6.1 COUNTY BUILDING THREAT POLICY

One of these requirements is the completion of a Policy relating to the use of the Direct Victim Needs Funds. These funds are used for victim's of crime in Mecosta County. The funds have been used for gas cards, food cards, security systems and in extreme cases help with relocation or rent. These funds have also been used to keep things on hand in the victim room for victims in exigent and emergency situations relating to the incident they have been victimized in.

Attached please find the Crime Victim Services Direct Victim Needs Policy and Procedures. If it meets with your approval, please approve at the next available meeting. Once approved by the Board of Commissioners the policy will be forwarded to Lansing for approval.

Mecosta County Crime Victim Services

Direct Victim Needs Policy & Procedures

Business Requirements:

This procedure provides guidance and direction for the use of the Direct Victim Needs funds.

Stakeholders:

DHHS Department of Victim Services, Prosecutor, Victim Rights Program Coordinator and the Mecosta County Board of Commissioners.

Purpose:

In accordance with the Mecosta County Policies: Internal Controls for Federal Grants/Awards as well as the Mecosta County Purchasing Policy.

A specific allocation of monies for direct victim needs. These are costs often essential for crime victims to participate in the criminal justice system or obtain a modicum sense of safety after the criminal event. These costs may include:

- Home security assistance: locks, cameras, motion lights, alarms, etc. <u>This category excludes</u> the monthly costs associated with the installation of a home security system.
- Criminal justice proceedings: transportation, childcare, respite care for dependent adults, food, clothing, and/or lodging.
- Transportation: gas cards, bus vouchers, taxi fare, and Uber/Lyft pre-loaded fare.
- Utility costs: these funds may be used to help the victim restore power to their home.
- Temporary pet housing.
- Victim protection/relocation if the crime victim must move from the area for their immediate safety.
- Needs for victims within the Mecosta County Victim Unit space.

Process for requesting and purchasing ancillary funds:

- 1. Purchases made with the County PA Office credit card.
 - a. Requested expense is approved through the Coordinator/ Advocate and Prosecutor via email with "Direct Victim Needs Request" PRIOR to purchase or gift or gas card distribution.
 - b. Once approved by both persons, advocate may obtain the PA Office Credit Card.
 - c. Once purchase is made, the crime victim services coordinator/Advocate will complete a credit card purchase encumbrance form.
 - d. VA will go into that case and generate Direct Victim Needs Received form.
 - i. This makes sure that the victim signs for picking up the item AND we have second confirmation of award to be tracked during grant cycles.
 - ii. Originals will be kept within the DVN binder in the victim unit office/room.
 - e. The prosecutor will sign the Credit Card Expense Form

i. Copy scanned into Coordinator's Grant vouchers folder.

f. The Coordinator/Advocate will submit the form for approval to the County administration office.

Procedure for Maintaining and Distributing on site gift cards.

Gift/gas cards are the same as cash and must be handled; accordingly, ensuring adequate controls are in place to safeguard, store, and prevent loss. Authorized individuals and their designees are required to appropriately safeguard, account for, and document all gift cards. Until disbursed, cards should be maintained in a secure, locked device or some other location approved by the Prosecuting Attorney.

- 1. All gift/gas cards distributed must use the **Direct Victim Needs Log** to control and account for distribution to victims.
- 2. Direct Victim Needs Log must be completed with each transaction.
- 3. A Direct Victim Needs Log form must be completed and signed by the recipient and distributor.
- 3. A quarterly reconciliation of gift/gas cards must be conducted using the **Direct Victim Needs** Log and reported to DHHS Department of Victim Services via the EGrAMS quarterly reporting system.

2. Purchases must be recorded on the Direct Victim Needs Log.

Log to include date of purchase, item description, vendor, card number (if gift card), amount, recipient first name, case #, identified victim need (i.e., transportation, home security assistance, etc.) date issued, distributed by.

Planning Commission: The Master Plan designates this area to be set for agricultural and residential usage with no expansion of commercial use. This makes the request inconsistent with the Master Plan as the petitioner wishes to continue his contractor's business on the property. This request comes after the petitioner was found to be in violation of the current zoning for his property. There are many factors which must be taken into account.

Other Information: After further review, it is believed that there are significant traffic impacts to be considered along with the health, safety, and welfare of the surrounding area. This request could be considered spot zoning as it does not abut-to other AF properties. A map amendment is not meant to solve a noncompliance of non-permitted uses when tickets have been issued and petitioner refuses to come into compliance.

Others: Julie and Joe Strohkirch, Greg Buydaert, Louis Kusay, and several letters in opposition were received. The neighbors spoke on the usage of the property, the previous petitions received for zoning changes, safety and traffic impacts this request does and could impose on the area.

THIS PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is made as of _10/1/2023____ between the Area Agency on Aging of Western Michigan, Inc., a Michigan nonprofit corporation, whose address is 3215 Eaglecrest Dr. NE, Grand Rapids, Michigan 49525-7005 ("AAAWM"), and

Mecosta County Commission on Aging whose address is ___12954 80th Ave. Mecosta, MI 49332 ____("Partner").

- 1. <u>Acknowledged Facts</u>. AAAWM has entered into a contract with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, (MDHHS), the Bureau of Aging and Community Living Supports (ACLS Bureau) and the Veterans Health Administration to provide Care Management - MI Choice Medicaid Waiver Program services (CM/WA). The goal of CM/WA is to assist frail elderly persons and disabled adults in obtaining services that will allow them to remain at home. AAAWM has entered into an Agreement with the County of Kent to administer senior millage funds (KCSM). One of the techniques used by CM/WA and KCSM is Direct Purchase of Services, as required in the client's care plan. Partner is in the business of providing in home and/or supportive services. Accordingly, it has significant expertise and ability to provide services required by CM/WA clients. AAAWM desires to refer clients to Partner for their care needs. These services will assist AAAWM to accomplish a number of service activities set forth in the AAAWM Area Plan.
- 2. <u>Term of Agreement</u>. The term of this Agreement shall begin on _10/1/2023 ____ and shall continue indefinitely until amended or terminated in accordance with its terms.
- 3. <u>Scope of Services</u>. Upon request from AAAWM, Partner shall, in a manner consistent with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, provide clients with the home and/or supportive services set forth in the attached <u>Attachment I</u>, at the applicable price for each service specified in <u>Attachment I</u>.
- 4. AAAWM Responsibilities.
 - (a) AAAWM will assess the Partner's performance and provide written feedback, as deemed by AAAWM to be appropriate, during the term of this Agreement. The assessment may, as determined by AAAWM, include reviewing a random sample of client files for those clients referred by AAAWM to the Partner, personnel records, and other agency records.
 - (b) AAAWM will pay the Partner for services provided under this contract within 30 days after approval of Partner's bill by AAAWM.
 - (c) AAAWM will include Partner in its listing of approved service Partners.
 - (d) AAAWM will provide electronic and/or written verification for services requested. AAAWM shall determine the care plan to be followed by Partner and monitor care plan adherence on an individual client basis. Service verifications sent from AAAWM shall be the primary document for establishing specific service requirements. AAAWM retains the exclusive authority to determine, at its own discretion, the time, frequency and use of Partner's services, if any. Partner further understands and agrees that AAAWM is not required by the terms herein set forth to use the services of Partner.
 - (e) AAAWM shall obtain the consent of the client for services.

