#### DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

On June 11, 2022, the Athens Fire Department responded to a fire alarm at Athens Place Assisted Living located at 120 Keith Lane at approximately 11:18 a.m. Minutes later, an employee called 911 and confirmed they did have a fire in the storage closet in the Memory Care wing.

Upon arrival, no fire or smoke was visible from the exterior of the structure. Firefighters made entry through the main entrance and continued to the hall that led to the fire. The hall was smoke-filled. Our firefighters quickly located the source of the fire: a fan box in the attic of a storage room. The fire was contained to a small area in the attic above the storage closet and the fire was quickly extinguished. A primary and secondary search was conducted and completed. Firefighters confirmed with onsite staff that accountability was in check.

Athens Fire Department assisted Athens Place Assisted Living staff with setting up a safe place in the parking lot. Chief Ainsworth noted that everyone involved with this fire did an exceptional job. He stated, "I would like to give the staff of Athens Place Assisted Living credit for the phenomenal job they did evacuating the residents as fire units arrived since many of the residents could not self-evacuate. The residents are blessed to have such amazing caregivers. They not only took care of the residents, but they worked hand in hand with us. The staff at Athens Place Assisted Living were prepared and they did an awesome job. The outcome in this situation could not have been any better. "The City Council of Athens, Tennessee, proudly acknowledges the outstanding performance of the staff at Athens Place Assisted Living on June 11, 2022.

RE: Requesting council approval to purchase AFD Utility Terrain Vehicle

- 1. The Athens Fire Department is in need of a Utility Terrain Vehicle and \$43,000 was budgeted and approved in the Fiscal Year 2023's Capital Fund for this purchase. AFD has sourced options for a Polaris Ranger Crew XP Northstar Ultimate and was able to find this utility vehicle on **Sourcewell**, a purchasing cooperative that complies with governmental procurement requirements applicable to the State of Tennessee for competitive solicitation.
- 2. MSRP for the UTV is \$35,199.00 but offered through Sourcewell Contract #122220-PSI at the discounted price of \$32,757.41. All other attachments and accessories are also discounted through this contract and listed in the attached quote build.
- 3. Therefore, under the authority of city <u>Resolution No. 2020-32</u>, I recommend requesting council approval to purchase the Ranger Crew XP Northstar Ultimate from **Polaris** and the listed attachments & accessories accompanying this memo for the quoted total of \$35,197.95. This request is under the budgeted \$43,000 to make this purchase and leaves remaining funds available to add a generic rescue skid attachment and emergency lights.

SUBJECT: Replacement & Surplus of Asset #3974 New Holland Tractor

The Public Works Department is requesting Council approval for purchase of a replacement tractor and mowing unit for the Street Cleaning Department. The tractor is currently on a 10-year useful-life cycle and was scheduled for replacement in 2021. Asset #3974, a New Holland Tractor, was purchased in July 2010 for \$25,864.00. The unit has seen extensive use and is due for replacement.

The Department recommends a replacement purchase of a John Deere 5090E 4WD tractor equipped with 96" SHD rear flail & 62" Interstater side flail Alamo mowing unit for \$134,261.93. This price includes delivery of the equipment to the Public Works facility. This vehicle is being purchased through Sourcewell co-operative purchasing contract #070821-AGI from CMI Equipment Sales, Inc. in Goodlettsville, TN. Current build time and delivery estimates put the unit being delivered to Public Works sometime in March 2023. The unit will immediately be put into service for the 2023 mowing season. After receipt of the equipment, inspection, and addition to the City's insurance coverage, asset #3974 is to be listed as surplus and sold on GovDeals.

On August 1, 2022, at 2 PM the city of Athens opened bid number 23-01 titled Construction of Athens Playground Renovation and Pavilion Kitchen Addition. The city received one qualified bid on this project from Wilson Construction of Athens. A second bid was submitted by Aspen Contracting but was invalid as it did not include a bid on the entire project.

This project was originally for drainage work and rubber surfacing at Cook and Regional Park playgrounds. Due to the playground incident at Cook, combined with Covid supply issues, this project was delayed for over a year waiting on the playground repair. City Council expressed interest in seeing additional work at Cook and since we had time, I had bid documents prepared to include all items discussed.

The items were bid as follows:

Item A – Site Improvements – \$456,295.20

Includes the rubber surface and associated drainage at Cook and Regional Park, ADA improvements to the Cook Parking lot and playground, drainage corrections associated with the pavilion at Cook, and concrete removal from Cook Playground.

Item B – Cook Park Kitchen Addition – \$304,196.80

Includes the addition of a caterer kitchen on the east end of the pavilion. The outside dimensions of the kitchen are 18'8" across by 14' deep. The kitchen addition will require extending the pavilion and the total extension is 27' 10.5" across by 17' 6" inches deep. The pavilion addition requires columns, a roof, and a concrete slab. The kitchen has a sink with hot and cold water, a stainless-steel countertop, a roll-up serving window, and a place for a refrigerator. This is the equivalent of other parks as the finishes are what was used at Heritage and the size is what is at the Regional Park Lake Pavilion. As with our other facilities, there are no stoves or cooking areas.

Item C – Combined Lump Sum of Improvements plus Kitchen - \$760,492

Item D – Contingency (5% of lump sum total) – \$38,024.60

Item F – Total Base Bid Lump Sum - \$798,516.60

Alternate 1 - \$13,434

Includes removal of unlevel concrete around the monuments that is a trip hazard. The concrete is not cracked but has settled leaving it very unlevel and raised edges. This will remove concrete walks and replace only the areas that abut the sidewalks. Some areas will be removed permanently to eliminate the continued settling. This is a structural and cosmetic fix.

Alternate 2 - \$14,400

Includes a pre-cast concrete cap for the wall around the basketball court. It was our desire to retain the last piece of the school building and it was determined that this cap was the best way to repair the top.

Alternate 3 - \$4,750

Includes a poured-in-place bench on the west side of the basketball court wall. This bench was deemed to be the best way to cover the exposed brick without compromising the structural integrity of the school wall. A bench will be poured that covers the unsightly area of the wall. This and Alternate 2 comprise the wall repairs discussed.

Alternate 4 - \$87,000

Includes the entirety of the landscaping plan for the property.

Alternate 5 - \$42,000

Includes the replacement of the entire roof. This price was asked for in case it was determined that the roof addition caused by the kitchen did not match.

#### Recommendations:

The items in the site improvements, (Item A), are necessary to finish the playground surfacing at Cook and Regional and include ADA improvements at Cook along with drainage corrections that have been discussed. As this was the original capital item and is keeping the Cook playground from opening, I recommend we do Item A.

The kitchen, (Item B) was discussed by Council as a suggested improvement to Cook Park. The architect and I also looked at a free-standing building but determined the best option was to add to the end of the existing pavilion. I present this configuration and bid as the best current option for adding a kitchen equivalent to Cook Park if the Council wishes to proceed with this item.


Alternate 1, relative to the concrete that has settled around the monument, should be accepted and fixed for safety reasons. This is a settling issue from the old building and will continue to be an issue if it is not addressed.

Alternate 2, the pre-cast concrete cap to address the wall around the basketball court and Alternative 3, the poured-in-place bench, should be accepted if it is the intent to preserve the wall as part of the school history. I recommend these as the best options for dressing up the area without disturbing the wall.

I do not recommend accepting Alternate 4, trees, and shrubs, as that can be handled in phases through the general budget or perhaps a community project.

I do not recommend accepting Alternative 5, replacement of the entire roof, unless some unknown structural issue necessitates the same. This was included in the event there was not an adequate color match. I recommend using the old roof and if after fading it does not match, look into repainting the entire roof. It should be noted that there will be a color difference from new to old as all colors fade.

I have included the building elevations as part of this memorandum and stand prepared to answer any questions relative to this bid or these plans.

FY2023 Budget Amendment Number 1 for Fund Balance Transfer

Our fund balance policy for the unassigned fund balance in the General Fund is to maintain an amount equal to 75% of budgeted expenditures. For the FY2023 budget, that amount should be \$14,625,000. Since we have several items that were not completed in the prior year and are being carried over to this year (\$500,000 of paving being one item), I recommend that this amount be \$15,500,000.

Based on the above, I recommend transferring \$2,900,000 from the General Fund to the Capital Projects Fund in August and ask that it be placed on the August Agenda. Please let me know if you have any questions or need any additional items for this memo.

### 5. Annexation Study and Plan of service recommendation for County Road 129 part of Parcel 055 104.00.

Mr. Casteel said this is approximately thirty-five acres of a remaining lot that is part in the city. He showed the Commission a notarized request from the landowners. It is across from McMinn County High School; he pointed out Lark Street and Lark Lane. The only access to this property currently is off County Road 129. It has a fifty-foot flag stem there's thirteen acres in the city and there are thirty-five outside the city. The main question is whether they want to annex the road. He is not recommending they do that right now because it is contiguous to the city. If they annex the road, it creates a donut hole. There is no reason to do that. They will still be able to provide services down that roadway and that is what he is recommending.

Mr. Casteel said under the plan of services they address police services, fire services. Based on the census, there is a possibility of 737 people could be in there when they finally get it developed. They are going to do a duplex, apartment rentals is what he heard. They do not have to do that, as they have asked for R-2 zoning and they can do anything the R-2 zone allows, which they will bring it to the Commission once it is annexed, they will have to have it zoned and once it is zoned, it will be done. No added fire, any fire service they need fire hydrants will come under the development. They will have to put those in, and it is no cost to the city. AUB has come back and told what their policy is for water and sewer. That will be handled at the time when they do the site plan, and they will have to be the ones who extend the sewer at their cost. It is the same with natural gas services. Street lighting policy will be the same it has always been, but there will probably be service lights. The city may provide one on the right-of-way where you come into the entrance. That will be the only light the city would have to pay for. Wastewater service will also be handled the same way as everybody else. He does not know if they will be using dumpsters or have individual pickup; they will have to work that out with public works. That is all covered under the development fees. There are no streets so no cost to the city. They will do planning and zoning and subdivision regulations for free other than what the fees already are. They can use the city schools starting in 2022. They can use the city parks. He said if they want, they can recommend to city council that they can annex this property with no cost to the taxpayers.

