#### Summary of Request

This is a request for consideration of variances from the required zoning setbacks for buildings that house farm animals.

#### **Background and Property Description**

Elawa Farm is owned by The City of Lake Forest. In 1998, as a result of a partnership between the Carroll Family, Lake County Forest Preserves District, Lake Forest Open Lands Association, the developer and the City of Lake Forest; Elawa, a Gentleman's Farm, was preserved as a community resource. The original 200-acre parcel was subdivided into 72 single family residential lots consistent with the density permitted by the underlying zoning. By using a conservation subdivision approach, wetlands, an oak savannah, prairie, and many of the structures and the garden from the historic Gentleman's Farm were preserved.

Today, portions of the original farm site are owned by the Lake County Forest Preserves District, Lake Forest Open Lands Association, and the City. The City ownership includes a neighborhood park which is under the purview of the City's Park and Recreation Department, a site north of the park that is reserved for a public elementary school if one is ever needed in this area, and Elawa Farm, the farm buildings and garden. The use of Elawa Farm, a non-residential use in a residential zoning district, is governed by a Special Use Permit.

In July 2023, the City Council, based on a recommendation from the Zoning Board of Appeals, approved amendments to the Elawa Farm Special Use Permit to allow a limited number of farm animals to be brought on to the site in the outdoor area previously occupied by the Wildlife Discovery Center animals. The small farm structures proposed by the Elawa Farm Foundation will

provide appropriate shelter for the farm animals.

#### Staff Analysis

The farm animals will be located in the area west of the Cottage, generally in the same footprint as the animal area used by the Wildlife Discovery Center. To support the farm animals, three small structures, a goat barn and duck and chicken coops, along with associated fenced areas, are proposed.

Elawa Farm is zoned R-5, Single Family Residence District, and as noted above, is authorized through a Special Use Permit. Farm structures are permitted by right in the R-5 zoning district. Farm buildings that house animals are required to be setback 200 feet from all property lines.

- ➤ A variance is requested to allow a 576 square foot goat barn to be located 53 feet from the south property line. The goat barn is low profile, 14-1/2 feet tall.
- A variance is also requested to allow two smaller structures, duck and chicken coops ranging from 72 to 84 square, and eight feet tall, to be located no closer than 21 feet to the south property line.

Importantly, the south property line is shared with open lands. The preserved open land to the south provides a buffer from the single family homes to the south which are located more than 500 feet from the south property line.

Existing components of Elawa Farm, a memorial garden, the approved area for tents for special events, the potting shed and the wagon shed, limit the opportunity to shift the proposed animal shelter buildings to the north and doing so, would locate the farm building closer to the homes in the Middlefork Farm Subdivision. The proposed structures comply with the 200 foot setback from the north property line of the Elawa Farm property and are located more than 400 feet away from the nearest homes to the northeast. The nearest residential properties are over 500 feet from the south property line of Elawa Farm.

#### Findings of Fact

The following findings are offered in support of the requested variances.

- 1. The variances are requested to align with the approvals granted in the Special Use Permit which allow farm animals to be housed at Elawa Farm to backfill the area previously used by the Wildlife Discovery Center for animal displays. Elawa Farm is a unique facility and use. Animals have previously been kept in this area with no issues.
- 2. The farm structures are small in size and low profile. Visibility from off of the site will be minimal.
- 3. The area where the farm animals are proposed is adjacent to preserved open land and there is a significant distance between the proposed farm animal structures and neighboring homes. The intent of the Code, providing for a 200 foot separation from neighboring residential uses, is achieved. The proposed area formerly housed animal exhibits for the Wildlife Discovery Center.

- 4. Elawa Farm is a one of a kind community resource. There are no comparable conditions or uses on other properties in the same zoning district.
- 5. The variances, if granted, will not create conditions that will be injurious to the use or enjoyment of surrounding properties because of the significant distance separating the animal structures from neighboring homes.
- 6. No evidence has been submitted to suggest that allowing the structures necessary to protect and shelter a limited number of farm animals will diminish property values in the area.
- 7. The hardship and practical difficulty in siting the new structures in conformance with current setback requirements is based on the layout of the original Gentleman's Farm long before current Code requirements and development of the surrounding area. The farm animals are proposed in the available area on the farm, the area where previous animal displays were located.


#### Public Comment

Public notice of this hearing was mailed to residents and property owners in the surrounding area. Legal notice of the hearing was published in a newspaper of local circulation and the agenda was posted at four public locations and on the City's website. As of the date of this writing, no correspondence or contacts have been received regarding the requested variance.


