**Mayor Alexander** called the Regular Meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. after declaring a quorum present.

**Council Member Hodges** gave the Invocation.

**Council Member Warnock** led the Pledge of Allegiance & Pledge to the Texas Flag.

**Mayor Alexander** read the Mission Statement:

**"The Mission of the City of Fort Stockton Municipal Government is to Promote & Value Public Confidence and Trust by the Accountable and Responsible Use of Community Resources; to Ensure Public Safety; Improve Public Services; Promote Local Recreation and Entertainment; and Generate Economic Development."**

**PRESENTATIONS:**

1. **City Manager Frank Rodriguez III----**
  - City Manager's Report

**City Manager Frank Rodriguez** emphasized the great job the City Staff does on a daily basis.

He thanked the Supervisors for their oversight of their departments.

He thanked the Police Department for all they do, from the dispatchers to the administration.

The city is in a good position.

He advised City Council that the Public Works Department is working on the punch list for the Landfill Project. The next phase of the Landfill Project is the Landfill Building Shop.

The Texas Department of Emergency Management awarded the City of Fort Stockton \$1.8 million for negative economic impact from COVID-19. These funds can be utilized for water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure. The City of Fort Stockton is in the last stage of obtaining these funds.

**City Manager Rodriguez** introduced Benny Bundy, Senior Warden of the James A. Lynaugh/Fort Stockton Transfer Units, who arrived in July.

**Warden Bundy** expressed that Fort Stockton seems like a great place to raise his family. He stated he would like to get the offenders accustomed to assisting with community projects. He introduced the Assistant Warden Jamadre Enge and his stepson.

2. **Recreation Director Ruby Bernal----**

- Department Activity Report

**Recreation Director Ruby Bernal** explained that Fall Registration still going on.

There are approximately 100 kids registered. Registration has been open for approximately 1 1/2 weeks.

**Current Registrants:**

- There are 9 registered players for Tackle Football.
- 25 volleyball
- 30 Football
- 40 soccer

There are a few surrounding towns such as McCamey and Iraan that are trying to join our league.

She wasn't sure if Alpine would have enough players to join the league.

The Deadline for Fall Registration is August 20, 2021.

The Google Registration Form is located on the Recreation Facebook Page.

Payments are \$60 for Tackle Football and \$50 for everything else, which can be paid with cash, card, or check at the Recreation Facility. Hopefully soon payments will be available online.

**Mayor Alexander** introduced the 2021 Fort Stockton 50/70 All Star Team. They had a great showing at the Texas West State Tournament, which is the highest level they could advanced to. Although they come up short finishing in third place the boys played very well with a lot a heart.

Since COVID didn't allow Little League to happen last year the boys weren't able to compete in the International Little League World Series. They had high hopes in competing well in the Majors Division as 12-year-olds. Their regular season began in late April of this year with just 3 local league teams. In the past the 13-year-olds rarely had enough players to fill a team much less an entire league. This group has love for the game and is always continuing to better their skills in baseball. Most of the team members play select and travel ball throughout the year. The Fort Stockton Recreation Department, City Council and Little League Board are very thankful for their commitment and hard work throughout the years.

Now for their All-Star success:

- June 14-15 they were named the Undefeated District 37 champions, sweeping Pecos in a best of 3 series. Played in Fort Stockton
- June 25-28 there were named undefeated Section 1 champions played in Slaton, Tx,  
defeating Floyd Gwin 6-3; defeating Slaton to advanced to the Championship game 5-1;  
defeating Floyd Gwin once more for the Championship title 8-6.
- July 9-11, they competed in the Texas West State Tournament placing 3<sup>rd</sup>. They played with 10 players the first game defeating 5 Diamonds in a close game 6-5; returning the next day with 9 players taking a tough loss to Oil Belt 2-14; returning Sunday morning facing 5 Diamonds in the Semi-Final game and coming up short by 1 run 10-11.

**Recreation Director Ruby Bernal** advised everyone this was the first time Fort Stockton checked in to the Texas West State Tournament.

**Director of Finance Rodriguez** explained the Municipal Court Department has requested to expend \$2,200 for the purchase of a laptop and accessories.

