7.1) Although I am not in opposition to lifting the current pit bull ban, I will be recommending that the council does not pass the third reading of this ordinance. Adrian and I have worked together to provide an alternative ordinance for agenda item 7.2.

7.2) This ordinance lifts the ban on pit bulls, but also includes a special registration and regulations on keeping of the pit bull breed of dogs. The ordinance includes an annual \$100 registration for pit bulls, requires that all pit bulls be spayed or neutered within 1 year of age, proof of liability insurance on the dog, requires the proper use of a leash and muzzle when being walked off of the owner's property, a secure enclosure for the dog to be kept on the property, and required notification if the dog escapes and is at large. There are other requirements, but I think those are the main topics. My opinion is that this is a fair compromise between the two factions. It allows citizens to own pit bulls, but puts in place reasonable precautions for public safety.

7.4) We will go through the proposals at the meeting, but in summary:

- Shuttlesworth & Ingersoll had the low bid with a total not to exceed \$3,500.
- Bradley & Riley submitted a not to exceed of \$3,000 for the policy review and \$1,200 for the sensitivity training, for a total of \$4,200.
- Simmons, Perrine, Moyer, and Bergman did not provide a not to exceed. They estimated the policy review to cost between \$2,000 and \$4,000. They estimated the training to cost between \$1,500 and \$4,000.
- 7.6) I have contacted multiple agencies regarding email hosting, but still have not received any proposals. I expect to have at least three proposals for discussion at the meeting. I apologize for not having those in advance.

The City Council of the City of Anamosa met in Regular Session this March 12, 2018 in the Council Chambers at City Hall at 6:00 p.m. with Rich Crump, Kay Smith, John Machart, Rod Smith, Cody Shaffer and Betty Weimer present. Absent: None. Mayor Dale Barnes presided. Also present were Jacob Sheridan, City Administrator; Tammy Coons, City Clerk; Dan Smith, Wastewater Superintendent; Jim Henson, Water Superintendent; Travis McNally, Police Sergeant; Rebecca Vernon, Library Director and Tyler Laing, Parks & Rec Director. Guests Present Addressing the Council: Nancy Shaffer, 803 N. Division Ct; Leanne Boone and Doug Edel, Anamosa Chamber of Commerce; Jon Custis, 407 E Cedar St.; Mike Dearborn, 405 N. Division St.; Kim Kurth, 303 Cleveland St.; John Ely, 301 N. Davis St.; Chris Collins, 507 E. 1st St.; Kelly Day, 110 W. Walnut St.; Toni Ellis, 505 E. 1st St.; Heidi Hubbard, 110 W. Walnut St.; Randy Day, 304 S. Oak St.; and Judy Rose, 206 S. Davis St. Mayor Dale Barnes called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Roll call was taken with a quorum present.

Council Minutes

Motion by Rod Smith, second by Shaffer to approve the minutes from the February 26, 2018 Regular Council meeting and the February 26, 2018 Special Council Meeting. All Ayes. Motion Carried.

Presentations

Nancy Shaffer, 803 N. Division Ct. addressed the Council asking them not to approve the third reading of the ordinance lifting the Pit Bull ban in Anamosa. Nancy then presented a video of attacks by Pit Bulls. She talked about the dog's body language being hard to read and that the type of bites from Pit Bulls cannot be compared to other types of dog bites. Nancy also stated that a breaking stick has to be used to break the bite of a Pit Bull. She stated that the easy breeding is a fast money maker for breeders. Nancy touched on the following: inexperienced owners adopting Pit Bulls from shelters, that the leash law and the licensing requirements are not enough to handle Pit Bulls and expressed worry for the safety of community.

Leanne Boone and Doug Edel, Chamber of Commerce addressed the Council presenting a proposed Bike Ride Event in combination with a band and beverage garden to be held after the ride event. They are tentatively looking at Saturday July 7th to hold the event. Doug reviewed the details of the event and potential City staff involvement.

Jon Custis, 407 E. Cedar Street addressed the Council stating that he had purchased the property at 1120 N. Williams St. and he had requested information on disconnecting the siren located very near his property line. He reviewed his experience from the siren being sounded when he was at the residence. Jon stated that he has 100% disability due to PTSD from being a veteran. He then reviewed statistics and guidelines on outdoor warning systems and how it related to the statistics of the current siren. He formally requested that this siren next his property be disabled. Discussion followed. Jacob Sheridan, City Administrator reviewed his gathered information on this siren regarding the location from Jon's property and also the FCC document that Jon had referenced. More discussion followed on the location of all sirens be reviewed by the contractor to determine the best location for sirens and meeting the requirements and regulations.

