




MARTIN COUNTY OPIOID EFFORTS



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Past Efforts

September 10, 2014

- Safe Kids Riverbend (members in Martin, Tyrrell, and Washington counties) hosted a
 community forum event at the Vernon James Center in Roper, NC. Approximately 45
 individuals representing multiple disciplines (law enforcement, schools, DSS, public health,
 mental health and medical providers, childcare, faith community, etc) attended. Participants
 learned about Project Lazarus, an effective approach to the current issues surrounding
 prescription drug misuse, abuse, diversion, overdose, addiction to pain medication and
 access to appropriate pain care. The main focus of this approach is public awareness,
 coalition building, and data and evaluation.
- The separate components include:
 - Community Education
 - Provider Education
 - Evaluation of Hospital /Emergency Department polices as they relate prescribing controlled substances
 - Diversion Control
 - Pain Patient Support
 - Harm Reduction
 - Addiction Treatment

Past Efforts


• MTW District Health Department partnered with the county leadership of each of our three counties and representatives of Trillium Health Resources to host a community forum to address opioids. This was a project sponsored by the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners and approximately 120 state and local leaders attended. Guest speakers included representatives from Cooperative Extension, North Carolina Attorney General's Office, Trillium Health Resources, Emergency Medical Services, Department of Social Services, Martin County Sheriff's Office and MTW Public Health. Participants then had small group discussions and a list of wants and needs was developed.

Strengthen Opioid Misuse Prevention (STOP) Act of 2017-

- Limits on the number of days worth of opioids that may be lawfully prescribed upon initial consultation for acute injuries
- Requires prescribers to use the NC Controlled Substance Reporting System (NCCSRS)- a prescription database (prevents "doctor shopping) and requires providers to conduct a 12 month history review.
- Requirement for all PAs and NPs practicing in pain clinics to consult with their supervising physician prior to prescribing opioids.

Opioid Trends

The **overdose death rate** in NC was **39** out of 100,000 people in 2021. This represents **4,041** people in **NC** who died from overdose in that year.

The **overdose emergency department visit rate** in NC was **161** out of 100,000 people in 2021. This represents **16,901** emergency department visits by NC residents for overdose in that year.

• The **overdose emergency department visit rate** in **Martin County** was **76** out of 100,000 people in 2021. This represents **17** emergency department visits by Martin County residents for overdose in that year.

The **overdose death illicit drug involvement rate** in **NC** was **78** out of 100,00 overdose deaths in 2021. This represents **3,166** people in **NC** who died from illicit drug overdose in that year.

• The overdose death illicit drug involvement rate in Martin County was 67 out of 100,000 overdose deaths in 2021. This represents 6 people in Martin County who died from illicit drug overdose in that year.



Martin County Residents, 2012-2021




The most common substances contributing to **overdose deaths** in Martin County, in 2012–2021 was **Heroin and/or Fentanyl.**








Vital Strategies to Dedicate \$1.5 Million to 12 North Carolina Counties That Use Opioid Settlement Money to Make Harm Reduction Services More Accessible

Opioid Listening Sessions

Martin County August 12, 2022

Community Attendees desire to have a mental health/psychiatric liaison at the hospital to prevent continuous/unnecessary emergency department visits at Martin General. This community member would be a mediator and help to administer needed medication to patients visiting for mental health disorders/needs.

Washington County

August 17, 2022

Concerns from this session included underreported overdose data from Sheriff's office, as well as Naloxone accessibility.

A few pitched ideas from this session included:

- Expansion of mobile delivery services (provided by HOPE Exchange) into Washington and Tyrrell counties.
- Partnerships with schools, churches, PTA meetings to provide education on opioids/substance misuse.
- Supporting opioid crisis
 work/efforts by hiring
 community health workers
 with opioid settlement funds.

Tyrrell County August 29, 2022

A few ideas included:

- Developing a family support network
- Providing support to families that have a loved one/family member struggling with substance use.
- Have law enforcement and local pastors to be a part of the network.
- Creating accessible resources for individuals who struggle with substances such as a mobile shower unit.
- Considering if an individual is homeless.
- Access to emergency housing and/or homeless shelters.
- Advertising resources that are available for individuals who use substances.
- Funding a mental health counselor to be available in Tyrrell County.

The HOPE Exchange is a syringe service program provided by the MTW District Health Department that serves the residents of Martin, Tyrrell, and Washington counties.


Syringe Service Programs, also known as SSPs, are community-based prevention programs. At the HOPE Exchange, we provide a variety of services, including access to sterile syringes and syringe disposal, Naloxone access, HIV/Hepatitis C/Syphilis testing, and linkage to care and treatment.


