A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) ANNUAL ACTION PLAN (PROGRAM YEAR 2016) FOR THE CITY OF LOGAN.

WHEREAS, the City of Logan (City) was designated a Metropolitan Statistical Area in May, 2003; and

WHEREAS, the City is required to develop an Annual Action Plan each year for submission for approval to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which plans delineate funding allocations to CDBG subrecipients and strategic priorities and a community needs assessment; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that the City has \$448,808 to allocate from HUD for PY2016; and

WHEREAS, the City has complied with the applicable requirements approved by HUD and outlined in the City's Five-Year Consolidated Plan, which requires that:

- a steering committee is formed to meet and review each eligible application for funding and to come to a unanimous consensus for a recommendation; which recommendation includes funding allocations and funding conditions; and which is submitted for approval to the collective City Council; and
- specified public hearings are held, notices are published, and both the Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan under consideration are made available for public review and comment in accordance with the Citizen Participation Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOGAN, UTAH:

- The PY2016 Annual Action Plan, including funding decision, the executive summary of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference, is hereby adopted by the City of Logan and approved to be submitted to HUD.
- 2. This resolution shall be effective immediately as of the date of its adoption.





The City of Logan is a CDBG entitlement community, and will receive an estimated \$448,808 allocation from HUD for Program Year (PY) 2016. These funds will cover eleven activities, including program administration and planning, as outlined in this Annual Action Plan (AAP).

During the first two years of the current Consolidated Plan (Conplan), Logan City was able to make significant investment in meeting both of the priority goals of the Conplan, (infrastrucutre and support of public services). In both years the funding allocations met the allocation percentages parameters laid out the Conplan, which was 65%-70% for infrastrucutre and 10%-15% for social service proveder support. With the city having met the goal both years, the plan for this year is to continue to meet those funding percentage goals.

The City followed the outline of its Citizen Participation Plan by conducting outreach through two public hearing, two application workshops, and working through a steering committee for application selection. Public hearing were advertised through newspaper announcements and postings on the Logan City website and at the city offices. The draft summary of the AAP was also published online and notice for public comment was announced in the newspaper, posted at City Hall, and directly emailed to local agencies and service providers.

Public comment was sought during two public hearings. The first, on February 2, 2016, was held prior to month long CDBG application period (February 5 through March 4, 2016). This meeting served as an opportunity for residents to provide input on CDBG goals for the year. The second public hearing was held on May 3, 2016, and allowed residents to speak prior to adoption of the AAP about the funding recommendation for the year.

Discussion

BRAG continues to operate the local its Section 8 housing voucher program. The program provides help to eligible low-income families and individuals to enable them to rent decent, safe, and affordable housing of their choice through rental subsidies to private landlords. The program presently has an annual budget of over \$2 million to provide rental assistance to 566 families.

BRAG also operates Weatherization, Furnace Replacement and Repair, and Single Family Housing Rehabilitation Loan, and HEAT assistance programs. All of these programs lend to the facilitation of affordable housing. While not directly funded through CDBG this year, Logan City proritizes funding for affordable housing through local sources. It is expected that local funds will contribute to 10 households

unsheltered homeless persons. This is not surprising considering the cold climate in northern Utah and that there is no homeless shelter in the immediate area that serves the chronically homeless. Without this service available, local agencies rely on a homeless shelter outside of their jurisdiction for sheltering the chronically homeless.

The concern from multiple agencies dealing with homeless issues in Cache Valley is not only persons meeting the definition of chronically homeless, but also the number of doubled-up households and couch-surfers. The City's goal is to stay involved with these concerns by being at the discussion table. Logan's CDBG Coordinator continues to be involved in multi-agency collaborations through the HCC to ensure that the City is engaged with these initiatives. No funding CDBG funding request was made by the HCC or participating partners this year.

The City is making housing more affordable through homeownership assistance and housing rehabilitation assistance programs, which are funded primarily through local funds. As stated previously, 197 families have recieved homeownership assistance program in 2003, and over two dozen households have recieved housing rahbiliation assistance since 2012.

In regard to Fair Housing, Logan City is currently working with Dr. Jessica Lucero of Utah State University on updating our Analyis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice. This update will serve as a Fair Housing policy document for the city, and help to inoform our next CDBG Consolidated plan. The Fair Housing plan is expected to be completed and adopted by the City by July, 2016.





Chairman Olsen opened the meeting to a public hearing.

Claudia Brilliant with the Family Information Resource Center addressed the Council. The Center is celebrating their 20th anniversary and they partner with the Logan City School District. They will be moving into their permanent location, a former home which is currently being remodeled. Additional space is needed and their project proposal is to add an additional 500 square feet at a cost of \$60,000 which the school district is not able to fund. She asked the Council for their support of this project.

Encarni Gallardo with the Children's Services Center addressed the Council. The Center provides services and helps grandparents that are raising their grandchildren due to the parents being unable due to incarceration or drug abuse. She said they currently do not hold a business license through the County because they are providing services through Bear River Mental Health. She asked if the City can provide any help in obtaining their business license.

CDBG Coordinator Aaron Smith offered to talk with Ms. Gallardo regarding how she can obtain a business license.

Dave Schuster with Neighborhood Nonprofit addressed the Council. His organization is applying for \$50,000 for the Welcome Home Own in Logan Program which helps first time home, low income home buyers with their costs of getting into a home. Since 2003 when the program started they have helped 195 families and of those 84% are still in their home today. He also stated that he would like to be involved in any discussions or meetings being held in regards to renovation projects.

Nelda Ault with the Cache Refugee and Immigration Program addressed the Council. She thanked the Council and the steering committee for their support of nonprofit organizations.

Gordon Yonker with the Family Place addressed the Council. He thanked the Mayor and Council for the new Family Place location. They have several program needs they would like the Council to consider as they apply for CDBG funding in the future.

Logan resident Bill Bower addressed the Council. He said when working with nonprofits sometimes tax payer money is used for their own salaries and the City should look closely at this when a request for funding has been made.

Councilmember Simmonds stated that CDBG Coordinator Aaron Smith watches this very carefully and it is specifically stated within the guidelines that funding cannot be used for salaries. There were no further comments and Chairman Olsen closed the public hearing.