The Public Works Department has requested to expend additional funds in the amount of \$1,545,600 to be expensed as follows:

- Streets-5th Street Sidewalk from Arnett to Everts
- HB 445 - Distributor and Street Repair Materials
- Court Technology-Laptop and accessories
- RO Plant-Well #1 Repairs
- Sanitation/Recycling-Building, Office and Bathroom

The Court Technology Fund Balance as of the End of FY 19-20 was \$16,767

The General Fund Balance as of the end of FY 19-20 was \$9,640,290.

The HB 445 Fund Balance as of the end of FY 19-20 was \$719,913

**Council Member Falcon** inquired if this item was approved by the CVB Board.

**CVB Director Lopez** responded the CVB Board did approve this purchase.

**Mayor Alexander** explained this item has been brought before the CVB Board multiple times and it was finally approved. The quality of the items are better than what was initially presented.

**Council Member Hodges** explained he was content with this decision.

**Mayor Alexander** explained these items are comparable to the furniture Monahans purchased.

**REGULAR BUSINESS:**

6. Discuss/Act upon School Resource Officer (S.R.O.) Agreement between the City of Fort Stockton & the Fort Stockton Independent School District. **(City Mgr./COP)**

**City Attorney Boinpally** explained herself, Fort Stockton Independent School District (FSISD) Superintendent Dr. Gabriel Zamora, City Manager Frank Rodriguez III, and Chief of Police Robert Lujan met a few times to discuss the School Resource Officer Agreement.

The FSISD agreed to an additional stipend after each semester, based on how many years of service.

The number of School Resources was changed from 5 to 3.

For larger events the Chief of Police will assist with staffing the events.

Compensation for School Resource Officers was increased.

**Council Member Hodges** inquired how many Officers recently graduated from the Academy.

**Assistant Chief of Police Ernesto Velasquez** responded that 5 Officers recently graduated from the Police Academy and 3 Officers are interested in applying as Officers for the Fort Stockton Police Department.

**Council Member Hodges** inquired how many arrests were made last year.

**Assistant Chief of Police Ernesto Velasquez** responded that there had been between 17-25 Juvenile arrests.

He explained the Fort Stockton Police Department is working on their relationship with the students. It is good for students to interact with Police Officers.

**Mayor Alexander** explained the City of Fort Stockton provides security for the FSISD as there have been several mass shootings in the other communities. This is one of the measures taken to ensure the safety of our community.

**Motion was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, seconded by Council Member James Warnock, and passed to Approve the School Resource Officer (S.R.O.) Agreement between the City of Fort Stockton & the Fort Stockton Independent School District. Council Member James Warnock, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Pam Palileo, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye and Council Member Ruben Falcon voted nay.**

7. Discuss/Act upon Purchase of Rectangle Tables, Round Tables, Folding Chairs, Chair Carts, Rectangle Table Carts, Round Table Carts for the Fort Stockton Event Center from MityLite Inc. with BuyBoard Government Purchasing Cooperative for \$154,486.72, Contract No. 584-19. **(City Mgr./CVB Dir.)**

**Mayor Alexander** explained these items can be delivered sometime in September.

The goal is to have the Event Center ready in time for the Big Bend Open Road Race 2.0.

**Motion was made by Council Member James Warnock, seconded by Council Member Darren Hodges, and carried unanimously to approve Purchase of Rectangle Tables, Round Tables, Folding Chairs, Chair Carts, Rectangle Table Carts, Round Table Carts for the Fort Stockton Event Center from MityLite Inc. with BuyBoard Government Purchasing Cooperative for \$154,486.72, Contract No. 584-19. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

8. Discuss/Act upon 3rd Quarterly Investment Report ending June 30, 2021. **(City Mgr./Dir. of Fin.)**

**Director of Finance Maria Rodriguez** explained in accordance with the City of Fort Stockton Investment Policy and the Public Funds Investment Act, she was submitting the 3rd Quarterly Investment Report for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

At the end of June, TexPool's average interest rate was 0.02%; LOGIC's average interest rate was 0.06%; 90-day T-Bills were 0.05% and the one-year T-Bills were 0.08%. Our local bank Pecos County State Bank, is currently at 0.35%.