Chairperson Hamilton said that is assuming they do not annex the street.

Mr. Casteel said that is what he is recommending, and he thinks it is what public works is recommending as well that they do not take the county road portion at this time.

<u>Chairperson Hamilton asked if the property owner requested the street.</u>

Mr. Casteel said no.

#### A. Police

- 1. Patrolling, radio responses to calls, and other routine police services using present personnel and equipment will be provided on the effective date of annexation.
- 2. Traffic signals, traffic signs, street markings, and other traffic control devices will be installed as the need as established by appropriate study and traffic standards.

#### B. Fire

- 1. Fire protection by the present personnel and equipment of the City of Athens, within the limitations of available water, will be provided to the area on the effective date of annexation.
- Fire hydrants for the County Road 129 Annexation Area that are required to be installed by the landowner when the parcel is devloped. Any future additional fire hydrants will be made available per the policies and requirements of the City of Athens and the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission as development occurs.

#### C. Water Service

1. Water service for domestic use and fire protection is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Proposed Site Plan(s) or Subdivision of the annexation area will require expansion of the existing water system to serve to any Site Plan(s) or subdivided tracts. Expansion of the existing water system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board. Expansions, Modifications, and Improvements to the existing system must be approved by the Athens Utilities Board and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prior to construction. With the final installation accepted by the Athens Utilities Board prior to the approval of a Site Plan(s) or Final Subdivision Plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

#### D. Electrical Service

1. Electrical power service is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Expansion of the existing power system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board.

#### E. Sanitary Sewer Service

1. Wastewater collection service is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Proposed Site Plan(s) or Subdivision of the annexation area will require expansion and modification of the existing wastewater collection system to serve to any Site Plan(s) or subdivided tracts. Expansion of the existing wastewater collection system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board. Expansions, Modifications, and Improvements to the existing system must be approved by the Athens Utilities Board and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prior to construction. With the final installation accepted by the Athens Utilities Board prior to the approval of a Site Plan(s) or Final Subdivision Plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

#### F. Natural Gas Service

1. Natural service is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Expansion of the existing gas system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board.

#### **G. Street Lighting**

1. Street lighting will be installed once lots are developed in accordance with the established policies of the City of Athens.

#### H. Solid Waste Collection and Disposal

1. The same regular solid waste collection and disposal service provided within the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation and subject to the policies of the City of Athens.

#### I. Street Construction and Repair

1. There are no streets involved in the annexation area/request. All interior access should be private for the duplex development.

#### J. Planning Services

- 1. The planning and zoning jurisdiction of the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation. An ordinance has been prepared zoning the property as an R-2 Medium Density Residential District that will become effective once all State statue requirements of the annexation and rezoning processes have been completed and finalized.
- Enforcement of the subdivision regulations, street design criteria, and flood damage prevention ordinance shall be extended to the annexed area after the effective date of the annexation.

- 3. Any inspection services now provided by the city (building, electrical, plumbing, gas, housing, sanitation, etc.) will begin in the annexation area on the effective date of annexation.
- 4. The City's participation in the National Flood Insurance Program will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation.

#### K. Recreation

 Residents of the annexed area will have the same access to all existing recreational facilities, parks, etc. upon the effective date of annexation. The same standards and policies now used in the present city will be followed in the expansion of the recreational program and facilities in the enlarged city.

#### L. School System

1. Children in the annexed area will be zoned to attend Athens City Schools when the new school year begins in 2022.

#### M. Other Miscellaneous Services

1. Other services such as general governmental administration, etc., will be in effect immediately upon the effective date of annexation.

## A RESOLUTION ADOPTING A PLAN OF SERVICES FOR THE ANNEXATION OF THE COUNTY ROAD 129 AREA PROPERTY BY THE CITY OF ATHENS, TENNESSEE

WHEREAS, the City of Athens is considering the annexation of property; and

WHEREAS, Tennessee Code Annotated (TCA) 6-51-102 as amended requires that a "Plan of Service" be adopted by the governing body of a municipality prior to the adoption of a resolution annexing an area; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with TCA 6-51-102 the Athens Municipal-Regional Planning Commission has recommended approval of the Plan of Services to the Council of the City of Athens, Tennessee; and

**WHEREAS,** a public hearing was held pursuant to TCA section 6-51-102, and notice thereof was published in the Daily Post-Athenian; and

**WHEREAS,** the City of Athens is considering annexation of property off of County Road 129 as detailed in Annexation Resolution # 2022-21.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Council of the City of Athens, Tennessee, as follows:

**SECTION 1**: Below is the "Plan of Service" for the proposed annexation of County Road 129 (aka Layman Road inside City) the remaining approximate 32 acres of Tax Map 055, Parcel 104.00, and part of a larger parcel identified as McMinn County Tax Map 055, Parcel 104.00 that contains 45.0 total acres to be recommended to City Council for adoption.

#### A. Police

- 1. Patrolling, radio responses to calls, and other routine police services using present personnel and equipment will be provided on the effective date of annexation.
- 2. Traffic signals, traffic signs, street markings, and other traffic control devices will be installed as the need is established by appropriate study and traffic standards.

#### B. Fire

- 1. Fire protection by the present personnel and equipment of the City of Athens, within the limitations of available water, will be provided to the area on the effective date of annexation.
- 2. Fire hydrants for the County Road 129 Annexation Area that are required to be installed by the landowner when the parcel is developed. Any future additional fire hydrants will be made available per the policies and requirements of the City

of Athens and the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission as development occurs.

#### C. Water Service

1. Water service for domestic use and fire protection is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Proposed Site Plan(s) or Subdivision of the annexation area will require expansion of the existing water system to serve any Site Plan(s) or subdivided tracts. Expansion of the existing water system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board. Expansions, Modifications, and Improvements to the existing system must be approved by the Athens Utilities Board and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prior to construction with the final installation accepted by the Athens Utilities Board prior to the approval of a Site Plan(s) or Final Subdivision Plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

### D. Electrical Service

Electrical power service is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation
Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Expansion of the existing power system is
subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board.

# E. Sanitary Sewer Service

1. Wastewater collection service is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Proposed Site Plan(s) or Subdivision of the annexation area will require expansion and modification of the existing wastewater collection system to provide service to any Site Plan(s) or subdivided tracts. Expansion of the existing wastewater collection system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board. Expansions, Modifications, and Improvements to the existing system must be approved by the Athens Utilities Board and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prior to construction with the final installation accepted by the Athens Utilities Board prior to the approval of a Site Plan(s) or Final Subdivision Plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

# F. Natural Gas Service

 Natural service is currently available to the County Road 129 Annexation Area by the Athens Utilities Board. Expansion of the existing gas system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board.

# **G.** Street Lighting

1. Street lighting will be installed once lots are developed in accordance with the established policies of the City of Athens.

# H. Solid Waste Collection and Disposal

1. The same regular solid waste collection and disposal service provided within the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation and subject to the policies of the City of Athens.

# I. Street Construction and Repair

1. There are no streets involved in the annexation area/request. All interior access should be private for the duplex development.

# J. Planning Services

- 1. The planning and zoning jurisdiction of the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation. An ordinance has been prepared zoning the property as an R-2 Medium Density Residential District that will become effective once all State statute requirements of the annexation and rezoning processes have been completed and finalized.
- 2. Enforcement of the subdivision regulations, street design criteria, and flood damage prevention ordinance shall be extended to the annexed area after the effective date of the annexation.
- 3. Any inspection services now provided by the city (building, electrical, plumbing, gas, housing, sanitation, etc.) will begin in the annexation area on the effective date of annexation.
- 4. The City's participation in the National Flood Insurance Program will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation.

# K. Recreation

1. Residents of the annexed area will have the same access to all existing recreational facilities, parks, etc. upon the effective date of annexation. The same standards and policies now used in the present city will be followed in the expansion of the recreational program and facilities in the enlarged city.

### L. School System

1. Children in the annexed area will be zoned to attend Athens City Schools when the new school year begins in 2022.

### M. Other Miscellaneous Services

1. Other services such as general governmental administration, etc., will be in effect immediately upon the effective date of annexation.

# **CHAPTER 1**

# Introduction, Methodology, Assessed Value, and Population Estimates

# Introduction

This annexation study was provided at the request of the City of Athens' Municipal-Regional Planning Commission for consideration of annexing the area known as the "County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area". A map of the proposed annexation area is included within the appendix of this document. The County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area is a large annexation area that requires the city to provide a "Plan of Services." In accordance with the statutory provisions of *T.C.A* §6-51-102, prior to the annexation of any territory by a municipality, the legislative body of the municipality shall adopt a plan of services establishing at least the services to be delivered and the projected timing of such services.

# **Purpose**

The purpose of the study is to provide the Planning Commission and the City Council with expenditure and revenue estimates associated with the annexation of the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area. By examining potential revenues and operational costs associated with providing various municipal services and the infrastructure needs of the annexation, Planning Commission and City Council Members will be provided with a rational basis for implementation of the plan of services to the annexation area.

