CPOA: The City's contribution towards the employees' monthly premiums for health and welfare insurance programs for employees will continue to be 80% of the total cost for employees hired before January 1, 2013. For employees hired after January 1, 2013 the City's contribution towards the employees' monthly premiums for health and welfare insurance programs will be 70% of the total cost.

Employees in CLOCEA, Local 39, and unrepresented employees: The City contribution towards the employees' monthly premium for health and welfare insurance programs for employees will be 75% of the total cost.

Employees who have medical coverage elsewhere and opt out of the City's plan are eligible to receive \$150 a month in the form of a contribution to a Deferred Comp account.

- K. Effective July 1, 2015, sick leave shall continue to be accrued as follows:
 - 3.69 hours per biweekly pay period for employees on 8 hour shifts, 4.06 hours per biweekly pay period for employees on 10 hour shifts and 4.43 hours per biweekly pay period for employees on 12 hour shifts.
 - Unused sick leave may be sold back to the City as per the current Memorandum of Understanding and/or City Personnel Manual.

Administrative leave shall be credited to the following positions in the amounts shown on an annual basis.

4 days Executive Assistant--Police Department Accountant

7 days

City Manager
Departments Directors
Assistant to the City Manager/City Clerk
Deputy Police Chief
Communications/Records Manager

No employee shall accumulate more than thirty (30) (45 for management) days vacation leave regardless of length of service without approval from the City Manager.

Employees may sell up to 5 days of accumulated vacation a year as long as they maintain 20 days accumulation, as per the current Memorandum of Understanding.

- M. Effective July 1, 2015, the reimbursement rate for use of a personal vehicle for City Business will continue to be the current IRS reimbursement rate or per the Travel and Training Policy.
- O. Eligible to receive one floating holiday a year.
- P. Eligible to receive two floating holidays a year.
- Q. Eligible for a City match of \$1 for every \$3 of contributions to a deferred compensation plan by the employee, up to a maximum of 4% of the employee's salary.
- R. Retirement benefits for full-time employees are provided by contract with CalPERS. Employees as of July 1, 2012 are covered under 2%@55 (single highest year) for miscellaneous employees and 3%@55 (single highest year) for safety employees. Effective January 1, 2013 a two-tier plan was established with new employees covered under 2%@62 (final three years) for miscellaneous employees and 2.7%@57 (final three years) for safety employees. Plan costs are split between the City and employee in accordance with the current MOU.



Honorable Members of the Corcoran City Council,

It is our pleasure to present for your consideration and approval the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 budget of the City of Corcoran. The annual budget represents an estimate of income and expenditures and thus constitutes the fiscal policy of the City Council for a given year. The budget reflects the priorities and goals of the Council in regards to how resources will be allocated. As a financial document, the budget establishes funding levels for City services and promotes transparency and accountability to the residents, businesses, and other stakeholders within the community.

The FY 2018-2019 budget reflects the dedicated efforts of the City Council and City Staff to reposition the City on a solid and sustainable financial foundation. In many ways, the City's actions in recent years have come about in response to outside factors that have severely limited the City's ability to provide core services and desired amenities. Of particular note, the variables that have most significantly affected the fiscal wellbeing of the City include the Great Recession that began in 2008, the adoption of the Affordable Care Act in 2010 and the subsequent increase in healthcare costs, the State's appropriation of municipal funds (such as the elimination of redevelopment agencies in 2011), the prolonged drought and its severe constraints on the local economy, and more recently the changes implemented by CalPERS that have increased employer contributions thereby placing additional fiscal burdens on local governments.

