Commissioner's Corner: JEFF JENKS

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

As an 84-year-old senior, thank you for allowing me to serve you for the past 24 years.

SEMCOG projects that the number of homes and population are expected to stay constant during the next 25 years, but the number of seniors 65-84 is expected to increase by 43.8% and the number of d to increase by 45.0%

seniors over 85 is expected to increase by 150%.

Huntington Woods is known for our outstanding services. We offer a lot of direct senior services, but you must reach out to city staff and get involved. Staff can assist you in finding services offered by other agencies. Please call the Parks and Recreation HW Cares Senior Outreach Coordinator, Jennifer Furlong at 248.581.2712. She can help with any service mentioned here plus grocery deliveries, movies, music, games and more. She is your friends and family connection as well.

Monday through Friday daytime transportation is offered curb-to-curb within a 7-mile radius. You need to request this service at least 48 hours in advance. The charge is \$1 each way. Minor home repairs can be assisted through our HARP program, where you only pay for the cost of materials, not labor.

Nearly every Monday at noon, the Monday Lunch Bunch meets. The meal costs \$5 and you must pre-reserve it by 10:00am the previous Wednesday. Sunday mornings from 10:30 am to 12:30 pm, seniors get together at the Gillham Recreation Center. Everyone is welcome at both events.

You can walk the gym Monday through Friday from 8:00 - 9:00 am or 1:00 - 2:00 pm (except Tuesdays). You can join in playing pickleball Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday mornings. There are classes in Tai Chi, Balance, and Sit and Fit, where you work out from your chair and even the AARP Driver's Safety class for seniors, 55 and older. If you complete the course, it can often lower your car insurance rates. There is a Senior lounge, right near the front desk. Available for reservations or walk in use. Ask for it to be unlocked if you would like to use it.

On the 3rd Wednesday of the month, from 10:00 to 11:00 am, there is a free blood pressure check, and on select Fridays at noon a free movie is shown.

This is the tip of the iceberg. The library offers movies, lectures, book delivery and other services. Public Safety offers Kindcalls and a secure meeting place for exchanging payments.

If your income declines, you may also be able to pay lower property taxes. There is a Poverty exemption and you may be surprised by the dollar levels. Call the City Treasurer for more information.

BUILDING HOURS

Non-emergency and general business calls are received by Huntington Woods Public Safety during normal business hours, Monday through Friday, 8:30 am - 5:00 pm. After 5:00 pm, telephone services are switched over to Berkley Dispatch. All 9-1-1 calls are answered by Berkley dispatch 24 hrs a day.

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATION: NIXLE

Nixle provides a quick, efficient, and secure way to get neighborhoodlevel information out to community members who subscribe to the system. Through www.nixle.com, the Public Safety Department is able to send text message (SMS) and e-mail alerts to subscribers in a specific area.

EMERGENCY CONTACT TOOL

Residents may fill out an Alert Form for Dispatchers to have important information on file so dispatchers can relay it quickly to first responders. The project was developed by the City's Senior Advisory Committee to identify seniors and other vulnerable residents in an emergency and to ensure Public Safety can respond appropriately to calls for service. The Alert Form for Dispatchers is located on the City's website at www.hwmi.org under Public Safety Forms.

FREE GUN LOCK WHILE SUPPLIES LAST

This free Gun Safety Lock Giveaway is courtesy of the National Shooting Sports Foundation | NSSF / Project ChildSafe in partnership with the Oakland County Board of Commissioners' Study Group on Gun Violence and the Oakland County Sheriff's Office. Gun locks can be picked up at Public Safety during building hours.

HEADING OUT OF TOWN?

Residents are welcome to contact Public Safety weekdays, 8:30 am - 5:00 pm when going out of town so that officers may keep an extra watch on your home.

KINDCALL

Kindcall is an automatic telephone calling service for residents. A Public Safety Dispatcher calls the resident daily at a pre-approved time. If no one answers the phone, a Public Safety officer responds to the home to assure the resident is safe. The service is upon request, and without charge, and can be obtained by calling the Public Safety Department at 248.541.1180.

KNOX-BOX SERVICE

The Knox-Box Residential Program is an extension of the Knox Rapid Entry system that provides first responders with safe and immediate entry into a residential property in the event of an alarm or an emergency. Residents who are interested in the program should contact the Public Safety Department at 248.541.1180 for written approval and program information.

OVERNIGHT STREET PARKING

Reminder, the City has an ordinance that prohibits parking on all streets, 3:00 - 5:00 am. If there is some reason why you need to park on the street during these hours, please contact DPS at 248.541.1180. Permission to park on the street is given on a case-by-case basis.

RESIDENTIAL HOME INSPECTIONS

Residents can call Public Safety to schedule a home inspection for fire safety review and home security issues.



RX DRUG DROP-OFF BOX

Residents can safely dispose of unwanted and expired prescription drugs between 8:30 am and 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday. All drugs must be brought in sealed baggies. Needles are not accepted and all liquid must be sealed.