# Methodology

Estimating for an annexation in a municipality is not an attempt to establish a precise budget for providing services in the annexation area but is instead a general measure of the potential costs associated with annexing an area. Public policy and budgetary considerations are the sole responsibility of the governing body. The authority to allocate resources within a municipality resides entirely with the chief legislative body and this study does not presume to make those decisions for the municipality. The Planning Commission uses the annexation study to provide a basis for reporting on the statutorily required plan of services, and that is all an annexation study should be viewed as, a general guideline, not an absolute "bottom line" budget.

There are always hidden costs and unforeseen contingencies in annexing an area. Moreover, there are times when annexation does not accrue costs to a municipality that may have been anticipated in the estimation process. Costs that are not immediately anticipated may be incurred by annexation or the City may streamline its service delivery, making some particular operations more efficient and less costly.

There are different ways that one could approach an annexation study. Varying methods and degree of detail can be considered, depending on the size of the annexation and the various factors that may need to be mitigated in an area. The following is merely one approach, which is based upon the physical evidence found in the area, the level of service that the municipality currently provides its citizens and valid assumptions of economic indices. An explanation of each of the aspects for this

annexation area is provided below. It is left to the reader to examine the study, determine whether the results are sound and valid and to make a decision based upon that determination.

# Land Use, Acreage and Assessed Values

This table merely provides an inventory of all the property in the annexation area. The property values were extracted from the State of Tennessee Property Data Web Site, which is based upon the state's property tax assessment computer program.

Property tax revenue estimates are simply the calculation of the total assessed value of property in the proposed annexation area, applied to the City's current property tax rate (\$1.2676 per \$100 of assessed value). Property tax assessments are calculated at a rate of forty (40) percent of appraised value for commercial and industrial property and twenty-five (25) percent for residential, vacant and Greenbelt property.

The following table provides a summary of acreage and assessed values of the property located within the proposed annexation area.

# **Estimated Population and Percent Population Increase**

The population estimates are based upon the number of households in the annexation area and the people per household population for Athens and McMinn County, utilizing data from the 2010 Federal Census. According to the 2010 Federal Census, the people per household population for Athens is 2.24, and the unincorporated territory of McMinn County is 2.47 people per household.

Since the annexation area is immediately adjacent to the city, but not within the corporate limits of the city it would seem likely that it is neither entirely rural in nature like McMinn County, nor entirely urban like Athens. Therefore, it may be appropriate to average the two people per household population figures listed above to gain a base line for population projections in the area. (An average per household population, using these two figures is 2.355 and will be rounded to 2.36).

This 2.36 people per household population figure is applied to the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area to estimate the total population. The maximum housing development unit in the R-2 is a duplex on a minimum of 10,000 square feet. The forty-five (45) acres is 1,960,200 square feet in area. Subtracting 20% of the property for infrastructure and setback requirement, leave 80% of the

site equal to 1,568,160 square feet. Dividing that by 10,000 minimum requirement yields a maximum of 156 duplex units. Multiplying the estimated 156 duplexes (312 households) by 2.36 persons per household yields a future population estimate for the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area of 737 people.

Athens's 2020 US Census Quickfacts estimates the population for Athens at 14,425 as of July 2021. The future population estimate for the area and the current City population is used to determine the percentage population increase that would be incurred through annexation. The percent population increase when the 156 duplex units have been fully developed and occupied is estimated at 0.0511% (737 divided by 14,425).

Under three (3) sections of *Tennessee Code Annotated*, §67-6-103, §54-4-203, and §57-5-205, state taxes are shared with Tennessee's incorporated municipalities on the basis of population. The federal decennial population counts are used as the basis for this distribution unless a municipality has a special census taken under the provisions for such a census in state statues. A municipality may include in its population base the residents of an area annexed after the last federal census by having a special census taken in the annexed area, but there is no current population in the annexation area, so there is no need for a special census at this time.

# **CHAPTER 2**

# PRESENT CITY FACILITIES AND ESSENTIAL SERVICES

The following chapter describes current public facilities and services provided to the residents by the City of Athens.

# **Community Development Department Services**

The Athens Municipal Planning Commission has been designated as a Regional Planning Commission by the State of Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development. At the present time McMinn County does not enforce a building code program and has chosen not to adopt comprehensive zoning within the unincorporated territory of McMinn County. The County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area does fall under the planning region, which is subject to the Athens Municipal-Regional Planning Commission Subdivision Regulations. However, with no building code enforcement, residential structures, or other types of structures could be built virtually right next to one another violating the required McMinn County Subdivision setbacks. Due to a lack of zoning in the County, undesirable uses and unmanaged growth, as well as, land use conflicts could develop over time, adjacent to the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area, as well as other areas within the unincorporated territory of McMinn County. The City of Athens has chosen to adopt the 2018 International Building Code, 2018 International Plumbing Code, 2018 International Residential Code and National Electrical Code 2017. The city also has its own adopted Municipal Housing Code. The City of Athens has also adopted and enforced comprehensive zoning for the corporate limits since 1948.

The City of Athens is a participate in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Flood Insurance Program and the County was mandated to join the program in 2012 by FEMA. The purpose of floodplain regulations is to minimize the loss of life and property when floods occur. The regulations require that new or substantially improved buildings be elevated, or flood proofed above the height of the 100-year base flood elevation. The City of Athens has been a participant within the NFIP since June 16, 1978, and participants within the Community Rating System (CRS) with a current State of Tennessee best CRS Flood ISO rating of 8. Therefore, residents within the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area will be able to purchase flood insurance at a reduced rate due based on this ISO rating.

The Athens Municipal-Regional Planning Commission and the City Council adopted the Athens Land Use and Transportation Policy Plan (The Plan) in February 2018. The Plan not only covered the corporate limits, but it also looked beyond the corporate limits of Athens to the potential growth area. This potential growth area, known as the Athens Planning Region, was also included within the review of development plans for the city. The Plan contains goals, objectives, and policies that support the City's efforts toward the annexation of the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area.

# **Water Service**

Athens Utilities Board (AUB) has three water sources: 1) The Ingleside Spring, which has been a source for decades, 2) wells that tap an aquifer that runs parallel to Oostanaula Creek, and 3) the Hiwassee Utility Commission. AUB's Vernon Wade Filter Plant off Ingleside Avenue treats water from aquifer wells and Ingleside Spring. The Hiwassee Utility Commission Filter Plant treats water from the Hiwassee River. Chlorine is added to all source water, as a disinfectant, and fluoride is added to prevent tooth decay.

Five above ground reservoirs store treated water that is supplied to residential and commercial/industrial customers.

# **Sewer Service**

Athens Utilities Board (AUB) treats the waste from both industry and residential customers across the service region. They operate two separate wastewater treatment plants. The newly renovated facility, called the Oostanaula Plant, is located on Alford Street. It is permitted to discharge 6 million gallons per day with peaks of up to (15) fifteen million gallons per day. The other facility, known as the North Mouse Creek plant, is located on Whittaker Road, and is designed and permitted to treat 1.2 million gallons per day with peaks of up to 3 million gallons per day.

# **Police Protection**

Police protection for the residents of the City of Athens is provided by the Athens Police Department. The Athens Police Department, with headquarters at the Athens Municipal Building, 815 N. Jackson Street, is staffed by 23 uniformed patrol officers. One Captain, a patrol Lieutenant, special services Lieutenant, animal control, and three detectives including the special services Lieutenant. There are three patrol zones with a minimum manpower of three officers per shift dayshift, and four officers minimum for evening hours. One officer per zone.

# **Fire Protection**

Fire protection for the residents of the City of Athens is provided by the Athens Fire Department. The City of Athens enjoys an ISO rating class of 02/02X and is served by two (2) stations. The area classified as a 02X basically receives the rates of a class 8 because there are no hydrants within 1000 feet of the developable areas and city's fleet does not have a water tanker. These ISO rating allows those residents of Athens to receive discounted fire insurance premiums. Station number one (1) is stationed at the Athens Municipal Building, 815 N. Jackson Street, and station number two (2) is stationed at 804 South Congress Parkway. The Athens Fire Department is currently staffed by twenty-one (21) full-time fire fighters, and sixteen (16) volunteer fire fighters.

# **Public Works Department Streets**

Public Works Department, the City's largest service department, includes the following divisions: sanitation, streets, fleet maintenance, animal Shelter, and administration. The streets division is divided into four (4) sections: Street Construction, Street Maintenance, Street Cleaning, and Traffic Control. The streets division is responsible for the repair and maintenance of approximately 86 miles of thoroughfares within the corporate limits of Athens, of the 86 miles approximately 22 miles are State and/or Federal Highways that are maintained by the State of Tennessee.

# **Solid Waste Collection**

The City of Athens provides solid waste collection to residential, industrial, and commercial properties within the corporate limits of Athens. The City of Athens currently charges \$9.50 per month for residential customer solid waste collection. The rate for solid waste collection of commercial property is determined by box size and the number of times per week the container is dumped. Solid waste collection of Commercial property is dumped once (1) per week with the rate based on box size as follows: 4 cubic yards-\$44, 6 cubic yards-\$66, and 8 cubic yards-\$88. If businesses share a dumpster, the cost is from \$9.50 to \$28.50 a month. Solid waste collection of Industrial property is dumped once (1) per week with the rate based on box size as follows: 4 cubic yards-\$54, 6 cubic yards-\$88, and 8 cubic yards-\$108.

#### Street Lighting

The City of Athens currently provides street lighting along city maintained/local streets within the corporate limits, as well as, for residential, commercial, and industrial establishments. The city pays Athens Utilities Board (AUB) a fee based on the size and type of streetlight and rolls these charges into an investment charge for street lighting facilities that meet TDOT standards.

