DIGITAL 101 CLASS: THE AGE OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

rtificial intelligence has become a $oldsymbol{\Lambda}$ significant part of our daily lives, from personalized recommendations on your favorite music platform to your email inbox automatically filtering out spam messages. Along with its many benefits come potential risks - including several scams that involve AI technology. To help residents navigate the new age of artificial intelligence, the Communications Division will be offering a free class to the residents of Maryland Heights.

During Digital 101, we'll explore how AI is used across various sectors to enhance efficiency. We will also discuss how to identify and avoid common AI scams, such as phishing attacks and deepfake videos. Our Communications Division is in the process of developing an AI policy to ensure responsible use. By participating, residents can contribute to shaping policies that prioritize transparency.

Additionally, residents will be able to chat with the communications team about popular social media platforms and staff will be available to answer questions about AI

and social media.

Whether you are new to technology or seeking to enhance your understanding, this class will aim to provide you with the tools needed when navigating through social media platforms and the internet.

Two classes will be offered with the same curriculum presented at both sessions. The first

will be Tuesday, August 6 at 6:30 p.m. in the Municipal Court Room at the Maryland Heights Government Center. The second class will be held on Tuesday, August 13 at 9:00 a.m. in the Infinity Room at the Maryland Heights Community Center. Refreshments will be served.

For those unable to join us in-person, a Zoom link will also be available. This presentation is free, but registration is required. Registration opens on June 10 and closes July 30. To register for a session

A re you curious about how our city runs? Do you want to know more about what goes on behind-the-scenes to keep our community thriving? If so, Maryland Heights University is the perfect program for you!

Maryland Heights University (MHU) began in 2009 with a simple goal: to help residents understand how their city government operates. The first class was well attended and participants of all backgrounds and ages joined to learn more about their city. This class became an annual tradition and is offered every year free of charge to our residents. Classes meet once a week for two hours. Students learn about their city through presentations from senior staff, tours, and hands-on activities.

Public Works Garage, the Maryland Heights Community Center, and the Maryland Heights Police Department. During the final session, students will be recognized at the City Council meeting.

"Some graduates return and take the class again," says Communication Manager Trisha Hall. "Participants tell us that every year is different and they learn something new every time!"

MHPD RECEIVES THIRD CALEA ACCREDITATION

The Maryland Heights Police Department has accomplished its third CALEA Law Enforcement Accreditation.

Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) is considered the "gold standard" for public safety accreditation. Only about 5% of the nearly 18,000 police agencies in the United States have committed to accreditation.

This achievement reflects the MHPD's commitment to excellence and dedication to upholding internationally accepted public safety standards. The accreditation process occurs every four years. It involves rigorous self-assessment, independent assessment

by experienced professionals, and valuable input from the community. The MHPD is committed to enacting, following, and maintaining the highest standards of the police profession.

This award affirms our pledge of accountability to our residents and visitors.



OUT OF TOWN? SIGN UP FOR VACATION WATCH!

Going out of town for summer vacation? The Maryland Heights Police Department offers a vacation watch program for residents who are concerned for the security of their home while they're away. During your registered dates of travel, patrol officers will periodically stop by your residence to check it over. This is a great way to have peace of mind while you are enjoying

time away from home.

The program is <u>free</u> to all Maryland Heights residents. FIREWORK LAWS KEEP RESIDENTS SAFE

Every year around the 4th of July, the MHPD receives many calls for service from residents wanting to report the illegal use of fireworks in their neighborhood. In July 2023, our officers responded to 44 calls regarding the use of fireworks.

Please remember that 911 is **NOT** for reporting fireworks! Our officers respond to all calls for service. You may think shooting off fireworks is an emergency, but it is NOT. We need to leave the 911 lines open for true emergencies, such as heart attacks or car accidents with injuries. If the 911 lines are tied up with reports of fireworks being shot off, those who need our help the most could be delayed and those few moments lost could cost them their lives.

If you want to report the use of fireworks in your neighborhood, please utilize the non-emergency police line at (314) 298-8700. Try to have an address or description of the person shooting off fireworks ready. Be patient if you are put on hold, as our Maryland Heights dispatchers prioritize calls and could be dealing with life-threatening situations. If there is a fire or injury caused by fireworks, 911 is the best number to call!

Louis County, which includes the City of Maryland Heights, per Section 9-2. Fireworks can be very dangerous and are illegal in St. Louis County due to the dense population. There is less space around residential areas and that means a bigger probability they could cause serious damage.

Per the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission, an average of 180 people go to the emergency room every day with fireworks-related injuries in July. Fireworks can cause serious burns, eye injuries, loss of body parts, and even death. Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries each year. Sparklers burn at about 2,000 degrees which is hot enough to melt some metals.

Did you know?

