# - 16 -REQUESTS FROM CITIZENS

Dan Anderson, 2307 County Road 700, Riceville, asked for City Manager Sumner to apologize publicly to him and Council Member Pelley and state the accusations regarding the woman left in the hotel were untrue. Mr. Anderson acknowledged receipt of a letter of apology by mail. Glenn Whiting, 237 County Road 655, Athens, asked to be put on the next Study Session agenda to set up a set of rules for citizens and the City Council to follow when they are speaking at a Council meeting. Cynthia McCowan, 617 Walnut Boulevard, Athens, stated the Bicentennial is coming up in March and Free Hill is not part of the celebration as far as she is aware. The Free Hill community has 120 years of history and should be included. Ms. McCowan asked for feedback when an individual makes a request. She had made a request about cleaning up the slave cemetery at Prof Powers Park and was told it would be put on the agenda, but she never heard anything more about her request. She had also requested having teen activities during the summer. It could be an everyday program for approximately two months to engage the teens. She had talked to Austin Fesmire, but the item has not been placed on the agenda. The teens do not get engaged when programs are not held every day because the parents cannot get them to those types of programs. It needs to be a program where the parents can drop the teens off in the morning and pick them up in the evening, not just a babysitting program but one that provides valuable programming. Ms. McCowan also felt there needed to be a well-defined process for citizen input. In her opinion, if she asks for an item to be placed on the Study Session agenda, then she should be allowed to participate in the discussion at that meeting as she may have more information than the Council on the topic and could provide

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clarification if needed. She understood that if everyone in the audience were allowed to speak it could take all night but felt the individual making the request should be allowed to participate in the discussion. She also felt the Study Session agenda should be posted so the public can know what is going to be discussed. There should be a process for a citizen to engage with the Council if they have any questions or comments on a specific item.

**WHEREAS**, CASA Corridor's volunteers continue to work unceasingly to preserve the rights for all abused/neglected children to live in a safe and stable home, and

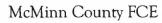
WHEREAS, since 2009, CASA Corridor has served 1,284 children with 203 Advocates.

SUBJECT: Increase Rogers Group Contract for STBG Paving

In September, Council approved the bid in the amount of \$1,066,988.50 for Rogers Group for the STBG paving project. The final cost ended up being \$1,097,731.16 and these costs have been verified by Mattern & Craig, our engineering consultants. I am requesting that the contract amount be increased by \$30,742.66 to allow for final payment to be made to Rogers Group.

SUBJECT: Purchase of Replacement & Surplus of Asset #4313 Tymco Street Sweeper

The Public Works Department is requesting Council approval for purchase of a replacement street sweeper for the Street Cleaning Department. The sweeper is currently on a 5-year useful-life cycle. Asset #4313, a Tymco sweeper, was purchased in February 2016 for \$196,669.00. Staff continued to use the vehicle beyond the anticipated end-of-useful-life as it has continued to perform acceptably, and staff is comfortable with operation of the vehicle.

The Department recommends replacement via purchase of a demo Schwarze A7 Tornado sweeper for \$239,284.00. This price includes delivery of the equipment to the Public Works facility. This vehicle is being purchased through TN Statewide Contract (SWC) 225 from CMI Equipment Sales, Inc. in Goodlettsville, TN. The unit being purchase is a demo with approximately 3,000 road miles and has been used exclusively by agencies to demo the sweeper platform. Purchase of this demo unit in lieu of a new unit means immediate inclusion to the fleet in addition to a cost savings of approximately \$40,000 vs a new unit. The unit will have a full manufacturer's warranty after purchase, the same as if it was new.

After receipt of the sweeper, inspection, and addition to the City's insurance coverage, asset #4313 is to be listed as surplus and sold on GovDeals.

The Public Works Department is requesting Council approval for purchase of a replacement tractor and mowing unit for the Street Cleaning Department. The tractor is currently on a 10-year useful-life cycle. Asset #4124, a John Deere Tractor, was purchased in August 2013 for \$45,286.46. Asset #4128, the Alamo flail mower, was purchased in July 2013 for \$44,200, the combined unit totaling \$89,486.46. The unit has seen extensive use, and the mower unit is beginning to exhibit significant wear and needs repairs.

Due to significant increase in costs and build/upfitting delays across heavy equipment industries, the Department is looking to move quickly on purchase of the replacement unit as the equipment platform is currently in stock and ready for immediate upfitting and integration in the fleet in preparation for warm weather.

The Department recommends replacement via purchase of a John Deere 6105E 4WD tractor equipped equipped with an Alamo 22' Machete grinding unit for \$136,995.00. This price includes delivery of the equipment to the Public Works facility. This vehicle is being purchased through Sourcewell co-operative purchasing contract #052417-AGI from CMI Equipment Sales, Inc. in Goodlettsville, TN. After receipt of the equipment, inspection, and addition to the City's insurance coverage, assets #4124 & #4128 are to be listed as surplus and sold on GovDeals.

**SUBJECT:** A & E Services for the Fire Training Facility

# **Scope**

At the present time, this project is anticipated to involve the installation of a modular manufactured Fire Tower, a driver training course, and a building to house a reserve fire engine and a training classroom. A & E services will be needed to help layout the site with special attention to be given to water runoff from the site, particularly the large concrete pad to be constructed as the driver training course. An analysis of the existing building will be needed to be sure it is structurally sound to convert it over to the proposed use. Because of this change in use, several upgrades will be needed to meet building codes. The services should also cover designing, bidding, and construction inspection for the installation of the tower, construction of the concrete pad, and work on the existing building. Other items may be needed, but at this time the list comprises the bulk of the work anticipated.