## **Security Lighting**

AUB offers security lighting for private property of customers both inside and outside the city limits. There is no difference in security light charges with reference to inside/outside city limits. Therefore, security lighting is not an applicable cost within the framework of an annexation cost-of-service study.

# **City School System**

The City of Athens currently maintains and operates five (5) schools within the City School System as follows:

They are also currently building a new facility that will eventually consolidate all the above listed primary and intermediate schools on one campus on Keith Lane.

# **Recreation Services**

The City of Athens currently maintains approximately two hundred ninety-three (293) acres of open space and recreational parks. Of note is the acreage devoted to the Athens Regional Park, the City's largest public recreational area, which is approximately one hundred sixty (160) acres. The nearest State or Federal Park facilities are in eastern McMinn County (Cherokee National Forest).

# Chapter 3

# **Expenditure Estimates**

Before the annexation of any area, the City must be aware of the financial obligation involved through providing city services to the new citizens in the same manner and to the same degree as is customary throughout the City. This chapter of the report will study the costs required for the City of Athens to provide services in the proposed annexation area on a level comparable to those within the corporate boundaries.

# **Community Development Department**

As mentioned earlier within this report the unincorporated territory of McMinn County is not zoned, nor does a building code enforcement program exist. Immediately upon the effective date of the annexation the City of Athens will extend its zoning ordinance and enforcement of its building code program to the area annexed.

Salaries, operation and maintenance, equipment, supplies and other operational requirements should not increase due to annexation at this time. The city should keep in mind, as the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area begins to develop the demands on the existing personnel level within the department could potentially increase. The city should be aware of and take the appropriate measures to determine the potential need of adding an additional building inspector, or codes enforcement officer to the Community Development Department within the future.

# **Police Department**

Current needs for annexation area should not increase due to the area has no population at this time. So, no addition officers would be required to provide services to the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area.

Future needs are based on the following National data for requirements for number of police officers. The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, *Bureau of Justice Statistics* Local Police Departments Personnel Report dated October 2019 states that municipalities with a population of 10,000-24,000 employ 2.0 full time patrol officers for every 1,000 population (margin of standard error 0.04). With twenty-three (23) full-time uniformed patrol officers and two (2) uniformed patrol captains, Athens is very close to the Office of Justice Programs report with 1.92 officers per 1000 population. An additional quotable source is the 2018 FBI Uniform Crime Report. The 2018 Report included an average of 2.3 police department employees per 1,000 residents in 1,634 cities between 10,000-24,999 population ranges. Again, Athens would fall just under the average reported by the FBI. These numbers are a resource for comparison purposes, not a directive on employment. It is understood that ratios are not the basis by which a municipality should budget resources, but rather, such comparisons simply highlight communities of similar size. Given the small increase in population this annexation will bring about (less than 1% increase); the proposed annexation itself would not be a trigger for additional hiring of officers.

# **Fire Department**

Since the property does not have any population at this time and is undeveloped of any structures, the annexation of the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Area would not in itself result in an ISO increase. Therefore, while at some point the level and types of development in the City of Athens and the increased maximum R-2 residential units of a possible 156 duplexes may necessitate additional fire services. The last ISO audit stated the possibly downgrading the class 02 if coverage area grew or if vacant property already in the city was continued to be developed and no additional staffing was added to the department.

# **Recreation Department**

The National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) suggest that a park system, at a minimum, be composed of 6.25 to 10.50 acres of undeveloped open space per 1,000 people. These recreational standards were established as a means to justify the needs for parks and open space within the overall land use pattern of a region or community. Using the maximum of 10.5 acres of developed open space per 1,000 people, the City of Athens would require 147 acres of undeveloped open space. As mentioned in the previous chapter, the City of Athens has 293 acres which is sufficient open space and recreational park system to meet the demands of the projected 2022 population of the City of Athens and the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area. Residents of the annexed area may use all existing recreational facilities, parks, library, etc., upon the effective date of annexation. Salaries, operation and maintenance, equipment, supplies and other operational requirements are not expected to increase due to annexation.

# **Wastewater Collection Service Expenditures**

The County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area does not have any population at this time. Service will require the extension of AUB's wastewater collection system to the area is being annexed. Extensions of the existing system will pay for by those wanting service as the area develops. Therefore, there will not be any direct cost to the City of Athens or AUB in the extension of wastewater collection services to the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area.

The Athens Utilities Board (AUB)'s wastewater policies and procedures will apply to every connected service in the annexation area.

The wastewater use rates will apply to all customers unless a special billing agreement applies. The wastewater rates will apply to all customers within the corporate city limits of the City of Athens where the wastewater collection system is available. The monthly service availability charge will apply to all customers including those with special billing agreements. Users (excluding permitted users) are billed according to water consumption as measured by the customer's water meter. Net billing will apply if paid on or before due date shown on the bill rendered. A higher rate will apply if paid after the due date shown. Non-residential customers contributing wastewater in excess of domestic strength shall be billed according to AUB Policy – Surcharge Rates for High Strength Wastewater.

AUB's wastewater Policies and Procedures referenced above will be extended to the annexation area without any cost to the City and as mentioned above, AUB does not anticipate any direct expenditures toward wastewater extensions within the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area.

# **Water Distribution Service Expenditures**

The County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area does not have any population at this time. Service will require the extension of AUB's water distribution system to the area is being annexed. Extensions of the existing system will pay for by those wanting service as the area develops. The availability of fire protection from fire hydrants connected to water distribution system will be included provided the expanded system can support fire hydrants. Therefore, there will not be any direct cost to the City of Athens or AUB in the extension of water distribution services to the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area.

The Athens Utilities Board (AUB)'s water policies and procedures will apply to every connected service in the annexation area.

The water use rates will apply to all customers unless a special billing agreement applies. The water rates will apply to all customers within the corporate city limits of the City of Athens where the water collection system is available. The monthly service availability charge will apply to all customers including those with special billing agreements. Users are billed according to water consumption as measured by the customer's water meter. Net billing will apply if paid on or before due date shown on the bill rendered. A higher rate will apply if paid after the due date shown.

AUB's water Policies and Procedures referenced above will be extended to the annexation area without any cost to the City and as mentioned above, AUB does not anticipate any direct expenditures toward water extensions within the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area.

# **Fire Hydrants**

The City of Athens Minimum Subdivision Regulations state that no structure shall be farther than five hundred (500) feet away from any fire hydrant. At the minimum, fire hydrants shall be spaced to ensure the minimum fire flows and taking into account the maximum length of the firefighter hose. All the required fire hydrants needed to serve the estimated 157 duplexes will be installed when they are developed. Therefore, there will not be any cost to the City of Athens or AUB for installation of fire hydrants in the Harrison Ridge Annexation Area

# **Public Works Department**

The Streets Division is divided into four (4) sections: Street Construction, Street Maintenance, Street Cleaning, and Traffic Control. The County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area will add approximately 1372.8' or 0.26 miles of new streets into the city street system for maintenance, cleaning, and traffic control if the city wishes to include the County Road 129 that leads to the property in the annexation area. Otherwise, there would be no new streets associated with this annexation area.

The City of Athens has budgeted an average of \$902,600.00 over the last four years for the maintenance of streets. The city currently has approximately 64 miles of city-maintained streets. By taking the amount budgeted for street maintenance and dividing it by the number of street miles the City maintains (902,600/64), it can be reasonably concluded that the City is spending approximately \$14,103.13 per mile on street maintenance. If the annexation area includes those streets described above the city could expect to spend approximately \$3,666.82 (0.26@\$14,103.13) per year on street maintenance.

The City of Athens has budgeted an average of \$884,925.00 over the last four years for the cleaning of streets. The city currently has approximately 64 miles of city-maintained streets. By taking the amount budgeted for street maintenance and dividing it by the number of street miles the City maintains (884,925/64), it can be reasonably concluded that the City is spending approximately \$13,826.95 per mile on street maintenance. If the annexation area includes those streets described above the city could expect to spend approximately \$3,595.01 (0.26 @ \$13,826.95.30) per year on street cleaning.

Currently, this study makes no attempt at estimating the impact of the annexation on the overall budget of the public works department. Items that could see increases if the annexation were to occur include traffic control, street signage (including all applicable city signage), sanitation, salaries, overtime, and the possible addition of personnel.

# **Street Lighting**

Currently this study does not make a determination of the cost per installment of streetlights within the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area. However, Street lighting will be installed in the annexed area in accordance with the City of Athens street lighting policies at the cost set by AUB at the time of the installation.

# **City School System**

Since the property does not have any population at this time and is undeveloped of any structures, the annexation of the Harrison Ridge Subdivision would not in itself affect the City School System at this time.

# Chapter 4

# **Revenue Estimates**

This chapter is provided as a guideline in determining the approximate amount of expected revenue the city may obtain by annexation. This is an important step in any annexation procedure because of the impact annexation may have on the city budget. Revenues, estimated for this annexation, are generated from four areas; 1) city property taxes levied on annexed territory, 2) state shared taxes distributed from the State of Tennessee, 3) state street aid funds derived from state gasoline and oil taxes, and 4) solid waste. This chapter will also address future water and sewer consumption rates for the future development of theses 156 duplexes. This study makes no attempt at estimating potential revenue generated from sales taxes.

# **Property Taxes**

The pro-rated twenty-five (25) acres of County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area valuation of residential property assessments was estimated to be \$33,875.00. Property in the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area was reassessed in 2018, and as per the requirements of Tennessee Code Annotated (T.C.A.) § 67-5-1701(3), the certified tax rate was determined to be \$1.3476 per \$100 of assessed value. This is the same rate approved for the 2022 property taxes.

