



LAKE FOREST

As we return from summer vacations, summer camps and gear up for a busy fall, I'd like to take an opportunity to thank the City staff, our local businesses and non-profit organizations in town for keeping us busy at the July 4 Festival & Fireworks, Lake Forest Day, Thursday evening Concerts in the Square, the Farmers' Market, and the Forest Park Ground Breaking. The City's next big event is, of course, the BMW Golf Championship at Conway Farms Golf Club, beginning on September 9, when we are host to over

100,000 visitors and spectators. The tournament raises between \$1-2 million for the Evans Scholarship Foundation, and we are thrilled to play such an important role as we welcome this extraordinary golf event to our City.

There will be much activity continuing as we enter the fall season. Northwestern Lake Forest Hospital began the first phase of its revitalization with the construction of the new entrance road from Rte. 41. This much-needed improvement project will allow for direct access to the Hospital campus from Rte. 41, helping to circulate traffic around the campus while also reducing traffic congestion at Rte. 41 and Deerpath.

Capital projects also continue around town. After receiving a \$1.2 million grant for the east side train station, the City will resume with the rehabilitation of the building. This historic site serves not only as an active train station, but as a focal point and gathering place for events such as the Farmers' Market, a bicycle route and a running club hub. We are still working with Amtrak and Metra to establish an Amtrak stop and pedestrian underpass at the Telegraph Road train station. Additionally, infrastructure work has begun at Forest Park. Throughout next summer, residents will begin to see restoration and enhancements take place at Lake Forest's oldest and most unique park, which will enhance the experience by all those visiting this beautiful area.

In addition, the City is actively pursuing proposals for the revitalization of the 10-acre Laurel Avenue property. The City Council will soon consider the conditions necessary for establishing a Tax Increment Finance District (TIF), a fiscally-responsible redevelopment program which has served Lake Forest with great success in the past.

As always, I, along with the City Council welcome your ideas and input on issues important to our community.

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The City Council approved the Bicycle Master Plan on June 3, 2013. The primary goals of the Plan are to generate awareness of bicycling in Lake Forest, to identify key routes for bicyclists and to prioritize infrastructure improvements for the long term. For more information, a copy of the Master Plan is available on the City's website, which will periodically be updated with information encouraging bicycling, promoting bicycle safety and bicycle-related improvements in the community. Planning for regional connections is an important component of the Master Plan. Last May, the Lake Forest Police Department held the Bike Rodeo for kids and their families. 175 children participated in the obstacle course set up in the parking lot at the corner of Oakwood Avenue and Deerpath. During this annual event, Police Officers also check each bike for safety and teach safety and bike skills. Each child is eligible to win a brand new bicycle donated by the Police Department.

Lake Forest recently partnered with the League of Illinois Bicyclists to design and produce "Bike to Metra" brochures to promote bicycling in Lake Forest for commuters and visitors. 80% of the initiative was funded by Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) funds. The brochures are available at Metra train stations and provide tips for bicycle commuting and offers suggested routes to both Lake Forest train stations.

 A new Student Residence Hall on the South Campus of Lake Forest College will open to students this fall. The new Hall offers state-of-the-art living space, student amenities, and includes a rain garden, an innovative way to manage stormwater runoff, improve water quality and provide a uniquely-landscaped open space.

NORTHWESTERN LF HOSPITAL

Since City Council approval of the Master Plan for the revitalized Hospital campus last fall, the Hospital has worked to develop a detailed site plan, architectural plans, a landscape, lighting and signage plans. The Advisory Committee, made up of residents with expertise in a variety of development-related fields, is guiding and advising the Hospital during the design-development process to assure that the project is moving in a direction consistent with City approvals. This fall, as plans are completed, the Hospital will present the plans for public review and comment at community drop-in sessions.

LAUREL AVENUE REDEVELOPMENT

Over the summer, the Plan Commission began review of the parameters developed in 2008 to better align the guidelines with current development trends, developer interest, and most importantly, with a focus on redevelopment in a manner that is in the best long interest of the overall community. The Plan Commission is expected to make recommendations to the City Council in September. In the meantime, a new fence was recently installed around the site to improve streetscape views.

Community Engagement Forums

The forums have proven to be excellent opportunities for residents to participate in informal discussions on topics identified in the City's Strategic Plan.

