

WHEREAS, Concord Township has prepared a Comprehensive Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan



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# Project Background

The Concord Township Comprehensive Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan sets forth a blueprint for how the Township can protect and improve its parks, recreation, open space, and environmental resources to enhance the quality of life for current and future Township residents. Changing demographics and growing demand for open space resources have prompted the need to improve facilities and programs, as well as to protect remaining open space and conserve sensitive natural resources. In order to promote the quality of life for future generations, it is necessary not only to assess current needs, but also to provide for future demands.

The underlying purpose of the Plan is to identify opportunities and set priorities for parks and open space enhancements in Concord Township, to guide future decision making and budgeting. It sets forth policy recommendations intended to inform the Township Council of issues and objectives of importance to Concord residents, and of strategies for achieving those objectives.

In pursuit of this goal, the Plan addresses the desire to maintain open space for both passive and active recreation, while planning for future growth. The expectation is that an enhanced park and open space system in the Township will improve the overall quality of life in the community, increase property values, and enhance the attractiveness of Concord Township to new businesses and residents.

The Plan is consistent with prior local planning efforts, and with stated goals of Delaware County and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is in keeping with the Pennsylvania Environmental Rights Amendment (Article 1, Section 27 of the State Constitution) adopted in 1971, which states:

"The people have a right to clean air, pure water, and to the preservation of the natural, scenic, historic, and esthetic values of the environment. Pennsylvania's public natural resources are the common property of all the people, including generations yet to come..."

The Plan sets as long-range policies and priorities. It should remain flexible at all times, to react to changing needs and take advantage of unforeseen opportunities. The Plan's recommendations should continually be re-assessed and updated periodically to reflect current conditions and aspirations.

The Plan should be referred to by the Township Council for guidance on setting priorities, allocating financial resources, and directing staff, volunteers, and outside professionals who may collaborate to implement capital improvements and conservation measures.

# The Importance of Parks and Open Space

There is no question that parks and open space contribute strongly to the quality of life of our communities. Numerous studies have shown that there are significant benefits to conserving open space, as it has the power to attract residents and business, promote tourism, elevate property values, and create a sense of place. More than just a pleasant amenity, high quality open space has direct and indirect economic benefits, such as:

- Increase nearby property values
- Help attract business and commercial development
- Energize economic development and neighborhood revitalization
- Promote health and fitness
- Build community spirit by providing venues to meet and interact with others
- Conserve natural resources and cultural heritage
- Attracts tourism

# **Recent Accomplishments**

In recent years, Concord Township has been diligent in improving recreation opportunities for residents and expanding the inventory of public open space and protected land. Within just the last three years, Concord has preserved more than 125 acres of new land and committed more than \$8 million to open space preservation, trails, and parks. The Township now owns more than 320 acres of open space, which hosts a wide variety of recreation and community activities.

Among many improvements made since 2015, some of the significant accomplishments by the Township to improve facilities and acquire new open space include the following:

- 1. Constructed new recreation facilities at the Municipal Building, including pickleball and bocce courts.
- 2. Established **new walking trails** at Phipps Farm, Bush Hill Farm, Municipal Complex, and Smallwood Preserve.
- 3. Added features to the Township Park including a new playground, dog park, and beach volleyball.
- 4. Preserved many properties for open space, including Smallbrook Preserve, Featherbed Farm, and numerous others, which will provide opportunities for trail connections, passive recreation, and environmental conservation.
- 5. Supported and funded the protection of hundreds of acres in Beaver Valley which aided the expansion of First State National Historical Park.
- **6.** Preserved and **protected many historic buildings**, including the AME Church and Newlin Log Home and Tayern.
- 7. Completed a Township-wide Greenways and Open Space Network Plan in 2016.
- **8.** Planned and acquired funding for the Octoraro Trail, now in final design with construction of initial phases expected in 2023-24.
- 9. Developed a plan for the proposed Garnet Valley Greenway.
- 10. Acquired conservation easements in the Ivy Mills Historic District and for Featherbed Farm.
- 11. Acquired properties in the Brandywine Summit neighborhood on Beaver Valley Road that may serve as a future pocket park.
- **12.** Coordinated with neighboring municipalities Chadds Ford and Bethel Township to explore potential for multi-municipal sidewalk and trail connections.
- 13. Coordinated with Delaware County on potential trail connections to Clayton Park.

# **Planning Context**

This Comprehensive Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan is consistent with and an extension of other recent and ongoing planning initiatives in Concord and the local region. For Concord to achieve its goals in sustaining and enhancing quality of life, it is important that a coherent vision for the future is expressed in public policy. The development of municipal planning documents which are consistent in their objectives is one way that this can happen. Some of the many relevant planning efforts that influence this Plan are listed below. See Appendix i for further information.

#### **Local Concord Township Planning**

Concord Township Recreation & Open Space Plan (1995) and Plan Update (2007)

The 1995 Open Space Plan established the need to balance development with preservation of open space, particularly environmentally and culturally sensitive resources. The plan recognized trails as an important component of community recreation and natural resource conservation and identified the development of a "linear open space system," as an important objective. The 2007 Plan Update documented many of the overriding goals that remain important today, and advocated for a connected open space network.

#### Concord Township Greenways and Open Space Network Plan (2015)

This plan conceives a Township-wide network of public trails and greenway corridors and the potential to connect a wide range of meaningful attractions with a combination of on- and off-street trails which link together in an integrated network.

#### Octoraro Greenway Feasibility Study (2016)

This plan outlines the feasibility of a pedestrian/bicycle greenway along the alignment of the former Octoraro Railroad. This route represents an outstanding opportunity for development of a continuous trail across the entire township, connecting a variety of existing recreational facilities as well as the promise of broader connections to neighboring municipalities.

#### Garnet Valley Greenway Feasibility Study (2020)

In addition to the Octoraro Trail, the Garnet Valley Greenway is envisioned as a paved multi-purpose recreation trail that utilizes a PECO electrical utility right-of-way to connect many major community, civic, and open space destinations, including Clayton Park, Concord Township Park on Smithbridge Road, Garnet Valley schools, the Octoraro Trail itself, and numerous residential neighborhoods.

#### Concord and Chadds Ford Route 1 and Route 202 Area Bike and Pedestrian Study (2020)

Concord partnered with neighboring Chadds Ford Township on this study that promoted multi-circulation with a wide range of recommendations to improve pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure to and along the busy commercial corridors of Route 1 and Route 202.

#### **Delaware County Planning**

#### Natural Heritage Inventory of Delaware County, PA (2011)

This inventory focuses on the best examples living ecological resources in Delaware County, and contains information on the locations of rare, threatened, and endangered species and of the highest quality natural areas in the County. Several locations in Concord Township are highlighted for their ecological value. These are Beaver Valley Woods, Johnsons Corner (Naamans Creek Road), and Clayton Park/Shavertown Woods. (Also see Chapter 2)

#### Delaware County Open Space, Recreation, and Greenway Plan (2015)

The Delaware County Planning Department prepared this Plan to address all facets of parks and recreation planning in the county including municipal, public and private land, and trails. The Plan identifies three overarching goals, which closely reflect those expressed in Concord Township planning documents:

- Conserve the natural and cultural resources of the County
- Enhance the environmental and/or recreational value of the land
- Connect natural features and people through development of a greenway network.

This plan also represents the county's first true Greenway Plan. The Plan identifies 25 Primary Trails within the county, including two within Concord Township, the Octoraro Trail and the "PECO Right-of-Way Trail," which was later rebranded as the Garnet Valley Greenway.


#### Delaware County 2035 (2013)

This Comprehensive Plan for Delaware County establishes an overall vision for the future and provides the County's 49 municipalities with a framework for the strategic use of public resources to improve the quality of life for all its residents. The Open Space, Recreation, and Greenway Plan noted above serves as the open space component plan of *Delaware County 2035*.

#### **Regional and Statewide Planning**

#### Pennsylvania Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (2020-2024)

Pennsylvania's outdoor recreation plan helps to guide strategy for local governments, state government and other outdoor recreation providers. Maintenance of existing park and recreation areas continues to be the top concern of Pennsylvanians. Access to recreation programs is also highly important, as is building more greenways and trails, and protecting existing open space and wildlife habitat. These findings are very consistent with the findings of this Concord Township Comprehensive Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan.






# **Existing Resources**

Concord Township is an active and diverse community, with a thriving commercial corridor, leafy residential subdivisions, abundant parks, vibrant senior citizen community, and an outstanding public school district. The Township experienced a period of rapid development around the turn of the millennium, but the population has stabilized during the past decade and only modest growth is predicted in the coming decades.

# **Township Profile**

Concord Township occupies 13.7 square miles and is situated about 20 miles west of Philadelphia. It is one of the oldest communities in the county, settled in 1660 and incorporated in 1683. It remained largely rural until the post-war period beginning in the 1950s. As suburbanization crept outward from Philadelphia in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, population density increased first in the inner-ring suburbs closest to the city. The outward migration continued in the postwar years. Only in recent decades has significant growth reached the townships in western Delaware County such as Concord, as suburbanization pushed out from Philadelphia and gradually transformed what had been a rural landscape.





Along with neighboring municipalities, Concord Township saw considerable growth in the years surrounding the turn of the millennium. During that period, retail and commercial activity along Baltimore Pike and Wilmington-West Chester Pike increased significantly, and residential subdivisions replaced much of the original farmland. The Township population more than doubled between 1990 and 2010 but has since stabilized and is only expected to grow modestly in coming decades.

Despite the recent significant growth, portions of the original community fabric remain. Historic properties still feature prominently in the local landscape, and century-old development patterns are still very much in evidence. In the face of these development pressures, residents and Township officials have recognized the importance of conserving open space, and the Township has made strides to protect and acquire undeveloped property for future use as public open space and recreation land.

### **Demographics**

The population of Concord Township is 18,295, according to the 2020 U.S. Census. An estimate of future population growth in the Township is made by the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC), which estimates population for all municipalities in the greater Philadelphia region in 10-year increments. Between 2015 and 2045, DVRPC projects continued steady growth in population for Concord Township, more than 14% growth over that time span. A similar rate of population growth is projected for neighboring Chadds Ford, Edgemont, Thornbury and Bethel. Future growth in this western part of the county is expected to greatly outpace that of Delaware County as a whole (4.1% estimated), since areas closer to Philadelphia are more fully built out.

The U.S. Census Bureau also provides statistics that offers a look at how the current population is broken down in terms of age, income, race, and other markers. In general, Concord Township more affluent and less densely populated than the County overall.


- Concord's population is slightly older than the County. About one-quarter of Concord's population is over 65.
- The average household income in Concord is almost 50% higher than the County.
- Concord is less racially diverse than the County. 77% of the populate describe themselves as Caucasian, followed by 7% Black or African American, 11% Asian, and 3% Hispanic.
- Concord has a highly educated population. 93% have graduated high school, and 39% have a bachelor's degree or higher.

# **Land Use and Zoning**

Concord Township is characterized by a mix of residential, commercial, and institutional uses, along with remnants of natural undeveloped land. The historic town center (Concordville) is located at the crossroads of Baltimore Pike (Route 1) and Concord Road. Baltimore Pike has developed into a thriving commercial corridor, with shopping centers, destination stores and restaurants, and service-oriented businesses. Parallel to the Baltimore Pike retail corridor are expanding commercial office and light industrial zones immediately to the south and north.

Along the western edge of the Township, Route 202 is another thriving retail and commercial corridor connecting the Borough of West Chester with the City of Wilmington, DE to the south. Both corridors carry a high volume of vehicular traffic, and the intersection of Route 202 and Baltimore Pike is one of the busiest intersections in the region, handling an average volume of approximately 80,000 vehicles per day. A third busy corridor in the Township is the Conchester Highway (Route 322), which has evolved as a circulation route for through-traffic connecting to Interstate 95 to the south.


The great majority of the Township area is residential, and much
of this is comprised of modern subdivisions and cul-de-sacs located
mostly in the central and southern part of the Township. Despite
recent growth, historic development patterns can still be seen along
Concord Road, Pole Cat Road, Ivy Mills Road, Beaver Valley Road,
and other areas.

Parks and institutional properties are congregated generally in the center of the Township. Newlin Grist Mill and the Municipal Complex form a pivotal anchor of open space along Baltimore Pike, as a protected green barrier to the commercial area immediately to the west. The Garnet Valley School District has a cluster of school buildings and recreational facilities along Smithbridge Road. The edges of the Township are bracketed by open space — Clayton Park to the south, Beaver Valley and First State National Historical Park to the west, and Concord Country Club to the north.

Remnants of former agricultural use do remain in the Township – on several parcels along Ivy Mills Road; lands owned by Delaware County along the northern edge of the Township; and lands making up part of the First State National Historical Park in the southwestern portion west of Route 202.

#### **Natural Resources**

Though density of development in the Township has steadily increased, there is a significant remaining presence of natural resources, including wooded areas, wetlands, floodplain areas, and natural flora and fauna habitat. These natural resources are documented in the *Township Comprehensive Plan*. It is likely that future trails may bring the public into close proximity to sensitive natural areas. This could be a strong positive feature of the open space system, providing the potential for educational and interpretive engagement of the public. However, such interventions must be handled sensitively to ensure the integrity of the natural resource. Protection and conservation of these sensitive areas should be a high priority.

Stream corridors and floodplain areas within the Township are protected as part of the Subdivision and Land Development, Stormwater, and Floodplain Ordinances. Concord Township lies primarily within Chester Creek watershed, except for the southwest portion of the Township, which is the Brandywine Creek watershed. While the Chester Creek itself lies to the east of Concord, and flows through Wawa, Lenni, and Thornton, a primary tributary – the West Branch of Chester Creek – flows through Concord, and can be seen in Newlin Grist Mill Park, along Pole Cat Road and flowing south into Chester Heights. Other streams are smaller tributaries of the West Bank Creek, including Concord Creek in the western part of the Township, and Green Creek in the southeast. The majority of the length of these streams are within the 100-year floodplain as mapped by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).


Distinct from floodplains, which are inundated intermittently based on rainfall volume, wetlands are areas that have standing water much of the time. Wetlands are important hydrological resources in that they act as water storage and recharge areas and help maintain water quality by filtering contaminants. They also provide critical habitat for a diversity of plants and animals. National Wetlands Inventory (NWI) has mapped a number of wetlands in low-lying areas within the Township, mostly associated with stream corridors.

Also associated with the stream corridors are other sensitive environmental features such as woodlands and steep slopes. Not coincidentally, these areas have escaped development because of the challenges these conditions pose to construction. Because the Township's native woodlands were cleared first for agriculture and later for development, most of what remains are in the wet areas or on the steep slopes alongside streams. The preservation of these remaining woodlands is essential for maintaining habitat, protecting water resources, and providing future recreational opportunities.





Natural resources in the Township are associated mainly with stream corridors, which are natural locations for future trails.



# **Natural Heritage Areas**

The most comprehensive survey of local sensitive environmental areas is the Delaware County Natural Heritage Inventory (NHI), which was published in 2011 and developed for the County by the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy. Its purpose is to inform residents and local decision makers about the unique plants, animals, and habitats that are found throughout Delaware County. This inventory focuses on the best examples of living ecological resources in Delaware County, and contains information on the locations of rare, threatened, and endangered species and of the highest quality natural areas in the county.

Thirty-seven Natural Heritage Areas are recognized in Delaware County. Of these, three are located in Concord Township, which are Beaver Valley Woods, Johnsons Corner (Naamans Creek Road), and Clayton Park/Shavertown Woods (see *Natural Resources Map, page 11*).

Beaver Valley Woods: This large area in the southwest area of the Township includes adjoining habitats along Beaver Creek and its tributaries, and is roughly bounded on the east by Route 202, on the south by the Delaware State Line, and on the west and north by Ridge Road. The area is a mosaic of upland forest, forested wetlands, open wetlands, spring seeps, and successional old fields set within an agricultural and residential context. Forested habitats include several significant patches of interior forest, which is critical nesting habitat for many of Pennsylvania's neotropical migrant songbirds. The area is home to at least 7 plant species of concern. Portions of this area are protected as part of First State National Historical Park. Some of the forest patches are in the long process of reverting from past agricultural uses, while other patches exhibit a much more undisturbed and pristine quality. Though the forest was likely selectively cut for fuel wood and timber several times since colonial times, much of the existing forest has apparently been standing for well over 100 years. Some individual trees in the area may be 200-300 years old or older. Although there is invasion of exotic plant species into the woods the overall quality of the woods is remarkably natural.

Clayton Park/Shavertown Woods: This area along the southern edge of the Township includes parts of Clayton Park and the powerline and pipeline rights-of-way and Green Creek that pass through the park. The site is roughly bounded by Featherbed Lane, Route 322, Garnet Mine Road, and Kirk Road. This area is a mosaic of upland forest, forested wetlands, open wetlands, spring seeps, and successional old fields set within a residential context. Several springs originate in

the woods and Green Creek meanders through the forest. Vegetation maintenance of the powerline right-of-way has kept the linear corridor in an early successional stage of development, which is the preferred habitat of several of the plant species of concern at this location. Forested habitats include a 12-acre patch of interior forest, which is critical nesting habitat for many of Pennsylvania's neotropical migrant songbirds. The area is home to at least 8 plant species of concern. In recent years Concord Township has prioritized the protection of these and surrounding lands with strategic property acquisitions.

Johnson's Corner, Naamans Creek Road: This fragmented habitat is loosely bounded by Route 202, Shavertown Road, Ebright Road, and the Delaware state line. This area is at the drainage divide of three watersheds and hosts the headwaters of two tributaries of the West Branch Chester Creek and one tributary of Beaver Creek. The area is home to at least 17 plant species of concern. Once considered one of the top sites of statewide significance for the protection of biological diversity, this area has been severely impacted by accelerated development in recent decades. This natural wetness in this area has provided suitable habitat for numerous plant species, many of which continue to persist in scattered patches of suitable habitat. Of special note was the presence of a

cranberry wetland, a very unusual habitat for this region of the state. Much of the surrounding area has since been converted to residential development leaving scattered remnants of habitat that in many cases still manage to support species of concern.



Shavertown Woods is designated a Natural Heritage Area, indicated high environmental value.