Proclamations

Mayor Dale Barnes read proclamation proclaiming April 2018 Sexual Assault Awareness month.

COMMUNITY BETTERMENT:

Ordinance Amending Chapter 55 of the City Code (Animal Protection and Control) to Drop Breed Specific Prohibition

Rod Smith read a letter he received from Mary Ellis, 318 Deerwood Drive who could not attend the Council meeting tonight, which reviewed her personal experience when a Pit Bull attacked her smaller dog and it happened twice in the same day. In Mary's letter she also gave statistics and requested that Anamosa continue the ban on Pit Bulls. Betty Weimer expressed her desire to table the third reading of

the ordinance until the next regular council meeting to afford the opportunity to review and possible increase restrictions on aggressive or dangerous dog ordinances at the same time. Jacob reviewed his experience with in his previous city when lifting the Pit Bull ban. Discussion followed.

Motion by Weimer, second by Crump to table the third reading of the Ordinance amending Chapter 55 of the City Code (Animal Protection and Control) to Drop Breed Specific Prohibition to the next regular council meeting on March 26, 2018. Discussion followed.

Mike Dearborn, 405 N. Division St. addressed the Council asking for clarification on what the Council was voting on in this motion. Betty explained her reasoning on the intention of the motion. Mike asked if the additional proposed ordinance on the aggressive dog would come before the 3rd reading of the Pit Bull ordinance on the agenda. Discussion followed. Mike inquired of the Mayor what his opinion was on the possible agenda item order.

Kim Kurth, 303 Cleveland St. addressed the Council asking if the public present could present an opinion on this agenda item. She reviewed her 3 experiences with Pit Bull attacks for the Council.

John Ely, 301 N. Davis St. addressed the Council reviewing open meeting laws and that require whenever there is a majority of the Council involved, it becomes a public meeting. He questioned one council member going around to other council members and giving information. John requested that the Council be very careful in these types of situations. Betty stated that it is correct that the Council cannot make decisions but can pass information on to each other.

Chris Collins, 507 E. 1st St. addressed the Council asking if the Pit Bull ban would apply to emotional support dogs. Jacob stated that yes, it does. Chris stated that this opinion differed from the City Attorney's opinion at the last meeting. He then reviewed Brian Darrow's previous presentation and summary. Chris also questioned where the Council will draw the line on what types of dogs are going to be allowed by the size or breed of dog. He stated that he is sure that no one in the community wants aggressive or vicious dogs in the community. Chris stated that he feels that banning a breed of dog is not effective.

Kelly Day, 110 W. Walnut addressed the Council questioning where the statistics that were given in Rod's citizen letter were acquired from or the source. She also stated that if the City is banning a breed due to fatalities, then other breeds will also need to be banned. Kelly stated that there are 25 breeds that account for the maulings.

Toni Ellis, 505 E. 1st St. addressed the Council stating that she has worked in health care and is very aware of what dogs, cats and people can do. She asked that the Council consider that looks can be deceiving and that everyone has a fear of different dogs.

Heidi Hubbard, 110 W. Walnut St. addressed the Council stating that she has volunteered at animal shelters and other facilities. She dog sits for 18 dogs and in her opinion every dog can bite and some dogs are trained poorly, which is bad ownership issues. Rod Smith expressed his disagreement with tabling the motion on the third reading of the Pit Bull ban. Weimer explained her reasoning once again. Roll Vote. 1 – Nay, Rod Smith. All Remaining Ayes. Motion Carried.

Establishing and Adopting Guidelines for Public Participation at City Council Meetings

Jacob suggested that item number three in the proposed resolution be removed and public comment with items not on the agenda (agenda item no.12.0) be removed. He stated that this limits the ability of the public to respond to the agenda item. Crump expressed his disagreement and that it should be allowed but controlled. Rod Smith suggested parliamentary procedures for council meetings. He also stated that side-bar conversations should not be allowed. Jacob recommended reviewing and revising and reconsideration of proposed resolution.

Randy Day, 304 S. Oak St. addressed the Council stating he remembered when this public participation guideline was adopted and he stated that this is a good thing.

Judy Rose, 206 S., Davis St. agrees with the time limit on citizen participation. She then reviewed her experience with her resignation from the Zoning Board of Adjustment and her application to be on the P&Z Committee. She reviewed her experience with P&Z, committees and her education.

Review of City Employee Personnel Policies/Discrimination/Sensitivity Training

Jacob reviewed the email from Adrian Knuth regarding his research, proposals and his recommendation to hire Shuttlesworth and Ingersoll to complete this process. Discussion followed. It was requested that Jacob have Adrian receive the actual proposals before the Council made a decision on both agenda items 6.3 and 6.4.