#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Based on the findings presented above, recommend approval to the City Council of variances to allow three small farm structures that will house a limited number of farm animals to be located in the area previously occupied by Wildlife Discovery Center animals.

- > A goat barn no closer than 53 feet to the south property line.
- > Duck and chicken coops no closer than 21 feet to the south property line.

Dear Chairman Bass and Members of the Zoning Board of Appeals,

Elawa Farm Foundation is requesting consideration of a variance to construct small-scale structures to accommodate our farm animal program within the zoning setback.

In July 2023, we received approval from the Zoning Board of Appeals to revise our Special Use Permit to backfill programs vacated by Wildlife Discovery Center (WDC). Included in this approval was the addition of a small-scale farm animal program.

The farm animal program will be limited to:

- Up to 8 female goats, 12 female hens, and 12 female ducks
- No roosters, uncastrated male goats, or male ducks
- Breed selections that are quiet and friendly in nature, tolerant of Midwestern cold and heat, and produce manure that is not odorous
- Daytime viewing only by the public

Our farm animal program will be located in the former outdoor animal exhibit area of WDC on the southwest corner of the property. This free program will provide enjoyment and education for the Lake Forest community, including families and children. Residents can visit and tour the animal area for free, as well as participate in planned programs like summer camp, animal meet & greets, egg collection, and goat yoga.

To shelter domesticated farm animals in a safe and humane manner, we need to construct small structures to house them. Based on the needs of the animals, these structures will be appropriate for their space requirements, year-round housing, and protection from predators.

For the goat program, we are recommending a fully enclosed small barn structure to meet their needs, while offering public viewing inside and around the structure.

Details of the goat barn structure include:

- 24'l x 24'w x 14.5'h enclosed structure This size allows for adequate space for up to 8 goats, storage for hay and supplies, and an 8' central pathway for visitors.
- The goat paddock/pasture area will be 1,344 square feet and to the east of the barn structure.
- The foundation of the structure will be ADA compliant crushed gravel. The structure will be reinforced with concrete footings.
- The setback of the barn structure will be in line with existing Caretaker's Cottage at 52 feet off the southern property line. Lake Forest Open Lands' prairie, preserved open space, is located just to the south.

The chicken and duck areas will be located to the south of the goat barn structure in the same area. For the chicken coop and run, we will use our existing structure. This structure will be moved from its former location on the east side of the original farm structures, south of the established gardens, to the southwest corner of property, next to goat barn. The coop structure is 8'l x 9'w x 8' h. Adjacent to the coop is a 144 square foot run, or pasture. The run is fully enclosed to protect from predators.


For the duck program, we will construct a fully enclosed shelter, pond, and run. The enclosed shelter area will be  $12'I \times 7'w \times 8'h$ , with a 228 square foot enclosed run with pond adjacent to the structure. This structure and run will be fully enclosed to protect from predators.

Thank you for your consideration of our variance request. We believe the farm animal program at Elawa Farm will be enjoyed by many Lake Forest residents, while being respectful to our adjacent neighbors.



#### Summary of the Request

This is a request for consideration of an update to the Special Use Permit ("SUP") that was approved for the Gorton Community Center in 1998 to allow at that time, a significant expansion of what is today, the Gorton Center. The 1998 SUP has little detail and does not provide an overview of the activities permitted on the site or establish any parameters for activities or events. Much like Elawa Farm, the uses and activities that occur at the Gorton Center have evolved overtime. In particular, during the Covid shut down, the Gorton Center experimented with outdoor activities to allow community members to gather safely. Although the level of outdoor activities hosted by the Gorton Center has declined from the numbers seen during Covid, the desire to continue to offer outdoor activities, concerts, films, and other events periodically throughout the spring, summer, and fall is in direct response to community interest and requests.

Importantly, an update to the SUP at this time will put in place some parameters for events and activities at the Gorton Center. The current SUP establishes *no* such parameters.

The update to the SUP now proposed is intended to document the range of uses that occur at Gorton, establish some parameters for use as determined to be appropriate recognizing that Gorton is located adjacent to single family homes, and to provide clarity for all stakeholders. Although the parameters established through this update may not be perfect for any of the stakeholders, as some members of the Board are aware, SUPs and the associated parameters often need to be revisited and modified from time to time. Elawa Farm is a great example of how uses and an SUP can evolve. Challenges at Elawa were addressed through several updates to the SUP and today, Elawa Farm is thriving, and the interests of various stakeholders appear to be fairly well balanced.

