




Crime and Incident Analysis

Domestic Violence



- 4% decrease in reports of domestic violence
- 61% of reports resulted in arrest

Mental Health, Substance Abuse, and Overdose


- 13% decrease in mental health related calls
 - 310 mental health related calls to include suicidal thoughts and ideations.
- 26% decrease in Opiate Related Overdose Calls (66)
- The number of fatal overdoses decreased by 5



5 - Year Comparison of DUI Arrests




Calls for Service

 - 11% increase from 2021




Response Times

Dispatcher Reaction Time




Officer Reaction Time

The most common charges were for intoxication, driving under the influence, and trespassing



Adult and Juvenile Arrest Charges 2017-2022




Traffic Citations



Satisfaction with Public Safety

21st Century Policing Principles

There is a clear link between the mirroring of the community demographics and the mental and physical well-being of officers and how we interact with residents- our attitude, communication style and use of force can all be tied to this. We must be at our best daily and treat people with dignity and respect.

Training Hours per Officer = minimum of 130 hours

Additional Hours needed for career development and specialties = an additional 80-300 hours for each course/certification

To maintain the high standards we are used to and to continue to be a leader in policing, we must continue our commitment to CALEA (Accreditation) and professionalism. In 2022 the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies completed year 2 of their 4 year audit cycle. We are currently on track to meet all 484 standards.

The construction of the new Public Safety Facility is complete. The new building will ensure we continue to meet the high standards imposed by CALEA in the areas of evidence storage and training. This facility houses state of the art storage and includes a virtual training simulator. These programs demonstrate the City's commitment to providing our residents with the highest level of professional police services.