Resolution Approving the Subdivision Plat for Storage Addition

Rod Smith asked Doug Edel, Planning & Zoning Commission for a summary of the review of these two subdivision plats. Discussion followed. Randy Williams, MMS Consultants explained the reasoning for the plat reviews.

Motion by Rod Smith, second by Shaffer to approve **Resolution 2018-04** approving the subdivision Plat for Storage Addition. Roll Vote. All Ayes. Motion Carried.

ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 55 OF THE CITY CODE (ANIMAL PROTECTION AND CONTROL) TO DROP BREED SPECIFIC PROHIBITION

WHEREAS Section 55.01(4) of the City Code in listing dangerous animals that are prohibited from being in the City includes all Pit bull terriers, Pit bull mixed breed dogs and any dog having the appearance and characteristics of being predominantly a Pit bull Terrier; and,

WHEREAS this Council is of the opinion it is not fair to categorically prohibit an entire breed of dogs but rather that the focus should be on individual dogs of vicious or threatening behavior;

BE IT RESOLVED, THEREFORE, that paragraph 55.01(4)(F) of the City Code is deleted in its entirety.

ORDINANCE DELETING PIT BULL TERRIER PROHIBITION BUT REQUIRING SPECIAL REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS OF PIT BULL TERRIERS

WHEREAS Section 55.01(4)(F) of the City Code currently categorizes pit bull terriers as dangerous animals; and,

WHEREAS Section 55.17 of the City Code bans dangerous animals from within the corporate limits of the City; and,

WHEREAS this Council does not believe a flat prohibition of pit bull terriers is warranted but does believe there should be special licensing requirements for pit bull terriers;

BE IT ORDAINED, THEREFORE, that Section 55.01(4)(F) is deleted in its entirety.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that there be added Section 55 of the City Code the following new numbered subsection:

- 22. Pit bull terriers, defined to consist of the following:
 - a. Staffordshire terrier breed of dog;
 - b. The American pit bull terrier breed of dog;
 - c. The American Staffordshire terrier breed of dog; or,
 - d. Any dog which has the appearance and characteristics of being predominantly of the breeds of Staffordshire terrier, American pit bull terriers or American Staffordshire terrier;

shall be subject to the following additional licensing regulations:

- 1. The annual pit bull terrier license fee shall be \$100.00.
- 2. The following documentation, in addition to that required under Section 55.21(3), is required to be submitted when licensing or renewing the license for a pit bull terrier:
 - a. Proof that the dog has been either spayed or neutered. Pit bull terriers must be neutered within one year of birth;
 - b. A picture of the dog showing it from the side or from lateral perspective;
 - c. A picture of the dog showing its face or from the cranial perspective;

- d. Proof of liability insurance coverage for no less than \$100,000.00 to cover any damages or injuries that may be caused by the dog. Each such policy shall contain a provision requiring the City be notified immediately by the insurance company issuing the policy in the event the policy is cancelled, terminated or expires during the registration period for the dog.
- e. A report from the Police Department that the owner's confinement space meets the requirements of the following subsection.
- 3. The keeping of a pit bull terrier shall be subject to the following minimum requirements:
 - a. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of a pit bull terrier to allow the dog to be off of the owner's property without a securely attached leash not more than (4) feet in length and a properly fitted muzzle to prevent it from biting humans or other animals. Such muzzle shall not interfere with the dog's breathing or vision.
 - b. Except when leashed and muzzled as provided in this section, a pit bull terrier shall be confined indoors or confined in a locked pen or other secure enclosure that is suitable to prevent the entry of children and is designed to prevent the dog from escaping. The enclosure shall include shelter for the dog and protection from the elements and shall provide adequate exercise room, light, and ventilation. A privacy fence does not meet the requirements of confinement for a pit bull terrier. The enclosed structure shall be kept in a clean and sanitary condition and shall meet the following requirements:
 - i. The structure must have secure sides and a secure top;
 - ii. The structure must have a bottom permanently attached to the sides or the sides must be embedded not less than one (1) foot into the ground; and,
 - iii. The structure must be of such material and closed in such a manner that the dog cannot exit the enclosure on its own.
 - c. All owners or keepers of pit bull terriers shall display in a prominent place on their premises a sign easily readable by the public using the words "Beware of Dog".
 - d. Every owner of a registered pit bull terrier shall, within ten (10) days of any of the following incidents, report in writing to the City of:
 - i. The removal of the pit bull terrier from the City;
 - ii. The death of the pit bull terrier;
 - iii. The birth of offspring from the pit bull terrier; or,
 - iv. The owner's new address if the owner moves within the City.