(f) AAAWM shall provide Care Management clients with the opportunity to contribute toward the cost of the service.

(g) AAAWM will reimburse mileage at the reimbursement rate set by the Internal Revenue Service as applicable.

5. <u>Partner Responsibilities</u>.

(a) Partner shall comply fully with all applicable state and local licensure requirements.

(b)As and when instructed by AAAWM, Partner agrees to provide the services listed in <u>Attachment I</u>, at the prices and in the geographical areas specified in <u>Attachment I</u>.

(c) Partner shall be responsible for meeting all AAAWM service standards and personnel qualifications, as provided in <u>Attachment II</u>, Conditions of Participation, and AAAWM Service Standards. Non-compliance with standards shall result in removal of Partner from approved service Partner list and may, at AAAWM's option, result in immediate termination of this Agreement.

(d) Partner shall be responsible for providing services as ordered in each electronic and/or written request for services. AAAWM shall not be liable for the cost of any goods or services not specifically requested in writing to the Partner.

(e) Partner shall notify AAAWM immediately in writing if, for any reason, it will be unable to continue to provide the quality or quantity of services that it is currently providing.

(f) Partner agrees to provide all services under this Agreement to all individuals referred by AAAWM, as staffing allows.

(g) The following individual shall be AAAWM's contact at Partner with regard to all matters relating to this Agreement: ______. In the event it shall become necessary to appoint a replacement contact person for any reason whatsoever, Partner shall promptly give AAAWM notice of such change and the contact information for the replacement contact person.

(h) Partner agrees to allow AAAWM access to reports and records noted in this Agreement for purpose of assessment. Assessments may be conducted by AAAWM at the Partner's agency to evaluate compliance with this Agreement, applicable standards and applicable laws and regulations.

(i) Provide a Community Health Automated Medicaid Processing System (CHAMPS) Provider ID to our agency at <u>COS@aaawm.org</u>

(j) Partner must agree to receive reimbursement for services rendered at the unit rate agreed upon with AAAWM as payment in full.

- 6. <u>Termination</u>
 - (a) This Agreement may be terminated upon thirty (30) days written notice by either party to the other.
 - (b) Partner's non-compliance with Operating Standards and Conditions of Participation,

Attachment II and Attachment III, or material breach of this agreement may result in immediate termination of this agreement.

- (c) Upon termination of this Agreement, AAAWM shall remove Partner's name from its list of approved service Partners.
- (d) Partner's obligations under this Agreement are separate from Partner's obligations to AAAWM clients. Termination of this Agreement shall not relieve Partner from its obligations to any AAAWM client receiving services at the time of termination.

7. <u>Hold Harmless</u>. Partner shall protect, defend, indemnify and hold AAAWM and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, and each of their respective officers, directors, agents and employees, harmless from and against all liabilities, damages, costs and expenses (including attorneys' fees) that either AAAWM or the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services may incur as a result of any of the activities of the Partner, its employees, contractors or agents, arising out of or relating to the Agreement.

8. <u>Insurance</u>. At all times during the term of this Agreement, Partner shall maintain such policies of insurance as will fully protect the Partner against any liability imposed upon Partner arising out of the performance of work of any nature carried out by Partner, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Partner, under this Agreement. Such coverage shall include, as appropriate to the operations of Partner, public liability and property damage insurance, worker's compensation insurance, facility insurance, unemployment insurance, personal liability insurance, professional liability insurance, bonding insurance, general liability insurance, property and theft coverage insurance, and no-fault vehicle insurance. Upon request, Partner shall promptly provide AAAWM with such evidence of such insurance coverage as AAAWM reasonable deems necessary to ensure Partner's compliance with this Paragraph 8.

- 9. Independent Contractor.
 - (a) It is understood and agreed that Partner holds itself out to the general public as a business providing the services described in this agreement. It is expressly understood and agreed that the legal and tax status of the Partner shall be that of independent contractor, and that under no circumstances shall the Partner or the employees of Partner be deemed to be the employees of AAAWM. Upon request, Partner shall fill out and submit to AAAWM an Independent Contractor Statement supplied by AAAWM.
 - (b) Partner shall retain its business organization status, i.e., private for profit corporation, private non-profit business corporation, governmental affiliation, partnership, sole proprietor, etc., throughout the term of this Agreement and shall immediately notify AAAWM of any change in its business status, or business office address during the term of this Agreement.
 - (c) Partner assumes full responsibility for payment of all withholding tax, social security tax, unemployment tax or any payroll deductions required by law for individuals who perform services for, or on behalf of, the Partner pursuant to this Agreement.

10. <u>Subcontracts</u>. Partner shall not assign this Agreement or enter into subcontracts with additional parties without obtaining prior written approval of AAAWM. Assignees or subcontractors shall be subject to all conditions and provisions of this Agreement; no subcontract may terminate the legal responsibility of AAAWM or the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services to assure that all activities under this Agreement are performed. Partner shall be responsible for the performance of all assignees or subcontractors approved by AAAWM. AAAWM shall have the authority to monitor and assess said subcontractors.

- 11. <u>Audit Compliance</u>.
 - (a) Partner shall permit AAAWM, Federal, or State auditors to inspect books and records related to this Agreement and Partner shall retain said records for at least ten (10) years after the termination of this Agreement.
 - (b) If, prior to the expiration of the ten (10) year retention period, any litigation or audit is begun, or a claim is instituted involving this Agreement covered by the record, the Partner shall retain the records beyond the six (6) year period until the litigation, audit finding, or claim has been finally resolved.
 - (c) At the request of AAAWM, Partner shall promptly supply all information necessary for the reimbursement of any outstanding Medicaid claims.
 - (d) AAAWM retains the right to review, approve, and monitor Partner's compliance with all rules, regulations, and requirements applicable to the waiver program. AAAWM, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services reserve the right, as a condition of funding, to require the development and implementation of corrective action plans if the Partner demonstrates inadequate performance.

12. <u>Amendments</u>. Any changes, amendments or modifications to this Agreement will be effective only if set forth in a writing signed by all parties to this Agreement.

13. <u>Federal Regulations</u>. Partner will comply with federal regulation 45 CFR Part 76 and certifies to the best of its knowledge and belief that its employees:

- (a) Are not presently debarred, excluded suspended, proposed for debarment or exclusion, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any federal department or agency;
- (b) Have not within a 3-year period preceding this Agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state, or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of federal or state antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statement, or receiving stolen property;
- (c) Are not presently indicted or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a government entity (federal, state or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in Paragraph 13(b); and
- (d) Have not within a 3-year period preceding this agreement had one or more public transaction (federal, state or local) terminated for cause or default.
- 14. <u>MI Choice Medicaid Waiver Compliance</u>.
 - (a) Partner shall comply with all MI Choice Medicaid Waiver service standards (see <u>Attachment</u> <u>II</u>), including without limitation:

- (i) General operating standards for waiver agents and their contracted service Partners;
- (ii) General operating standards for MI Choice waiver service Partners; and

(iii) Specific operating standards for MI Choice Waiver service Partners, including service category definitions for the services specified in <u>Attachment II</u>.

