

## **IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Rocky Mountain Power will be upgrading the power substation in Grantsville on Sunday, July 11<sup>th</sup>. This upgrade will minimize the number and length of power outages. Unfortunately to do this, the power will be off for approximately 5 hours, beginning at 11:00 pm on July 11<sup>th</sup> until 4:00 am on July 12<sup>th</sup>.

Grantsville City is asking all residents to minimize their water usage on July 11<sup>th</sup>, beginning at 8:00 am. This will keep the water tanks full in case water is needed for fire protection. We request that *everyone* turn off their sprinkler systems that night to conserve water.

We want to remind citizens who need power for medical devices to have alternate power (battery or generator) that night. Please make sure if you use a generator, it has adequate ventilation.

Rocky Mountain Power and Grantsville City apologize for the inconvenience, but this is a needed upgrade to improve our power reliability.

## WATERING RESTRICTIONS

As Utah's drought worsens, Grantsville City will implement voluntary watering restrictions. At a news conference on June 8, 2021, Gov. Spencer Cox directed all state facilities to water landscapes only twice a week. He asked all municipalities, business owners, and property owners to follow suit. Outdoor watering makes up 60% of all residential water use. The Governor joked that we can "make yellow lawns great again." Water experts recommend allowing your lawn to grow longer and prioritize watering trees, shrubs and perennials over grass. Following the below recommendations can make a difference in our water supply.

- 1. Do not water between 10 A.M and 6 P.M.
- 2. Do not water on consecutive days.
- 3. Do not water multiple times a day.
- 4. Do not water for excessive lengths of time.
- 5. Water your lawns only twice a week.
- 5. Immediately replace leaking sprinkler heads and water lines.
- 6. Do not allow water to run down the gutter, curb or onto neighboring properties.
- 7. Minimize the amount of water spraying streets or sidewalks.

We all love a lush green lawn, however, during an extreme drought is not the time for that. Please be understanding as our City parks and facilities will not look as green as they have in years past. It's okay during a drought for us all to have a yellow lawn. For additional tips and information visit water.utah.gov.

Remember, especially with our current conditions, fireworks are illegal in ALL of Utah, except for July 2<sup>nd</sup>-July 5<sup>th</sup>, and between July 22-July 25<sup>th</sup>. We ask that you use extreme caution with fireworks. If you choose to ignite fireworks within the city designated boundaries, please have a hose and shovel handy and make sure there is no dry vegetation nearby. You can be responsible for the cost if you start a fire.
