Re: Public Comments

Lann: We have six signed up, eight voicemails and eleven emails.

**Joyce Gooden, District 6**: Good evening. My name is Joyce Gooden and I live on Shelton's Store Road in District 6. Joe Chambers is my Board of Supervisors representative. My comments have to do with the 2020 Electoral process here in Buckingham County. My polling site is the Masonic Hall. I work the dual primary in June. I volunteer to help prepare the absentee ballots for mailing. I worked the early voting at the central office. I was the Slate River's Assistant Chief until the 3<sup>rd</sup> of November. I tell you of my background so you will understand that I know firsthand of what I say. Thank you. Thank you. Thank you to the person or persons who hired Lindsey Taylor as the Registrar and Director of Elections. I applaud Lindsey's dedication, energy, her election protocol knowledge, equipment knowledge and ability to get the job done. Let me not forget to mention Lindsey's patience. Lindsey's patience with me and my many questions foremost but also her patience with the questions and the scheduling of all the people needed for early voting and all 11 voting precincts. A huge thank you goes to Lindsay's team of the Buckingham County Electoral Board. Rick Caldwell, Chairman; Gail Braxton, Vice Chair; Larry Davis, Secretary. Thank you to all of the central office support. Thank you to Margaret Thomas, and all of the poll workers who supported our electoral processes here in Buckingham. As a final note, I urge the Board of Supervisors to expedite the upgrade of the cell phone and internet service here in Buckingham County, You were able to support the school system in their quest to provide buses with hotspots to support student educational needs. We truly needed better service at the Masonic Hall. At one point, 3 of us were on our cell phones, trying to find the sweet spot in the room to get a call to the registrar's office. We were all going to ask the same question. By the way, the signal sweet spot was never twice in the same spot. It would be wonderful if Buckingham precincts could use laptops instead of paper poll books that would translate into quicker voter verification and less calls to the central office. Again, thank you for allowing me to express myself at this meeting.

Marie Flowers, District 3: Marie flowers the third district and I'm coming because of the gold mining. My interpretation of the responsibility of government is to promote an orderly society and protect people. For example roads, speed limits, etc. You know we have guidelines so that things go smoothly and people were safe. We need to protect the health of the people. Now this board, except for the two people who were not on the board that previously, in my opinion did not do their utmost to protect the people of Union Hill from the consequences of the compressor. Obviously, there are people in this county who do not matter. This Board, the Planning Commission, they wouldn't demand an electric generator. They wouldn't demand closer turn off valves. There were a number of things that this Board and the Planning Commission could have done to protect the people. But you all went along with whatever Dominion wanted. And I just feel like you don't care about people. You only care about what you want. You have another

opportunity to shortchange these same people with the goldmine and with the poison that mining generates. Try to remember they are people. They're more important than money. Thank you.

Julie Quillen, District 5: Good evening. My name is Julie Quillen, And I grew up on a Warminster Church Road, I currently reside with my father David Ouillen, at 4484 Warminster Church Road in the James River district. I live on the land and property that I will inherit, and this is the land that I hold, dear. And this is where I hope to raise my future children. As I was a young child, my brother and I spent our summers roaming the woods and playing in Branch Creek behind our house. We built forts from tree branches, covered ourselves in mud and dammed up sections of the creek to make swimming pools. There's a certain type of happiness, health and wellbeing that comes from a childhood of loving the land that you live on. I hope that all of you listening today have a sense of what that feels like. Also, there's a there's a certain type of pride in adulthood that comes from believing that your county officials will do the right thing to preserve the land that you love, as well as to maintain the health and wellbeing of the citizens who live on it. As I stand here this evening, I question whether I have that sense of pride or not. I do not support a zoning text amendment that would allow core sampling for commercial purposes with a special use permit. Aston Bay holdings has been illegally conducting core sampling in this county for four years. I understand that we are here this evening to talk about core sampling. And yet core sampling is the obvious precursor to gold mining. A zoning text amendment is simply a slap on the wrist and opens the door for a potential open pit gold mine. This would pollute our air and discharge toxic chemicals into our streams and groundwater. This would wreak havoc on our health and on the land that we hold so dear. Open pit gold mining could irreparably damage Northwestern Buckingham. Rather than a zoning text amendment. I urge you to make changes in the zoning laws to prohibit mining and related activities in A-1 and to issue a fine against Aston Bay holdings for their violation of our zoning ordinance. Imagine that this is happening in your backyard. Imagine it's your children or grandchildren who want to roam through the woods and play in the creek. Imagine it's your well water and your family and your neighbor's health and wellbeing at stake. Like you I love Buckingham County and I want to preserve it for future generations. I want a healthy childhood for my children just as I had as a child. No amount of money gained from this project is worth the cost of our health, our community and our future. Thank you.

David! Ball, District 3: Good evening, David ball district three. I see that you're looking at some policy changes with regards to what's happened with this pandemic. And I can tell you that this pandemic is gonna be over pretty quickly. Now that we have a pharmaceutical company that has successfully proven that they have 90% capacity in their results to cure this virus or to immune people against it. So I expect that this event is going to end very quickly. And it's always good to have a backup policy for future events. And you can't always forecast with those events are going to be, but bear in mind that the county here except for the prison system has fared fairly well as opposed to the more populated areas. And the other side of that is the fact that there are a lot of small businesses here that actually suffered, or were put out of business because of this COVID thing. There was no provision. There was no ability for those companies or businesses to adjust. And so they shut down. And even major corporations, I mean, you can see major corporations like AC Moore, they just decided a tough market, we are just closing down all together. So there's been a lot of effect on not just the county, but the state and the country as

far as what's happened with this pandemic virus. And so we need to plan for the future and know that in the present day and what's going on, that there are cures out there. That we have fantastic pharmaceutical companies that have worked on this aggressively, and come up with cures. And those will be available shortly to the general public. So I think that's something that we can all be comforted by and look forward to a more prosperous future. Thank you.

Quinn Robinson, District 4: Good evening, gentlemen, fellow citizens. My name is Quinn Robinson, I live out in Andersonville. I can't give you the address right now. Because VDoT ran over the sign or the box but I can be reached at P.O. Box 888 in Dillwyn. I have a couple of comments. First of all, I had extreme difficulty accessing the website in order to get information about this meeting. It's just... it's probably something that CenturyLink is doing or neglected to do. And I think it's... it merits some consideration, investigating, if not an audit of what is happening with the website and how to improve it. There's a lot of dead ends with old information that should have been purged a long time ago. And I couldn't get the agenda to load because it was over 300 and some pages, according to my printer, not that I was going to print them, but I wanted to navigate it. And that's another problem. But anyway, my concerns tonight are the nature of these meetings, and how they're run. And I think we can do better. And I think this apparatus now, this is being filmed and people are looking at backs of people's heads. That's a little bit awkward. And there are other ways of doing it. I shared something with Supervisor Miles that possibly could correct this and it's an inexpensive option in terms of cameras, record a live stream and can be controlled by the county and not by YouTube. The other thing is about the gold mining, I'm opposed to it. And I'd like to repeat what I said at the Planning Commission. First thing is we did... there was an episode back in the 70s and 80s, when the Love dump was created and became a disaster. It's now a Superfund site. We don't want to repeat that time. And again, when you hear people say that they appreciate the rural nature of the county, farming, forestry, and friendship, whatever, but not heavy industry. There were very little necessary provisions for heavy industry or anything like this gold mine. But the point is, you didn't get it right that time. And then along came Dominion with the pipeline. The same thing was said we like it the way it is, you know, casual, comfortable setting where people can live in peace. But that didn't happen. He spent a better part of six years for the pipeline, it was wrong. And now we're going to be having potential gold mining and you're gonna throw out all the ordinances and fix them so the Southwick murkier. It's wrong, Just look at the poisons that are used to extract the gold from the ore.

Paul Barlow, District 5: Good evening. Paul Barlow, district five. I live off of Pond Road, two miles from the core drilling site. So it looks like we're all going to get crash courses here soon and gold mining. I've learned quite a bit in the last few weeks. But first and foremost, before pursuing a zoning text amendment to allow core drilling for A-1 zones, we should consult with some experts to figure out why all of a sudden we have a cluster of wells going dry in the area surrounding the core drilling site. Somehow it seems the hydrology of the area has been affected by this. And if Aston Bay activity is to blame, then then they should be held accountable. We all know that core drilling is a gateway to open pit mining. It will be an open pit because of the gold is near the surface. And that's just going to cause an environmental disaster for generations to come. And also everyone here should be angry or at least miffed that a company snuck in here and started drilling holes into the local aquifer without any permission or

supervision. You know, I mean, you know, we need to get some ire up about that. So I say let's just take a timeout and consult with some experts. And if the zoning ordinance is to be amended, amend it so the core drilling and mining is prohibited in A-1 zones. Thank you.

### Voicemails:

Alan Binstock: Greetings. I'm Alan Binstock. I'm a master planner with 20 years, two years experience at NASA Goddard Space Flight Center. And I'm currently working on a Draft Master Plan for the Yogaville community and area. I just wanted to let you folks know that we're looking at 20 years, which will focus in on village growth, economic growth, and particularly development of businesses and perhaps light industry that's all ahead of us coming up and our community expects to expand and grow. And as we've done in the past, we will continue to employ people, the Ashram community will employ people who are from the community. And this is important to us. And of course, as you probably guessed, it's critical that our area remain healthy and helpful to live in. I'm very concerned as we go forward to do this, about the outfall and side effects of the potential gold mining and I will at future meetings show up in person. I couldn't come for this meeting coming up. So I wanted to go on record for you. I am at 301-395-6080 if you have any questions. Thank you for your time. Appreciate it.

Cassandra Stish: Good evening, honorable Board of Supervisors and members of the Planning Commission. This Cassandra fish 3098 Sycamore Creek Road, Buckingham, Virginia 23921. I live in the fifth district. I have spoken to some of you directly and thank you for taking time to listen to my concerns, and for telling me about your upcoming work session where you're expecting to learn more about the industrial drilling and mineral prospecting currently occurring approximately two miles from my home. I'm glad to hear that more information is coming from some experts to help everyone understand what is before us. Even so, please be sure you are getting information from all angles, not merely from permitting agencies who have explained how they regulate this activity, not the impact of it, per se. And I implore you to get more information or more experts if our current concerns are addressed. It would be helpful to present all of the information provided during the work session to the public in a format a little more useful than the meeting minutes. Please be proactive on behalf of the citizens and make sure we have access to and can easily share information provided to our leaders. It's a travesty this activity went on for so long unnoticed and I hope that our county attorney is exploring if injunctive relief is called for in the case of the citizens who have already experienced detrimental effects on our wells. This is only the camel's nose in the tent. Please do everything you can to keep it from progressing further. Do not permit the ZTA to move forward. Deny Aston Bay's requests for a ZTA and therefore the inevitable subsequent special use requests that will follow to permit industrial mining and significant zoning map amendment. The industrial mining activity that is being marketed as an investment opportunity, as a result of this illegal industrial drilling conducted by Aston Bay does not belong in A-1 district. Weyerhaeuser doesn't live here. We do. Aston Bay doesn't live here. We do. Their kids don't drink the water. Ours do. It is the job of the comprehensive plan in our zoning ordinance to protect Buckingham and to shepherd a

clean, bright future for all of us. It's the job of the Board of Supervisors and the Planning Commission to make sure we don't get screwed over. We're counting on you for do your jobs for our sakes. Thank you very much. I look forward to talking to you about this more in the future. Have a lovely evening.

Chad Oba: My name is Chad Oba and I am in district number six. Good evening. It's my understanding that what is being considered here tonight is an advisory to the Planning Commission of what you want to do about a Canadian company that has been doing drilling on an A-1 zoned land for four years. And this is an activity as prohibited by our Buckingham zoning ordinance. First of all, I say do a legal notification to cease this activity which I understand you've already done and then find them to the maximum amount. 23 holes times whatever should be a good amount. And I'm surprised that they haven't been fined already. I don't believe that drilling 23 exploratory holes with questions about how much water has already been used. And certainly where it was dispersed to afterwards can lead to anything other than full out open pit gold mining. So even considering a zoning text amendment will ensure that it will be taken to the next step. I say stop it now and keep this A-1 zone integrity intact for what it was intended to be as clearly spelled out in your own zoning ordinance. I've been practicing mental health here in Buckingham and surrounding counties for 25 years. And what that means is that I listen to people's stories, where they're working and where they aren't. Sometimes I'm able to help them reframe them and make a new story that works better. I think that this story of moving Buckingham towards open pit mining would not have a good ending. There are people who you will hear from that are already being impacted through water loss of this risky trajectory. Who is paying for their new wells? Is asked Aston Bay? We could well end up with another Superfund Love dump. I'm asking you to protect the good people here. Many of whom have contributed positively to Buckingham teaching your children, developing their land for agricultural use, paying their taxes and living on the land for what it was intended for. Why have a zoning plan if you don't follow it? We need an new story that protects the people the land or water tables or wildlife. Please do not create another sacrifice with little regard for the impact it would have and have had already. I've further support having a Citizens Advisory Board that can offer some real information and what open pit gold mining leads to. Although there were good people that work in our state agencies, they are limited in what they can say. Further research needs to be done. I say delay this process. Do the research. Do not pass a zoning text amendment. Thank you

Heidi Berthoud: Hi, my name is Heidi Dhivya Berthoud. I'm in the James River district and these comments are for the public comments for the Board of Supervisors tonight, November 10 2020. Thank you for making this available. Aston Bay drillers were informed in June that their drilling is prohibited by county law. And that's after four years of exploratory drilling without the county's knowledge or permission. So please do not reward very bad behavior by making it easier for them by creating a ZTA that would permit core typical drilling. We heard you deny, in an earlier meeting that exploratory drilling for gold leads to gold mining, but that's exactly what it's for. I'm very concerned that your need to watch over a healthy economy in Buckingham is being clouded by thinking that gold mining would bring money to the county. Unfortunately, gold mining has a clearly proven, very bad business history that would cost the county and the state dearly for generations to come. I asked you to please slow down and do the research that is

readily available. Friends of Buckingham has been compiling information on the website. And if you just put goldmining in the search all those posted articles will come up. What penalties will be levied? I see that it is not just our right but also our duty to demand that you penalize this company. That's their income resource. You have guidance for this in zoning codes. What oversight would be conducted on the 23 holes that were drilled? Who will do that? A nontoxic water well requires oversight site. A GW 2 form is filed for each well dug, listing things like the day the drilling started when it finished the depth flow size of the hole, how it was closed. What and so what else is needed for the gold drilling site. I formally asked you to make zoning changes to remove the allowable activity of mining and quarrying in the A-1 zone as it is contrary to the purpose stated for this zone. And I sent in an email that has excerpts from both the A-1 zone and industrial zone. So the industrial zone is in alignment with these purposes. Industry would have to apply to change the zone from A-1 to M-2 to do their very dirty impactful work. But the county would then be in, you know, in keeping with the zoning masterplan. And environmental impact studies should be required. Other allowable, way less impactful activities require close scrutiny and updated review. I asked you to create a citizen Advisory Council so that the growing number of very alarmed residents can have a reasonable conversation with you. These public comment periods fall short of what is needed to address this very serious situation. There's already been a lot of unnecessary confusion. Please see us as your best resources and not the enemy. Let's work together. To be clear. I am opposed to open pit gold mining as there is substantial and justifiable fear of gold mining doing irreparable harm to our county, state and beyond. Let us not create more sacrifice zones in this county that only benefit the mining companies and leave us with external lack of living with toxic soil, water, air, water tables drastically drawn down, health care burdens, expensive road repairs. Cleanup is not really possible. We live with a mess we allow for centuries to come. Let's be open for clean business.

Jeeva Abbate: Hello, this is Jeeva Abbate, representing Yogaville, from district five. I'm addressing the issue of gold mining and core drilling in Buckingham County. Dear county supervisors, thank you for your service. Yogaville and many of our community members, staff and leadership are now informed of the plan gold mining operations in the county by Canadian mining company Aston Bay Holdings. The history of toxic gold mining operations is well established with huge cost of cleanup, pollution mitigations and legal actions. Open pit, deep pit and other types of gold mining produce waste containing dangerous chemicals including mercury, arsenic, cyanide, lead, petroleum byproducts and acids. Mining, mineral processing and metallurgic extractions produce large quantities of waste into the environment and waste metals leaching out in contaminated water called acid mine drainage which threatens groundwater, our well water our farms and livestock. Well Aston Bay and their representatives claim that they don't use poisonous toxins but biodegradable products and little water, the clear science on this matter disputes that claim. A paper on heavy metal pollution from gold mines and the bacterial strategies for resistance from the National Institutes of Health hold that there is no clean approach and using any kind of biodegradable products. All gold mining is dirty. While the request for a zoning text amendment by Aston Bay is being framed as just providing for a zoning change to allow an entity to apply for a permit for core sampling, the whole basis of this is to open up gold mining in Buckingham. The A-1 agricultural zoning is currently in place in our region to protect us from such a toxic operation. In fact, to quote the comprehensive plan, this

district is established for the purpose of preserving and promoting rural land uses. It's supposed to be facilitating existing and future farm operations found in Buckingham County. Preserving farm and forest lands, conserving water, reducing soil erosion, preventing water pollution, protecting watersheds and reducing hazards from flood and fire. Finally, an independent environmental impact study conducted on the potential impact of this operation on the health and safety of Buckingham communities and property should be conducted before opening the doors such an operation. Yogaville and our many community members urge each of you as a County Representatives to vote no on any change to the zoning text amendment, or the zoning text at all that would open the door for goldmining to our beautiful Buckingham County. Thank you for your continued service. Respectfully submitted. Jeeva Abbate. Thank you.

Katherine Thimnakis: For tonight's Board of Supervisors meeting. This is Katherine Thimnakis, Coordinator for Concerned Citizens for Animal Protection. I am speaking out from the Glenmore district. Appealing to everyone in charge to not make any amendments to the zoning text which continues enforcement of prohibited activity. This gold mine project is only for profit. Literally gold digging and will destroy the ecosystem. The most precious of all our resources. Thank you

Kenda Hanuman: This is Kenda Hanuman from district five and I'm speaking to the ZTA that is proposed for exploratory zoning text amendment. Thank you for hearing what Buckingham has been discovering about this topic. Several of you have stated the text amendment is simply about exploratory drilling. Does anyone here really think that drilling isn't the precursor to mining? Your constituents have uncovered information regarding Aston Bay Holdings Buckingham project. This is what this Canadian company is telling their investors in their Aston Bay corporate presentation of September 2020. I quote "the hail mine is a great play and one we'd like to replicate in Virginia." This is at about the 12 minute point in their recording for investors on that Aston Bay website. Not only is the drilling finding gold, but other minerals, copper, lead, zinc, cobalt, referred to as polymetallic substances. Consider where this is heading. A lot is impaired should this mining be allowed. I quote, "acid drainage and cyanide are among the major environmental threats in gold mines across the country contaminating ground water and rivers in some places". This is in the June 30, 2019 WFAE report called Mining Company wants to expand operations at the historic South Carolina goldmine. Leave this ordinance as it is thus continuing to prohibit exploratory drilling. Again, please leave the ordinance as it is continuing to prohibit exploratory drilling. This is a decision made regarding tonight's ordinance. This is the choice I ask you to make for the good of Buckingham residents. environment, and our children's and grandchildren's future. Thank you.

**Swami Dayananda**: Good evening. My name is Swami Dayananda living on Warminster Church Road, district number five. I want to begin for tonight's November 10<sup>th</sup> Board of Supervisors meeting for public comment. Firstly, thank you to planning commissioners for discussing the possibility so inviting experts on the matter of gold mining before making any recommendations on zoning text amendment. I am very glad that Board of Supervisors will be considering the topic this evening. The gold mining project, which can have such great impact on our water, land, our health and environment, and for some of us possibility so losing our homes.

Gardens, some farms require taking time to study and get all the facts on what it means to the residents nearby the sites and for the entire county. As a part of the study, I asked the Board to consider Citizens Advisory Council. When the citizens and the county administrators work together with free communication and sharing of information, I believe we can go through the process of considering gold mining project in our county with more civility and with mutual respect and common goal for the betterment of the County. We all want the best for Buckingham County residents, farms, businesses, our family, our health and wellbeing. I look forward to the expert's presentation. And also for Board of Supervisors to please consider creating Citizens Advisory Board. Thank you so very much for your service.

Lann: Now, Nicci will read you the emails.

Edmondston: The first email states: My name is Brian Lucy. My wife and I own a home and 43 acres at 2878 Warminster Church Road in district five. Our property is about a mile from current core sampling activity. The facts as I see it is Aston Bay violated page one of its own code of conduct. Aston Bay violated the county zoning ordinance. Aston Bay failed to exercise even a minimum of due diligence before drilling for core samples and then continued to illegally drill core samples for four years without so much as making a simple phone call to the zoning office during that entire time. Instead of communicating with the county government, they preferred to talk only with investors and shareholders. They touted their prospecting funds and celebrated what they claimed to be a permissive legal jurisdiction. This does not bode well for future operations. I can only surmise from this that they are either malevolent, incompetent or lazy. Any one of those three will spell disaster. In Montana, another Canadian gold company, Pegasus Gold stuck taxpayers there with a \$100 million with a \$100 million cleanup bill after they went bankrupt in the late 90s. The company's cleanup Bond was insufficient to repair the damage it caused. It's now one of several gold mines that are EPA Superfund sites. A 2013 earthworks study of 93% of all gold producing mines in the US found that every single site had at least one pipeline spill, and three quarters of them harm to ground or surface waters adjacent to their operations. Core sampling and mining activities are in direct conflict with the intent and scope of A-1 zoning as is expressly stated in county code. Deviation from that intent will open the door not to business opportunity, but to countless burdens heaped on taxpayers. At the October 26 meeting of the Planning Commission, the chairman told us that the 50 to 100 age demographic in our community cannot afford tax increases caused by a lack of business tax revenue. This community is telling you what we cannot afford. We cannot afford to drink poison water. We cannot afford to have water delivered when our wells dry up beneath us. We cannot afford to breathe polluted air. We cannot afford to sell our homes at a loss when the value plummets. We cannot afford to lose our wildlife. We cannot afford to be stuck with the cleanup bill once gold profits dry up and the mine operators disappear in a cloud of lawyers. Allowing this activity to go forwards here or elsewhere in A-1 zoned areas that the county will not bring long term sustainable revenue, jobs and opportunity. It will bring some short term gains for a few people followed by decades of expense for everyone. Do not amend the zoning ordinance to allow for core sampling in A-1 zones.