- (b) Partner must maintain a current copy of the following forms with AAAWM:
 - (i) Purchase of Service Agreement;
 - (ii) Medicaid Assistance Partner Enrollment Agreement DCH-1625;
 - (iii) Assurance of Compliance with Applicable Laws;
 - (iv) Request for Taxpayer Identification Number and Certification form W-9;
 - (v) Business Associate Agreement;
 - (vi) Certificate of Liability Insurance;
 - (vii) Applicable license or certification as required by service standards;
 - (viii) Personnel records;
 - (ix) Staff Development records;
 - (x) Independent financial audit (if required); and
 - (xi) Annual internal evaluation (if required).
- <u>14.</u> Billing.
 - (a) Partner agrees to bill AAAWM monthly within 15 days following the last date of service/delivery in a month.
 - (b) AAAWM shall not be charged for services not authorized on service verification.
 - (c) Partner shall not charge for services not delivered or provided.
 - (d) If payment is made to Partner by AAAWM for services not performed or for overcharges for services, AAAWM reserves the right to require reimbursement of those funds from Partner.
 - (e) AAAWM shall not accept bills that are more than 60 days old.
- 15. <u>Governing Law</u> This Contract shall be governed by Michigan law without regard to principles of conflict of law. Any litigation between the parties relating to the Contract shall be brought in the federal or state courts in or covering Kent County, Michigan.

This Business Associate Agreement ("Agreement") is being entered into between the Area Agency on Aging of Western Michigan, Inc. (AAAWM) ("Covered Entity") located at 3215 Eaglecrest Dr NE, Grand Rapids, MI 49525, and _____Mecosta County Commission on Aging _____("Business Associate") located at ____12954 80th Ave., Mecosta, MI 49332 ______to facilitate compliance with the Privacy and Security Rules. It is also being entered into between the parties to facilitate compliance with the HITECH Amendment to HIPAA. In consideration for the compensation paid to Business Associate to provide services relating to and on behalf of Covered Entity, the parties agree to the terms set forth in this Agreement.

Article 1

Definitions

The following terms have the meanings described in this Article for purposes of the Agreement unless the context clearly indicates another meaning. Terms used, but not otherwise defined, in this Agreement have the same meaning as those terms in the Privacy Rule.

1.1 **Business Associate**

"Business Associate" means the person or entity described in the first paragraph of this Agreement.

1.2 <u>CFR</u>

"CFR" means the Code of Federal Regulations.

1.3 <u>Covered Entity</u>

"Covered Entity" means the Area Agency on Aging of Western Michigan, Inc. (AAAWM), a Michigan nonprofit corporation.

1.4 Designated Record Set

"Designated Record Set" has the same meaning as the term "Designated Record Set" in 45 CFR 164.501.

1.5 Electronic Health Record

"Electronic Health Record" (EHR) means an electronic record of health-related information on an individual that is created, gathered, managed, and consulted by authorized health care clinicians and staff.

1.6 <u>HIPAA</u>

"HIPAA" means the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996.

1.7 HITECH Amendment

"HITECH Amendment" means the changes to HIPAA made by the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act.

1.7.1 OMNIBUS Final Rule

"Omnibus Final Rule" means the changes to HIPAA made by the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) 45 CFR parts 160 and 164.

1.8 <u>Individual</u>

"Individual" has the same meaning as the term "individual" in 45 CFR 160.103 and includes a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance with 45 CFR 164.502(g).

1.9 Privacy Rule

"Privacy Rule" means the privacy rule of HIPAA as set forth in the Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information at 45 CFR part 160 and part 164, subparts A and E.

1.10 Protected Health Information

"Protected Health Information" or "PHI" has the same meaning as the term "protected health information" in 45 CFR 160.103, limited to the information created, received, maintained or transmitted by Business Associate from or on behalf of Covered Entity.

1.11 <u>Required By Law</u>

"Required By Law" has the same meaning as the term "required by law" in 45 CFR 164.103.

1.12 <u>Secretary</u>

"Secretary" means the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services or his/her designee.

1.13 Security Incident

"Security Incident" has the same meaning as the term "Security Incident" in 45 CFR 164.304.

1.14 Security Rule

"Security Rule" shall mean the security standards and implementation specifications at 45 CFR Part 160 and Part 164, subpart C.

Article 2

Obligations and Activities of Business Associate

Business Associate agrees to perform the obligations and activities described in this Article.

2.1 Business Associate understands that pursuant to the HITECH Amendment *and Omnibus Final Rule*, it is subject to the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules in a similar manner as the rules apply to Covered Entity. As a result, Business Associate agrees to take all actions necessary to comply with the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules for business associates as revised by the HITECH Amendment *and Omnibus Final Rule*, including, but not limited to, the following: Business Associate shall appoint a HIPAA privacy officer and a HIPAA security officer, Business Associate shall establish policies and procedures to ensure compliance with the Privacy and Security Rules, Business Associate shall enter into a privacy/security agreement with Covered Entity, Business Associate shall enter into privacy/security agreements with its subcontractors that perform functions relating to Covered Entity involving PHI, and Business Associate shall conduct a security risk analysis.

2.2 Business Associate agrees to not use or disclose Protected Health Information other than as permitted or required by the Agreement or as Required By Law.

2.3 Business Associate agrees to use appropriate safeguards, and comply with Subpart C of 45 CFR Part 164 with respect to electronic PHI, to prevent use or disclosure of the Protected Health Information other than as provided for by this Agreement. Business Associate shall implement administrative, physical and technical safeguards (including written policies and procedures) that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality, integrity and availability of electronic PHI that it creates, receives, maintains or transmits on behalf of Covered Entity as required by the Security Rule.

2.4 Business Associate agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to Business Associate of a use or disclosure of Protected Health Information by Business Associate in violation of the requirements of this Agreement.

2.5 Business Associate agrees to report to Covered Entity any use or disclosure of the Protected Health Information not provided for by this Agreement of which it becomes aware and/or any Security Incident of which it becomes aware.

In addition, Business Associate agrees to the following in connection with the breach notification requirements of the HITECH Amendment *and Omnibus Final Rule*:

- (a) If Business Associate discovers a breach of unsecured PHI, as those terms are defined by 45 CFR 164.402, Business Associate shall notify Covered Entity without unreasonable delay and within 10 calendar days after discovery. For this purpose, discovery means the first day on which the breach is known to Business Associate or by exercising reasonable diligence would have been known to Business Associate. Business Associate shall be deemed to have knowledge of a breach if the breach is known or by exercising reasonable diligence would have been known to any person, other than the person committing the breach, who is an employee, officer, subcontractor or other agent of Business Associate. The notification must include identification of each individual whose unsecured PHI has been or it has reasonably believed to have been breached and any other available information in Business Associate's possession which the Plan is required to include in the individual notice contemplated by 45 CFR 164.404.
- (b) Notwithstanding the immediately preceding paragraph, Business Associate shall assume the individual notice obligation specified in 45 CFR 164.404 on behalf of Covered Entity where a breach of unsecured PHI was committed by Business Associate or its employee, officer, subcontractor or other agent of Business Associate or is within the unique knowledge of Business Associate as opposed to Covered Entity. In such case, Business Associate will prepare the notice and shall provide it to Covered Entity for review and approval at least five calendar days before it is required to be sent to the affected individual(s). Covered Entity shall promptly review the notice and shall not unreasonably withhold its approval.
- (c) Further, where a breach involves more than 500 individuals and was committed by the Business Associate or its employee, officer, subcontractor or other agent or is within the unique knowledge of Business Associate as opposed to Covered Entity. Business Associate shall provide notice to the media pursuant to 45 CFR 164.406. Again, Business Associate will prepare the notice and shall provide it to Covered Entity for review and approval at least five calendar days before it is required to be sent to the media. Covered Entity shall promptly review the notice and shall not unreasonably withhold its approval.
- (d) Business Associate shall maintain a log of breaches of unsecured PHI with respect to Covered Entity and shall submit the log to Covered Entity within 30 calendar days following the end of each calendar year so that the Plan may report breaches to the Secretary in accordance with 45 CFR 164.408.