### **Process**

Ben Burchfield, Chief Ainsworth, and I have discussed options for obtaining A & E Services. Based upon these discussions and given the expertise they have in house designing fire facilities, we are recommending we negotiate an agreement with Stantec to provide these services. Stantec is already working for the city on the traffic improvements to accommodate the new school and for the downtown area. We do not feel this additional project will overload their schedule and cause progress on any of these projects to slow. They have been extremely responsive to date on the two projects they are handling, and other than the lead contact different personnel with a different set of expertise will handle this project.

### **Action Item**

We are asking for permission to enter negotiations with Stantec so that we may bring an agreement for services to the City Council next month for approval.

# Scope

This project involves various streets throughout the city which are in most need of paving. The project consists of milling, re-paving, and addressing drainage issues which are impacted by the existing pavement or changes to the pavement grades. The project could also involve addressing some ADA compliance issues, but those items may also be addressed with city forces and not funded by this project. The decision regarding ADA compliance issues will be worked out as we design the project and get feedback from TDOT as to how they will require us to address ADA issues. We have already obtained our Notice to Proceed with the NEPA process so as soon as a firm is approved, we will be able to begin work on this project.

### **Process**

We have utilized the required TDOT Local Programs selection process for obtaining engineering services. Five firms originally submitted for the project and three firms were chosen to advance to Phase II of the evaluation process. A committee comprised of myself, Ben Burchfield, April Johnston, Mike Keith, and Anthony Casteel evaluated the firms during both Phase I and Phase II of the evaluation process. The finalists in order of highest to lowest ranking were Gresham Smith, Mattern & Craig, and Cannon & Cannon.

# **Action Item**

We are asking for permission to enter negotiations with Gresham Smith to bring an agreement for services to the City Council next month for approval. In the event these negotiations prove unsuccessful, we would attempt to negotiate an agreement with Mattern & Craig. In the unlikely event an agreement cannot be reached with either of the first two firms, then we would attempt to negotiate an agreement with Cannon & Cannon. This approach complies with the TDOT selection guidelines.

**SUBJECT:** Wayfinding Signs

As you are aware, Hacker Sign was the only company to submit a valid proposal in response to our recent Request For Proposals regarding wayfinding signage. On March 9<sup>th</sup> I was contacted by a representative from Hacker Sign who indicated they were working on pricing for the City's updated design but were having issues with the project. The problem revolves around the typical timeframe between when the City requests items to be submitted for the City Council agenda and when the matter is voted upon by City Council. A project such as this would historically be quoted with a price guarantee of at least 30 days. In today's environment manufacturers are not willing to guarantee prices for more than five to ten days. Hacker Sign was inquiring as to the shortest timeframe the City could accept between pricing and consideration for approval. Their three suppliers were all limiting the pricing to five days. Mr. Hacker indicated he thought he could get a short extension, but it probably would be only a few extra days.

Earlier today I spoke with Mr. Hacker and he stated he could supply us pricing later today which would be valid until the City Council meeting next week. To my surprise he also had one supplier who had the material in stock and was willing to hold it for him if we could work within this timeframe. In this environment, I expected the supply time to be at least eight weeks.

Delaying consideration of this matter until next month wouldn't resolve the issue at hand, because we still would not be able to obtain pricing which would be valid for more than five days. Delaying the decision also risks a significant price increase based upon the dramatic rise in fuel prices over have risen the past week. We would also risk losing access to the materials in stock, potentially creating a lengthy delay for the project.

While I realize this is an inconvenience to the elected officials and city staff, the only other alternative at this time would seem to be to wait and approve the project with a not to exceed budget amount, which may or may not be enough to allow us to move forward once the pricing is updated. Otherwise, we would likely have to delay the project for the foreseeable future until the current volatility and supply chain issues are resolved.

# CITY OF ATHENS, TENNESSEE Narrative on Financial Analysis February, 2022

This narrative will discuss various aspects of the financial data presented to the city council for the above-referenced month. July, and 2 or 3 subsequent months will be above the normal percentages, primarily on the expenditure side because of several factors, as discussed below.

# General Fund

Overall, we collected about \$315,000 more through February this year, primarily because we received \$625,000 more in sales tax, \$150,000 more in state sales tax, \$160,000 less from the direct appropriation grant from the State, \$208,000 less in CARES Act funding, \$55,000 more in property taxes, \$73,000 less interest and \$71,000 less in gross receipts tax. The increase in local and state sales taxes continues to exceed our projections for the budget year. As a percentage we collected 5.58% less than the budgeted revenues for last year.

PLEASE NOTE: On the financial spreadsheet that accompanies this report, at the top you will see General Fund revenues. I have only broken out major sources of revenue such as property taxes and sales taxes. The "total revenues" amount includes smaller items that I did not show in detail. A complete listing of all revenue accounts can be found on your computer-generated report titled "Statement of Actual and Estimated Revenues".

Expenditures are always going to show high in the early budget months, primarily due to the retirement contribution being paid in July and the fleet management transfer. The \$2,500,000 transfer of the excess fund balance to capital makes up 12% of the total budget.

Another factor that makes the percentage spent look high is the fact that we set up annual purchase orders for known or recurring monthly expenses. For example, in the City Council division we pay for the monthly taping of council meetings. To avoid having to prepare a purchase order every month, we prepare one for the entire year and pay off of it monthly. This total PO is included in the "expended & encumbered" percentage.

Expenditures and encumbrances for this year are \$3,080,000 more than this time last year, showing 69.29% this year. The variance is due to the \$2,500,000 fund balance transfer and the transfer to the Debt Service Fund.

# Sanitation

Revenues and expenditures are comparable to the prior year.