Our next comment states: Gold drilling in Buckingham. Fjord public comment. Lakshmi Fiord, district five. I asked the Board of Supervisors not only to deny zoning text amendment to the list of special use permits and an A-1 agricultural district to allow core sampling for commercial use, but that you also issue hefty fines to Blue Ridge property owners for each 28 plus exploratory core drilling sites, which defied our local ordinances unlikely calls nearby wells that share this aguifer to go dry. There is no economic justification imaginable to instead reward that elect illegality by overturning our farmland protections ordinance to endanger our 100% single source of water, which is illegal under the US Clean Water Act for the sole benefit of a Canadian gold mining operation. Because of the mining operations, location and immense environmental and environmental justice impacts, the Board of Supervisors must instead stop this permit process to involve federal and state agencies and required prescreening reviews for the site suitability of this project. Your special use permit for the Union Hill compressor station was considered not relevant by the US appeals court for the fourth district when vacating the ACP air permit. Why? Because Dominion had supplied you FERC and DEQ with the same poor incomplete and deliberately omitted data that led to our last lawsuit and its favorable outcome. The judges required the DEOs and Dominions lawyer to place in the record that Union Hill is an environmental justice community to accept the door to door household findings of 84% majority minority from the community household study designed and LED. The other one half of the basis for the judges unanimous decision was the proposed fine particulate matter emissions from gas fired turbine which this mining operation will also cause. The Department of Transportation, DOT, requires environmental justice reviews and reviews of particulate matter and new infrastructure that we use public roads as part of their operations. Thus the board must not for goldmining as for fracked gas prior only consult with and accept as factual corporate provided gold mining environmental science data, which like the coal industry has their mining operations, health and morality hazards, or tobacco and opioid industries having addiction and health impacts by manipulating data. The billions in fines now for doing so do not bring back the dead. Instead, the Board must consult open pit mining environmental scientists who are independent of industry ties, whose methods and findings stand up as replicable real replicable by other independent scientist. A National Environmental Policy Act, NEPA, guidelines based environmental justice review, we'll find the same EI findings and air emissions with this site for open pit mining activities. And the site must be reviewed under the Historic Preservation Act section 106 that brings the Federal Advisory Council of Historic Preservation, CHP, into consult. Because both Yogaville and Union Hill Rural Historic District are under Virginia Department of Historic Resources review processes. A new gold rush in Buckingham will this time leave permanent scars and contaminations with its tossed toxic cocktail of chemicals degradations that heightened sickness and mortality. We will bring these issues before the courts to because preventing health conditions and deaths from gold mining and all forms of toxic polluting air, water and soil hazards to Buckingham is our mission. Stephanie Rinaldi 2878 Warminster Church Road, District Five. Excerpts from Buckingham County's Comprehensive Plan: Vision

Buckingham County will be a model of planned residential and business development that ensures sufficient managed economic growth to enhance the quality of life of its residents, to attract desired socially responsible new businesses, and to ensure a fiscally sound County government that is responsive to the needs of its residents and businesses while maintaining tax rates at a responsible level and while preserving the desired rural characteristics of the County. Attainment of this vision will be supported by the following planning principles:

- -Seek sufficient economic growth by attracting socially and environmentally responsible businesses
- -Ensure that development is done in an environmentally sensitive, planned, and "green" manner that serves to preserve environmentally sensitive features.
- -Preserve the County's natural resources that provide valuable benefits to the County and its residents.

Continuing to recognize that one of its richest assets is agricultural, forestry and rural lands, Buckingham wants to continue to protect these areas and natural resources to ensure that a rural quality of life is maintained. Protecting and preserving farmland, forest uses, livestock operations, wetlands, significant wildlife habitats, and water resources are of primary importance to these areas.

Future residential, commercial and industrial development should be encouraged to locate in areas of the County where adequate public services are available or planned. Development that does occur in the rural agricultural and forestall portions of the County should be designed to incorporate significant open spaces and designed to minimize environmental impacts on the County's land and water resources.

The specific location of future land uses should be determined by the zoning ordinance, and when required by the zoning ordinance, the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors review of specific land use requests. Such review should consider the compatibility and benefits of the use, and the land impacts of a specific use on the surrounding neighborhood and larger community.

When future development requests require Planning Commission review and Board of Supervisors approval, the economic and quality of life benefits of open space, agricultural and forest land uses should be considered, as well as the adequacy of public facilities and services within the area. The environmental impacts of the development should also be considered. It is important to maintain a balance between development and preservation objectives throughout the County.

The issue before you regarding the amendment of the zoning ordinance to allow core drilling for commercial use in A1 must be held to the standards set in the Comprehensive plan. These were only some of the pertinent excerpts you must consider when determining your course of action.

Core drilling, particularly the drilling already illegally occurring in A1, is in direct opposition to the goals and vision this county has established for itself. Do not amend the zoning ordinance to allow this activity. Charge the company with the misdemeanors they have been committing. Fine them, as our laws allow. Clearly this activity should be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law, with maximum fines and even reimbursement to those who have had to drill new wells because of the extravagant water use during this preliminary activity. Needless to say, open pit gold mining will cause even worse damage including poisoning air and water for many generations to come. Even the best financial deal will still see most of the wealth generated going to out of state and out of country investors. The whole idea that a special use permit here for modern mining operations could possibly be justified is absurd. While the mine is operating they will disrupt traffic patterns, put extra burdens on road maintenance, not to mention animal and plant contamination, obvious noise and dust issues. Local inhabitants will be forced to flee with great losses of property value and or health issues directly related to the mining operations. I have been told that company representatives have approached local landowners to purchase their

properties saying "You wouldn't want to live next to our mine anyway. Condemning many innocent citizens to these devastating losses is unconscionable. Every citizen that was heard whether in person or by e-mail was adamantly opposed to this activity, albeit, someone suggested that the Planning Commission and the BOS together with citizen input hear further experts/opinions on this matter. I feel that would be an inordinate waste of time and energy. Simply put, core drilling will lead to open pit mining. Let us nip this in the bud NOW. We do not wish this devastation to our way of life, our clean water, our clean air, and quiet rural way of life, and our sanity. Agree? Thank you. Betty Dunnevant Zumbro, Pembleton Road.

Congratulations! You have all been given another opportunity to protect the citizens, water and soil of Buckingham County! The only ordinance that you need to pass is one that protects our right to be free of chemical trespass. The proposed mining process will compromise the water table and wells with its "acid mine waste" that includes dangerous chemicals such as mercury, arsenic, cyanide, lead, petroleum byproducts and acids that can threaten groundwater. All citizens of Buckingham could be affected by this kind of mining, including you, even though you might not live near the sites. It is time to look at the big picture of health and safety instead of the short-term picture of gains that industrial revenue might bring to the county. I understand how strapped the county is for money, every county is, but this doesn't mean that our health and safety should be compromised by giving corporations the right to drill for commercial purposes. The "Zoning Text Amendment" would allow core sampling for commercial purposes, changing an ordinance to allow drilling in an A-1 agriculturally zoned part of the county. Allowing exploratory drilling is just the beginning of opening the county doors to open pit gold mining. We all know that. There is already a Town Council on record which protected their citizens from chemical trespass - in Halifax, Virginia. And our last email comes from J Sumati Thorn, 3355 Warminster Church Rd, Buckingham VA To be presented to the Buckingham Board of Supervisors: We must stop gold exploration in Buckingham right now. If current drilling is allowed to continue the entire county will be opened up to potential mining sites. The massive amounts of water needed even for test boring is already drying up wells in adjacent properties. We do not know what chemicals are being used to lubricate the exploration drilling bits but the ground water may already be experiencing contamination. You only need to refer to current and past sites to learn about the sad effects of open pit mining. The most terrifying parts are the perpetual cyanide lagoons that remain long after the temporary mining projects are closed down. But the forced displacement of residents on neighboring properties is also terrifying in its own way. Adjacent homeowners are typically asked to relocate and offered a 'fair market price' for their homes. But 'fair market price' won't allow them to duplicate their holdings in a different location like say Albemarle County. If they refuse to sell, they are harassed by perimeter fencing, berms and property line crowding. Other alarming aspects to local mining sites is the twenty-four-hour onslaught of blasting noise & vibrations, truck traffic and intense lighting. The work force on mining sites tends towards a high turnover of single males who are not invested in the community, its values or preservation. The temporary nature of gold mines encourages a fast in, fast out, take what you can business approach that can and does leave the hosting locales wounded and depressed. Groundwater WILL be affected. Its contamination and depletion can distress not only neighboring areas but the James River and the Chesapeake Bay as well. Expect endless lawsuits, confrontations, surveillance, demonstrations and constant media exposure directed at the mining companies and the County of Buckingham. Expect this to go on for years unless it is stopped in its tracks now. Please defend your county, its water, its citizens and its future by preventing further commercial gold exploration within the borders of Buckingham County. Thank you.

Bryant: Is that all the comments you have?

Edmondston: Yes sir.

Re: Public Hearing: Cody Davis, Emergency Services Director, Consider Emergency Ordinance to Allow for the Continuity of Government Operations during the Pandemic

**Bryant:** We move on to public hearing. We will open the public hearing now for Mr. Cody Davis.

**Davis:** Good evening, gentlemen, I'll just start with a quick up date on the situation. The website, Health Department website, does indicate an uptick in cases. The short of it is that a lot of that is due to the fact that the prisons are starting to do their point prevalence testing again. Hundred tests at one given time. So Buckingham facility did that a couple of weeks ago. So they're

starting to get a lot of positive results or a lot around 50 at this point. Dillwyn is slated to do the exact same thing tomorrow. So it's going to grow. But the good thing is it's confined to those facilities like it was at the beginning of this thing. In terms of outside of those facilities. We're still averaging roughly two cases, a developed a day. And according to the health department, those are really associated with family gathering events, Sunday meals and things like that. But kind of a good outlook for Buckingham outside of those facilities, not to downplay the situation or anything but I do think we fared well. So without further ado with that said since this is still a dynamic and progressing event, we ask that you guys readapt, the emergency ordinance that you guys adopted towards the beginning of all of this, which the short of it allows for continuity of government of operations during the pandemic, including altering the process for conducting public meetings, restricting the use of public buildings and facilities, providing additional powers to the Director of Emergency Management or Mrs. Carter to incur cost, waive procedures and take the other temporary actions and suspending deadlines and procedures. We think that it's been a valuable asset throughout this response. And we'll need that tool in our pocket to continue our response. Questions?

Carter: I'd like to add that this would be in effect until you come back and rescind it.

Bryant: Thank you, Mr. Davis.

Lann: We have two signed up to speak for the public hearing.

Bryant: We will hear comments on this.

**David Ball, District 3:** Yes, David Ball, District Three. I think given the fact that as I said earlier, there is adequate treatment now available. They waited till after the presidential election to announce that there are drugs available to treat people as well as immune, inoculate people to make them immune to this disease. To take the government and shut it down again, to shut the people out. Yet businesses like Walmart, Shoppers Food Warehouse, hardware stores, etc. continue to operate and do it successfully without any loss of revenue or availability to the cut you know to their consumers. If the government wants to shut everything down, you can't get anything done with Government anymore, Ever try going to DMV. From what I understand, they basically have shut that down. And there are people piling up who want to get into DMV for particular services, they can't do it. You go to Richmond, you can't get into the government. The screw ups that are occurring in government because of the shutdown. And the fact that people aren't being responsible, and putting proper protocols in place to assure that there isn't a vast spread of the disease. It just is mind blowing. You can't just shut down government. You can't shut people out. The whole purpose of government in this country is to be open, viewable, and accessible to the public. At 100 years ago, a similar event with the Spanish Flu occurred in this country. The population of the date, that 120 million people, 2.2% of the population were infected and died from that disease. So the current situation in this country, you've got maybe .1 or .2 of a percent of the population who have actually died. We have over 3.5 million people in this country. The percent of people who are getting sick and cured is phenomenal. The response in this country of the medical society to treat this disease, to minimize the loss of life has been fantastic. So the idea that we keep shutting down government, shutting down people, closing

everything off, and I guarantee you, I've tried when you had a shutdown before, you can't watch anything about these meetings. You can't even properly broadcast it shuts down. It shuts you out, you lose signal. It's ridiculous. Thank you.

Carter: It does not shut anything down. We have to follow the Governor's executive order, which we have no control over. But this ordinance is not to shut down any businesses. And we would only go back to phase two with government operations if the governor directs us to. So this ordinance is just so that we can continue our government operations during the pandemic.

Quinn Robinson, District 4: Thank you. Again, my name is Quinn Robinson, District Four and I live in Andersonville, I have some concerns about this. But it's not so much on the broader scale. I think it's important. This has been an incredible disaster for the entire world. And precaution is good and reasonable thing. And it's been trivialized and politicized often. Perhaps things are improving to the point where we can get some things accomplished. But the main thing for Buckingham as far as I'm concerned, and I refer you to the editorial in the Herald, the school board had their meeting in the cafeteria or the gymnasium or something I'm not sure exactly where but you need more space. People are being locked out of this because they can't get here on time or figure out how to make the online things work. I couldn't figure out how to get into the county site last night. Very annoying. And it's an obstacle and you don't need them. You want people to have confidence and trust in what you're doing. And you're doing it well. So let them see that. But get open it up again so more people can take part. It's very important. And I noticed that this is only good for 60 days. And hopefully things will progress and can be reexamined at that time. But they all the medicine argues that caution be made. And it's not a matter of opening the economy up because we're going to have troubles with that for some time. This is far from over. Anyway. Thank you for your input and attention. This is its very important. Thanks.

Lann: That's all.

**Bryant:** Any other comment?

Carter: Mr. Chairman, before you all vote, I know that at the end of the ordinance, that was the emergency ordinance that you all adopted before, was the 60 days to try to pretty much save money of having a public hearing. So often, that ordinance would be in effect until you rescind it.

**Bryant:** Do we have a motion to that effect?

Miles: Mr. Chairman. I'd like to make a just offer a general observational remark in terms of how this county has handled its response to this pandemic, which, you know, has put over 100,000 people in the grave. Let me just add that and second of all, this document, through the governor's orders, and through orders from the federal government, is going to really bring a lot of different options to how the public can interact with their elected officials. And this board has done nothing, in my opinion, as former editor and former being in media, this board has done nothing, has done nothing to make anything less transparent with regard to COVID-19. We were

one of the first counties to offer this online method of calling in your public comments, of emailing your public comments, of watching our proceedings, and their entirety on YouTube. So I don't want to hear anything about how this board is not transparent. And by the way, you want to talk about helping businesses, this county board of supervisors, but \$60,000, \$60,000 of our CARES Act money into helping small businesses. And we did that. Every board member will tell you that small businesses are the backbone of our economy, of the Virginia economy, and we're supporting them. And this document is going to do nothing but help continue to give the staff and us give the staff the authority to help keep our government open instead of shutting down, which is this is no shutdown. And I've heard, and I'm sure my colleagues up here have heard some concerns about our audio. And obviously we're working on that, you know, we use some carriers that can money. We've got some new technology up here in front of us that we're learning about. But Buckingham is a leader when it comes to and this board has seen to that when it comes to transparency, working with the people being present, even if it's not physically but also virtually taking those public comments on voicemail. So I resent the comment, that we're shutting things down. We're shutting businesses down. We're helping businesses as best we can. And other parts of the government are to and I can't speak to that. But I can tell you what this board has done. We've helped keep things transparent. We are keeping our space as Mr. Robinson said, we're wearing masks. So you know, let's take a look at the facts. And I would make a motion that we approve this or I would second the motion that we approve this ordinance, Mr. Chairman.

**Bryant**: Motion made and a second that we approve this thing and go on until it's rescinded. Any other comments? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Miles seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the Emergency Ordinance to Allow for the Continuity of Government Operations during the Pandemic.

Re: Public Hearing: Case 20-SUP279 Charles A. Jackson, Owner/Fredrick Jackson, Applicant. Request for a private park/playground, at 785 Sleepy Hollow Road

Edmondston: Good evening, Mr. Chairman and members of the Board. Tonight we will have the public hearing for Case 20-SUP279. As you may remember from the introduction last month this is for Frederick Jackson. His father Charles A Jackson at 785 Sleepy Hollow Road is the landowner. Frederick lives at 113 River Core Apartment A in Charlottesville, Virginia. His request is to obtain a special use permit for a private park/playground. The property in question is Tax Map 54 Parcel 177A and contains approximately .6 of an acre and is currently zoned A-1. The zoning ordinance does not, of course, list private parks playgrounds as a permitted use however, within the A-1 zoning district, private parks and playgrounds may be permitted by way of a special use permit. The Planning Commission may recommend that the Board may impose conditions. We do have 13 conditions attached to this SUP for the public hearing. Mr. Frederick Jackson is actually with us tonight via zoom to answer any questions that you or the public may have. As far as commentary.

**Bryant:** Okay. Does anyone have any comments?

**Davis:** That's in my district? And everybody I've talked to is for it. I'm ready to approve it tonight. This is a good thing for the community.

**Lann:** We have one signed up. David ball District Three.

**David Ball, District 3:** Yes, David Ball, District 3. And I do think you ought to approve it. With a cut back on restrictions, because it's such a small park, serving in such a small, confined community to try and put all these hard restrictions on it make no sense. I will also point out looking here, I only see two of seven supervisors who actually are wearing masks. The other five in the back row never wear masks at this meeting. So it's an observed event.

Matthews: That's a lie. I've worn the mask before. There's a six foot distance between each one of these members.

Ball: Yes, but you require...

**Bryan**: You see I put on a mask when I moved close to Mr. Bryant. You take care of Mr. Ball and I'll take care of Mr. Bryan. Okay.

**Ball:** We're observing what we see. Oh, the other thing is, there's a lot of information that I will say with regards to the gold, because I wanted to hear what people said and having a background in that. And knowing what's been done have...

**Bryan:** This doesn't have anything to do with gold. You are making your comments on the playground.

Ball: Right.

**Bryan**: Stick to that please?

**Ball:** Okay, so you don't want to hear anything?

**Bryan:** I want to hear what your comments are about the current hearing that we're hearing on not about gold.

**Ball:** All right. And I've told you, I think that because it is such a small area. And putting hard restrictions on it wouldn't make sense. You need to make it open and accessible because it serves a small local community. Give them the availability to have more features there without having all these setback restrictions and everything that were originally proposed on them that would have limited it to virtually nothing. I mean, it's a small community, a small property. It can't really, and it's for playground for the community. It's not for building for homes and accessible. So there.

Bryant: Any other comments?

Lann: No, sir. It's all

Bryant: Any board members, have a comment on it? And we'll take a motion.

Bryan: Mr. Chairman, I do have one comment. Mrs. Edmondston, you said the person is via

zoom?

Edmondston: Yes.

Bryan: Okay. I noticed that it's going to be operating from dawn to dusk, so there will be no

lighting.

Edmondston: That's correct. That's the way the conditions have passed through the Planning

Commission.

**Bryan:** Okay. And they are okay with that?

Edmondston: Mr. Jackson had agreed to the conditions. Yes, sir. Thank you.

**Bryant:** Any other comments?

**Davis:** I make a motion that we approve it.

Bryant: Motion made, is there a second.

Matthews: Second.

Bryant: Motion made and a second that we approve this SUP. Any other comments? Call for

the vote.

<u>Supervisor Davis moved, Vice Chairman Matthews seconded and was unanimously carried by</u>
<u>the Board to approve 20-SUP279 for Charles Jackson/Fredrick Jackson for private</u>

park/playground on Sleepy Hollow Road.

Re: VDOT Road Matters

Carter: Mr. Chairman. VDOT is calling in.

Scott Fredrick: Good evening board. Can you guys hear me?

Carter/Bryant: Yes, sir. Yes, very good.

Fredrick: I turned my video on as well. I got a good update for you guys tonight. You guys have asked me several times over the past eight months, when the Six Year Plan Improvement Plan would resume. And we just got that good news late last week. The pause has been removed and we're resuming the program. So we're gonna pick up right where we left off. Remember, in spring, we did a work session, and we are ramping up to do a public hearing. And that was right when it got pause. So tonight, I need to request that at the December meeting to hold a public hearing. And I sent the programming to Administrator Carter so that we can use that with a resolution that will hopefully pass next month based off the work we did in the early spring. So that's great news. I'm excited. I think the unsafe roads program is a great program. As far as the update on the work that we've been doing. We've been battling wet weather seems like for the last six months, and we've had a lot of stopped up pipe. We currently have a couple more that we need to get throughout the county that we're aware of. We got one on Union Church Road. I got a few on other roads. Then there is a slope brought to my attention there on 60. And I was unaware of it. But my guys have actually been monitoring that area for a while and they said it hasn't really been getting worse. But it is on our list of things we want to fix. So probably over the next couple months, we're hoping to either place some concrete or maybe some asphalt material to help kind of change the slope right there across from Route 60 Convenience. But so we've had our eye on it. And there's not any kind of problem now that the structural that could affect the roads integrity at all. It is mostly ascetic. And it hasn't been getting worse as long as they've been watching it but they were aware of it and they've just been trying to get it scheduled. So thank you for bringing that to my attention. It taught me something new about the community. We're getting close to finishing our mowing for the year of secondary and primary. We're kind of wrapping that all up. If it wasn't going to rain the next two days. I think we would finish it this week, but I think we'll probably end up finishing it next week. Let's see here. But then machining our gravel road. And we've been, we had that amount caught up before tropical storms came in, we're trying to catch back up on that in preparation for that, you know, to get them ready for the winter. So we're almost there. And then thinking about winter, we did a dry run for our snow event for our snow operations. That's where we mount up our equipment and look for anything that has deteriorated, electrical connections. But all of our stuff is in good shape again, and ready for the winter. We've also been working to get our emergency snow contractors that we use to help us plow the road, making sure their equipment is ready and getting them signed back up. They were in very good shape going into winter. A couple other quick updates of stuff that come up over the last few months, Troublesome Creek Road, where it connects with 60, the radius, the radii, I'll call them on each side of that road and have a habit of getting kind of beat out by traffic to where they drop off. And we've put stone back in them up several times over the last few months. And it seems like we're just kind of chasing our tail right there. So just over the last few days, we've put a plan together, we're going to extend the pipe that goes under Troublesome Creek Road, eight feet on either side, and we're going to add fill material and improve the radii with asphalt. So hopefully after we do that, we'll never have to touch it. Again, the weather and everything cooperates with us, we'll be up there sometime within the next two weeks to do this. I think that's a good, good thing that we're about to try to accomplish there. Then the other last thing on the event on the agenda for me to afford on is a little bit of bad news, we had a pipe get washed out on Route 664. But me and the team here in the Farmville residency, we've done the preliminary engineering. We've sized the pipe. We're actually going to put multiple pipes back in. So we have to get an environmental permit for the

work we're going to do there. That's not really holding us up, though, because we had to order a bunch of different materials. And they're going to be being delivered to that site. So you'll start seeing that stuff show up out there. And we'll get that repair made. But it's going to be that roads gonna be closed for. I think the notice that we put in Virginia traffic goes into January. So you'll start seeing materials delivered and work probably starting sometime in early December. But I hate it when a road gets closed. So we are attacking it, trying to get it back open as fast as we can. So I guess that wraps up my report session. Do you guys have any matters that you want to bring to my attention?

