The Arts and Entertainment District in Marshall Minnesota incorporates what most local residents call our Downtown. It is bordered by Memorial Park on the south, the Lyon County Courthouse on the north, Liberty Park band shell on the east and the National Guard Armory on the west.

It has been the dream of local art and music supporters to add cultural experiences to the business of downtown. From the Thursdays on Third, Sounds of Summer and of course, our weekly band concerts, many have dreamed to develop Marshall's downtown into an entertainment district.

### **Developing Downtown Marshall** – A Community at Work

The Marshall Mural Project is a multi-year community effort to develop and implement visual imagery through three public arts murals in downtown Marshall. The purpose of this project is to enhance public art in the community by working with the City

of Marshall, businesses, organizations and community residents to develop a mural program that will provide for the funding, selection, creation and maintenance of up to three public art works.

Locations at 256 W Main (Corner of Third Street and Main Street), West Wall of Greig and Gregerson property will display the History/Cultural theme; 128 W Main, East side of Varsity


Pub will display the Athletics/Recreation theme and 316 W Main, West Wall of Johnson's Paint and Wallpaper Store will display Marshall's Music theme.
