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Crafting a Budget Takes Time

But Results in Lake Forest Have Been Heartening

What does it take to craft a \$121 million budget? Dozens of meetings, a host of workshops, plenty of debate – all over seven months, leaving little time before the process starts again for the next fiscal year.

Welcome to the world of the Finance Department at the City of Lake Forest. Team members' dedication to working on the budget across all four seasons makes sense, given it's hard to think of a process that has a bigger effect on the daily lives of Lake Foresters, whether it involves garbage collection, the quality of road surfaces, maintenance in parks and more.

"It is safe to say that the budget process impacts all residents of Lake Forest, given that it encompasses both the revenue and expenditure side of all services provided by the City," said Elizabeth Holleb, Finance Director for the City of Lake Forest.

Although the Finance Department is responsible for administering the budget development process with guidance from the City Manager, it is a City-wide effort, and staff in all operating departments are engaged and involved in all aspects of the process, which begins each September. After Labor Day, the Finance Department starts to develop the five-year Capital Improvement Program. Revenue projections take place later in the fall, and once those are completed, each department is given a target budget amount based upon forecasted revenues.

The operating budget is discussed from January to March. During this entire process, the City Council Finance Committee holds meetings to review budget components, and a capital budget workshop and an operating budget workshop are held to gather and exchange information. In the spring, the City Council adopts the annual budget, which must be balanced according to state law and City policy, typically at its second meeting in April. The fiscal year begins each May 1.

The reliable, prudent process is a big reason why the City maintains an Aaa bond rating. And others outside of town have noticed the City's budgeting prowess: the Government Finance Officers Association honored Lake Forest with a Triple Crown Award in 2021. Out of about 85,000 units of government in the United States, fewer than 350 achieved the distinction.

"The City Council has a longstanding tradition of conservative budgeting, which reduces the likelihood of mid-year revenue shortfalls that might require budget cuts or could impact service," said Holleb, adding that

in most years, this philosophy has resulted in a year-end operating surplus, which the City Council directs to a high-priority initiative.

The biggest chunk of revenue generated for the budget typically comes from property taxes, which is expected to bring in \$40 million this fiscal year, or around 34 percent of the entire budget. The biggest expense? Capital outlays, which comprise about 27 percent of spending in fiscal year 2024, or \$33.2 million. These outlays often involve large-scale projects, such as the recently completed Burr Oak Area Storm Improvement Project and the upcoming Waukegan Road and Everett Road Intersection Improvements. The City received grants for both projects - \$2.75 million for Burr Oak and \$3.1 million for Waukegan and Everett – to lower local costs (from 2018-2022, the City secured \$17.5 million in grants to save taxpayers money).

The good news for residents who want to know how tax dollars are being spent is that, over the years, the City has offered ways to discover budget information in an accessible format. The condensed Popular Annual Financial Report is intended to avoid the confusion that a 200-page document may



generate. It looks back at how the City performed financially for a completed fiscal year and is based on independently audited financial data. The Budget in Brief provides important information and is forward looking, displaying the budget or plan for revenues and expenses for the upcoming fiscal year. This year, the City launched the Monthly Flash Report so citizens can see how the City is trending compared to the present budget.

In addition to those tools, important financial details can be found on the City of Lake Forest website. Users can access property tax data and information on pension obligations. Residents can even explore the City's financial data with drill-down capabilities to the individual account level. An online check register is available, allowing users to view every single vendor check payment made by the City with check date, amount, vendor name and description.

Since she joined the city in 2012, Holleb has witnessed a number of large changes to budget revenue and expenses. A modified strategy to meet police and fire pension obligations, increases in capital budget needs to maintain all asset categories and continued pressure to balance the budget due to personnel cost increases outpacing revenue growth are the chief ones. She noted the City weathered the COVID pandemic extremely well, as temporary increases in both real estate transfer tax revenue and income tax distributions helped weather budget concerns. On the expense side, though, the City continues to face significant challenges with supply-chain issues impacting purchases and capitalproject bids coming in significantly over budget estimates.

Holleb has been working in municipal finance for 35 years. She appreciates how technological enhancements have made the budget process more efficient.

"When I started in Lake Forest, operating departments were still developing their budget submittals in Excel," she said. "A financial system conversion about five years ago allowed us to move to a much more automated budget development process that has been well received." She noted that artificial intelligence has not yet impacted the City's budget process but is on the horizon. Holleb continues to enjoy the process every year.

"I always learn something, and every budget is different," she said. "It requires us all to think strategically and creatively to ensure that we are using taxpayer money in the most effective and efficient manner."

LAKE FOREST POLICE DEPARTMENT CITIZENS POLICE ACADEMY

For over two decades, the Citizens Police Academy has been a beacon of knowledge and understanding within the Lake Forest community. This cherished program, offered by the Lake Forest Police Department (LFPD), provides an invaluable opportunity for citizens to gain insights into the vital role our police force plays in safeguarding our city. While it doesn't train participants to become police officers, it seeks to foster a deeper appreciation for the multifaceted functions of the LFPD.

A Glimpse Through the "Law Enforcement Lens"

The Citizens Police Academy is an 11-week course that is open to anyone residing or working in Lake Forest who is over 21 years old. This enlightening program is entirely free, and it is designed to offer participants a unique perspective of the world from the standpoint of law enforcement.

A Comprehensive Curriculum

Participants in the Citizens Police Academy are exposed to a wide array of topics, presented by LFPD officers who specialize in these areas. These include an opportunity to ride along with a patrol officer, engaging in police use of force scenarios, and even experiencing the thrill of firing department weapons at the indoor range. In addition to these handson experiences, the curriculum includes in-depth discussions on police legislation, federal actions, and the future trajectory of law enforcement in our community.