- e. All offspring born of registered pit bull terriers are subject to the requirements of this ordinance.
- f. The owner or keeper of a pit bull terrier shall notify the Anamosa Police Department immediately if the pit bull escapes from its enclosure or restraint and is at large. Such immediate notification shall also be required if the dog bites or attacks a person or domestic animal.

The owner of a pit bull terrier found to be in violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be subject to the following civil penalties:

a.	For first offense, \$250.00;
b.	For second offense, \$500.00; and,
c.	For third offense, \$750.00 along with removal of the pit bull terrier from the corporate City limits.

Resolution Establishing and Adopting Guidelines for Public Participation at City Council Meetings

WHEREAS, the City Council for the City of Anamosa, Iowa recognizes the importance of citizen participation in City matters; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wants to assure that citizens are heard and the Council meetings are conducted efficiently and in an organized manner, the following guidelines shall be adopted.

NOW, THEREFORE, It Is Resolved by the City Council of the City of Anamosa, Iowa, the following guidelines shall be adopted to allow citizens to speak on any issue at the Council meeting.

- To speak on any issue The citizen shall submit the item of discussion in writing to the City Administrator or City Clerk by the close of business on the Wednesday preceding the scheduled Council meeting and the item can be placed on the agenda. The Citizen making the presentation shall address the Mayor and Council only. Any member of the public present at the meeting wishing to address the presenter, will need to seek permission from the Mayor and Council.
- 2. To speak on a specific item listed on the Council agenda Once the agenda item has been identified by the Mayor and there has been a first and second motion on the item, the Mayor will ask if there is any discussion by the Council first, after which citizen(s) present at the meeting may request permission to address the Council on the agenda item. The citizen will address the Council from the podium, stating their name and address for the record before addressing the Council. The Mayor will limit their time to 5 minutes and will also limit the address if this point of information has already been identified by another citizen. As a courtesy, the Mayor and Council will refrain from asking questions of the citizen addressing the Council until that person has finished their comments or has reached the 5 minute limit.
- 3. To speak on a topic that is not on the agenda and a prior written request was not made The citizen may address the Council on such a topic at the time the Mayor identifies the following agenda item "Public with Business with the Council on Items not on the Agenda". As stated in No. 2 above, the Mayor will impose the same limits of time and point of information.
- 4. If a citizen or citizens create any disruption during the meeting, including "side-bar" conversations, they may be asked to discontinue their behavior or be asked to leave the meeting in order for the Council to conduct business in an orderly and efficient manner.

All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Thank you for your recent communication regarding a proposal for training for the City of Anamosa. My hourly rate is \$260.00 per hour for this work. I estimate, depending on the status of the Employee Handbook and Personnel Policies, it would cost between \$2,000.00 and \$4,000.00 to revise and update a new handbook and policy manual. I have not reviewed it so it may be that it does not need a significant amount of work.

My proposal for conducting the training for the City Council, supervisors, and staff, is to hold multiple sessions that are conducive to interactive question and answer sessions. I propose to do two to three sessions, depending on the number of employees and staff that need to attend. I propose that we also do a separate supervisor training depending on the number of supervisors. I anticipate a modest amount of preparation time and two hours for each session.

Presentation time: Approximately 2 hours

Employee training: 2-3 sessions x 2 hours each = 4-6 hours Supervisor training: 1-3 sessions x 2 hours each = 2-6 hours

I estimate a range of \$1500.00 to \$4,000.00 to conduct the training.

With the current environment, the City of Anamosa and its employees may have many different questions and wideranging levels of comfort when discussing workplace harassment. Sessions should be tailored to specific audiences and presented in smaller groups to ensure appropriate tone and allow opportunities for questions.

ORDINANCE PRESCRIBING CIVIL PENALTIES FOR FAILURE TO LICENSE DOGS

WHEREAS Section 55 of the City Code, in requiring the licensing of dogs, does not prescribe minimum penalties for violations thereof; and,

WHEREAS this Council believes minimum penalties should be prescribed for failing to license dogs as required by Section 55.21 of the City Code;

BE IT ORDAINED, THEREFORE, that the following numbered paragraph be added to Section 55.21 of the City Code:

- 6. For each day a dog required to be licensed is unlicensed its owner shall be subject to the following civil penalties:
 - A. For first offense, \$65.00.
 - B. For second offense, \$130.00.
 - C. For third offense, \$260.00.
 - D. For fourth offense, \$750.00 along with removal of the dog from the corporate City limits.

Dog licenses shall be effective for the fiscal year July 1st through June 30th. Dog license renewals shall be available June 1st each year. However, no citation shall issue for renewal violations prior to August 1st each year.