2.6 Business Associate agrees to ensure that any agent, including a subcontractor, to whom it provides Protected Health Information received from, created, maintained, transmitted or received by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity, agrees in writing to the same restrictions and conditions that apply through this Agreement to Business Associate with respect to such information. Moreover, Business Associate shall ensure that any such agent or subcontractor agrees to implement reasonable and appropriate safeguards to protect Covered Entity's electronic PHI.

2.7 Business Associate agrees to provide reasonable access, at the written request of Covered Entity, to Protected Health Information in a Designated Record Set, to Covered Entity or, as directed in writing by Covered Entity, to an Individual in order to meet the requirements under 45 CFR 164.524. If Business Associate receives a request directly from an Individual or the Individual's designee, Business Associate shall notify Covered Entity as soon as administratively feasible in order for the parties to coordinate a response.

2.8 Business Associate agrees to make any amendment(s) to Protected Health information in a Designated Record Set that the Covered Entity directs in writing or agrees to pursuant to 45 CFR 164.526 at the written request of Covered Entity or an Individual. If Business Associate receives a request directly from an Individual or the Individual's designee, Business Associate shall notify Covered Entity as soon as administratively feasible in order for the parties to coordinate a response.

2.9 Following receipt of a written request by Covered Entity, Business Associate agrees to make internal practices, books, and records including policies and procedures and Protected Health Information relating to the use and disclosure of Protected Health Information received from, created, maintained or received by Business Associate on behalf of, Covered Entity reasonably available to the Secretary for purposes of the Secretary determining Covered Entity's compliance with the Privacy Rule.

2.10 Business Associate agrees to document such disclosures of Protected Health Information and information related to such disclosures as would be required for Covered Entity to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of disclosures of Protected Health Information in accordance with 45 CFR 164.528, or effective as of such later effective date prescribed by regulations issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, an accounting of disclosures of Protected Health Information from an Electronic Health Record in accordance with the HITECH Amendment.

2.11 Following receipt of a written request by Covered Entity, Business Associate agrees to provide to Covered Entity or an Individual, information collected in accordance with Section 2.10 of this Agreement, to permit Covered Entity to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of disclosures of Protected Health Information in accordance with 45 CFR 164.528, or effective as of such later effective date prescribed by regulations issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, an accounting of disclosures of Protected Health Information from an Electronic Health Record in accordance with the HITECH Amendment. If Business Associate receives a request directly from an Individual or the Individual's designee, Business Associate shall notify Covered Entity as soon as administratively feasible in order for the parties to coordinate a response.

Article 3

Permitted Uses and Disclosures by Business Associate

3.1 Except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, Business Associate may use or disclose Protected Health Information to perform functions, activities or services for, or on behalf of, Covered Entity as specified in the underlying service agreement between Covered Entity and Business Associate, provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the Privacy Rule if

done by Covered Entity or the minimum necessary policies and procedures of the Covered Entity. If there is no underlying service agreement between Covered Entity and Business Associate, Business Associate may use or disclose Protected Health Information to perform functions, activities or services for, or on behalf of, Covered Entity for the purposes of payment, treatment or health care operations as those terms are defined in the Privacy Rule, provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the Privacy Rule if done by Covered Entity or the minimum necessary policies and procedures of the Covered Entity.

3.2 Except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, Business Associate may use Protected Health Information for the proper management and administration of the Business Associate or to carry out the legal responsibilities of the Business Associate.

3.3 Except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, Business Associate may disclose Protected Health Information for the proper management and administration of the Business Associate or to carry out the legal responsibilities of the Business Associate, provided that disclosures are Required by Law, or Business Associate obtains reasonable assurances in writing from the person to whom the information is disclosed that it will remain confidential and used or further disclosed only as Required by Law or for the purpose for which it was disclosed to the person, and the person notifies the Business Associate of any instances of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached.

3.4 Except as otherwise limited in this Agreement, Business Associate may use Protected Health Information to provide Data Aggregation services to Covered Entity as permitted by 45 CFR 164.504(e)(2)(i)(B).

3.5 Business Associate may use Protected Health Information to report violations of law to appropriate Federal and State Authorities, consistent with 45 CFR 164.502(j)(1).

Article 4

Obligations of Covered Entity

4.1 Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any limitation(s) in its notice of privacy practices of Covered Entity in accordance with 45 CFR 164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect Business Associate's use or disclosure of Protected Health Information.

4.2 Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any changes in, or revocation of, permission by an Individual to use or disclose Protected Health Information, to the extent that such changes may affect Business Associate's use or disclosure of Protected Health Information.

4.3 Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any restriction to the use or disclosure of Protected Health Information that Covered Entity has agreed to in accordance with 45 CFR 164.522, to the extent that such restriction may affect Business Associate's use or disclosure of Protected Health Information.

Article 5

Term and Termination

5.1 <u>Term</u>

This Agreement shall terminate on the date the Agreement is terminated for cause pursuant to Section 5.2, when the underlying service agreement between the parties terminates, or as of such other date as agreed to by the parties in writing. However, the protections in Section 5.3 shall survive termination of the Agreement and continue as specified in Section 5.3.

5.2 <u>Termination for Cause</u>

Upon either party's knowledge of a material breach of this Agreement by the other party (the "breaching party"), the first party shall either:

Provide an opportunity for the breaching party to cure the breach or end the violation and terminate this Agreement if the breaching party does not cure the breach or end the violation within a reasonable time, as specified by the first party;

Immediately terminate this Agreement if the breaching party has breached a material term of this Agreement and cure is not possible; or

If neither termination nor cure are feasible, the first party shall report the violation to the Secretary.

5.3 Effect of Termination

Upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, Business Associate shall return or destroy all Protected Health Information received from Covered Entity, or created or received by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity. This provision shall apply to Protected Health Information that is in the possession of subcontractors or agents of Business Associate. Business Associate shall retain no copies of the Protected Health Information.

In the event that Business Associate determines that returning or destroying the Protected Health Information is infeasible, Business Associate shall provide to Covered Entity written notification of the conditions that make return or destruction infeasible. Upon receipt of written notification that return or destruction of Protected Health Information is infeasible, Business Associate shall extend the protections of this Agreement to such Protected Health Information and limit further uses and disclosures of such Protected Health Information to those purposes that make the return or destruction infeasible, for so long as Business Associate maintains such Protected Health Information, which shall be for a period of at least six years.