Bryant: I don't have anybody got

**Bryan:** Scott, I have one. This brought Donnie Bryan, were you able to look at the runoff right there at 6939 Bell Road?

Fredrick: Yes, sir. I sent Gareth Taylor out there actually, I didn't look at it myself. But he was...it's kind of a shared driveway connection there. And he was saying to him, he didn't... I actually am flecked on my part of the deal that I made with him. But he wanted me to get clarification from you of what type of improvement he felt we needed to make because he said he didn't see any sight distance or drainage or drop off problems there in the state right away. But I think I was having trouble hearing you last month, or last time you brought it up. But I should have called you by now and I apologize. But could you tell me what specific issue you were wanting to address?

**Bryan:** Yeah, can you take a look at it, the water pours off of that area right there at the driveway, and it runs along the... if you're looking towards Dillwyn away from the Chuck Stop, the water runs down that hill and along the road and it's puddling which is creating, you know, a kind of bad puddle there when we get heavy rains because of the way grass and stuff has grown in the ditch area. You know, there's really no place for it to go.

**Fredrick**: Okay. Well, we'll take a closer look at it. I sent him out there and he actually took some video of it, sent it to me. I'm not saying anything, but he said if you could get clarification and he said I'm happy to come back down. So now that I've heard you more clearly and understand a little bit better, we'll take a second look at it.

Bryan: Okay, appreciate it.

**Fredrick:** Thank you, Mr. Bryan.

**Davis:** I got some Mr. Bryant. This is Supervisor Davis. Cartersville Road, when you are coming from Bryant's Store west, the road is deteriorating. It's approximately a quarter of a mile from Bryant's Store coming west back toward 15, the road is like the shoulder is trying to give away and you can see the road crumbling. A couple citizens bought it to my attention and I rode down and looked at it the other evening. If you could get somebody down to look at that it would be very much appreciated.

Fredrick: Okay, the quarter mile from Bryant's Store heading toward 15?

**Davis:** Yes. After you get past the curve opponent up the hill it looks like the road is just...the sides of it are coming loose.

Fredrick: Okay, what was the actual road name itself? I missed that part.

Davis: Cartersville Road.

**Fredrick:** Oh, Cartersville. Virtual world does not make it easy. I got a good note wrote down on that one. We'll take a look at that.

Davis: Thank you very much.

Miles: Mr. Chairman.

Bryant: Oh, thank you, Scott.

Fredrick: I'm always a phone call away.

Miles: Mr. Chairman, I've got a quick question for Scott. If you don't mind sir. We need to schedule a public hearing for December 14th for a public hearing with regard to the six year improvement plan. And I'll make a motion to that effect if no one has anything else.

**Bryant:** Miles made a motion to second to that motion to have a public hearing on December 14.

Allen: Second.

**Bryant:** We have a second. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Miles moved, Supervisor Allen seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to schedule a public hearing for December 14, 2020 to hear public comments on the Six Year Plan.

Re: Zoning Matters: Consider request of Planning Commission regarding a work session and direction regarding the Core Drilling Issue

**Edmondston:** Yes, sir. Mr. Chairman, members of the Board at our last Planning Commission meeting held on October 26, it was indicated by our Planning Commission members that they would like to provide an update to the status as to where they were with disseminating information in regard to commercial core sampling. The regular meeting was held October 26. And of course, there was a discussion period regarding those activities. The Planning Commission believes that expert opinion would be beneficial prior to any determination regarding prospecting activity. The Planning Commission made a motion at their meeting to ask

the Board of Supervisors to provide guidance and direction forward with respect to the subject matter. The Planning Commission by way of consensus has decided to ask a panel of experts to speak on this matter at the upcoming work session. At this time, if you find it agreeable. The planning commission is requesting your attendance at the Planning Commission work session on Monday, November 16, at 6pm.

**Allen:** Normally we have a 7:00 meeting on the Planning Commission. So why are we doing 6:00?

**Edmondston:** To make it a bit more agreeable. Some of the Board of Supervisors had asked in other forums to try to make this 6p.m.

**Allen:** I'm just saying it's normally at 7:00. You've got to call the rest of the Planning Commission to let them know.

**Edmondston:** Well usually Wednesday or Thursday prior to the work session or meeting, I always send a text message to them to notify them, so if everyone finds it agreeable. If not, do you want to change it to 7p.m.?

**Bryant:** I think the Planning Commission voted us to meet at 6:00 when meeting with the Board of Supervisors at the meeting before last.

Edmondston: There was some discussion to change it to 6:00.

Bryant: Meet at 6:00.

**Carter:** This meeting is probably going to take a while so we need to start early.

**Edmondston:** Yes, I would imagine that this fact finding session with the panel of experts would last quite a while.

Bryant: 6:00 then.

Edmondston: Yes, sir. If that's agreeable.

Miles: Yes.

Bryan: Yes.

Miles: I've got a question, Mr. Chairman for Mrs. Edmondston, if I may sir?

Bryant: Go ahead.

Miles: Could you talk about, please, if it's ok, this panel of experts and who you sought out or who the county has sought out, I should say, I should ask, and what sort of representation that

that I know the Planning Commission has tasked the staff to look for and sort of what you've got going?

Edmondston: Sure, so there have been various state agencies, I do have a list of those. And we do have responses back confirming multiple members from some others, they're still working to put together a representative that will most likely attend via zoom. In an effort to maintain virtual and social distancing. I have reached out to the DEQ, the health department, the Division of Mining and Mineral Energy, extension agents through Virginia Tech, geologists within Virginia Tech and the geosciences department, the Office of the Attorney General and Department of Forestry. As of right now we have five confirmed panel experts that will be on the panel, and I'm still awaiting three other offices.

Miles: Thank you.

Edmondston: Yes, sir.

Miles: And us agreeing to meet with the Planning Commission during your work session, obviously does not bond us to do anything. We are simply exploring some of the options that we have. Is that right?

Carter: Yeah, yeah, this would not be a regular meeting. There would just be a work session.

Miles: Therefore we couldn't vote. Is that right?

Edmondston: You can vote.

Carter: You need to take action to accept the invitation of the Planning Commission

Allen: Don't you think there is need to have the people who are actually doing the drilling to come and talk too? And we know what they are doing and what they've done? How they do it? So we'll have something to work...

**Bryant:** I would like to have as much information as possible.

Miles: I agree.

**Allen:** I understand that part, but I mean, asked him questions about what drillers have done so you know what to ask. You don't know what to ask if you don't, they're not here to tell you what they've done or what they're doing.

**Miles:** Right. And Mr. Chairman, Supervisor Allen, if they want to, if we go down the road of a ZTA, if they want to put in for an application I think that's when we would hear from them. That's my understanding of it.

**Allen:** Yeah, I understand what you're saying. I'm just saying I like to know, what's going on before we get there.

**Bryant:** I'm just trying to get information as to what' gold mining actually is because I don't know.

Allen: Well, I don't know if the people coming will be able to tell you.

Bryant: They've tell you what the impact is. EPA and all this kind of stuff coming.

Allen: The gold mine part, I don't know.

Miles: Yeah, we need to hear from the experts on this. Mr. Chairman, I would move that we meet with the Planning Commission during the work session on Monday, November 16. at 6:00.

Bryant: All right. Got a motion made. A second to that. Any more discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Miles moved, Supervisor Allen seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to meet with the Planning Commission for a work session on Monday, November 16, 2020 at 6:00 p.m.

Re: County Attorney E.M. Wright, Jr.: Information regarding the Core Drilling Process as it relates to the County Zoning Ordinance.

Wright: Mr. Chairman, and members of Board. What it says on the agenda item is probably more information in there than what I've really got for you. What we're talking about tonight is sort of a rehash of what I spoke with the Planning Commission about when they met. And I know that several of you were there and heard it so I hope this won't be too boring for you. What I want to do is talk a little bit about process. So in talking about process, please understand that this is not a statement that says I'm ir favor of this or in favor of that. It's not a further discussion of the interaction between the zoning ordinance and the comprehensive plan. This is simply a discussion of how you move forward if you want to do something or the implications if you don't do something. So that that's sort of the topic that I want to talk about. And we'll play a little bit off the notes that were in your Board package. And I know you have reviewed so I'm going to start sort of on the back of that. We've got a situation here in the county, that's been discovered relating particularly to I'm going to call it commercial prospecting. There may be other ways to describe it, we may end up if you do something describing it differently. But for the purposes of this discussion, we're gonna call it commercial prospecting. And that commercial prospecting is happening in A-1. The zoning office in consultation with me, we don't see where that operation is permitted and an A-1. But we understand there's a lot swirling around it. So they've been advised of that's the position of the county. So now, the topics been before you for about a little bit over a couple of months now. I know you want to know, what are your options as you go forward. So I see it that you really have three options. I'm talking about whether they're good bad or indifferent, but the options themselves are if you do nothing, in other words, you decide

we've heard everything we want to hear about it. And we just don't care to change what we got. The implication would be that the status quo would remain the same. And the interpretation that the county has right now is prospecting, commercial prospecting would not be allowed. But that's your first option, just do nothing. Let it ride and then boning on... would have to take additional action if the violation or perceived violation to make a determination in the proper way to bring an end to that. A second thing you could do, is you and it ultimately resides on you, though we'll talk about procedure a little bit later here. You can say, okay, we don't have any heartburn with it. We don't think we need to worry about it. We don't want to have any control over it. You can permit it as a use by right. In other words, to do that, you've got to make a zoning text amendment. You'd go down into the A-1 area, and where you have permitted things that you can do by right, you'd need to put language in there that would allow this operation to continue. And with the Planning Commission, we talked about a little variation, there was some concern was a way to make people register if they did that. And just register. I won't go into that tonight because that's sort of a different discussion. Well, that's a second thing you can do. The zoning text amendment to allow commercial prospecting, maybe different words to occur as a matter by right. In other words, they don't have to do anything come and go to work, do whatever they want to do. The third option would be to go into... it requires a zoning text amendment, would be to go into the A-1 district or any other district you wanted this to occur for any of these. You wanted to do by right use and he wanted to be allowed another district you could make that zoning text amendment and those districts too. And you would amend down where it says uses that are permitted with the use permit or special use permit, you would amend that to say it would be allowed with a permit and again, whether you call it a commercial prospecting, whatever, we come up with a some discussion going on and maybe geotechnical, boring or exploring or those types of things might be a way we want to go. So the general pattern would be do nothing. Make it a right, where people can do it without having to do anything. Have them apply for a special use permit. And to do that you'd make your text amendment in the zoning ordinance at that place. Now, what's the path forward? You know your options. Well, while all the amendments if you do a text amendment comes ultimately back to you. All zoning stuff, passes through the Planning Commission. They can adopt and say, hey, we want you to look at this and you can look at it referred back to them or you can say Planning Commission, take a look at this. And you can do that independent of each other. But ultimately it's gonna go back to the Planning Commission and then back up to you. The path you're choosing appears that you're choosing, you're gonna have a work session with them to sort of get a temperature of the water hear the information, get some ideas of a way you want to go. When you're holding those joint hearings, that's sort of saying, you to the Planning Commission, the Board saying to the Planning Commission, we want you to look at this thing. Now it can go back to the Planning Commission with specific directions. And they can say we've studied it. We don't think that's a good idea, here's our report. And then you get to decide really what you want to do with it. You can stay with the original plan, you can modify your plan, you can do nothing, and you come back to that type of arrangement. All those paths are gonna have to go through the Planning Commission, with ultimately the Board of Supervisors in control. It's gonna require a public hearing in the planning commission. It's gonna require public hearing by the board. That can be a joint public hearing. What I would ask that you be thinking about, is when you have this work session, that you've agreed to be a part of next Monday night, you begin to formulate what you really want the Planning Commission to look at. And whether you want to continue to have a joint public

hearing with them, once you decide what you want them to look at. The advantage of that you all hear the same thing at the same time. So Monday night, you're gonna gather information. You need to consider whether you want to continue to work jointly with the Planning Commission. And I don't mean this in a negative way, whether you want your own meetings, whether you want to have joint meetings with the Planning Commission, to get some direction of what you really want to put out for the public to come comment on. And once they come comment on it, you're not bound specifically to the language to use. There is some flexibility once you get the public comments, you can craft your language a little differently. But as I say the information on the agenda item is a lot broader than what I want to talk about tonight. Try to answer any questions that you have. But that's about what I have for this part, Mr. Chairman.

Bryant: Thank you, Mr. Wright. Really appreciate that.

Wright: Thank you.

Re: VACO Executive Director Dean Lynch: Recognition of Supervisor Joe N. Chambers, Jr. for his service of over 30 years on the Buckingham County Board of Supervisors

Carter: Yes, Mr. Chairman, that presentation will be in December. What that is about Supervisor Chambers has served on the Buckingham County Board of Supervisors for 30 years. So the Executive Director of Virginia Association of Counties will come to present him with a plaque of recognition.

Re: Dr. Daisy Hicks, Division Superintendent, Buckingham County Public School System: Consider request of School Board for budget adjustments due to changes in state and federal funding

**Dr. Hicks:** Good evening. Mr. Chairman, Board of Supervisors, I'll start off with thank you for providing the Wi Fi hotspot to our students. It has been a tremendous step with our teachers in providing synchronous virtual instruction during this time. They have been very appreciative. So I just want to first start off with thanking you all for that. We are requesting approval of the fiscal year 21 budget update. This is a routine budget update regarding our budget to include changes in federal grant from the original adoption back in May.

Carter: To make it clear, this is the budget that we are operating in right now.

**Chambers:** They want approval to transfer funds. Right?

**Miles**: Right. The request is, Mr. Chairman to approve the transfer of funds right? I'll second it, Mr. Chairman, if I can find a button.

**Carter:** And this is mainly to revise the present budget there and right now. Changes in federal and state money.

**Bryant:** What's the pleasure of the Board?

**Matthews:** We have a motion and a second to adjustments for the current fiscal year, right? So we need to take the vote.

Bryant: I guess we do.

Bryan: Looks like a lot of grants.

Carter: If you're looking at categories, you see that Instruction, the adjustment as an additional \$587,046. And your Administration, Attendance and Health is an increase of \$453,077, Transportation is an increase of \$40,884, Operations and Maintenance is an increase of \$179,001. And Technology is an increase of \$478,869. And again, that's state and federal money, not local money.

Bryant: We need to adopt that budget now.

Carter: Yes, sir. You need to approve the amendments.

**Bryant:** Okay. Motion made and seconded. Any other comments? Call for the vote then.

Supervisor Chambers moved, Supervisor Miles seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the requested changes to the FY21 budget for federal and state funds.

Re: Dr. Daisy Hicks, Superintendent: Discussion of savings due to the pandemic and request for contract employees 2% bonus with the exception of Board members and Superintendent

Carter: Dr. Hicks, if you want to, if you will address the second request for the FY 20 ending year balance money.

**Hicks:** Second request is we have \$579,000 in savings from the closure last year as outlined in the document you have in front of you. Of that \$579,000 we would like to propose to request \$279,000 of that money back to provide all contract employees with the exception of myself at one time 2% bonus.

Matthews: I've got a couple questions.

**Bryant:** Okay. Go right ahead, Mr. Matthews.

Matthews: Dr. Hicks. This is Don Matthews, District 3. I'm just curious. First thing is we haven't even reached the halfway point of this year, this school year and you want to give a bonus. Why? What reasoning is that for?

Hicks: This \$579,000 was from last year's money. Not this years. It is based on the fact that the employees did not get the 2% raise that we had projected for them to give us a budget. So we

just thought in honor of them and all of their hard work and effort that they've shown throughout this year and throughout the years. They would appreciate that onetime 2% bonus.

**Matthews**: I have one other question. Typically, when you give a bonus, is that money counting towards their Virginia retirement? Why would you not want to give them a raise, a 2% raise instead of a bonus because that way that money would count towards their Virginia Retirement?

Hicks: And that would cause a lot more than \$279,000.

Matthews: What are you basing the 2% on?

**Hicks:** Their salary they are currently making now.

**Carter:** I believe you are saying the bonus would be a onetime expenditure where a 2% raise would be recurring.

Hicks: Exactly, yes.

Matthews: Well, that leads to another question. You are half way through the year and you've got over ½ a million dollars which you have already saved from when the schools closed. What date does that run through? What period of time is this?

Hicks: This is was up June 30<sup>th</sup> of last year. This is not coming off of this year's budget.

**Matthews**: Okay, so you saved this much money in three months? Is that what you're telling me?

Hicks: Yes, sir.

Matthews: All right. So my question to you would be, if you go to December, how much more money are you going to save? And that way, you could give them a raise of 2% and it will still count towards their retirement instead of a onetime situation. And you could also freeze the raise for next year, if you give it to them this year. I just think you're wasting money by not putting it in their retirement system.

**Hicks**: Basically, I was just trying to save some money. But if that's something you all wanted to take a look at, I'll be more than happy to look into it. We wanted give them something with the bonus that we knew we had already saved from last year.

Matthews: I don't like to give someone a bonus when they haven't completed the year in task. So I mean, that's my question. So anybody else has anything else? I'll turn the floor over to them.

**Chambers:** I don't have no problem with it. But you know, she had to give a bonus for the employees. But I look at that 2%, I would like to see them...I look at the bus drivers and the cafeteria workers. If a person making \$50-60,000 they would get a right good bonus, and the

person under that, the little man, he's going to be kind of stuck in the hole? I would like to see them give a one amount bonus for everybody. Same amount of money all across the board. See what I'm saying?

Bryan: Include non-contracted employees.

Chambers: Right. What we did one time, we had done that 2% too, and the little people was really getting nothing compared with the high salaries. So we reconsidered on the personnel committee, and I was on the Personnel Committee to give everybody at one time bonus of the same thing right across the board. One figure. That's something I would like you take a look at. I think is a good thing to recognize your employee. When people do good job they deserve it. I agree about it. I think you should do and I appreciate you, applaud you for doing it. Well, ['m just looking at the small people that are not making as much others. That's all I'm saying. You understand what I'm saying? If you give up a one figure to everybody. What I'm saying is this, Dr. Hicks, if Jordan was making \$60,000 a year and I was making 15,000-\$20,000 a year, look what he will get versus what I will get at 2%. You see what I'm saying? If you give me and Jordan \$500, both of us get \$500. I think that's fair. That's all I'm saying.

Hicks: That's perfectly fine.

Chambers: Okay, thank you.

Bryan: Mr. Chairman. I'd like to see him add the non-contracted employees as well.

**Chambers:** That is what I'm talking about. Yeah, I'm talking about everybody. The school bus drivers and the cafeteria workers and all those. You know, the whole fleet I'm talking about.

Miles: Dr. Hicks, if I could ask a question, what percentage of the school staff are non-contracted versus contracted?

Hicks: About 34.

Miles: Percent?

**Hicks:** 34 people that are non-contracted.

**Chambers:** I'd like to see them included.

**Hicks:** There are 34 people that are non-contracted that work full time.

Carter: I wouldn't want to put you on the spot. But do you know right off the number of total employees, you have including bus drivers, everyone.

Hicks: It is over 300.

Miles: I'd add to what, Mr. Chairman, I'd add to what Supervisor Chambers said. I definitely think that the teachers have worked very hard along with the parents. And, you know, we can, I'm sure the school board is addressing that, hopefully in a very meaningful way. But there's no doubt that the teachers and the school bus drivers, and the cafeteria workers and the paraprofessionals, and all those folks have been working hard and deserve to be recognized. Dr. Hicks, could I ask you a question related to the schools in terms of what the... I know a lot of parents and a lot of folks that we've heard from or have questions about the reopening of the schools? Could you update us on that? Please?

Hicks: Do you want me to talk about that before you all vote on what we've been talking about?

**Chambers**: I'm saying I'm all in favor what you're doing? I think it's a great idea, but I'm just saying it, you know, to bring other people in on it too.

Matthews: I think I think the wise thing to do would be to come back with some figures to our board on, I mean, I don't want to fly by the seat of my pants here. I'd like to have some concrete information on what you're talking about dollar wise.

**Chambers:** What are you talking about Mr. Matthews, bringing it back to the next board meeting?

Matthews: Yes. I mean, yes.

Chambers: Can you do that Dr. Hicks?

Hicks: What am I bringing back? Am i dividing the \$279,000 into the number of employees?

Bryan: Yes.

**Hicks**: Is that what you want me to do?

Carter: I get a little over \$800.

Miles: Did non-contracted staff work during the pandemic, Dr. Hicks?

Chambers: They had to clean his schools.

Miles: Some did some didn't.

**Chambers:** I think you should bring everybody on board.

Allen: You want to wait for a numbers or just divide the \$279,000 between everybody.

**Chambers:** I think the \$279,000 for each, right Mrs. Carter?

Carter: We could divide it up to make sure it's the exact number but that's an average I think. 300 times 800 it comes to 240,000. So that's close.

Chambers: So that's about \$800 a piece roughly.

Miles: That's with non-contracted, right Mrs. Carter?

Chambers: Everybody.

Miles: Okay. Sure. I just didn't hear okay.

Bryant: We have a motion here. Motioned by Mr. Chambers, seconded by Mr. Miles.

Bryan: I have a question.

Bryant: Yes, sir.

**Bryan:** Dr. Hicks. I've searched and searched and I can't find it anywhere in the amended budget it doesn't look like they have proposed a teacher pay raise. In fact, it looks like they froze everything. Is that what you're getting out of the amended budget from the governor?

**Hicks**: That's exactly what I'm getting. Yes. They've frozen all of the raises and increases that we're looking at for teachers.

**Bryan:** And from the little bit that I could gather, it's frozen in 2022 as well, because he doesn't want to commit himself based on the economy right now.

**Hicks:** Yes, that's what it is as of right this minute now. No, they're talking with the legislators and I've met with them today and last week, and expressed my concern about teacher pay, pay up to the national level as well as I mentioned to them even with insurance you know, they treat us as Virginia State employees, new VRS but we did not get the benefits that the regular state employees get with health insurance. All of that information is being presented to them and see what happens when they meet again in January, February time.