General Fund and Measure A

Faced with repeated deficits in the General Fund, the City Council initiated a 1% sales tax measure to be presented to the voters on June 6, 2017. Final counts of the election verified a 58.4% approval of Measure A and a willingness to increase the sales tax in Corcoran to 8.25% that are earmarked for future capital expenses. Noteworthy capital projects for the upcoming fiscal year include the following:

Police Department Facility – The construction of a new 10,000 sf police department will be the most significant City project in over a decade. The total cost of the project is an estimated \$6,700,000 and the facility will have a useful life of 50-60 years. The new PD facility will be more conducive to the delivery of services than the current building and will thereby enhance public safety in the community. Funding for the project was secured primarily from the State through the diligent efforts of Chief Shortnacy, the CrisCom Company, and City and County elected officials working closely with Assemblyman Rudy Salas. This collaboration resulted in an allocation of \$3,800,000 in 2016 and an additional \$1,700,000 in 2018.

Burnham Smith Park Renovation – In 2017 the City initiated an extensive park rehabilitation initiative. Improvements to Cesar Chavez Park were completed in 2017 and similar improvements at Father Stephen Wyatt Park and John Maroot Park were finalized in 2018. A Housing Related Parks Grant, a generous contribution from the Corcoran Community Foundation, Measure A monies, and park impact fees will facilitate a \$225,000 renovation of Burnham Smith Park. The new playground and other amenities are scheduled to be open to the public in early 2019.

Water System – During FY 2018-2019 the City will see the addition of a new domestic well (Well 11A), improvements to the water treatment plant, and replacement of water main lines. Also significant, the Water Department will initiate citywide water meter project consisting of the installation of meters on connections that are currently unmetered and the replacement of meters on metered connections. Total water system capital costs for the proposed budget are roughly \$4,966,000.

Waste Water System – Of the \$1,412,000 allocated for capital projects for the City's waste water system, approximately \$1,000,000 will be budgeted for the West Lagoon Pond expansion project. Currently the City relies on a single aeration pond with increasing levels of sludge. The second lagoon is critically needed to remain in compliance with State waste water treatment standards. Other significant projects include the completion of Lift Station #14 and the first phase of a needed sewer main replacement.

Existing and Future Challenges

As the City enters into the new fiscal year and prepares for future budgets, the most daunting financial constraint stems from the reduction of the CalPERS "discount rate" or anticipated rate of return on investments. In December 2016 the CalPERS Board made the decision to lower the discount rate from 7.5% to 7.0% over a three year period beginning with FY 2018-2019. For the

LOCAL ECONOMY

The City has approximately 320 acres in the City limits zoned for light and heavy industry with two industrial parks included.

Agriculture and corrections are the foundation of the local economy which has provided economic stability for the City. The major farming entities are J.G. Boswell Co., Hansen Ranches, Gilkey Farms, Boyett Farms, and Salyer America. The employment sector is concentrated with the two large correctional facilities employing over 4,000 employees.

Corcoran leaders are continuing to push for additional industries to further solidify and diversify the local economic base. Virtus Nutrition LLC, Buttonwillow Warehouse, Mar Vista Brand Inc, Camfill Farr Company are all located in one of the City's industrial parks.

Downtown you will find many chain stores like Rite Aid pharmacy, Family Dollar, fast food restaurants like McDonalds, Taco Bell, Subway, Pizza Factory, and Little Caesars Pizza.

SCHOOLS

The Corcoran Unified School District offers kindergarten through 12th grade classes with three elementary schools, one junior high and one high school. West Hills College and College of the Sequoias (C.O.S.) serve the local community college needs in nearby Lemoore, Hanford and Visalia. In 2009, a multi-million dollar Technology Learning Center opened and is located on the campus of Corcoran High School where students are able to take high school classes and some college courses offered by COS.

Fiduciary Funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the government.



That the Council authorizes the City Manager to sign on their behalf for the Federal Fiscal Year 2019 FTA Certifications and Assurances Signature Page committing the Council and City or Corcoran to comply with all Federal Statues, Regulations, Executive Orders, and Federal Requirements applicable to each application it makes to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) in Federal Fiscal Year 2019.

DISCUSSION:

Before the FTA can award a Federal grant or agreement, the applicant must submit all certifications and assurances pertaining to itself and its project or projects as required by Federal laws and regulations.

