Fayetteville City Schools:

Dr. Janie Wilson, Director of Schools, reported that the city school system has numerous talented young people, and tonight she has brought the City Thunder part of the Band to preform and to wish you a Merry Christmas.

<u>Fayetteville-Lincoln County Library:</u>

Bernadette Roche, Library Director reported that the library is excelling in service to the community. In 2017 there were 277 programs, 2,712 in attendance, 65,000 loaned items and 15,127 computer users. The Star Wars Event will be December 14th from 5:00 - 8:00 p.m. at the library. The Student Advisory Board is conducting a children's literature book drive. So far, 150 books have been donated. The ordinances of the city of a general, continuing, and permanent application or of a penal nature, as codified and revised in the following "titles," namely "titles" 1 to 20, both inclusive, are ordained and adopted as the "Fayetteville Municipal Code," hereinafter referred to as the "municipal code."

Section 2. Ordinances repealed. All ordinances of a general, continuing, and permanent application or of a penal nature not contained in the municipal code are hereby repealed from and after the effective date of said code, except as hereinafter provided in Section 3 below.

Section 3. Ordinances saved from repeal. The repeal provided for in Section 2 of this ordinance shall not affect: Any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any contract or right established or accruing before the effective date of the municipal code; any ordinance or resolution promising or requiring the payment of money by or to the city or authorizing the issuance of any bonds or other evidence of said city's indebtedness; any appropriation ordinance or ordinance providing for the levy of taxes or any budget ordinance; any contract or obligation assumed by or in favor of said city; any ordinance establishing a social security system or providing coverage under that system; any administrative ordinances or resolutions not in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of such code; the

Section 8. Construction of conflicting provisions. Where any provision of the municipal code is in conflict with any other provision in said code, the provision which establishes the higher standard for the promotion and protection of the public health, safety, and welfare shall prevail.

Section 9. Code available for public use. A copy of the municipal code shall be kept available in the recorder's office for public use and inspection at all reasonable times.

Section 10. Date of effect. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its final passage, the public welfare requiring it, and the municipal code, including all the codes and ordinances therein adopted by reference, shall be effective on and after that date.

portion of any ordinance not in conflict with such code which regulates speed, direction of travel, passing, stopping, yielding, standing, or parking on any specifically named public street or way; any right or franchise granted by the city; any ordinance dedicating, naming, establishing, locating, relocating, opening, paving, widening, vacating, etc., any street or public way; any ordinance establishing and prescribing the grade of any street; any ordinance providing for local improvements and special assessments therefor; any ordinance dedicating or accepting any plat or subdivision; any prosecution, suit, or other proceeding pending or any judgment rendered on or prior to the effective date of said code; any zoning ordinance or amendment thereto or amendment to the zoning map; nor shall such repeal affect any ordinance annexing territory to the city.

Section 4. Continuation of existing provisions. Insofar as the provisions of the municipal code are the same as those of ordinances existing and in force on its effective date, said provisions shall be considered to be continuations thereof and not as new enactments.

<u>Section 5.</u> Penalty clause. Unless otherwise specified in a title. chapter or section of the municipal code, including the codes and ordinances adopted by reference, whenever in the municipal code any act is prohibited or is made or declared to be a civil offense, or whenever in the municipal code the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be a civil offense, the violation of any such provision of the municipal code shall be punished by a civil penalty of not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) and costs for each separate violation; provided, however, that the imposition of a civil penalty under the provisions of this municipal code shall not prevent the revocation of any permit or license or the taking of other punitive or remedial action where called for or permitted under the provisions of the municipal code or other applicable law. In any place in the municipal code the term "it shall be a misdemeanor" or "it shall be an offense" or "it shall be unlawful" or similar terms appears in the context of a penalty provision of this municipal code, it shall mean "it shall be a civil offense." Anytime the word "fine" or similar term appears in the context of a penalty provision of this municipal code, it shall mean "a civil penalty."1

Each day any violation of the municipal code continues shall constitute a separate civil offense.

For authority to allow deferred payment of fines, or payment by installments, see *Tennessee Code Annotated*, § 40-24-101 et seq.

Section 6. Severability clause. Each section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, and clause of the municipal code, including the codes and ordinances adopted by reference, is hereby declared to be separable and severable. The invalidity of any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, or clause in the municipal code shall not affect the validity of any other portion of said code, and only any portion declared to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction shall be deleted therefrom.