#### **Historic and Cultural Resources**


Significant examples of Township history remain with the presence of numerous historic properties. There are several local properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and many more that have been determined to be eligible. Several historic properties are along existing or proposed trails. The possibility of linking these properties as part of a trail network is a valuable opportunity to promote the area's cultural heritage. Notable historic properties include the following:

The *Newlin Grist Mill* complex dates to 1704 and is one of several working grist mills in Pennsylvania. The mill was originally built by Nicholas Newlin, a Quaker who obtained a 500-acre grant from William Penn. He brought his family to Pennsylvania from Ireland and built two water-powered mills along Chester Creek. The mill was in operation until 1941 and the original dam and mill race are still supplying power to the mill today. The mill's interior gears and machinery have been reconstructed to 1700 operational standards and is fully functional. The Philadelphia and Baltimore Central Railroad was built through the property in 1859; this allowed the mill to market its flour in Philadelphia and Baltimore. A railway station was built in 1868, which remains today as the current park office. The 160-acre property includes twelve historic structures, including the mill, station, warehouse, miller's house, Trimble House, and others.

The *Polecat Road House* is an early tenant house for workers at nearby mills. Built prior to 1750, it is a simple, small, stone structure, originally built for two families. This house was donated to Concord Township in 1967 and restored by the Concord Township Historical Society

The African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church on Spring Valley Road dates to the 1880's and is a significant local historic building. In its early years the church was a focal point for the black community who worked on the area farms. The church was closed in the 1980's, and eventually was purchased by the Township in 2014 as part of its open space program. It is currently being renovated, and may have use as a community facility providing trail head amenities.


The Maplewood Gymnasium and Dante Orphanage were part of an early boarding school dating to the 1860s. The Gymnasium was built in 1898, and the Orphanage in 1920. It was temporarily used by Garnet Valley School District and Delaware County Community College. Today the Gymnasium is the Concord Community Center and the Orphanage is the home of the Concord Township offices.

Concord Township Historic Resources (2005)

The Ivy Mills Historic District represents a significant period in the history of the township and county. The district includes two contributing buildings and one contributing structure. They are the ruins of the Ivy Mills paper mill, erected in 1829; the clerk's house, dated to about 1830; and the Ivy Mills Mansion House, built in 1837. The original paper mill was erected in 1729, and the original mansion house in 1744. Both of the original buildings were replaced in the early-19th century by the present buildings. The District was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1972. The Township has acquired conservation easements on portions of land comprising the Historic District.

In 2020, the Township purchased a property on Beaver Valley Road that includes the Nathaniel Newlin Log Home and Tavern constructed in 1775. The log portion of the home was later covered with wood clapboard siding. The Township has relocated it to the Newlin Grist Mill property where it can be rebuilt and properly interpreted and cared for.

Additionally, historic structures and remnants are present on several properties recently acquired by the Township, including Phipps Farm and Bush Hill Farm.

An inventory performed by the Concord Township Historical Society in 1997 noted more than 200 existing historic structures, which are documented in the earlier Concord Township Open Space and Recreation Plan. The complete inventory of historic structures can be found on the Township website. Certain protections are afforded local historic resources in the Township Zoning Code.




# **Equestrian Resources**

While much of the Township has been developed, pockets of agricultural landscape remain. Among these there is an equestrian community in the Township that keep and rides horses, with an estimated total of 100 or more horses. These are generally clustered in three areas of the Township – Beaver Valley, Ivy Mills, and the area around Clayton Park – with a few others elsewhere. The historic rural character is an important part of Township identity.

# **Existing Parks and Open Space**

Today the parks and open space resources in the Township include dozens of separate properties totaling almost 2,000 acres of land. These resources accommodate a broad range of activities, including a variety of sports and active recreation, playgrounds and informal recreation, and simple passive recreation such as walking and bike riding. Other resources are unimproved and serve as important natural resources.

#### **Aspects of Open Space**

"Open space" is a general term that can take on different meanings and can encompass a very broad range of uses. Some key aspects of open space that will be referred to in this study include the following:

- Intended Use: "Active open space" refers to recreation areas, such as playgrounds or athletic fields, that engage the public physical activity. "Passive open space" most often refers to generally unimproved land used for natural conservation or interpretation. It is well suited for activities such as hiking, bird watching, and education, or simply ecological preservation.
- Property Ownership: Public open space, such as local parks, is often owned by a government entity such as a municipality, county, or state. While these may be the dominant opportunities for recreation, it is important to also take into account the full range of open space that may be available for use by residents of the community. This broader range may include private and institutional properties that are open to public use, and even public-inaccessible areas which nevertheless are preserved as green space. The term "quasi-public open space" refers to open space opportunities that are privately-owned yet generally accessible to the public.
- Protected or Unprotected: "Protected open space" is land that is permanently
  protected for parks and recreation, scenic, or environmental purposes by
  means of public ownership, deed restriction, or conservation easement. It can
  be publicly or privately-owned. Unprotected open space could potentially be
  developed at any time by its owner, within restrictions placed by local zoning
  and applicable ordinances.






# **Township Parks and Open Space**

The Township owns more than a dozen open space properties. Some have been designated and improved for public recreation, some are intended for passive recreation with limited public accommodations, and others set aside for nature conservation and are entirely unimproved.


#### **Active Recreation**


At present, active recreation is primarily concentrated in two Township parks.

- Concord Township Community Park on Smithbridge Road is a principal hub
  of community activity, located adjacent to the Rachel Kohl Community
  Library, and the Garnet Valley Elementary and Middle Schools. The park has
  a variety of amenities, including a multi-purpose field, sand volleyball, paved
  walking trail, large children's playground, picnic pavilion, dog park and
  bandstand. The Park hosts community events, and the walking trail is
  routinely overflowing with users.
- The Municipal Complex on Thornton Road is another hub of activity. In addition to the municipal building and associated civic functions, the property features a recreation area that includes two multi-purpose fields, two baseball/softball fields, paved and unpaved walking trails, pickleball courts, as well as the Brandywine Youth Club (BYC) O'Donoghue Field House, which houses basketball courts and other resources.

#### **Passive Recreation**

Several other township properties have been lightly improved in recent years for passive recreation, primarily consisting of unpaved walking trails.

- Bush Hill Farm is a 40-acre property on Bethel Road that features a dog park
  and ample open space lawn areas, undeveloped flexible open space utilized
  for a variety of community programs. Two historic barns and other
  outbuildings reflect its history as a working horse farm. An internal system of
  walking trails has recently been established and will provide up to 1 mile of
  mown trails.
- Smallbrook Preserve at Hillsborough is a 14-acre property on Featherbed Lane that was recently acquired for passive open space. Like Bush Hill Farm, this property is adjacent to Delaware County's Clayton Park, and serves to expand the area of contiguous open space in this southern part of the Township. Unpaved walking trails on the property were opened to the public in 2021.
- Phipps Farm: This 23-acre farmstead is located on Smithbridge Road adjacent
  to the Township Park. Walking trails have been established and other light
  passive uses may be considered. Due to adjacent residential neighborhoods,
  further outreach should take place when planning for future uses of the
  property.

#### **Unimproved Open Space Resources**

Several Township open space properties are either unimproved or do not currently accommodate public access. These properties are nevertheless valuable open space which serves to protect and conserve natural resources such as floodplains, steep slopes, wetlands, stream corridors, and remaining agricultural land. These natural areas are critical environmental features and are important to the overall composition of Township open space. Passive recreation and other features may be considered in the future.

- The Township owns two unimproved properties along Temple Road. These occupy a key location along the proposed Octoraro Trail and at the juncture of the Octoraro and proposed Garnet Valley Greenway. Additionally, they have environmental value as home to wetlands and the Concord Creek stream corridor. These properties may have utility for a future trail head, passive recreation, and nature conservation.
- Two other unimproved Township properties are located in the vicinity of Carter Way in the southwest portion of the Township. These are in proximity to residential neighborhoods, and they may play a future role in enabling an off-road trail connection to the area of the Township west of Route 202 containing First State National Historical Park.
- The Bickley Tract is a 22-acre unimproved parcel located on Ivy Mills Road. The
  property is actively farmed and is part of the remaining agricultural legacy of the
  Township that is characteristic of the Ivy Mills Historic District.

#### **Other Recent Township Acquisitions**

Since 2018, the Township has successfully capitalized on opportunities to preserve and acquire a number of other properties that are valuable to the as natural, historic, and potential recreation resources.

- In addition to Smallbrook Preserve noted above, several properties have recently been acquired and/or protected in the vicinity of Bush Hill Farm and Clayton Park, along Bethel Road and Featherbed Lane. This congregation of protected land is discussed further in Chapters 3 and 4. Properties include:
  - o Featherbed Farm: In 2021, the Township announced an agreement to preserve the 42-acre Featherbed Farm. The Township will purchase 8.6 acres and will merge it with the adjacent township-owned Bush Hill Farm. The land will remain as open space and provides opportunities for trails and passive open space. The remaining 33.2 acres will be placed under a conservation easement managed by the Brandywine Conservancy. The property contains significant historical resources as well as portions of the Shavertown Woods cited as ecologically significant in the Natural Heritage Inventory of Delaware County.
  - o Greener Property: This 3-acre property provides opportunities for trail connections adjoining the planned Garnet Valley Greenway.
  - o DeNenno Property: This 3-acre property provides opportunities for trail connections and is a supporting landscape surrounded Shavertown Woods.
- Along Concord Road, several separate acquisitions have resulted in a block of Township
  property adjacent to the sewer plant. These parcels are largely free of environmental
  constraints and may be suitable for trails and passive recreation.
- The 1.6 acre Zechman and Frail properties on Beaver Valley Road, are in proximity to First State National Historical Park and have historic significance with the presence of a log home dating to 1775. The historic home is being relocated to Newlin Grist Mill. The properties themselves are an opportunity for pocket park and potential trailhead.
- The 2.0 acre Carilla property on Pyle Road, purchased in 2020, is a valuable natural resource at the headwaters of Concord Creek and as part of the core habitat of significance noted in the Natural Heritage Inventory of Delaware County.
- In October 2021, the Township acquired a conservation easement from the Willcox Family
  that will protect 50 acres in the lvy Mills Historic District, at lvy Mill and Polecat Roads. The
  easement will protect the historic mill house and ruins, and preserves a pristine landscape,
  viewshed, and portions of the Chester Creek watershed.



# Other Public and Quasi-Public Open Space

Township residents also benefit from use of other public, quasi-public, and institutional properties that contribute meaningfully to the overall available open space in the Township.

- Clayton Park on Route 322 is managed by Delaware County. This 170-acre
  park is the largest of the county's park and recreational facilities, and offers
  scenic woodlands, a nine-hole golf course, four playing fields, shaded picnic
  groves, nature trails and parking.
- First State National Historical Park includes miles of walking trails on more than 250-acres in Concord Township west of Route 202, which extends south into Delaware and connects with Brandywine Creek State Park.
- Newlin Grist Mill is a private non-profit historic site dedicated to historical preservation and environmental conservation. The Grist Mill offers a wide range of educational and environmental programs for all ages, and the park is open to the public with more than eight miles of walking trails.



- Garnet Valley School District operates four schools in Concord Township, which have multiple playing fields and playgrounds. These are available for use by the public and local athletic organizations, subject to schedule coordination and other limitations. Concord Township, the school district, and local youth athletic associations have cooperated effectively to share resources for public benefit.
- Brandywine Youth Club offers a wide range of organized youth sports and athletic activities, including baseball, basketball, football, and others. BYC maintains a large field complex on Kirk Road, as well as O'Donoghue Field House located at the Municipal Complex.
- Concord Country Club is a member-based, semi-public golf course offering a range of recreation amenities along with an 18-hole golf course.
- Edgewood Cemetery: Cemeteries should not be overlooked as an important form of open space in local communities, and they have a long history in America as part of the designed public landscape. At the very least, this 65-acre parcel is a visual amenity and valuable open space resource protected from development.






# **Existing and Planned Trails in Concord**

The Township has made a concerted effort in recent years to expand the options for public walking trails. Currently there are a number of highly popular walking trails in different parts of the Township, as well as several new opportunities currently being developed. It is the long-term goal to connect these together into an integrated trail system. Existing trails include:

- Concord Township Community Park (Smithbridge Road): Heavily-used paved walking trail 0.7 miles long. Ample parking is available, along with restrooms and many other amenities.
- Collman Trail at Phipps Farm: Located on Smithbridge Road adjacent to the Township Park, this property opened to the public in 2020 with an internal system of mowed walking trails approximately 0.5 mile long. These connect to the paved trails in the Township Park with a pedestrian crossing at Temple Road.
- Township Municipal Complex on Thornton Road: More than one mile of walking
  paths, including a paved trail around the athletic complex and wooded hiking trails.

  Ample parking is available, as are restrooms located in the Municipal building during
  business hours.
- Bush Hill Farm: Formerly known as 30 Bethel Road, Bush Hill Farm features a
  Township dog park and ample open meadow areas. An internal system of walking
  trails has recently been established, providing up to 1 mile of mown trails.





- Smallbrook Preserve at Hillsborough is a former Christmas tree farm that
  offers 0.7 miles of mowed walking trails in a 14-acre natural meadow
  setting. A small gravel parking area is available at the entrance on
  Featherbed Lane.
- Public walking trails are available in the vicinity of Beaver Valley Road in the southwest corner of the Township within the First State National Historical Park. These connect to an extensive contiguous network of trails that stretches into Delaware and connects to the Brandywine Creek State Park and Delaware Greenway trail network.
- Newlin Grist Mill: Newlin Grist Mill contains more than eight miles of unpaved walking trails through woodland and meadow settings. There is the potential to connect these to the planned Octoraro Trail.
- The Township has also acquired multiple other properties in the vicinity of Bethel Road and Featherbed Lane, with the intention of developing trails and passive open space as part of an integrated network.
- Currently in a design stage, the proposed Octoraro Trail is planned to run along the alignment of the former Octoraro railway. The first phase of construction is planned to originate at Route 202 just south of the Brandywine Mill shopping center, and run eastward to Newlin Grist Mill, at Concord Road (see Chapter 4).
- Planning has begun for the Garnet Valley Greenway, a potential future paved trail spine that may one day connect the Octoraro Trail to Concord Township Park, Clayton Park, and other open space resources (see Chapter 4).
- Preliminary planning has been done to create pedestrian and bicycle connections to the commercial destinations along the main traffic arteries of Route 1 and Route 202. These will create important linkages between neighborhoods, recreation, and commerce (see Chapter 4).



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




### **Privately Owned HOA Open Space**

Some privately-owned properties in Concord are accessible to the public for recreational use, subject to limitations. Other properties may not be available to the public but are nevertheless protected from development to some degree. They may contribute to the scenic value of the landscape and serve an important role in conservation of natural resources. For these reasons, the public usually has an interest in seeing these resources preserved, even though they are in private hands.

In Concord, Homeowners Associations (HOA) provide a significant portion of open space. This is made up from land dedicated to open space as part of residential subdivisions. Currently there is almost 700 acres of dedicated open space located within HOAs. While the dedicated open space on these properties does not necessarily provide for access by the general public, it does provide a potential future opportunity for public use for recreational use such as walking trails, provided appropriate access easements can be negotiated. Currently the open space areas within Fox Hill Farm and Concord Woods contain walking trails, but they are not intended for use by the general public.



### Vacant, Undeveloped and Underdeveloped Properties for Potential Future Open Space Needs


There are many undeveloped or under-developed properties that are not protected as open space and could potentially be developed at any time (though zoning does place certain restrictions on development). While these parcels are privately-owned, they represent potential future opportunities for expansion of public recreation and conservation of open space.

The map on this page identifies private properties that may be candidates for future open space protection in some form, such as conservation easement or outright acquisition by the Township. These properties have one or more of the following characteristics:

- Undeveloped properties larger than 5 acres in size.
- Under-developed properties that may be suitable for active or passive recreation.
- Properties containing sensitive natural resources such as stream corridors, woodlands, or notable flora/fauna habitats.
- Undeveloped properties adjacent to existing concentrations of protected open space.
- Properties that could host trail connections as part of the Township trail network.

In some instances, a portion of a property may be developed, but there is a significant undeveloped portion that may have value as protected open space.

Certain properties are residential homes on large parcels that contain stream corridors or other natural resources. In these instances, the natural areas could be protected by a conservation easement. One exception is the Concord Country Club, which is developed for active recreation. While this is a significant existing recreation and open space resource, the property is currently zoned for residential development, and it is not protected as open space.




### **Conservation Easements**

Several valuable open space properties in the Township are protected by conservation easement. Under these easements, the land remains in current ownership, but sells the rights to develop the land. The Township has partnered with the Brandywine Conservancy to manage some of these easements.

In 2021 the Township reached agreement to acquire two major new conservation easements. Featherbed Farm (33 acres) on Featherbed Lane was historically part of the original 200-acre land grant by William Penn to John Beal in 1683. The property contains Township Class I Historical Resources, including a stone house and barn dating to 1776 and 1830 respectively, which will be protected from demolition under the terms of the easement. The home is also listed on the Pennsylvania Register of Historic Sites and Landmarks. In addition to its historical significance, the land is ecologically important. This vast majority of the land, which includes a tributary of Green Creek, is cited as a "Core Habitat" and "Supporting Landscape" in the Natural Heritage Inventory of Delaware County for "Clayton Park/Shavertown Woods".

The Township is also in the process of acquiring a conservation easement for approximately 50 acres of the historic Willcox property near the corner of Pole Cat Road/lvy Mills Lane, which will add to a previous 15-acre easement for the historic Willcox home. The new easement encompasses land on the opposite of Pole Cat Road, including Class 1 historic structures such as the Clerk's House and Mill Ruins. The property is part of the lvy Mills Historic District on National Register of Historic Places. It also includes valuable environmental resources, associated with the West Branch of Chester Creek corridor



### **Open Space Opportunities Beyond Concord**

While Concord Township boasts a healthy variety of parks and open space, it is not possible for every possible type of recreation facility to be available within the Township itself. Outside Concord, many popular types of parks and recreation facilities are available to Concord residents, and these should be accounted for as part of the overall available recreation resources. If certain facilities exist elsewhere, it may not be necessary to provide them in Concord. These are a few examples of resources available outside Concord. It is not intended to be a comprehensive inventory.

### **Community Parks in Nearby Municipalities**

- Thornbury Park in Thornbury Township features basketball, tennis, softball, and extensive paved and unpaved walking trails.
- Upper Chichester Township Municipal Park on Furey Road features a skateboard park, along with playing fields and children's playground.
- Other nearby open space and recreation opportunities include walking trails in Chadds
   Ford, and various public parks in Bethel, Chester Heights, and other surrounding Townships.