Gorton Center, like many other non-residential community oriented uses in Lake Forest, is located in a residential zoning district and adjacent to (to the north and east) and across the street from (to the south) single family residences. Many of the homes, garages and outbuildings in the area were constructed long before current zoning setback requirements and as a result, structures in this neighborhood are in close proximity to each other. Historically, Gorton was an elementary school, a use which generates a significant amount of activity. As briefly described below, extraordinary community efforts have preserved this important historic building. Permitting and supporting adaptive reuse of the building is critical to the ability to preserve, maintain, and update the building long into the future. The SUP process has been used in Lake Forest for decades to support adaptive reuse of structures that, like the Gorton building, are part of the fabric of the community.

# **Brief History**

Like Elawa Farm, Gorton is owned by the City of Lake Forest and exists today because of the commitment of past and present Lake Forest residents who rallied on more than one occasion to preserve and adaptively reuse the building and site for the benefit of the community. Gorton School was closed in 1971 after a unanimous vote by the District 67 Board to do so. The school building stood vacant for a year and a half until local residents, led by Mr. and Mrs. H. Brooks, saved the building from demolition and the "Gorton Community Center" was created and as described at that time, was opened for community meetings.

In 2010, the community again rallied and today, the Gorton Center, is thriving and as envisioned by forward thinking residents in the early 1970's, is one of the many treasures in the community.

# Board Review of this Petition to Date

The Zoning Board of Appeals opened the public hearing on this petition in December 2023. The Board heard a presentation from Gorton Center representatives, received written and verbal public comment, and received a report from City staff. After discussion and deliberation, the Board voted to continue consideration of the petition and requested some additional detail on the range of events currently held at the Gorton Center, some specifics around the frequency and activity associated with the various events, and high level information on the relationship between the events and Gorton's financial viability. As the Board is aware, the economics of any stakeholder, petitioner or neighbor, are not under the Board's purview. As background information, the Lease Agreement between the City and the Gorton Center is included in the Board's packet. Again, the Lease is not under the purview of the Board but is provided to offer some additional background.

# <u>Overview</u>

Why is an update to the SUP appropriate at this time?

As noted above, Gorton has evolved over time and as a non-residential use in a residential zoning district, a community center must be authorized by a Special Use Permit. An update to the Gorton SUP is long overdue. An updated SUP will provide clarity and clear authorization for the variety of activities that occur at the site and set some limitations for the benefit of the neighboring residents and the larger community. The City has been remiss in not initiating an update sooner.

What has changed at the Gorton Center over the years?

To remain viable, the Gorton Center continuously explores new opportunities to provide engaging, educational, entertaining, and fun activities for all ages while at the same time, remaining financially viable. During the pandemic, Gorton pivoted to outdoor activities in the parking lot including movies, musical events, and community celebrations of various types. These activities were well received and continue today on a more limited basis than during the pandemic, but the outdoor activities have become a Gorton Center tradition.

The City, in conjunction with the Gorton Center, is proposing to replace and enlarge the terrace at the northwest corner of the building. This terrace, as an expanded outdoor space, is located close to neighboring residential properties, within about 20 feet. Use of the terrace should be limited to lower intensity activities without amplified sound. (Amplified sound is defined later in this report.) The terrace entrance should not be used as a location for deliveries, event setup, or as a service entrance.

Why should there be any limits or parameters for activities that take place at the Gorton Center?

Special Uses, non-residential uses in residential zoning districts, are not permitted outright and require special review, a public hearing, and in almost every case are limited by conditions and operational parameters. This is true for churches,

the College, the hospital, private clubs, Ragdale, Grove Campus, and Elawa Farm.

How is the Gorton Center similar to or different from other Special Uses in the community?

Like some other Special Uses in the community, Ragdale, Grove Campus, and Elawa Farm, Gorton Center is a tenant in a City owned historic building. The City itself does not have uses for these historic structures but the buildings are able to be preserved as community resource because of the efforts of not for profit groups to use these facilities to provide unique community centered uses. Uses that benefit the overall community for the long term.

Like some other Special Uses such as Elawa Farm, the Winter Club, and Lake Forest College, from time to time, events are held at these facilities that bring activity, vehicles, and noise to the surrounding neighborhood. For the most part, the surrounding homes have for many decades co-existed with these nonresidential uses experiencing impacts at times which are mitigated and limited by parameters detailed in each SUP.

Unlike many of the other non-residential uses in the community, the Gorton Center is located at the edge of a residential neighborhood. It is at a point of transition between more intense uses, the Central Business District, public parking lots, and the railroad tracks, which all generate activity and noise, and the residential neighborhoods.

