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	<p>been staggered to maintain the 6 ft. safe distance. Floors are marked throughout the prison at 6 ft. intervals. Sanitizing facility has been increased.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Perdue-No visitors are allowed. All employees are required to wear masks. Temperature screenings for employees are in place. Perdue continues normal production operations.</li> <li>• Berry Global-Visitors are restricted, everyone entering must be temperature screened. Staff from Aulander Medical Center are screening employees each shift. Masks are offered to employees to wear on a voluntary basis. Non-essential staff are working mobile. Truckers not allowed inside the plant. Portable restrooms and portable hand washing stations are provided outside. Berry is also providing to the truckers snacks and water in individual bags. Berry is operating 24 hours, 7 days weekly.</li> </ul>

<a href="#">Executive Order #116 – 10 March 2020</a>	Declares State of Emergency as well as issuing Statewide guidance for COVID19 Response.
<a href="#">Executive Order #117 – 14 March 2020</a>	Prohibits mass gatherings of more than 100 people and closed K-12 schools from 16 March to 30 March 2020. Executive
<a href="#">Executive Order #118 – 17 March 2020</a>	Limits operation of restaurants and bars in addition to broadening unemployment insurance benefits in response to COVID 19.
<a href="#">Executive Order #119 – 20 March 2020</a>	Facilities critical motor vehicle regulations, waives regulations to expand access to childcare and supports local health departments.
<a href="#">Executive Order #120 – 23 March 2020</a>	Prohibits mass gatherings of more than 50 people and closed public K-12 schools until May 15, 2020. Order also closes gyms, movie theatres, sweepstakes parlors, health clubs, barber shops, hair and nail salons and massage therapist.
<a href="#">Executive Order #121 – 27 March 2020</a>	Prohibits mass gathering of more than 10 and Stay at home order.
<a href="#">Executive Order #122 – 30 March 2020</a>	Eases regulations on the disposition of state surplus property to help schools and local government's access state surplus property to help bridge gaps during the response to COVID-19
<a href="#">Executive Order #124 – 31 March 2020</a>	Prohibits utilities (electric, gas, water, wastewater) from disconnecting people who are unable to pay during pandemic for the next 60 days and allows to pay for the services over the next 6 months.
<a href="#">Executive Order #125 – 1 April 2020</a>	Encourage & authorize shareholder meetings conducted by remote communications.
<a href="#">Executive Order #129 – 7 April 2020</a>	Extending time for law enforcement agencies to complete Criminal Justice Training Courses
<a href="#">Executive Order #130 – 8 April 2020</a>	Increases resources for health and human service needs. Increases health care resources, increases child care capacity, increases the pool of professional health care workers, expands telehealth services and flexibility for in-home care.