In accordance with Resolution No. 11-110R, the City exceeded the required 7% of General Fund's and Enterprise Fund's budgeted expenses totaling \$19,390,590.00 by maintaining \$1,357,341.30.

9. Discuss/Act upon Awarding of Bid for Construction of New City Landfill Shop Building Project.  
**Bids Submitted:** *Eric's Plumbing Remodeling & Construction, Fletco Construction (City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)*

**Public Works Director Aaron Ramos** explained two bids were received for the New City Landfill Shop Building.

Eric's Plumbing Remodeling & Construction: \$503,000.00

Fletco Construction: \$374,500.00

Both companies are from Midland, Texas.



Construction consists of a 60 x 60 x 20 Building to include an Office, Restrooms, Plumbing and Electrical. The City would be responsible for tying in the utilities.

**Public Works Director Ramos** recommended awarding the bid for the New City Landfill Shop Building to Fletco Construction for \$374,500.00.

**Motion was made by Council Member Ruben Falcon, seconded by Council Member James Warnock, and carried unanimously to approve Awarding of Bid for Construction of New City Landfill Shop Building Project to Fletco Construction in the amount of \$374,500.00. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

10. Discuss/Act upon Re-Solicitation of Bids for Purchasing of Materials for Replacement of Cast Iron Gas Line. **(City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)**

**Public Works Director Aaron Ramos** explained there there No bids received for this project. He informed City Council that the City initially needed to replace 5.9 miles worth of Cast Iron Gas Line. The City is currently lacking 4.3 miles.

**City Manager Rodriguez** explained the City of Fort Stockton has until the end of December to complete the Replacement of Cast Iron Gas Line Project.

He explained that in speaking with the Railroad Commission, so long as we make every effort it shows due diligence on behalf of the City of Fort Stockton we should be ok.

There was one bid submitted for 1.2 million Dollars; however, it did not meet the deadline for submission on the original bid and the company did not submit the bid for the re-solicitation. It has been difficult to find anyone qualified for the job, as they have to be certified.

**Motion was made by Council Member James Warnock, seconded by Council Member Ruben Falcon, and carried unanimously to approve Re-Solicitation of Bids for Purchasing of Materials for Replacement of Cast Iron Gas Line. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

11. Discuss/Act upon Solicitation of Proposals for Repairs of Paddlewheel Aerator Unit at City Wastewater Plant Oxidation Ditch. **(City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)**

**Public Works Director Ramos** explained this is the last paddlewheel aerator at the City Wastewater Plant Oxidation Ditch. This is located on the southeast side of the Oxidation Ditch.

**City Manager Rodriguez** explained there are 3 operational and 1 is not operable. He explained this is one of the projects eligible for the Texas Department of Emergency Management Funds.

**Motion was made by Council Member James Warnock, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, and carried unanimously to approve Solicitation of Proposals for Repairs of Paddlewheel Aerator Unit at City Wastewater Plant Oxidation Ditch. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

12. Discuss/Act upon Solicitation of Bids for New Insulated Heated 6,500 Gallon Emulsion Storage Tank. **(City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)**

**Public Works Director Ramos** explained this New Insulated Heated 6,500 Gallon Emulsion Storage Tank is the same size as the one the City already has. He elaborated that obtaining a second emulsion tank would allow the City to Store both types of emulsion. It would be more efficient as the City would no longer have to wait until one type of emulsion is completely used to be able to use the other type of emulsion.

**Motion was made by Council Member James Warnock, seconded by Council Member Ruben Falcon, and carried unanimously to approve Solicitation of Bids for New Insulated Heated 6,500 Gallon Emulsion Storage Tank. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

13. Discuss/Act upon Rescinding the July 13, 2021 Motion regarding the Purchase of a 2023 Freightliner 114SD from Freightliner of Austin with BuyBoard Government Purchasing Cooperative for \$200,809.00, Contract No. 601-19. **(City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)**

**Public Works Director Ramos** explained he would like City Council to rescind their motion made during the July 13, 2021 meeting to approve the purchase of the 2023 Freightliner 114SD from Freightliner of Austin with BuyBoard Government Purchasing Cooperative for \$200,809.00, Contract No. 601-19, as the earliest the City could receive it was April of 2022.