Article 6

Miscellaneous

6.1 <u>Notice</u>

Any notice or other written communication required or permitted to be given to the other party under this Agreement must be addressed to the attention of the other party in care of the contact person identified below. Written notice may be delivered by certified mail or overnight mail.

If the Business Associate refuses to sign such an amendment, this Agreement shall automatically terminate.

6.4 <u>Survival</u>

The respective rights and obligations of Business Associate under Section 5.3 of this Agreement shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

6.5 Interpretation

Any ambiguity in this Agreement shall be resolved to permit Covered Entity to comply with the Privacy Rule and the Security Rule.

6.6 <u>Successors</u>

This Agreement is binding on each party's legal successors.

6.7 <u>Indemnification</u>

Business Associate agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Covered Entity and its directors, officers and employees against any and all claims, lawsuits, settlements, judgments, costs, penalties and expenses including attorney's fees resulting from or arising out of or in connection with a use or disclosure of Protected Health Information by Business Associate or its subcontractors or agents in violation of this Agreement.

Covered Entity agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Business Associate and its directors, officers and employees against any and all claims, lawsuits, settlements, judgments, costs, penalties and expenses including attorney's fees resulting from or arising out of or in connection with a use or disclosure of Protected Health Information by Covered Entity, or agents of Covered Entity, in violation of this Agreement.

6.8 No Beneficiaries

Nothing expressed or implied in this Agreement is intended to confer, nor shall anything confer, upon any person other than the Covered Entity and Business Associate, and their respective successors or assigns, any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities.

(hereinafter called the Subrecipient)

I. Purpose

The purpose of this grant agreement is to provide federal pass-through funds to the Subrecipient for the development and maintenance of an emergency management program capable of protecting life, property, and vital infrastructure in times of disaster or emergency.

The FY 2023 EMPG program plays an important role in the implementation of the National Preparedness System (NPS) by supporting the building, sustainment, and delivery of core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal of a secure and resilient Nation. The objective of the NPS is to facilitate an integrated, all-of-nation/whole community, risk driven, capabilities-based approach to preparedness.

In support of the National Preparedness Goal, the FY 2023 EMPG supports a comprehensive, all-hazard emergency preparedness system to build and sustain core capabilities across the Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery mission areas.

For more information on the NPS, federally designated priorities, and the FY 2023 EMPG objectives, as well as guidance on allowable costs and program activities, please refer to the FY 2023 EMPG Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Preparedness Grants Manual located at <u>https://www.fema.gov/grants</u>.

II. Statutory Authority

Funding for the FY 2023 EMPG is authorized by Section 662 of the *Post-Katrina Emergency Management Reform Act of 2006* (PKEMRA), as amended, (Pub. L. No. 109-295) (6 U.S.C. § 762); the *Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act*, as amended (Pub. L. No. 93-288) (42 U.S.C. §§ 5121 et seq.); the *Earthquake Hazards Reduction Act of 1977, as amended* (Pub. L. No. 95-124) (42 U.S.C. §§ 7701 et seq.); and the *National Flood Insurance Act of 1968*, as amended (Pub. L. No. 90448) (42 U.S.C. §§ 4001 et seq.).

Appropriation authority is provided by the *Consolidated Appropriates Act, 2023* (Pub. L. No. 117-328; *Compact of Free Association Amendments Act of 2003* (Pub. L. No. 108-188 (2003)).

The Subrecipient agrees to comply with all FY 2023 EMPG program requirements in accordance with the FY 2023 EMPG NOFO, and the FY 2023 FEMA Preparedness Grants Manual; both are located at https://www.fema.gov/grants/preparedness/emergency-management-performance; the *Michigan*

III. Award Amount and Restrictions

- A. The County of Mecosta is awarded \$17,897 or 21.23% of the Subrecipients local emergency manager's salary and fringe benefits under the FY 2023 EMPG. The Subrecipient may receive less than the allocated amount if the Subrecipient's cost share (match) of wages and fringe benefits paid to the local emergency manager are less than the total allocation. The Subrecipient's EMPG program budget must be documented on the Local Budget for Emergency Management Performance Grant form (EMHSD-17).
- B. The FY 2023 EMPG covers eligible costs from October 1, 2022, to September 30, 2023. The funds awarded in the grant agreement shall only be used to cover allowable costs that are incurred during the agreement period. Grant funds shall not be used for other purposes. For guidance on allowable costs, please refer to the EMPG Appendix in the FEMA Preparedness Grants Manual.
- C. This grant agreement designates EMPG funds for the administration and oversight of an approved emergency management program. The Subrecipient may utilize grant funds for the reimbursement of salary, overtime, compensatory time off, and associated fringe benefits for the local emergency manager. Up to 5% of the total allocation may be utilized for other allowable organization costs after all payroll costs for the grant award year have been reimbursed. No other expenditures are allowed. If other organization costs are requested, a narrative must be submitted detailing the expenses that are included in these costs.
- D. The FY 2023 EMPG program has a 50% cost share (cash or in-kind) requirement, as authorized by the *Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act*, as amended, (Pub. L. No. 93-288) (42 U.S.C. §§ 5121 et seq.), specifically, Title VI, sections 611(j) and 613. Federal funds cannot exceed 50% of eligible costs. Unless otherwise authorized by law, federal funds cannot be matched with other federal funds.

The FEMA administers cost sharing requirements in accordance with 2 CFR § 200.306. To meet matching requirements, the Subrecipient contributions must be reasonable, allowable, allocable, and necessary under the grant program and must comply with all federal requirements and regulations.

See the FY 2023 EMPG NOFO and FEMA Preparedness Grants Manual for additional cost share guidance, definitions, basic guidelines, and governing provisions.

E. All EMPG funded personnel must complete either the Independent Study courses identified in the Professional Development Series, or the National Emergency Management Basic Academy delivered either by the Emergency Management Institute or a sponsored state, local, tribal, territorial, regional, or other designated location and record proof of completion. All EMPG funded personnel must also participate in exercises consistent with the requirements outlined in the EMPG Guidebook and work agreement.

The EMPG funded programs are required to complete a quarterly training and exercise report identifying training and exercises completed during the quarter. Guidance for accomplishing these requirements is provided by the Recipient.

- F. Upon request, the Subrecipient must provide to the Recipient information necessary to meet any state or federal subaward reporting requirements.
- G. In the event that the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) determines that changes are necessary to the award document after an award has been made, including but not limited to, changes to period of performance or terms and conditions, Subrecipients will be notified of the changes in writing. Once notification has been made, any subsequent request for funds will indicate Subrecipient acceptance of the changes to the award.

IV. Responsibilities of the Subrecipient

- A. Grant funds must supplement, not supplant, state or local funds. Federal funds must be used to supplement existing funds, not replace (supplant) funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose. Potential supplanting will be carefully reviewed in subsequent monitoring reviews and audits. Subrecipients may be required to supply documentation certifying that a reduction in non-federal resources occurred for reasons other than the receipt or expected receipt of federal funds.
- B. The Subrecipient agrees to comply with all applicable federal and state regulations; the FY 2023 EMPG NOFO; the FEMA FY 2023 Preparedness Grants Manual; the FY 2023 EMPG Agreement Articles Applicable to Subrecipients, included with the grant agreement package for reference; and the EMPG Guidebook (EMD-PUB 208).
- C. The subrecipient shall not use FY 2023 EMPG funds to generate program income.