# **State-Shared Taxes**

State-shared revenues are distributed on a per capita basis. Future revenue can be projected using the 2019-2020 fiscal year estimates of state-shared taxes, which were released by the Municipal Technical Advisory Service.

Total allocation per capita is estimated at \$162.68, which includes \$113.25 per capita share of the Sales Tax, \$0.47 per capita of the Beer Tax, \$1.83 per capita of the Special Petroleum Products Tax, \$10.38 per capita of Gross Receipts Tax (TVA in lieu of taxes), \$1.50 per capita for sports betting, and \$35.25 per capita of the Gasoline and Motor Fuel Taxes.

Using the total general fund revenue of (162.68- 35.25 Gas tax) \$127.43 per capita, and assuming a future total population of 737 persons in the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area, the annexation will generate an additional estimated \$93,915.91 in general state revenue funds.

# **State Street Aid**

Gasoline and Motor Fuel Tax is distributed to the community based upon the amount of area served by city streets. A derivation of this distribution formula can be based upon the amount of population and revenue distributed locally. According to State Aid Estimates the City can expect to receive \$35.25 per

capita for State Street Aid. At this rate, and assuming a total population of 737 persons in the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area, the annexation area will generate additional street aid revenues in the amount of \$25,979.25.

# **Solid Waste Collection**

As stated, before the City of Athens charges \$9.50 per month for residential solid waste collection. In the future, all 156 new residential duplex (312 households) within the proposed annexation area would generate an additional \$2,964.00 a month in additional revenue for residential solid waste pickup, or \$35,568.00 annually. Or if they use a centralized dumpster for the complex, based on the \$88 per week unit, would generate \$4,576.00.

# **Water Service**

An estimate of revenues for future public water for 156 new residential duplex (312 households) using 3,400 gal at the current AUB monthly rate of \$38.25, would generate \$143,208.00 annually.

# **Sanitary Sewer Revenues**

An estimate of revenues for sanitation is based upon the future 156 new residential duplex (312 households) and the current "user fees" listed in Chapter 2. On the simple assumption that all future 156 new residential duplex (312 households) are charged the minimum monthly service availability charge (\$39.10 for residential), AUB could expect to receive \$12,199.20 per month, or \$146,390.40 annually in sanitary sewer revenues.


# **Expenditure/Revenue Summary and Conclusion**

# **Expenditure and Revenues Summary**

The Expenditures and Revenues Summary merely lists the totals of those current and future operational expenditures shown in the previous sheets. It also shows the current property tax revenue that would be generated, based upon the prorate 25-acre area and its assessed value of property and the City's current property tax rate. This is a one-year snapshot of revenues and expenditures and does not reflect a long-range cumulative effect of the annexation, which once developed will generate and exponentially higher revenues and expenditures for the City of Athens.

# Conclusion

The proposal to annex the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Annexation Area appears entirely feasible for the City of Athens. One may expect some unanticipated hidden costs of this annexation, but it would appear that the city will have an adequate margin of safety for defraying those costs.





### A. Police

- 1. Patrolling, radio responses to calls, and other routine police services using present personnel and equipment will be provided on the effective date of annexation.
- 2. Traffic signals, traffic signs, street markings, and other traffic control devices will be installed as the need as established by appropriate study and traffic standards.

### B. Fire

- 1. Fire protection by the present personnel and equipment of the City of Athens, within the limitations of available water, will be provided to the area on the effective date of annexation.
- 2. Fire hydrants for the Velma Road Subdivision that encompasses the entire Velma Road Annexation Area are required to be installed by the developer prior to the approval of the final plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission. Any future additional fire hydrants will be made available per the policies and requirements of the City of Athens and the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission as development occurs.

### C. Water Service

1. Water service for domestic use and fire protection is currently available to the Velma Road annexation area by the Athens Utilities Board. Proposed Site Plan(s) or Subdivision of the annexation area will require expansion of the existing water system to serve to any Site Plan(s) or subdivided tracts. Expansion of the existing water system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board. Expansions, Modifications, and Improvements to the existing system must be approved by the Athens Utilities Board and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prior to construction. With the final installation accepted by the Athens Utilities Board prior to the approval of a Site Plan(s) or Final Subdivision Plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

# **D. Electrical Service**

Proposed Site Plan(s) or Subdivision of the annexation area will require expansion and modification of the existing wastewater collection system to serve to any Site Plan(s) or subdivided tracts. Expansion of the existing wastewater collection system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board. Expansions, Modifications, and Improvements to the existing system must be approved by the Athens Utilities Board and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prior to construction. With the final installation accepted by the Athens Utilities Board prior to the approval of a Site Plan(s) or Final Subdivision Plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

### F. Natural Gas Service

1. Natural service is currently available to the Velma Road annexation area by the Athens Utilities Board. Expansion of the existing gas system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board.

# **G. Street Lighting**

1. Street lighting will be installed once lots are developed in accordance with the established policies of the City of Athens.

# H. Solid Waste Collection and Disposal

1. The same regular solid waste collection and disposal service provided within the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation and subject to the policies of the City of Athens.

## I. Street Construction and Repair

- 1. All of the streets for the Velma Road Subdivision that encompasses the entire Velma Road Annexation Area are required to be built or bonded by the developer prior to the approval of the final plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.
- 2. Emergency maintenance of streets (repair of hazardous chuckholes, measures necessary for traffic flow, etc.) will begin once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.
- 3. Routine maintenance on the same basis as in the City of Athens, will begin once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.
- 4. Reconstruction and resurfacing of streets, installation of storm drainage facilities, construction of curbs and gutters, and other such major improvements, as the need therefore is determined by the governing body, will be accomplished under the established policies of the city, once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.

5. Street signs will be installed where necessary once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.

# J. Planning Services

- 1. The planning and zoning jurisdiction of the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation. An ordinance has been prepared zoning the property as an R-3 High Density Residential District that will become effective once all State statue requirements of the annexation and rezoning processes have been completed and finalized.
- 2. Enforcement of the subdivision regulations, street design criteria, and flood damage prevention ordinance shall be extended to the annexed area after the effective date of the annexation.
- 3. Any inspection services now provided by the city (building, electrical, plumbing, gas, housing, sanitation, etc.) will begin in the annexation area on the effective date of annexation.
- 4. The City's participation in the National Flood Insurance Program will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation.

### K. Recreation

1. Residents of the annexed area will have the same access to all existing recreational facilities, parks, etc. upon the effective date of annexation. The same standards and policies now used in the present city will be followed in the expansion of the recreational program and facilities in the enlarged city.

# L. School System

1. Children in the annexed area will be zoned to attend Athens City Schools when the new school year begins in 2022.

### M. Other Miscellaneous Services

1. Other services such as general governmental administration, etc., will be in effect immediately upon the effective date of annexation.

1. Wastewater collection service is currently available to the Velma Road annexation area by the Athens Utilities Board. Proposed Site Plan(s) or Subdivision of the annexation area will require expansion and modification of the existing wastewater collection system to provide service to any Site Plan(s) or subdivided tracts. Expansion of the existing wastewater collection system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board. Expansions, Modifications, and Improvements to the existing system must be approved by the Athens Utilities Board and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prior to construction with the final installation accepted by the Athens Utilities Board prior to the approval of a Site Plan(s) or Final Subdivision Plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.

# F. Natural Gas Service

1. Natural service is currently available to the Velma Road annexation area by the Athens Utilities Board. Expansion of the existing gas system is subject to the policies and associated fees of the Athens Utilities Board.

# G. Street Lighting

1. Street lighting will be installed once lots are developed in accordance with the established policies of the City of Athens.

# H. Solid Waste Collection and Disposal

1. The same regular solid waste collection and disposal service provided within the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation and subject to the policies of the City of Athens.

# I. Street Construction and Repair

- 1. All of the streets for the Velma Road Subdivision that encompasses the entire Velma Road Annexation Area are required to be built or bonded by the developer prior to the approval of the final plat by the Athens Municipal Regional Planning Commission.
- 2. Emergency maintenance of streets (repair of hazardous chuckholes, measures necessary for traffic flow, etc.) will begin once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.
- 3. Routine maintenance on the same basis as in the City of Athens, will begin once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.
- 4. Reconstruction and resurfacing of streets, installation of storm drainage facilities, construction of curbs and gutters, and other such major improvements, as the need, therefore, is determined by the governing body, will be accomplished under the established policies of the city once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.
- 5. Street signs will be installed where necessary once the future roadways are constructed and accepted into the city street system.

# J. Planning Services

- The planning and zoning jurisdiction of the City of Athens will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation. An ordinance has been prepared zoning the property as an R-3 High Density Residential District that will become effective once all State statute requirements of the annexation and rezoning processes have been completed and finalized.
- 2. Enforcement of the subdivision regulations, street design criteria, and flood damage prevention ordinance shall be extended to the annexed area after the effective date of the annexation.
- 3. Any inspection services now provided by the city (building, electrical, plumbing, gas, housing, sanitation, etc.) will begin in the annexation area on the effective date of annexation.
- 4. The City's participation in the National Flood Insurance Program will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation.

# K. Recreation

1. Residents of the annexed area will have the same access to all existing recreational facilities, parks, etc. upon the effective date of annexation. The same standards and policies now used in the present city will be followed in the expansion of the recreational program and facilities in the enlarged city.