**Bryan**: Good luck on that fight. I've been fighting that one for years. But good luck. Hopefully we can fight together for different ends. So is there a motion on the floor for that?

**Bryant:** Are we going to except this 2%.

**Bryan**: Mr. Chairman, that we take the money that is being proposed for the bonus and split it equally among the employees across the board to include non-contracted employees, as well. I'll second the motion.

Bryant: Any discussion on it?

Miles: Can I ask one question? I mean, I do have I... before I vote on this, I would like to know what the reopening plan is for our schools if there is one.

Bryan: Jordan, the school board's not going to meet again until... at the last meeting, they voted to stay closed until the first semester is over. So they will address the situation, hopefully at the end of the first semester. And that depends on what the COVID count is going to be. I do know that that like Cody presented, I saw today where the state average is ticked up to 6.2%. At one time, we were down to 4.7%. So, you know, it depends on how safe we are in the community. Whether or not you know we can safely reopen based on the COVID count.

Bryant: Does that answer your question, Mr. Miles?

Miles: Yes, in part it did.

**Bryant:** Motion to give the school employees divide the \$279,000 into the school employees down to the non-contract workers. That correct?

Bryan: Yes, sir.

Bryant: Question all that? Call for the vote.

<u>Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Chambers seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve for the schools to take the \$279,000 requested and divide it equally between all employees even the non-contracted employees.</u>

Hicks: We really appreciate that. Thank you.

Re: Consider appointments to the Board of Building Code Officials

**Bryant:** How many of them need to be appointed?

Carter: All of them are vacant.

Miles: Mr. Chairman, I did talk to Larry Haskins who lives in my district and he's willing to continue his service if that helps.

Matthews: Is that a motion.

Miles: Sure. Yes, sir. Mr. Chairman, so I would move that we reappoint Larry B Haskins, for the term that is noted for Board of the Building Code Appeals.

Bryant: I know Gordon Rush can't do it because he's dead.

Miles: I can't do it because I'm on the Board.

**Chambers:** Can we do that next month?

Carter: Yes, sir.

Bryan: Why don't we just wait and come back next month with 1, 2, and 3,4,5,6 names.

Carter: They do not have to reside in the district that you're appointing. If you have a difficult

time.

Miles: But take my name off at least.

**Carter:** We have to take your name off because you're on the board. So we need a replacement for that though.

Bryant: So we will come back with the name of our next meeting.

Re: Consider appointment/reappointment to the Industrial Development Authority for District 3

**Bryant:** Jeffery Steffers is on there now.

Matthews: So I think you'll do it again. I'd like to reappoint him. I'd like to make the motion to reappoint

**Bryant:** Is there a second?

Miles: I'll second it. Mr. Chairman.

**Bryant:** Motion made and a second to reappoint Jeffery Steffers to the Industrial Development Authority. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Vice Chairman Matthews moved, Supervisor Miles seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to reappoint Jeffery Steffers to the Industrial Development Authority for a term that will end December 31, 2024.

Re: Cody Davis, Emergency Services Director: Update regarding Rescue Squad transition to take place December 15, 2020.

C. Davis: Thank you. Okay. Good evening. Again, gentlemen, and I'll make this quick. Just in regards to the transition. We're still moving mountains, things are going well. Mrs. Carter is gonna key on something here in a minute. That's a pretty important item. And then Mr. Wright will have another important item within his update. But while I'm here, the first thing I'd like to talk to you guys about is the Glenmore station renovation project. I gave you guy's three

different items just now. The first would be a memo more or less from Mrs. Carter and Mr. Wright and myself, suggested allocation for utilizing the design build approach to contract with the firm for those renovations. And you can read the specifics about why we have come to the opinion that design build is the best approach. But and then to follow that it is pretty much the exact same thing except for we specifically state that the contractor would be the Jameson and Lewis company to complete the design build of that Glenmore station and more or less ends up being a turnkey project that they would turn out for us aside from the county has a statutory requirement to secure its own architectural design individual under direct contract for consulting reasons. And I think we're able to utilize the exact same individual that you utilize for the library project. So any questions we'll knock out those items.

Okay, and then the last thing to follow all of that up would be a resolution from you guys to authorize us to proceed with the design build and construction management contracts that Mr. Wright is working with.

Wright: All three items before you but there is an order of adoption that I would ask that you give to those. If you adopt the resolution as county policy to use design build. You've got to have that in place before you can move forward. After you adopt the resolution, then you need specifically for this project to find the justification appropriate to use design build and this particular project. And then finally, the other one would be the justification to move forward with Jameson-Lewis. So there is the property before you but there is a particular order that I'd ask you to consider in.

Carter: You gave them to them in an order I believe.

Allen: Motion to approve the resolution.

Matthews: Second.

**Bryant:** Motion made and a second that we approve the resolution. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Allen moved, Vice Chairman Matthews seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the resolution to make it county policy to use design build.

**Davis:** Thank you. And the last two items that I would update you guys on at this time would be all of the assets of the rescue squad are now assets of the county with a use agreement in place for them to continue doing business until December 15. And then lastly, we've secured a contract signed by both parties DRT and us for them to continue to provide staffing services for 18 and a half months that we all discussed and you all approved at the last board meeting. Any questions on any of that?

Carter: We've got to vote on the next two things.

Allen: I make a motion to accept the design bill.

Miles: I'll second it Mr. Chairman.

Bryant: Motion made and seconded to accept the design build. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Allen moved, Supervisor Miles seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to accept the design build from Jameson-Lewis for the Glenmore squad building.

Allen: Make a motion to move forward with the bids you have.

Matthews: Second.

**Bryant:** Motion made and second to move forward with the contract for the Glenmore squad building. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Allen moved, Vice Chairman Matthews seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to move forward with the contract for the Glenmore squad building.

Re: Cody Davis, Consider appropriation of Virginia Fire Programs grant of \$11,445.87

**Davis:** So the next item that I'm up for would be the request for you guys to appropriate some funding from Virginia Department of Fire Programs. They granted us a grant to complete some repairs to the training facility, the burn building. We've gotten the work completed. Things were turned in and submitted and they've awarded us the funds in the amount of \$11,445.87.

Allen: I make a motion that we accept.

**Bryant:** Okay. That's what it is cost us?

Davis: To complete those repairs. Yes, sir.

Carter: That's all grants. So.

Bryant: We got a motion made and seconded. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Allen moved, Supervisor Bryan seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to appropriate the \$11,445.87 grant received from the Virginia Department of Fire Programs for repairs to the burn building.

Re: Rebecca Carter, Rescue Squad Committee Transition: Consider Rescue Squad Committee to transition to the Emergency Services Committee and Consider the authorities of this committee

Bryan: Cody, don't go anywhere. What the update on the squads?

**Davis:** Yes, they are almost complete. I got a great production report a couple of days ago. They look like they're almost road ready. Now. Just a few final touches. It sounds like we're slated to travel down there to the factory, the week of December the 14<sup>th</sup> to do our final inspection. That'll be a busy week. It'll be our go live date and also when we get to see those for the first time. I'll be happy to share that report with any of you guys that would like to see it.

Bryan: Thank you.

Carter: The board meeting will be the eve of the transition. Final transition. Yes, the next item is sometime back the Board of Supervisors did appoint a Rescue Squad Committee to work with the volunteer rescue squad regarding finances and to try to help the squad get more volunteers. That committee is Vice Chairman Matthew, Supervisor Allen, the president and vice president of volunteer rescue squad, Cody Davis, Mr. Wright, Karl Carter and myself. Now, but now this service has become the Buckingham County Emergency Services Department, I do believe we need to transition this committee appropriately. So I would recommend that the committee title be changed to the Emergency Services Committee. This committee would oversee the Buckingham County Emergency Services as it relates to the operation of emergency medical services. And just to make it clear, this does not oversee the volunteer fire department. I state this because of course, we've had some inquiries that possibly that that would be taken place. And we want to clear that we appreciate our volunteer fire departments and, and that's not in in the cards right now. Presently, the fire department do have a quarterly meeting with Mr. Davis, Mr. Carter and the four fire chiefs and someone from dispatch. So I think that's a good way that they're communicating with each other. And I think the new Emergency Services Committee should consist of only county officials and staff. If you wish to leave the same board members on the committee, it will be all the rescue squad committees listed above, with the exception of representatives from the volunteer rescue squad. If this is to be a standing committee, the By-Laws will need to be revised to add this committee to the list of standing committees that the Board considers every year with the adoption of the By-Laws. By-Laws can be revised anytime a year at the discretion of the Board of Supervisors. Also, I would like for you to consider the authority of this committee. For example, the public utilities committee and solid waste committees have the authority to interview hire, suspend terminate employees so that their departments, they also have the authority set the salaries as long as the money is available in the budget. Any changes in total budget would have to be approved by the full board. So I asked at this time, if you do establish this committee. And if you establish this as a setting committee, also, do you want to extend the same authority to this committee? Or do you want this committee to have all actions, including recommendations of hiring and everything to come back to the pool Board of Supervisors?

**Chambers:** I think they should. That we should give it the authority to hire and fire.

Miles: It's like you said Mrs. Carter. It mimics the authority of the water I mean, the of the utilities committee. Right?

Carter: So the action said that I would ask that you consider the motions to accomplish these steps. If you desire to do this would be first you consider the establishment of Emergency Service Committee. In place of the squad committee. Consider revising your By-Laws. If you do do that, consider revising your By-Laws to add this committee as a standing committee, you will not have to have a public hearing. Three, consider confirmed appointments to the committee and four, consider authority of this committee.

Matthews: I make a motion.

**Carter:** I think it would be good to have a motion for each item so that we have a clear record of Motion.

**Chambers:** So one motion for each item she discussed.

**Carter:** You will have to make a motion to change the By-Laws and you have to take a motion for committee. You need to take action and motion for the authorities.

I guess the first item would be for you to consider the establishment of an Emergency Services Committee.

Bryant: Do we have a motion to establish the Emergency Services Committee.

Bryan: I second that Mr. Chairman.

**Bryant:** A motion and a second to establish the Emergency Services Committee. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

<u>Supervisor Chambers moved, Supervisor Bryan seconded and was unanimously carried by the</u>
Board to transition the Rescue Squad Committee to the Emergency Services Committee.

**Carter:** The second order would be considered revising the By-Laws to add this committee as a standing committee.

Miles: I move, Mr. Chairman.

**Bryant:** Motion made and second to consider to the By-Laws this committee as a standing committee. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Miles moved, Vice Chairman Matthews seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to add the Emergency Services Committee as a standing committee to the By-Laws.

**Carter:** The third item would be to consider appointments to the committee or confirm it as presented with the exception of the volunteer rescue squad members. I need a motion for considered for the performance to the committee.

D. Davis: I'll make a motion.

Miles: Second.

Bryant: Motion made by Mr. Davis and a second by Mr. Miles. Any discussion?

Miles: And we're gonna keep the same board members want it right. Mr. Chairman?

**Bryan:** We keep the same. Yeah until January.

Carter: This committee would be considered every January when you consider your By-Laws.

Bryant: Any other discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Davis moved, Supervisor Miles seconded to confirm the same members to this committee with the exception of the volunteer squad's president and vice president. These members are Vice Chairman Matthew, Supervisor Allen, Cody Davis, Mr. Wright, Karl Carter and Mrs. Carter. This motion passed with a 6-1 vote with Supervisor Allen abstaining.

Allen: I'm on the committee.

**Bryan:** One more. The motion should be that this committee should have the full authority as public utilities and solid waste for hiring, interviewing, suspending, terminating and adjusting the salaries. That's my motion.

**Bryant:** Motion made and a second by Mr. Davis. Is there any other discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Davis seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to give the Emergency Services Committee the authority for hiring, interviewing, suspending, terminating and adjusting the salaries.

Carter: I'd like to just take a moment to thank those on the squad committee. It's been a long time you've been working on this. And also working with Kerry Flippen, the president of the squad. We've had a lot of issues to overcome. And you've all worked hard and worked well together. And we appreciate what the volunteer rescue squad has tried to do with this.

Bryant: It has been challenging, I know.

Carter: It has been.

# Re: Lyn Hill, Solid Waste Manager: Consider closing of Waste Sites for Christmas

Carter: So notice that Mr. Hill is not here, but he is proposing...he has to find out if the landfill is closed both days.

Bryan: Did he find out for sure if it was going to be closed the 24<sup>th</sup>?

Carter: He was supposed to. Some of this stuff is just Christmas Day.

Bryan: We talked about it. You know, he sent emails out to me because I'm on solid waste. And what he said was he wasn't sure about the 24<sup>th</sup>. He knows that it's going to be closed Christmas Day. So we would close just the one site Christmas Day. Because right now it's an unrenovated site. That way no employees had to come out and unlock it, it would be closed. All others are our gated sites. People can get in them with the proper decal. If for some reason the landfill is closed the 24th as well, we have no choice but to close the sites, all sites because we wouldn't have a place to put the garbage. And currently we empty the sites daily. And if they're closed, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, there's no way to empty the sites. The stuff would be running everywhere.

Carter: I think what we ran into last year was we just didn't give notice to people and people would come with their trucks loaded with trash. So I would further say that we could send out the telephone message, the red alert message, to everyone to let them know the Dillwyn site will be closed but the other sites will be open.

Bryan: Unless the landfill is closed on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Miles: Could you maybe get it on the website to Mrs. Carter.

Carter: If it's if the landfill is closed Christmas Eve ...

**Bryan:** And Christmas Day, then we have to close the sites that day. We have to close from what Lynn told me we would have to close the sites both days. Yeah, for one day. Yeah, Christmas Day they would all have to be closed because we would empty them Christmas Eve and then the trucks are full and there is no place to put it.

Carter: So, all of them will be closed Christmas Eve.

**Bryan**: Possibly Christmas Day?

Carter: Yeah, I think he said the 25th but he didn't let me know for sure.

**Bryan:** I'll shoot him an email as well tomorrow. And have him nail it down and ask him the scenario of what's the latest we can empty them? Can we empty the trucks the 23rd?

**Bryant:** Late 23rd.

**Bryan:** Yeah, late 23rd. And then we would empty the site the 24th. And we would only have to close for possibly one day.

Carter: Christmas Day. All right.

**Bryan:** I won't know anything until I talk with Lyn.

Carter: And it's what we thought that day is the only day we'll be close. So they can do early morning pickups on Christmas Eve. Take it to the landfill, then be home with their family on Christmas Eve night and home with their families on Christmas Day.

Re: Consider application through the Commonwealth Regional Council for Fast Track Broadband funding to partner with MBC

Carter: This certainly was a fast track funding thing and something that we were notified on to do on a fast track. So it's...we will turn this into the CRC and get what we can get out of it. We don't know yet. But this is also some more money that's available because of the pandemic. So we want to apply with the CRC and see what comes up with the region.

Miles: Mr. Chairman, I move we approve the application as presented. Looks like it's going to improve access to about 600 homes and 69 businesses, which I think is excellent. If that goes through.

Carter: I think this is to try to assist with that. But as we're finding out with the CARES money, because we've had this question a lot, and some of the COVID grant money, there's just not timing when you get you get a notice in October that you could get some money for broadband, but it's got to be built out by the end of December. It just isn't...I've made a request, many of us have made a request for an extension. You could possibly have a contract and not pay out till after that date. But that contract has to be the delay has to be at no fault of the local government. And you really couldn't have a design by that time. So this will be whatever they can do for us to help us. I don't think it's gonna even be a lot of money, but whatever they can do they help us.

Miles: And it's 10%, Right, Becky?

Carter: Yeah, yeah. That we would get 10% of the total. It'll be through the other six counties, maybe seven now with Cumberland.

**Miles**: And I think the CRC has worked really hard on getting all this information to county staff. They ought to be commended.

**Bryant:** Motion and second to consider the Commonwealth Regional Council Fast Track Broadband. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Miles moved, Supervisor Allen seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to approve the application through the CRC for Fast Track Broadband funding to partner with MBC.

Re: Other Board Matters

Miles: Mr. Chairman. Regarding Anti-Litter, I distributed a copy of our most recent report from the meeting we had on everyone's desk and y'all can get with me if you have any questions or Lynn Hill who was there, but we do have someone who's interested. Liz Jones lives in District 1, and I've talked to Supervisor Davis, and he's, familiar with her. And I would offer a motion that we appoint Mrs. Jones to the Anti-Litter Task Force representing District 1.

Matthews: Second.

Bryant: Motion made and seconded. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Miles moved, Vice Chairman Matthews seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to appoint Liz Jones to the Anti-Litter Task Force.

Bryant: Any other Board matters?

Re: County Attorney Matters

Wright: Mr. Chairman, Members of the Board. I have two matters that I'd like your direction on the first amount of deals with a request made from the McGuire Woods. As you may or may not know, McGuire Woods is served in bond counsel for the county for a number of years, and we've had a good working relationship with them. I had a request from one of the managing partners of the firm if they had been approached by Buckingham Land and Timber Company, asking them to represent them in regard to advising them concerning the onsite drilling by the company and on the land that it owns here in Buckingham County. They would be prohibited from doing that, unless you consent to allowing them to do that. It's not uncommon with a firm the size of McGuire Woods, that there are so many various departments, the bond department is probably the most isolated one of all, to have other people doing that, but they can't do it without your permission. They are not seeking a general wave of what they're asking for is a limited consent, that if at any time in the future, really, they should become totally adversarial and we go to court. And they would not be adversarial. They would not represent a party in an adversarial relationship and a court action against the county. What they want to do is appear administratively before hearings and otherwise and represent the Buckingham Land and Timber Company, But they can't do that without your consent. It's not uncustomary. But I don't have the authority. You are the client and you're the one that has to give them permission after they have disclosed you that information.

Bryant: You heard what he said. Anyone make a motion to that effect?

Carter: I don't see a problem.

Wright: The motion would be and I heard Mrs. Carter saying she doesn't see a problem and I don't see a problem with it either. I mean, they are advocates for their client. They said we are not limited if it comes down to ever go into court, they are not going to represent somebody in court against the county. So if you agree with that, then I would ask that you make a motion to give McGuire Woods a call it a limited consent to represent Buckingham Land and Timber Company in regard to zoning requirements are related to on site drilling by that company.

Bryan: That's my motion as presented.

Miles: Second

Bryant: Motion and second, any discussion? Call for the vote.

Wright: Second item is Mr. Davis reported to you on what's happening with the Buckingham County rescue squad. I have two items in regard to that. One of which you authorized the purchase of a remainder interest. We have not been able to make that happen yet through no fault of anybody but the Prince Edward County Clerk's Office had to limit the number of people that could come into the clerk's office because of this pandemic. There are certain records in that clerk's office that I need to get and put on record and this clerk's office to complete the chain of title. I'm monitoring when I can get in there. So that will happen. But that does not hold up anything in regard to the transition of the services in providing the services by the county so I'll offer that to you as just as an update and why that hadn't been completed. The other item a little bit more delicate. We are engaged in discussion with the company who will do the billing to insurance companies and Medicare on behalf of the County. We are in the process of talking about a contract. We have gotten down to where there are issues to that. I need your direction so accordingly and I know the hour is late. And you've heard a lot of information. And I promise you a short discussion to go into Executive Session under 2.2-3711.A.29 when the time comes, so we can talk about that model. It deals with negotiation of the contract and the expenditure of public funds. So when the appropriate time comes, if you could do that, I'd appreciate it if you choose not to do it, it really does bog things down and we might not be able to resolve some issues. So I appreciate it.

## Re: County Administrator's Report

Carter: Yes, sir. The first item is a very nice thank you from the school board for the student hotspots. And then also thank you from Theresa's place for the CARES business grant. And they've expressed to you the appreciation situation they were in prior to getting that grant, kept them to been able to keep going.

Miles: Absolutely, yeah, very gracious for what board has done for them.

**Edmondston:** Comment from three other businesses. Cheryl White, Sherry Midkiff and Bruce Dunnavant expressed their sincere gratitude and appreciation to the Board of Supervisors as well for making that happen.

Carter: The next item is cigarette tax workshop information update. Karl and I have started working on because we don't know how to do a cigarette tax increase. And a budget time we wanted to look at any aspect we could to bring in more revenue instead of real estate tax and personal property tax. We started with this workgroup to Virginia Association Counties. So we're gathering information and trying to learn more about this so that we'll know by budget time. It does seem to be more complicated than we would ever think. So Virginia Association of Counties is really helping to educate us. The next item, I wanted to give you an update on the Gold Hill School. I don't have it on the agenda. We will close that out November the 17th. So as of November 17, the county will no longer own that building. And Mr. Christian is very eager to start the renovations to the building to get this business going. So we think that's a great thing. Last thing is the Personnel Committee recommendation report that we provided you. And as always, if you agree with it, you do not have to take action. If you don't agree, I would ask you to go into closed session to discuss.

#### Re: Executive Closed Session

**Chambers:** Before we go into closed session, I want to thank my friends from St. Thomas. They want to learn more about the county government. So they want to come over tonight. We're glad they came and I hope you got a better understanding how the county government operates. I hope you'll come back again. Thank you.

Bryan: Mr. Chairman. I make a motion that we go into executive closed session under Section 2.2-3711.A.29 Discussion of the award of a public contract involving the expenditure of public funds, including interviews of bidders or offers and discussion of the terms or scope of such contract. Where discussion in an open session would adversely affect the bargaining position or negotiating strategy of the public body.

Miles: Second, Mr. Chairman,

Bryant: Motion and a second that we go into Executive Session.

**Bryan:** I would also like to add in there, section 2.2-3711.A.1 Discussions, consideration or interviews of prospective candidates for employment assignment, appointment promotion, performance, demotion, salaries, disciplining or resignation of specific public officers, appointees or employees of any public body and evaluation of performance of departments.

Bryant: You heard the motion. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Miles seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to enter into Executive Closed Session under the above stated Codes.

## Re: Return to Regular Session

**Bryan:** Mr. Chairman, I move that we return to open session and certification that to the best of each board members knowledge, only business matters related to the codes of which the executive meeting was convened was discussed or considered in the closed executive session.

Miles: Second, Mr. Chairman.

Bryant: Motion and second to return to regular session. Any discussion? Call for the vote.

Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Miles seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to return to regular session and certification of business discussed.

## Re: Call to Order

Chairman Bryant reconvened the recessed meeting of November 10, 2020.

Chairman Bowe called the Planning Commission to order.

## Re: Establishment of a Quorum

Chairman Bryant certified there was a quorum. Seven of seven members were present. Vice Chairman Matthews was joining virtually.

Chairman Bowe certified there was a quorum. Six of eight members were present.

## Re: Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance

The invocation was given by Commissioner Dorrier and the Pledge of Allegiance was said by all who were in attendance.