- E. Complete and submit quarterly work reports, the Quarterly Training and Exercise Worksheet, and the Annual Training and Exercise Plan Worksheet in accordance with the schedule outlined in the FY 2023 EMPG Work Agreement/Quarterly Report (EMHSD-31).
- F. Enact enabling legislation establishing the local emergency management program and ensure a copy of the local resolution or ordinance is on file with the Recipient.

- G. Appoint an emergency management program manager who can assume responsibility for the functions outlined in section 4 of the EMPG Guidebook.
- H. Provide the Recipient with a complete job description for the federally funded EMPG local emergency manager, including non-EMPG duties if applicable.
- I. Notify the Recipient immediately of any changes in the EMPG funded local emergency manager's position.
- J. The Subrecipient will contribute to the development and maintenance of the state's multi-year Training and Exercise Plan. This will include conducting exercises that comply with local, state, and federal requirements, including the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program and the EMPG Guidebook, to accomplish this goal.
- K. Ensure the EMPG funded local emergency manager completes training as required by the annual EMPG Work Agreement.
- L. Have an approved and current emergency operations plan on file with the Michigan State Police, Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (MSP/EMHSD) District Coordinator.
- M. The Subrecipient agrees to prepare the form EMHSD-007 EMPG Quarterly Billing Cover Sheet. The Subrecipient agrees to submit this form with supporting documentation, including all required authorized signatures and required reimbursement documentation to the appropriate MSP/EMHSD District Coordinator by the due date following the end of each quarter, as identified in FY 2023 Emergency Management Report Schedule. <u>The most current EMHSD-007 form must be used</u> and can be obtained from the MSP/EMHSD District Coordinator, or by visiting <u>https://www.michigan.gov/msp/0,4643,7-123-72297_60152_95164_95317---,00.html</u> under Finance Forms.
- N. Comply with applicable financial and administrative requirements set forth in the current edition of 2 CFR, Part 200, including, but not limited to, the following provisions:
 - 1. Account for receipts and expenditures, maintain adequate financial records, and refund expenditures disallowed by federal or state audit.
 - Retain all financial records, statistical records, supporting documents, and other pertinent

If any provision of this grant agreement shall be deemed void or unenforceable, the remainder of the grant agreement shall remain valid.

The Recipient may suspend or terminate grant funding to the Subrecipient, in whole or in part, or other measures may be imposed for any of the following reasons:

- A. Failure to expend funds in a timely manner consistent with the grant milestones, guidance, and assurances.
- B. Failure to comply with the requirements or statutory objectives of federal or state law.

General Instructions

Section references are to the Internal Revenue Code unless otherwise noted.

Future developments. For the latest information about developments related to Form W-9 and its instructions, such as legislation enacted after they were published, go to *www.irs.gov/FormW9*.

Purpose of Form

An individual or entity (Form W-9 requester) who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) which may be your social security number (SSN), individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN), adoption taxpayer identification number (ATIN), or employer identification number (EIN), to report on an information return the amount paid to you, or other amount reportable on an information return. Examples of information returns include, but are not limited to, the following.

• Form 1099-INT (interest earned or paid)

Form 1099-DIV (dividends, including those from stocks or mutual funds)

 Form 1099-MISC (various types of income, prizes, awards, or gross proceeds)

Form 1099-B (stock or mutual fund sales and certain other transactions by brokers)

- · Form 1099-S (proceeds from real estate transactions)
- Form 1099-K (merchant card and third party network transactions)
- Form 1098 (home mortgage interest), 1098-E (student loan interest), 1098-T (tuition)
- Form 1099-C (canceled debt)
- Form 1099-A (acquisition or abandonment of secured property)
 Use Form W-9 only if you are a U.S. person (including a resident)

alien), to provide your correct TIN.

If you do not return Form W-9 to the requester with a TIN, you might be subject to backup withholding. See What is backup withholding, later.

By signing the filled-out form, you:

1. Certify that the TIN you are giving is correct (or you are waiting for a number to be issued),

2. Certify that you are not subject to backup withholding, or

3. Claim exemption from backup withholding if you are a U.S. exempt payee. If applicable, you are also certifying that as a U.S. person, your allocable share of any partnership income from a U.S. trade or business is not subject to the withholding tax on foreign partners' share of effectively connected income, and

4. Certify that FATCA code(s) entered on this form (if any) indicating that you are exempt from the FATCA reporting, is correct. See *What is FATCA reporting*, later, for further information.

Note: If you are a U.S. person and a requester gives you a form other than Form W-9 to request your TIN, you must use the requester's form if it is substantially similar to this Form W-9.

Definition of a U.S. person. For federal tax purposes, you are considered a U.S. person if you are:

An individual who is a U.S. citizen or U.S. resident alien;

 A partnership, corporation, company, or association created or organized in the United States or under the laws of the United States;

· An estate (other than a foreign estate); or

• A domestic trust (as defined in Regulations section 301.7701-7).

Special rules for partnerships. Partnerships that conduct a trade or business in the United States are generally required to pay a withholding tax under section 1446 on any foreign partners' share of effectively connected taxable income from such business. Further, in certain cases where a Form W-9 has not been received, the rules under section 1446 require a partnership to presume that a partner is a foreign person, and pay the section 1446 withholding tax. Therefore, if you are a U.S. person that is a partner in a partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States, provide Form W-9 to the partnership to establish your U.S. status and avoid section 1446 withholding on your share of partnership income.

In the cases below, the following person must give Form W-9 to the partnership for purposes of establishing its U.S. status and avoiding withholding on its allocable share of net income from the partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States.

 In the case of a disregarded entity with a U.S. owner, the U.S. owner of the disregarded entity and not the entity;

 In the case of a grantor trust with a U.S. grantor or other U.S. owner, generally, the U.S. grantor or other U.S. owner of the grantor trust and not the trust; and

• In the case of a U.S. trust (other than a grantor trust), the U.S. trust (other than a grantor trust) and not the beneficiaries of the trust.

Foreign person. If you are a foreign person or the U.S. branch of a foreign bank that has elected to be treated as a U.S. person, do not use Form W-9. Instead, use the appropriate Form W-8 or Form 8233 (see Pub. 515, Withholding of Tax on Nonresident Aliens and Foreign Entities).

Nonresident alien who becomes a resident alien. Generally, only a nonresident alien individual may use the terms of a tax treaty to reduce or eliminate U.S. tax on certain types of income. However, most tax treaties contain a provision known as a "saving clause." Exceptions specified in the saving clause may permit an exemption from tax to continue for certain types of income even after the payee has otherwise become a U.S. resident alien for tax purposes.

If you are a U.S. resident alien who is relying on an exception contained in the saving clause of a tax treaty to claim an exemption from U.S. tax on certain types of income, you must attach a statement to Form W-9 that specifies the following five items.

1. The treaty country. Generally, this must be the same treaty under which you claimed exemption from tax as a nonresident alien.

2. The treaty article addressing the income.

3. The article number (or location) in the tax treaty that contains the saving clause and its exceptions.

4. The type and amount of income that qualifies for the exemption from tax.

5. Sufficient facts to justify the exemption from tax under the terms of the treaty article.

Example. Article 20 of the U.S.-China income tax treaty allows an exemption from tax for scholarship income received by a Chinese student temporarily present in the United States. Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident alien for tax purposes if his or her stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on his or her scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

If you are a nonresident alien or a foreign entity, give the requester the appropriate completed Form W-8 or Form 8233.