- Almost 10,000 people are treated in emergency rooms with fireworksrelated injuries yearly
- Most injuries occur to the face (12%), eyes (17%), and hands (34%)
- The majority of firework-related injuries happen to children under the age of 15.
- · Fires caused by fireworks injure 50 and kill 15 people yearly.

• Per the National Fire Protection Association, more than 18,000 fires are started by fireworks, costing an average of \$43 million in direct property damage yearly.

It's also worth noting that the 4th of July is NOT fun for many pets in the area. More pets are reported missing on the 4th of July than on any other day of the year. Fireworks can cause severe burns and trauma to the face and paws of pets. Unused fireworks are potentially toxic to them due to substances such as potassium nitrate, arsenic, and heavy metals.

If our officers respond and find that you or your family are shooting off fireworks, they can confiscate them and you could be subjected to an arrest and/or fined by the Municipal Judge.

We will be putting out signs around the community reminding everyone that fireworks are illegal in the weeks leading up to the 4th of July. The safest and most effective way to prevent injury or damage to property is to leave the fireworks displays to the professionals!

MHPD OPEN **HOUSE** RECAP


Tedi and young padawans from around the city set out on a journey to learn the ways of the police force at this year's MHPD Open House on Saturday, May 4.

Did you know that, in the United States, **July 26** is recognized annually as National Disability Independence Day. This day commemorates the signing of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) into law in 1990.

TURN AROUND, DON'T DROWN

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

When severe weather and heavy downpours strike, stay safe by remembering this simple phrase: Turn Around, Don't Drown[®]. More than 50% of flood-related deaths are due to someone driving or walking into floodwaters. Water can be an extremely powerful force. As little as six inches of fast-moving flood water can knock an adult off their feet and twelve inches of moving water can carry away a small car! Larger vehicles aren't immune to the danger either. It only takes 18-24 inches of water to sweep away larger trucks, vans, and SUVs.

It is often more difficult than you think to judge the depth of a flooded area, especially at night. If you come upon an area that is covered with water, play it safe and turn around. If you inadvertently drive into a flooded area, attempt to remain calm and take the following steps:

- Call 911 as soon as possible.
- Turn on your headlights and hazard

lights to make it easier for emergency personnel to see you.

- Unbuckle your seat belt.
- Unlock your doors.
- Take off your coat or jacket.
- Lower your window.
- If windows won't open, you will have to use a door to escape, but you won't be able to open it until the pressure is equalized. This means that you will have to wait for water to enter the car and fill up to about neck level, which is terrifying but necessary.
- Once free, climb onto the roof of your car and hang on to whatever you can. Pull a seatbelt strap from the car, if possible, or clutch the rails.
- If water rises over the top of the car, swim to safety.

There are over 4,000 acres of regulatory floodplain in our community. If you have any questions about floodplain requirements such as permitting, flood insurance,





Maryland Heights' own outdoor water park first opened in 1998. As one of the first municipalities in the area to include water slides at the city pool, many of the original features are still enjoyed by residents today. In 2021, major renovations were completed to the facility, including the addition of a new feature, a surfing simulator called The FlowRider. Other renovations included a new entrance where residents and Season Pass holders can bypass lines at the gate, a new concessions stand with a revamped menu, the addition of Cardinals themed sprayers in the Kids' area, and a new filtration system.

Aquaport's daily hours are 12:00 - 6:00 p.m. daily. Season Pass holders and residents are able to enter one hour early. Residents may bring in two guests per day, per card holder at the resident rate. Season Pass holders may bring in four guests per day per card holder at the resident rate. Maryland Heights' residents (ages 4 and older) can purchase a Privilege Card if they want to pay the resident rate. The Privilege Card includes discounts on admission, use of the FlowRider, and early entry. Residents will need to bring a photo ID, proof of residency (utility bill, bank statement, occupancy permit) and \$5 to the Community Center. A Privilege Card is included if a Season Pass is purchased.





PUBLIC WORKS RECEIVES RE-ACCREDITATION

The Maryland Heights Public Works Department has recently received full reaccreditation by the American Public Works Association (APWA) for the third time. This accreditation formally verifies and recognizes that the agency is in full compliance with the recommended management practices set forth in APWA's Public Works Management Practices Manual.

After completing its initial accreditation in 2016, the public works department continues to pursue re-accreditation though a process that builds on the original accreditation.

APWA's accreditation process includes five major steps:

- Self-Assessment
- Application
- Improvement
- Evaluation
- Accreditation

The purpose of accreditation is to promote excellence in the operation and management of a public works agency, its programs, and employees. Accreditation is designed to assist the agency in continuous improvement of operations and management, and in providing a valid and objective evaluation of agency programs as a service to the public and the profession.

