

Frankenstein








Jane Eyre


Flowers for Algernon by Daniel Keyes TEEN FICTION KEYES


The joy luck club

But when he meets an eccentric young neighbor, Clarisse, who introduces him to a past where people didn't live in fear and to a present where one sees the world through the ideas in books.

The Chosen

Set in 1944, this book follows two Jewish sons and their fathers. Reuven, a modern Orthodox Jew, and Danny, an ultraorthodox Hasid, become friend over their CHAIM POTOK love of baseball (through a circuitous