Backup Withholding

What is backup withholding? Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 24% of such payments. This is called "backup withholding." Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include interest, tax-exempt interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royalties, nonemployee pay, payments made in settlement of payment card and third party network transactions, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

You will not be subject to backup withholding on payments you receive if you give the requester your correct TIN, make the proper certifications, and report all your taxable interest and dividends on your tax return.

Payments you receive will be subject to backup withholding if:

1. You do not furnish your TIN to the requester,

2. You do not certify your TIN when required (see the instructions for Part II for details),

3. The IRS tells the requester that you furnished an incorrect TIN,

4. The IRS tells you that you are subject to backup withholding because you did not report all your interest and dividends on your tax return (for reportable interest and dividends only), or

5. You do not certify to the requester that you are not subject to backup withholding under 4 above (for reportable interest and dividend accounts opened after 1983 only).

Certain payees and payments are exempt from backup withholding. See *Exempt payee code*, later, and the separate Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Also see Special rules for partnerships, earlier.

What is FATCA Reporting?

The Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act (FATCA) requires a participating foreign financial institution to report all United States account holders that are specified United States persons. Certain payees are exempt from FATCA reporting. See *Exemption from FATCA reporting code*, later, and the Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Updating Your Information

You must provide updated information to any person to whom you claimed to be an exempt payee if you are no longer an exempt payee and anticipate receiving reportable payments in the future from this person. For example, you may need to provide updated information if you are a C corporation that elects to be an S corporation, or if you no longer are tax exempt. In addition, you must furnish a new Form W-9 if the name or TIN changes for the account; for example, if the grantor of a grantor trust dies.

Penalties

Failure to furnish TIN. If you fail to furnish your correct TIN to a requester, you are subject to a penalty of \$50 for each such failure unless your failure is due to reasonable cause and not to willful neglect.

Civil penalty for false information with respect to withholding. If you make a false statement with no reasonable basis that results in no backup withholding, you are subject to a \$500 penalty.

Criminal penalty for falsifying information. Willfully falsifying certifications or affirmations may subject you to criminal penalties including fines and/or imprisonment.

Misuse of TINs. If the requester discloses or uses TINs in violation of federal law, the requester may be subject to civil and criminal penalties.

Specific Instructions

Line 1

You must enter one of the following on this line; **do not** leave this line blank. The name should match the name on your tax return.

If this Form W-9 is for a joint account (other than an account maintained by a foreign financial institution (FFI)), list first, and then circle, the name of the person or entity whose number you entered in Part I of Form W-9. If you are providing Form W-9 to an FFI to document a joint account, each holder of the account that is a U.S. person must provide a Form W-9.

a. Individual. Generally, enter the name shown on your tax return. If you have changed your last name without informing the Social Security Administration (SSA) of the name change, enter your first name, the last name as shown on your social security card, and your new last name.

Note: ITIN applicant: Enter your individual name as it was entered on your Form W-7 application, line 1a. This should also be the same as the name you entered on the Form 1040/1040A/1040EZ you filed with your application.

b. Sole proprietor or single-member LLC. Enter your individual name as shown on your 1040/1040A/1040EZ on line 1. You may enter your business, trade, or "doing business as" (DBA) name on line 2.

c. Partnership, LLC that is not a single-member LLC, C corporation, or S corporation. Enter the entity's name as shown on the entity's tax return on line 1 and any business, trade, or DBA name on line 2.

d. Other entities. Enter your name as shown on required U.S. federal tax documents on line 1. This name should match the name shown on the charter or other legal document creating the entity. You may enter any business, trade, or DBA name on line 2.

e. Disregarded entity. For U.S. federal tax purposes, an entity that is disregarded as an entity separate from its owner is treated as a "disregarded entity." See Regulations section 301.7701-2(c)(2)(iii). Enter the owner's name on line 1. The name of the entity entered on line 1 should never be a disregarded entity. The name on line 1 should be the name shown on the income tax return on which the income should be reported. For example, if a foreign LLC that is treated as a disregarded entity for U.S. federal tax purposes has a single owner that is a U.S. person, the U.S. owner's name is required to be provided on line 1. If the direct owner of the entity is also a disregarded entity, enter the first owner that is not disregarded for federal tax purposes. Enter the disregarded entity's name on line 2, "Business name/disregarded entity name." Line 4, Exemptions

If you are exempt from backup withholding and/or FATCA reporting, enter in the appropriate space on line 4 any code(s) that may apply to you.

Exempt payee code.

 Generally, individuals (including sole proprietors) are not exempt from backup withholding.

 Except as provided below, corporations are exempt from backup withholding for certain payments, including interest and dividends.

 Corporations are not exempt from backup withholding for payments made in settlement of payment card or third party network transactions.

• Corporations are not exempt from backup withholding with respect to attorneys' fees or gross proceeds paid to attorneys, and corporations that provide medical or health care services are not exempt with respect to payments reportable on Form 1099-MISC.

Line 5

Enter your address (number, street, and apartment or suite number). This is where the requester of this Form W-9 will mail your information returns. If this address differs from the one the requester already has on file, write NEW at the top. If a new address is provided, there is still a chance the old address will be used until the payor changes your address in their records.

Line 6

Enter your city, state, and ZIP code.

Part I. Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN)

Enter your TIN in the appropriate box. If you are a resident alien and you do not have and are not eligible to get an SSN, your TIN is your IRS individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN). Enter it in the social security number box. If you do not have an ITIN, see *How to get a TIN* below.

If you are a sole proprietor and you have an EIN, you may enter either your SSN or EIN.

If you are a single-member LLC that is disregarded as an entity separate from its owner, enter the owner's SSN (or EIN, if the owner has one). Do not enter the disregarded entity's EIN. If the LLC is classified as a corporation or partnership, enter the entity's EIN.

Note: See What Name and Number To Give the Requester, later, for further clarification of name and TIN combinations.

How to get a TIN. If you do not have a TIN, apply for one immediately. To apply for an SSN, get Form SS-5, Application for a Social Security Card, from your local SSA office or get this form online at *www.SSA.gov*. You may also get this form by calling 1-800-772-1213. Use Form W-7, Application for IRS Individual Taxpayer Identification Number, to apply for an ITIN, or Form SS-4, Application for Employer Identification Number, to apply for an EIN. You can apply for an EIN online by accessing the IRS website at *www.irs.gov/Businesses* and clicking on Employer Identification Number (EIN) under Starting a Business. Go to *www.irs.gov/Forms* to view, download, or print Form W-7 and/or Form SS-4. Or, you can go to *www.irs.gov/OrderForms* to place an order and have Form W-7 and/or SS-4 mailed to you within 10 business days.

If you are asked to complete Form W-9 but do not have a TIN, apply for a TIN and write "Applied For" in the space for the TIN, sign and date the form, and give it to the requester. For interest and dividend payments, and certain payments made with respect to readily tradable instruments, generally you will have 60 days to get a TIN and give it to the requester before you are subject to backup withholding on payments. The 60-day rule does not apply to other types of payments. You will be subject to backup withholding on all such payments until you provide your TIN to the requester.

