Leaves: NO CHARGE

Keep separate from brush & yard waste. Drop off in paper bags or dump from tarps. Note: Do not use plastic bags and do not mix with grass clippings which are not allowed per DEEP regulation.

Brush & Yard Waste

Only with **\$20 Day Pass** bought at gate w/ proof of residency -OR- a **\$100 Annual Permit** bought in advance via mail or at Town Hall Annex during regular office hours.
