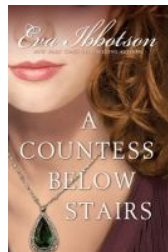

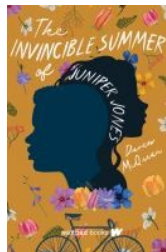

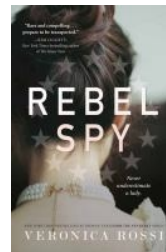
A countess below stairs

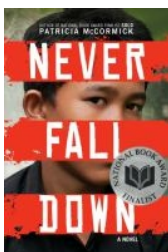
The invincible summer of Juniper Jones

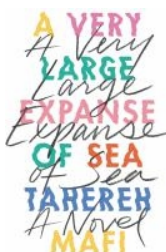

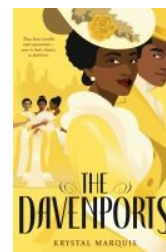
Never fall down

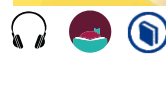
A very large expanse of sea

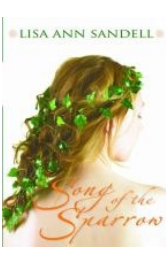
The wild queen