# **Recommended Permitted Activities**

# Indoor Activities

On a daily basis Gorton Center is a busy place with a multitude of different activities occurring at any one time and throughout the day and evening hours. Gorton Center is constantly exploring new opportunities to meet the needs and interests of the community. Recognizing the need for the Gorton Center to be flexible and responsive, the permitted activities listed below are intended to define the overall character and type of activities with the understanding that not all specific activities may be called out. The Indoor Activities are classified in three ways: 1) <u>Community activities</u>: managed, planned, and organized by Gorton and open to the public including both ticketed and non-ticketed events and activities. 2) <u>Tenant activities</u>: managed, planned, and organized by tenants that hold ongoing leases for space in the building. 3) <u>Private rentals</u>: single event parties, celebrations, memorials, funerals, and gatherings hosted by private individuals not open to the public.

# Community and Tenant Activities

- 1. The range of activities permitted on a daily basis include the following and other activities that are determined by the City to be similar in nature, intensity, and impact.
  - a. Classes, programs, meetings, childcare and preschool, lectures, camps, theatrical and musical productions and youth programs.
  - b. Ongoing leasing of space to various not for profit community groups and individuals offering classes and programs.
  - c. Community events.

# Private Rentals

- 2. Private rental of various spaces inside the Gorton Center building for single day or single evening events is permitted for the following activities and other activities that are determined by the City to be similar in nature, intensity, and impact.
  - a. Parties, celebrations, funerals and memorials, meetings.

# Outdoor Activities

The Gorton Center offers a range of outdoor activities which are held in the parking lot on the Gorton Center site and on the City owned grassy area just to the north of the parking lot. The Outdoor Activities are for the most part managed, planned, and organized by Gorton with a few outdoor activities hosted by local not for profit groups such as the GLASA Walk/Run.

A temporary stage or platform is set up along the south side of the parking lot, facing north, during the summer months to support the outdoor activities. Locating the stage facing either east or south would direct amplified sound toward the neighboring properties. Locating the stage facing west, with the stage backing up to the Gorton building, limits emergency access and general ingress and egress to the building. Optimally, the stage, or at least the speakers on the stage should be directed slightly to the northwest, with the stage along the south property line, but slightly angled to direct sound toward the railroad tracks and the Central Business District.

As noted in the statement submitted by the Gorton Center, all outdoor events end by 10 p.m.

There is an outdoor playground near the northeast corner of the building. This area is not accessible to the public and is used by children attending the Children's Learning Center located on the first floor in the northwest corner of the building.

As noted above, plans are moving forward to replace the terrace at the northwest corner of the building. The terrace should be limited to low intensity, passive uses.

# Recommended Conditions of Approval

- 1. Parking. Employee, tenants, and users of Gorton Center should be directed to park in the on site lot or in the public City owned parking lots in the area, to the north and to the west. Parking on neighboring residential streets is not permitted.
- 2. End time. Private rental events in the Stuart or Nagel Rooms shall end by midnight. Loitering in the parking lot after events is not permitted. No overnight activity is permitted in the building without prior authorization from the City.
- 3. Indoor Amplified Sound<sup>\*</sup>. When feasible, sound systems installed in spaces at the Gorton Center should be used for private events instead of large speakers brought in by vendors. Current technology allows rooms to be equipped with multiple, smaller speakers to distribute sound evenly throughout the room without the need for excessive volumes to mitigate noise outside the building and impacts on neighboring residents. (As future upgrades occur at the Gorton Center, consideration should be given to enhancing the sound system in the Stuart room.)
  - a. During activities and events, windows on the north wall of the Stuart room and the doors at and near the northwest corner of the building in the Stuart and Nagel Rooms, shall remain closed to mitigate noise impacts on neighboring residents to the north. (In addition, the building is climate controlled and the efficiency of the system is enhanced by keeping the windows and doors closed.)
  - b. No amplified sound\* is permitted on the outdoor terrace off of the Stuart and Nagel Rooms.
  - c. In compliance with the City Code, sound levels and bass levels shall be kept at reasonable levels to minimize impacts beyond the property lines.
- 4. Outdoor Amplified Sound. No more than 15 outdoor evening events with amplified sound\* are permitted to be held on the site on an annual basis. Amplified\* events shall end no later than 10 p.m. and shall not be held on consecutive evenings except that outdoor movies may be held on

consecutive evenings up to four times a year with each consecutive night counting as one. Clean up should be completed by 10:30 pm and no loitering on the site is permitted after that time.