"Our Public Works department has dedicated itself to continuous improvement and excellence. This accomplishment would



not be possible without the efforts of public works team whose mission it is to provide services and programs that contribute to making Maryland Heights a great place to live and work," said Director of Public Works Cliff Baber.



COMPOSTING GUIDE FOR HOME & APARTMENTS

Composting is a means of disposing of household organic waste (such as yard and food waste) that allows for organic material to naturally degrade over time. As the materials break down, the material is converted into compost, a vital nutrient for soil that helps to promote plant growth.

Composting reduces landfill waste and feeds biodegradable materials back into the circular economy. It is more environmentally-friendly and economically worthwhile than regular waste disposal. To begin composting, follow these steps:

- 1. Combine green and brown materials in a dedicated compost bin.
- 2. Sprinkle the materials with water
- 3. Stir the items together
- 4. Let nature allow the items to decompose into compost over time

Green materials include nitrogen-rich items, such as: grass and plant clippings, produce food waste, coffee grounds, tea bags, eggshells.



Brown Materials include carbon-rich materials, such as: dry leaves, plant stalks and twigs, sawdust and untreated wood chips, shredded newspaper or cardboard, and paper straws.

If you rent or live in a space without a backyard, composting is still possible!

One method for indoor composting is worm composting, or vermicomposting. This method takes up little space and the materials are simple and inexpensive. Learn more about indoor composting from our partners at Republic Services at <u>www.</u> <u>republicservices.com/Blog</u>.

A little time and patience can yield amazing results! Whether you're an avid gardener or if you're simply looking to more responsibly manage your waste output, everyone can benefit from composting!

DON'T MISS THESE AQUAPORT PROGRAMS

Aquaport season has officially begun! That means summer is here in Maryland Heights and we are ready to dive into fun at our favorite local waterpark.

"Our team is excited to welcome guests back for another season at Aquaport," said Aquatics Supervisor, Caitlin Morrison. "We are happy to keep providing some favorite traditions, as well as some new events for families this summer."

Aquaport first opened in 1998 and has since become a regional attraction and favorite local hotspot to stay cool during hot St. Louis summers. In 2021, major renovations were completed to the facility, which included the addition of The FlowRider, a surfing simulator. Most recently, a shade canopy was added to the concessions stand area for cooling and a more comfortable wait.

This summer, patrons can enjoy the return of several favorite programs. Little Splashers is a private morning swim time, where guests, ages 6 months to 5 years,





and their guardian can get exclusive use of the kid's area before it opens to the public. It's the perfect chance to give our littlest swimmers a calmer water park experience and to socialize with other children their age. This program only occurs on Fridays from 10:00 - 11:00 a.m. during the season and costs \$7 for non-resident kids. Parents, Season Pass holders and residents enter for free. All guests must leave the park at 11:00 a.m. and re-enter during their respective times, at their respective admission rates. Little Splashers will be available **June 7** through **August 16**.

Another program making its return in 2024 is **River Walking**. Those ages 14 and older are invited to drop-in for a relaxing stroll against the current of the Lazy River. This low intensity workout will burn calories and patrons go at their own pace. No instructor is provided. River Walking is available 6:15 - 7:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday from **June 3** to **August 15**. Dropins cost \$6 for residents and \$7 for nonresidents. Season Pass holders are free.

And if swimming under the stars sounds

like a fun outing for you and your family, we've got plenty of chances to do just that. Back again in 2024 is our **Luau Party**. This Hawaiian-themed after hours swim party is family-friendly and includes games, giveaways, and more. The concession stand will remain open for those who want to snack. There will be no preregistration for this event; day-of ticket sales only.

New in 2024, Aquaport has added two Family Swim Nights. On **Friday, June 14** and **Friday, July 12** from 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. families can enjoy an after-hours swim at Aquaport. General admission is \$7 and Season Pass holders are free.

Dogs will need to be 6 months or older, well-mannered, have current vaccination records for both rabies and distemper, and recently bathed. SPLASH PAD SAFETY

A re you headed to one of the splash pads operated by the Maryland Heights Parks Department? There are two locations: Eise Park (12103 Bourbon St.) and Vago Park (2700 Fee Fee Rd.). Both of these locations are favorite spots for kids to cool down during the summertime. The suggested age for the splash pads are kids ages 2-10 years old. If you plan to enjoy some water play time - keep these helpful tips in mind during your visit:

Supervise

Always keep an eye on children when visiting the splash pads. An adult should be present to supervise and to make sure everyone is playing safely. Older kids should be watching out for the younger children and refrain from running at full speed in or around the splash pad. There are no lifeguards or staff members on guard at these locations - play at your own risk!

Stay Hydrated

Playing in the water doesn't mean that you won't become dehydrated. Make sure you bring water bottles and take frequent water breaks.