He was able to find another Freightliner that was a little more expensive; however, the City would receive it within 90 days.

**Council Member Warnock** inquired how much more expensive the second Freightliner was than the original Freightliner.

**Assistant City Manager Gonzales** explained with the difficulty locating vehicles; they asked City Council to approve the purchase of the other Freightliner to ensure they would have a one;

however, Public Works Director Ramos was able to find a vehicle that would arrive sooner at an additional nominal fee.

**Council Member Warnock** inquired if the other Vendor had been notified that City Council approved the purchase.

**Assistant City Manager Gonzales** explained the company was contacted concerning the quote; however, a contract has not been signed therefore the City is not

14. Discuss/Act upon Purchase of a 2020 Freightliner M2 Class 8, more specifically a 36 Yard Side Loader Sanitation Truck for \$240,092.00 or a 33 Yard Side Loader Sanitation Truck for \$233,832.00 from GSP Marketing with Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) Cooperative Purchasing Program, Contract No. HT06-20. **(City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)**

**Public Works Director Ramos** explained these quotes are more; however, they will be delivered within 90 days from the time of purchase.

He recommended approving the purchase of the 36 Yard Side Loader Sanitation Truck.

The reason for the \$40,000.00 can be attributed to the hopper.

**City Manager Rodriguez** explained the City is trying to be proactive. They purchase of this Freightliner will be made out of next fiscal year's budget.

This allows the City to avoid interruption.

**Motion was made by Council Member Darren Hodges, seconded by Council Member James Warnock, and carried unanimously to approve Purchase of a 2020 Freightliner M2 Class 8, more specifically a 36 Yard Side Loader Sanitation Truck for \$240,092.00 from GSP Marketing with Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) Cooperative Purchasing Program, Contract No. HT06-20. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

15. Discuss/Act upon Rescinding the July 13, 2021 Motion Regarding the awarding of the Bid for Crushed Limestone and Aggregates #3, #4, #5 for Street Construction and Repairs to DG Trucking & Materials. **(City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)**

**Public Works Director Ramos** explained City Council previously Awarded DG Trucking & Materials the Bid for Crushed Limestone and Aggregates #3, #4, #5 for Street Construction and Repairs to DG Trucking & Materials during the last City Council Meeting. He stated Aberock was the lowest bid at \$7.45 per ton. DG Trucking & Materials bid was for \$7.50 per ton. After DG Trucking & Materials was awarded the bid they provided a sample of the aggregate from their query, which the City is unable to utilize as it is crushed limestone not crushed rock.

He explained the crushed limestone would turn into powder once they run the rollers over it.

**City Manager Rodriguez** recommended requesting samples of materials prior to the bid being awarded.

**Motion was made by Council Member Ruben Falcon, seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, and carried unanimously to rescind the July 13, 2021 Motion Regarding the awarding of the Bid for Crushed Limestone and Aggregate #3, #4, #5 for Street Construction and Repairs to DG Trucking & Materials. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

16. Discuss/Act upon Awarding the Bid for Crushed Limestone for Street Construction and Repairs.  
**Bids Submitted:** *Aberock Materials, LLC, Arcosa Aggregates, DG Trucking and Material, Green Dream International (City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)*

**Public Works Director Ramos** explained the City has been utilizing the materials from the Query Aberock Materials, LLC is located.

**City Attorney Boinpally** elaborated that there was some confusion concerning the name change and who was utilizing which query.

**Motion was made by Council Member Ruben Falcon, seconded by Council Member James Warnock, and carried unanimously to award Aberock Materials. Council Member James Warnock, Council Member Pam Palileo, Mayor Pro-Tem Paul Casias, Council Member Ruben Falcon, Council Member Darren Hodges voted aye.**

17. Discuss/Act upon Awarding the Bid for Aggregates #3, #4, #5 for Street Construction and Repairs.  
**Bids Submitted:** *Capitol Aggregates Inc, DG Trucking & Material, Green Dream International LLC (City Mgr./P.W. Dir.)*

**Public Works Director Ramos** recommended awarding the Bid for Aggregates #3, #4, #5 for Street Construction and Repairs to Green Dream International LLC.