- a. To the extent possible, outdoor speakers should be directed to the northwest to minimize noise impacts on neighboring residential properties.
- b. In compliance with the City Code, sound levels and bass levels shall be kept at reasonable levels to minimize impacts beyond the property lines.
- 5. Entering/Exiting the Building. The entrances on the west and south facing elevations only shall be used for deliveries, setup for activities, and for employee, patron, and event attendee ingress and egress.
- 6. Capacity. The posted capacity of specific areas of the building and the overall capacity of the building as established by City Life Safety Officials based on applicable Code limitations shall not be exceeded.
- 7. Smoking. No smoking is permitted in the building or outside within 25 feet of any part of the building or neighboring residential properties. This prohibition includes the terrace and corridor on the north side of the building adjacent to the residential properties to the north.
- 8. Event Management. A Gorton Center employee, designated as an Event Manager, shall be on site for the duration of all private rental events and until all guests, hosts and service providers have left the site. The Event Manager shall be responsible for assuring that all conditions of the SUP are adhered to including, but not limited to room capacity, noise levels, assuring that windows and doors remain closed, proper doors are used for entering and exiting the building, enforcing smoking limitations, and assuring that gathering or loitering in the parking lot or around the building is not occurring.
- 9. Temporary Stage. Seasonally, a temporary stage or platform may be erected along the south property line, near the driveway exit to Illinois Road. To the extent possible, the stage, or at least any speakers on the stage, should be angled slightly to the northwest to minimize noise impacts on the surrounding residential neighborhood.
- 10. Signage. Any new signage shall be subject to review and approval by the City with the exception of temporary signage for specific events which may be put in place on the day of events.

11. Temporary Lighting. Lighting for evening events shall be shielded and directed away from neighboring homes.

\* For the purposes of this SUP, "amplified sound" is defined as music, voices, or pre-recorded sound that is ongoing continuously or intermittently for a period of 30 minutes or longer the volume of which is increased through electronic means that make it audible at or beyond the property lines.

# Public Comment

Public notice of this petition was published in a local newspaper. Notice was mailed by the Community Development Department to surrounding properties and the agenda for the meeting was posted at public locations and on the City's website.

The written testimony received prior to and at the December meeting is again included in the Board's packet. To date, no additional correspondence has been received since that meeting.

## **Staff Recommendation**

Recommend approval of updates to the Gorton Center Special Use Permit as detailed above based on the following findings.


# Findings


- On an ongoing basis, Gorton Center has offered a wide range of activities to the community. These activities subject to the conditions recommended above, will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, comfort, or general welfare of the residents and general public. The majority of activities at the Gorton Center occur wholly within the building with no impact on the surrounding area. Like other Special Uses in the community, periodic outdoor activities and indoor rental activities are held. The conditions detailed above will mitigate impacts from those activities on surrounding properties. No parameters or limitations pertaining to these activities currently exist.
- 2. No significant change in the numbers or types of activities currently held at the Gorton Center is proposed.
- 3. The Gorton Center is a unique community asset not unlike Elawa Farm, the Winter Club, the College, and other uses. Non-residential uses are commonly found imbedded in residential zoning districts throughout the community. Conditions of the various Special Use Permits regulate the activities recognizing the proximity to neighboring homes. Gorton Center adds value and distinction to the community and as limited by the conditions of approval as recommended, will not impede the normal and

orderly use or enjoyment of properties in the surrounding areas for the uses already permitted.

- 4. Ongoing adaptive reuse of the historic Gorton building, which was originally an elementary school, furthers the goal expressed by the community on more than one occasion of preserving the building. Maintaining a viable use in the building is essential if it is to be preserved and continue to contribute to the community's character and quality of life by providing a gathering space and activities for people of various ages and interests.
- 5. No evidence has been submitted to demonstrate that the continuation of current activities and the addition over time of similar activities will substantially diminish property values in the neighborhood. In fact, the relationship between this non-residential building and use and the surrounding homes and structures, many of which predate current zoning setback requirements, has existed for many decades with no evidence of a negative impact on the attractiveness of this neighborhood to either existing residents or potential buyers.
- 6. The proposed replacement and enlargement of the existing terrace located at the northwest corner of the building will require review and approval by the City's Historic Preservation Commission.
- 7. Adequate utilities, roads and drainage facilities are already available to the site. The planned replacement of the terrace will incorporate stormwater management improvements to address current on site drainage issues at the northwest corner of the building and along the north side of the building, an area where overland flows naturally occur due to the original topography of the area.
- 8. There are sufficient public parking lots on the site and within walking distance to accommodate employees, tenants, and participants without the need to park on nearby streets avoiding congestion and safety concerns in the surrounding area due to limited sightlines.
- The activities at the Gorton Center will be consistent with all applicable City regulations for the GR-3 zoning district except as otherwise authorized or limited by the Special Use Permit.