Re: Discussion and Fact Finding Session with agency experts panel to include DEQ, DMME, Virginia Tech, and VDH in regard to mineral exploration activity/frilling/mining

**Bowe:** We're gathered here tonight to have a discussion, a fact finding session. We have to the experts here in person. The others will be joining us virtually. Numbers got up again. So I guess it might as well be me. I think I would like to have David Spears answer a list of questions for me if you would. Microphones right there, sir.

**Edmondston:** Mr. Bowe, Chairman Bowe. If I may interject for just a moment. At this time, first of all, I would like to thank the Board of Supervisors for finding it agreeable to meet with the Planning Commission tonight for this work session. And if it's okay with you, Chairman Bo and Planning Commission members, I would just like to briefly introduce the expert panel that we have with us tonight, both in person and virtual. And I'd also like the opportunity for each of them to describe their position currently held and their background. Do you find that Okay?

Bowe: Yeah. Okay.

Edmondston: And Mr. Spears, if you would just take just a moment I'm going to go through the list. But you can speak first since you are up there. I won't make you sit down and come back. How about that?

Spears: All right.

Edmondston: Tonight, we are delighted and very grateful to have joining us a wonderful team of multiple agencies that have more than enough background and education and experience to help shed lots of light on this fact finding session tonight. Joining us from the Department of Mining and Mineral Energy is David Spears. He's a state geologist and he works in the Charlottesville Office of this state office. Along with him in the DMME office is Michael Skiffington, along with Damien Fehrer. Joining us from DEQ is James Golden. He is the Director of Regional Operations and the Piedmont Regional Director. Joining us from Virginia Tech in the Office of Geosciences is John Chermack and we also have Erin Ling, who is the Virginia Household Water Quality Program Administrator and Extension Associate and Program Coordinator in the Biological Systems Engineering Department. Joining us from the Virginia Department of Health is Paul Louis, an Environmental Health Specialist here at the Health Department in Buckingham. So we'll start with Mr. Spears since he has the lucky spot at the microphone right now. Mr. Spears, thank you very much.

Spears: My name is David Spears. I work for the Department of Mining and Mineral Energy. My title is the State Geologist to Virginia. I am a Certified Professional Geologis: in Virginia, certification number 1520. And I've held that since about 2002. I have a master's degree in geology from Virginia Tech. I got my Hokie pen right here. I also happen to be a 30 year resident of Buckingham County. I live on Bell Road over by Cedar Baptist Church. I'm in Mr. Allen's district. I've been a geologist, a paid working geologists for about 40 years. I started out in the petroleum industry so I have a lot of experience with drilling big wells. I have a little bit of experience with drilling small wells. But in my role at DMME, I've worked on coal. I've worked on natural gas, I've worked on gold, and other metals. But in my role as state geologist, I've done a lot of work on public policy, and I work quite a bit with local government. Thank you.

**Bowe:** For the clarity of the Board of Supervisors and the Planning Commission. Would you explain the difference between exploratory drilling and mining?

Edmondston: Well, let's finish with the rest of the panel first, Mr. Bowe. They're waiting to...

Bowe: Oh, okay.

**Edmondston**: And then we'll start with the Round Table of questions from both the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors tonight, okay. That way it gives everyone a chance to tell about themselves. So while we're in this state office of DMME, Mr. Skiffington, are you available to introduce yourself and to tell us about who you are and what you do for this particular office?

Skiffington: Yes, good evening. Can you hear me?

Edmondston: Yes, sir.

**Skiffington:** Thank you very much. My name is Michael Skiffington. I am the Director of Policy and Planning for the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy. And I've had that job for about 11 years now. My main function is I'm the primary agency liaison to the General Assembly, and I'm also the agency's regulatory coordinator for its regulated divisions. I'm happy to be here tonight.

**Edmondston:** Thank you so very much for joining us. And in the same office is Damien Fehrer, Mine Inspector. Damian, are you available?

**Fehrer:** I am. My name is Damian Fehrer. I'm a Mine Inspector with the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy. Division of Mineral Mining. I've been working for the division in this capacity for 22 years. I've been working in the mining industry for over 35 years. I'm a professional engineer. And I've inspected the mining operations up in Buckingham County for a number of years. So I'm familiar with that area.

**Edmondston**: Wonderful. Thank you for joining us tonight. And Mr. Golden, James Golden with DEQ. Are you available? Have you joined us?

Golden: Yeah. I'm the Director of Piedmont Regional Office. Our service area is 33 counties. And I'm happy to say one of which is Buckingham. I've been with the DEQ for 30 years, and have held numerous technical and managerial level positions, while with the DEQ.

**Edmondston:** Thank you so much for joining us this evening. John Chermak with Virginia Tech?

Chermak: Hello, my name is John Chermak. I'm a professor at Virginia Tech, in the Department of Geosciences. I'm happy to be here to try to help kind of think about this a little bit. I've worked around the mining industry my entire career. I've worked for industry, I've worked for consulting, I've worked for NGOs, I've worked for lots of different organizations. I spent a lot of time thinking about the pros and cons of mining, the good and the bad and the

social and political and environmental impacts and my specialty or areas of interest, where I've published on a new resource extraction or water quality and water quantity. Thank you.

Edmondston: Thank you, Erin Ling with Virginia Tech.

Ling: Good evening, everyone. My name is Erin Ling. I'm an Extension Associate in the Biological Systems Engineering Department at Virginia Tech. And I coordinate a statewide program that offers well testing and education for homeowners in about 65 counties every year. We analyze for a variety of bacteriological metals and elements and then basically explain what the results mean and possible remediation, including well maintenance, and water treatment to homeowners that rely on private wells in Virginia. Thanks for having me.

Edmondston: Thank you. And Paul Louis, with the Health Department.

Louis: My name is Paul Louis, I work with the health department and I've been digging holes and looking at soil for about 30 years. My specialty is wastewater disposal. And I just have an idea of where to put wells for drinking water. That's my expertise.

Edmondston: Thank you and I believe Chairman Bowe, you were ready for some questions.

Bickford: Mr. Spears, if you would step up.

Spears: Okay, I'm ready. Okay.

Bowe: For clarity sake, let's start with the difference between core sampling and mining.

Spears: Okay, I'd say there's a technical distinction as well as legal distinction. So technically, core sampling involves the taking of rock samples with a drill bit, and typically involves a steel bit and a small drill rig. Usually the steel bit has industrial diamonds embedded in it. And that drill bit is spun by the drill rig and pushed down into the ground using water to cool the bit. And they drill down and then they pull the whole drill string back out and collect a core sample. So they end up with a solid cylinder of rock. And I could have brought one I have some sitting at home, but it's a cylinder of rock, and then those cylinders are sent off and analyzed at a laboratory. So it's not really a commercial activity, because the cylinders, the rock samples aren't sold. I'd say it's more of an applied science. So it's done by companies who are looking for minerals. And so they collect those samples, and then they analyze them for the minerals that they're targeting and then there's a big legal difference. Mining involves actually putting some kind of hole in the ground and extracting material and selling it. That can be either through an underground mining operation or an open pit mining operation. Some mining is done simply by the drilling of wells, and they call it solution mining. That's are different kinds of mining. But the really big difference is that mining is a highly, highly regulated activity. In Virginia and nationwide. Every state has laws and regulations that that govern mining. Exploration by core drilling is not regulated activity. It's specifically excluded from the definition of mining in the Code of Virginia. And so it's not regulated, because it's widely understood to be a harmless

activity. It's about collecting rock samples. They drill a hole. They collect the sample and they plug the hole with cement, and then they go away. That's it. Collecting rock samples. Mining is a much different thing, once someone wants to actually make a mine and sell material from the ground. It requires an extensive permitting process from DMME. And one of the things the DMME requires before they will issue a permit is a proof of a special use permit from the locality. So the process of mining triggers a whole set of regulatory requirements and inspections and review that exploration by core drilling does not require.

Bowe: So do I understand you to say that core drilling is not regulated in the State of Virginia?

**Spears:** It's not regulated in the State of Virginia. Exploration for minerals other than uranium. If you're drilling for uranium, that does require a permit. But drilling for other minerals requires no sort of permit and no sort of state review.

**Bowe:** Does drilling automatically lead to mining?

**Spears:** No. Drilling is part of an exploration activity that either they find something that's valuable and commercially viable, or they don't. It's exploration. It does not necessarily lead to mining, perhaps maybe one of the other panelists can... Dr. Chermak at Virginia Tech, he might be able to shed some light on that. But someone who's worked in the industry could give you an indication of what percentage of exploration projects actually result in mining. Now, I know of at least two other prospects in Buckingham County that have been drilled in the last 40 years and never turned into a mine. One is in Mr. Allen's district between his house and my house. It's called the Tower Hill prospect. It's been drilled several times in the past 20 years. And it's still just a hill just sitting there.

Miles: Mr. Chairman, could I pose a question? Mr. Spears, it's my understanding that the location in question up at Warminster Church Road has been drilled about 22, 20 to 23 to 30 times. How many times for those sites drill?

**Spears:** In the other places? I don't know. That's not public information, because it's not a regulated activity. But typically a prospect will be drilled multiple times. A core sampling program typically involves a number of cores 10-20 at the very least. Dr. Chermak could probably give a better answer than I could about that.

**Bowe:** Dr. Chermak? Can you give us an estimate of how many holes you got to drill before you possibly end up with a mine? In other words, how many holes are dug fruitlessly?

Chermak: That's a good question. It depends a lot on the geology. If we're talking about a gold deposit, I know a little bit about the area there, but not a lot about the deposit itself. So it just depends on how much we do or don't know. But you know, from, you know, like Dave said, from a mine for an exploration are two very different kind of intensities of drilling, so to speak. But, yeah, so. So the answer, unfortunately, I can tell you is it takes a number of putting on deposits. So it's very site specific as to what happens. What I will tell you the first question Dave

was talking about was the chance of an exploration becoming a mine in the gold industry, the number is usually less than 5%. From the time that they're finding, you know, going out and trying to get the information to actually turn it into a mine. an active mine that actually is kind of, you know, kind of moves forward, either underground surface or in situ, any of the three is usually around the numbers about 5% in the gold industry.

Bowe: Okay, thank you, sir.

Miles: Can I follow up with Dr. Chermak, Mr. Chairman? In terms of core sampling could you talk about, Dr. Chermak, could you talk about variations? Maybe, of core sampling? And how different depths could if they do, or could lead to any environmental impacts, especially with regards to water in the ground?

Chermak: Yeah, I mean, when you're talking about core sampling, you know, again, you're talking about a small hole, like you said, that you put into the ground is very dependent on, you know, what our aquifer systems are around, so to speak, and kind of where you are, but by large, when you talk about exploration, and as Dave said, core drilling is, you know, again, from impact to other wells and other water sources, by large. I, you know, again, this would take a lot more, you know, sitting down with the science and the specifics of some things, but, I mean, by large, as Virginia has said, as many other places do, you know, exploration is just part of the process. And from a water impact perspective, by large, and especially in hard rock materials. So you're talking about hard rock versus soft rock fracture flow. I mean, there's lots of different mechanisms and lots of different things. So, again, it's not kind of A-1 size fits all. Geology and hydrogeology are both very variable depending on where you are. So again, but from a, from an environmental impact perspective, when you're thinking about kind of the water and how much water you're using, and how big a core hole, how many, you know, all of those things are things you kind of take into account to think about.

Miles: Can I follow up, Mr. Chairman? Briefly. Sir, could you comment on maybe, you know, with the 20, some odd holes, say 25 holes, just for guesstimate sake, in terms of the there is some usage of water that is being employed to execute these core sampling, these core samplings for commercial use? Can you maybe comment on based on that number? On that estimate, on how much water might have been used to drill the holes that are in that location in which we're discussing tonight? I've been told maybe 2000 to 3000 gallons per hole? Whether that's correct. I don't know. So that's why I'm asking that question for clarification, sir.

Chermak: Yeah, I mean, again, it depends on if its A-2 inch hole or a six inch hole, and it depends on how easy or hard it is to drill. So the answer is I don't know. I mean, that information that type of number you're talking about seems reasonable, but it's a wide range. And again, from a water intensity maybe somebody else on this call knows more about the specifics of some of the core drills around this area. Again, I haven't worked in this area specifically, I couldn't tell you. You know, you can get more information, you know, down the road from you. Maybe not maybe a little bit of different deposit, you know, but there's lots of exploration and mining old around and maybe somebody else on the call to talk a little bit more about, you know, the actual

numbers there. But, but again, you know, they're usually it's not a super water intensive process, but you know, it does keep the moderation.

Allen: When you said a while ago, somebody said it was using the water just for cooling process and not for actually doing the drilling.

**Spears:** The water actually cools the bit. The water is pumped down the drill stem and cools the bit and brings the rock chips back up. So it is it is used during the drilling process. But I was going to suggest that we ask Mr. Golden from the DEQ about the regulation of groundwater withdrawals. And if, if any of this activity, would we require a water well, groundwater withdrawal permit?

**Golden:** Yes. So the regulations DEQ administers relative to groundwater withdrawal only applies to the eastern part of Virginia in what's defined is the groundwater management area. It's generally areas east of Interstate 95, on the east part of the state. So we would not regulate groundwater withdrawal in Buckingham County.

Miles: And is that a general assembly type Code of Virginia type thing? Because why wouldn't we be involved in that territory? Or, you know, the county close to?

Golden: There are state regulations that define the groundwater management area that is regulated by DEQ. And it's just defined and focuses on those aquifers located generally east of Interstate 95.

**Bowe:** I think maybe what we're getting at here is core drilling likely to have an effect on private wells within the area, quarter mile, half mile, mile away.

**Spears:** I would say the drilling itself, they're pumping water into the ground, clean water into the ground. So if anything, they're putting water back in the ground. Now the question of where that water came from is a separate question. What we have in Buckingham, is what they call an unconfined fractured rock aquifer. So the water in your well comes from whatever fractures that you are well penetrated. It's very difficult hydrogeology to understand, and the only way to answer that question is to actually do a pump test where you pump water out of one well, while monitoring other wells nearby. I'd say a mile away in a fractured rock aquifer, you'd have to pull many, many thousands of gallons out of the ground to affect a well that's mile away. But to really answer the question, you would need to do a pump test.

**Bickford**: Mr. Spears, can I ask you a question, well a couple? You sort of clarified but I just want to make sure for the record. In the core sampling, there is no chemicals used. Its auger is cooled with water correct?

**Spears:** I haven't actually been on this particular company's drill rig. So I don't know but the typical industry practice is to use plain water.

**Bickford:** Plain water. Okay. To Mr. Jordan's question, I think it's been 27 holes on the subject property of Warminster Church. Its 85 acres. Is a normal procedure when they're drilling, they're not all going to be concentrated in one area for the most part, not when they're exploratory. They're going to be spread out while they get these samples?

**Spears:** Well, there is actually a map available of where the core samples were drilled, and I don't know what the spacing is on them. But the company, it's expensive to drill cores so they don't drill more than they need to. So I don't know what the spacing is. But there is a publicly available map from Aston Bay that shows the spacing of the wells.

Bickford: Okay, Thank you sir.

Bowe: Do the exploratory holes have any long term effects on the environment?

**Spears:** If they're plugged properly, they should not. The hole is open for a period of hours to days. And then they... the typical industry practices to plug it with cement, so becomes solid rock again, essentially when they're done with it. So I'd say in that case, there'd be very, very little opportunity for contamination.

Allen: I just want to ask it again, while we're here, because so many people brought it up before. They were worried about it. We had one person who said that they believe that the well was going dry because of the drilling close by. And some others said that they thought that the well was getting contaminated. So would you just hit it one more time? Say, what do you think about running the well dry?

Spears: I haven't seen any of the evidence, I would love to see what evidence they have. As a scientist, I cannot imagine that a process that puts water into the ground is going to cause a well to go dry. It just, it just doesn't make any sense. There's no sensible scientific explanation for that. In terms of contaminating wells, I would have to ask to have those wells been tested. If there is actually evidence of contamination, then we would apply best scientific thinking to try to trace the source of that contamination. But again, they're drilling with a steel bit with diamonds in it. They're putting plain water down the hole. It's just hard to imagine any kind of contamination that could happen. I'm not saying it could never happen mine. But you'd really need some evidence. We'd need to see what is showing up in the wells, and then try to find a source of what that material is.

Allen: Yeah, it would be nice if we could have a little area there to do a test of the well water. But do you know how deep or what size the holes are? I'm just trying to get an idea. I know you're not a well driller.

**Spears:** Aston Bay has pretty much published that material. It's widely available. I don't have it. I don't have it readily available. But typically, they would drill hundreds of feet. I mean, if they wanted to delineate a mineral deposit, they're going to be drilling hundreds to probably 1000 feet, right.

Allen: I've heard 300 feet. And I've heard two inch holes and three inch holes. I just didn't...

**Spears:** They may have done both. They might have done both.

Allen: You pretty much answered most all of my questions.

**Bryan**: I have a question. So if this is not regulated by the state, then who is checking to make sure that they're properly sealed?

**Spears:** No one does that. It's the industry. These companies want to be... they don't want to leave a bad...they don't want to leave a mess behind. It suits them to not leave a mess behind. So standard practice is to fill the hole with cement and then make sure it's sealed before they leave.

**Bryan:** So we're talking about concrete, you'd have to have a concrete truck.

**Spears:** They call it grout, G-R-O-U-T, and it's more of a cement than concrete so it doesn't carry the pebbles in the sand that the concrete would have in it. It's more of a pure cement, a pure calcium carbonate cement.

Bryan: Thank you.

**Edmondston:** Mr. Bryan, you posed the question about the holes that were there. So myself along with Lynn Hill, who's our zoning enforcement officer, we visited the site and saw multiple of these holes. There was one that was open and the rest of it was not sealed, I would say appropriately with grout because it was a like a sack crete that you're supposed to mix with sand. We actually found a bag of it on the property and you could actually flake it away with your hand and remove it from the hole. And the holes were very close in proximity, probably 10 to 50 feet from one another and we counted 16.

Allen: My understanding is they are supposed to fill it up with grout, what they call plowing distance, and then...

**Edmondston:** There's no plowing distance around it at all.

**Allen:** And then the plow and distance would be 8, 12, to 16 inches. They'd have put some that's lighter, that would not get hard.

Edmondston: It's grass broom straw around

**Bryant:** I visited the site and the core was just a 2" core. We visited the site, Mr. Miles and myself, it was all filled up with concrete.

Miles: Mr. Chairman, if I may. I'm going to kind of direct this at whoever wants to answer it. What does the data show in terms of what y'all have seen and in terms of the experience, that with the depth, depths that we're talking with regards to the project that's been going on for four years, unbeknownst to the county, what's the likelihood with the number of holes and the depth that an aquifer could have been disturbed? And the hydrological environment in which we live, if that makes sense?

**Bowe:** Anybody with the State want to answer that one?

Edmondston: Erin, would you be available to answer any questions in regards to Mr. Miles his questions about water and please note that we did reach out to a halt hydrologist with USGS and they turned us down because there is no federal information, no study information posted or available on the County of Buckingham, so they were unwilling to participate tonight. Also with the Virginia Water Well Association, Christina Eckoff, they were unable to provide anyone. And I know that I reached out to a Jeff Wells with I believe he's with DEQ or the health department with no response. Paul Louis is with us tonight as an environmental specialist to maybe speak to some of the water issues if you would be available to do so Paul, is this year will house or would you feel comfortable with this or maybe the DEQ maybe, Mr. Golden, if you'd like to jump on it?

Miles: And the reason I ask this, Mr. Chairman is for this is probably one of the biggest concerns in the general community with regards to the core sampling. And the water.

**Ling:** I'll ask a clarifying question. This is Erin Ling. Are you asking about the depth of the cores that were drilled or the depth of private wells in the area? Like drinking water well?

Miles: Sure. Yes, ma'am. It's sort of all-inclusive in terms of the depth, say, between five and 800 feet down, a core sample goes down. And maybe its lateral, maybe it's not. But what does the data show in terms of what you've seen in terms of where our aquifer is in this county? In terms of the potential for hitting an aquifer? Or have you seen an experienced an aquifer get hit at these depths with a core sampling operation?

Ling: So just to speak, from a private well perspective, I think it was Mr. Spears that was speaking earlier about the complexity of the bedrock aquifers in a place like Buckingham County. It's underlaying by crystal and bedrock and anticipating where those fractures intersect a particular borehole. For a privately supplied household, it's very hard to predict how water moves, how quickly it moves. How open or not open those fractures are for contributing water to a drinking water well. So my data from Buckingham, which is based on programs that we've done over the past few years there shows this homeowner reported and based on well completion reports a range of 30 to 485 feet deep for private wells that we've tested. So there's a huge range. There's also going to be a huge range in the construction of those wells. Whether they were constructed, whether or not they were constructed after Virginia Department of Health put well regulations into effect in 1990 or before, and how those wells have been maintained over time. So we regularly, this reminds me a lot of the conversation around sipeline construction in

southwest Virginia, where there is a fair amount of concern, you know about potential impacts on private drinking water wells. There's not really a silver bullet contaminant that we would, you know, not find and then find to document that there's been an impact. So being able to document that there's been, you know, sediment movement in some of these fractures that could contribute to changes in well yields, you know, hundreds of yards away. It's just very hard to prove and I think some somewhere also said that, that that wasn't already happening or hadn't happened for some other reason. For example, everyone being home quite a bit more during COVID. You know, for example, and using quite a bit more water, that kind of thing, it would be hard to document. So from what I can see, there's a big range. And I would just further reiterate the complexity of understanding that fractured bedrock and how wells are connected or not underground.

Miles: Thank you.

Bowe: Jordan. I heard you say 5 to 800 feet deep.

Miles: Sure.

**Bowe:** I'm gonna go back to one of our earlier meetings. And the geologists who was doing his name was Josh Mace. He testified, I guess you'd call it that their deepest well, was 300 feet on a diagonal? Not 5 to 800 vertical.

Miles: Thank you.

**Chermak**: Erin, could you say that the shallowest wells are in the fractures around there? More or less? What was the shallowest?

Ling: The shallowest reported was a 30 foot well. We probably very rarely will see something like a bored well that's still. It might even be said by something similar to a spring. So it's really hard to say, local department of health might have some more accurate numbers to know in terms of what what's normal for Buckingham County, as you know.

**Bowe**: Is it at all possible to tell if this became a mine, how many acres would this mine be? Or how big would it be? Is there any way to tell that?

