FRONTIER FIBER INTERNET IS COMING TO HITCHCOCK

Access to high-speed internet is critical to everyone. Frontier is expanding the reach of its fiber network so homes and businesses can benefit from Frontier's mission to Build Gigabit America.

You'll notice a lot of activity in our surrounding areas. Before Frontier brings fiber to our neighborhoods, they will place door hangers on homes in the area where work will be preformed a minimum of 1 week in advance.

The project is expected to last approximately 4 months and will be spread across various parts of the city. These cables will be installed on poles and/or placed in the ground. The contractor will need access to any facilities or poles that may be on private property (including backyards). SDT Solutions will be the contractors in the city working for Frontier. Any impacts to streets, sidewalks, or landscaping will be restored by the contractor.



HITCHCOCK'S ANIMAL ALLEY

The City of Hitchcock is all about saving pets, serving our community, and promoting responsible pet ownership by educating you on local, state, and federal laws as they apply to animals and their welfare. It is our duty to ensure all animals are treated humanely, responsibly, and with respect in accordance with the law. To help our citizens be the best Fur-Parents they can be, here are 7 state and local animal regulations you may not know about that Hitchcock actively enforces:

- Animal owners must provide proper care and control of their animals to prevent such animals from becoming a
 public nuisance.
- 2. Ît is unlawful for any person to allow their animal to run at large.
- 3. Hitchcock city ordinance requires that you ensure your pets have current rabies vaccinations.
- 4. State and local regulations mandate that animal owners provide adequate shelter, water and food (this requirement pertains to your pets and farm animals).
- City ordinance limits the number of dogs and cats per household, you are limited to a total of 4 animals per household.
- 6. You are required to pick up and sanitarily dispose of pet waste left on public or private property.
- 7. The State of Texas adopted new regulations pertaining to the tethering and unlawful restraint of dogs.
 - The law prohibits an owner from leaving a dog outside and unattended by use of a restraint unless the owner provides the dog with access to:
 - adequate shelter;
 - an area that allows the dog to avoid standing water and exposure to excessive animal waste;
 - shade from direct sunlight:
 - potable water;
 - The new law also prohibits the use of a restraint that:
 - is a chain;
 - has weights attached;
 - is shorter in length than the greater of 10' or 5x the length of the dog; or
 - is attached to a collar or harness not properly fitted.

ARE YOU READY FOR WHEN DISASTER STRIKES?

Anyone who has lived in the Gulf Coast region knows the threat of a disaster is a possibility for which residents must prepare. In recent years, residents in this region have dealt with a range of major disasters – from hurricanes, floods and freezes to chemical spills and plant explosions. In preparing for the unexpected, Ready Houston suggests making a plan, building a kit and staying informed.

Make A Plan- A good preparedness plan can prevent or at least reduce the confusion and panic typically brought on by an emergency situation. Simply knowing what to anticipate once a disaster hits your area or your home is key to your family's safety. Start planning early by contacting the proper sources for help or information.

Build A Kit- Building a family emergency kit is crucial. During emergencies, you will need to be self-reliant for a period of time. You may want to consider two types of kits: a Go Bag and a Stay-At-Home Kit. A Go Bag is one you would take with you in case of evacuation. A Stay-At-Home Kit would come into play if you were taking shelter in your home. Drinking water and non-perishable food are essential, but don't forget about your pets. Make sure to add supplies for Fluffy and Fido too.

Stay Informed (Before, During and After Disasters)- For you and your family's safety, and the safety of your community: Start today making sure your family and your neighborhood are prepared to respond and cope before, during and after disasters. Emergency Alert System broadcasts are activated by local authorities when there is an emergency. In addition to KTRH 740 AM and KUHF 88.7 FM is also reliable for emergency updates. BASIC KIT SUPPLY LIST:

Enough for 5 to 7 days is recommended

- Water (one gallon per person per day, for dinking and sanitation)
- Non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio & weather radio with tone alert, plus extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First Aid Kit & Rain gear
- Whistle to signal for help
- Filter mask or cotton t-shirt, to help filter the air
- · Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener if kit contains canned food
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Items for unique family needs, such as daily prescription medications, infant formula, or diapers
- Paper towels and disposable cups, plates & utensils
- · Cash or traveler's checks
- Fire extinguisher
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Disinfectant
- Copies of important documents in a waterproof container
- Books, board games and other non-electric entertainment

YOU COULD HAVE A WATER LEAK

Right this moment hundreds of gallons of water could be leaking in or around your home. You may not hear water running or see any puddles, but that doesn't mean it's not happening.

The clear evidence: an unusually high water bill.

In some cases, the answer is simple: You've started watering more. Even hand watering can increase your bill, especially if you lose track of time while you're doing it. But sometimes the reason your bill has skyrocketed is a complete mystery.

The two most common culprits of a high water bill are leaky toilets and misbehaving irrigation systems. Any device in your home that automates anything related to water is at risk of leaking — often without leaving any easy-to-find clues.

Swimming pools, water softeners — anything with pumps and valves that move water could malfunction. These culprits could be silent, invisible problems. A device that tops off the water in your pool automatically is the number one reason for catastrophic water bills.

According to a national study, 13 percent of the water used in homes is lost to preventable leaks — leaks people didn't know they had.