Section 7. Reproduction and amendment of code. The municipal code shall be reproduced in loose-leaf form. The board of mayor and aldermen, by motion or resolution, shall fix, and change from time to time as considered necessary, the prices to be charged for copies of the municipal code and revisions thereto. After adoption of the municipal code, each ordinance affecting the code shall be adopted as amending, adding, or deleting, by numbers, specific chapters or sections of said code. Periodically thereafter all affected pages of the municipal code shall be revised to reflect such amended, added, or deleted material and shall be distributed to city officers and employees having copies of said code and to other persons who have requested and paid for current revisions. Notes shall be inserted at the end of amended or new sections, referring to the numbers of ordinances making the amendments or adding the new provisions, and such references shall be cumulative if a section is amended more than once in order that the current copy of the municipal code will contain references to all ordinances responsible for current provisions. One copy of the municipal code as originally adopted and one copy of each amending ordinance thereafter adopted shall be furnished to the Municipal Technical Advisory Service immediately upon final passage and adoption.



ORDINANCE NO. 2017-15

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FAYETTEVILLE, TENNESSEE AMENDING THE FAYETTEVILLE MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 12, CHAPTER 5 KNOWN AS THE SIGN ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, the Board of Mayor and Alderman adopted Ordinance No. 2016-04 on January 12, 2016, which instituted a set of standards for signs, billboards and other advertising structures known as the "Sign Ordinance;" and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the citizens of the City of Fayetteville to make certain amendments to the Sign Ordinance; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Fayetteville Board of Mayor and Alderman that the Municipal Code shall be amended to read as follows:

14-508.4(1)(e) Political signs. One (1) non-illuminated sign per candidate per lot, parcel, or tract, not to exceed sixteen (16) square feet in size and six (6) feet in height. Lots, parcels or trace that front on more than one street may have one (1) sign per candidate for each street frontage. No such signs are permitted on any public rights-of-way for other public property. Such political signs shall not be posted prior to sixty (60) days before an election and shall be removed by the owner of the property on which the sign is located within five (5) days after any election to which it refers. Per state law winners of primary elections may display political signs until the general election.

14-508.5 - Nonconforming and Noncomplying Sign Provisions:

Any sign lawfully existing at the time of the enactment of this ordinance but which is not permitted either by type of sign, location, or district or which fails to meet the standards on regulations shall be declared legal nonconforming signs.

- 1. The zoning administrator shall have authority to determine if a sign is legally nonconforming based on its current condition, time of construction and continuance at the location. Appeals to the decision shall be made to the Fayetteville Board of Zoning Appeals.
- 2. Any legal nonconforming sign may be continued in operation and maintenance after the effective date of this chapter, provided:
 - a. The sign is not relocated or replaced, unless the interest of public safety necessitates the relocation or replacement of the sign. Approval of the City of Fayetteville Planning Commission shall be obtained to permit the relocation or

replacement of any sign based on public safety concerns.

- b. The structure or size of the sign is not altered in any way except toward compliance with this chapter. The does not refer to the change of text of changeable copy signs or normal maintenance.
- c. No new or additional signs are added to the premises, except as allowed under paragraph (a) above; and
- d. Other than changing the test of changeable copy signs, no other existing signs are charged or replaced on the premises, exceptas allowed under paragraph (a) above.
- 3. A legal nonconforming sign is subject to all requirements of this Code regarding safety, maintenance, and repair. However, if the sign suffers more than fifty (50) percent damage or deterioration, as based on appraisal, it must be brought into conformance with this code or removed.

Adoption of Agenda:

Reports:

Fayetteville Public Utilities:

Britt Dye, CEO reported that FPU has had 7 leaks during the cold weather. The work on the water redundancy line is continuing down Hwy 110 and Molino Road, and also across the River Bridge. There have been 819 modules installed on the gas side, and stations are being checked. There have been 23 pole changes and 176 locates. Ten thousand meters have been changed out to AMI. The tree trimmers are hitting the hot spots during the cold months. Currently, FPU is in negotiation with Channel 4 regarding the rates that may affect the cable. Only a 3 year agreement can be signed and this may cause rates to go up to cover the high costs. Four hundred fire hydrants have been tested and the flow testing will resume after the weather warms up.

Acting Fire Chief Coby Moon reported that the Fire Department had 95 calls for service, (67) medical calls and a loss of \$40,000.00. Also, there were 7 motor vehicle accidents, with 1 extrication.

Police Chief Richard Howell reported that the Police Department had 68 arrests, 57 traffic accidents, 61 citations, with a total police activity of 1,265.