### **Other Types of Public Parks**

Public outdoor areas are often owned and managed at the County, State, or Federal level. Several such parks and open spaces are in close proximity to Concord and are available for use by Concord Township residents.

- The nearest Pennsylvania State Park is Ridley Creek State Park in Edgmont and Middletown Townships. This park occupies more than 2,600 acres that are primarily wooded and bisected by Ridley Creek. Activities include hiking, biking horseback riding, picnicking, fishing, cross country skiing, and camping.
- Brandywine Creek State Park offers more than 14 miles of trail and a remnant old-growth forest within its 933 acres. The rolling meadows provide habitat to native pollinators, ground nesting birds and rare native plants. The Park also features disc golf, picnic pavilions and nature center, fishing, and is the site of Civil War reenactments in the spring.
- Brandywine Battlefield Park sits on 46 acres of rolling hills in Chadds Ford and includes the former Continental Army encampment, historic buildings, and a self-guided driving tour.
- National Parks are considered to have the highest level of scenic beauty or cultural
  importance to U.S. history. There are three national parks within 25 miles of Concord, which
  are First State National Historical Park (noted previously); Valley Forge National Historic Park
  in Valley Forge; and Independence National Historical Park in Philadelphia.

### **Other Activities and Facilities**

- Swimming: Concord does not have public swimming pool facilities. Swimming is available
  nearby from several member-based facilities, including Concord County Club and private
  swim clubs, the closest of which are Knowlton/Hidden Hollow Swim Club and Riddlewood,
  both located in nearby Middletown. Garnet Valley Middle School has an indoor swimming
  pool for use by students, with limited opportunity for use by the public.
- Golf: Several public and private golf courses are present in the area. The nearest courses open to the public are the Clayton Park Golf Course and Concord Country Club (both in Concord) and the Golf Course at Glen Mills.
- Fitness: Numerous private commercial fitness centers are located in the nearby vicinity, including Main Line Health in Concord. In addition, the Rocky Run YMCA offers a wide range of fitness and recreation programs for all ages. This is one of several YMCA branches in the region and is located about 5 miles away, in Middletown.
- Boating: Nearby Brandywine Creek is a popular setting for kayak and canoe enthusiasts.
   There are several public launch points within a few miles of Concord.
- Recreational Camping: Brandywine Summit Camp Meeting on Beaver Valley Road has
  campsites and cabins for rent, and offers a playground, swimming pool, and outdoor
  pavilion. It is adjacent to First State National Historical Park.
- Bowling: Several private commercial bowling alleys are located nearby, the closest of which is AMF Conchester Lanes on Route 322 in Upper Chichester.
- Arboreta: There are numerous Arboreta and Nature Centers in the nearby region which are open to the public and serve as outstanding resources for experiencing the natural environment. Those closest to Concord include Tyler Arboretum (Middletown), Palmer Arboretum (Thornbury), and nationally-known Longwood Gardens in Kennett Square.

### **Park and Open Space Programming**

A strong sense of community, promoted and supported by meaningful local programs and events and recreation programs, helps to create desirable places to live and work. Low-cost activities for all ages provide opportunities for the everyone to be active and involved. Community programming also encourages a sense of unity, pride and appreciation for local traditions and heritage.

### **Township Community Events and Programs**

Concord Township host a variety of public events throughout the year. The Township Park on Smithbridge Road is the principal location for these, however some also occur at the municipal complex, Bush Hill Farm, and other locations. Typical events include:

- Easter Egg Hunt, typically held at Bush Hill Farm.
- Summer concert series, with live music performances weeknight evenings at the bandshell in the Township Park.
- Summer movie nights, weekend evenings in the Township Park.
- Concord Community Day, a festival each fall with food, music, games, and other attractions.
- Harvest festival and Halloween parade, typically held at Bush Hill Farm.









Local park events in Concord include the Easter Egg Hunt, movie nights, and outdoor concerts.

### **Brandywine Youth Club (BYC)**

Organized youth sports are provided by the independent non-profit Brandywine Youth Club, which offers a wide range of sports and activities. Events are held at the BYC fields on Kirk Road, O'Donohue Field House at the Township Municipal Complex, Garnet Valley school facilities, and other local parks and fields. Sports and activities include basketball, baseball, cheerleading, football, soccer, lacrosse, softball, wrestling, and field hockey. The club also hosts events for families such as golf outings, Fun Runs, and other events.

#### **Newlin Grist Mill**

The non-profit historic site and 160-acre nature preserve offers a wide range of public education and recreation programs geared toward history and nature. Topics include birdwatching, archeology, naturalist programs, and historic interpretation. The Grist Mill also offers a popular Summer Discovery summer camp program for children ages 4-12.

### **Garnet Valley School District**

The school district offers a wide range of age-appropriate sports and activities for students. A significant portion of school students are Concord residents, who benefit from school programs and activities. However, those programs and activities are offered at the discretion of the school district and are not specifically addressed within the scope of this study.

### **Community Organizations**

A variety of established community organizations sponsor events, activities, and programs throughout the year, collectively appealing to a diverse range of interests and ages. Some of these organizations include Boys Scouts of America Concordville Cub Scout Pack 260 and Boys Scouts Troop 191, as well as many local churches, and local parochial schools.

### **Other Programs**

Concord residents often take advantage of other nearby opportunities to meet their needs for recreation programs. Other than youth sports associations described above, a popular local source of fitness and recreation programming is the Rocky Run YMCA located about 5 miles away in Middletown. The YMCA offers an extensive range of youth and adult programs that are available to members. Programs include exercise and fitness classes, swimming lessons, a variety of sports, youth summer camps, and many other options.













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### **Needs and Opportunities**

The previous chapter outlined the current open space resources available in Concord Township. This chapter envisions how the open space system in Concord could be *better*, by identifying issues of concern to residents, needs and wants for improved facilities and programs, and opportunities for future improvements.

It is important for Concord to plan its future open space according to its unique circumstances and to the priorities of its residents. With this in mind, significant public input was received, and extensive discussion took place with the Steering Committee and other stakeholders in the Township to assess perceived needs and wants for park facilities and resources. The outcome of these discussions is presented in four primary categories:

- Current Strengths: Positive attributes to be protected and enhanced
- Issues and Concerns: Problems that should be addressed
- Needs and Desires: Improvements and new features that would be beneficial
- Opportunities to Improve: Unique circumstances that will help make improvements possible

### **Public Participation**

The public participation process was a guiding force behind the Plan by identifying needs and wants of the community and providing fresh ideas. This plan was developed through extensive outreach and dialogue with a wide range of stakeholders, including public officials, local institutions, property owners, and the general public. The Plan was shaped and guided by a Steering Committee that included representatives of civic organizations, youth sports associations, park neighbors, township officials, and residents.

### **Voice Your Vision**

In July 2021, the Township hosted public workshops as part of its *Voice Your Vision* public outreach initiative, where local residents were encouraged to express their views and provide suggestions on a wide range of topics, which included open space planning, including land use, public spaces, events, and circulation.

Through these sessions and other related outreach, a broad community consensus emerged in support of open space protection, expansion of community events, creation of more spaces for gathering and recreation, and improved pedestrian and bicycle connectivity. The full report from these sessions can be found in the Appendix.

### **Public Opinion Survey**

During spring 2021, Concord Township invited residents to share their thoughts related to recreation and open space. An elaborate online survey, created with the assistance of *MetroQuest*, asked detailed questions that polled residents' satisfaction and interest across a wide range of specific topics. A total of 1,552 responses were received, which is a remarkable level of participation. Residents were asked a variety of questions about their views of the current parks and open space in Concord, and their opinions on what improvements they would most want to see. Some questions were multiple choice, and others were open-ended to allow respondents to describe their opinions in their own words. Overall public opinions are incorporated into the summary of strengths, concerns, and desires outlined later in this Chapter.



Extensive public outreach efforts included online surveys, in-person visioning workshops, and stakeholder interviews.

A more expansive presentation of the survey results can be found in the Appendix. Highlights include:

#### **Priorities**

- When asked to rank the most important types of open space and recreation activities, the most highly ranked choice was Trails.
   Residents expressed a strong desire for both paved and unpaved trails, indicating a range of users looking for different types of experiences.
- Many other open space and recreation options were also looked upon favorably. The diverse variety of preferences is reflective of a diverse population with a broad range of interests.

#### Visitation


- 77% of respondents visit a Township park at least once a month, and 45% reported they do so every week. This represents a high level of engagement and familiarity with the existing resources and issues.
- 70% of respondents had used the trail at the Township Park during the past year. This is a highly popular recreation option for local residents.


#### Satisfaction

- 80% of respondents are satisfied or very satisfied with the variety of recreation options available in the Township.
- 90% are satisfied or very satisfied with the condition and maintenance of Township parks.

#### Needs

- More than half of respondents answered that the best use of limited resources is to acquire more open space, rather than spending that money to improve existing parks or provide more programs.
- When asked what types of new open space and recreation features should be added, trails were the most frequently mentioned item.
   Natural areas, sprayground, outdoor basketball courts, outdoor fitness activities, and community gardens were also ranked highly.
- Respondents placed high value on community events, scenic beauty, local heritage, and the natural landscape, as important parts of the open space system.








### **Current Strengths**

It is important to identify the perceived strengths of the current parks and open space system, in order to protect and enhance those aspects of the system that are already of high value. Notable current strengths include:

- Community Events: Concord residents enjoy the various community events
  hosted by the Township throughout the year and wish for more.
- Trails: Walking trails are currently the most popular physical activity in the Township. Residents wish for more trails, both paved and unpaved, and for these to be part of an interconnected system
- Natural Areas: Residents place a high value on undeveloped open space as
  part of the scenic character of the Township. The current undeveloped open
  areas of the Township are appreciated by residents. Woodlands, stream
  corridors, and wetland areas are the best place in the Township to
  experience the natural landscape up close, and they are also important
  elements of Concord's cultural heritage.
- Youth Sports: Residents are generally satisfied with the variety and quality of organized youth sports programs and facilities.
- Cultural Heritage: Many features of the Township's rural past remain evident and are highly valued by residents. These include historic buildings and places, as well as scenic and agricultural areas.



Youth sports are considered a local strength.

### **Current Issues and Concerns**

While parks and open spaces in Concord are generally appreciated, the outreach process for this Plan identified perceived problems that should be addressed and ways that current parks could be improved. A range of issues and concerns emerged, including the following:

- Township Park is Crowded: Concord Township Park is a highly popular and valuable community hub. However, as a focal point of community activity and recreation, it is often overcrowded, and supporting infrastructure like parking and restrooms are insufficient.
- Cost to Taxpayers: Some residents worry that Township plans to expand
  and improve parks and open space might be overly ambitious and may
  result in higher taxes or increased costs that will be passed along to
  residents.
- Private Development: Some residents feel that private commercial and
  residential land development is gradually eating up important remaining
  open space. There is a concern that the visual character of the Township
  will be diminished if too much open space disappears.
- Ability to Maintain Parks and Natural Lands: In recent years the Township
  has increased its open space inventory by actively acquiring new property.
  While the Township's parks are well-maintained, the undeveloped natural
  areas should be more actively managed to preserve environmental quality.
  As new resources are developed, maintenance needs will grow accordingly.



Expanded open space inventory requires expanded maintenance capability.

### **Needs and Desires**

As noted earlier in this chapter, based on public input there is a perceived need for different, enhanced, or new features, to meet the level of demand and address the interests of current and future residents. Prominent needs and desires include:

- Trails for walking and biking are the most commonly noted desire
  expressed by residents in the opinion survey and public meetings. Trails
  have appeal for users of all ages and abilities and provide an
  opportunity to experience the natural environment.
- Closely related to trails is an appreciation for the natural environment.
   Residents express a desire to preserve open space, to protect the scenic quality of the Township and to promote environmental sustainability.
- Potential new active recreation elements, including sprayground, outdoor basketball courts, and adult fitness equipment.
- While local youth sports are strong, recreation options for adults are more limited. There is strong desire for open space resources in Concord that appeal to all ages, including senior citizens. Recentlyadded pickleball courts, which appeal to older adults, are a highly popular example.
- Residents enjoy the opportunity for community events, and there is a
  desire for expanded or additional public events space that has
  improved facilities and supporting amenities such as restrooms.
- There is a local equestrian community that would utilize trails and places for horseback riding.
- Community gardening, recycling, composting, and other environmentally sustainable practices should be accommodated within the open space system.











A wide variety of new open space features and elements have been suggested by the community.

### **Opportunities to Improve**

In considering ways to achieve stated goals, current circumstances present a number of opportunities to address current issues and needs. These include the following (specific recommendations for each are described in Chapter 4):

- The Township owns a cluster of properties located along Temple Road between Smithbridge and Spring Valley Road. Considered as a group, these have great potential to form a hub for trails and passive recreation, with direct close connection to the Township Park.
- The Township owns a second cluster of properties in the vicinity of Bethel Road and Featherbed Lane. These include Bush Hill Farm and Smallbrook Preserve, along with others. Together this group of properties can form a hub for trails and passive recreation, with the added benefit of direct adjacency to Delaware County's Clayton Park.
- The area surrounding the Ivy Mills Historic District and nearby vicinity is a
  valuable remaining example of Concord's historical legacy as a working
  agricultural landscape. This section of the Township has thus far largely
  avoided modern development and retains much of its early-American
  character.
- In addition to the clusters of Township property noted above, there are several undeveloped Township open space properties that can be better utilized to serve needs of active and passive recreation or protected and managed as natural landscapes having environmental value.
- Active recreation is generally concentrated in a few areas of the Township:
  the Municipal Complex on Thornton Road, the Township Park and Garnet
  Valley School grounds on Smithbridge Road, and the BYC fields on Kirk
  Road. One or more of these existing recreation hubs can be expanded with
  additional features, capitalizing on existing supportive infrastructure such as
  parking, restrooms, and amenities.
- Certain major stream corridors within the Township are largely undeveloped.
  These can play a key role in the open space system. They are valuable
  environmental resources, important for stormwater management as well as
  wildlife habitat. Many stream segments are already protected and dedicated

- as open space by Homeowners Associations. These stream corridors hold potential for possible trail connections, passive recreation, and nature conservation.
- Several utility corridors that have the potential for development as recreation trails. The former Octoraro rail corridor runs east-west across the Township and carries underground water, sewer, and fiber optic communications, along with overhead electric. A second corridor runs roughly NW to SE and carries overhead electric. Paved trails have been proposed for both these corridors.
- The recent establishment of First State National Historical Park represents a
  key opportunity to connect Township residents to more than 1,000 acres of
  open space and trails managed by the National Park Service.
- Dedicated open space belonging to Homeowner's Associations (HOAs) total
  almost 700 acres, representing a significant open space resource. While
  these areas are protected from development, there may be opportunities to
  better utilize them for recreation, or better manage them for natural
  resources.
- While private development has continued steadily over the past 20 years, many private undeveloped parcels still remain. Certain of these may have value as public open space, particular those which fit one or more criteria:

   (a) facilitate trail connections;
   (b) contiguous to other public open space;
   (c) contain sensitive natural features;
   (d) have scenic and/or historic value, and
   (e) possess other qualities conducive to recreation.
- The Township benefits from strong local institutions and private non-profit partners. There is an opportunity to coordinate these civic resources more closely to maximize efficiency to deliver high quality programs and facilities.

# 4

## Recommendations

The underlying purpose of the Concord Township Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Space Plan is to identify opportunities and set priorities for ways the Township can protect and improve its parks, recreation, open space, and environmental resources.

The Township Council has demonstrated a significant commitment to open space, parks, and trails by allocating more than \$8 million since 2018, opening three new nature trails and two public parks and expanding recreation opportunities with pickleball, new playground, new dog park, and other features. The recommendations in this plan seek to build on that momentum.

The following recommendations represent a suggested course of action for Concord to follow during the next ten years, and represent the priorities set by the Steering Committee during the course of this study. They include a wide variety of actions. Some recommended projects are straightforward and relatively low-cost. Some are ambitious long-term initiatives that will require significant funds. Still others involve policy decisions that cost nothing, only the will to act.

There is no expectation that these recommendations can be implemented all at once. By prioritizing resources, the Township can proceed incrementally, starting with the "low-hanging fruit", and working steadily toward more ambitious goals.

### **Prioritize Open Space Hubs and Connections**

Recommendations of this Plan include a wide range of potential actions. Opportunities to improve open space and recreation can be found throughout the Township, and the intention is to capitalize on these opportunities wherever they may be. However, it is necessary to prioritize those actions that are likely to yield the highest public benefit. In certain areas in the Township, multiple open space resources exist in close proximity. This allows the potential to create a synergy between complimentary uses. These areas have the great potential to serve as hubs of activity and social interaction for Township residents.


Active Recreation Hubs are can be enhanced at the Township Park and the Municipal Complex. There

is a value to concentrating active recreation opportunities where these already exist, so that supporting infrastructure such as parking and restrooms can be shared.

Passive Recreation Hubs can be created in several locations, where there is a concentration of public open space of high environmental value that lends itself to trails and related activities. Careful management of environmental resources can bring people in contact with nature in a sensitive manner.

In addition to walking trails that already exist and can be expanded, there are opportunities for two longer Trail Network Spines. The Octoraro Trail and Garnet Valley Greenway can serve as connectors that link many individual open space, recreation, and civic destinations.

Open space is not only valued for recreation. The Ivy Mills Historic District represents the historic legacy of the Township and is highly valued for its scenic beauty and the cultural resonance. Conservation easements in the Ivy Mills district can protect these lands from development and preserve historic character.





### **Recommendations for**

### CONSERVATION

Not all public open space needs to be devoted to public activity. Sensitive natural resources are valuable and deserving of protection in their own right, even if there is no recreational purpose involved. Public opinion of Concord residents is strongly in support of natural resource conservation. The Township should play an active role in promoting environmentally responsible stewardship of the natural environment.

### **Conserve Additional Open Space Property**

Based on public input gathered for this plan, Concord residents are solidly in favor of preserving undeveloped open space. The Township should actively take steps to protect undeveloped open space from future development. These protections should be targeted toward properties that can provide for future recreation needs, conserve natural resources, and/or preserve the scenic and historic character of the Township for future generations. The Township should remain alert for opportunities to acquire or conserve undeveloped property as part of the open space system.