Fostering In-Depth Understanding

The course runs on Wednesday evenings from 7 to 10 pm at the Lake Forest Police Station. This convenient schedule makes it accessible to a broad audience. To ensure optimal interaction and learning, the class size is intentionally limited. This allows participants to engage in discussions and gain deeper insights from the officers who lead the program.

New e-Scooter Ordinance

Walk Your Wheels in the Central Business District

On Monday, October 2, 2023, Lake Forest City Council approved an ordinance prohibiting the use of recreational powered devices (electric scooters, electric bikes, etc.) on sidewalks in the Central Business District. Riders must dismount and walk their devices on sidewalks within the Central Business District boundaries to avoid a fine of up to \$300 per offense. Licensed motor vehicle operators with a valid motor vehicle operator's license may operate the device within the street.

Signs have been placed throughout the Central Business District with a reminder of the new regulation. The Lake Forest Police Department is issuing warnings as a courtesy as people adjust to the new regulation and then will begin issuing tickets. As a reminder, bicycles must also be walked on sidewalks in the Central Business District per a previous ordinance.

While there's no perfect solution, we hope that this action will help address community concerns regarding e-scooter safety within the Central Business District.

Adopt-A-Hydrant Fire Department

In the event of a fire emergency during the winter, could firefighters find the hydrant(s) near your home or business?

The Lake Forest Fire Department encourages residents to "adopt a fire hydrant" near their home or business and keep snow shoveled away from them during the winter season. Please make it a point to uncover your fire hydrant(s) after every snowfall. Clear a path approximately 3 feet around the hydrant. These actions will allow the Fire Department to quickly locate the fire hydrant, obtain a water supply for firefighting activities and give the fire department room to work with this hydrant should the need arise.

Please consider helping a neighbor who is elderly or has a medical condition by shoveling out a hydrant in front of their home. This act of kindness will benefit the entire neighborhood.

Water is the principal agent used by the Fire Department to control and extinguish fires. Delays in locating and hooking-up to a fire hydrant can seriously hamper a fire suppression operation, raising the risk of injury and possibly resulting in additional property damage.

The "Adopt a Hydrant" program is an informal program: therefore, it is not necessary to advise the Fire Department about which hydrants you will be keeping clear of snow.

On behalf of the entire Department, thank you for keeping the City of Lake Forest fire hydrants clear of snow and keeping our community safe!

COMPOST & RECYCLING CENTER OPERATING HOURS CHANGE

Located on the south side of Route 60 west of Waukegan Road, Lake Forest residents can drop off yard waste and various unwanted household items for proper disposal at the Compost & Recycling Center.

How does it work?

- Residents using the site must display a current Lake Forest vehicle sticker on their vehicle windshield. Driver's licenses will not be accepted as proof of residency.
- Acceptable items: yard waste, unwanted household items, electronics (computers, printers, DVDs, etc.), batteries, metal cans, glass, newspapers, magazines, plastics (#1-5 and 7), plastic bags, corrugated cardboard, office paper for recycling.
- Unacceptable items: appliances with CFCs, asbestos, paints/ chemicals, tires and food waste.
- Commercial contractor use of this facility is not allowed.

- Monday collection on Tuesday
- Tuesday collection on Wednesday
- Thursday and Friday collections remain the same

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

Throughout the month of January, Christmas trees will be picked up at the curb on regularly scheduled recycling days. To be collected, trees 1) must be free of all lights and ornamentation, 2) must have the tree stand removed, and 3) cannot be in plastic tree bags. Wreaths and garland are not compostable because they contain plastic and metal wires.

CITY GIFT POLICY

The City policy prohibits its employees from accepting gifts (including cash). If you would like to thank an employee, please send a card or letter, which can be placed in the personnel file, or make a donation to charity in the name of the employee or department. Acceptable gifts, like cookies or candy, can be delivered to City buildings to share with all who work throughout the year to provide excellent City services.

Let it Snow Snow Operations

SNOW REMOVAL PRIORITIES

When snow and ice removal need to be prioritized during a big weather event, here's how the City of Lake Forest prioritizes resources:

- City Streets. All City streets and Route 43 from Route 176 to Route 22 and Route 60 from Route 41 to Field Drive.
- 2. City Parking Lots and Train Station Platforms.
- 3. Sidewalks. The first priority is sidewalks along the bike path adjacent to McKinley Road and sidewalks with .25 miles of schools. Second priority is all remaining sidewalks.
- 4. Pedestrian Bridge Sidewalks.
- 5. Compost & Recycling Center.
- 6. West Park Ice Rink.
- 7. Hauling Snow from the Central Business District. The City hauls snow piles to ensure businesses and shoppers have access to parking lots.

NAME A SNOW PLOW CONTEST!

A few other snow-related things to know...

Do NOT Push Snow Back Into Street

When removing snow from your driveway, please do not shove or plow it onto the public roadway. It creates a slippery and hazardous surface for traffic. It also requires that snow plow operators return to replow the road, which diverts resources from other priorities.

Parking After It Snows

After a minimum 2-inch snowfall, parking is not permitted on City maintained roads until snow has been cleared edge to edge. Parked vehicles may be towed at the owner's expense.

Mailbox Replacement Policy

If you believe a City snow plow caused damage to your mailbox, please report the damage by contacting the Public Works Department at (847) 810-3543 or using the "Report a Problem" feature in the Lake Forest Now App within 48 hours of damage.

- 2. No plastic bags. No plastic bags should be among your recyclables.

- **3. No styrofoam.** Styrofoam and #6 plastics are not recyclable.
- **4. No tanglers.** They can damage sorting equipment.