Drug test kits for concerned parents are available, no questions asked.

SAFE HAVEN

DPS is offering the lobby as a "Safe Haven" for Craigslist or like transactions. Nationwide, many Craigslist scams have resulted in robberies, assaults and even homicides. Residents do not need to call in advance. The Public Safety Lobby is open 24/7. However, you will need to use the red phone located in the foyer to contact a public safety officer Monday -Friday after 5:00 pm and on weekends/ holidays. If the involved party refuses to meet in the lobby or parking lot of our Public Safety Department, refuse the transaction. Officers will need to be aware that a transaction is taking place, but will not serve as witnesses or take part in the transactions unless something gave rise to their involvement. By being proactive and implementing a Safe Haven for such transactions it allows our residents the opportunity to meet in a safe environment.

SIREN TEST SCHEDULE

Oakland County Homeland Security tests the outdoor warning siren system on the first Saturday of each month at 1:00 pm.

WALKERS/JOGGERS

All walkers/joggers are encouraged to use sidewalks where provided. It is contrary to traffic law to use the street for jogging or walking. Where no sidewalks are available, pedestrians should use the left side of the street facing traffic. Always carry ID in case of emergency. Wear light colored clothing or reflective vests so you are visible to traffic.

CITY-WIDE GARAGE SALE MAY 19 - 21 | 9:00 am - 6:00 pm Recycle your treasures or find a treasure at this annual sale.

The annual City-Wide Garage Sale is always a huge success! To sell, residents must obtain a permit, which includes 2 garage sale signs, through Public Safety or at the Gillham

Recreation Center for \$3. No homemade signs are permitted. The City website (HWMI.ORG) will have a list of homes having a sale. For more information call Lynn at Public Safety, 248.541.1180.

CITY NOTES

2023 SUMMER PROPERTY TAX BILL

The 2023 summer tax bills will be mailed to those homeowners without escrow accounts on June 30, 2023. If you do not have an escrow account and have not received a tax bill within a week of July 1st, contact City Hall immediately. Non-receipt of bill does not negate the owner's responsibility to pay.

SUMMER TAX DEFERMENT

The summer tax deferment allows certain taxpayers to delay payment of their summer bill until February 14, 2024 without additional interest and penalty. The deferment is available to residents whose gross household income for 2022, will not exceed \$40,000, and also qualify under one of the following classifications: 62 years of age or older, paraplegic or quadriplegic, eligible serviceperson, eligible veteran, eligible widow or widower, blind person, or totally and permanently disabled. The deferment can be taken on the principal residence only. Proof of income may be required. Forms are available at City Hall or the website www.mich.gov/treasury, search for form #471.

AN EASY WAY TO PAY YOUR WATER BILL

City water bills may be paid by direct debit of your checking or savings account similar to the convenience offered by many utility companies. On the due date, payment is drafted from your account to pay the bill in full. Enrollment forms may be obtained from the City website or by calling City Hall at 248.541.4300.

ONLINE PROPERTY INFORMATION

Property Tax, Water Billing Information and Building Permits are available online on the City website www.hwmi.org. Property taxes and water bills may also be paid online using a credit card or e-check, but please note there is a fee. Summer taxes are due on August 10, 2023. Half payments are allowed if the 1st half is paid by August 10, the remainder may be paid on or before October 31, 2023.

PUBLIC WORKS

CHIPPING: WEDNESDAYS (EARLY DECEMBER - MID-**OCTOBER**)

The City provides chipping for branches 2" to 4" in diameter and 4 feet to 8 feet long, all year except for leaf season (mid-October to December 1), and weather permitting. Because we serve over 2,400 homes in one day, the amount of branches we can handle is limited - huge piles of unstacked branches with other debris mixed in cannot be handled by the DPW.

Smaller branches, brush, root balls, and soft plant materials should be put in yard waste bags or containers, for Tuesday pickup, early April through mid-December. Stack branches neatly with cut ends toward curb. Have branches out for chipping by 7 am on Wednesday. (In case of inclement weather on chipping day, the branches will be picked up the following day, or as soon as possible thereafter.) **Contractors cutting branches** or brush must remove their own debris.

TREE CARE

Don't forget to water your trees in periods of dry weather. Trees prefer long slow drinks over sprinkler watering. A "donut" of mulch around but **not touching** the tree will keep the water from evaporating. Do not put large rocks or heavy materials on the roots and keep weed whips and mowers away from the bark.

WATER/SEWER

Avoid surprise water bills - not just in summer but year-round. The most common cause for wasted water (and high bills) is

toilet leaking. Leaks are often silent, can be intermittent, and can even occur with new toilets.

WATER METERS

Water readings in Huntington Woods are actual, not estimates. Your water meter is in your basement (in nearly all homes). We read from the little black device outside your home, connecting our reading device directly with it. Please make sure we have access to that device.