The 2007 Concord Township Recreation and Open Space Plan Update contained evaluation criteria for prioritizing potential new acquisitions. This set of criteria has served as a useful frame of reference when considering new opportunities.

Based on the goals and expectations for open space described in this Plan, an updated measuring stick for acquisition of new property is proposed. An objective metric such as this is often a requirement of grant funding programs, which may assist with acquisition costs.



The following important open space attributes should be considered in identifying priority lands for acquisition. A weighted scoring system is proposed for each category, with values assigned according to specific characteristics. The full score sheet can be found in *Appendix* C.

- 1. Parcel Size: Larger parcels have greater potential for public benefit, and to justify Township efforts to plan, acquire, and maintain.
- Development Risk: Properties that are subject to imminent development pressure may become high priority for preservation.
- 3. **Proximity to Other Public Space:** Open spaces have more value when they can be connected and avoid fragmentation.
- 4. Watershed Protection: Benefits include groundwater recharge, flood resiliency, water quality, and wildlife habitat.
- 5. **Environmental Sensitivity:** It is important to preserve habitat for native plant or animal species listed as threatened or endangered.
- 6. Connectivity to Trail Network: Properties that can help to expand or fill gaps in the network should be prioritized.
- 7. Scenic Value: Properties that have high scenic value or contribute to a scenic viewshed are important to the local character and sense of place.
- 8. **Historic Value:** Properties that have historic and cultural value are important to preserve as part of the open space system.
- 9. Suitability for Recreation: Parcels that have characteristics suitable for recreation should be acquired to serve future needs.
- 10. Overall Public Benefit: Some factors are unique to the property or the Township's immediate needs may also weigh heavily in the decision to acquire land for open space and recreation.

### **Acquire Conservation Easements**

Other than outright acquisition of property, in some instances it may be more practical and feasible to acquire conservation easements for the protection of open space. In 2021 the Township acquired two major new conservation easements. Featherbed Farm (33 acres) on Featherbed Lane and the Willcox property (50 acres) on Ivy Mills Lane are significant additions to the Township inventory of protected land.

The Ivy Mills Historic District located in the southeast part of the Concord is the most prominent remaining open space in the Township. It represents the historic agrarian legacy of the Township and is highly valued by local residents for its scenic beauty and the cultural resonance. The Township should look to acquire additional conservation easements on contributing properties in the district to protect these lands from development and preserve historic character.

Conservation easements should also be prioritized for lands that have significant environmental resources, such as stream corridors and sensitive plant and animal species.

Conservation easements place restrictions on development at a lower cost than fee simple acquisition. Under a conservation easement, land remains in current ownership, but the property owner voluntarily agrees to donate or sell one or more rights attached to the land. In the case of a conservation easement, the owner agrees to relinquish or limit their rights to develop the land. Continued use by the owner may be allowed in accordance with agreed-upon terms, such as when an owner continues to farm and maintain the property.

### **Develop a Land Management Plan for Natural Resources**

Once open space property is acquired and protected from development, the condition of that property needs to be managed and maintained. Land is a living thing, subject to constant change and impacts from natural forces. As the Township inventory of open space increases, the requirements of managing that land increases in scale and complexity. This effort will be assisted greatly by development of a Management Plan to conserve and protect natural resources. This Management Plan should include guidelines to allow the Township to be responsible stewards of the natural landscape.

The Land Management Plan should assess each Township property for specific site conditions, existing and potential use of the site, problems to be addressed, immediate and long-term maintenance needs, and opportunities to foster environmental quality. It should include an operational plan for controlling invasive plant species, promoting native flora and fauna habitat, establishing and maintaining sustainable landscapes such as meadows and rain gardens, reforestation with native species, methods to provide streambank stabilization to prevent erosion, and other management best practices.

The Township should develop a plan to manage natural lands.

### **Prepare a Natural Resources Inventory**

The most thorough investigation of local natural resources was done in 2011 as part of a county-wide study performed as part of the Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program (see Chapter 2, page 12). This study identified three locations in Concord Township as high in environmental value, based on endangered flora and fauna, habitats, and environmental characteristics worthy of protection and conservation. While the County-wide study was invaluable, a Township-wide survey could provide a greater level of detail and more specific awareness of important local environmental features. This knowledge can then inform Township decisions on zoning, land development, and protection of watersheds and open space

### **Strengthen Partnerships for Natural Lands Programs and Management**

Established non-profit organizations are present in the region that offer public programs of various kinds geared toward environmental conservation and the natural landscape. The Township should strengthen these partnerships, to facilitate appropriate public programming on Township lands. Such programs can increase public awareness of open space resources and appreciation for the natural environment. Non-profit partners often have the capability and expertise to assist with management and restoration of natural lands. In recent years, collaboration with private sector partners for stewardship of public lands has grown to be prevalent, through sponsorships, programming, and other means.

Potential partners for natural lands programming and management may include:

- Brandywine Conservancy
- Newlin Grist Mill
- Darlington Arts Center
- Natural Lands Trust
- Delaware County Parks
- First State National Historical Park
- Local Health and medical community
- Local nature and outdoor oriented retailers
- Neighboring municipalities



The Township should better understand its sensitive natural resources, as well as engage partners to provide interpretive and educational programming. The private sector can contribute financial resources through sponsorships and other means.

### **Review Zoning/SALDO Ordinances**

Township Zoning and Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SLDO) codes have been recently updated to strengthen protections for open space, water resources, and natural features. While these codes have been recently updated (2016 and 2018), they should periodically be reviewed and strengthened where possible to reflect the latest best practices for protection of open space and natural resources.

The Township may wish to require trails or other open space improvements, and in having more direct control over land that is dedicated for open space as part of the land development process.

### **Adopt an Official Township Map**

To protect its interest in acquiring the properties and rights-of-way intended as future trails, open space, and protected natural resources, the Township can depict the proposed improvements on an Official Township Map. An "official map" is a combined map and ordinance designed to implement the goals set forth in the comprehensive plan. The official map shows the locations of planned future public lands and facilities such as transportation, recreational parks and trails, and open space. The official map expresses a municipality's interest in acquiring these lands for public purposes sometime in the future. The authority to create an official map is granted in Article IV of the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code (MPC).

Listing a parcel or portion of a property on an official map notifies developers and property owners that the area mapped is of interest to a municipality for public purposes sometime in the future. According to the MPC, designation of a property on the official map does not constitute a taking in and of itself. It simply gives a municipality an opportunity to negotiate acquisition of property, or rights thereto, where a public use would be beneficial before development or redevelopment occurs. Adoption of the Official Map and corresponding Ordinance are subject to public review and must follow an established process as required by the MPC.

### **Update the Township Comprehensive Plan**

The recommendations of this Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan may be incorporated into the Concord Township Comprehensive Plan. The Comprehensive Plan represents the overriding planning document that formally defines the community vision and articulate in detail the long-term community goals and objectives. The Comprehensive Plan serves as the basis for implementation of a wide range of municipal land use policies such as Zoning, and Land Development Ordinances. It also is a basis to justify major capital improvements such as for utility and transportation infrastructure. The Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan relates most closely to the Recreation, Transportation and Natural Resources elements of the Comprehensive Plan, and those sections may be updated to reflect the recommendations of this Plan.





#### **Construct the Octoraro Trail**

Funding has already been secured to design and construct portions of the Octoraro Trail, per the goals of the Octoraro Greenway Feasibility Study. The Octoraro has the potential to serve as a major local trail spine and future link to the regional trail network. Currently in the design stage, the proposed Trail is planned to run along the alignment of the former Octoraro railway. The first Phase (1A) of construction is planned to originate at Route 202 just south of the Brandywine Mills shopping center and run eastward approximately 1 mile to Temple Road. The following Phase (1B) will continue the trail eastward for another mile to Concord Road, where there is the potential to connect to the existing trail

network at Newlin Grist Mill, at Concord Road. Phase 2 is envisioned to extend the trail through Newlin Grist Mill, for which careful planning and close coordination with the Newlin Grist Mill will be necessary.

The Octoraro is highly valued not only as a local resource, but also for its potential to connect to the broader regional trail network. The trail can connect to the planned Chester Creek Trail, now under construction in Middletown Township, and from there to other existing and planned trail segments that are part of the growing network. It could also connect to the planned SEPTA regional rail Wawa train station, allowing for a true multimodal transportation connection.

While partial funding for Phase 1A has been secured, it is necessary to continue to plan and seek funding for design and construction of future phases. Extensive community outreach will also be needed, including right-of-way acquisition to extend the trail eastward toward Chester Heights, and coordination with Chadds Ford Township on connection west across Route 202 into Chadds Ford.

The goal is for Phase 1A to be constructed within the next two years, and Phase 1B to be constructed within the two following years. For more information on the planned alignment and other details, see the Octoraro Greenway Feasibility Study.



Phase 1B of the Octoraro Trail is planned to pick up at Temple Road and move east as far as Concord Road where it will connect to Newlin Grist Mill. An existing underpass will allow the trail to cross beneath Route 322.





### **Construct the Garnet Valley Greenway**

In 2020, Concord Township completed the grant-funded *Garnet Valley Greenway* Feasibility Study, a planned trail along the utility corridor occupied primarily by PECO electrical transmission lines. The route of the proposed Greenway is approximately 2.5 miles long from Spring Valley Road to Clayton Park. Additional recreation options will be enhanced by providing off-road linkages between other trails, parks and other public destinations. The potential trail route represents an outstanding opportunity to connect a variety of existing community facilities as well as several established residential neighborhoods. A recreation trail in this location would also help to expand the local and regional trail network, since it connects directly to the planned Octorara Trail.

Parks and community facilities that are along the Garnet Valley Greenway route include Concord Township Park, Rachel Kohl Library, Clayton Park, Garnet Valley Schools, and Bush Hill Farm, as well as the route of the planned Octoraro Greenway. Residential

neighborhoods that could be directly served by the Greenway include Fox Hill Farms, Concord Hunt, and Sharpless Farm.

The first phase of design and construction is envisioned to connect the Concord Township Park with the Octoraro Trail to the north.

It is necessary to secure funding for design and construction, acquire right-of-way, and continue public outreach to potential trail neighbors. Portions of the alignment are on property owned by PECO Energy, and an access license agreement will be needed.

For more details of the alignment and implementation steps, see the Garnet Valley Greenway Feasibility Study.

### **Expand Bethel-Featherbed Trail Network**

The growing assemblage of Township land in the vicinity of Bethel Road and Featherbed Lane can be planned to form an interconnected network of natural walking trails (see also "passive recreation" below).

Natural grass walking paths have already been established at Bush Hill Farm on Bethel Road and at the Smallbrook Preserve a short distance away on Featherbed Lane. Both these properties are directly adjacent to Delaware County's Clayton Park and have the potential for an expanded network of connected trails.

As noted earlier, the Township recognizes the value of protecting additional undeveloped open space in this area, and in recent years has acquired several contiguous parcels.

Future acquisition of properties can allow these existing trails to connect into an extensive network of "nature trails" that will have their own distinct purpose and character different from the more formal paved trails planned for elsewhere in the Township. The trails and associated open space comprising the Bethel-Featherbed hub will connect directly to the planned Garnet Valley Greenway, from there linking to a variety of community and recreation resources in the Township. (See also Passive Recreation, below.)

### **Develop Trail Connections to First State National Historical Park**

Concord Township is uniquely positioned at the gateway of the Brandywine Valley to connect trail networks in Pennsylvania and Delaware. West of Route 202, the southwest portion of the Township known as Beaver Valley contains a network of paved and unpaved trails that are accessible to the public. These trails extend into the State of Delaware and nearby Brandywine Creek State Park. This area is part of the First State National Historical Park, which was established by the National Park Service to protect and conserve important historical and cultural sites across the state of Delaware.

First State National Historical Park (NHP) is made up of six sites spread throughout the state of Delaware. More than 1,300 acres of rolling agricultural fields, pastures, forested hills, and streams preserve the natural and cultural legacy of the larger Brandywine Valley in northern Delaware and southern Pennsylvania. There are more than 23-miles of recreational trails available, as well as horseback riding, biking, and kayaking. While primarily in Delaware, the Park includes more than 250-acres in Concord Township.

The Township has secured funding from Pennsylvania DCNR to study ways to connect First State to the existing trails and recreation resources in the heart of the Township. The growing Township trail network can extend west toward Route 202 by knitting together a combination of on-street trail segments, HOA open space, and isolated Township-owned properties. The study is scheduled to begin in 2022.




Concord will benefit from establishing trail connections to the existing open space resources of First State National Park.



### **Construct Smithbridge Road Pedestrian Connections**

Significant improvements to Smithbridge Road are planned to include a multi-use asphalt path between Kirk/Temple Roads and Garnet Valley High School and a controlled street crossing to Concord Township Park. These pedestrian accommodations along this busy street will greatly enhance the ability to safely move on foot or bicycle between the Community Park and adjacent Rachel Kohl Library and Garnet Valley schools. They will also directly link to the planned Garnet Valley Greenway. The Smithbridge Road improvements are funded largely by state and federal grants and are currently planned for construction in 2022-2023.






Pedestrian/bicycle improvements along Smithbridge Road will improve the ability to connect between the Community Park, Library, and neighboring schools.

### **Develop Trail Connections Linking Neighborhoods** to Recreation and Commerce

In addition to primary trail spines and secondary hubs that have been described in this Plan, additional smaller local trail connections are also possible to link neighborhoods, recreation, and commerce. The Concord Township Greenways and Open Space Network Plan (2015) noted a wide variety of other possible trail connections of various styles. Building upon that earlier study, the recent Route 1 and Route 202 Area Bike and Pedestrian Study (2020) recommends extensive sidewalk and trail connections linking neighborhoods to the commercial destinations along the commercial corridors of Route 1 and Route 202. Many recommendations of this study include the creation of direct linkages to recreation and trails, including:

- Just south of the Brandywine Mills shopping center, the planned Octoraro Trail
  is intended to cross Route 202 at the intersection of Applied Card Way. This is a
  key crossroads where recreation leads directly to retail and dining. The
  intersection can be designed to facilitate a more inviting connection so that
  residents will have an easy off-road way to reach shopping destinations.
- The planned Octoraro Trail can be connected to Baltimore Pike (Route 1) with an off-road connection along Brinton Lake Road. The Wawa at the corner can serve as a natural trail head. A second connector can be developed feeding into Concordville Town Center. This has the potential to connect residents in the Meadow Run and Sharpless Farms neighborhoods, as well as The Point apartment complex and Maris Grove retirement community.
- The Concord Township Municipal Complex is home to many of the Township's municipal functions and is also a nexus for community recreation. Existing Township trails at the Municipal Complex can connect to the adjacent Newlin Grist Mill trail network, which is planned to be an important access point for the Octoraro Trail.
- The high-volume intersection of Routes 1 and 202 poses a hostile environment for pedestrians and cyclists. As an alternative, a system of shared lane markings would provide a safe route for bicycles on the relatively low-traffic loop streets Brandywine Drive, State Farm Drive, Applied Bank Boulevard, and Hillman Drive. A continuous pedestrian sidewalk around the circumference of the loop will help connect retail/dining destinations with office and residential uses, as well as adjacent neighborhoods.

### **Develop Trail Connections to Concord Road Properties**

Recent Township acquisitions along Concord Road have resulted in a 17-acre tract that may be suitable for trail connections. This tract is adjacent to the Township Sewer Authority property, and in close proximity to the planned Octoraro Greenway as well as the Concord Woods neighborhood. Neighboring St. John's Episcopal Church may be a willing partner on open space initiatives.

#### **Outreach to Homeowner's Associations**

Many potential opportunities for trails exist on dedicated open space controlled by Homeowners Associations (HOAs). In most cases, this open space consists of stream corridors that have a high degree environmental value. These linear corridors also are often ideal for trail development. The Township should continue dialogue with Homeowners Associations to explore the potential of using dedicated HOA open space for trail linkages as part of an interconnected network. These can be a valuable recreation and transportation amenity for residents. Under certain circumstances, the Township may be willing to accept dedicated HOA open space as part of the Township open space inventory.

### **Recommendations for**

### **PASSIVE RECREATION**

Several Township properties have been lightly improved in recent years for passive recreation in the form of natural walking trails. These include Bush Hill Farm on Bethel Road, Smallbrook Preserve at Hillsborough on Featherbed Lane, and Phipps Farm on Smithbridge Road adjacent to the Township Park. The recent Township acquisition of additional open space properties creates expanded opportunities for passive recreation. This may include connecting trail segments into a cohesive network, as well as other passive activities appropriate for the setting.

### Improve Event Space at Township Park

In addition to its many recreation assets, the Concord Township Park on Smithbridge Road serves as a de facto community hub, and host to a wide variety of community events during the year. The Park is undergoing a general upgrade to improve its appearance and would benefit from site planning to better organize its current elements. This can be addressed as part of a comprehensive park Master Plan, as also noted under *Active Recreation*, below. Specific park improvements would enhance the ability of the Township to hold special events here. These improvements may include:

- Expanded parking
- Better pedestrian circulation and gathering areas
- Better spectator area for the bandshell
- Improved restrooms
- Higher quality materials and amenities such as lighting
- Shade trees and ornamental landscaping
- Clear and consistent signage

### **Develop Plans for Additional Gathering Space**

While the capacity of the Township Park to hold events can be improved, there is a perceived need for a second primary event space elsewhere in the Township. This space would be to accommodate events of a size or type that could not easily be held at the Township Park. Such events may include large-scale festivals or performances, or events requiring more space. Further planning for Township properties can address the feasibility for such as space, including the adaptive re-use of existing structures.

### **Expand Bethel/Featherbed Open Space Hub**

As noted above under *Trails*, above, the Township has been working to assemble a significant collection of contiguous open space properties in the vicinity of Bethel Road and Featherbed Lane, opposite Delaware County's Clayton Park, including Bush Hill Farm, Smallbrook Preserve, and Featherbed Farm. These properties have high environmental value as well as great potential for a range of passive recreation uses. In addition to the potential for a widespread network of nature trails (noted above), these properties have the potential to accommodate equestrian uses, for which there is a demand in this part of the Township. The Township should continue to investigate other potential passive recreation uses, as well as opportunities to expand this open space resource with strategic future acquisitions of additional open space properties. The first step will be a Master Plan for Bush Hill Farm, which is at the core of this open space hub, as noted above.