#### An Ordinance 1998-10 Granting a Special Use Permit for Expansion of Property Located at 400 E. Illinois Road

WHEREAS, the City of Lake Forest, owner, and the Gorton Community Center, occupant, of the property located at 400 E. Illinois Road, legally described as follows:

Lots 2, 3, 4, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 in W. S. Johnston's Estate Subdivision according to the plat thereof recorded as Document No. 68247 on July 1, 1897, in the north ½ Section 33, Township 44 North, Range 12 East of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Principal Meridian, City of Lake Forest, Lake County, Illinois.

WHEREAS, in accordance with an ordinance dated April 21, 1979, amending Chapter 27 of the City Code of the City of Lake Forest, 1971 as amended, the Gorton Community Center Commission was created.

WHEREAS, the City of Lake Forest and the Gorton Community Center, have submitted a petition for a special use permit as authorized by the regulations of 46-24 of the Lake Forest Zoning Code, and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Board of Appeals of The City of Lake Forest held a public hearing on January 26, 1998, to review the petition for a special use permit as provided by law, and submitted to the City Council a report of its findings, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A, recommending the enactment of an ordinance granting the requested special use permit subject to conditions; and

WHEREAS, the City Council concurs with the findings of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKE FOREST, ILLINOIS:

<u>Section 1</u>: A special use permit as required by Section 46-24 of the Lake Forest Zoning Code is hereby granted to allow the expansion of the Gorton Community Center in accordance with the site plan attached as Exhibit C subject to the conditions as set forth in the attached Exhibit B.

Section 2: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

#### EXHIBIT A FINDINGS

- 1. The Special Use Permit is requested to allow the expansion of the Gorton Community Center. The primary purpose of the proposed expansion is to accommodate improvements required to meet the Americans with Disabilities Act, upgrade existing space, and provide sufficient space for current users of the building. The Special Use Permit will allow improvements to be made to the building from a life safety perspective. The Special Use Permit will allow a continuation of current operations at the Gorton Community Center with improved facilities which will promote public safety. The proposed renovation and expansion will not be detrimental to public health, morals, or general welfare.
- 2. The Gorton Community Center has had a dominant presence in the neighborhood for nearly 100 years. The proposed expansion will represent a change for the adjacent residential properties in that there will be an increase of the bulk of the structure on the north side. Balancing that impact is the fact that a clean-up of the neglected north facade and property line area will occur. Aging mechanical equipment currently exposed on the top of the one-story building will be eliminated and equipment will be concealed by the new structure. The unattractive existing one-story addition will be demolished. Above ground utility lines will be buried, a new fence will be installed along the property line and evergreen landscaping will be offered to adjacent neighbors, all significant improvements over the existing condition. Recognizing the existing condition, the proposed improvements together with the impact of the proposed addition will not result in an overall reduction in the use and enjoyment of the neighboring properties and in fact may improve upon the current situation.
- 3. The Board has received expert testimony that the proposed expansion that would be authorized by the Special Use Permit will not substantially diminish property values within the neighborhood.
- 4. A demonstrated public benefit is derived from the Gorton Community Center as evidenced by its over 20 year presence in the community and continued community support of its operations and use of the programs offered by the Center. The Special Use Permit will serve a public need by providing upgraded and accessible facilities and sufficient space for current programs and operations.
- 5. The neighborhood surrounding the Gorton Community Center is well established. The expansion of the Center will not impede development in this area. The high quality addition to the Gorton building will improve the appearance of the building from the north and east and could serve as a catalyst for other property improvements in the area.
- 6. The exterior architectural appearance of the proposed addition is compatible with the existing historic Gorton building in overall architectural style, detailing and high quality materials. The addition will represent an improvement over the existing structure that will be demolished. the Building Review Board has reviewed and approved the proposed addition.



- 7. Adequate utilities, access, and drainage are already provided to the site.
- 8. On-site circulation changes and parking reconfiguration will improve traffic flow on the property and in doing so will help to reduce traffic congestion on the surrounding public streets. In addition, the City plan to provide a driveway connection between the Gorton Center parking area and the northern parking lot will improve on-site traffic flow, encourage off street parking to alleviate congestion on Illinois and McKinley Roads and with appropriate landscaping and screening, will not negatively impact the neighboring properties.
- 9. The expansion of the Gorton Community Center will conform to all applicable rules and regulations of the GR-3 zoning district unless such regulations are modified by City Council.

