WHEREAS, the strength of our nation, and all of its cities and states, flows from the promise of individual equality and freedom of choice; and

WHEREAS, the 55th anniversary of the enactment of Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, the Federal Fair Housing Law, during the month of April, is an occasion for Americans -- individual and collectively -- to rededicate themselves to the principal of freedom of choice and to participate in efforts to eliminate vestiges of housing discrimination wherever they exist. This law guarantees for each citizen that critical, personal element of freedom of choice and the selection of the home; and

WHEREAS, the City of Athens passed Ordinance No. 577 on June 5, 1979, adopting the Fair Housing Law into its Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, the City of Athens fully endorses the concept behind the Fair Housing Law and pledges to enforce the provisions of its Municipal Code dealing with the implementation of fair housing laws.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Athens, Tennessee, as follows:

Council Approval of Notice of Intent to Apply for Multi-Modal Access Grant

The Public Works Department is requesting Council approval to submit a Notice of Intent to apply (NOI) and, if determined to be eligible, submit a full application for Multi-Modal Access Grant (MMAG) funding to support implementation of the Historic Downtown Transportation Alternatives (HDTA) project. Considering that the project includes state routes throughout the proposed scope of work, it stands to reason that it will be extremely competitive in the selection process for funding. The included report from Stantec for the January HDTA Stakeholder meeting discusses proposed improvements that would be pursued, 5-point intersection being the top priority.

Being selected for funding would provide appreciable financial support in the construction of the project, as the MMAG funding cap is \$1,250,000 and is a 90/10 cost-share with the state covering 90% of the cost of the approved scope of work. Leveraging TDOT dollars when and where we can allows our local dollars to go further.

The application window is as follows: – the NOI must be submitted from April 26, 2023, to May 16, 2023. After the NOI application window closes, TDOT will review all NOIs submitted and then notify eligible applicants to submit a full application between May 31, 2023, and July 13, 2023. Awards would tentatively be announced in December 2023. Because we are already under contract with Stantec in accordance with TDOT RFQ requirements, have a defined scope of work, and have conducted extensive public input efforts, our application and project eligibility for funding is strong. The Department will also be pursuing Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) funding for the HDTA project to help supplement local dollars to the maximum extent practicable later this year. In summary, MMAG is one of the best sources of State funding to aid municipalities in pursuing improvements to State Routes within their jurisdictions.

CITY OF ATHENS, TENNESSEE Narrative on Financial Analysis February, 2023

This narrative will discuss various aspects of the financial data presented to the city council for the above-referenced month. July, and 2 or 3 subsequent months will be above the normal percentages, primarily on the expenditure side because of several factors, as discussed below.

General Fund

Overall, we collected about \$935,000 more through February this year, primarily because we received \$626,000 more in sales tax, \$159,000 more in property taxes, \$168,000 less from the direct appropriation grant from the State, \$70,000 more in state sales tax and \$178,000 more in interest revenue. As a percentage we collected 2.40% more than the budgeted revenues for last year.

PLEASE NOTE: On the financial spreadsheet that accompanies this report, at the top you will see General Fund revenues. I have only broken out major sources of revenue such as property taxes and sales taxes. The "total revenues" amount includes smaller items that I did not show in detail. A complete listing of all revenue accounts can be found on your computer-generated report titled "Statement of Actual and Estimated Revenues".

Expenditures are always going to show high in the early budget months, primarily due to the retirement contribution being paid in July and the fleet management transfer.

Another factor that makes the percentage spent look high is the fact that we set up annual purchase orders for known or recurring monthly expenses. For example, in the City Council division we pay for the monthly taping of council meetings. To avoid having to prepare a purchase order every month, we prepare one for the entire year and pay off of it monthly. This total PO is included in the "expended & encumbered" percentage.

Expenditures and encumbrances for this year are \$1,398,000 more than this time last year, showing 72.43% this year. The variance is due to the Schools appropriation being \$212,000 more than the amount paid by this time last year, the fund balance transfer to the capital projects fund being \$570,000 more than the amount in the previous year and the debt service transfer being \$400,000 more than this time last year.

Sanitation

Revenues and expenditures are comparable to the prior year.