### **Prepare Master Plan for Bush Hill Farm**

The Township acquired the Bush Hill Farm property with the intention of preserving open space and utilizing the site primarily for passive recreation purposes. Since that time, only minimal improvements have been made beyond basic maintenance. Public usage of the site has been primarily for the dog park established using former horse paddocks, as well as seasonal events such as the Harvest Festival and Easter Egg Hunt. The Township leases portions of the property to a tenant to keep horses and goats.

In 2021, the Township secured grant funding for and will begin preparation of a formal Master Plan for Bush Hill Farm. This study will seek to define clear programmatic uses for the property, and outline specific improvements needed to best adapt the property to those uses.

### **Prepare Master Plan for Temple Road Open Space**

Similar to the Bethel/Featherbed vicinity, the Township owns multiple undeveloped open space properties along Temple Road near the Concord Township Park. The intended future uses of these should be studied and planned jointly as part of a master plan to assess the feasibility to create a passive recreation hub.

Walking trails have recently been established at the Phipps Farm property, located at the northwest corner of Temple Road and Smithbridge Road. With a pedestrian crossing of Temple Road, these trails connect directly to the highly popular walking trail in the Township Park. Other passive uses may also be considered for Phipps Farm, such as historic interpretation, rehabilitation of the historic ruins, designed ornamental and/or community gardens, and other similar features. Given the proximity to the Township Park, supporting amenities there may be close enough to make these unnecessary on the Phipps property. Continued outreach will be needed to immediate neighbors such as Fox Hill Farm.

A short distance north on Temple Road, the Township recently acquired another open space parcel adjacent to the Waterford at Garnet Valley development. This open space occupies key location linking the Octoraro Trail and Garnet Valley Greenway and is ideal for development as a future trail head. The Greenway will provide a direct connection the Township Park to the south. This property also has a high degree of environmental value with the presence of wetlands, stream corridor, and pond. It is easy to envision nature trails here to facilitate environmental education and programs.

Just further to the north on Spring Valley Road, the historic AME church is being restored by the Township and has the potential to serve as a trail head entrance for the future Octoraro Trail and Garnet Valley Greenway. Across the street, Main Line Health has undeveloped property and may serve as a natural partner in promoting the health benefits of open space.

### **Strengthen Partnerships for Passive Recreation Programs**

As for active recreation noted above, the Township should strengthen partnerships with outside organizations to provide programming for passive recreation. Potential partners include agencies and non-profit organizations such as First State National Historical Park, Newlin Grist Mill, Brandywine Conservancy, Darlington Arts Center, and others, as well as local nature and outdoor oriented retailers such as Trail Creek Outfitters and Wild Birds Unlimited. (see also Conservation, above.)

Events such as nature hikes and bird watching are planned in 2022 in partnership with Newlin Grist Mill and Wild Birds Unlimited. An expanded range of similar programs may be possible in the future.

### **Recommendations for**

### **ACTIVE RECREATION**

Township residents benefit from a wide range of available options for active recreation. These include strong local youth sports programs and relatively abundant athletic field and court facilities. The Township should build on this solid foundation by expanding the variety of available activities and strengthening partnerships with outside organizations for programming and other assistance.

### **Enhance Township Park and Municipal Complex as Active Recreation Hubs**

Concord Township Park (Smithbridge Road) and the Township Municipal Complex (Thornton Road) are two of the primary locations for active recreation in Concord. (Two other primary locations - Brandywine Youth Club Gillespie Park and Garnet Valley Schools – are not managed by Township.) Both sites have space and capacity to accommodate additional facilities and activities. There is a value to concentrating active recreation opportunities where these already exist, so that supporting infrastructure such as parking and restrooms can be shared.

Master Plans for both Township sites should be developed that assess feasibility to add active new recreation features and account for expanded needs for parking and amenities to support increased usage, along with overall park landscape management. Based on public feedback, potential new active recreation features to be considered may include:

- outdoor basketball courts
- additional pickleball courts
- water sprayground
- adult fitness exercise circuit
- bocce courts
- disc golf

Both sites may also accommodate expanded features for passive recreation and trails, as well as a wide range of additional programs and activities.

## **Strengthen Partnerships for Recreation Programming**

While the Township provides high-quality recreation facilities at the two sites noted above, the Township does not have the ability to directly manage recreation programming. Organized recreation events and leagues are managed by outside non-profit organizations and clubs which may utilize Township facilities by agreement. Most notable of these is Brandywine Youth Club (BYC), which offers a range of youth sports. Similarly, the Garnet Valley School District makes district facilities available to the community under certain terms and conditions.

The Township should coordinate closely with outside recreation partners such as BYC and the school district to confirm facility allocation and plan for potential future growth. For example, if the Township is to consider adding new recreation facilities on its properties, it should be clear from the outside if user groups are intended to include organized programs, and agreements for use, operations, and maintenance be outlined in advance.

## **Designate Alternative Location(s) for Future Active Recreation**

While it appears both the Township Park and Municipal Complex have room to support further recreation features, capacity is nonetheless limited, especially for larger playing fields. In the future, recreation needs may arise that cannot be satisfied at those two sites. Another site in the Township should be identified and designated for future active recreation. Ideally, this site should be relatively free of physical and environmental constraints that would limit the ability to develop, as well as have adequate space for the facilities and supporting infrastructure. Factors such as traffic impacts, available utilities, and impacts to neighbors should all be taken into consideration.

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# Recommendations for

## LAND MANAGEMENT

As the Township's inventory of open space property and facilities continues to grow, the duties of managing these resources becomes more extensive. The numerous recent, pending, and planned improvements will greatly increase maintenance demands. Even unimproved natural lands need to be carefully managed, since land is a living thing, subject to constant change and impacts from natural forces. The capacity for maintenance and operations will need to increase for the Township to be responsible stewards of its property and facilities.

## **Hire a Parks and Open Space Director**

Responsibility for managing parks and open space needs in Concord has traditionally fallen within the many overall duties of the Township Manager. Presently, the Township has no full-time administrative staff devoted to parks and open space. To better address the increasing responsibilities of open space management, the Township has plans to fund a new position of Parks and Open Space Director to provide comprehensive oversight for issues relevant to open space property and recreation facilities. Duties may include:

- plan and direct capital improvements
- grant writing/fund raising
- liaison to programming partners
- liaison to public works for maintenance
- establish and coordinate parks volunteer efforts
- secure and manage sponsorships
- coordinate efforts for future acquisitions and improvements

## **Increase Public Works Capacity for Maintenance**

With the increase in acquisitions and preservation of open space, in addition to the construction of physical improvements such as trails, playgrounds, pickleball and similar, a need for additional funding and staffing for Public Works is critical. The Township has done an excellent job maintaining its primary parks facilities, as recognized by the high level of public satisfaction expressed in the public opinion survey. The Township should review current operations, workload and budgeting to determine what is needed with regards to:

- Additional maintenance needed for new properties and capital improvements
- Added responsibility for implementing land management plans
- Increased budget for Public Works
- Public Works management and operational structure
- Specialized training in natural lands management
- Short and long-term maintenance needs

A detailed evaluation can assist the Township in ensuring proper maintenance of these resources.



As recreation facilities and open space areas increase, capacity to manage those resources should also increase.

## **Expand Administrative Structure for Open Space Management**

The scope and ambition of the Township's Open Space plan may prove to be overly broad to be effectively implemented within the current administrative framework. The existing administrative structure for managing parks and open space consists of the following:

- Township Council: Sets policy, approves expenditures, and endorses recommendations of the Park and Recreation Board.
- Park and Recreation Board: Advises Council on priorities for parks and recreation initiatives, manages community events, and makes recommendations to the Council for budgetary expenditures.
- Township Manager: Oversees the hiring of professional consultants, oversees public works department in managing maintenance and construction projects, oversees preparation of grant applications and other fundraising efforts, manages budget.

It may be necessary to expand the Township administrative **open space management structure** to provide more effective stewardship of open space resources. In addition to creating a new full time staff position noted above, the role of current Park and Recreation Board may be expanded to incorporate all forms of public open space. Subcommittees can then be established to deal directly with specific issues. These committees can be populated with members that have specialized knowledge and interest in these relevant areas and would work closely with the Parks and Open Space Director. These may include the following, along with others as may be deemed appropriate:

- Trails Committee: Plan, implement, and coordinate trail improvements and maintenance.
- Natural Lands Committee: Oversee the management, maintenance, and programming for natural lands.
- Recreation Committee: Plan for improvements and maintenance of recreation fields and facilities, oversee event programming, and coordinate with programming partners.

As an alternative, Concord may also consider establishing an Environmental Advisory Council (EAC) to serve in an advisory capacity to help inform decision-making regarding the environment and related issues (see Chapter 5 for more information).

#### Work with Partners and/or Consultants to Obtain Grants

The Township should augment in-house staff capability with outside expertise in identifying and securing grant funding. Non-profit partners can provide valuable staff resources and lend credibility. Paid consultants can sometimes bring highly specialized knowledge and professional contacts that can pay dividends in successful grant applications.

## **Create Opportunities for Volunteer Participation**

There is ample precedent in the region for public-private partnership for operations and maintenance of public open space. It is very common for parks and other public places to have "Friends" groups made up of local volunteers. These groups can provide supplemental services over and above the basic services provided by the municipality, such as volunteer labor, modest financial contributions, technical expertise, or other in-kind services. The Township should create a variety of opportunities to encourage volunteer participation to maintain and improve its open space.



# 5 Implementation

The previous chapters outline the *What?* - a broad range of recommendations for individual parks and open space intended to better provide for the current and future recreation and open space needs of the community.

This chapter concerns the *How?* - the steps necessary to implement the proposed improvements and bring these ideas to reality. This section is organized as follows:

 Action Plan: Specific tasks to be performed to implement the recommendations, along with recommended sequence and timing.

## Open Space Funding

- Anticipated Costs: Estimated costs for planning, acquisitions, physical improvements, and maintenance
- Current Budget Resources: Sources of revenue to fund recreation and open space expenses.
- o Return on Investment: Benefits of investing in public open space.

## • Implementation Tools

- Funding Tools: Potential sources of new revenue to fund expanded efforts.
- Acquisition Tools: Methods and strategies to acquire open space property
- Planning Tools: Policy and regulatory techniques to achieve open space goals.

- Policy recommendations are actions that are largely administrative and can be performed with existing staff using existing resources. Examples of policy recommendations are updating zoning ordinances or drafting an official map. Since implementation of policy actions does not require much in the way of funding, these can be undertaken almost immediately. The impact of policy changes may seem subtle, since they rarely result in tangible improvements in the ground that can be seen right away. However, policy changes are critical since they establish clear objectives for planning and development and set the legal framework for funding and management of improvement plans.
- Planning recommendations are those that clarify goals, investigate possibilities, and identify specific projects. Examples of planning efforts include drawing up master plans for future park expansion; feasibility studies to determine whether certain "good ideas" are really possible; public outreach to build broad support and understanding; coordination between the Township and its partners; and many other activities. There are many grant and funding programs for planning activities available to municipalities, which are described later in this chapter. Since the level of funding necessary is moderate, planning efforts can be undertaken in the near-term.
- Capital Projects are those involving acquisition of property or
  construction of physical improvements. Larger capital projects frequently
  require funding beyond the typical municipal operating budget. Concord
  Township should look to outside sources of funding, such as grants,
  bonds, or other techniques described later in this chapter. Since the
  process of raising capital funds is often laborious and time-consuming,
  these projects are usually seen as long-term.

## **Universal Design and Barrier-Free Accessibility**

The Township's goal is to provide recreation facilities and experiences for all ages and abilities including the physically handicapped. This aligns with Pennsylvania's goal to provide "Recreation for All", as well as federal mandates outlined in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Access is one of the important factors influencing recreation participation. All people, including those with disabilities, kids and older adults, deserve safe and easy access to recreational facilities. As local populations age, accessibility of recreation areas to people with limited mobility or other physical conditions will become more important. These citizens will be looking for opportunities for healthy recreation in the outdoors, and facilities should be accessible to them.

Under federal regulations, when parks and recreation facilities are built or altered, they must comply with the ADA Standards for Accessible Design (ADA Standards), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability. It requires, among other things, that newly constructed and altered "places of public accommodation" be readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities. Facilities must provide accessible routes connecting all accessible elements and spaces within areas of indoor or outdoor sports activities.

The concept of "universal design" goes beyond the design requirements of the ADA and involves more than simply providing barrier-free routes for the physically disabled. Universal design principles emphasizing building places that can be accessed, understood, and used to the greatest extent possible by all people, regardless of their age, size, ability or disability. This includes the very old, very young, those with visual and auditory impairments, as well as those with physical or mental handicaps.

For walking trails, it is sometimes difficult to achieve barrier-free access, especially in wooded or naturalistic settings. In general, trails should be designed to comply with current standards for universal accessibility. Trails that do not offer ADA accessibility may not be eligible to receive state funding from PennDOT or DCNR.

However, some accessibility design standards may not be easily applicable to the natural environment. At the federal level, the United States Forest Service (USFS) has developed Forest Service Trail Accessibility Guidelines (FSTG), which are helpful because they "provide guidance for maximizing accessibility of trails... while recognizing and protecting the unique characteristics of their natural setting."

These guidelines encourage design for increased accessibility but recognize that accessibility isn't possible everywhere because of the limitations imposed by natural terrain, existing vegetation, or other constraints. Where terrain allows accessible slopes, a range of surfacing choices create levels of accessibility that respond to the character and desired use of the trail. While full accessibility may not always be achievable, design should always provide access to the greatest extent possible. Departures from specific accessibility guidelines are allowed where compliance would:

- 1. Cause substantial harm to cultural, historic, religious, or significant natural features or characteristics;
- 2. Substantially alter the nature of the setting or the purpose;
- 3. Require construction methods or materials that are prohibited by Federal, State, or local regulations or statutes;
- 4. Not be feasible due to terrain or the prevailing construction practices.



Parks and open space should be designed so they can be enjoyed by people of all ages and abilities.





## 10-Year Action Plan

With a focused and consistent approach, it is conceivable that a significant number of the Plan recommendations can be completed or underway within the next ten years. (See *chart also*, pages 69-70).

## Years 0-2

Near-term actions should focus on tasks and projects that can achieve results quickly and effectively. Tangible results will build momentum and public support and demonstrate credibility with stakeholders and potential funding partners. Other short-term actions should involve continued planning for the more ambitious elements of the Plan. Bigger, more complicated projects take time, since they involve many steps and many stakeholders. Near-term actions that could be initiated within the next two years include:

- Pursue additional open space property acquisitions and conservation easements, especially in key areas such as the Bethel/Featherbed hub, Beaver Valley, and Ivy Mills Historic District.
- Municipal Complex: Construct additional pickleball courts and determine capacity for new active new recreation features and supporting infrastructure and amenities, along with land management needs.
- Township Park: Determine new recreation features that may be added and install upgraded supporting infrastructure such as parking and other amenities, as well as to develop landscape management plan for naturalized areas.
- 4. Prepare Master Plan for Township's Temple Road open space and Phipps Farm property, especially feasibility to create and environmental conservation.
- 5. Bush Hill Farms: Complete Master Plan Study to clarify desired program elements and future improvements.
- Smallbrook Preserve: Expand unpaved walking trail and add supporting amenities. Prepare Master Plan for expanded passive recreation uses and land management.

- 7. First State National Historical Park (FSNHP): Complete study to identify alternatives to develop pedestrian/bicycle connections from FSNP to the overall Township trail system.
- 8. Smithbridge Road: Construct planned pedestrian connections.
- 9. Develop management operations plan to conserve and protect natural lands (invasive species, meadows, etc.)
- 10. Garnet Valley Greenway: Complete design of Phase 1 (Township Park to Spring Valley Road, see Garnet Valley Greenway Feasibility Study) and continue outreach to PECO, neighbors, and other stakeholders for future phases.
- 11. Octoraro Trail: Construct Phase 1A and secure funding for design and construction of Phase 1B.
- 12. Clarify administrative responsibilities for implementing open space and recreation improvements. Consider adding additional management-level staff position, as well as advisory board(s)/commission(s).
- 13. Continue outreach to HOAs for potential trail connections on HOA open space.
- 14. Engage in active dialogue with programming partners including Garnet Valley School District, Brandywine Youth Club, Newlin Grist Mill, and Darlington Arts Center.

#### Years 3-5

In subsequent years, further steps can be taken to advance projects, and physical improvements can be made to high-priority sites identified during the community outreach and master planning phases. During years 3-5, Concord Township should expect to undertake the following activities:

- Pursue funding for design and construction of future phases of the Octoraro Trail.
- 2. Pursue funding for design and construction of future phases of the Garnet Valley Greenway.
- Design and construct recreation and infrastructure improvements to Township Park and Municipal Complex.
- 4. Develop plan for additional walking trail connections to fulfill goals of Trails Master Plan
- Prepare Master Plan for passive recreation hub at Bethel/Featherbed, including further property acquisitions and connections to Clayton Park.
- 6. Design and construct first phase of improvements to Bush Hill Farm, per the recommendations of the Master Plan.
- Prepare a formal natural resources inventory to identity species, habitats, and environmental characteristics worthy of protection/conservation.
- 8. Prepare and Official Township Map to designate future intended improvements.

## **Years 6-10**


Long term goals should include implementation of recommendations made as an outcome of detailed near term planning studies. During years 6-10, the following projects and activities are anticipated:

- 1. Design and construct remaining phases of the Octoraro Trail.
- 2. Design and construct improvements to the Temple Road properties, including Phipps Farm.
- Design and construct physical on- and off-road bicycle and pedestrian improvements to connect to Beaver Valley and First State National Historical Park, per the recommendations of the earlier planning study.
- 4. Design and construct improvements to the Bethel/Featherbed hub.
- 5. Institutionalize an effective and consistent program for the maintenance and management of natural lands.
- 6. Develop plan for additional walking trail connections to fulfill goals of Trails Master Plan.
- 7. Prepare updated Municipal Comprehensive Plan.

## **Anticipated Costs**

As described in the previous Chapter, the Plan includes a wide range of recommendations. Some can be implemented at minimal cost, while others are very ambitious and will require significant financial investment. It is expected that funds for major expenditures will be sought from grants and other outside sources and will not be funded from the operating budget of the Township. Minor expenditures for small projects, planning efforts and specific maintenance tasks will be funded from the annual budget and should be planned for accordingly.

