3- Over the phone at 484-5600. Visa, MasterCard, Discover, and American Express are accepted. Phone orders will be delivered to the pool twice a week. Refunds will not be issued for new or partially used punch cards.

An adult must remain in attendance during swim lessons and family swims. In the event that the Waverly Schools are closed due to inclement weather, all pool activities are also cancelled. Information on possible closings can be obtained by calling 484-9322. No street shoes are allowed on the pool deck. Swimmers must shower before use. Infants must wear a swim diaper (not a regular diaper) in the pool. No persons over the age of 5 are allowed in opposite gender locker rooms.

The Citizen of the Year Award was presented to Daren S. Bebee.

Daren has served the residents of Delta Township for fifteen years as a member of the Parks, Recreation & Cemeteries Commission where he was an integral part of helping to guide several events and projects including the Delta Township Fireworks and Parks & Recreation Master Plan. What Does "Flushable" Really Mean?

Sewer utilities across the country are having a huge problem, and the problem is "flushable" products. Premoistened personal wipes labeled as "flushable" as well as other products like flushable toilet cleaning sponges and some women feminine products are creating an enormous problem. While these products may swirl down the toilet with ease, most don't disintegrate, creating serious problems as they work their way through aging sewage systems on their way to the treatment facility. These so-called "flushable" products cause pumps to jam, equipment to break or simply use more energy to operate. This can lead to sewage backups and potentially sewage backing up into a customer's basement.

Industry experts estimate these issues cost U.S. utilities between \$500 million and \$1 billion annually to clear clogs, unjam pumps, or replace equipment altogether. The number of manpower hours to alleviate these issues is also becoming extremely burdensome to sewer utilities. Other items, such as disinfectant wipes and facial cloths not meant to be flushed are also contributing to these problems.

Utilities across the country are trying to stress to their customers the message of the "3 Ps" meaning only flush pee, poop, and toilet paper. The wastewater industry has long considered toilet paper as the benchmark for any product that is labeled as "flushable", since toilet paper is flushed constantly and utilities do not see it causing problems. Why is toilet paper ok to flush while other so-called "flushables" are

not? It rapidly loses strength when it gets wet. It breaks into pieces during the flushing action of a toilet and continues to break apart simply by moving through the sanitary collection system. It does not require the force of a mechanical device to break into pieces. It has short fiber lengths that are unlikely to re-rope or entangle with other materials. It is biodegradable and will not reduce the quality of biosolids. These qualitative properties of toilet paper should apply to any product that calls itself "flushable".

So, the next time you go to do the convenient thing and flush that product, help out your sewer utility and ask yourself, is this really "flushable"? Is it only one of the three Ps? If the answer is no, please don't flush it. Find another way to properly dispose the items or product. Who knows, you may just be saving yourself the burden of a plugged pipe or sanitary sewer backup into your basement.

Should You be Paying City Income Tax?

With income tax time rapidly approaching, Delta Township wants to eliminate some of the confusion residents have regarding the issue of the City of Lansing income tax. Delta Township does not have an income tax. Some Delta residents with a Lansing address may believe they owe city income tax; or, more frequently, their employer may have withheld city income tax over the year.

Many times, an employer will automatically withhold taxes when the address is Lansing. A Lansing address relates only to the United States Postal authorities for delivering mail. A Lan

sing address may mean that a person lives in Delta Township and therefore is not subject to city tax.

- Persons living within the City of Lansing pay a one percent tax, no matter where they work.
- Delta residents that work in the City of Lansing, pay one-half percent income tax.
- The following businesses located in Delta are subject to city income tax because of a 425 Agreement with the City of Lansing: GM-Delta Manufacturing Complex, located on Millett Highway, 7009 W. Mt. Hope currently vacant (formerly YanFeng), Bridgewater Interiors, L.L.C., and Avancez (formerly Android).
- Delta residents that live and work in Delta Township do not pay income tax other than businesses listed above.

Residents that are registered to vote in Delta Township or pay their water and sewer bill to Delta Township are Delta Township residents. If residents discover that their employer withheld City of Lansing income taxes in error, simply contact the Clerk's office and they will provide the employer with proper identification.

Security Camera Registry and Mapping (S.C.R.A.M)

The Eaton County Sheriff's Office is launching a new program called S.C.R.A.M. Security Camera Registry and Mapping. This community policing program is designed to assist investigators with the help of Eaton County residents. The program will help officers solve crime and save valuable time during investigations.

Today, more and more citizens and businesses are installing private security cameras to help protect the inside and outside of their property. As a citizen or business owner, you may not be aware that your cameras may have unknowingly captured valuable footage that can help solve crimes. This footage, if accessible to law enforcement, has the ability to keep our community safer.

How it Works

The S.C.R.A.M program encourages residents and businesses with security cameras to register their cameras with the Eaton County Sheriff's Office. By registering your cameras, the Sheriff's Office will know which residences and business have functioning cameras. Should the sheriff's office believe that your cameras might have footage that can help solve a crime or catch a criminal, a member of the department might contact you and request to view your footage. PLEASE NOTE: registering your cameras provides the sheriff's office with the location of your cameras and does not allow the sheriff's office to view what your cameras are recording!

Benefits of Registering Your Cameras

- Helps fight crime indirectly with technology.
- Allows officers to immediately identify where private security cameras are located and positioned, saving valuable time.
- Help solve crimes and crime sprees.
- Can eliminate the innocent.
- Assist with runaway and missing person cases.

New Dog Licensing Information

Beginning January 1, 2020 Eaton County will offer 3-year licenses. 1-year licenses will still be available. The dog license expiration date will now correspond to the month in which the rabies vaccination occurred. If the rabies vaccination expires in 2023, you are eligible for a 3-year dog license. To assist during the transition period, all 2019 licenses will be valid until the rabies vaccination anniversary month. For example, if the rabies vaccination occurred May 2019, the current 2019 licenses valid through May 31, 2020. A 2-year license will be offered in the year 2020 only. This is to help transition 1-year vaccinated dogs to a 3-year license. Proof of rabies vaccination is required. Licenses can be purchased at Eaton County (www.eatoncounty.org) or at Delta Charter Township by credit card only. Questions, please call 543-4262.

SAFETY TIPS

Carbon Monoxide Detector

Carbon monoxide is odorless, colorless, and tasteless. It is produced by incomplete combustion of fuels including oil, coal, gasoline, propane, wood, natural gas, diesel fuel, charcoal and kerosene. Carbon monoxide exposure can cause headaches, nausea, fatigue, dizziness and other symptoms. Prolonged exposure brings more severe symptoms, including confusion, disorientation, convulsions, and unconsciousness. In severe cases, it can be fatal. The Consumer Product Safety Commission recommends installing a carbon monoxide detector in each level of your home, especially near bedrooms.

Simple Things That Could Save Your Life

Change your smoke detector batteries. Replace old batteries with fresh, high quality batteries to keep your smoke detector working yearlong. After inserting a fresh battery in your smoke detector, check to make sure that the smoke detector is working by pushing the safety test button.

Count your smoke detectors. Install at least one smoke detector on every level of your home including the kitchen, basement, family room, and most importantly, outside of every bedroom.

Plan and practice your escape. Create at least two different escape routes and practice them with the entire family. Children are at double the risk of dying in a home fire because they often become scared and confused during fires. Make sure your children understand that a smoke alarm signals a home fire and that they recognize its alarm.

Winter Driving Tips

Use caution and common sense when driving in the winter. Vehicles cannot stop as fast on icy and snowy roads.

Watch for scattered slippery spots, especially on overpasses, bridges, and underpasses.

Keep a shovel, warm blankets, and bags of sand and/or cat litter in the trunk which can be used in case of emergency. If your vehicle does become stuck and you are unable to free it, run the engine and heater only for short periods of time and with the window partially rolled down. Make sure that end of the exhaust pipe is unobstructed.

Stay in your vehicle in case of emergency.

Keep the gas tank and windshield washer reservoir full.

Make sure wiper blades and snow tires are in good condition prior to the start of the winter season. Clear snow and ice from windows, mirrors, hood, roof, headlights, taillights, and trunk. Use low-beam headlights in snow and fog.

When applying the brakes on either snow or ice, avoid locking the brakes thereby allowing you to maintain steering control of the vehicle while obtaining maximum braking efficiency. On vehicles equipped with anti-lock brakes, do not pump the brake pedal, instead apply steady pressure.

Motorists who change lanes or merge on icy or snowy roads should proceed with caution. Watch out for other drivers.

Always wear your safety belt.

If you see a large plume of snow or yellow flashing lights, stay back, it is probably a snowplow clearing the road.

Keep telephone numbers for local tow service and/or roadside assistance in case your vehicle becomes disabled or stuck in the snow.

The Life You Save May Be Your Own

Have you noticed the fire hydrant nearest your home? Is it partially (or even fully) obstructed by snow or other debris? The Delta Township Fire Department is asking all residents and businesses to take a look at their nearest fire hydrant and ensure that it is clear three feet in each direction. In case of a

fire, firefighters need immediate access to the hydrant for water supply. Any obstruction, including snow may cause a delay when firefighters try to get water to extinguish a fire. If there is a delay in obtaining water, someone may be injured or even killed because water is not available as soon as possible. Remember, the life you save may be your own.



When Is Ice Safe?

The simple answer is never; no ice is safe ice. This is the message that the Coast Guard advocates. The reality is that people will be on the ice for a variety of recreation opportunities including fishing, snowmobiling, skating, and skiing. The Michigan DNR does not measure ice thickness and there is no reliable "inch-thickness" to determine if ice is safe. Your safety is your responsibility!

Guidelines:

Test ice thickness and quality using a spud, needle bar, or auger.

Strongest ice: Clear with bluish tint.

Weak ice: ice formed by melted and refrozen snow. Appears milky.

Tools You Will Need:

- Spud: Long-shank with a chisel-like end that is used to chip a hole in the ice. Use this when the ice isn't too thick
- Auger: Corkscrew-like device with a cutting blade that operates like a hand drill to make a hole in the ice.
- Lifejacket
- Ice picks/claws
- Two-way communication device (Make sure it receives signal)!

Ice Covered by Snow:

Should always be considered unsafe.

Snow acts like an insulating blanket and slows freezing process.

Ice under snow is thin and weak.

A recent snowfall can melt existing ice.

Caution:

Stay off ice with slush on top. Slush ice is only half as strong as clear ice and indicates the ice is not freezing from the bottom.

A sudden cold front with low temperatures can create cracks within a half-day.

A warm spell may take several days to weaken ice and cause the ice to thaw during the day and refreeze at night.

Ice weakens with age.

If there's ice on the lake but water around the shoreline, be extra cautious.

Stronger the current on the lake, the more likely the ice will give to open water.

Avoid areas of ice with protruding debris like logs or brush.

If You Do Break Through the Ice:

Remain calm.

Don't remove winter clothing. Heavy clothes won't drag you down, but instead help provide warmth.

Turn in the water toward the direction you came from, this is most likely the strongest ice.

If you have ice picks, dig the points of the picks into the ice while vigorously kicking your feet to pull yourself onto the surface by sliding forward on the ice.


Roll away from the area of weak ice.

Rolling on the ice will distribute your weight to help avoid breaking through again.

Get to shelter and remove your wet clothing, redressing in warm, dry clothing, and consume warm, non-alcoholic, noncaffeinated beverages as soon as you can.

Call 911 and seek medical attention if you feel disoriented, have uncontrollable shivering, or have any other ill effects that may be symptoms of hypothermia, which is a lifethreatening condition

2020 Scheduled Elections

March 10, 2020 – Presidential Primary Election - (CLOSED PRIMARY)

Voter Registration Deadline – Election Day – 8 p.m., Tuesday, March 10, 2020

Delta Township residents will have the opportunity to nominate a candidate for office of President at Michigan's CLOSED PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY ELECTION scheduled for Tuesday, March 10, 2020. The closed primary is set by the Michigan Legislature and requires voters to select which ballot they will be voting (Democrat or Republican) when completing the application to vote either at the precinct or when applying for an absentee ballot. A ballot cannot be issued to voter until the selection of Democrat or Republican has been made. If residents will be out of the community on Election Day or need any information regarding the upcoming election, contact the Township Clerk's Office at 323-8500.

The Delta Township Clerk's Office will be open for extended hours on Saturday, March 7 and Sunday, March 8, 2020 to process voter registration applications and absent voter applications for the following hours:

Saturday, March 7, 2020 – 8 a.m.-2 p.m. Sunday, March 8, 2020 – 1-4 p.m.

August 4, 2020 – Primary Election – (OPEN PRIMARY)

Voter Registration Deadline – Election Day – 8 p.m., Tuesday, August 4, 2020

Delta Township residents will have opportunity to vote in the OPEN PRIMA-RY ELECTION scheduled for Tuesday, August 4, 2020 throughout the State of Michigan. An open primary has both Democratic and Republican offices on the same ballot, but a voter can only vote for candidates in one party during the August Primary Election. If a voter "crosses-party votes" (votes for candidates in both the Republican and Democratic offices) the partisan section of the ballot will not count. Any non-partisan votes cast on the ballot would be valid votes. If a voter is at precinct and makes a mistake, they may let an Election Inspector know so the ballot can be spoiled and replaced to vote correctly. If you are voting by absent voter ballot, please contact the Clerk's Office at 323-8500 for instructions on obtaining a new ballot. The August Primary is to "reduce the number of candidates" for each office by party. Winners in August Primary Election are placed on the General Election ballot on November 3, 2020. If residents will be out of the community on Election Day or need any information regarding the upcoming election, contact the Township Clerk's Office at 323-8500.

The Delta Township Clerk's Office will be open for extended hours on Saturday, August 1 and Sunday, August 2, 2020 to process voter registration applications and absent voter applications for the following hours:

Saturday, August 1, 2020 – 8 a.m.-2 p.m. Sunday, August 2, 2020 – 1-4 p.m. *November 3, 2020 – General Election*

Voter Registration Deadline – Election Day – Tuesday, November 3, 2020 The General Election, scheduled both state and nationally, will be electing the President of the United States on November 3, 2020, along with many other partisan and non-partisan offices. In a General Election, all parties (the two major parties: Republican and Democrat and minor parties: Green, Libertarian, Natural Law, U.S. Taxpayers, and Working Class) that are represented in Michigan will be on the ballot. In General Elections voters have the choice of voting; "Straight Ticket" -Vote the party of your choice. Nothing further needs to be done in partisan section of ballot. "Split Ticket" Voters may vote a straight ticket AND vote for individual candidates of your choice, or "Mixed Ticket" Vote for the individual candidates of your choice in each office. Nonpartisan and Proposal Sections of ballot must be voted separately. When voters choose to vote each office individually the only restriction is, voters must only vote for the number of candidates allowed to be elected as identified under the office heading for each office on the ballot. If the voter votes for more candidates than is allowed the votes within that office will not count. In a precinct, if voter does overvote or makes any other mistake, the voter should let an Election Inspector know so the ballot can be spoiled and replaced to vote correctly. If you are voting by absent voter ballot, please contact the Clerk's Office at 323-8500 for instructions on obtaining a new ballot. New Rights for Michigan Voters - Registering to Vote through Election Day

Proposal 3 "Promote the Vote" was a Constitutional Amendment that was passed overwhelmingly by Michigan voters in the General Election in November of 2018 by a margin of 66.8% Yes and 33.2% No. This constitutional amendment brought about the following changes for Michigan Voters for voter registration:

Registering to Vote up to 15 days prior to Election:

Register to vote at:

- Any Secretary of State branch office
- Your township, city or county clerk's office
- A designated state agency
- By Mail
- Online through Secretary of State Office.

Register to Vote – 14 days before election and including Election Day (Same Day Registration):

Register to vote at:

• Voter must appear in person at the Delta Township Clerk's Office during regular business hours and up until 8 p.m. on Election Day. Residency and identification verification will be required. Documents must have name and current Delta Township address. Digital copies are acceptable.

• Additional weekend hours will be available the weekends prior to each scheduled election. Contact the Delta Township Clerk's Office at 323-8500 for additional information.

Can I Register to Vote at My Polling Precinct on Election Day?

No, if you are not registered on Election Day, you must register to vote at the Delta Township Clerk's Office in person. However, when a voter registers on Election Day at the Delta Township Clerk's Office, a voter has choice to either vote by absentee ballot at the Clerk's Office, or to take their registration receipt to polling precinct on Election Day and vote until close of polls at 8 p.m.

New Rights for Michigan Voters - Voting by Absentee Ballot

At the General Election in November of 2018, Michigan Voters passed Proposal 3 "Promote the Vote" a constitutional amendment which made significant changes to Michigan Election Law regarding who can vote by absentee ballot in any scheduled election.

Who is eligible to vote by "mail" absentee ballot?

All REGISTERED VOTERS are eligible to receive an absentee ballot upon request. A reason is no longer required.

How do I get an absentee ballot?

Voters are required by Michigan Election law to submit a written request for an absentee ballot for every election they intend on voting by absentee ballot. If a voter has requested an absentee ballot, the Township Clerk will mail the voter an application for an absentee ballot. A request in the form of an application for absent voter ballot or written request from voter must be on file with the Clerk's Office with the following information: voter's name, residential address, where to mail the ballot (if different than registered voter address), date of election and signature of voter. An application for an absentee ballot can be found at the Delta Township website at www.deltami.gov. Voter can return an application by mail, by email at deltatwp21520@ deltami.gov, or in person to Delta Township Clerk's Office or the gray drop box drive-up night deposit box on the north side of Township Administration Building. Once the application or written request for an absentee ballot has been received the ballot will be mailed to voter as soon as ballots are available.

Automatic Permanent Absent Voter List

Delta Township maintains a list of voters who automatically are mailed an application for an absentee ballot for all elections scheduled in Delta Township. A voter can request to be placed on the "automatic absent voter list". Once an application is returned and ballots are available, the ballot will be mailed to voter. Voter can vote ballot in comfort of their home and then return ballot in any of the methods listed above.

To be placed on our Automatic Absent Voter List please call the Clerk's ELECTIONS 323-8500

Office Monday-Friday 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at 323-8500. If you would like to sign up electronically go to the Delta Township website at www.deltami.gov. Select the Government heading at top and from drop down list click on Election and Voter Registration. Select the Absent Voter Information tab and go to "Automatic Absent Voter List Request" and complete form on-line. Once received you will be placed on the automatic absent voter list and an application for absent voter ballot will be sent for all scheduled elections in Delta Township.

Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment Act ("MOVE Act")

The MOVE Act as signed into law affords all active uniformed service, spouse, dependents, and merchant marine, stationed inside or outside the United States and civilians residing indefinitely or temporarily overseas the option of requesting an "electronic" transmitted, faxed or mailed absentee ballot. The voter must submit a written request or utilize the FPCA form requesting ballot every calendar year (January 1-December 31), and must be filled out in its entirety. The FPCA completed form can be utilized to register to vote and/or apply for absentee ballot and can be emailed to deltatwp21520@deltami.gov or faxed to 323-8599 to the attention of the Clerk's Office. The FPCA form used for this request is available at our website at www.deltami.gov for your convenience. Additional information including contact information for Michigan's city and township clerks, sample ballots for you to view for upcoming election or candidate and proposal information can be viewed through the Michigan Voter Information Center (MVIC) Web site maintained by the Michigan Department of State at www.mchigan.gov/vote.