# L. School System

1. Children in the annexed area will be zoned to attend Athens City Schools when the new school year begins in 2022.

# M. Other Miscellaneous Services

1. Other services such as general governmental administration, etc., will be in effect immediately upon the effective date of annexation.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Council of the City of Athens, Tennessee, as follows:

That the recitals above are true and accurate and form a part of this Resolution; and

# **CHAPTER 1**

# Introduction, Methodology, Assessed Value, and Population Estimates

# Introduction

This annexation study was provided at the request of the City of Athens' Municipal-Regional Planning Commission for consideration of annexing the area known as the "Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area". A map of the proposed annexation area is included within the appendix of this document. The Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area is a large annexation area that requires the city to provide a "Plan of Services." In accordance with the statutory provisions of *T.C.A §6-51-102*, prior to the annexation of any territory by a municipality, the legislative body of the municipality shall adopt a plan of services establishing at least the services to be delivered and the projected timing of such services.

# **Purpose**

The purpose of the study is to provide the Planning Commission and the City Council with expenditure and revenue estimates associated with the annexation of the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area. By examining potential revenues and operational costs associated with providing various municipal services and the infrastructure needs of the annexation, Planning Commission and City Council Members will be provided with a rational basis for implementation of the plan of services to the annexation area.

# Methodology

Estimating for an annexation in a municipality is not an attempt to establish a precise budget for providing services in the annexation area but is instead a general measure of the potential costs associated with annexing an area. Public policy and budgetary considerations are the sole responsibility of the governing body. The authority to allocate resources within a municipality resides entirely with the chief legislative body and this study does not presume to make those decisions for the municipality. The Planning Commission uses the annexation study to provide a basis for reporting on the statutorily required plan of services, and that is all an annexation study should be viewed as, a general guideline, not an absolute "bottom line" budget.

There are always hidden costs and unforeseen contingencies in annexing an area. Moreover, there are times when annexation does not accrue costs to a municipality that may have been anticipated in the estimation process. Costs that are not immediately anticipated may be incurred by annexation or the City may streamline its service delivery, making some particular operations more efficient and less costly.

There are different ways that one could approach an annexation study. Varying methods and degree of detail can be considered, depending on the size of the annexation and the various factors that may need to be mitigated in an area. The following is merely one approach, which is based upon the physical evidence found in the area, the level of service that the municipality currently provides its citizens and valid assumptions of economic indices. An explanation of each of the aspects for this

annexation area is provided below. It is left to the reader to examine the study, determine whether the results are sound and valid and to make a decision based upon that determination.

#### Land Use, Acreage and Assessed Values

This table merely provides an inventory of all the property in the annexation area. The property values were extracted from the State of Tennessee Property Data Web Site, which is based upon the state's property tax assessment computer program.

Property tax revenue estimates are simply the calculation of the total assessed value of property in the proposed annexation area, applied to the City's current property tax rate (\$1.2676 per \$100 of assessed value). Property tax assessments are calculated at a rate of forty (40) percent of appraised value for commercial and industrial property and twenty-five (25) percent for residential, vacant and Greenbelt property.

The following table provides a summary of acreage and assessed values of the property located within the proposed annexation area.

#### **Estimated Population and Percent Population Increase**

The population estimates are based upon the number of households in the annexation area and the people per household population for Athens and McMinn County, utilizing data from the 2010 Federal Census. According to the 2010 Federal Census, the people per household population for Athens is 2.24, and the unincorporated territory of McMinn County is 2.47 people per household.

Since the annexation area is immediately adjacent to the City, but not within the corporate limits of the City it would seem likely that it is neither entirely rural in nature like McMinn County, nor entirely urban like Athens. Therefore, it may be appropriate to average the two people per household population figures listed above to gain a base line for population projections in the area. (An average per household population, using these two figures is 2.355 and will be rounded to 2.36).

This 2.36 people per household population figure is applied to the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area to estimate the total population. The master preliminary plat (both city and county portions)shows 81 detached single family home sites. Multiplying the estimated 81 single family homes by 2.36 persons per household yields a future population estimate for the Portion of

Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area of 192 people. However, only 29 of these proposed units are located in the annexation area which generates 69 people.

Athens's 2020 US Census Quickfacts estimates the population for Athens at 14,425 as of July 2021. The future population estimate for the area and the current City population is used to determine the percentage population increase that would be incurred through annexation. The percent population increase when the 81 Single family homes units have been fully developed and occupied is estimated at 0.0133% (192 divided by 14,425). The percent population increase when the 29 Single family homes units have been fully developed and occupied is estimated at 0.0047% (69 divided by 14,425).

Under three (3) sections of *Tennessee Code Annotated*, §67-6-103, §54-4-203, and §57-5-205, state taxes are shared with Tennessee's incorporated municipalities on the basis of population. The federal decennial population counts are used as the basis for this distribution unless a municipality has a special census taken under the provisions for such a census in state statues. A municipality may include in its population base the residents of an area annexed after the last federal census by having a special census taken in the annexed area, but there is no current population in the annexation area, so there is no need for a special census at this time.

#### **CHAPTER 2**

#### PRESENT CITY FACILITIES AND ESSENTIAL SERVICES

The following chapter describes current public facilities and services provided to the residents by the City of Athens.

#### **Community Development Department Services**

The Athens Municipal Planning Commission has been designated as a Regional Planning Commission by the State of Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development. At the present time McMinn County does not enforce a building code program and has chosen not to adopt comprehensive zoning within the unincorporated territory of McMinn County. The Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area does fall under the planning region, which is subject to the Athens Municipal-Regional Planning Commission Subdivision Regulations. However, with no building code enforcement, residential structures, or other types of structures could be built virtually right next to one another violating the required McMinn County Subdivision setbacks. Due to a lack of zoning in the County, undesirable uses and unmanaged growth, as well as, land use conflicts could develop over time, adjacent to the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area, as well as other areas within the unincorporated territory of McMinn County. The City of Athens has chosen to adopt the 2018 International Building Code, 2018 International Plumbing Code, 2018 International Residential Code and National Electrical Code 2017. The city also has its own adopted Municipal Housing Code. The City of Athens has also adopted and enforced comprehensive zoning for the corporate limits since 1948.

The City of Athens is a participate in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Flood Insurance Program and the County was mandated to join the program in 2012 by FEMA. The purpose of floodplain regulations is to minimize the loss of life and property when floods occur. The regulations require that new or substantially improved buildings be elevated, or flood proofed above the height of the 100-year base flood elevation. The City of Athens has been a participant within the NFIP since June 16, 1978, and participants within the Community Rating System (CRS) with a current State of Tennessee best CRS Flood ISO rating of 8. Therefore, residents within the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area will be able to purchase flood insurance at a reduced rate due based on this ISO rating.

The Athens Municipal-Regional Planning Commission and the City Council adopted the Athens Land Use and Transportation Policy Plan (The Plan) in February 2018. The Plan not only covered the corporate limits, but it also looked beyond the corporate limits of Athens to the potential growth area. This potential growth area, known as the Athens Planning Region, was also included within the review of development plans for the city. The Plan contains goals, objectives, and policies that support the City's efforts toward the annexation of the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area.

#### **Water Service**

Athens Utilities Board (AUB) has three water sources: 1) The Ingleside Spring, which has been a source for decades, 2) wells that tap an aquifer that runs parallel to Oostanaula Creek, and 3) the Hiwassee Utility Commission. AUB's Vernon Wade Filter Plant off Ingleside Avenue treats water from aquifer wells and Ingleside Spring. The Hiwassee Utility Commission Filter Plant treats water from the Hiwassee River. Chlorine is added to all source water, as a disinfectant, and fluoride is added to prevent tooth decay.

Five above ground reservoirs store treated water that is supplied to residential and commercial/industrial customers.

#### **Sewer Service**

Athens Utilities Board (AUB) treats the waste from both industry and residential customers across the service region. They operate two separate wastewater treatment plants. The newly renovated facility, called the Oostanaula Plant, is located on Alford Street. It is permitted to discharge 6 million gallons per day with peaks of up to (15) fifteen million gallons per day. The other facility, known as the North Mouse Creek plant, is located on Whittaker Road and is designed and permitted to treat 1.2 million gallons per day with peaks of up to 3 million gallons per day.

#### **Police Protection**

Police protection for the residents of the City of Athens is provided by the Athens Police Department. The Athens Police Department, with headquarters at the Athens Municipal Building, 815 N. Jackson Street, is staffed by 23 uniformed patrol officers. One Captain, a patrol Lieutenant, special services Lieutenant, animal control, and three detectives including the special services Lieutenant. There are three patrol zones with a minimum manpower of three officers per shift dayshift, and four officers minimum for evening hours. One officer per zone.

#### **Fire Protection**

Fire protection for the residents of the City of Athens is provided by the Athens Fire Department. The City of Athens enjoys an ISO rating class of 02/02X and is served by two (2) stations. The area classified as a 02X basically receives the rates of a class 8 because there are no hydrants within 1000 feet of the developable areas and city's fleet does not have a water tanker. These ISO rating allows those residents of Athens to receive discounted fire insurance premiums. Station number one (1) is stationed at the Athens Municipal Building, 815 N. Jackson Street, and station number two (2) is stationed at 804 South Congress Parkway. The Athens Fire Department is currently staffed by twentyone (21) full-time fire fighters, and sixteen (16) volunteer fire fighters.

#### **Public Works Department Streets**

Public Works Department, the City's largest service department, includes the following divisions: sanitation, streets, fleet maintenance, animal Shelter, and administration. The streets division is divided into four (4) sections: Street Construction, Street Maintenance, Street Cleaning, and Traffic Control. The streets division is responsible for the repair and maintenance of approximately 86 miles of thoroughfares within the corporate limits of Athens, of the 86 miles approximately 22 miles are State and/or Federal Highways that are maintained by the State of Tennessee.

