

Election Sign Placement and Campaigning on Social Media Information.

Placement of Election Signs on Private property in Bladensburg.

Prior to placing any election signs it is recommended that you obtain permission from the resident or property owner.

Permission from the utility companies should be obtained prior to placement them on utility poles

Placement of any Signs on a Maryland State Highway right of way.

(Annapolis Road, Kenilworth Avenue, 48th Street, Quincy Street and 52nd Avenue)

(This is from Maryland State highway Administration website FAQs)

1. Can I put my sign on the highway Right-of-Way or State property?

NO. State property is reserved for official traffic control signs or devices. Other signs are distracting to motorists and considered a safety hazard.

2. What do I have to do to put up a sign?

Before you erect or post a sign adjacent to a State highway, you need to contact the Maryland State Highway Administration - Outdoor Advertising Representative, at your local District office. This includes not just billboards, but yard sale, political, real estate, and other types of advertising signs.

Placement of Signs on Prince Georges County right of Way.

(5300blk of Quincy Street, 56th Place and 60th Avenue)

(1) At least 10 feet behind the street line; and

(2) At least 50 feet from the nearest corner of any street intersection.

(b) Validity period.

(1) *Campaign signs* may be erected forty-five (45) days prior to the election. The *signs* shall be removed within ten (10) days after the general election or within 10 days after the primary election if the candidate is not successful.

(2) Other public interest *signs* may be erected for a period not to exceed 30 consecutive days.

Other regulations.

(1) One permit is required per applicant per event.

(CB-59-1993; CB-95-1994)

And please remove all election signs within 10 days after the Election

Any signs placed without permission is subject to removal.

Social Media

There cannot be any campaign materials or announcements on any of the Town's social media or community notification platforms.

This includes the Town's Facebook Page, Town Website, Town Newsletter, Town's Cable Channels, or in Town E-blasts, Twitter, Next Door. This includes commenting to the public using any of these platforms.