Ultimately, the total cost of planned improvements will be dependent on the exact nature of the work, which will need to be determined by a thoughtful planning process for each individual park site. Until such time as specific improvement plans are drawn up, potential costs are speculative.





## **Return on Investment**

In 2011, the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission and the GreenSpace Alliance prepared Return on Environment - The Economic Value of Protected Open Space in Southeastern Pennsylvania. This study quantifies the ways that access to local open space accounts for millions of dollars each year in

savings, earnings, and avoided costs. Open spaces are productive assets that generate significant economic value. They contribute to our local economies and property values, and they help us save on everything from health care to recreation. They also naturally improve the air we breathe and the water we



drink, reducing the cost of providing these basic needs.

To better understand how these investments specifically impact Delaware County, the County is embarking on a new study to identify how these trends apply specifically to Delaware County, expected to be completed by the end of 2021.

The DVRPC report defines the economic value of local open space, such as:

Open Space Enhances Home Values: Homes that are closer to open space enjoy a more significant property value increase.

- Open space adds \$16.3 billion to the value of southeastern Pennsylvania's housing stock.
- Protected open space generates \$240 million annually in property tax revenues to support county and municipal governments and local school districts.

Open Space Promotes Clean Air and Water: Although these vital services are provided naturally by the environment that surrounds us, they would be costly to replicate. If the region's open space were lost to development, we would need to spend more than \$132.5 million per year to do what our preserved lands already do.

- Southeastern Pennsylvania realizes nearly \$61 million in annual cost savings from protected open spaces' ability to naturally filter out pollutants and replenish water supply.
- The total annual benefit generated by natural flood mitigation services is more than \$37 million.
- Trees on protected open space are estimated to provide \$17 million in annual air pollution removal and carbon sequestration services.

Open Space Provides Low- or No-Cost Recreation that Saves Money and Improves Health: Outdoor exercise improves our health and well-being. Improved health prevents nearly \$800 million in medical care costs annually.

- 41% of physical exercise is performed in a park or on a trail.
- Nearly \$577 million in benefits accrue annually to residents who participate in recreational activities on protected open space.
- Each household in the region saves \$392 per year by having open space available for recreation and exercise.
- The health-related cost savings resulting from physical activity on protected open space amount to \$1.3 billion per year including avoided workers' compensation costs and avoided productivity losses.

Open Space Creates Jobs and Attracts People W BGho Spend Money in our Communities: Parks, trails, and farms are destinations that attract visitors who spend millions of dollars in our regional economy. Each year open space accounts for \$566 million in expenditures and almost \$299 million in salaries.

- Economic activity associated with protected open space results in more than 6,900 jobs and \$299 million in annual earnings.
- Total annual expenditures in the five-county region associated with protected open space equal \$566 million. Specifically \$174 million, or 31%, is attributable to spending associated with the management and maintenance of publicly protected open space; \$206 million, or 36%, accounts for agricultural sales associated with preserved farmland; and \$187 million, or 33%, is generated through tourist activity associated with protected open space.
- Economic activity associated with protected open space generates \$30 million per year in state and local tax revenue.

## **Potential Implementation Partners**

Potential funding resources for acquisition, design, and construction of open space and recreation facilities can be found through a variety of federal, state, and local grants. Each has specific requirements and is subject to certain limitations. These grant programs are almost universally competitive and are awarded based on the merits of individual proposed projects and on the quality of grant application submissions. It is expected that grants such as these will be an essential source

Achieving the goals of this Plan will require the cooperation of a broad range of partners and stakeholders. Given the cost and complexities involved in land conservation, Concord Township can go it alone. Neighboring municipal governments, land trusts, non-profits, and private sector developers must forge public-private partnerships to help preserve valuable open space. The more broadly Concord Township can reach out to partners, the more successful these efforts can be.

Some potential partners are noted in Chapter 4. Additional potential partnerships may include these local and national organizations.

Natural Lands Trust: Based in Delaware County, Natural Lands Trust is a nonprofit organization that saves open space, cares for nature, and connects people



to the outdoors in eastern Pennsylvania and southern New Jersey. The Trust currently owns 42 nature preserves and one public garden across two states and 13 counties, totaling more than 23,000 acres. The Trust also

assists municipalities and other non-profits to permanently protect natural areas through acquisition and land protection agreements (conservation easements), and by helping communities preserve more of their land.

Brandywine Conservancy: Based in nearby Chadds Ford, the Conservancy is a strong proponent of trails and open space conservation. The Conservancy



provides conservation and planning services to private landowners and municipal officials in southeastern Pennsylvania and northern Delaware and has extensive experience working on the broadest array of

conservation easements, including private land, working farms, sensitive natural areas, scenic landscapes, and historic sites and structures.

**Newlin Grist Mill:** The Newlin Grist Mill and the surrounding park is a critically valuable institutional open space in the Township. It features a working grist mill, public programs, and over 8 miles of nature trails. For more than fifty years, the



Nicholas Newlin Foundation has served its community through the preservation of history and open space, conservation of plants, animals, and waterways, and as a place for both education and recreation. Today, the Nicholas Newlin Foundation continues to maintain the Newlin Grist Mill and Park along with its twelve historic structures and miles of hiking

trails. Newlin Grist Mill is currently partnering with the Township to preserve and interpret the Newlin Loa Home and Tavern and will be a key partner in expanding the Township trails network.

Delaware County: With its 2015 Open Space, Recreation, and Greenways Plan, Delaware County has taken a strong role in advocating for the expansion of the



county-wide trail network. Through its Planning Department, the County can play an important role in coordinating the many independent planning initiatives that may be in play at a given time and identifying opportunities for synergy. Furthermore, the County plays an important role in determining funding allocations for regional trails programs.

The Conservation Fund: Since 1985, the Conservation Fund has helped protect more than 8 million acres of America's most important, at-risk lands and waters.



In 2021, the Fund worked on more than 150 projects in 35 states conserving nearly 207,000 acres valued at more than \$323 million. Often this

assistance comes in the form of loans to help purchase and protect valuable open space. In the local region, the Fund assisted the Brandywine Conservancy in purchasing and protecting the largest and most historically prized 100 acres within the Brandywine Battlefield National Historic Landmark in Chadds Ford.

## **Grant Funding Programs**

Potential funding resources for acquisition, design, and construction of open space and recreation facilities can be found through a variety of federal, state, and local grants. Each has specific requirements and is subject to certain limitations. These grant programs are almost universally competitive and are awarded based on the merits of individual proposed projects and on the quality of grant application submissions. It is expected that grants such as these will be an essential source to fund most of the expense of expanding local open space resources.

## Federal Programs

Grant programs sponsored by federal agencies (such as the Federal Highway Administration) are administered at the state level by various state agencies and at the regional level by the local Metropolitan Planning Organization, which for the southeast Pennsylvania region is the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC). Application for federal funding is made to the specific state or regional agency designated for each specific program.

## Regional Programs

## <u>DVRPC - Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission</u>

DVRPC administers a range of funding programs to facilitate planning and design of trails and greenways. These programs evolve annually. In recent years, programs oriented toward multi-



modal transportation have included the Transportation and Community Development Initiative (TCDI), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), and Regional Trails Programs (RTP). It is expected that programs of a similar nature will be offered in future years.

## Pennsylvania State Programs

## DCED - Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program (GTRP)

The PA Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) administers this program, which allocates funds to the Commonwealth Financing



Authority (CFA) for planning, acquisition, development, rehabilitation and repair of greenways, recreational trails, open space, parks and beautification projects.

## DCED and PennDOT - Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF)

The PA DCED and PennDOT each administer this program, which provides grants to encourage economic development and ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available to the residents of the Commonwealth. Funds may be used for the development, rehabilitation and enhancement of transportation assets to existing communities, including lighting, sidewalk enhancement, pedestrian safety, bicycle circulation, connectivity of transportation assets and transit-oriented development.

### PennDOT - Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Program (TA)

The TA program utilizes federal funds authorized through the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century (MAP-21) legislation. Funding is awarded by PennDOT, with program administration at the local region provided by DVRPC. Each County recommends its top priority projects requesting



funding. TAP grants are intended for pedestrian and bicycle facilities, improved access to public transportation, safe routes to school, and trails projects that serve a transportation purpose, while promoting safety and mobility.

## DCNR - PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources

DCNR administers a range of grant programs to fund parks, recreation, and open space projects in local Pennsylvania communities. Most prominent among these programs are the federally-funded Recreation Trail Program and the state-funded Community Conservation Partnerships Program (C2P2).



- The <u>Recreation Trails Program</u> is designed to develop recreational trails and trail related facilities for trail users. Project examples include development and rehabilitation of trailside and trailhead facilities and trail linkages and acquisition of easements or property for recreation trails.
- The <u>Community Conservation Partnerships Program (C2P2)</u> is designed to provide grants for comprehensive recreation and park planning and greenway planning. Potential projects include development of public park and trail recreation facilities, acquiring land for park and conservation purposes, site development planning, and feasibility studies.

## Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP)

RACP is a Commonwealth grant program administered by the Office of the Budget for the acquisition and construction of regional economic, cultural, civic, and historical improvement projects.

The grant requires a 50% match, and

eligible projects must have a total cost of at least \$1,000,000.

## **Delaware County Programs**

## Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

Delaware County administers federal Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) funds for a wide range of activities such as housing rehabilitation, acquisition of real property, demolition, infrastructure and public facility improvements, and economic development. Funds are also used to expand economic opportunities geared to low-and moderate-income individuals and to improve infrastructure critical to community health and welfare. Seventy percent of each entitlement grant must be used for activities that benefit low-and moderate-income persons. Refer to program guidelines.

## **Green Ways Program**

Periodically, Delaware County has offered funding to municipalities for trail development and associated activities through the County's Green Ways program. The objective of this program is to advance the County's goals of conserving green spaces, connecting the County with safe places to bicycle and walk, and enhancing public parks for people of all ages, interests, and abilities — for a more unified countywide system. The most recent round of funding was 2021. Future rounds have not yet been scheduled.

## Private/Corporate Programs

## PECO - Green Region Open Space Grant Program

Green Region grants are available to municipalities to cover a wide variety of planning and expenses associated with developing and implementing open space programs and capital improvements for passive recreation such as trails and greenways. The program is administered in partnership with the Natural Lands Trust.

#### William Penn Foundation

This private charitable foundation based in Philadelphia has long been a strong supportive of recreation, open space, and trails in the region, and periodically has funded trail-oriented initiatives.

#### Kaboom

This national non-profit promotes playscape equity with a variety of grants to build playgrounds and adventure courses. Funding is geared toward disadvantaged communities.

## AARP Community Challenge

This grant program is part of the nationwide AARP Livable Communities initiative that helps communities become great places to live for residents of all ages. The program is intended to help communities make immediate improvements and jump-start long-term progress in support of residents of all ages. Since the program's debut in 2017, AARP has awarded more than \$6 million through 560 grants.

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## **Property and Right-of-Way Acquisition Tools**

There are several common mechanisms for the acquisition of open space land and right-of-way for future parks and trails, such as fee simple purchase, easements, and donations. They can be used separately or in combination with other techniques listed below to facilitate acquisition.

Fee Simple Acquisition: The most effective means of preserving land is through fee simple purchase. Fee simple ownership gives the owner complete control of the land, including all public access and conservation practice decisions. However, fee simple acquisition, particularly purchases at market value, can also be the most expensive. Therefore, many entities interested in land preservation, particularly public agencies or land conservancies with limited budgets, will usually explore more creative options to acquire open space.

Easements/Deed Restrictions: An easement is a mechanism by which a municipality or conservation organization can obtain a legal interest in private land for public use or conservation purposes.

Conservation easements place restrictions on development at a lower cost than fee simple acquisition. Under a conservation easement, land remains in current ownership, but the property owner voluntarily agrees to donate or sell one or more rights attached to the land. In the case of a conservation or access easement, it would be the right to develop the land. A conservation easement may also provide the property owner with federal income tax and estate tax benefits. Conservation easements are frequently used for environmental preservation without providing for public use of the land. The easement can be held by a municipality, county, or a private conservancy.

A conservation easement can also be combined with a *pedestrian easement* or *right of public access easement* to allow public access for walking, hiking, bicycling, and other activities. The easement language typically establishes rules and restrictions, such as limiting when, where, and how the easement may be utilized. PA Act 68, Recreational Use of Land and Water Act (RULWA), assures that the landowner is not held liable for any injuries, crimes, or death associated with public use of the land.

Purchase and Leaseback or Resale: An entity interested in preservation, such as a local government or a conservancy, can purchase land in fee simple, place restrictions on the deed prohibiting certain uses (e.g., residential development), and resell or lease the land to an interested party. The original buyer gains the potential for future use at the current price and may recover some or all, of the purchase price through leasing. The land is maintained in open space and may be developed as a park if and when future demand warrants. Resale of some or all of the land with deed restrictions may maintain open space levels, relieve the municipality of maintenance obligations, and return the land to the tax rolls.

**Donation:** Land or an easement on the land is frequently donated by a private owner, organization, or corporation. Local governments should encourage the donation of land or easements by pointing out benefits of such actions, including possible federal income and estate tax benefits and public relations value. In addition to land, corporations and other private parties also frequently provide cash donations for worthy causes, including land preservation.

Land Development Fees and Mandatory Dedication: In Concord Township, the Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance requires that developers dedicate a portion of their property for recreation purposes or pay a fee-in-lieu of that dedication of land. This ordinance requirement has resulted in the various protected open space areas associated with residential subdivisions. The current ordinance requires that residential developments set aside 2,000 square feet of land for each dwelling unit. Non-residential developments are required to set aside 5% of the total land area.

Eminent Domain: When land for open space or trails cannot be obtained through negotiated fee-simple purchase or easement, a governmental entity (municipality, county, or other) can exercise its right to use eminent domain as a means to acquire land for public purpose. Eminent domain involves condemnation proceedings to acquire land in exchange for "just compensation" from an unwilling seller. The just compensation is usually equal to the fair market value of the condemned land. The condemner must pay all associated costs for acquisition. Eminent domain can be an effective tool for land acquisition; however, it is the acquisition method of last resort.

## **Land Conservation Tools**

Zoning Ordinance: The current Township Zoning Ordinance has been recently updated and provides adequate provisions to meet Concord's open space, recreational, and environmental resource protection needs. The Township should continue to monitor its needs, trends, and regulatory changes in those fields and amend the ordinance over time when applicable.

Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance: The Concord Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO) has recently been updated and provides adequate provisions for natural resources protection. The SALDO should be reviewed and strengthened where possible to facilitate protection and enhancement of recreational facilities.

**Stormwater Ordinance:** The Concord Stormwater Ordinance has recently been updated. However, the Township should monitor future County and State code amendments and recommendations, and further update the Township ordinance as needed to remain consistent with overlapping regulations.

Cluster Development: Cluster development regulations are implemented through zoning ordinance and subdivision and land development ordinance regulations. Cluster developments can be designed to provide appropriate economic returns for the tract's owner, while preserving significant open space areas. Depending on the type of design and the regulations that apply to the cluster development, up to 75 percent or more of a site's land area can be preserved in permanent open space using a cluster design. The open space can include natural and historic resources, woodlands, recreational facilities, as well as agricultural activities, if appropriately located. The flexibility of cluster development designs can be used to locate development in the most appropriate areas of a site while using open spaces to provide buffering and screening for residents and between potentially less compatible land uses. Cluster designs typically result in lower infrastructure and maintenance costs due to shorter roads, sidewalks, and water and sewer lines.

Transfer of Development Rights: A TDR program separates development rights from a parcel of land that needs protection (the sending parcel) and transfers them to a parcel of land more appropriate for development (the receiving parcel). Through this process, the sending parcel is permanently restricted from development and the receiving parcel is granted a density bonus above what is allowed by its by-right zoning designation. Under a TDR program, development can be directed from undeveloped "greenfield" areas to areas with existing sewer, water, and transportation facilities that can more cost effectively absorb growth. For communities, TDR programs can help protect community character and limit sprawl by preserving important lands with agricultural, environmental, and historic resources

Historic Resource Designation: The Pennsylvania Municipal Planning Code (MPC) enables local municipalities to "provide for protection of natural and historic features and resources." Pennsylvania Act 167 (1961 PL 282) allows for the creation of a district that, after certification by Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission (PHMC), provides local review of changes in the district. While the National Register of Historic Places is a well know tool that conveys historic status, it has regulatory power only where Federal funding is involved. Local municipal regulation is the best way to ensure a municipality identifies and protects their most valued resources.

A zoning overlay that includes identified resources can be adopted into the zoning ordinance. This overlay can apply regulations and incentives in addition to those of the base zoning. The review body for activities that take place within an historic overlay district is generally an historical commission. This is an appointed advisory board, but its general responsibilities can consist of more than its review function.

## **Planning Tools**

Municipal Comprehensive Plan: The recommendations of this Plan should be incorporated into the Concord Township Comprehensive Plan. The Comprehensive Plan represents the overriding planning document that formally defines the community vision and articulates in detail the long-term community goals and objectives. The Comprehensive Plan serves as the basis for implementation of a wide range of municipal land use policies such as Zoning and Land Development Ordinances. It also is a basis to justify major capital improvements such as for parks and recreation. This Plan may serve as the Recreation element of the Comprehensive Plan.

The latest update to the Township Comprehensive Plan was prepared in 2007. The Pennsylvania Municipal Planning Code recommends that comprehensive plans be updated every ten years, so the Township is due for an update.

Official Map: To protect its interest in acquiring the properties and rights-of-way necessary to establish future trails and parks, the Township can depict intended acquisitions and improvements on an Official Township Map. An "official map" is a combined map and ordinance designed to implement the goals set forth in the Comprehensive Plan. The official map shows the locations of planned future public lands and facilities such as transportation, recreational parks and trails, and open space. The official map expresses a municipality's interest in acquiring these lands for public purposes sometime in the future. The authority to create an official map is granted in Article IV of the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code (MPC).

