MASTER CONCEPT PLAN FOR NOLT ROAD PARK

The Board of Supervisors presents to the residents of East Hempfield Township, the adopted Master Concept Plan for a proposed park on 50 acres of Township land at the intersection of Nolt Road and Church Street (also known as the sod farm).

The golf course, the sod farm, and the recreation center parcels were all purchased by the Township in the mid-1980's. Since that point in time, the plan was to utilize the property for a park facility on the 50-acre sod farm that all residents could enjoy.

Over the years, there have been one or two sketches for varied facilities, but nothing was ever approved. Even though the land is zoned recreation and open space, the sod farm has been present for many of those years of ownership. Those within walking distance were able to use the space, in limited capacity, as allowed by the leaseholder, Sporting Valley Sod.

In 2022, the Township was approached by the Hempfield Youth Association (HYA), who indicated a need for more baseball fields (both baseball and softball) due to continued increases in their registrations. Representatives met with the recreation group, and their request moved through the process to the Board of Supervisors. The Board of Supervisors acknowledged the need and authorized the Township Engineer, David Miller & Associates, to design a master concept plan for the site, to provide the best layout and level of recreation uses for the 50 acres of open space.

David Miller & Associates put pen to paper and designed the first concept plan, which included four ball fields (both baseball and softball), a playground, a dog park, restrooms, multiple parking areas, and walking trails. This plan was presented to the public for review and feedback. Residents requested that the Township make further effort to gather input into the plan, which was done through a survey (with just over 500 respondents) and a public meeting charrette, dedicated to plan input. The Board reviewed the feedback and noted several areas of concern from residents: noise and light pollution, more traffic, speed of traffic, and requests to have a more passive park (trails, trees, meadows, benches).

The Board responded to the feedback by revising the plans, eliminating field lighting and the press box building (storage, loudspeakers, restroom, snack shack), and adding an additional picnic area, more trails, and expanding the meadows

(passive areas). The restroom facilities were relocated, and raised crosswalks on Nolt Road were proposed.

The revised plan was presented publicly on August 2nd and then considered for approval on August 16th. Based on the small number of comments received, the Board felt that the revised plans addressed many of the concerns of the public. The master concept plan was approved on August 16th (see map on pg. 3).

A Master Park Plan is simply a roadmap for the future. The plan will allow HYA and other groups, with support from the Board of Supervisors, to take their ideas one step further to seek grant funding for improvements. There are no tax dollars set aside for any improvements to this acreage. It is the hope of the Board of Supervisors that interest groups, such as HYA, will be able to raise funds to complete future improvements to the space.



What Type of Residential Permit Is Required?

East Hempfield Township requires permits for many types of construction and improvements to residential structures. Some jobs require a "Zoning Permit," some a "Building Permit," and others require both a "Zoning & Building Permit." Permit applications are reviewed and issued concurrently. Zoning Permits fall under Township rules and ordinances. Building permits fall under the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code and require inspection. Keep in mind that permits take time to review and process. Please allow 2-3 weeks.

Examples of Projects REQUIRING A BUILDING PERMIT

- House or garage, carport addition.
- Above ground and inground swimming pools even "wall-less" and portable pools, deeper than 42".
- Patio, porch or deck roof where the roof is attached to the house.
- Decks that are higher than 30" from the ground.
- Doors and windows if they are a different size.
- Upgrading an electrical service.
- Addition or relocation of electrical wiring.
- Plumbing work where the "trap" seal is broken.

Examples of Projects REQUIRING A ZONING PERMIT

Construction and/or installation of:

- Shed, unattached carport, or unattached garage, under 400 square feet.
- Patio, including paver patio or porch with no roof or walls.
- Walkway on the property other than the sidewalks along the street.
- A deck that is not more than 30" high.
- Widening, replacing or adding newly paved areas to an existing driveway.

Examples of Projects NOT REQUIRING A PERMIT

- Repair to existing structures, such as floorboards in a deck.
- New shingles on your roof.
- House siding.
- Replacing windows and doors with ones of the same size.

- Replacing a garage door (however, replacing a manual door with an electric door will require an electrical permit).
- Wallpaper, carpet, tile, paint, and interior cabinetry such as kitchen cabinets.



Winter Stormwater Pollution Prevention Tips

Start shoveling early! The more snow you remove, the less salt and sand you'll need. Here are some DO's and DONT's when shoveling or plowing snow.

D0:

- Pile snow in locations with the most opportunity to infiltrate into the ground.
- Pile snow in areas where water does not pond.
- Clear snow away from storm drains to allow water flow as the snow melts.