**Spears:** First of all, I could hook you up, have we let Chermak?

Chermak: That's fine. I was just gonna say I mean, again, the information from the, if the drill spacing that you're talking about is all in a concentrated area, right? I mean, I think it depends a lot on the geology kind of where things are. And you know, that really is, you know, when we're looking for gold in fractures, which is sounds like that's what they're looking for, this is really hard to figure out kind of what and how, you know, kind of what holes they found some really high gold in one of the fractures, and that's probably based around closer, and then they went out further. So yeah, I think it's really difficult to say how big that mine would be. And actually, you

know, to be honest with you for fractures in cores, and maybe an underground mine, or whether, you know, again, at the surface, my all of those things are just, again, this is way too early, in my perspective, as geologists doing this, at companies and you know, kind of thinking about it is, it's very early, you know, now there may be information and people can look at this and, and have much better information. But again, with no information, it's really hard to answer with.

Fehrer: The surface footprint of a mine is really going to depend on whether it's an underground operation or surface operation. Now, in some of the previous minutes of these joint informational meetings, I read where a couple of fellows in hip boots approached the landowner, and we're asking for permission to do some gold panning in a stream on the individual's property. And this person asked about the next step if this prospecting turn not a viable deposit. And that these individuals replied that it would more than likely be a surface mine. And surface mines going to have a larger footprint because they extract a given area underground safely, you've got to have benches or banks that would slope up to the surface. This is going to make the surface impact much larger than that area that's actually disturbed underground. So the area would include the pit, a plant and an area for the disposal of mine waste. It may be 50 acres, it may be 300 acres or larger. It just depends on how the mine is going to be developed.

**Spears:** That was Mr. Ferrer. And I would just like to make the point that I even hesitate to bring up the subject of mining, because really, that's not what we're talking about. We're talking about exploration by core drilling. Mining is a completely separate issue that would happen years or decades down the road and require a completely separate regulatory approval process. This is not a question about mining.

Miles: Mr. Chairman? Can I ask a question? This is for whoever wants to answer it. So I'm just doing some research as to Aston Bay's website. I'm gonna preface my question with these two statements with regards to what they've published on their website, and they've said that they're drill programs have confirmed a high grade at surface gold vein system in Buckingham as well as an adjacent water zone of lower grade disseminated gold mineralization. And they also noted and forgive me for messing these measurements up but drilling on the Buckingham vein included core length intercepts of up to 3.5 GTAU, over 2.03 M and 24.7 GTAU over 3.57 m 2019 drilling and a 5.81 GTAU over 6.29 M, including 29.9 GTAU over .92 M 19. 25 GTAU over 1.4 M and 14.5 for GTAU over 1.06 M and quartz veins material based on these results that that have been published? What would our expert's opinions beyond the likelihood that their findings would lead to an open pit mine?

Chermak: I'll go back to my number, which is again, I know these numbers well. And so again, I think that that again, the chances of, you know, having a hole, I mean, I worked with mines that have much greater numbers than that. And it'll never be a mine. So I still stand by you know, just on average, I'm not saying this won't be a mine, but on average, you know, exploration to see these kinds of numbers is just to be those are normal numbers. And I would still think that the chance of it being you know, actually turning into a mine from where it is today. You know what, based on the information I have, which is very, which is almost nothing except, you know, a few numbers is still you know, less than 5%.

**Spears:** And I would say some of those numbers are quite rich and not in terms of grams per ton. That's what GT stands for grams per ton, but they're over very short distances. The longest since they mentioned I think you said was 6.9 meters, that's about 20 feet. So they have some rich veins, but in a very, very small area so far.

Bowe: Does any other county in the state that you're aware of require anything to core sample?

Spears: Okay, Mr. Skiffington?

**Skiffington:** I am not, but there are over 130 localities in the Commonwealth. So I certainly can't swear to it, but I'm not aware of any.

Bowe: Okay, thank you, sir.

**Bryan:** If it's not regulated, how would he know?

Bowe: I don't know. I mean, it seems like this problem would have come up someplace else if it was a problem. I don't know.

Miles: In terms there got... I'm a layman when it comes to core sampling. I've never sampled any core, maybe an apple with my mouth. There have got to be variations of core sampling and I referred to Mrs. Carter, or asked Mrs. Carter wasn't there some talk about doing a core sample when there were some questions about the soil back behind the one primary building, when maybe the a library would be there. Right? There were some loose discussions before samples, VDOT core samples, a lot of things core sample. So can one of these experts talk about the variations of that? Obviously, there's a there's a depth variation and there's a how you going to ground variation?

Bowe: Looks like it's you again, David.

**Spears:** It's nearly an identical process feeder. The VDOT core samples that I've seen are usually quite large. They're about six inch cores. But it's the same process. They go in with a hollow stem, drill rig, pump water as they're drilling, and they collect the core. Yeah, but you're right. Typically, a VDOT core would only go down maybe between 10 and 40 feet depending on the material. But it's the same mechanical process of collecting a sample. It's just VDOT usually takes up a larger sample.

Miles: Sure. And so, Mr. Chairman, so the variation would be the depth. That's the biggest variation of this.

**Spears**: When it comes to, I would say for some projects, say, if you were to build a skyscraper on in Virginia Beach, you'd probably want to go down a couple hundred feet with that core

sample and make sure what the soil conditions are beneath that building. But I'd say yeah, typical VDOT core where they're not building a great big tower would be less than 100 feet.

Allen: Everybody we got here now, there's experts and all these different fields. Does anybody have any idea of what this is a good thing, bad thing or something the county should or shouldn't be doing? If you could let us just give us any kind of idea what you think. Or each one y'all come in line to say, wouldn't think is good idea, Bad idea? Or whatever? Give us a little help.

**Spears:** I'll just go back to one of my original points that exploration by core drilling is an unregulated activity for a good reason. It's widely understood to be harmless. And just not a problem. They drill a hole, they take a rock sample, they plug the hole.

Bryan: But it's not regulated.

Spears: It's not regulated.

Miles: Is it typical, Mr. Chairman, and experts, if I may ask, that this use would go on for about four years and the county wouldn't know about it. Talking about not being regulated, you know, going off of what Supervisor Bryan's question was, is that something that goes on in Virginia all the time?

**Spears:** I can tell you that dozens of core holes have been drilled in Buckingham in the past 40 or 50 years without any oversight. The private landowners and the companies that leased the mineral rights from those landowners have had this relationship for many, many years. And it happens all over Virginia. It happens all over the country. They drill a hole, they take a rock sample, they plug the hole and they go away,

Miles: Specifically these depths that we're talking about.

Spears: I can't say for sure. Because, again, it's not public information. What they're doing is not public information. It's between the landowner and the mineral company. So yeah, we don't know we happen to know, I mean, just by being involved with the industry and being involved with geology we have in our files, we have records of some of these portals. Sometimes a company will donate the records to us. So we have, we actually have some physical core in our core facility in Charlottesville that came from Buckingham during the 20th century. So it's happened a lot before, and no one has really taken any notice. I remember, it was about 1995 or 1996. Driving on Tower Hill Road, the drill rig just moved right along Tower Hill Road over about a month and a half. And I don't know how many cores they took, I think it was Reynolds Metals at the time, I believe was the company that was doing the work. But it was right there just a mile from my house probably a mile and a half from your house. They plug the holes and they went away.

**Fehrer:** Oh, I would add something to this. A lot of people don't realize it but we have over 430 mineral mines permitted in the State of Virginia. At one time, there were almost that many coal

mines. Most of these are large operations that take many millions of dollars and years to develop and most of them would not have been developed without exploratory drilling that proved a deposit. We don't think about it. But the stone quarries, putting in core holes to determine whether the granite or limestone or diabase, whatever it's going to be charged into an aggregate will meet the state's specifications for road construction or concrete or Kyanite Mining would not be expanding that operation without core drilling to determine the viability of an area that they would expand the mine into. The coal mines, which most of them are below grade, are all core drilled. It's a common practice that is part of the initial planning to put in one of these large, multi-million dollar operations. And it happens all the time, all over the state, even in the eastern part of the state, in the Tidewater area, core drilling issues, where mineral sands are mined to determine the depth of those deposits and the extent of those deposits, for planning purposes. So it's, this isn't runoff in Buckingham County, it's happening all over the State of Virginia and for that matter, all over the United States, in North America, and even the world. So it's a pretty common practice.

Chermak: I'm gonna, David, I think you said it really well. I just and I, since I work at Virginia Tech, I can kind of be a little bit more liberal free, I guess is my response, your question about, you know, would you recommend, you know, a mine in your area? I think you need to think about it. And this is what I do. It's the social impacts, the environment impact. There's pros and cons to these things, right. And so we all like to use a lot of stuff, right? I mean, uranium, I was involved in the Virginia uranium mine, and nobody wanted a uranium mine in Virginia. And so it turned into, you know, a difficult discussion, but we still get, you know, in Virginia, almost 40% of our electricity comes from nuclear power. So, I mean, we just think about some of these things as the pros and the cons. And so, I think it's the data, you know, you don't need to make that decision now. And as Dave said, you know, it's really early on of will it ever be mine or not, but there are good things from a mine. And again, Damien mentioned Kyanite, I mean, Kyanite and Buckingham, you know, I think has a good relationship with the landowners with the people, there's jobs, there's taxes, there's opportunity for young people that you know, are from that area, they go to Virginia Tech, they get engineering degrees and go back to the where they came from and they work. I mean, I work so I kind of had to do some things over there. So, you know, in the aggregate mining is much bigger, you know, from a volume perspective than gold ever will be. And so, again, so all of these things, I think, you know, again, I think getting the information and then trying to make a decision, because at this point in time, there's really no information there. But again, I can say this, I teach this to my students. This is what I talk about all the time, and I try to convince communities that, that mine is good for them, you know, in Virginia, in wherever around the world. And so, you know, but you as individuals need to decide if there's enough, you know, good versus bad. So it's a cost benefit. And if the mining company is smart, you're all going to be happy, and you're going to get something out of it, it's going to be good, and it's going to raise everybody's boat, so to speak. But, you know, again, but that's down the road, you know, from mining down the road, and that is my personal perspective. I've worked in the middle of this my entire career, I do environmental social management of mines, and I see the positive and I also see the things that are bad.

Ling: This is Erin. I can also add, just kind of push for perspective, you know, thinking about these core boreholes and just being developed with water and that's all that's happening. You know, it's very typical in Virginia, although a property abandoning a private water well is required by the Department of Health that is not enforced. Because there's not really the manpower to go out and you know, trump around on people's private property to make sure it's done properly. So I would say there's a pretty high incidence, you know, of wells that have been there are no longer in use, that are basically represent an open borehole down into the groundwater and potential contamination from the surface. You know, that could pose a similar risk. That's across the state. Across all the counties in the state and some cities. Likewise, wells that have not been properly maintained, tend to present a similar risk to other nearby wells. So I just want to be clear that it's not, I'm going to pause for a second. Like I'm yelling at my kids. Just to put into perspective, that there are similar roots for water to get relatively quickly from the surface, you know, down into affecting groundwater, which is certainly not something that we want to see. But I think it's more common than we then we'd like to think. And from a well water testing perspective, you know, in terms of what we see, we do run a pretty extensive list of heavy metals for wells across the state. And by far, the biggest concern is bacteria, and lead just coming from premise plumbing. So while there's certainly concerns, you know, with fully developing the site, you know, in terms of what's done with any wastewater, and if there's any kind of injection or things like that going on, in terms of the core, you know, the core boreholes I don't see a huge risk, you know, given the distance that I've heard from private wells to the site. So just speaking about the cores in particular.

Bowe: Anybody else have any additional questions?

Bryant: Are there any heavy metals brought up in core drilling?

**Spears:** It depends on what you were drilling into. If this company were drilling for lead or arsenic or cadmium or something like that, which are all commercial mineral products. I would say there would be some risk of that. But what they're looking at here is gold, which is chemically inert, completely chemically inert. It doesn't dissolve in water. It doesn't move. Gold does not really move in groundwater unless the water is incredibly acidic and incredibly hot. So yeah, I'd say unless they drilled into some kind of vein that had heavy metals in it. But I suppose that could happen. But that's not what they're going after here.

**Bryant:** I understand that. Thank you.

Miles: Mr. Chairman. If I could ask Mr. Spears a question. Going off of what Chairman Bryant said, is that you said...could you reference what you just said about depending on if then, then it possibly could be used, depending on what's...

**Spears:** Not used in the drilling. I'm saying that if they were, if they were prospecting for cadmium, or lead or arsenic or something like that, then they would be aiming at a vein that contained those minerals.

Miles: Right, but let me ask you this question, question of a layman, isn't it in this vein that we're talking about...and I know, you know a lot about what's under the ground in this county, which we're very fortunate to be here to be able to answer these questions. Is that possible?

**Spears**: I'd say in other parts of the county, for example, the more traditional gold belt that runs along 15, there are sulphide minerals in there that would be more likely to contain some of those heavy metals, those elements. We haven't seen a complete chemical analysis of what they've pulled up here, but it's not in what we call the normal sulfide belt, which runs more or less along Route 15. So the traditional gold belt actually has more of a risk of heavy minerals, heavy metal metals, geologically, than where they are out in the Warminster area.

**Bickford:** As long as we're getting into this, it might be helpful, if you could explain the difference in the geology along this Route 15 Dillwyn area versus the geology up where the drilling is taking place.

**Bowes:** The age difference in the two areas.

Spears: Yeah, I don't think it's so much a difference in age as it is a difference in geological environment. That the traditional gold belt that runs along Route 15 is what we call a volcanic rock, volcanic genic rock. The rocks themselves are derived from volcanic ash deposits that were formed in a volcanic belt that was in an offshore island chain, but there's a major, major geologic boundary that runs roughly through the Buckingham High School. And everything east of that would be the volcanic rocks. And everything west of that is very, very different. You've seen these rocks, they look like shale, kind of a silvery rock, it's what we would call a tribal sediment. It's basically a mud stone that's been compressed. And the gold here is occurring in veins associated with the mineral quartz. So it's not as associated with sulphide minerals as the gold to the east of the line that runs through the high school. And that's a big, what we call a tectonic suture that runs right down the middle of Buckingham County, two very different kinds of geology. And that's why this is a fairly unusual gold occurrence in the western part of the county. If you look at the historic mines, they pretty much line up right on either side of Route 15. Very, very little gold has ever been found to the west of that line.

**Bowe:** Anyone else have any questions? How about the supervisors? Do y'all have any additional questions? I guess Ladies and gentlemen, we appreciate y'all having given us your time and answers this evening. I guess that pretty much if there's no additional questions, anybody again. Okay. Well.

**Edmondston:** Again, I'd like to thank the panel for your participation and cooperation. And all the answers provided tonight. Thank you all very much for taking your time out to join the Buckingham County Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors, we truly appreciate it.

The Panel: Thank you.

**Bowe:** Do we have a discussion amongst ourselves after having gathered the information. Is that appropriate?

Allen: It's part of the agenda, yeah we can have a discussion about it.

**Bowe:** Let's have the discussion.

Miles: One of the concerns I have, Mr. Chairman, is that you know in doing some research and I know full well know that the reason we're here is to talk about core sampling but there's also a large component in the back of mind, as to what's next after core sampling if they're successful. I would assume that they will be successful. And I know that that mining is a special permitted use in the agricultural district, in the A-1 district, let me be more specific. And that concerns me for a number of reasons in that the, and you all know more about this tonight because you've been on this Planning Commission longer than I have and generally are much more intelligent than I am but just in reading it the A-1 district, this is what the A-1 district calls for: for the purpose of preserving and promoting rural land uses. They include forested lands areas significant for them for the environment such as lakes, reservoir streams, parks, and less intensive farming operations that are more traditional and character. The district is established for the purpose of facilitating existing and future farm operations traditionally found in the county preserving farm and forest lands, concentrating, conserving water and other natural resources, reducing soil erosion, prevent water pollution, protecting watersheds and reducing hazard from flood. So just looking at that having mining as a special permitted use in the A-1 district, and it says special permitted use in the AC agricultural comprehensive district seems like it's going against the grain with the purpose of the district. That's my main concern.

**Bowe**: Well, maybe that is a concern that comes later. But right now, the topic is core sampling. And certainly, I feel that the landowner has a right to evaluate his land. But that's what this is all about.

Bryan: But it's not regulated

Bowe: Right.

Bryan: It's not policed by anybody.

Bowe: Right.

**Bryan:** I mean, that's a, you know, that's a mistake. Yeah, you can do it. I don't have to police it. So I trust you to do what you're supposed to.

**Dorrier:** Do we know how much more core drilling and sampling that they need to do. Does anyone have a clue? Are they done or is it going to come in and do 25 more holes? Or is it something to worry about?

**Edmondston:** Well, Mr. Dorrier, we have to remember the reason that we came here is for the core sampling activity. And it's been deemed prohibited, because there's no specific use for it in our zoning ordinance. So it's not permitted. So the company was told to cease their operations for their activity. So that's where they are now. The activity has not continued, because they've been asked to stop due to the prohibited type of activity through our ordinance. Now, Mr. Bowe post some questions about property rights. If Mr. Wright, our county attorney is available, he may have some input in regard to property rights and zoning activity.

Allen: But you are asking whether they wanted to do any more drilling or not. We'd have to wait and talk to the mining people.

**Bowe:** You know, I've done a little bit, a whole lot of reading on this thing. And when you get into the Code of Virginia, its 45.1.-1 at mines and mining. And you know, it gives you the definition of mine. And that's where you're breaking the ground and removing goodies to be sold or used commercially. Then it goes on to say, this definition shall not include, nor shall this title, chapter or section be construed to apply to the process of searching, prospecting, exploring or investigating for mineral spot drilling. To me, it's expressly excluded right there.

Wright: What you're reading from is exactly what you were told by the group, that it's not mining. The section you're referring to talks about mining and they wanted to make sure that prospecting wasn't included in mining. That's why they have that definition. Also, in terms, I think the question that was Edmondson brought me out here in terms of property rights. The general notion is if it's not a permitted use in a zone, then it's not allowed. And again, we're dealing state that what we have is what the state gives us. And we can't regulate mining except to the activities in the areas in which it's done. Now, you're exactly right and reading the code. But what that says is prospecting is not going to be regulated by the state of Virginia. That's all it says. That definition. I just means the State of Virginia is not gonna record I prospecting and that's what you were told by the experts.

**Bowe**: Mr. Wright. I was also told that there's not another county in the state that they're aware of that is raising an issue with this.

Wright: Well, we adopted this ordinance in October of 1997. And you heard the references to when these activities occurred. So I don't know when the last time any prospecting or drilling holes occurred or Virginia. I know them in 19. I'm gonna say somewhere around in 1966 to 68, some of the cases that I suspect were donated to the State of Virginia that they occurred during that time. I don't know when the drilling occurred on between most Allen and the geologists when that occurred, but I suspect it was probably 1997. We have not had an ordinance in place that suggested that, that I'm aware of anytime prospecting is going on and Buckingham by the way of core drilling. After this event had happened, it just never got called to anybody's attention.

**Bickford:** Mr. Wright. We have tried to address this through asking for registry from the company. Your research which we got that would require the county adopting a business license for all businesses? Would it be feasible to shift the burden to the landowner, that they would have to bring the information to the county either...?

Wright: How would you want to do that?

**Bickford:** Well, I don't know. In other words, if they entered into a lease, with a mining company to do core samples, we as the county would ask them and I think we could create a form that could be emailed to them, or they could pick it up just for some questions. That would stipulate whatever we chose to do long within appropriate kept within our legal bounds. In other words, the land owners responsibility is too common notify the county that they've entered into a lease with a mining company to do just core samples. And therefore we are able to create this inventory, register, whatever because they do that. Now, my question to you is, is it as a county are we able to do that, require that from the land or legally, I know, when we did three years ago, when we did the first revision on the comprehensive plan, we required the allow family cemeteries, we require that some family member come forth, and bring the best it could a drawing a sketch and aerial photograph of the location of this cemetery plot for the family. So it would serve dual purposes, it'd be for the county to know where it's at to be for the potential buyer in the future know that there's a graveyard here, but also the, for the family members themselves, you know, 20-30 years down the road. So we put some obligations on them at that point with that, can we do this?

Wright: You can create a mechanism in your zoning ordinance to do something some of that. It would come back to the same question, if you if it's permitted use, or use by right. I mean, what I should have said, they don't have to do anything. If you do, say with a special use permit, then it starts with you and ends up with the board as to whether that special use permit should be granted for that information. Land activities, zoning always falls on the landowner. That's why you require that first, second or third page in the zoning application where the land owner says I'm delegating the person applying for those changes to make those requests to the for the text amendments or either for the special use permit. All an activity falls on the landowner to control.

**Bickford:** I understand that, but I guess my question is, if we made it a by right, but with the caveat that the land owner has to provide this information to either Nikki or Rebecca Carter.

Wright: I can give some thought to that. It would not be in any particular zones. And depending on how you wanted to go about it, you made it applicable to all as a general vein, across all zones, you may catch more fish than what you want to catch in your net.

**Bickford:** Well, I would have no objections when making it across all zones myself. That way we know exactly, I'm like Mr. Bryan, I think I'd like to know when somebody enters into it. I don't have to know all the pertinent information, but at least know, okay, they they've entered into a lease and they're gonna be there will be some activity on their property with the core sampling.

Wright: If that's the direction that the Board and the Planning Commission wants to pursue, we'll see what we can do to give it legs.

**Bickford:** Well, that's just a suggestion. That's all it is, as I suggested just about building an idea, but I wanted to know if we actually had the legal authority to require the land owner to do that.

**Wright**: Have a little discussion, not an in depth discussion about exactly how that would be accomplished. Okay. So my answer is maybe

Bickford: Good enough. For now.

**Allen:** That's the biggest thing we want to know anyways. If they're in the county. And where they are at because people call saying they were in the county, and nobody up here knew it. So it's just a thing of notification is the biggest deal. What I see right now.

**Wright:** I've tried to say in this discussion as well as others, once y'all decide between the board and the Planning Commission in what direction you want to take the policy, we will try to find a way to facilitate that for you. So, for me to say that's good, bad or indifferent is really not my role. You tell me where you want to go to find the ditches as I've come to the farm. And I'll try to keep you between them.

Allen: What the geologists and everybody here there was here tonight talking about it. I didn't hear nothing that was actually bad about core drilling. And that's all we're talking about right now. I know everybody's talking about down the road's going to be mining. But we are it's already set up. If someone wants to come up here tomorrow and say I want to go mining and they got all the right paperwork. Well, you know, it's set up in our zoning to do mining. But to me, this is just one little thing in A-1 to take care of. Anyway.

Bowe: Ashley, Steve, do yall have any thoughts on this?