Listing a parcel or portion of a property on an official map notifies developers and property owners that the area mapped is of interest to a municipality for public purposes sometime in the future. According to the MPC, designation of a property on the official map does not constitute a taking in and of itself. It simply gives a municipality an opportunity to negotiate acquisition of property, or rights thereto, where a public use would be beneficial before

development or redevelopment occurs. Once a property owner or developer notifies a municipality of their intention to build, subdivide or perform other work on land that is located on an official map, the municipality has one year to either purchase the land, come to a mutual agreement with the developer, condemn the land through eminent domain, or decide not to pursue the acquisition of the land. Adoption of the Official Map and corresponding Ordinance are subject to public review and must follow an established process as required by the MPC.

Environmental Advisory Council: Any municipality in Pennsylvania may establish an environmental advisory council (EAC) to tap the skills and volunteer energy of its citizens. An EAC serves in an advisory capacity to help inform decision-making regarding the environment and related issues. It may also undertake an array of on-the-ground conservation projects, planning of new conservation initiatives, and environmental education efforts.

If a municipality's governing body chooses to create an EAC, it must do so by passing an ordinance. Neighboring municipalities may choose to form regional, multi-municipal EACs. An EAC's potential mix of activities is authorized and limited by Pennsylvania's Act 148, which states that EACs "shall have the power to:

- Identify environmental problems and recommend plans and programs to the appropriate agencies for the promotion and conservation of the natural resources and for the protection and improvement of the quality of the environment.
- Make recommendations as to the possible use of space.
- Promote a community environmental program.
- Keep an index of all open space and other unique natural areas, for the purpose of obtaining information on the proper use of those areas.
- Advise the appropriate local government agencies in the acquisition of both real and personal property.

# Appendix A: Planning Context

## **Planning Context**

This Comprehensive Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan is consistent with and an extension of other recent and ongoing planning initiatives in Concord and the local region. For Concord to achieve its goals in sustaining and enhancing quality of life, it is important that a coherent vision for the future is expressed in public policy. The development of municipal planning documents which are consistent in their objectives is one way that this can happen. Related plans and policy documents include the following:

## **Local Township Planning**

Concord Township Recreation & Open Space Plan (1995) and Plan Update (2007)

The 1995 Open Space Plan anticipated the expected population boom by stating as an overriding goal the need to balance development with preservation of open space, particularly environmentally and culturally sensitive resources. The Plan established regulatory strategies to minimize the disruption and loss of open space, and to expand the open space network through strategic acquisitions and protections. The Plan also addressed the needs of a growing population for additional recreation opportunities, by improving existing parks, adding new park properties, and creating a linked open space network. The Plan recognized trails as an important component of community recreation and natural resource conservation and identified the development of a "linear open space system," as an important objective.

The 2007 Plan Update documented many of the overriding goals that remain important today. "The Township is committed to open space preservation," states the 2007 Plan, "recognizing its value to passive recreation pursuits, resource protection, and the health, safety and welfare of residents." The plan advocates for establishing a connected open space network. "To reduce fragmentation of open space, the Township can seek to acquire parcels that are adjacent to existing open space and recreation areas and that would form larger contiguous open space areas. These areas can be linked together by protected natural features... forming a network of open space."

The Township has proceeded methodically to advance the goals of the 1995 and 2007 Plans and has been successful in implementing many of its specific recommendations. (See *next page*.)


Concord Township Comprehensive Plan (1988), Plan Update (2000) and Plan Addendum (2004)

The Concord Township Comprehensive Plan and Updates have consistently expressed the value of preserving open space and cultural and natural resources while still providing opportunities for development. The 2000 Plan Update warns of potential "future dramatic loss of agricultural lands" and recommends establishing "large green areas where existing parks, recreation areas, institutions, and historic resources are maintained."

The 2004 Plan Addendum addressed specifically the Land Use, Housing, Water Supply, and Natural & Historic Resources elements of the Municipal Comprehensive Plan. These elements support the goals echoed in the Recreation & Open Space Plan, particularly regarding the importance of protecting sensitive natural resources such as floodplains, wetlands, watersheds, steep slopes, prime agricultural soils, and woodlands. The Plan recommended regulatory means to strengthen these protections.





## Concord Township Ordinances

The Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance of the Township Code (160-52) provides that residential subdivisions must provide land set aside for recreation purposes and that provisions be made for trails and pathways, or pay a fee-in-lieu of land dedication. Other provisions of the Code regulate protection of natural resources such as trees, watercourses, wetlands, floodplains, and steep slopes. In recent years code requirements for stormwater management expanded the riparian buffer and added other protections.

Concord Township Greenways and Open Space Network Plan (2015)

This Plan identifies opportunities and a methodology for developing a Township-wide network of public trails and greenway corridors. The study addresses the balance between recent and future growth with the desire to maintain open space for both passive and active recreation, while planning for future greenway opportunities. Recommendations focus on the potential to connect together a wide range of meaningful attractions with a combination of on- and off-street trails, including a variety of individual trail segments and types, which link together in an integrated network. These include major trail spines, secondary trails, paved and unpaved trails, off-street and on-street trails, and primary trail head access points.

Octoraro Greenway Feasibility Study (2016)

A primary recommendation of the Greenways and Open Space Network Plan was to investigate the feasibility of building a pedestrian/bicycle greenway along the alignment of the former Octoraro Railroad. This route represents an outstanding opportunity for development of a continuous trail across the entire township, connecting a variety of existing recreational facilities as well as the promise of broader connections to neighboring municipalities such as Chadds Ford and Chester Heights. The Octoraro has for decades been considered to have high potential for a recreational trail. It is currently promoted by Delaware County as one of the highest-priority trail routes in the county and is included in the planned "Circuit" regional trail system. The Octoraro Trail would intersect with the proposed Garnet Valley Greenway at or near Spring Valley Road.

In addition to the Octoraro Trail, prior planning efforts identified a second opportunity for a major trail spine through the Township. The Garnet Valley Greenway is envisioned as a paved multi-purpose recreation trail that utilizes a PECO electrical utility right-of-way to connect many major community, civic, and open space destinations, including Clayton Park, Concord Township Park on Smithbridge Road, Garnet Valley schools, the Octoraro Trail itself, and numerous residential neighborhoods.

#### Route 1 and Route 202 Area Bike and Pedestrian Study

Prepare in partnership with Chadds Ford Township, this study identified opportunities for an interconnected system of sidewalks, bicycle routes, and multimodal corridors to safely connect origins and destinations along the Route 1 and Route 202 corridors. The study documents gaps in the existing pedestrian/bicycle network and recommends specific improvements contributing to a local multi-modal transportation network. These include paths, sidewalks, and trail connections, as well as support elements such as bus shelters, tree canopy, crosswalks, trail heads, signals, signs, and bike racks needed to provide convenient and safe non-motorized options for getting around.




## **Delaware County Planning**

In 2015, the Delaware County Planning Department prepared a County-wide Open Space, Recreation and Greenway Plan to address all facets of parks and recreation planning in the county including municipal, public and private land, and trails.

Volume I of this plan provides a complete review of municipal, county, state, and federal open space within Delaware County. It includes an inventory of existing open spaces and natural resources, analysis of open space and recreational needs and opportunities, and an overview of implementation methods for municipalities and the County to utilize. The Plan



identifies three overarching goals to guide the open space planning efforts in the County. These goals, which closely reflect those expressed in Concord Township planning documents, are:


- Conserve the natural and cultural resources of the County
- **Enhance** the environmental and/or recreational value of developed and undeveloped lands, and
- **Connect** natural features and people to community and regional destinations through development of a greenway network.

Volume II of this plan represents the county's first true Greenway Plan. The Plan identifies 25 Primary Trails within the county, including two within Concord Township, the Octoraro Trail and the "PECO Right-of-Way Trail," which was later rebranded as the Garnet Valley Greenway.

Delaware County 2035 (2013)

Adopted in 2013, this Comprehensive Plan for Delaware County establishes an overall vision for the future of the County through the year 2035. It also sets policies for development, redevelopment, conservation, and economic initiatives. The Plan provides the County's 49 municipalities with a framework for the strategic use of

public resources to improve the quality of life for all its residents. In accordance with the Municipalities Planning Code (MPC), the plan "establishes objectives of the municipality concerning its future development, including, but not limited to, the location, character, and timing of future developments." Delaware County 2035 consists of a central Land Use Policy Framework Plan and a number of related, interconnected, but more detailed component plans. The Open Space, Recreation, and Greenway Plan noted above serves as the open space component plan of Delaware County 2035.

The Delaware County Natural Heritage Inventory (NHI) was developed for the County by the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy. Its purpose is to inform residents and local decision makers about the unique plants, animals, and habitats that are found throughout Delaware County. This inventory focuses on the best examples of living ecological resources in Delaware County, and contains information on the locations of rare, threatened, and endangered species and of the highest quality natural areas in the County. Several locations in Concord Township are highlighted for their ecological value. These are Beaver Valley Woods, Johnsons Corner (Naamans Creek Road), and Clayton Park/Shavertown Woods. 
## **Regional and Statewide Planning**

Pennsylvania's outdoor recreation plan helps to guide strategy for local governments, state government and other outdoor recreation providers. Priorities, recommendations and action items delineate a course of action for five years and help to determine where best to make investments in recreation.

Analysis shows that maintenance of existing park and recreation areas continues to be the top concern of Pennsylvanians. Access to recreation programs is also highly important, as is building more greenways and trails, and protecting existing open space and wildlife habitat. These findings are very consistent with the findings of this Concord Township Comprehensive Recreation, Park and Open Space Plan. The Pennsylvania Plan identifies five priority areas to serve as the foundation for action. These are:

- Health and Wellness: Outdoor recreation is key to helping address some of today's pressing health care issues.
- Recreation for All: Ensure that all people feel invited and engaged in our outdoor spaces by developing strategies to overcome real and perceived barriers through enhanced access, amenities, and programs.
- Sustainable Systems: Balance the needs of our natural resources with the
  ever-changing demands of recreation enthusiasts through careful planning
  and design, innovative solutions and partnerships, and emphasis on
  stewardship by all.
- Funding and Economic Development: Increasing investments in outdoor recreation and expanding support for the outdoor recreation economy must be top priorities.
- Technology: Set the right balance on how we can use technology to our advantage without it being disruptive or destructive to nature.

## **Recreation, Trails and Open Space Grants**

The Township has been highly successful in procuring grant funding for parks and open space initiatives. In recent years, the Township has received grant funding from a wide range of Federal, State, and local agencies, and these have funded acquisitions, planning studies, and capital improvements. Since 2014, the Township has received grant funding for trails, recreation, and open space totaling more than \$4 million.

## Concord Township Open Space Acquisition/Conservation Score Sheet

Based on the goals and expectations for open space described in this Plan, an updated measuring stick for acquisition and conservation of new property is proposed. An objective metric such as this is often a requirement of grant funding programs, which may assist with acquisition costs. The following important open space attributes should be considered in identifying priority lands for acquisition. A weighted scoring system is proposed for each category, with values assigned according to specific characteristics.

- 1. **Parcel Size**: Larger parcels have greater potential to maximize public benefit, and to justify Township efforts to plan, acquire, and maintain.
  - 3 pts More than 10 acres
  - 2 pts 5-10 acres
  - 1 pts 1-5 acres
  - 0 pts less than 1 acres
- 2. Development Risk: Properties that are subject to imminent development pressure may become high priority for preservation.
  - 3 pts Known land development interest
  - 2 pts Public water and sewer available at property
  - 1 pts Public water and sewer within 500 ft.
  - $0\ pts-Public\ water\ and\ sewer\ not\ available$
- **3. Proximity to Other Public Space:** Open spaces have more value when they can be connected, to allow for greater impact and to avoid fragmentation.
  - 3 pts Abuts existing Township open space
  - $2\ pts-\ Abuts\ other\ public\ open\ space\ or\ community\ facility$
  - 1 pts Can feasibly be connected to other open space or community facility
  - 0 pts Disconnected from other public or undeveloped open space

- 4. Watershed Protection: Land conservation is an important part of watershed management. Benefits include groundwater recharge, flood resiliency, water quality, and wildlife habitat.
  - 3 pts Contains water body, watercourse, or wetlands
  - 2 pts Within 500 ft. of water body, watercourse, or wetlands
  - 1 pts Within 1,000 ft. of water body, watercourse, or wetlands
  - 0 pts Not in proximity to water features
- Environmental Sensitivity: It is important to preserve habitat for native plant or animal species listed as threatened, endangered or of special concern and/or an outstanding example of a native ecological community.
  - 3 pts Located within one of three (3) identified Natural Heritage Inventory locations
  - 2 pts Abuts other public open space located within a Natural Heritage Inventory location
  - 1 pts Contains sensitive environmental features such as woodlands, steep slopes, or other
  - $0\ pts-\ Does\ not\ contain\ known\ sensitive\ environmental\ features$

- **6.** Connectivity to Trail Network: Expansion of the local trail network is a clear public priority. Properties that can help to expand or fill gaps in the network should be prioritized.
  - 3 pts Contains or abuts an existing or proposed Township trail
  - 2 pts Can potentially be connected to the trail network
  - 1 pts May be suitable for an isolated trail not connected to the network
  - 0 pts Not suitable for trails
- Scenic Value: Properties that have high scenic value or contribute to a scenic viewshed are important to the local character and sense of place.
  - 3 pts Possesses the highest degree of scenic value in the Township.
  - 2 pts Possesses a high degree of scenic value.
  - 1 pts Contributes to a an overall scenic viewshed or vista.
  - 0 pts Does not have scenic value.
- **8. Historic Value:** Properties that have historic or cultural value are important to preserve and incorporate into the open space system.
  - 3 pts Listed on the National Register of Historic Places or determined eligible
  - 2 pts Has historic features or structures included in Township Historic inventory
  - 1 pts Has importance to local culture
  - 0 pts Does not have known historic or cultural value.

- Suitability for Recreation: Parcels that have physical characteristics that
  can be easily adapted for active recreation should be acquired to
  serve future needs.
  - 3 pts Can easily be adapted for recreation purposes
  - 2 pts Can be adapted for recreational use with significant cost and/or effort
  - 1 pts Can host only limited or small-scale recreation uses
  - 0 pts Not suited for recreation purposes
- 10. Overall Public Benefit: Some factors are unique to the property or the Township's immediate needs may also weigh heavily in the decision to acquire land for open space and recreation.
  - 3 pts Provides outstanding public benefit on a regional scale
  - 2 pts Benefits a broad segment of the local community\
  - 1 pts Benefits a limited segment of the local community
  - 0 pts Minimal public benefit.


## **Voice Your Vision**

## **PROJECT SUMMARY**

The Voice Your Vision initiative by Concord Township Council brought public, private, and community stakeholders together over the course of the last 8 months to discover immediate, short-term actions that can set the stage for interaction and engagement and grow in the coming years. The insights gathered and short term projects have planted the seeds for long-term improvements.

At the end of 2020, the leadership in Concord expressed interest in pursuing a new form of townwide engagement that would allow them alternate ways to connect with community members about their priorities and issues. Council members not only sought to foster more openness and conversation with constituents, but to lay a foundation for community building and transparency across township affairs. This process has been driven by Council's desire to hear more voices, understand the needs and values of its residents, and provide a more meaningful experience for residents to interact with township officials.

Voice Your Vision Concord was designed to support the Concord community in creating a collective vision surrounding public amenities, programming, and township communications. Additionally, it was designed to reach more residents and provide clarity about Council's plans and thoughts for the township's future. The goal of this process is to collaborate with the public to help shape Concord's future decision making and engagement strategies. This means that all events, outreach, and communications from this initiative served the dual function of council-community collaboration and working towards action on identified community projects.

## Why Connect the Dots?

Township Council contracted the stakeholder/community engagement firm Connect the Dots to assist in piloting a more accessible, collaborative, and transparent approach to public engagement in Concord. Council worked with Connect the Dots to practice alternative approaches for public engagement. The two groups worked together to come up with Voice Your Vision Concord, the critical first step to revamping strategies for including more residents in decision-making processes.

Connect the Dots has over 7 years of experience in facilitating public engagement processes in a way that honors and incorporates all backgrounds and perspectives. What makes their work different is that they work not just for their clients and engagement participants, but with them. They encourage collaboration through each phase of Voice Your Vision, and always lead with a cooperative spirit. We have designed and facilitated a wide range of engagement processes using our approach that begins with the participants and context at hand. As the Covid-19 pandemic changed the way we interact and engage with one another, Connect the Dots not only adapted to new normalities but shared their expertise with communities around the region.

## WHAT WE ACCOMPLISHED

#### Initial Engagement with Concord Township Council

#### -- Understanding Interests, Goals, Priorities

At the beginning of Voice Your Vision, all seven township council members filled out a survey in order to co-design the engagement process and identify multiple topics for community discussion. They were asked to think of needs and opportunities within the town that they feel are necessary and feasible for them to address, particularly during the summer months. Connect the Dots then analyzed the abilities and insights from council members in order to design a community-wide public agenda survey.

#### **Public Agenda Survey**

#### -- Finding Common Ground

Next, the public agenda survey gave Concord residents the opportunity to share their needs and visions for the community. By gauging the importance of various topic areas, the survey was able to align the abilities and insights from council members with the goals of surveyed community members. In order to focus future discussions and decision making, Connect the Dots then narrowed down the points for discussion into three high-priority topic areas identified by the survey. Though there are numerous topics important to the future of Concord, prioritizing three topics allowed Council to focus their energy and ensure that their initiatives are actionable. Council members paired off into teams and each championed a topic of their choosing.

#### Voice Your Vision Kickoff Event

#### -- Diving In

The public kickoff event took place virtually on May 11, 2021. Facilitated by Connect the Dots, the event included a detailed presentation of key project information, survey results, and how the project team arrived at each of the three priority topic areas: Connectivity, Planning + Land Use, and Community Identity + Communication. Council members were able to dive deeper into understanding the public's vision and priorities through a series of listening sessions conducted in breakout rooms. Attendees self-identified which topic area they're most interested in, and were given the opportunity to share their thoughts and ideas with the Council members championing that topic. Residents heard directly from council members about their personal connections to these topic areas, and discussed some early ideas for action items and ways to work through township concerns. The kickoff meeting got the conversation going, and provided community members with space to ask questions and better understand township decision making. Resident ideas and insights were then used to inform the next phase of Voice Your Vision: interactive community events.

## **Ongoing Actions**

### -- Efforts Along the Way

Council members took time out of their busy schedules each month to regroup and touch base on the Voice Your Vision initiative. They met with staff members at Connect the Dots to discuss how to contribute their interests and strengths to the Voice Your Vision overall process. They periodically workshopped new ways to engage with Concord residents.