#### **Solid Waste Collection**

The City of Athens provides solid waste collection to residential, industrial, and commercial properties within the corporate limits of Athens. The City of Athens currently charges \$9.50 per month for residential customer solid waste collection. The rate for solid waste collection of commercial property is determined by box size and the number of times per week the container is dumped. Solid waste collection of Commercial property is dumped once (1) per week with the rate based on box size as follows: 4 cubic yards-\$44, 6 cubic yards-\$66, and 8 cubic yards-\$88. If businesses share a dumpster, the cost is from \$9.50 to \$28.50 a month. Solid waste collection of Industrial property is dumped once (1) per week with the rate based on box size as follows: 4 cubic yards-\$54, 6 cubic yards-\$88, and 8 cubic yards-\$108.

#### **Street Lighting**

The City of Athens currently provides street lighting along city maintained/local streets within the corporate limits, as well as, for residential, commercial, and industrial establishments. The city pays Athens Utilities Board (AUB) a fee based on the size and type of streetlight and rolls these charges into an investment charge for street lighting facilities that meet TDOT standards.

#### **Security Lighting**

AUB offers security lighting for private property of customers both inside and outside the city limits. There is no difference in security light charges with reference to inside/outside city limits. Therefore, security lighting is not an applicable cost within the framework of an annexation cost-of-service study.

#### **City School System**

The City of Athens currently maintains and operates five (5) schools within the City School System as follows:

They are also currently building a new facility that will eventually consolidate all the above listed primary and intermediate schools on one campus on Keith Lane.

#### **Recreation Services**

The City of Athens currently maintains approximately two hundred ninety-three (293) acres of open space and recreational parks. Of note is the acreage devoted to the Athens Regional Park, the City's largest public recreational area, which is approximately one hundred sixty (160) acres. The nearest State or Federal Park facilities are in eastern McMinn County (Cherokee National Forest).

#### Chapter 3

#### **Expenditure Estimates**

Before the annexation of any area, the City must be aware of the financial obligation involved through providing city services to the new citizens in the same manner and to the same degree as is customary throughout the City. This chapter of the report will study the costs required for the City of Athens to provide services in the proposed annexation area on a level comparable to those within the corporate boundaries.

#### **Community Development Department**

As mentioned earlier within this report the unincorporated territory of McMinn County is not zoned, nor does a building code enforcement program exist. Immediately upon the effective date of the annexation the City of Athens will extend its zoning ordinance and enforcement of its building code program to the area annexed.

Salaries, operation and maintenance, equipment, supplies and other operational requirements should not increase due to annexation at this time. The city should keep in mind, as the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area begins to develop the demands on the existing personnel level within the department could potentially increase. The city should be aware of and take the appropriate measures to determine the potential need of adding an additional building inspector, or codes enforcement officer to the Community Development Department within the future.

#### **Police Department**

Current needs for annexation area should not increase due to the area has no population at this time. So, no addition officers would be required to provide services to the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area.

Future needs are based on the following National data for requirements for number of police officers. The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, *Bureau of Justice Statistics* Local Police Departments Personnel Report dated October 2019 states that municipalities with a population of 10,000-24,000 employ 2.0 full time patrol officers for every 1,000 population (margin of standard error 0.04). With twenty-three (23) full-time uniformed patrol officers and two (2) uniformed patrol captains, Athens is very close to the Office of Justice Programs report with 1.92 officers per 1000 population. An additional quotable source is the 2018 FBI Uniform Crime Report. The 2018 Report included an average of 2.3 police department employees per 1,000 residents in 1,634 cities between 10,000-24,999 population ranges. Again, Athens would fall just under the average reported by the FBI. These numbers are a resource for comparison purposes, not a directive on employment. It is understood that ratios are not the basis by which a municipality should budget resources, but rather, such comparisons simply highlight communities of similar size. Given the small increase in population this annexation will bring about (less than 1% increase); the proposed annexation itself would not be a trigger for additional hiring of officers.

#### **Fire Department**

Since the property does not have any population at this time and is undeveloped of any structures, the annexation of the County Road 129 (aka Layman Road) Area would not in itself result in an ISO increase. Therefore, while at some point the level and types of development in the City of Athens and the increased 81 single-family homes may necessitate additional fire services. The last ISO audit stated the possibly downgrading the class 02 if coverage area grew or if vacant property already in the city was continued to be developed and no additional staffing was added to the department.

#### **Recreation Department**

The National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) suggest that a park system, at a minimum, be composed of 6.25 to 10.50 acres of undeveloped open space per 1,000 people. These recreational standards were established as a means to justify the needs for parks and open space within the overall land use pattern of a region or community. Using the maximum of 10.5 acres of developed open space per 1,000 people, the City of Athens would require 147 acres of undeveloped open space. As mention in the previous chapter, the City of Athens has 293 acres which is sufficient open space and recreational park system to meet the demands of the projected 2022 population of the City of Athens and the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area. Residents of the annexed area may use all existing recreational facilities, parks, library, etc., upon the effective date of annexation. Salaries, operation and maintenance, equipment, supplies and other operational requirements are not expected to increase due to annexation.

#### **Wastewater Collection Service Expenditures**

The Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area does not have any population at this time. Service will require the extension of AUB's wastewater collection system to the area is being annexed. Extensions of the existing system will pay for by those wanting service as the area develops. Therefore, there will not be any direct cost to the City of Athens or AUB in the extension of wastewater collection services to the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area.

The Athens Utilities Board (AUB)'s wastewater policies and procedures will apply to every connected service in the annexation area.

The wastewater use rates will apply to all customers unless a special billing agreement applies. The wastewater rates will apply to all customers within the corporate city limits of the City of Athens where the wastewater collection system is available. The monthly service availability charge will apply to all customers including those with special billing agreements. Users (excluding permitted users) are billed according to water consumption as measured by the customer's water meter. Net billing will apply if paid on or before due date shown on the bill rendered. A higher rate will apply if paid after the due date shown. Non-residential customers contributing wastewater in excess of domestic strength shall be billed according to AUB Policy – Surcharge Rates for High Strength Wastewater.

AUB's wastewater Policies and Procedures referenced above will be extended to the annexation area without any cost to the City and as mentioned above, AUB does not anticipate any direct expenditures

toward wastewater extensions within the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area.

#### **Water Distribution Service Expenditures**

The Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area does not have any population at this time. Service will require the extension of AUB's water distribution system to the area is being annexed. Extensions of the existing system will paid for by those wanting service as the area develops. The availability of fire protection from fire hydrants connected to water distribution system will be included provided the expanded system can support fire hydrants. Therefore, there will not be any direct cost to the City of Athens or AUB in the extension of water distribution services to the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area.

The Athens Utilities Board (AUB)'s water policies and procedures will apply to every connected service in the annexation area.

The water use rates will apply to all customers unless a special billing agreement applies. The water rates will apply to all customers within the corporate city limits of the City of Athens where the water collection system is available. The monthly service availability charge will apply to all customers including those with special billing agreements. Users are billed according to water consumption as measured by the customer's water meter. Net billing will apply if paid on or before due date shown on the bill rendered. A higher rate will apply if paid after the due date shown.

AUB's water Policies and Procedures referenced above will be extended to the annexation area without any cost to the City and as mentioned above, AUB does not anticipate any direct expenditures toward water extensions within the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area.

#### **Fire Hydrants**

The City of Athens Minimum Subdivision Regulations state that no structure shall be farther than five hundred (500) feet away from any fire hydrant. At the minimum, fire hydrants shall be spaced to ensure the minimum fire flows and taking into account the maximum length of the firefighter hose. All the required fire hydrants needed to serve the estimated 81 single-family homes will be installed when they are developed. Therefore, there will not be any cost to the City of Athens or AUB for installation of fire hydrants in the Harrison Ridge Annexation Area

#### **Public Works Department**

The Streets Division is divided into four (4) sections: Street Construction, Street Maintenance, Street Cleaning, and Traffic Control. The Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area will add approximately 1372.8' or 0.26 miles of new streets into the city street system for maintenance, cleaning, and traffic control if the city wishes to include the County Road 129 that leads to the property in the annexation area. Otherwise, there would be no new streets associated with this annexation area.

County RoadFeet/MilesNew roads A and B993/0.19Total Local Streets/Feet (Miles)993' (0.19 Miles)

The City of Athens has budgeted an average of \$902,600.00 over the last four years for the maintenance of streets. The city currently has approximately 64 miles of city-maintained streets. By taking the amount budgeted for street maintenance and dividing it by the number of street miles the City maintains (902,600/64), it can be reasonably concluded that the City is spending approximately \$14,103.13 per mile on street maintenance. If the annexation area includes those streets described above the city could expect to spend approximately \$2,679.60 (0.19@\$14,103.13) per year on street maintenance.

The City of Athens has budgeted an average of \$884,925.00 over the last four years for the cleaning of streets. The City currently has approximately 64 miles of city-maintained streets. By taking the amount budgeted for street maintenance and dividing it by the number of street miles the City maintains (884,925/64), it can be reasonably concluded that the City is spending approximately \$13,826.95 per mile on street maintenance. If the annexation area includes those streets described above the city could expect to spend approximately \$2627.00 (0.19 @ \$13,826.95.30) per year on street cleaning.

At this time, this study makes no attempt at estimating the impact of the annexation on the overall budget of the public works department. Items that could see increases if the annexation were to occur include traffic control, street signage (including all applicable city signage), sanitation, salaries, overtime, and the possible addition of personnel.

#### Street Lighting

At this time this study does not make a determination of the cost per installment of streetlights within the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area. However, Street lighting will be installed in the annexed area in accordance with the City of Athens street lighting policies at the cost set by AUB at the time of the installation.

#### **City School System**

Since the property does not have any population at this time and is undeveloped of any structures, the annexation of the Harrison Ridge Subdivision would not in itself affect the City School System at this time.