Since 1995, FTA has consolidating the various certifications and assurances that may be required into a single document for publication in the Federal Register.

The City of Corcoran uses FTA funding for its Transit service. This includes funding for operation, expansion of services and capital improvements. Because of these applications and contracts, the City is required to file the attached certifications and assurances.

Through FTA 5311, the City of Corcoran's Transit Division will receive \$118,238 in Operating Assistance

BUDGET IMPACT:

None, these certifications, and assurances are required in order to obtain the Federal Funds the City of Corcoran's Transit Division uses for its operation.

PREFACE

Before the Federal Transit Administration (FTA or We) may award federal assistance for public transportation in the form of a federal grant, cooperative agreement, loan, line of credit, loan guarantee, master credit agreement, or State Infrastructure Bank (SIB) cooperative agreement, certain pre-award Certifications and Assurances are required, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing. The Applicant must authorize a representative (Authorized Representative) to select and sign its Certifications and Assurances and bind the Applicant's compliance. 01.B. Standard Assurances.

 - f. U.S. DOT regulations, "Nondiscrimination on the Basis of Sex in Education Programs or Activities Receiving Federal Financial Assistance," 49 CFR part 25,

 - (c) Any other Act that provides federal public transportation assistance, unless otherwise excepted.
 - c. A Third Party Participant includes any:
 - (1) Subrecipient at any tier,
 - (2) Lessee,
 - (3) Third Party Contractor or Subcontractor at any tier, and
 - (4) Other Third Party Participant in its Award.
 - d. You and your Applicant agree that neither it nor any governmental authority or publicly owned operator that receives federal public transportation assistance appropriated or made available for its Award will engage in charter service operations, except as permitted under:
 - (1) Federal transit laws, specifically 49 U.S.C. § 5323(d) and (g),
 - (2) FTA regulations, "Charter Service," 49 CFR part 604, to the extent consistent with 49 U.S.C. § 5323(d) and (g),
 - (3) Any other federal Charter Service regulations, or
 - (4) Federal guidance, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.
 - e. You and your Applicant agree that the latest Charter Service Agreement selected in its latest annual Certifications and Assurances is incorporated by reference and made part of the Underlying Agreement accompanying its Award of federal assistance from FTA.
 - f. You and your Applicant agree that:
 - (1) FTA may require corrective measures or impose remedies on it or any governmental authority or publicly owned operator that receives federal assistance from FTA that has demonstrated a pattern of violating of FTA's Charter Service regulations by:
 - (a) Conducting charter operations prohibited by federal transit laws and FTA's Charter Service regulations, or

- (b) Otherwise violating its Charter Service Agreement selected in its latest annual Certifications and Assurances.
- (2) These corrective measures and remedies may include:
 - (a) Barring your Applicant or any Third Party Participant operating public transportation under its Award that has provided prohibited charter service from receiving federal assistance from FTA,
 - (b) Withholding an amount of federal assistance as provided by Appendix D to FTA's Charter Service regulations, or
 - (c) Any other appropriate remedy that may apply.

 - (1) Federal transit laws, 49 U.S.C. chapter 53,
 - (2) 23 U.S.C. §§ 133 or 142, or

- 3. A Third Party Participant includes any:
 - a. Subrecipient at any tier,
 - b. Lessee,
 - c. Third Party Contractor or Subcontractor at any tier, and
 - d. Any other Third Party Participant in the Award.
- 4. You and your Applicant agree, and will obtain the agreement of any Third Party Participant, that it will not engage in school bus operations in competition with private operators of school buses, except as permitted under:
 - a. Federal transit laws, specifically 49 U.S.C. § 5323(f) and (g),
 - b. FTA regulations, "School Bus Operations," 49 CFR part 605, to the extent consistent with 49 U.S.C. § 5323(f) and (g),
 - c. Any other federal School Bus regulations, or
 - d. Federal guidance, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.
- 5. You and your Applicant agree that the latest School Bus Agreement selected on its behalf in FTA's latest annual Certifications and Assurances is incorporated by reference and made part of the Underlying Agreement accompanying its Award of federal assistance.
- 6. You and your Applicant agree that after it is a Recipient, if it or any Third Party Participant has violated this School Bus Agreement, FTA may:
 - a. Bar your Applicant or Third Party Participant from receiving further federal assistance for public transportation, or
 - b. Require the Applicant or Third Party Participant to take such remedial measures as FTA considers appropriate.