DON'T:

- Pile snow on top of storm drains or near water bodies and wetlands.
- Do not pile snow onto rain gardens or bio-retention areas.

Tips to Avoid Using Salt as a Deicer:

More salt does not equal more melting snow. Follow product instructions when spreading deicing material and give it time to work. Sweep up any material remaining after the snow ice melts. When temperatures hit 15 degrees F or below, salt is not effective. Consider using traction materials that contain acetate, potassium chloride, magnesium chloride, or cracked cornmeal instead of sand or kitty litter.

** Pay close attention to places that may have eroded during the snow melt. Plan to improve these areas in the spring by using native grasses, meadow plants, or native trees and shrubs.

** Normal snow accumulation does not pose a threat to rain gardens, so there is no need to shovel a rain garden. However, heavy snow loads can weigh down and saturate your garden and hurt plants. Pile snow uphill from the rain garden so when the snow melts the rain garden can do what it is designed to do.

SNOW PLOWING & MAILBOXES

The Township will not replace a mailbox that is not directly hit by our trucks. Plowed snow may knock over an unstable mailbox. Please inspect the condition of your mailbox prior to the winter season.

Recycling Right Doesn't Have to Be Hard

Only the **Big** 4 should be placed in your recycling bin:

WHEN IN DOUBT, THROW IT OUT!



- Glass Jars & Bottles (emptied, rinsed & lids removed)
- Corregated Cardboard (flattened)
- Metal food and Beverage cans (emptied, rinsed & lids removed)
- Plastic bottles & jugs with necks (emptied, rinsed & lids removed)

EVERYTHING ELSE IS TRASH.

If you think something may be recyclable (like newspaper or plastic bags), visit <u>earth911.com</u> (where to recycle, at the top of the page) for a list of potential drop-off locations. Otherwise, place the material in your trash.

Do not put anything other than the **Big 4** in your recycling bin.

TRASH & RECYCLING REMINDERS

- Place trash/recycling curbside the night prior to your scheduled day.
- When inclement weather is in the forecast, the trash hauler prefers starting services earlier than normal.
- Old, broken recycle bins are to be disposed of in the trash. They are not recyclable.
- Recyclables are not to be placed in plastic bags.
- Please consider putting out recyclables only when your bin is full. Less frequent stops will help GFL provide better all-around service to our residents.
- If your trash or recycling is not collected, call the Township Office. We will contact GFL.

SEASONAL CURBSIDE LEAF PICK-UP

CURBSIDE LEAF PICK-UP INFORMATION

- A separate truck will come around. Service occurs weather permitting.
- Do not mix twigs, pine needles, or any other yard waste in with leaves.
- Do not park on leaf piles.
- Visit our website for general route information.

LEAF DROP-OFF POLICY at the Township Building through mid-December

- NO PLASTIC BAGS PERMITTED.
- Biodegradable bags or loose leaves only.

Township Roads & Right-of-Way

Please keep in mind before planning your next project that you need to consider having space to store materials on your property. Although it may be a convenient area to deliver items, the storing or staging of materials on the public street or right-of way is **NOT** permitted.

Even if it's just for a couple hours or a day or two, **DO NOT** place dumpsters, mulch, stones, soil, or building materials in the street.



CHRISTMAS TREE DISPOSAL

is included in your trash and recycling service.

Trees will be collected curbside during the week of **January 8-12, 2024** on your normal trash day.

> Curbside pick-up any other week will require a \$5.00 red tag or you may drop it off at the Township Building until Sunday, January 28, 2024.

No decorations, garland, tinsel, etc. permitted.

Plantings in the Right-of-Way

Improper placement of trees and shrubbery is a danger for motorists exiting an intersection or driveway. Plantings should not be placed where they may grow into the street or overhead wires.

Without prior notice, the Township and utility companies will trim trees & shrubs that grow into and over the roadway.

All plantings are to be maintained at approximately 14' in height and a minimum of 3' behind the curb or white line.

AMOS HERR HOUSE AND PARK A Teacher's Legacy

In his will, Herr donated his family homestead to East Hempfield Township for a park, while the farmhouse has been preserved as a museum. If not for his foresight, people wouldn't be able to enjoy the amenities of A Herr Park.

The property and house are owned by the township but maintained by the Amos Herr House Foundation & Historical Society. The grounds, which are part of the park, are open year-round, making it an ideal spot for a picnic, sports activity, or photographer's backdrop.

The mission of the Foundation is to oversee the renovations, maintenance, and usage of the historic house, barns, and adjoining gardens and to preserve the history and traditions of the greater Hempfield area.