#### EXHIBIT B CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

- 1. A landscape plan for the overall Gorton Community Center site shall be reviewed and approved by the City Arborist prior to the issuance of any building permits.
- 2. Overhead utilities shall be placed underground to the maximum extent possible at the expense of the Gorton Community Center.
- 3. Evergreen plantings shall be offered, at the expense of the Gorton Community Center, to the properties immediately adjacent to the Gorton Community Center for placement on the rear portions of their properties for the purpose of providing a visual screen and buffering near the property line.

Dear Chairman Bass and members of the Zoning Board of Appeals,

Gorton Center has been asked by the City to submit a revision to Gorton's recent request for an updated Special Use Permit (SUP). The current special use permit was created years ago for different purposes (to expand the building on the north side in the late 90's). It is useful for Gorton and the City to have an SUP that is more in line with the kinds of SUPs in place with other organizations within the City. Gorton has reviewed a number of these, and respectfully submits the following for consideration.

The Operating Agreement Between Gorton and the City

Gorton has a long-term use agreement with the City that describes permissible operations including but not limited to the following (GORTON/CITY AGREEMENT page 5 section 5A)

a. During the term of this agreement (until July 2046) Gorton Community Center shall operate the property as a community center and uses consistent with GCC's historic use of the property since 1974 as a community center, subject to the terms and conditions of this agreement. In connection with the community center operation, space upon the property may be used and occupied for:

*i.* Community service, charitable and other similar purposes that serve the Lake Forest and Lake Bluff communities:

*ii.* Cultural, recreational, and educational activities for the enjoyment and benefit of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff residents of all ages:

*iii.* Facilities in support of community activities, services, and other not-forprofit groups and organizations affiliated with the Lake Forest and Lake Bluff communities;

- iv. GCC's office functions, activities, and programs:
- v. the drop-in center (now called the Children's Learning Center): and
- vi. such other uses that the City may otherwise approve.

During the term of this agreement, GCC shall continue to operate the drop-in center (now called the Children's Learning Center) and to obtain and maintain all required licenses and certifications therefore, unless the city otherwise consents in writing.

Gorton has operated for years in conformity with this agreement and in compliance with City ordinances. Given the language in the use agreement already in place, and in line with Gorton's current and historical normal course operations, Gorton is presenting the following additional detail to be included in an SUP with respect to newer outdoor operations.

### Programs and Events

Gorton has been occasionally producing "amplified" events outdoors since the summer of 2020 when we had no other means of bringing our communities together, and has now done so successfully for four summers. Being a destination for live music is a central aspect of what Gorton offers to our patrons, both indoors and outside.

Enclosed with this letter are PDFs of Gorton's THE WINDOW newsletters and postcards send to all households in Lake Forest and Lake Bluff in 2023. We hope this helps give information about the kinds of classes, films and events are happening at Gorton every day. Having these events at Gorton works within Gorton's mission and vision and is seen by its patrons as an extension of building activities, so having them at Gorton is an important part of the overall goal for these events.

Communication about outdoor events goes out to our neighbors at the start of each summer, and feedback received from patrons attending these activities has been positive and robust. Each year, the list of activities happening outdoors are shared with the City, and disseminated to all pertinent City staff using their procedures, including police and fire.

All of Gorton's interior spaces have fire code related capacity limits, and all events adhere to these limits. All event rentals are agreed upon in writing with an event rental contract that states capacity limits. Patrons who rent and don't follow the rules are not allowed to rent again at Gorton. Lake Forest Police and Fire are knowledgeable about building capacity.

Gorton has recently updated all website and other written materials to encourage patrons not to park along Illinois Road, and would be in favor of the City making the section of Illinois Road adjacent to Gorton a permanent no parking zone. Gorton also regularly informs the City when events are expected to utilize the lot north of Gorton or any other City-owned lots.

