Help the City Make Improvements

Do you want to help shape our City? Help shape upcoming transportation Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) before they are added to future City budgets.

Many projects start with an idea or a comment submitted by residents who are concerned about being able to walk or bike safely, or better navigate through busy intersections. Those ideas and comments are adopted in the City's 2040 Comprehensive Plan that guides future growth and development. City planners and engineers then work to develop conceptual plans that turn these ideas into projects that will make it safer and easier to get around.

The public involvement phase has begun and that's where you come in. You can vote for your favorite plan or weigh in on what you would like to see included with several current projects:

- The Sudley Rd. Sidewalk Project will build a new 0.7-mile sidewalk on the east side of Sudley Rd. between Mathis Ave. and Grant Ave. Right now, the existing sidewalk on the west side of Sudley Road is four feet wide without a buffer for pedestrians on this busy road. The new sidewalk will be five feet wide from Grant Ave. to Portner Ave. and six feet wide from Portner Ave. to Mathis Ave. with a three-to-six-foot buffer. State funds are being sought to fund this \$3 - \$3.1 million project. Visit www.manassasva.gov/sudleysidewalk to vote on two alternatives.

- The Godwin Trail (North) Project is a new 10-foot wide, 0.9 mile shared-use path on the east side of Godwin Dr. between Wellington

Rd. and Sudley Rd., and will include pedestrian improvements at Ashton Ave. and Godwin Dr. State and federal funds are being sought to fund the \$8.3 million project. Visit www.manassasva.gov/godwin to find out more and comment on the plans.

- The Dumfries Road Bike Facilities Project is a 0.5-mile bike connection between Wellington Road and Hastings Dr. You can vote on your favorite among three alternative plans. Depending on which plan is chosen, the project cost will be between \$260,000 and \$560,000. Visit www.manassasva.gov/dumfries to find out more and vote.

Being able to vote on detailed alternatives or share comments on conceptual plans before adding projects to the Capital Improvement Program is something new. "We recognize that public outreach is a critical part of each

project," says Matt Arcieri, Director of Planning and Community Development. "It is important that property owners know about these projects, and that the people who use these roads, sidewalks and pathways share their voice about what they think is important."

Other transportation projects underway include the Redoubt Road Trail and the Liberia Third Lane eastbound, which are in the planning stages; and Mathis Ave., Sudley Road/ Centreville Road Roundabout, Sudley Rd. Third Lane, and the Wellington Trail are all in the design phase. Visit www.manassasva.gov/transportationprojects to find out about all of the projects and see detailed plans.

You can also visit www.manassasva.gov/parkprojects to share your thoughts on park improvement projects--like the plans to add more recreational options at Dean Park--to find out about meetings, and to see the parks maintenance schedule.

Trash, Recycling and Yard Waste Collection

Have you been experiencing missed or no trash collection? The City’s trash and recycling contractor is dealing with a number of issues that are causing problems with the collection of residential trash, recycling and yard waste. Some of these challenges are driver job shortages and supply chain issues. This is affecting maintenance of trash/recycling trucks, as well as arrival dates for new trucks. This problem is not just happening here in the City of Manassas, but throughout the Northern Virginia area, the state and the nation. Collection crews service about 10,500 residential stops in the City of Manassas. This is an average of three carts per household which equates to more than 31,500 carts set out weekly just in the City. In addition there are bulk items set out for pickup and the paper yard bags.

Over the past few weeks, the City has seen a rising number of collection routes not being completed until the next day. As the summer progresses, the delayed collections may continue due to the hot weather days, storms and equipment failures. How can you help? If you did not receive your regular weekly service, report it online www.manassasva.gov/trash. If carts are not emptied in your area, your route has probably been delayed. Please leave your carts at the curb so the collection crew can empty them the next day. Trash and recycling crews will catch up the following morning. Thank you for your patience and understanding as we face these challenges.