CATEGORY 04. ROLLING STOCK REVIEWS AND BUS TESTING.

Before FTA may provide federal assistance for an Award to acquire rolling stock for use in revenue service or to acquire a new bus model, you must select the Rolling Stock Reviews and Bus Testing Certifications in Category 04, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

 - a. Your Applicant will conduct or cause to be conducted the required pre-award and postdelivery reviews of that rolling stock, and
 - b. It will maintain on file the Certifications required by 49 CFR part 663, subparts B, C, and D.

04.B. Bus Testing.

If your Applicant seeks federal assistance from FTA to acquire a new bus model, the Bus Testing Certifications in Category 04.B apply to your Applicant, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

On behalf of your Applicant, you certify that:

 - a. That new bus or new bus model has been tested at FTA's bus testing facility, and
 - b. It has received a copy of the test report prepared for that new bus or new bus model.

- 4. It will ensure that the new bus or new bus model that is tested has received a passing aggregate test score under the "Pass/Fail" standard established by regulation.

CATEGORY 05. DEMAND RESPONSIVE SERVICE.

 - (1) Response time,
 - (2) Fares,
 - (3) Geographic service area,
 - (4) Hours and days of service,
 - (5) Restrictions on priorities based on trip purpose,
 - (6) Availability of information and reservation capability, and
 - (7) Constraints on capacity or service availability.

CATEGORY 06. INTELLIGENT TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS.

Before FTA may provide federal assistance for an Award in support of an Intelligent Transportation System (ITS), you must select the Intelligent Transportation Systems Assurances in Category 06, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

Any provision of the Assurances in Category 06 that does not apply will not be enforced.

On behalf of your Applicant, you and your Applicant:

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CATEGORY 07. INTEREST AND FINANCING COSTS AND ACQUISITION OF CAPITAL ASSETS BY LEASE.

08.B. Public Transportation Safety Program.

If your Applicant applies for funding under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53 and it is a State, local government authority, or any other operator of a public transportation system, the particular provisions under the Public Transportation Safety Program in Category 08.B apply to your Applicant, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

 - b. A controlled substance testing program.
- 2. Your Applicant, its Subrecipients, and its Third Party Contractors to which these testing requirements apply have complied or will comply with all applicable requirements of 49 CFR part 655 to the extent those regulations are consistent with 49 U.S.C. § 5331.
- 3. Consistent with U.S. DOT Office of Drug and Alcohol Policy and Compliance Notice, issued October 22, 2009, if your Applicant, its Subrecipients, or its Third Party Contractors to which these testing requirements apply reside in a state that permits marijuana use for medical or recreational purposes, your Applicant, its Subrecipients, and its Third Party Contractors to which these testing requirements apply have complied or will comply with the federal controlled substance testing requirements of 49 CFR part 655.

CATEGORY 10. FIXED GUIDEWAY CAPITAL INVESTMENT GRANTS PROGRAM (NEW STARTS, SMALL STARTS, AND CORE CAPACITY IMPROVEMENT).

- 2. It has or will have satisfactory continuing control over the use of its equipment and facilities acquired or improved under its Award.
- 3. It will maintain its equipment and facilities acquired or improved under its Award in accordance with its transit asset management plan and consistent with FTA regulations, "Transit Asset Management," 49 CFR part 625,
- 4. It will comply with:
 - a. The metropolitan transportation planning requirements of 49 U.S.C. § 5303, and
 - b. The statewide and nonmetropolitan transportation planning requirements of 49 U.S.C. § 5304, and
- 5. It will comply with FTA guidance, "Final Interim Policy Guidance, Federal Transit Administration Capital Investment Grant Program," June 2016.