It should also be noted that while everything at Gorton is programmed for the benefit of the citizens of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff and with their interests in mind, Gorton welcomes visitors from outside of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff for many activities. While the majority of patrons at Gorton are from Lake Forest and Lake Bluff, the building is utilized by patrons from greater Lake County and the North Shore and the entire Chicagoland region. This is a benefit both for Gorton and for the City, as these patrons also visit and spend money at shops and restaurants while in town. Tickets purchased to events by those living outside of Lake Forest and Lake Bluff help subsidize the overall event and allow us to offer programs that serve only Lake Forest and Lake Bluff residents. For example, Gorton's 2024 budget, recently approved by the City Council, reflects anticipated revenue from programs and events of \$663,249, generating income after expenses of \$303,623. Gorton's 2024 budget anticipates that overall, Gorton will operate at essentially breakeven, with income of \$11,792. If Gorton's ability to offer programs and events, including outdoor events, were to be constrained, it would need to limit its programs significantly. It merits mentioning that in approving the Gorton budget, the City Council fully embraced Gorton's vision for its future and applauded its growth and emergence from its past financial difficulties. Gorton's anticipated revenues from programs and events was a material element of the budget approved by the City Council.





SUP Language for Gorton's Outdoor Events

Gorton proposes the following provisions for the revised SUP.

a. Gorton utilizes the parking lot of the building located at 400 E. Illinois Road for patron parking, as well as the lot north of the center at McKinley and Deerpath roads, which is reported to the City in advance of an overflow event to the north lot. Gorton also utilizes the building parking lot for community education and gatherings such as (but not limited to):

i. Camps during daytime hours

ii. Classes when an outdoor space would be more appropriate and useful, including use of the grassy space on the north side of the parking lot, during daytime hours

- iii. Community events during daytime and evening hours
- iv. Outdoor concerts and film screenings during daytime and evening hours
- v. Rentals to outside groups and individuals such as GLASA's annual 5K, group gatherings that require outdoor space
- vi. Support for theatrical productions on the south side of the building near the loading dock for the theater

b. All events (produced by Gorton or event rentals) are required by Gorton to be managed onsite by Gorton employees. These employees monitor capacity limits, agreed upon parameters, and ending times, and employees also ensure that patrons do not loiter after an event has ended.

c. Deliveries for these events are scheduled prior to and managed by Gorton personnel utilizing the western or southern doors of the building, and are arranged to avoid interfering with other events happening in the building.

d. Many of the outdoor events are unamplified or utilize only one microphone for brief speeches given at the event, and take place during daytime hours and end before 5 p.m. All outdoor events of any kind end by 10 p.m. "Amplified" outdoor events are defined as any event at which electronic means are used to increase or enhance sound to broadcast a band or other performance related presentation. Amplified events taking place after 5pm will not exceed 15 a year in number. The capacity for events held outdoors at Gorton cannot exceed 600 people. The sound level at such events will be held at reasonable levels and in compliance with any local or state ordinances.

For all events at Gorton, indoors or outside, that serve alcohol, sales of the alcohol shall end 30 minutes prior to the scheduled end of the event. Gorton shall hold all required state and local alcohol permits for Gorton events, and when a liquor license is required for an event held by an outside party, it must be obtained as required by law.



Gorton Center has an outdoor gross motor space and playground on the northeast side of the building for use by the Children's Learning Center. It is not accessible to the public and is only used during times when the center is open to children at the center.

Management of the Impact of Sound

Title XV, Chapter 159, Section 159.045(E) of the Lake Forest City Code sets forth the findings necessary to approve an SUP. There are eight elements ranging from the need for adequate utilities to architectural appearance. Gorton meets all of these requirements and believes that the only element of the Code that merits consideration is the requirement that the use "will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity." This requirement is met as well.

Gorton's operations do not impact the "immediate vicinity." Only one neighbor complained about sound at the last meeting, while a second mentioned parking (a complaint with which Gorton agrees).<sup>1</sup> But, the sound issue is addressed by limiting the number of outdoor events and the requirement that sound levels will be reasonable. Moreover, with respect to indoor events, sound studies have shown sound that bleeds outdoors from the Stuart Community Room is the same or quieter than existing ambient sound in the area. As a tenant of the building, Gorton would welcome future sound protection investments by the City to the windows, fences, landscaping, or other similar elements to further deaden any potential indoor sound from bleeding outdoors. And, as Gorton looks to make further technological capital improvements, care will be taken to maximize control over sound in the Stuart Room and on the outdoor stage. In the meantime, Gorton will install signage that requires the door to the exterior of the Stuart Community Room to remain closed (and not allowed to be propped open) during events and programs.

Gorton is honored to bring events and activities to Lake Forest that no one else provides and that strengthen and enrich our community as well as providing a positive economic effect on the City as a whole. The Zoning Board's task is to balance the needs of the Community with the impact of Gorton's activities on its neighbors. Gorton believes this proposal achieves that balance.

Thank you to the zoning board for reviewing these materials and this request.