Ald. Jack Reisenberg and the Lake Forest Collaborative for Environmental Leadership engaged residents in a lively conversation on "Our Water: Where does it come from and where does it go?" on July 18. In addition to providing information about the City's fresh water system, the water plant, wastewater and wetlands, the presentation concluded with tips on how Lake Foresters can preserve and conserve water:

- Follow watering restrictions in the summer and consider watering less
- Reduce the amount of fertilizers and pesticides on lawns and gardens
- Consider adding native plants, trees and installing rain barrels
- Install WaterSense plumbing fixtures and irrigation controllers
- Stop leaky toilets, indoor faucets and outdoor faucets

- Do not flush or dump pharmaceuticals or chemicals down drains. Instead, drop them off at the SWALCO event (see page 4).
- Use phosphorus-free detergents

Emerald Ash Borer Update: What Does Green Mean?

The City has begun tagging EAB infested trees with distinctive green tags and ribbons on public and private properties. Ash trees that are declining more than 40% will be identified for removal. Trees tagged on private properties will occur where the greatest threat to public health or safety on public properties exists. Residents will receive a door hanger and a letter by U.S. mail notifying them of trees on their property that are required to be removed. Residents will have 30 days after receipt of the letter to have the tree(s) removed. Trees tagged on City rights-of-way will be removed by City crews or by a licensed contractor hired by the City. Homeowners Associations and neighborhood groups may contact the Forestry Section at 847.810.3563 to learn how the City's EAB Management Plan may affect their neighborhoods and how they can develop their own management plans.



The Mighty and Majestic Oak Tree

Both the City and Lake Forest Open Lands recommend planting one of the varieties of oaks that were once abundant in the area. Of all our native trees, oaks are the most important for the habitat and ecosystem services they provide.

- One oak supports over 500 species of plants and animals as well as a habitat for moths, butterflies and birds.
- Oaks clean our air and water. One oak transpires over 100 gallons of groundwater each day.
- Oaks are climate regulators their transpiration cools the earth during the day and their respiration helps to warm cool nights.
- Oaks grow well in Lake Forest and are droughttolerant once established.
- Myth: oaks are too slow-growing. If you plant a young bur oak, it will quickly catch up to the other trees in your yard.
- An oak tree planted today can live for several hundred years!

YARD WASTE COLLECTION TIPS

City crews will pick up yard waste that is placed in store-brand craft paper bags if a City of Lake Forest yard waste sticker has been placed on the bag. Yard waste bags should be at the curb by 7 a.m. on your collection day. Stickers are \$1 (sold in sheets of five) and may be purchased at Sunset Foods, Jewel, Pasquesi Home & Garden, Lake Forest Hardware, The Fresh Market, City Hall and the Municipal Services Building. **Please do not mix contaminants such as planter containers, dirt, sod or refuse material in with yard waste.**

Reminder: City crews will pick up bundles of brush if a City yard waste sticker has been affixed to each bundle of brush placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on your collection day. There is no limit to the number of bundlers permitted on each collection day. Each branch in the bundle should not exceed six inches in diameter or four feet in length. Multiple branches must be tied in bundles with string or twine. Each bundle should not exceed four feet in length or two feet in width.

For removal of larger amounts of unbundled brush, please contact the Forestry Section at 847.810.3563. There is a fee associated with the collection of unbundled brush or for tree limbs larger than six inches in diameter.

BMW CHAMPIONSHIP TEEING UP

September 9-15 at Conway Farms Golf Club For the first time, Lake Forest will host the 2013 BMW Championship Tournament, drawing the PGA Tour's top golfers to the area for the first time, including Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson, local favorite Luke Donald, 2012 BMW Championship winner Rory McIlroy and 2013 Masters champion Adam Scott. Named "Tournament of the Year" by the PGA Tour last year, the BMW Championship is conducted by the Western Golf Association for the benefit of the Evans Scholars Foundation. Founded in 1899 as the Western Open, the tournament is the second oldest in the U.S. behind the U.S. Open. In addition to raising millions of dollars for the Evans Scholars charity, the BMW Championship is expected to have an estimated economic impact of \$30 million on the North Shore and the surrounding area. The Incubator will provide public good and public benefit by encouraging businesses to grow in the Incubator as well as providing new and emerging business/ technology businesses with an environment to support their start-up phase and increase their likelihood of success.

The Incubator facility includes office space, flexible leases, free WiFi and access to county and state resources. It connects members with existing resources in the community such as the Illinois Small Business Administration, the Career Resource Center, Dickinson Hall, Lake Forest College, Lake County Partners, Lake Forest Bank & Trust and the Sun-Time Digital Media.