WEST NILE VIRUS PREVENTION

West Nile Virus is still a threat to human health in Michigan and elsewhere. The DPW treats the City catch basins with a biological larvicide, but it's important that individuals take precautions in the summer months. Check the Oakland County Health Department website for prevention tips: oakgov.com/ health/information/pages/weatnile-virus.aspx

TRASH COLLECTION DATES TO NOTE FOR 2023

- Memorial Day one day delay Wednesday, May 31 Independence Day one day delay Wednesday, July 5 Labor Day one day delay Wednesday, September 6 Curbside yard waste pickup begins April 4 and ends December 12. This includes fruit and vegetable scraps, whether in paper yard waste bags or can's with YARD WASTE stickers.

Curbside collection is on Tuesdays (unless noted), between 7:00 am and 7:00 pm (often later depending on staffing). If you experience problems with collection, please contact the DPW at 248.547.1888 or hwdpw@hwmi.org, as soon as possible. Leave a detailed message with your name, address, and phone number and the nature of the problem.

Containers or items for recycling, yard waste, or trash may be put at the curb no earlier than 4:00 pm Monday and **no later than 7:00 am on Tuesday.** Empty containers must be removed by midnight on Tuesday.

MAXIMUM CONTAINER SIZES AND WEIGHTS:

• **Trash:** 35 gal cans (50 lbs. maximum) or 2 mil plastic bags (40 lbs. maximum)

 Recycling: City-supplied wheeled cart (60 lbs. maximum). You may purchase a larger cart if needed - call DPW for info. All materials must be inside the cart.

• **Yard waste/kitchen scraps:** 35 gal cans (50 lbs. maximum) or paper yard waste bags (40 lbs. maximum). Free yard waste stickers for cans available at DPW. Little bins are available at our cost (currently \$18) at the DPW for kitchen (fruit and vegetable) scraps.

LANDFILL/TRASH

Trash must be put into either a 2-mil-thick plastic bag or in closed plastic bags inside of a 35-gallon covered container. Be sure to have trash set out at the curb by 7:00 am on Tuesday or it could be missed. Bulk items, like appliances, can be set out neatly next to – but not mixed in with other trash.

Wheeled 35-gallon trash carts are available at the DPW, at cost, while supplies last.

NOT ACCEPTED FOR COLLECTION

There are certain items that are not acceptable for curbside collection. These items must be disposed of privately. Please check the SOCRRA website to find out how to dispose of these items: liquids, radioactive items, flammable products, explosives, infectious materials, asbestos insulation, tires and hazardous waste. Also, very large or very heavy items (like pianos, etc.) must be disposed of privately. Call the DPW if you are unsure whether an item is acceptable for curbside pickup.

YARD WASTE (INCLUDING FRUIT AND VEGETABLE MATTER!)

Yard waste pickup extends from early April through mid-December. From small branches to grass clippings, raw fruit and vegetable matter, your yard waste can be placed in tall paper bags or 35 gal cans with **YARD WASTE** stickers. If you like, you may purchase a small 6-gallon container at the DPW for fruit and vegetable scraps, or you can mix those items into other yard waste.

RECYCLING CURBSIDE PICK-UP

With our single-stream recycling carts, curbside recycling is simple: everything goes into the cart with no need to separate anything Items not listed below may be dropped off at SOCRRA. The following items can go in your cart:

- Cardboard: All cardboard must be placed in cart. Flatten completely, cut down to fit into cart.
- Paperboard cereal boxes, paper towel rolls, etc.
- Paper envelopes w/ windows, a staple or two. Shredded paper should go in a thick clear plastic bag (available at DPW) and placed in the recycling cart.
- Plastic bottles, jugs, and containers (including . "clamshell" and thermoform packaging). If it once held something, it's a container. Keep lids on plastic bottles, jugs, and jars—no need to save the lids separately.
- Metal can's including empty • aerosol cans.
- Glass containers jars and bottles, but no window glass or mirrors. All colors of glass are acceptable.

NO BATTERIES in the carts! Household batteries may be taken to SOCRRA for disposal in a hazardous waste landfill.

Thunder/Lightning: The pool will be cleared immediately. Patrons must leave the pool and deck area. The pool will remain closed for 30 minutes after each occurrence of thunder/lightning.

Severe Weather: The facility will close in the event of a severe weather warning. Patrons will be asked to go into the Recreation Center.

Cold Weather/Rain: The pool will close at the discretion of the manager if the air temperature

is below 69°, steady rain, or the total attendance is fewer than 10 people in a 2-hour period. If the facility closes during General Swim, it may be reopened if the weather improves. Pool closings will be posted and sent out via Remind. Please call before returning to the pool.

Low Attendance: At the

discretion of the manager, the number of lifeguards on duty will be reduced if pool attendance remains low. The slide will be closed as a result of this reduction in staff.

Contamination: The pool will be cleared in the event of contamination. The closing period is dictated by the severity of the contamination. The Pool Manager will determine the length of time required based on health department standards.
