CPA Rives reported that according to the Independent Auditor's Report, the financial statements referred to presented fairly in all material respects. The City of Fort Stockton received an "unmodified" opinion which was the best opinion that could be rendered.

FY 2016-2017 Financial Highlights:

- The City's net position increased by \$4,487,547 as a result of that year's operations. Net position of the business-type activities increased by \$1,867,674 or about 9.97%, and net position of the governmental activities increased by \$2,619,873.
- During the year, the City incurred expenditures that were \$1,585,737 more than the \$7,682,417 generated in taxes and other revenues for the governmental programs. This compared to last year when expenditures exceeded revenues by \$3,531,481.
- In the City's business-type activities, operating revenues increased by \$1,519,629, or about 15.33%, while operating expenses decreased by \$7,904, or about 0.13%.
- Total cost of the City's programs was \$8,521,950, while last year's cost was \$9,521,044.
- The General Fund ended the year with a fund balance of \$4,138,413, which was above last year's fund balance of \$2,570,254.
- The resources available for appropriation were \$98,001 or about 1.92% less than budgeted for the General Fund.
- Actual expenditures were \$1,786,998 less than budgeted for the General Fund due primarily to health insurance revenues being netted against medical claims.
- It took \$8,521,950 to operate the City for a 12-month period whereas business-type activities took \$6,314,386 to operate for a full year and component units \$1.157,095 million. Resources were from various sources i.e. water, sewer, gas, unrestricted grants & contributions, property taxes, general sales & use taxes, franchise tax, mixed beverage tax, etc. Total General Revenues and Transfers were \$7,454,342.
- On the Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and Report on Compliance for Each Major Federal Program regarding Federal Awards, "No Findings" were issued.

A potential nepotism violation was brought to their attention by several employees of the City although on July 17, 1948, the City adopted the City-Manager Form of Government.