Have your kids wear water shoes to prevent slips and to protect their tiny feet from hot surfaces.

Sunscreen is Your Friend

Apply waterproof sunscreen frequently to protect against sunburn.

Take Potty Breaks

Encourage your little ones to use the bathroom before playing and take multiple bathroom trips to keep the splash pad clean.

Report Broken Equipment.

If you find that something is not working, please report it to staff by calling the Parks and Recreation Department at (314) 738-2599. The sand from the volleyball court at Vago Park is often a culprit and should be kept far away from the splash pad equipment.

Take Your Trash With You.

Splash pads can be a lot of fun and kids will often bring some extra things to the location such as water balloons or water



guns. These outdoor toys are fine, but we ask that you clean up after your play and don't leave any trash behind. Trash, such as broken water balloons or food wrappers, will clog the filtration system and cause the splash pad to shut down.

Splash pads are a free and convenient way to keep your younger kids busy and cool throughout the summer. This free amenity relies on the assistance of our community members to keep a watchful eye and to alert us if there's something wrong. Respect your fellow splashers by keeping these tips in mind. You can help keep our splash pads clean, safe, and a continuous source of fun all summer long!

Thank you to the Applied Science class at PHS for joining us. We look forward to hosting another demonstration next year.














WORLDFEST BRINGS CROWDS TO MARYLAND HEIGHTS



Another year, another bigger and better WorldFest celebration! In its fourth year at Saint Louis Music Park, WorldFest garnered more than 1,000 visitors from across the St. Louis region to celebrate global traditions. This year, 31 countries were represented by food, art, crafts, dance, and musical talent.

Families and guests traveled around the world, from booth to booth, shopping craft and food vendors, while children filled up their passports and participated in fun activities like origami.

THE EVOLUTION OF CREVE COEUR LAKE

Creve Coeur Lake, one of Missouri's largest natural lakes, formed thousands of years ago when the Missouri River created a river bend, like a loop. The lake covers over 400 acres and has a very curious history.

Creve Coeur Lake's name, meaning "broken heart" in French, carries a sense of mystery and folklore. While romantic tales of Native American maidens are popular, the true origin of the name remains unknown.

In 1881, the Missouri Pacific Railroad opened up a line to the lake. Later, in 1903, a trolley line was constructed, leading to a population boom and turning the lake into a popular tourist destination. The area



was bustling with rowboats, motor crafts, and even a floating dance floor. Picnicgoers, fishermen, and tourists enjoyed the amenities that included a hotel, restaurant, and the amusement park known as Electric Park.

A number of events were hosted at Creve Coeur Lake, such as Olympic rowing competitions, county fairs, hot air balloon races, and boating regattas. In the wintertime, it remained a bustling location with activities like ice-cutting and winter sports. Despite its popularity, the lake saw dark times during Prohibition, becoming a hotspot for gambling and illegal activities.

Over the years, the lake has witnessed numerous transformations. By the mid-20th century, the smaller upper lake disappeared due to siltation. In 1945, 400 acres of land were donated to St. Louis County, establishing Creve Coeur Lake Memorial Park. During the 1950s, when part of the lake nearly dried up, local residents united to save the fish population by catching and relocating them. The spirit of conservation returned in the 1969 County Bond Issue, which led to the acquisition of surrounding lands, ensuring the lake's preservation for future generations. A significant dredging project from 1974 to 1981 expanded the



lake, making it more accessible for boating and fishing. Modern developments, such as the creation of Mallard Lake and the construction of bike paths, highlight the ongoing efforts to enhance recreational opportunities. It's evident the park has continually evolved to meet the community's needs, while preserving its historical charm.

The park has faced some challenges, such as the Great Flood of 1993, but has resiliently bounced back and become one of the most visited parks in St. Louis County's park system. Today, with over a million annual visitors, it remains a cherished landmark, offering scenic beauty and a rich history of community and recreation.

MARYLAND HEIGHTS NIGHT OUT

On **Saturday, September 28,** Maryland Heights residents will gather among neighbors for our annual block party program, Maryland Heights Night Out (MHNO)!

This tradition has been a strong annual tradition for many years. What originally started as members of Neighborhood Watch coming together to sit on their porches during National Night Out has evolved into block parties held all around the City in celebration of our community. Sharing food, music, games, and all-around good times guarantees neighborly fun each and every year!

MHNO Block parties are coordinated by designated neighborhood "party hosts" and held on the same date. The City then provides the party host a party planning guide, flyer invitations to pass out in their neighborhood, and giveaways to keep the kids occupied. The night also includes visits from local fire districts, the Maryland Heights Police, the City Public Works, and Parks and Recreation Departments. Don't be surprised if Mayor Moeller and Council members also drop in to say hello and visit.