CATEGORY 11. STATE OF GOOD REPAIR PROGRAM.

Before FTA may provide federal assistance for an Award financed under the State of Good Repair Program authorized under 49 U.S.C. § 5337, you must select the Certifications in Category 11, except as FTA determines otherwise in writing.

Any provision of the Assurance in Category 11 that does not apply will not be enforced.

On behalf of your Applicant, you certify that:

- 1. It has or will have the legal, financial, and technical capacity to carry out its Award, including the safety and security aspects of that Award,
- 2. It has or will have satisfactory continuing control over the use of its equipment and facilities acquired or improved under its Award,
- 3. It will maintain its equipment and facilities acquired or improved under its Award, in accordance with the Applicant's transit asset management plan and consistent with FTA regulations, "Transit Asset Management," 49 CFR part 625, and
- 4. It will comply with:
 - a. The metropolitan transportation planning requirements of 49 U.S.C. § 5303, and
 - b. The statewide and nonmetropolitan transportation planning requirements of 49 U.S.C. § 5304.

CATEGORY 12. GRANTS FOR BUSES AND BUS FACILITIES AND LOW OR NO EMISSION VEHICLE DEPLOYMENT GRANT PROGRAMS

 - (2) Any individual who, because of illness, injury, age, congenital malfunction, or any other incapacity or temporary or permanent disability (including an individual who is a wheelchair user or has semi-ambulatory capability), is unable to use a public transportation service or a public transportation facility effectively without special facilities, planning, or design,
 - (3) Any individual presenting a Medicare card issued to that individual under title II of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 401 et seq., and
 - (4) Any individual presenting a Medicare card issued to that individual under title XVIII of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 1395 et seq..
 - e. When carrying out a procurement under 49 U.S.C. § 5339, it will comply with:
 - (1) The applicable general provisions of 49 U.S.C. § 5323, and
 - (2) The applicable third party contract provisions of 49 U.S.C. § 5325.
 - f. It has complied with or will comply with 49 U.S.C. § 5307(b).
 - g. As required by 49 U.S.C. § 5307(d):
 - (1) It has or will have the amount of funds required for the non-federal share,
 - (2) It will provide the non-federal share from sources approved by FTA, and
 - (3) It will provide the non-federal share when needed.
 - h. It will comply with:
 - (1) The metropolitan transportation planning requirements of 49 U.S.C. § 5303, and

- (2) The statewide and nonmetropolitan transportation planning requirements of 49 U.S.C. § 5304.
- i. It has a locally developed process to solicit and consider public comment before:
 - (1) Raising a fare, or
 - (2) Implementing a major reduction of public transportation service.

- 7. Its Awards and Subawards in its Formula Grants for the Rural Areas Program are included in:
 - a. The statewide transportation improvement program, and
 - b. To the extent applicable, a metropolitan transportation improvement program.
- 8. With respect to the non-federal share:
 - a. It has or will have and, as necessary, will require each Subrecipient to have the amount of funds required for the non-federal share, as required by former 49 U.S.C. § 5311(g),
 - b. It will provide and, as necessary, will require each Subrecipient to provide the non-federal share from sources approved by FTA, and
 - c. It will provide and, as necessary, will require each Subrecipient to provide the non-federal share when needed.

- 9. It may transfer a facility or equipment acquired or improved under its Award to any other Recipient eligible to receive assistance under 49 U.S.C. chapter 53, if:
 - a. The Recipient possessing the facility or equipment consents to the transfer, and
 - b. The facility or equipment will continue to be used as required under 49 U.S.C. § 5311.
- 10. Each fiscal year:
