New CATA Service in Delta Township to get to work and beyond!

Delta Redi-Ride Service

CATA launched a new curb-to-curb demand-response service throughout Delta Township in late September to enhance both access to jobs for township and urban residents working in the township and mobility services for persons with disabilities.

The service operates:

Monday-Friday: 6 a.m.-9 p.m.

Saturday: 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

\$1.25 Regular Fare (one-way)

\$.60 Discounted Fare (one-way) for Medicare cardholders, students, seniors (62+), and persons with disabilities.

Travel within the township and beyond

Use Delta Redi-Ride to travel within the township or to connect with CATA's Route 3 at Lansing Mall or Route 12 at Ollie's Bargain Outlet and LCC West for seamless service to downtown Lansing and the greater Lansing area. Transfers are free.

To schedule a ride:

Monday-Friday: 6:30 a.m.-5 p.m.

Saturday: 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

Calls to request trips should be made at least four hours in advance of the desired pick-up times. Rides needed Monday through Friday before 10:30 a.m. or before noon on Saturday must be reserved before 5 p.m. the day before. Trips are scheduled in the order requests are received and are limited to availability of space on the bus.

Delta Redi-Ride will not provide transportation to or from schools when school bus transportation is available to a student.





The ninth annual Delta Township Community Awards Reception was held on October 30 at the Crowne Plaza Lansing West. Over 270 people attended, making it the most attended event since its inception in 2006. The event recognized the nominees and honored the award recipients in several categories. This year's "Pride of Delta" honored guests were recognized and included neighborhoods and homeowners associations, which are such an integral part of Delta Township. The event also continued the "I Am Delta" campaign to further strengthen the identity of Delta Township. Guests had their pictures taken on the red carpet and in a photo booth, provided by "For a Song and a Dance". Jason Colthorp from WILX was his usual witty self and served as the evening's emcee. The Lansing Chorale performed several musical numbers during the evening.



This year's event was co-sponsored by Delta Township, the Crowne Plaza Lansing West, the David Chapman Agency, Auto-Owners Insurance, Comcast, LAFCU, Weddings by Nicole, Delta Flowers, Dart Bank, Chris & Renee Draves (McDonalds of Delta Township), Delta Side Business Association, On The Spot Engraving, Mary R. The nominees for the **Business of the Year award** were Coldwell Banker Hubbell BriarWood, H&H Jewelry Design, Horrocks Farm Market, and NAI Mid-Michigan TMN Commercial. **The award went to the H&H Jewelry Design.** H&H Jewelry Design has been a major sponsor for the Delta Township fireworks display since 1999. They were one of the first businesses to lend support to the program and have continued to do so for the past 15 years, donating over \$9,100. They are a member of the Delta Side Business Association. The nominees for the **Citizen of the Year** were Phil Brown, Irene Corser, Gloria Kovnot, and Theresa Ross. **The award went to Phil Brown.** During the power outage of December 2013, Phil had the idea of hosting a Christmas dinner at Calvary Lutheran Church for those without power during the ice storm. He located a caterer and was willing to pay for all the food to make the event happen. On a 48-hour notice, he was able to pull off the dinner, which served over 200 people in our community. Phil provided the resources to make the dinner happen, and numerous members of the community came forward and volunteered as well. Phil is also a retired military officer, with over 21 years of service to our country and is a Purple Heart recipient.

The nominees for the **Young Person of the Year** were Josh Arbour, Grace Billman-Benveniste, Brett Blayer, Matthew Dake, Nathan Ethridge, Amanda Gabriel, Lauren Grost, Mary Haddad, Andrew Henrikson, Dominic Knisely, Kayla Jean Koonter, Caleb McAllister, Carly McDevitt, Ivanna Mendoza, Hannah Palmer, Emily Richards, Josh Setnicky, Matthew Spagnuolo, Alyse VanAcker, and David Weiss. A \$2,000 scholarship was also awarded to the recipient. **The award went to Grace Billman-Benveniste.** Grace attends Grand Ledge High School, where she maintains a 4.12 GPA. She has served on the Student Council and is a member of the National Honor Society. Grace is a very active volunteer in the community, having logged in over 1,000 hours as a volunteer for the Township's Parks and Recreation Department. She also volunteers at the Lansing City Rescue Mission. Grace has secured donations and sponsors for the Relay for Life since her freshman year in high school. She serves on the school improvement committee and organized a fundraiser to raise money and donations for the Hope Lodge.



Two groups were recognized and received the **Community Enhancement Award.** **The first award went to NAI Mid-Michigan TMN Commercial.** A property, located at 603 North Waverly Road, was purchased in March 2014. The parcel was in a deteriorated condition due to poor maintenance of the building and grounds. The owner spent several months improving the site and is now marketing the site for future businesses to locate in Delta Township. The estimated cost of the rehabilitation is \$360,000. The rehabilitation included a new façade on the front of the building and resurfacing the parking lot.

The second award went to Delta-Waverly Garden Club. The Delta-Waverly Garden Club, founded in 2005, is comprised of 21 members who voluntarily maintain various gardening sites throughout the Township. The Club has partnered with Delta Township for the "Vision for Continuing Delta Township Parks Improvement" project. The beautification projects that the volunteers maintain continue to enhance the properties, making them aesthetically pleasing for everyone to enjoy. Other projects that have been done include the Sharp Pathway from the mall entrance area, planting at the Brookside "Triangle" on the pathway, and planting along the new pathway area behind the library. In the spring of 2015, they will develop and plant flowers around the welcome sign at Waverly and Saginaw. They also planted and maintain flowers at the Canal Road entrance to the pathway. They donate their time and resources to the beautification of Delta Township properties.

WINTER SAFETY

Preparing for the Winter Season

It's Not Too Early To Begin Preparing For The Heating Season

Check these tips off your list and get ahead of the winter freeze.

- Furnace has been inspected and serviced by a qualified professional during the last 12 months (a furnace should be serviced at least once a year).
- Chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional.
- Check for creosote build-up. Not cleaning a chimney is the leading cause of chimney fires from built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least once a year.
- Wood for a fireplace or wood stove is dry, seasoned wood.
- Fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass, in good condition, and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.
- Have a covered metal container ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.
- Children know to stay at least 3 feet away from the fireplace, wood/pellet stove, oil stove, or other space heaters.
- Portable space heaters have an automatic shut-off.
- Portable space heaters will be plugged directly into an outlet (not an extension cord) and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls, and even people. Place notes throughout your home to remind you to turn-off portable heaters when you leave a room or go to bed.
- Test smoke alarms and made sure they are working. You need smoke alarms on every level of the home,

inside each sleeping room, and outside each separate sleeping area.

- For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Test carbon monoxide alarms and made sure they are working. Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.

Safe Generator Use

Take the Appropriate Steps to Stay Safe

The following information, developed by the American Red Cross with technical advice from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the National Fire Protection Association (publisher of the National Electric Code®) and the U. S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, is provided to address questions about using a generator when disaster or emergency strikes.

How to Buy a Generator

If you choose to buy a generator, make sure you get one that is rated for the amount of power that you think you will need. Look at the labels on lighting, appliances, and equipment you plan to connect to the generator to determine the amount of power that will be needed to operate the equipment.

For lighting, the wattage of the light bulb indicates the power needed. Appliances and equipment usually have labels indicating power requirements on them. Choose a generator that produces more power than will be drawn by the combination of lighting, appliances, and equipment you plan to connect to the generator including the initial surge when it is turned on. If your generator

does not produce adequate power for all your needs, plan to stagger the operating times for various equipment.

If you cannot determine the amount of power that will be needed, ask an electrician to determine that for you. If your equipment draws more power than the generator can produce, then you may blow a fuse on the generator or damage the connected equipment.

How to Use a Generator at Home

The primary hazards to avoid when using a generator are carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning from the toxic engine exhaust, electric shock or electrocution, and fire. Follow the directions supplied with the generator. Every year, people die in incidents related to portable generator use.

Never Use a Portable Generator Indoors

This includes inside a garage, carport, basement, crawlspace, or other enclosed or partially-enclosed area, even with ventilation. Opening doors and windows or using fans will not prevent CO buildup in the home. The CO from generators can rapidly lead to full incapacitation and death, but CO can't be seen or smelled. Even if you cannot smell exhaust fumes, you may still be exposed to CO. If you start to feel sick, dizzy, or weak while using a generator, get to fresh air RIGHT AWAY - DO NOT DELAY.

Because you may have windows open to get fresh air while the power is out, be sure to place the generator away from windows, doors, and vents that could allow CO to come indoors. To avoid electrocution, keep the generator dry and do not use in rain or wet conditions. To protect the generator from moisture, operate it on a dry surface under an open canopy-like structure, such

as under a tarp held up on poles. Do not touch the generator with wet hands.

It is a good idea to install battery-operated CO alarms or plug-in CO alarms with battery back-up in your home, according to the manufacturer's installation instructions. If CO gas from the generator enters your home and poses a health risk, the alarm will sound to warn you. Test the battery frequently and replace when needed.

Be sure to turn the generator off and let it cool down before refueling. Gasoline spilled on hot engine parts could ignite.

Store fuel for the generator in an approved safety can. Use the type of fuel recommended in the instructions or on the label on the generator. Local laws may restrict the amount of fuel you may store, or the storage location. Ask your local fire department for additional information about local regulations. Store the fuel outside of living areas in a locked shed or other protected area. Do not store it near a fuel-burning appliance, such as a natural gas water heater in a garage. If the fuel is spilled or the container is not sealed properly, invisible vapors from the fuel can travel along the ground and can be ignited by the appliance's pilot light or by arcs from electric switches in the appliance.

Plug appliances directly into the generator. Or, use a heavy duty, outdoor-rated extension cord that is rated (in watts or amps) at least equal to the sum of the connected appliance loads. Check that the entire cord is free of cuts or tears and that the plug has all three prongs, especially a grounding pin.

Never try to power the house wiring by plugging the generator into a wall outlet, a practice known as "backfeeding." This is an extremely dangerous

practice that presents an electrocution risk to utility workers and neighbors served by the same utility transformer. It also bypasses some of the built-in household protection devices.

Future Generator Safety Considerations

The only recommended method to connect a generator to house wiring is by having a qualified electrician install a power transfer switch. This switch must be installed in accordance with the National Electrical Code® (NEC), which is published by the National Fire Protection Association, as well as all applicable state and local electrical codes. Call a qualified electrician or check with your utility company to see if they can install the appropriate equipment.

For power outages, permanently installed stationary generators are better suited for providing backup power to the home. Even a properly connected portable generator can become overloaded. This may result in overheating or stressing the generator components, possibly leading to a generator failure. Be sure to read instructions that come with the generator to make sure you operate it within its limitations for power output.

Winter Hazards Facts

A major winter storm hits part of Michigan at least once per month between October and April. The following are some commonly-asked questions about winter weather. *What is wind chill?* Wind chill is the perceived temperature resulting from the effect of wind, in combination with cold air, which increases the rate of heat loss from the human body.

What is frostbite and what can you do to treat it? Frostbite is damage to body tissue caused by that tissue being frozen. Frostbite causes a loss of feeling and

a white or pale appearance in extremities, such as fingers, toes, ear lobes, or the tip of the nose. Frostbite varies in severity from frostnip to deep frostbite depending on the length of exposure, temperature to which the skin is exposed and wind speed. For frostnip, place firm, steady pressure from a warm hand against the area. Also, blow on the surface holding the frost-nipped area against the body. Do not rub the area, apply snow or plunge it into very hot or cold water. Victims of severe frostbite must receive prompt medical attention.

What is hypothermia? Hypothermia occurs when the body temperature drops to 95° F. or lower. It can develop whenever body heat loss exceeds heat gain. Hypothermia is not exclusive to winter, it can occur during the wind and rain of spring and summer.

What are the warning signs of hypothermia? Often mistaken for fatigue, irritability, or dehydration, it may include some of these signs: abnormal decision making; improper response to cold; apathy; lethargy; decreased cooperation; slurred speech; disorientation; shivering; stumbling; clumsiness and muscle stiffness progressing to inability to move.

How do you treat mild to moderate hypothermia (body temperature is greater than 90° F., conscious, shivering, able to walk)? Prevent further heat loss. Dry, remove from cold and insulate. Re-warm by warming the body core first. Re-hydrate with hot drinks and food. Seek medical attention.

How do you treat severe hypothermia (body temperature is less than 90° F., unconscious, not shivering)? Evacuate to re-warm. Prevent further heat loss. Handle gently and seek immediate medical attention.

The following are some things everybody should know in order to keep everyone safe on our beautiful trails:

- **Pass with Care:** Announce your presence before passing - a simple "on your left" will do. Pass on your left as you would on the road and give yourself as much room as possible.
- **Avoid Spreading Out:** If you want to travel the trail side by side, be diligent about checking behind you to make sure you aren't a road block by the time others reach you.
- **Teach Your Kids:** Make sure kids know the basics when you hit the trail and remind them regularly. And if you are passing a family, slow down and give them as much room as possible.
- **Mind Your Pets:** Your dog needs to be with you on the right side of the trail so you don't clothesline a cyclist with your leash.
- **Be Smart with Headphones:** Being aware of your surroundings is arguably the most important step in being a safe trail user. Use headphones that allow you to hear ambient noise or, at least take one ear bud out so you can hear. *Adapted from LSJ.com*



Election Information

2015 Voter Registration and Elections

For questions regarding voter registration or elections, please contact the Clerk's Office at 323-8500. Please visit the Secretary of State website for additional election information at www.michigan.gov/sos or the Delta Township website at www.deltami.gov.

No elections are scheduled in 2015 for Delta Township. Election information will be updated and posted on the Delta Township website at www.deltami.gov when elections are scheduled. Residents should refer to their voter identification card for proper precinct number and polling location. If a voter identification card has been lost, call the Clerk's office for a replacement to be mailed.

Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment Act ("MOVE Act")

The MOVE Act was signed into law in 2009 affording all active uniformed service members, spouses, dependents, and merchant marines, stationed inside or outside the United States and civilians residing indefinitely or temporarily overseas the option of requesting an "electronic" transmitted, faxed or mailed absentee ballot. The voter must submit a written request or complete the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) form requesting a ballot every calendar year (January 1-December 31). The completed FPCA form can be submitted for voter registration and/or to apply for an absentee ballot. The completed FPCA can be emailed to Delta-tw@miqvf.org or faxed to 323-8599 to the attention of the Clerk's Office for your convenience. The FPCA form used for this request is available at our website at www.deltami.gov.

Additional information including contact information for Michigan's city and township clerks, sample ballots for you to view for upcoming election or candidate and proposal information can be viewed through the Michigan Voter Information Center (MVIC) website maintained by the Michigan Department of State at www.michigan.gov/vote.

Voter Registration

A person may register to vote at either a Secretary of State office or at the Clerk's Office in the township in which they reside. Updates can be made at any Secretary of State Office throughout Michigan. If you submit a driver's license address change, it will also be applied to your voter registration. A voter registration form can be mailed to your local clerk, but if you are a first time voter or first time voter in Michigan, you must appear in person to vote the first time voting if you registered to vote by mail.

Election Workers

Delta Township depends on residents to help in the

election process. The Clerk's Office is always looking for dependable citizens for our precinct polling locations and absent voter counting board. Residents are paid for working Election Day. Anyone interested should contact the Delta Township Clerk's Office. Applications to be an election inspector for 2015/2016 are available at the Delta Township Clerk's Office after December 1, 2014.



2014 Elections

There were three elections held in Delta Township in 2014 – Grand Ledge Schools Election, August Primary Election, and the November General Election. All of the elections ran successfully due to the dedicated, hardworking elections workers and our tremendous community partners who donate their buildings to the township for use as precinct locations.

The November 2014 General Election saw a 55.9% voter turnout, a total of 13,800 voters participated in Election Day either by absentee ballot or at one of the 16 precincts.

Delta Township Recycling Programs

Yard Waste Not Accepted – December-March

Yard waste is not accepted during the winter months of December through March. The yard waste bins at the recycling center are removed for the winter. Yard waste recycling will be accepted starting **April 1, 2015**.

Acceptable Recycling Items

Delta Township's recycling center accepts the following products or materials to be recycled: cooking oil, polystyrene foam, household batteries, household electronics, ink cartridges, plastics with #1-7 symbols on the bottom, metals, clear and brown glass (no green, blue, or frosted), paper, boxboard, CFL bulbs, phone books, and cell phones. Please remove all lids and caps from plastic containers prior to recycling. Pop or beer boxboard containers, containers designed to go in the freezer or refrigerator, and plastic containers used for hazardous waste (such as motor oil or anti-freeze), are not accepted. Metals Accepted Year-Round

Below is a listing of metal items accepted year round at the Recycling Center. All items must be 80% metal or more to be accepted for recycling. The listing is not limited to the items below, but is a general listing. If you have a question regarding the acceptability of an item, please ask the recycling center attendant: appliances – washers, dryers, cook stoves, metal microwaves, water heaters, water softeners, furnaces, and steel dishwashers (no all plastic dishwashers). Steel and aluminum lawn furniture or swing sets, lawn mowers, rototillers, weed whackers, spreaders (fluids must be drained), gas and charcoal grills, pots and pans, basketball poles (no cement), wire or metal fencing bundled, fence poles (no cement), metal cabinets and shelving, metal yard ornaments,

steel doors and storm doors with glass removed, scrap metal, sheet metal, cast iron, metal sinks, and metal burning barrels (must have open tops and be clean). **NO GAS OR OIL CANS ARE ACCEPTED.** Tin and aluminum cans (cleaned and flattened), as well as items mostly composed of metals as listed but not all inclusive.