Picture ID Requirement When Voting in Michigan

Michigan voters who vote at the polls and absent voter ballot in person requests must comply with the requirement of showing picture identification. The most common sources of picture identification are your driver's license or a state ID card. The following forms of picture identification may also be used if they are current:

- Federal or state government-issued photo identification (Driver's license or state identification card from any state).
- U.S. passport
- Military ID card with photo
- Student ID card with photo from high school or an accredited institution of higher education
- Tribal ID card with photo.

 Voters without picture identification:

 Michigan election law anticipates
 that not all voters will have picture
 identification. Voters who do not bring
 picture identification to the polls or do
 not possess picture identification can
 vote like any other voters by signing
 an affidavit of voter not in possession
 of identification.

Election Worker Recruitment

Delta Township is seeking election workers for the following positions; electronic pollbook inspectors, help desk inspectors, general inspectors, absent voter counting board inspector, precinct chairpersons, absent voter counting board chairperson and chairs in training to work elections. Election dates in 2020 are March 10, May 5, August 4, and November 3. All positions are paid positions. Chairpersons are paid \$18/hour, Chairs in Training are paid \$15/hour, and Help Desk Inspector, Electronic Poll Book Inspector, and General Inspectors are paid \$12/hr. All required training is paid at the hourly rate applicable

for the position you are hired for. To qualify to work in Delta Township, an individual must be a registered voter within state of Michigan, have no felony convictions, complete an application, and attend mandatory training prior to every election. The positions require applicants to be available for long hours on Election Day. Electronics Recycling

Delta Township offers a monthly (Saturday) event for electronics and freon recycling. A fee of \$.50 per pound will be charged for electronics and a fee of \$20 each will be charged for freon containing items. Examples of electronics include microwaves, PCs, laptops, servers, printers, copiers, scanners, LCD screens, plasma/LED/ flat screens, CRT monitors, CRT televisions, projections, monitor/televisions, cell phones, answering machines, and remote controlled items. Collection of these items will take place between 9 a.m. and 12 p.m. on the following dates: January 18, February 15, March 14, April 18, June 13, July 11, August 15, September 12, and December 19. There will be no collection in October and November. A fee of \$30 will be charged for the recycling of carbon monoxide and smoke dectectors. For questions or more information, please call the Clerk's Office at 323-8500.

Yard Waste - Not Accepted December-March

Yard waste is not accepted during the winter months of December through March. The yard waste bins at the recycling center are removed for the winter. Yard Waste Recycling will be accepted starting April 1, 2020.

Metals Accepted Year-Round

Below is a listing of metal items accepted year round at the Recycling Center. All items must be 80% metal or more to be accepted for recycling. The listing is not limited to the items below, but is a general listing. If you have a question regarding the acceptance of an item, please ask the recycling center attendant: appliances – washers, dryers, cook stoves, water heaters, water softeners, furnaces, steel dishwashers (no all plastic dishwashers), steel and aluminum lawn furniture or swing sets, lawn mowers, rototillers, weed whackers, spreaders (fluids must be drained), gas and charcoal grills, pots and pans, basketball poles (no cement), wire or metal fencing bundled, fence poles (no cement), metal cabinets and shelving, metal yard ornaments, steel doors and storm doors with glass removed, scrap metal, sheet metal, cast iron, metal sinks and metal burning barrels (must have open tops and be clean). NO GAS OR OIL CANS ARE ACCEPTED. Tin and aluminum cans (cleaned and flattened), as well as items mostly composed of metals will be accepted.

Delta Township's Recycling Center accepts the following products or materials to be recycled: cooking oil, polystyrene foam, household batteries (please tape the circuits on lithium, 9 volt and larger batteries), and cellular phones, ink cartridges, plastics with #1-7 symbol on bottom, metals, clear and colored glass, paper, boxboard, CFL bulbs, and phone books. Please remove all lids and caps from plastic containers prior to recycling. Pop or beer box containers, containers designed to go in the freezer or refrigerator, or plastic containers that hazardous waste comes in, such as motor oil or anti-freeze, are not accepted.