**Dorrier:** I think we need to give Nicci some guidance as to what to do and come up with a suggestion to least to help her along. She sort of between a rock and a hard spot.

Shumaker: I think I might be in the minority. But yeah, we're very focused on what's been happening with us today or for the last four years. And I know, that's how we got to these conversations. But as a Planning Commission for long term planning, I think we have to have a better plan for not just that location, but county wide. And David Spears, he was very passionate about his career. I think geology is a science is important to understanding what we're doing. Of course, sampling is a big part of that. But it sounds like there's still a lot of hesitations like Supervisor Bryan was talking about his expression that, you know, it's not regulated at all. And if that's a concern, seems like with the amount of people that have been coming in the boardroom during these discussions, it sounds like that's kind of where everyone is leaning is that there's no

county regulation either. So for this project, and potential projects, to keep the plan moving forward, and to get the verbiage and all of our zones, and to keep our residents comfortable, like I said, I might be in the minority, but I was leaning more to the special use permit plan that we were on a couple months ago. I think that gives the county the ability to at least have some control, you know, usage of water, reviewing, you know, what's around each planned site, proximity of a drilling relative to adjoining properties, you know, this property is huge, but in an A-1. I mean, some of the smaller parcels could be what, just a couple acres. So do we really want a rig, you know, exploring property right next door to, you know, a double wide next door. I think that eases some folks minds in terms of our ability to assign someone to inspect the holes, when they're done with their activities. You know, we talked about these locations that may have heavy metal contamination, should it become an activity, you know, in that vein that Mr. Spears was talking about? So I am of the opinion that a special use permit would be a good compromise for letting people do what they want to with their property but still having the county have some eyes on it for what would be best to all residents in that neighborhood.

**Bowe:** Harry, do you want to give us some guidance? I mean, we work for you. As a Planning Commission, what do you want us to do? What direction do you want us to take?

**Bryan:** If we take no action, then the way we have it now, they have to have a special use permit to core drill in an A-1.

Allen: No. It's not allowed right now? With no action, they'd never be able to do nothing.

Bickford: They don't have the right to do it.

Bowe: Yes sir.

Davis: But don't you have to give us a permit to put a well on your property. I know down on our end. I know Johnny and I live on the same end of the county. My dad's well is 500 foot deep. That's the only way we could get water up at his house. So I mean, that's going into ground eight inch well 500 feet. So what is, to me is something we could make some kind of compromise to where these will get backfield back with grout when they're done. And I work in the construction industry in the pipeline industry so core drilling is common practice. It's done all the time. VDOT, just like they said VDOT has to do it on the road, they have to see where the base is. So they know where the rock is so there's suitable material to build a road on. So to me, if we can make some kind of compromise that we can make it work. Johnny had, I thought that was a good idea. But we need to know when they're doing stuff in the county, they shouldn't be doing stuff four years, and nobody knows nothing about it. That's, that's the issue I have with.

Allen: That's where our registers would come in to. Once they came into the county, they would register. And they say, well, this is the name of the company. This is where we're drilling is how long we're doing the drilling, and make it where they have to renew it every year. So if you're back next year, we know the back but register don't sound like it's gonna work very good.

Carter: That's pretty much what I've heard, because I live out that way. You know, why didn't you tell us what they are doing, and the fear has been instilled that this is going to a mine, we need to get that out there, because they've been told of revenue sources for the county jobs for the county. And, and so I think, you know, with them not knowing really what was going on there. I think that was a fear of theirs. So that would be as we've said, another step they would have to take with getting, you know, an SUP.

**Bryant:** I think we'll put the monkey on yalls back and yall make a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors of how you want to go.

Wright: Ultimately we are going to have to do it a little differently, I think you're gonna have to give them some direction.

Carter: The Board should direct the Planning Commission, they need to know what you want them to look at, and need to know what you want them to be doing.

Wright: After that, they need to make a report. It can change, they can say look at this, and they can do whatever. We can say we don't think that's the best proposal. They can send it back to you, have something different than what you've asked for and then you can change it again after you make your changes to it. You need to start a movement saying look at this.

Allen: I like that idea of the by right with the register book with us. That's a little issue in our head. So the way that Donnie was saying while ago, we do it with the landowner. I'd like to look into that some more I don't know about the rest of the Board members.

**Bryan:** Mr. Chairman, I would like the Planning Commission to schedule a public hearing to take mining out of the A-1 district. It would require changing the zoning ordinance to be in compliance with our comprehensive plan.

Miles: I'll second that, Mr. Chairman and Supervisor Bryan, can we add AC to that as well, because it's also in the agricultural comprehensive district?

Bryan: Yes, sir.

Miles: That would leave it only in the industrial district in the zoning ordinance.

Carter: So if that's the case, just to make it clear, should these people there want to come back and apply for a mine there then they would have zoning text amendment. Yeah. Yeah. Rezone to industrial.

Allen: Why would you do that? I mean, we're jumping off on a different thing now. We're here talking about core drilling. And now you're going off back into mining again. We're not talking about mining right now.

Miles: Yeah, it's directly linked, I think.

Allen: Everything you do is linked somewhere else. But tonight, we're talking about core drilling. And whether it's bad for the county, or not.

Bryan: Mr. Chairman, I have a motion on the floor.

Allen: He's got a motion. Vote for it.

**Bryan:** Call for the vote. I have a motion on the floor to get the Planning Commission to schedule a public hearings to take mining out of the A-1 and AC district.

**Wright:** You might want to modify your motion to ask the planning commission to take a look at it and make a recommendation.

Bryan: Yes, sir. Play on words.

**Bickford:** Just for clarification, I understand you're saying mining, are you also saying no core sample also?

**Bryan:** Right now core sampling is not authorized in there anyway.

Bickford: I know, but that's what we're here for.

Allen: That's what we are working on.

**Bickford**: That's what we're working on. I mean, what you're saying is valid. I'm just saying I'm asking for the Planning Commission, or what do you want us to do about core sampling? Because that's two different subjects here.

Bryan: Right. Well, right core sampling is not allowed.

Bickford: So in other words, no action on core sampling.

Bryan: That's right.

Bickford: So it's null. Not on board in Buckingham.

Allen: No, no. We hadn't voted on it.

Bickford: I mean, but that's what you're saying.

**Bryant:** We have a motion on the floor and a second that the zoning stays as it is. No, core drilling.

**Allen:** No, no. He's just taking it back to the to the Planning Commission to check on the mining to see if they would see if they would look at taking the mining out the zoning and give a reference back to the board. If we get that far.

**Bryant:** We had a motion in a second. Any other discussion? Call for the vote.

Bryant: Yes.
Miles: Yes
Bryan: Yes
Allen: No
Davis: No
Chambers: Yes

Edmondston: Mr. Matthews, are you still with us? They're calling you to vote.

**Matthews:** I know that. But I had one other thing I wanted to add in discussion before we vote on this, but anyway, you've already started. But I'm just curious. It doesn't look like that the comprehensive plan and this special use permit, for or against. So I think the Planning Commission needs to look at the comprehensive plan along with what you're planning on doing right now. In my right or wrong?

Carter: If in fact the Planning Commission has a hearing, and makes a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors to take mining out of A-1 and A-2, then you do not have to change your comp plan. If that's the recommendation, and then the Board of Supervisors would have a public hearing, and make the final decision. And that would be you would be in compliance with your comp plan. If you would decide...

**Matthews:** We're voting. That's what we're voting on right now. Is that what you are saying?

**Carter:** That would change the zoning ordinance.

**Matthews:** For A-1 and AC?

Edmondston: Yes, sir.

Matthews: And what...so we're gonna change those two zones to not allow mining. Is that

what you're saying? Right?

Edmondston: Yes.

**Matthews:** To be in line with the comp plan. So moving forward, if someone wants to come in and do that they're gonna have to apply for a special use permit. Am I correct on that or not?

Miles: Rezone it in an industrial zoned area of the county that is that is permitted formatting Supervisor Matthews.

Matthews: Okay, so what can you tell me the votes again, now tell me what who's voted how

Bryant: Yes.
Miles: Yes
Bryan: Yes
Allen: No
Davis: No
Chambers: Yes

Matthews: I'm voting no on that.

**Bryant:** So what is the final count?

Bryan: 4-3

Bryant: Yes.
Miles: Yes
Bryan: Yes
Allen: No
Davis: No

Chambers: Yes Matthews: No

Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Miles seconded to ask the Planning Commission to take a look at taking mining out of A-1 and A-C districts in the Zoning Ordinance. This motion passed with a 4-3 vote. Supervisors Bryant, Miles, Bryan and Chambers voting in favor.

**Edmondston:** So at this time, our Planning Commission has been asked to schedule a public hearing. And remove...

**Wright:** The motion was to study the issue to make a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors after conducting the public.

**Edmondston**: And the public hearing will be to possibly amend the ordinance in the A-1 and AC district to remove mining, leaving it only in a heavy industrial zoning district, correct?

**Wright:** The motion was to remove it from A-1 and A-C.

Edmondston: Gotcha.

Allen: But the issue was core drilling and that's what we're here for tonight and we kind of jumped into another zone.

Miles: Mr. Chairman, I would like to see the Planning Commission and this is just me speaking, not speaking on behalf of the board, because it would take motions and so forth to get that done. But I would like to see some options as to identifying...it's just putting what you all have said, in writing in terms of some proposals for us to look at for core sampling when there's mining involved. I don't mean all core sampling. Because again, VDOT is going to core sample for a road. I'm gonna core sample for a new house I'm gonna build. There's got to be some variation there, I think.

Allen: Yeah. You just got rid of it.

Miles: The only thing I supported was taking mining out of A-1. That was it.

Allen: If you don't have mining there ain't no need to worry about core drilling.

Miles: What if I want to core samples to build a house?

Allen: No, no, no, you just voted no for it.

Bowe: You cannot do it.

Bryan: What we voted for was to take mining out of the A-1 AC district.

Allen: Right. If you don't have it, then what are you gonna have it? So who's going to core drill? Who's going to core drill when there's no mining?

**Edmondston:** Supervisor Davis, we can't hear you. So put what... we want to be able to hear you for the notes of this meeting. So please, please,

**Davis:** I'm saying if you make it where you can't do core sampling in a A-1 district because you took mining out, the new Luck Stone quarry that just opened up in Prince Edward County, if Prince Edward had that same amendment, them jobs and all wouldn't be there for anybody where that new quarry just opened up right down 460.

Allen: So like, we've had Solite here for years, they had do core drilling. You've had 2 slate quarries here for years. You've got Kyanite over here. And look how many jobs and look how it's carried Buckingham County and now you're gonna say we don't want no mining.

**Edmondston**: Mr. Davis, to your point for the aggregates with Luck Stone, I will bring up that I was contacted by an aggregate specialist last week. And I think that one of the reasons that we're here now is because of the way this activity was discovered. No one knew about it. No one had approached the county to discuss this project. The difference with what Luck Stone did in Prince

Edward was even before they had acquired the property and had everything in place, they approached the county in months and months and months of discussion, so that the county would understand that they would be sampling that granite and going no more than 10-20 feet because as it was explained to me a 30 foot sample cost too much money for a low quality or low value commodity. So if they're digging granite, which is not gold, they wouldn't definitely probably not go 30 feet but that it was in the vision and mission and the ethics of that particular company to approach the county that they were going to work with very early on in the process, so, and yes, they were successful in that. So I think that the issues coming from our citizens, in the public commentary, have been that no one has been aware of this, there was no partnership or stewardship towards the county to explain the process. So, as E.M. Wright, our county attorney mentioned, there have been some suggestions on the table from the Planning Commission to give us, you know, some direction to move forward to give legs to a possible idea. As it is now, according to our zoning ordinance, it is prohibited. So, you know, as we take a look at, you know, how do you make this work? Or does it just not work? I think there's a difference in the attitude of the company will use Luck Stone, and they are the ones that mentioned this evening. I will go back and state that Kyanite mining was brought up tonight in the expansion of their facilities. I do work with one of their individuals there. And the majority of the property that they own in and around there, we'll use the East Ridge plant, is currently zoned heavy industry, it's an M-2. So as far as core drilling and expansion of that property where they are now, they are zoned for it. We've had conversations in the past in regard to if they want to grow outside of what's zoned in that M-2, what would be the steps for them? I think it's different to they've partnered with this county. They've been here prior for a very long time prior to the zoning ordinance. And they are citizens of this county and employers of our citizens. And once again, they partner with our county. So I think the issue comes down to the fact that this was discovered after over four years of drilling with no contact to the county to describe the process.

**Bickford:** Mrs. Edmondston, how much of the county is agriculture?

Edmondston: The majority, I would say 95%.

**Bickford:** So we're gonna limit any possibility of mines, core sampling to 5% of acreage in Buckingham County?

Edmondston: Yes. Well, I will say once again, that our comprehensive plan, and stating what the vision as Mrs. Shumaker, Planning Commission Member Shumaker mentioned earlier, if we're going to discuss the vision and the mission of this county, and where we see our growth and where we don't see our growth, and it's not that we don't see industry coming into the county, but is it going to be consistent with the zones in which it wants to be in? So I think before us we didn't...

**Bickford:** So before the slate quarry started and Kyanite wasn't it all at that time agricultural?

**Edmondston**: It would have been. Yes, sir. Because we had no zoning.

**Bickford:** If we had taken this position, we wouldn't have Kyanite. We wouldn't have slate quarries, or Solite.

Miles: They could have rezoned.

Edmondston: There was no zoning at that time. So they had the ability to carry on. I do think months ago in July, I brought to each of you, a county near us, one county that I could find close to us out of, I did not research 95 of the counties in our state. But I did bring to you what is happening in Greene County. They were the only county that had an example of mineral extraction and an A-1 for household use as a permitted item. Mineral extraction for commercial use was by an SU P and they're A-1 district. So if we want to look to what other counties are doing, I think it's important to remember there's no regulation for this. Other counties are sitting here, just like us not knowing the core sampling that's going on. Let's discuss the core sampling for VDOT architects and engineers. Is that not brought back at some form or fashion to discover for their discovery? What were they looking for? Why were they looking for it there? How deep did they go? Was it suitable for what they were doing? It would be in a state finding?

Carter: Yes. State agency.

**Edmondston**: Correct. We have a state agency DMME that does not monitor this. And that was told tonight.

**Bickford**: VDOT is a state funding. They are required to do that. They get funding to do that. We are talking about private enterprise here, not required because they're not taking state funds. I don't think there is a comparison.

Edmondston: Well, I just I would go back to what Mr. Wright said a month ago. As a property owner, you do have the right to do things with your with the property that your own. But your zoning ordinance is shows you the allowable activity in ways that you can do that. So there are certain things that like to do on my property, but it's either not zoned appropriately so I can't do it. Or it's only permitted by the way of a special use permit. I would have to come to the county I can't just do it because it doesn't state. We've gone through permitted or prohibited. You know, it's one of those things 50% of us may read our zoning ordinance and if it's not specifically listed, we'd say, Okay, well, it's not listed. So it must mean I can do it. The other 50% say it's not listed, I can't do it. Per the State Code and the way that we are governed, when it is not specifically listed, it's prohibited. And it's not allowed. So as we go back to the issue at hand, tonight, it is core sampling and we've called it for commercial use, since we've started this conversation, prohibited it is. You can do nothing, and it continues to be prohibited. You can take a look at it as a zoning text amendment for a permitted item, or zoning text amendment by way of a special use permit. But we're still back to this core sampling. And it's currently prohibited.

Miles: And the question is, do we want to regulate it and how?

**Edmondston**: And if you're going to regulate it, and you'll add it in a permitted, what else do we regulate in a permitted or by right item that doesn't have a state agency associated with it in order for you to move forward to do it? With the help of Mr. Wright, if he could give legs to how we would add it with the conditions that we would find out?

**Chambers:** It makes a lot of sense to me, if you think about it, put some responsibility to the landowner, you know.

**Miles:** Because core sampling is not gonna stop, right. I think is what Supervisor Allen was saying. But mining is permitted in the industrial use, in an industrial zone, I should say. So therefore, core sampling for that purposes will take place in agriculture.

Allen: In agriculture right now. In A-1.

Miles: Right, but zoning is saying in an industrial, but what I'm saying is, is that because mining can't be in but one district proposed, core samples will go away. Like we core sample all the time might not be for mining, but it might be for a host of other things?

Allen: I don't know. He did say that it's not legal anywhere. So

Bryan: Don't mix apples and oranges here, Danny.

**Allen:** I'm not. Is it core sampling or not? That's all I'm saying. Why are you jumping into a different batch of apples anyway?

Bryan: To be fixed.

Allen: But what needs to be fixed?

**Bryan:** Currently, the zoning and the comp plan, are not in agreement with each other.

**Allen:** And that's something we work on.

**Bryan:** And that's the motion I just made.

Allen: Your motion is to change the zoning. We ought to be working in the comp plan. The comp plan is the thing we work on, the thing that would change. That's a living document that we work on every five years. Update it. You have never looked at it. Nobody has ever looked at it, and know that this was a problem. And you know, it talks about minerals for the county to be looking at and doing. I don't see, you know, by looking at that, but that's fine.

**Bryan:** Johnny, do you want to look at your idea with Mr. Wright? About putting the burden on the landowner?

Miles: For the registration, right?

**Bickford:** Yeah. In other words, your core sampling would be by right. And we could make it, as Mr. Wright said, to make it have more standing across all districts. I certainly wouldn't want it in, you know, B-1 or something like that. It's, you know, don't want that. Not really sure if you want an agriculture comprehensive, but that's a discussion you can have. But if you shift the burden over to the land owner to bring the information forward, when he enters into a lease with whatever mining corporation, you're sort of creating that register, or at least the county is aware of what's going on.

**Bryan**: Then it would prevent, you know, like you mentioned, that it would prevent someone from coming in doing things without the county knowing.

**Bickford:** Correct. As long as I mean, the citizens of Buckingham would have to know that. If you're going to enter into a lease agreement with a mining corporation, this is what you have to bring forward. I would suggest that a questionnaire form be created if we go this route, if we're able to go this route. Mr. Wright will have to check that out. That Mr. Wright come up with the questionnaire that would have the questions that we're able to ask legally and try to get as much information about that lease. And that way, they just have to check a box, fill it in whatever. Something rather than allowing them to bring their own, you know, give them the questions. They bring in the answers. Try to create a simpler form as possible. But you get as much information as you can from them.

Allen: Wait a minute. Now you talking about... I'm like lost. Now you're talking about trying to go back with what Johnny said about the core drilling. And just a minute ago, you said and you say we're getting rid of mining.

**Bryan:** You are putting words in my mouth. Mr. Allen,

Allen: You didn't talk about just now about core drilling?

**Bryan:** Like I was saying, Are you gonna pursue that?

**Bickford:** Yes, if that is the favor of the Board of Supervisors, I will certainly.

Allen: And that's what I'm talking about. Core drilling.

**Bryan:** That's my motion. Mr. Bickford. Would you consider approaching that with Mr.

Wright? Based on your suggestion to put the burden on the landowner?

Bickford: I'll be glad to.

Miles: And I'll second, is that a motion? Well, second.

Allen: We didn't vote on that though.

**Bryan**: I just made that motion now.

Allen: Mr. Davis, they just made a motion to send it back to the Planning Commission to work on trying to get a way to write it up to put the burden on the landowner. So the landowner would have to fill out paperwork saying that.

Carter: Registration?

Allen: Well, I don't want to call it registration because we had trouble with the registration word

before. They kicked that out.

Bickford: How about questionnaire?

Allen: Questionnaire. That sounds better.

Wright: (talking from behind the wall and did not pick it up)

Bickford: Mr. Wright said it would have to come through the zoning.

Carter: So that would be needed to be added as a permitted use? Is that what Mr. Wright is

saying?

Wright: (did not pick up)

Carter: What did he say?

**Bickford:** He said it is work in progress.

**Bryan:** To work with the county attorney.

**Bryant:** All right. We have a motion on the floor for the Planning Commission to come up with a questionnaire for landowners to get the answers we need, is that correct?

Bowe: Donnie, does this replace your first one?

Bryan: No, sir. No, no, sir. Not at all.

**Bickford:** Mr. Wright has suggested the questionnaire will be discussed with the Planning Commission at the same time, that way we can come up with a series of questions, which we'll provide at the same time based on a legal assessment that he has on the property.

Wright: The questionnaires will be something if you legally can do it...what you want the Planning Commission do is consider whether you are legal to have landowners register when there's commercial prospecting going on the property. That's what you want to have the Planning Commission take a look at and if they can't do it, then the questionnaire will follow that.

**Bryant:** We don't have to vote on this motion, then.

Miles: Yeah, I think we do. To give the Planning Commission direction.

**Bryant:** We're giving the Planning Commission direction. We don't need to vote on this. No.

Wright: If they come up with something, come back to you, then you have to send it back to him to do a public hearing. If that's what you want them to do. They need to make a report to you.

Bryan: It eliminates one step.

Bickford: Yeah. I would suggest if you could if

Chambers: We need a motion, right?

**Bickford:** If you have extra time you can think of a questions that you might want to pose.

Chambers: We need to vote on it right?

Wright: You need a vote, please.

**Bryant**: We need to vote on that?

Allen: Yes. He said we do.

**Bryant:** Well, any discussion? Call for the vote then.

Bryant: No Miles: Yes Brvan: Yes Allen: Yes Davis: Yes Chambers: Yes

Matthews: Yes

**Bryant:** Six yeses and one no. Vote carried.

Supervisor Bryan moved, Supervisor Miles seconded to have the Planning Commission to see if it is legal to have the landowners register when they want commercial prospecting on their property and if it is to come up with a questionnaire for the landowners who want to allow commercial prospecting on their property to fill out so the county knows what is going on.

Allen: We've got a lot to work on.

Bryan: That's it.

Carter: I've got a couple things.

Bowe: Is there any other Planning Commission action?

**Bickford:** I do have one question. Supervisor Bryan, just for clarification on your vote to not allow mining in the A-1 and AC district. You mean none whatsoever or requires a special use permit?

Bryan: None.

**Bickford:** None. Okay. I thought that's what you indicated. But I just want to make clear. Thank you.

Bryan: None.

Bickford: That's all I have.

Blowe: A motion for adjournment?

Allen: So moved.

Edmondston: It's gonna be a recess to reconvene.

**Bowe:** Recess to reconvene. You want us to recess?

**Edmondston:** Yes, sir. Letter F if you read that recess to reconvene to Monday, November 23 2020 at your regularly scheduled Planning Commission meeting, okay.

**Bowe:** Recess of the Planning Commission to reconvene Monday November 23 2020 at the regular meeting of the Planning Commission. That one will be at 7:00 p.m.

## Re: Consider taxpayer relief of the credit/debit card fees during the Tax Collection months

Miles: Mr. Chairman, with regard to the other two items we have. I was gonna offer a motion that we waive the credit and debit card fees during the tax collection months and I would I think that's a great incentive to A. to get people to continue to pay from home and B. to get people to continue to pay without that extra additional penalties, not quite that word but help me out a little bit. The fee that they would have extra.

Edmondston: Convenience fee.

Allen: Second. I second the motion.

**Bryan:** I have a question on that. Mrs. Carter, can that fee be reimbursed to the county through a CARES Act?

Carter: I don't know. I'd have to... when you all did it in June, did we pay with will be CARES? It's a big help to people to paid from home and pay online because we were...our offices were shut down then. We can we can try? Yeah. We did find that and I guess it's convenience of going on your computer at night paying taxes instead of come up here, that collections were better, don't you? We really believe it? And so what would be the timeframe you want to extend?

Miles: I was gonna ask Mr. Chairman, could we do, I don't know, how soon technically can you do it? But could you do it like starting next week through the end of February? Is that too much?

**Bryan:** What is usually the tax collector months? Through December 5, December 31?

Carter: But I might add that collections to April really come in good. And that's when people get their county decals. So they could get that done too without paying that fee. If you extend the day started, like from next week to April 15. That gives them, they can do their county decals and pay their personal property tax.

**Miles:** So I amend my motion to make it effective the first of next week through the 15th of April.

**Allen:** That's when most people finish up their taxes.

Miles: Yeah. Thank you guys.

Allen: I second the motion too.

**Bryant:** A motion and a second by Mr. Allen. Any other discussion? Call for the vote.

## Re: Consider an additional Small Business Grant Application process

Carter: Yes. Mr. Miles is the board representative on the committee that where we did the last business appreciation, our business grants, small business grants. And so we were looking at how to reach some other people that did not apply before. And so Jordan came up with some ideas of what we could set that criteria at, and try to get on a fast pace, because it does have to go through the IDA to maybe do another round of grant applications for businesses, small businesses.

**Bryant**: Do we have the money for it?

Carter: It's CARES grant funds. It all has to be spend by the end of December. What's the current balance? It's not exact, but we've got several hundred thousand.

Bryant: So several hundred thousand. But if they got it before they can't reapply, right?

Miles: Right. What I was gonna say, Mr. Chairman, is and I know you and I talked and Supervisors Chambers, as to the idea that that we had to just do it like we did last year. Last year. Last time we did it and add that if you've gotten BSBA money, which is our input, which is this for small business, grant assistance, money, you can't come back and apply. So what I was thinking that we could do \$6,000 for businesses and again, these are new businesses who have not applied in the first round. And I'd like to propose that we do \$3,000 for nonprofits.

**Carter:** What's that? Six or 60?

Miles: 60. That's what we did last time.

Chambers: Oh, okay.

Allen: Yes. Yeah, we did 30 the 1st time and 30 next time. Total 60.

Miles: So what I'm putting forward is 60 for businesses, and I'd like to see us do 30 for some nonprofits in the area, especially for personal protective equipment. Not for any revenue or anything like that.

Carter: Well, you know, I saw in the, you know, we questioned several times, can we give anything to the fire departments? We couldn't find anywhere where they qualified. But I did see where Prince Edward County did. And what I found that was most of their loss was fundraising money. So they consider nonprofit.

Miles: So what I'm thinking is maybe we can take that \$30,000 added to the 60. And obviously, we need to do a little bit of research for it. But there are many nonprofits. And hopefully those could include the volunteer fire departments who could be a part of that when it comes to those fundraisers that they've missed. I do think that they will if we open it up to them. We would see a lot of need that we could help with this pandemic.

**Bryan**: I know that Dillwyn lost quite a bit.

Miles: They did?

**Bryan**: Yeah, with the with the tractor pull. But we weren't able to help them. Because it didn't qualify for CARES. But now, it may qualify under CARES under nonprofit

Miles: To specify the 60,000 would be for businesses who have not applied in the past for this and the 30,000 would be nonprofits in the form of a motion, Mr. Chairman,

**Allen:** Second. Back into motion, but same time a question, what if, what if they lost a lot more than 30?

Miles: So what we got? That's a good question Supervisor Allen, Supervisor Bryan, the chairman and I served on the committee that did that. And we pretty much just voted best we could. We had one business that lost gobs and gobs and gobs of revenue because they had to shut down and so we weren't able to get give them nearly the amount of revenue that they lost. No, we couldn't even touch it. But I do know, I think it was 5000.

Edmondston: And remember that we had a ranking sheet and, and we based it on where they had received other funds through other governmental programs, and SBA loans and those type of things. So we had some that had received no outside sources, but had lost year over year, a considerable amount of money in that time period from January through April of lost funds when they were ordered to shut down. So we do use our ranking process. And we also configure where they have received other outside sources, how much and those type of things just to make sure that it's kept fair across the board for the fund designation.

Carter: And we did find that in it because we put on our website reached out to all accounts, all the businesses we could, but we found that many did take advantage of the payroll protection. The small business and for the protective personal protective equipment that you know, many of our businesses got systems. And we're really glad to see.

Miles: To answer your question Supervisor Allen and they're vetted very well, by way the application that county staff put together. And then your suggestion Supervisor Bryan early on, if they've gotten x y&z they're not going to get nearly as much as the business is asking.

Bryan: Should we increase to go to 60/60 instead of saying...

Allen: Instead of slide it back and go, you know, just say \$90,000 and use it wherever you need it. You know, I'm saying.

Miles: Don't say we're gonna do 60,000 for this and 30,000 for this. Use the 90,000....

Allen: Say 90,000 let them use it wherever they can use it.

Miles: How about go 60/60? 60 for the businesses 60 for the nonprofit.

**Bryan:** Okay, amend your motion for that?

Miles: I would amend my motion contingent on our budget for CARES money. So we do have about \$60,000 for nonprofits and \$60,000 for businesses.

Bryant: Okay. All heard the motion second. Further discussion? Call for the vote.

Bryant: Yes
Miles: Yes
Bryan: Yes
Allen: Yes
Davis: Yes
Chambers: Yes
Matthews: Yes

Supervisor Miles moved, Supervisor Allen seconded and was unanimously carried by the Board to do a second round of Small Business Grants with CARES funds in the amount of \$60,000 for businesses and \$60,000 for non-profits.

Miles: Mr. Chairman, I'm gonna get with you because we're gonna have to fast track this process on the committee that we're on.

**Bryant**: All right. Are you gonna set a deadline on it?

**Carter:** We got a little plan. We can do that. We'll set it. We have a plan because it has to go to the IDA. The IDA has to actually expend the money.

## **PROPOSAL**

The following is a proposal for a path forward in resolving the commercial prospecting issue and the related question of mining in the A-1.

This proposal has been developed by a work group of staff consisting of the Planner/Zoning Administrator, the County Attorney and County Administrator.

The working group understands that this is not a solution that will satisfy all interest. It however, does offer the County the ability to be in control of the development in the County and see that is responsible and appropriate.

## Proposal

- 1. Add "commercial prospecting" as a special use in A-1 and M-1 and to clarify, as a matter of right in M-2.
- 2. Define "commercial prospecting" as the exploration for the material, including but not limited to, mineral, stone, gas or rock, for commercial purposes, by drilling, excavation or other land disturbing activity for commercial purposes.
- Add that definition to the definition section of the ordinance.
- Leave mining in A-1 as a special use permitted use in A-1 and M-1.<sup>1</sup>

#### Rationale:

Why this proposal. From the beginning of the zoning ordinance, mining has been allowed as a use with a special use in A-1. This is consistent with many ordinances around cental Virginia. Since it is a special permitted use, it also allows control of whether the activity should be permitted after evaluation of the application and the area. It allows appropriate conditions for the activity and offers the potential to approve, in a very general sense, an operation plan. Thus the recommendation that A-1 remand as a special permitted use in A-1.

The recommendation of commercial prospecting being a special permitted use addressees certain issues that have been expressed. It requires a business to request a permit. That allows the County to be aware of the activity and decide if it is appropriate in the A-1 area and impose conditions and specifications. It also is logical if the mining is allowed as a special permitted use, then prospecting should be allowed within that district and with conditions.

## Implementation:

This issue has been discussed for some time now. If this is the path forward, it would be well to resolve it quickly to bring certainty to the issue.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Note that mining is already a use by right e in M-2. Prospecting in M-2 would be an accessary use in that district.

The Board at its December 14<sup>th</sup>, 2020 meeting could ask the planning commission to join the Board at a December 28<sup>th</sup>, 2020 meeting. At that meeting the Board could hear the thoughts of the Planning Commission on the topic.

In conjunction with that meeting on the 28<sup>th</sup>, the Board could advertise for public comment on the plan and the Planning Commission could adopt that public hearing as its own. With that the Planning Commission, if it deemed appropriate, could recommend the course of action to the Board. The Board could then, if it felt it appropriate, adopt the proposal. This would be done on an emergency basis in order to settle the issue.

As an abundance of caution, the Planning Commission could have a more formal public comment time on the topic at its January 2021 regular meeting and from that make a recommendation to the Board on whether to keep the proposal or modify it. The Board could schedule its public comment period for it February 2021 regular meeting and take final action.

## Clarification on Core Drillng

A great deal of conversation has centered around core drilling and its permissibility as it relates to other types of underlying uses.

The focus in this discussion is about commercial propsecring and the land disturbing activities, which would include core drilling.

Core drilling would be allowed for some activities in A-1 without a special use permit. For example, if a farmer wanted to determine if a location was good for a barn, silo, etc., he could core drill to access that matter. It is an accessory use for the underlying farm activity.

In regard to mining, that is not an underlying use in A-1. So core drilling related to mining is not an accessory use.

The same analogy can be made in other districts and other permitted uses in ths districts.

In other words, in M-2 where ming is a permitted use, core drilling would be permitted as an accessory use in M-2.

It is the middle ground where the discussion comes.

Dear Sir:

l am writing to ask Buckingham County for \$725 of your county's Covid 19 Relief Funds to enable our clinic to continue to offer laboratory and x-ray services to 4 of our uninsured patients who are residents of Buckingham County. This request is being made because as of September 24, Centra Southside Community Hospital has notified us that they are not able to provide lab work or x-rays as donations to the patients of our clinic. This is a direct result of the funding crisis that the hospital is experiencing due to the Covid pandemic. Our volunteer doctors, nurse practitioners, nurses, and physician's assistants cannot safely diagnose and treat our patients without the benefit of laboratory analysis of their blood and urine chemistries and x-ray studies. Some of the lab work needed include: CBC's, Hgb A1C, glucose, blood chemistry, thyroid stimulating hormone levels, Vitamin D levels, hepatitis tests, renal function tests, liver function tests, cholesterol and lipid levels, urine chemistry, and several more. Patients taking fluid medicines need to have their blood chemistry analyzed regularly to be sure potassium and sodium levels are not depleted or elevated. Blood chemistry analysis affects a patient's ability to tolerate certain drugs. Doctors use these tests to make decisions about prescriptions and their dosages. For eight years Centra has provided these tests to our patients at no charge. Centra has notified us that this is no longer going to happen.

The amount we are requesting from Buckingham County is a percentage of our projected monthly lab expenses based on our average daily enrollment from your County. We project that this amount will be \$725 from September 24 until December 31, 2020, which amounts to \$242 per month. I think you will agree that this is a small amount to pay to save 10 lives and help our community's only free clinic to continue to operate competently.

As you may be aware, the Commonwealth Regional Council (CRC) was recently awarded a grant through FEMA's Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program to undertake an update of the CRC's Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The planning process is expected to take almost three (3) years, with the current target end date of September 23, 2023.

During the grant application process, your locality submitted a statement of interest to participate in the Plan Update. In order for staff to proceed with the initial steps of the project, we are now requesting that you: 1) confirm your intent to participate; and 2) appoint someone from your locality to serve on the Project Management Team (PMT). The PMT will assist CRC staff during the Plan update (reviewing data and materials, coordinating with local government staff as needed, etc.) and making sure the Plan is adopted by each covered locality prior to final approval by FEMA.

The total project budget is \$150,000.00, with federal grant funds covering \$112,500.00 and the local match totaling \$37,500.00. The State of Virginia will NOT be picking up any of the match. Therefore, the local share of the match breaks out to \$4,687.50 per locality. It should be noted that each locality has the option of using in-kind (staff time) as their match. This will allow you to avoid any cash outlays for this project.

Please complete the enclosed form – confirming your participation, indicating your option for meeting the local match, and appointing a representative to the Project Management Team - and return it to me no later than December 17, 2020. If you choose in-kind for your match, we will coordinate with your representative on the PMT on tracking local staff time for the match.





Mike has recently completed studying five (5) existing solid waste convenience sites for upgrades for Amherst County, VA. The scope of these projects required Mike to study the existing sites and make his recommendation as to what improvements should be considered given the overall size of each site and how best to orient the facilities to take advantage of the shape of each site.

Mike had to take into account on each site for the most convenient traffic movement for the users and the large trucks removing and setting new roll-off containers. In addition to siting the attendant's small office building. Storm water produced from each site was also a major factor in how Mike completed his recommendations to the County.

Another project where &P engineers provided our services was the Convenience Center site on state Route 648 in Appomattox County, VA. The site borders the existing railroad right-of-way, VDOT right of way for Route 648 and Route 460 and a privately owned parcel. The site is approximately 50 feet wide and 250 feet long.

To this day, this site is one of the most heavily used convenience centers for residents in Appomattox County. The site also allows for plastic and mixed paper recyclying covered boxes along with the site attendant office building.

## **Engineering Services Proposal**

#### **Project Understanding**

Buckingham County has requested engineering proposals for site improvements to the Dillwyn Recycle Center on Wingo Road. Our proposal includes engineering services to develop a site plan based on the general outline provided by the County. The improvements will include new concrete entrance, concrete container area, non-commercial asphalt drive area, stone drive improvements, two gate access islands, existing containers relocated, lighting improvements, site expansion, new/replacement fencing, and other miscellaneous improvements noted in the RFP and Addendum #1.

H&P will meet with the County two times during the site plan development. The first meeting will be to review a schematic concept plan and the second meeting will be to review the development design drawings. We will finalize construction drawings and specifications for County review and approval. Once approved, the project will be publically advertised, bid, and awarded. H&P will then provide construction administration services for the project. Our Scope of Services are outlined below.

#### **Scope of Services**

#### Task - Topographic Survey

H&P will provide a Topographic Base Map of the proposed project area. The map will be tied to Virginia State Plane Horizontal Datum. Structures to be located with this activity include existing buildings, driveway, utilities, and storm sewer inlets & manholes. Visible property corners will be located in order to establish property lines. In addition, we will locate all overhead utilities and underground utilities to the best of our abilities based on visual evidence and as marked by Miss Utility. Please note that this proposal does not include the marking of utilities by a utility location consultant. Final drawing scale will be 1"=50' or larger and a 2' contour interval and will be used as part of the construction documents.

#### Task - Construction Documents

H&P will develop project construction documents for the proposed convenience site that will include:

- Cover Sheet, Vicinity Map, Project Narrative and Utility Contacts
- General Construction Notes
- Existing Conditions
- Site Plans including Dimensional Layout, Utilities, Grading and Drainage Plans
- Electrical plan
- Repair/replace the existing detention pond outlet pipe.
- Storm water Management Plans We assume that we can procure credits for water quality and will not need to design water quality components on site.
- Erosion and Sediment Control Plans and
- Narratives and Details
- Contract and technical specifications for bidding.



#### Intermediate deliverables will be:

- 30% Meet with County to review the development of schematic design drawings to confirm site design elements before proceeding with developing detailed construction plans. An engineer's opinion of probable construction costs will be provided.
- 60% Meet with County to review the development of preliminary design drawings to confirm site design elements before developing detailed construction plans. An engineer's opinion of probable construction costs will be provided.
- 90% Development of design drawings for grading, site improvements, and electrical. Project specifications
  and an engineer's opinion of probable construction costs will be provided. PDF copies will be provided to
  the County and Regulatory agencies for review.
- 100% Incorporate agency review comments to finalize design drawings, specifications, and engineer's opinion of probable construction costs for bidding purposes.

#### Task - Geotechnical Investigation

Since there have been deterioration of the existing concrete drive aisles, geotechnical investigation is proposed to identify the sub-soil conditions. To complete the design and support documentation, H&P will provide the following geotechnical engineering services:

- Initiate an 811 request to locate all public utilities.
- Use a track mounted drill rig to bore 15 feet or refusal at 3 locations. Core existing concrete 2 locations.
- Soil samples will be taken using ASTM D 1586, "Penetration Test and Split-Barrel Sampling of Soils", and
  delivered to the laboratory. Selected samples will be tested for natural moisture content, particle size
  analysis, and plastic and liquid limit to verify visual classifications and provide engineering properties of the
  soil. The soil samples will be taken at the ground surface, 2 feet, 4 feet, 6 feet, 9 feet, and at 5 feet

- Review opened bids, issue a Bid Tabulation and provide a bid recommendation.
- Issuing Notice of Award.



#### Task - Construction Administration

H&P will provide construction administration services for the proposed recycle center improvements. An engineer will complete the following assuming a 4-month construction schedule:

- Review contractor requests for information (RFI).
- Review contractor shop drawing submittals.
- One site visit during the construction (mid-month) to check quality and progress.
- One Progress/Pay Request meeting (end of the month)
- Perform substantial completion inspection and provide letter with punch list.
- · Perform final inspection.

#### Task - Materials Testing

H&P will provide construction materials testing to confirm construction activities are in conformance with the construction documents. We have assumed the following services:

- Earthwork, Grading, and Proofroll Inspections 5 trips
- Concrete Testing 6 trips

#### Task - Record Drawings

Upon completion of the construction, H&P will use red-line information provided by the contractor to prepare record drawings.

#### Authority

This ordinance is adopted pursuant to § 58.1-2636 of the 1950 Code of Virginia.

#### Assessment

The County shall assess a revenue share of \$ 1,400.00 per megawatt as measured in alternating current (AC) generation capacity of the nameplate capacity of the facility based on submissions by the facility owner to the interconnecting utility, on any solar photovoltaic (electric energy) project in Buckingham County, Virginia, except as is hereinafter excluded. The assessment shall be per year during the operational life of the project beginning with the year the projects connects to the interconnecting utility.

#### Exclusions

Solar photovoltaic (electric energy) project shall not include any project that is (i) described in § 56-594, 56-594.01, or 56-594.2 or Chapters 358 and 382 of the Acts of Assembly of 2013, as amended; (ii) 20 megawatts or less, as measured in alternating current (AC) generation capacity, for which an initial interconnection request form has been filed with an electric utility or a regional transmission organization on or before December 31, 2018; or (iii) five megawatts or less.

#### Exemptions

For any facility on which the assessment is made, the County shall not collect any machinery and tool tax as might be authorized by statute and local ordinance. Until the assessment is made the facility shall pay any machineryand tools taxes that might be due.

#### Schedule

After the first assessment is made, subsequent assessments shall be due on the same date that the machinery and tools tax is due.

#### Effective Date

This ordinance shall become effective at the time of adoption.

## Buckingham Broadband Update - November 2020

#### Fiber Build in Buckingham

**Pamplin:** Currently installing service, 188 active accounts as of last week. 268 customers have registered for service- this is about a 52% take rate out of this substation.

**Curdsville:** Splicing and service drops are being finalized. 347 customers have registered for service. In-home connections are scheduled to begin soon.

**Tower Hill and Mt. Rush:** Sites for fiber huts at both substations are being designed and survey/permitting work is being completed. Make ready work on over-head lines is complete. Connections expected in 2021.

Centenary and Schuyler: Fiber design and make ready engineering are complete. The next steps will be the make ready contractors working to change poles and equipment on poles where necessary to prepare them for fiber. Connections expected in 2022.

## **Buckingham VATI Application**

We have not heard any work from the VATI program on the award status for our VATI application in Buckingham. For your reference, a description of the project is below.

On August 17th, Buckingham County and CVSI submitted a VATI grant application that, if awarded, would provide gigabit level, fiber -to-the-home, to the area in an around the town of Dillwyn. The area for this project is adjacent to the northern border of the Central Virginia Electric Cooperative ("CVEC") fiber build and the retail internet access service area of Firefly Fiber Broadband ("Firefly"), a wholly owned subsidiary of CVEC. The project will connect to that network and extend north along Rt 15 through Dillwyn and further north to Bell Road. The project area then continues east along Bell Road and then down Scotts Bottom Road back to Rt 60. From there the project area map goes back west to Sprouses Corner. There is also a small area along Rt 60 west of Sprouses Corner that provides service to the Va State Police office, USDA office and several other businesses and homes. The full project area can be viewed in the attached map.

The total number of serviceable units, or passings, for this area has be estimated to be 783, including 74 businesses. The services offered by Firefly Fiber Broadband will include 100 mbps for \$49.99 and 1gbps for \$79.99. All services include unlimited data and speeds are symmetrical for upload and download. If citizens register for service while construction is taking place in the area, the \$100 installation fee will be waived. Voice over IP telephone service is also offered for \$34.99 with a \$5.00 per month bundling discount if paired with internet service.

This project will be an important step towards Buckingham County completing its goal of 100% connectivity for its citizens. If this grant is successful, it will open the northern Rt 15 corridor to further expansion of broadband access. It will also provide another source of fiber connectivity to the state prison just outside of the town. Furthermore, it will strengthen the larger rural broadband network that Firefly Fiber Broadband is constructing across Buckingham County and neighboring counties, improving reliability and driving down costs to allow the very competitive rates to remain in place for many years in the future. | | | | P. #### Additional Info:

Buckingham County has approximately 8,200 homes and businesses. Almost 4,600 are served by Central Virginia Electric Cooperative and will have internet options from their system wide fiber build which will be completed by 2023. In addition, Firefly has applied for a ReConnect grant for some non-CVEC territory which will cover almost 300 additional homes and businesses. With 783

being passed with this project and if the ReConnect grant is awarded this fall, Firefly will have fiber optic service passing almost 5,800, or 71% of the county homes and businesses. There are a few areas with CenturyLink DSL that exceeds 25/3, and another local fiber based internet company provides service to the school system and a small portion of the residences and businesses; with these two providers plus Firefly, more than 80% of all county buildings will have access to broadband after this project.

- V. Return to Open Session and certification that to the best of each Board member's knowledge only business matters related to the code of which the executive meeting was convened was discussed or considered in the closed executive session
- W. Adjournment or Recess (Depending on Actions of the Board )