#### **Summer Event Series**

#### -- Workshopping Ideas + Solutions

Council members spearheaded two in-person community events. Each event focused on current township initiatives and brainstorming actions for collaboratively envisioning Concord's future related to Connectivity, Planning + Land Use, and Community Identity + Communication. Each event discussed current township initiatives and relied on public participation to brainstorm future actions and programming. Councilmembers Colleen Morrone and Vinita Deshmukh held their Community Identity + Communication event alongside that of Connectivity. The combined event covered how placemaking and events can create better community connections in Concord, while Councilmembers John Gillespie and Dominic Pileggi spoke about the future of Concord's sidewalks and trail connections. The final event of the series was held on July 27th, where Councilmembers Dana Rankin and Dominic Pileggi dove into issues of open space and zoning.

#### Stakeholder Interviews

#### -- Additional Insights

Following the summer event series, Council members evaluated event attendance lists to better understand what voices weren't well-represented at each event. We learned that the business and religious communities had not shared their insights at the kickoff or summer events. Connect the Dots then coordinated a series of stakeholder interviews. Questions for stakeholders included "What do you think Concord is missing?"; "What types of events have you enjoyed in Concord or surrounding townships in the past?"; "Where do you consider to be the "heart" of Concord?"; "What are the important next projects?"

#### Final Report + Event

#### -- Coming Together

The Closing Event for Voice Your Vision was a virtual presentation and celebration of everything we've learned, and all of the upcoming initiatives the community can enjoy as a result of this engagement process. Connect the Dots presented this report - Concord Connects - detailing the Voice Your Vision goals, process, and outcomes. The final event served as the main opportunity for council members and the community to come together, check in, and assess the progress made so far. Community members also had the chance to comment on and discuss the path forward, ensuring that their ideas are being furthered and considered for implementation in the 2022 budget and incorporation into future planning.

## WHAT WE LEARNED: Public Agenda Survey

## Planning + Land Use

People generally believe there needs to be strategic, long-range planning that preserves open space for recreation, gathering, and environmentally-conscious programming. It's important to find a balance between managing growth, density, and tending to existing infrastructure. There's growing dissatisfaction with the scale of shopping centers, parking lots, when residents would rather preserve open space for nature and recreation. Some ideas coming out of the survey include updating planning documents, prioritizing land conservation, and sustainability initiatives.

#### Testimonials:

"As a community that has grown so quickly I'd like to see the reasons I moved here preserved, such as open space, wide manageable roadways, and the natural beauty of the area...."

"The unbelievable growth of the township has it pros and cons. Our family got to take advantage of great schools and I'm thankful. But since we've been here, there has been an explosion in development and there is overcrowding."

"We need to save what's left of contiguous open space for quality of life and for the economic vitality of our community..."

## Connectivity

People who responded to the survey feel that there is a need for more opportunity to safely walk, bike, and hike throughout Concord. Due to its auto-orientation, there are very few physical connections between various parts of Concord. People were excited by the thought of more sidewalks and pedestrian connections, bike paths, and open space. People also want to experience less traffic and congestion, with better maintenance and improvements on existing roads.

It's important to note that the root cause of frustration with traffic congestion stems from roads that are controlled by state agencies like PENNDOT. These agencies pay for, plan, and maintain these roads, and the township does not have a lot of control over issues that occur on these roads. Rather than center the discussion around traffic and congestion, Council mentioned that they are working hard on their relationships with State agencies and continue to advocate for the Concord community.

#### Testimonials:

"If we are going to allow community to grow and expand, reducing open space and interjecting more businesses, then the infrastructure needs attention as well including roads, transportation, public safety."

"Walking through the business community is impossible because of disconnected sidewalks."

"Concord Township NEEDS sidewalks. We NEED connections to and from neighborhoods and trails."

#### Connectivity

There is a need for more communication between residents, and between council and residents. The Concord community wants to feel heard and listened to by its Council members, and would appreciate more transparency through various public engagement processes when it comes to financial and zoning matters. Residents also cited a need for developing a greater sense of community, potentially through more programming and higher participation in township processes.

As more development has come to the area and influenced the way Concord looks and feels, this sense of better collaboration and communication should also be reflected in the physical environment. Survey respondents mentioned that the feel and character of Concord is being shaped by big box stores, retail vacancy, and few spaces or opportunities for gathering. Respondents want more opportunities for community partnerships and greening, with an emphasis on sustaining small businesses.

"Creating that nice quality of life where people want to move to, and not leave, comes from a community that listens to their residents, people need to feel that their voices are heard."

"We need more small business and less chain stores..."



## WHAT WE LEARNED: Kickoff Event

## Planning + Land Use

#### Council members Dana Rankin + John Crossan

This group talked in depth about the various dynamics that go into land use and thinking about ways of guiding change in the future. There was a recurring theme discussing how deciding land use at the onset is critical. Community members had the idea of looking more deeply into the ordinances that describe valuable land / open space, and getting creative with zoning regulations and looking to precedents that preserved open space. Participants also discussed working with homeowners associations to efficiently utilize space that is managed collaboratively. All expressed that they would love to be involved in decision making, and at the very least would like to see resources that explain how tax money is being spent related to land use, and how it could be saved or spent more creatively for conservation.

### Connectivity

### Council members Dominic Pileggi + John Gillespie

Community members were most excited about expanding opportunities for walking through building trails, and also about making existing roads and infrastructure more friendly to pedestrians. Having the ability to walk and bike to/from township shopping centers would make a big difference to the community, as would traffic calming measures like speed bumps or roundabouts that would help pedestrians feel safer. Anything the township can do to encourage walking, biking, and cars sharing the road with pedestrians would be appreciated; examples include street redesigns and ensuring sidewalks are included in new developments, the way they have been recently. Community members also had questions specific to certain roads and trail projects in the works, and would like to be involved in those processes through public comment meetings.

## Community Identity + Communication

#### Council members Colleen Morrone + Vinita Deshmukh

This general topic area includes community identity, communications, and placemaking, and is meant to encompass different facets of identity in Concord. The first is physical identity or how Concord looks and feels when you move around. Dynamics such as big box stores vs.

small local businesses, whether there are trees and plantings, whether there is art and signage about township history can all affect the feeling of place or community. There is also the social aspect of the town's identity, so whether there are opportunities or channels in place for people to gather, communicate, and share. This includes things like talking to neighbors, more chances to get together and discuss experiences, community events, things like newsletter, so everyone is on the same page. All of these facets work together to create a sense of community, which can be achieved through collective visioning and planning.

Participants in this group talked about a general identity crisis in Concord, and the feeling of uncertainty around whether Concord is a rural or suburban community. They felt that creating design guidelines specific to Concord was an achievable way to address the issue of identity. Discussion between community members and the council during the process of creating design guidelines would be an important way to foster more participation and get people talking to one another about Concord's identity. This group also acknowledged that there are groups that the township should work with in order to have more inclusive events and initiatives. The business community should be leveraged and play an active role in putting on events and fostering more of a sense of community, along with the large senior community that has very little programming dedicated to it. One idea was business owners coming together to sponsor a township partnered event.

## Community Identity + Connectivity

Combined Event

# Council members Colleen Morrone + Vinita Deshmukh + Dominic Pileggi + John Gillespie

Placemaking (Community Identity + Communications) and Connectivity held their combined event in the Township Garage on Smithbridge Road on July 20, 2021. Rows of tables and surrounding chairs placed community members in a semi circle facing the Council members hosting the event. Dominic Pileggi gave opening remarks, welcoming all to the event and thanking all for their time. After introducing each Council member, he spoke briefly about the goals of Voice Your Vision and introduced Alexandra Zazula of Connect the Dots.

Alexandra shared brief ground rules for the event, encouraging folks to share the floor and be respectful so that all in attendance could feel comfortable sharing their thoughts and ideas. She reiterated how this process has been enthusiastically driven by each Council member and their passion for their topic. The goal of the event was to have an open and interactive dialogue about gathering places in the community, and how to better connect Concord's various assets in a safe, sustainable way.



Vinita Deshmukh kicked off the first activity by introducing the various maps displayed in an open-house style in the front of the room. She highlighted the map including markers for various public spaces and amenities. Each table was equipped with the event agenda, pens and paper, and multicolored heart-shaped stickers. Vinita invited participants to place a heart sticker on their favorite places to spend time and gather in Concord – creating a map where the community's 'heart' lies within the township. Community members came up to the maps in two waves, and ultimately clustered their hearts around Concord's parks, as well as the site of the new community center currently being upgraded.

### Key Takeaways | Community Identity + Communication

People enjoy and appreciate the existing events put on by the township. Folks appreciate activities like Community Day, Harvest Festival, and the Summer Concert Series, and want to see them continued and even expanded upon. Resident ideas for future events/activities include Food Festivals, outdoor fitness groups and tournaments, and Recycling Day with an environmental focus.

Folks are eagerly awaiting the Octoraro Trail addition, and are excited by ideas of the township having a potential amphitheater, swimming pool with water features for kids, or a cluster of businesses reminiscent of small downtown areas in nearby municipalities. Residents most enthusiastically suggested creating Bocce Ball courts that can serve as a fun, active gathering place for community members of all ages and abilities. People also expressed appreciation for the opportunity to have virtual events, noting more flexibility and ability to get involved.

The community would like Council to prioritize opportunities to be informed about upcoming decisions and developments, particularly those that could affect properties or taxation. People felt that the township newsletter should be more widespread/known in the community and could be utilized more effectively.



### Key Takeaways | Connectivity

Council members Dominic Pileggi and John Gillespie stayed fairly "off-book," allowing the discussion to progress freely without direct prompts. Dominic shared many anecdotes about the history of the township in terms of transportation and connectivity, and responded with questions about the township layout with explanations and history lessons. General community feedback included sidewalks, vehicle and pedestrian access to developments, and the quality of roads in Concord.

People feel that there needs to be a better system of sidewalks, primarily for connections to different areas and for people and their children to feel safe as they travel. Residents observed that the designers of newer developments did not consider the ability to access these spaces from all surrounding roads and areas, nor as a pedestrian. People cited Spring Valley Road and Concordville Town Center as examples. The issue of cut-through traffic in the neighborhoods should be addressed as well.

Flooding is becoming an issue, meaning that assessing and updating road drainage should be a priority for future township improvements. Road widths and conditions should be evaluated for drainage as well as traffic calming improvements. Community members also observed that curbs are inconsistent throughout Concord while potholes are very common. Dominic responded with context about the Council's relationship and advocacy work with PennDOT, a working relationship that they will invest energy to continue improving over time.





## Planning + Land Use

#### Council members Dana Rankin + Dominic Pileggi

Dana Rankin and Dominic Pileggi began the event by thanking everyone for coming out to the event, and provided context on the project and feedback that was collected during the survey and kickoff meeting. Residents spent time sharing comments, questions, and ideas about ways to preserve open space in the township.

## Key Takeaways | Planning + Land Use

Dana Rankin and Dominic Pileggi began the event by thanking everyone for coming out to the event, and provided context on the project as well as feedback that was collected during the survey and kickoff meeting. Residents spent time sharing comments, questions, and ideas about ways to preserve open space in the township.

They mentioned their desire to preserve existing trees and avoid building or laying asphalt on green areas. When a resident asked about the possibility for open space acquisitions (OSAs), Dominic Pileggi took care to explain that the referendum to provide funding for OSAs only came about within the past 17 years. As an example, he shared how Concord's Coleman tract was purchased immediately after funding was secured. Township Manager Amanda Serock responded to questions regarding funding for open space conservation and improvements, mentioning that there has been nearly \$3 million in grants for open space and trails in the past 10 years.

An added difficulty to securing open space is the reality that owners are not always willing to sell their land, even if the funding has been secured. Council should also continue working with developers to set aside open space as part of new developments. With proper and tactful negotiations, developers and community members may be amenable, even if only for a portion of the ask. For instance, Council was able to think creatively while negotiating with Main Line Health for their adjacent land zoned for both hospital and residential uses. Lastly, residents mentioned Bocce ball courts, a community center or pool for kids, and more shade along trails as potential improvements to green spaces like Smithbridge Park.

## WHAT WE LEARNED: Stakeholder Interviews

Connect the Dots worked with Council members to engage in a detailed stakeholder mapping process. The decision to hold stakeholder interviews towards the end of Voice Your Vision allowed the team to evaluate the attendance of each community event and discern which voices had not yet been represented. Council ultimately found gaps in the business and religious communities.

#### Key Takeaways | Business Community

Getz first noted how much he appreciates everything about Concord, from how great the people are to work with to the open, uncongested feel of the township. He also shared how the increasing use of sidewalks will make a great difference for walkability and bikeability. He explored how the township could plan meetings and events in partnership with local businesses, to utilize their space and feed into the idea of having simple community meetings 'On the Road.' He also noted how businesses would be happy to sponsor different community events as a way to better collaborate and encourage local consumption. Lastly, he emphasized the importance of centering the family in community gathering opportunities, like Family Fun Day and expos or festivals. In terms of important next projects for the township, Getz mentioned the Statefarm property as well as how the Council should continue keeping things like overdevelopment and congestion in mind.

## Key Takeaways | Religious Community

Pastor Eric shared how he believes that the people in Concord are what make it such a special place to be. He's inspired by the deep love and devotion people have for their township and community. In light of the past year, he also believes that people should do their best to be more understanding and gentle with one another. He would love for him and all religious leaders in the area to be invited into conversations and meetings, as having a seat at the table is what brings people closer together. Much like Getz, he believes that anything new revolving around the family would be a win for the township and the community. He also feels that the school system and level of involvement people have in their children's education is a real benefit and potential asset for community building in the future - though where families, students, and residents gather is something that could be enhanced. He appreciates how much Council is doing to take advantage of open space, to enhance connectivity with trails and sidewalks, and would love to see Council pursue more opportunities to be face to face with people of all ages and backgrounds.

**Evaluate township committees** so that they feed into the future of Connectivity, Planning + Land Use, and Placemaking / Community Identity in Concord.

**Strengthen public-private partnerships** by working with local businesses and strategizing economic development support.

#### Large-scale Improvements

**Implement a Vision Statement for Concord Township.** Council will use insights from Voice Your Vision to create a visioning statement, which will work in tandem to represent the priorities of the Concord community uncovered during the initiative.

**Enhanced and Improved Reporting.** Council will share regular updates using various media platforms on planning + zoning to maximize transparency and awareness on township issues.

Engage in a strategic planning process regarding connectivity, land use, and sustainability.

**Expand research initiatives by launching focus groups** and potential studies on issues such as open space, water management, quality of amenities.

Continue promoting and constructing trail upgrades and expansions, with enhanced proactive communications about trails and process updates.

**Develop an approach to incorporate sidewalks into future developments.** Potential long-term actions include reviewing current guiding legislation and developing design guidelines that better incorporate pedestrian and vehicle connectivity in Concord.

**Build towards better roads and infrastructure** by continuing to grow the relationship and advocacy agenda between the township and PennDOT.

**Evaluate public space opportunities** to create more recreation for all, including a sensory garden and activation of community center facilities.

## **Assessment of Needs by Acreage**

In order to assess the demand for parks and open space in Concord Township, it is helpful to rely on objective criteria and accepted standards. There is not one universal standard that can be applied to all communities. However, it appears clear that by any measure, Concord Township currently has an ample amount of public open space and has planned recent property acquisitions to serve a growing future population.

At one time, park planning relied on numerical standards based on population to determine open space needs. For example, one accepted standard was that communities should have at least 10 acres of park land per 1,000 residents. These numerical standards, however, provide only a rough idea of how well a community's park system serves the needs of its residents. Traditional numerical standards do not account for private open space, or lands owned and managed by institutions and school districts which share use of their facilities with the community, providing many of the same benefits as municipal parks. Nor do they account for age of the population, availability of natural resources, or specific local interests, or for the presence of nearby recreational facilities that happen to be outside the formal community boundaries.

In recent years, park planners have taken the view that the traditional fixed park and recreation standards were too crude and rigid to be applied uniformly to something as complicated and variable as recreation planning. The National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) now emphasizes a systemic approach that accounts for unique needs and opportunities of a community.

Despite this trend away from numerical standards, the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC) developed basic "parkland" standards based on population density (*Recreational Open Space Needs Analysis for the Delaware Valley, 2002*). According to the 2020 U.S. Census the population of Concord is 18,295. With an area of 13.7 square miles, the population density for Concord is 1,335 people per square mile. This places the Township in the "medium" density class. For this class, the standard park acreage needed is 8.0 acres per 1,000 population. Based on this formula, Concord Township would currently have a need for 146 acres of parks and open space. Projected further out to 2045, the population is expected to increase, and the need for park and open space will increase accordingly.

Today, the parks and open space parcels owned and maintained by Concord Township take up more than 300 acres. This does not include significant additional area provided by Garnet Valley Schools, Newlin Grist Mill, Brandywine Youth Club, Delaware County's Clayton Park, and others.

# **Public Opinion Survey**

During spring 2021, Concord Township invited residents to share their thoughts related to recreation and open space. An elaborate online survey, created with the assistance of *MetroQuest*, asked detailed questions that polled residents' satisfaction and interest across a wide range of specific topics. A total of 1,552 responses were received, which is a remarkable level of participation. Residents were asked a variety of questions about their views of the current parks and open space in Concord, and their opinions on what improvements they would most want to see. Some questions were multiple choice, and others were open-ended to allow respondents to describe their opinions in their own words. These individual comments are presented later in the appendix.






Chart indicates number of responders that ranked each feature among their top three.


## Page 3: Tell Us Your Opinions

The third page of the survey polled respondents for their opinions on a range of topics.



- Your Needs asked for opinion on potential future improvements. Trails and protection of open space resources ranked the highest.









How often do you visit a park or open space in the Township?




How satisfied are you with condition and maintenance of existing parks in Concord?

The Township has limited resources to devote to parks and open space. What do you think is the best way to invest these resources?





We just had that conversation yesterday..some of the beautiful trees along the path are being overrun by invasive weeds and thorns..it would be great to preserve them and to keep the natural beauty as it's meant to be.

Invasive plants and insects are inevitable. We need to protect the riparian areas, and create large enough natural areas (woodlands, wetlands) to protect endangered species from human development.