#### Chapter 4

#### **Revenue Estimates**

This chapter is provided as a guideline in determining the approximate amount of expected revenue the City may obtain by annexation. This is an important step in any annexation procedure because of the impact annexation may have on the city budget. Revenues, estimated for this annexation, are generated from four areas; 1) city property taxes levied on annexed territory, 2) state shared taxes distributed from the State of Tennessee, 3) state street aid funds derived from state gasoline and oil taxes, and 4) solid waste. This chapter will also address future water and sewer consumption rates for the future development of theses 81 single-family homes. This study makes no attempt at estimating potential revenue generated from sales taxes.

#### **Property Taxes**

The pro-rated 25 acres of Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area valuation of residential property assessments was estimated to be \$42,484.00. Property in the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area was reassessed in 2018, and as per the requirements of Tennessee Code Annotated (T.C.A.) § 67-5-1701(3), the certified tax rate was determined to be \$1.3476 per \$100 of assessed value. This is the same rate approved for the 2022 property taxes.

#### **State-Shared Taxes**

State-shared revenues are distributed on a per capita basis. Future revenue can be projected using the 2019-2020 fiscal year estimates of state-shared taxes, which were released by the Municipal Technical Advisory Service.

Total allocation per capita is estimated at \$162.68, which includes \$113.25 per capita share of the Sales Tax, \$0.47 per capita of the Beer Tax, \$1.83 per capita of the Special Petroleum Products Tax, \$10.38 per capita of Gross Receipts Tax (TVA in lieu of taxes), \$1.50 per capita for sports betting, and \$35.25 per capita of the Gasoline and Motor Fuel Taxes.

Using the total general fund revenue of (162.68- 35.25 Gas tax) \$127.43 per capita, and assuming a future total population of 69 persons in the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area, the annexation will generate an additional estimated \$8,792.61 in general state revenue funds. The entire development or 81 homes (192 persons)on the 29.05 acres will generate an additional estimated \$24,466.56 in general state revenue funds.

#### **State Street Aid**

Gasoline and Motor Fuel Tax is distributed to the community based upon the amount of area served by city streets. A derivation of this distribution formula can be based upon the amount of population and revenue distributed locally. According to State Aid Estimates the City can expect to receive \$35.25 per capita for State Street Aid. At this rate, and assuming a total population of 69 persons in the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area, the annexation area will generate additional street aid revenues in the amount of \$2,423.25. The entire development or 81 homes (192 persons)on the 29.05 acres will generate an additional estimated \$6,768.00 in general state revenue funds.

#### **Solid Waste Collection**

As stated, before the City of Athens charges \$9.50 per month for residential solid waste collection. In the future, all 81 new residential homes within the proposed 29.05-acre area would generate an additional \$796.50 a month in additional revenue for residential solid waste pickup, or \$9,234.00 annually. The all 29 new residential homes within the proposed annexation area would only generate an additional \$275.50 a month in additional revenue for residential solid waste pickup, or \$3,306.00 annually.

#### **Water Service**

An estimate of revenues for future public water for 29 new residential homes using 3,400 gal at the current AUB monthly rate of \$38.25, would generate \$13,311.00 annually.

#### **Sanitary Sewer Revenues**

An estimate of revenues for sanitation is based upon the future 29 new residential homes and the current "user fees" listed in Chapter 2. On the simple assumption that all future 29 new residential homes are charged the minimum monthly service availability charge (\$39.10 for residential), AUB could expect to receive \$1,393.90 per month, or \$13,606.80 annually in sanitary sewer revenues.


#### **Expenditure/Revenue Summary and Conclusion**

#### **Expenditure and Revenues Summary**

The Expenditures and Revenues Summary merely lists the totals of those current and future operational expenditures shown in the previous sheets. It also shows the current property tax revenue that would be generated, based upon the prorate 25-acre area and its assessed value of property and the City's current property tax rate. This is a one-year snapshot of revenues and expenditures and does not reflect a long-range cumulative effect of the annexation, which once developed will generate and exponentially higher revenues and expenditures for the City of Athens.

#### Conclusion

The proposal to annex the Portion of Parcel 047-226.00 on Velma Road Annexation Area appears entirely feasible for the City of Athens. One may expect some unanticipated hidden costs of this annexation, but it would appear that the city will have an adequate margin of safety for defraying those costs.





SUBJECT: Council Approval of Layout & Scope of Proposed Animal Shelter Facility

After extensive work by both the City & MRHS in reviewing and coordinating with Allen & Hoshall on critical design elements of the new shelter, we have finally received a set of plans that details the layout of the facility as it is to be constructed. Staff is still working to make minor adjustments and clean up the plans to minimize clerical errors and eliminate conflicting or unconcise sheets or details that impact bidding. The expectation is to complete this over the course of the next week.

The Public Works Department is requesting Council approval of the proposed layout & scope of the proposed animal shelter facility based on the plan documents provided. Staff would recommend Council direct particular attention to the following sheets to best understand what is being pursued for construction:

- C1.1 which details what improvements are being performed to the site, generally, such as exterior outdoor runs, pathways, and parking lot adjustments required in order to make the facility fully ADA accessible
- AD1.1-1.2 Floor plan showing renovations under the base bid & alternate bid which
  include demolition activities that will remove existing structures and facilities in the
  building currently that must be addressed in order to accommodate the proposed use as
  a shelter and clinic and ensure the facility is fully ADA compliant
- A1.2 Floor plan showing renovations under the base bid which include construction activities related to building of shelter intake, animal housing, and adoption center


- A1.3 Floor plan showing renovations under the bid alternate which include construction
  of the MRHS Spay & Neuter Clinic which, if elected to be funded by MRHS, would allow
  them to relocate and operate their clinic seamlessly alongside the shelter
- A2.2 Floor plan showing renovations under the base bid which include construction
  activity details specifically for specialty kennels to house nursing dogs & puppies as well
  as aggressive & sick animals that need to be separated from the general shelter
  population for their safety and the safety of staff, visitors, and volunteers. There are also
  a few regular canine kennels in this warehouse area as well
- A2.3 Floor plan showing renovations under the base bid which include construction activity details for the kennel areas that will house canines. There are two distinctive types of kennels, indoor-outdoor kennels, and smaller indoor kennels for smaller dogs. All kennels will afford animals climate-controlled shelter that can be secured as needed. The indoor-outdoor kennels are equal in size, and all kennels are larger than the largest kennel at the current shelter facility
- A5.1-5.2 Exterior profiles of the facility showing how the facility will look. In order to manage project costs, extensive exterior renovations, such as sealing of the existing block with a vapor barrier, addition of insulation, and new exterior blocking are not within the scope of the project. This could be pursued in a future renovation project if desired. Renovations are primarily limited to repair of damaged block areas, repainting, and replacement of existing doors and awnings, and addition of signage denoting animal intakes, adoption center, and the spay & neuter clinic

If Council agrees with the proposed layout and renovation scope as submitted, City Staff will proceed to soliciting bids. Any other remaining minor issues or revisions will be handled as addenda during the bid process and any interested bidders will be made aware of the changes.



LAYOUT PLAN






DIMENSION FLOOR PLAN -BASE BID

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#### **RESOLUTION NO. 2022-24**

WHEREAS, a final layout plan, pending minimal adjustments and clerical revisions, has been provided to City and MRHS Staff, and both entities agree that the design adequately meets the needs of the animal shelter, adoption center, and a future location for the MRHS Spay & Neuter Clinic should they choose to pursue funding for its construction as a bid alternate; and,

**WHEREAS**, City Staff submit the plans for this layout for the review, evaluation, and approval of the Athens City Council to inform the Council of the project plan and scope, and to ensure collective agreement and approval of the project's design and scope before proceeding further with the project; and,

WHEREAS, with approval of this resolution by the Athens City Council, City Staff will proceed to finalize construction bid documents, solicit competitive bids for the construction of the new Animal Shelter Facility, review said bids, return to Council with a recommendation to award construction of the Shelter to the lowest qualified bidder and, if the bid is approved, proceed swiftly to construction.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Council of the City of Athens, Tennessee, as follows:

That the recitals above are true and accurate and form a part of this Resolution; and

# CITY OF ATHENS, TENNESSEE Narrative on Financial Analysis July, 2022

This narrative will discuss various aspects of the financial data presented to the city council for the above-referenced month. July, and 2 or 3 subsequent months will be above the normal percentages, primarily on the expenditure side because of several factors, as discussed below.

#### **General Fund**

Overall, we collected about \$67,000 less in July this year, primarily because we received \$59,000 more in sales tax, \$168,000 less from the direct appropriation grant from the State and \$17,000 more in state sales tax. As a percentage we collected 1.56% less than the budgeted revenues for last year.

PLEASE NOTE: On the financial spreadsheet that accompanies this report, at the top you will see General Fund revenues. I have only broken out major sources of revenue such as property taxes and sales taxes. The "total revenues" amount includes smaller items that I did not show in detail. A complete listing of all revenue accounts can be found on your computer-generated report titled "Statement of Actual and Estimated Revenues".

Expenditures are always going to show high in the early budget months, primarily due to the retirement contribution being paid in July and the fleet management transfer.

Another factor that makes the percentage spent look high is the fact that we set up annual purchase orders for known or recurring monthly expenses. For example, in the City Council division we pay for the monthly taping of council meetings. To avoid having to prepare a purchase order every month, we prepare one for the entire year and pay off of it monthly. This total PO is included in the "expended & encumbered" percentage.

Expenditures and encumbrances for this year are \$188,000 less than this time last year, showing 15.71% this year. The variance is due to the school funding not being paid until August and the transfer not being made to capital until August as well.

#### <u>Sanitation</u>

Revenues and expenditures are comparable to the prior year.