Note: Entering "Applied For" means that you have already applied for a TIN or that you intend to apply for one soon.

Caution: A disregarded U.S. entity that has a foreign owner must use the appropriate Form W-8.

Part II. Certification

To establish to the withholding agent that you are a U.S. person, or resident alien, sign Form W-9. You may be requested to sign by the withholding agent even if item 1, 4, or 5 below indicates otherwise.

For a joint account, only the person whose TIN is shown in Part I should sign (when required). In the case of a disregarded entity, the person identified on line 1 must sign. Exempt payees, see *Exempt payee code*, earlier.

Signature requirements. Complete the certification as indicated in items 1 through 5 below.

1. Interest, dividend, and barter exchange accounts opened before 1984 and broker accounts considered active during 1983. You must give your correct TIN, but you do not have to sign the certification.

2. Interest, dividend, broker, and barter exchange accounts opened after 1983 and broker accounts considered inactive during 1983. You must sign the certification or backup withholding will apply. If you are subject to backup withholding and you are merely providing your correct TIN to the requester, you must cross out item 2 in the certification before signing the form.

3. Real estate transactions. You must sign the certification. You may cross out item 2 of the certification.

4. Other payments. You must give your correct TIN, but you do not have to sign the certification unless you have been notified that you have previously given an incorrect TIN. "Other payments" include payments made in the course of the requester's trade or business for rents, royalties, goods (other than bills for merchandise), medical and health care services (including payments to corporations), payments to a nonemployee for services, payments made in settlement of payment card and third party network transactions, payments to certain fishing boat crew members and fishermen, and gross proceeds paid to attorneys (including payments to corporations).

5. Mortgage interest paid by you, acquisition or abandonment of secured property, cancellation of debt, qualified tuition program payments (under section 529), ABLE accounts (under section 529A), IRA, Coverdell ESA, Archer MSA or HSA contributions or distributions, and pension distributions. Secure Your Tax Records From Identity Theft

Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personal information such as your name, SSN, or other identifying information, without your permission, to commit fraud or other crimes. An identity thief may use your SSN to get a job or may file a tax return using your SSN to receive a refund.

To reduce your risk:

- Protect your SSN,
- Ensure your employer is protecting your SSN, and
- · Be careful when choosing a tax preparer.

If your tax records are affected by identity theft and you receive a notice from the IRS, respond right away to the name and phone number printed on the IRS notice or letter.

If your tax records are not currently affected by identity theft but you think you are at risk due to a lost or stolen purse or wallet, questionable credit card activity or credit report, contact the IRS Identity Theft Hotline at 1-800-908-4490 or submit Form 14039.

For more information, see Pub. 5027, Identity Theft Information for Taxpayers.

Victims of identity theft who are experiencing economic harm or a systemic problem, or are seeking help in resolving tax problems that have not been resolved through normal channels, may be eligible for Taxpayer Advocate Service (TAS) assistance. You can reach TAS by calling the TAS toll-free case intake line at 1-877-777-4778 or TTY/TDD 1-800-829-4059.

Protect yourself from suspicious emails or phishing schemes. Phishing is the creation and use of email and websites designed to mimic legitimate business emails and websites. The most common act is sending an email to a user falsely claiming to be an established legitimate enterprise in an attempt to scam the user into surrendering private information that will be used for identity theft.

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The IRS does not initiate contacts with taxpayers via emails. Also, the IRS does not request personal detailed information through email or ask taxpayers for the PIN numbers, passwords, or similar secret access information for their credit card, bank, or other financial accounts.

If you receive an unsolicited email claiming to be from the IRS, forward this message to *phishing@irs.gov*. You may also report misuse of the IRS name, logo, or other IRS property to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) at 1-800-366-4484. You can forward suspicious emails to the Federal Trade Commission at *spam@uce.gov* or report them at *www.ftc.gov/complaint*. You can contact the FTC at *www.ftc.gov/idtheft* or 877-IDTHEFT (877-438-4338). If you have been the victim of identity theft, see *www.IdentityTheft.gov* and Pub. 5027.

Visit www.irs.gov/IdentityTheft to learn more about identity theft and how to reduce your risk.

Privacy Act Notice

Section 6109 of the Internal Revenue Code requires you to provide your correct TIN to persons (including federal agencies) who are required to file information returns with the IRS to report interest, dividends, or certain other income paid to you; mortgage interest you paid; the acquisition or abandonment of secured property; the cancellation of debt; or contributions you made to an IRA, Archer MSA, or HSA. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project.

Waivers:

- Staff explained how violations to ordinance are delt with; 1st and 2nd letters sent to property owners, if no compliance tickets may be issued. Court handles any fines, and may give alternative in lieu of fine, could give additional time for compliance.

County may make decision to abate property and bring into compliance with cost added to property taxes as fines and fees.

- Property owner may lose property to state land bank if fines and fees are not paid.
- May need a language change in the ordinance.
- After discussion, the item has been tabled to come back at a later date.

 Site Plan Review #PPC23-012 – Mecosta Farm House LLC, 19306 Monroe Rd, Morley, Aetna Township; Parcel #13 023 007 200. Property is zoned R-1. Site plan review for a proposed platted subdivision.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant's representative, Adam Feenstra, was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Drain Commissioners has been consulted.
- Has no information on Health Department approval nor does he know if sites will perk for water wells.
- Is available to answer board questions but is stepping in for another who had a last-minute appointment.

Additional members in favor were none.

Those present to speak against were area neighbors, Russ Eckert, Rob Brooks, Maggie Winger, Tom Eyk, Rod Mavis, Jessica, Mindy Smith, Connie Schultz, Chris Pelton, Robert Miller, Duane Probst, and Tom Wheeler.

- Development will hurt the hunting area.
- Will be large traffic impacts for a road that already has large wear and tear.
- Believe that the water drainage could cause neighboring properties to become wet and retain water.
- Wells are shallow in this area; additional water wells could run the water table down and deteriorate neighboring wells.
- Not an area for development to be placed.
- Will impact the agricultural lifestyle and people may not like the area ag smells.

- Not a good fit for a rural area.
- Would be better suited for a split or condo plan not a platted subdivision.
- May be issues with well and septic.

Approved

- Does not have approval from Health Department for well and does not know if property will perk to allow large number of wells on each area.
- Would be better suited to be in a different area.
- Firearms and hunting in the area would be a concern for all residents.
- Density and storm water runoff could be a large concern.
- County roads may need to be updated for additional traffic impacts.
- Habitat and vegetation may be damaged or upset.
- Subdivisions are not suited for rural, agricultural areas, closer to a metropolis area may be better suited.
- Appears to be undesirable to the area.
- Main road would need to be paved before any lots could be sold.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Gary Lambrix and supported by Bill Stanek to deny/disapprove special use/site plan review #PPC23-012 –to allow a platted subdivision, property located at 19306 Monroe Rd, Morley, Aetna Township; Parcel #13-023-007-200.

Roll Call Vote – 6 Yeas – 0 Nays, motion passed. Platted subdivision is not allowed.

3. Map Amendment Request #PPC23-013 – Thomas & Mary Watson, 13152 New Millpond Rd., Big Rapids, Colfax Township; Parcel #06 030 013 057. Property is zoned R-3. Request to rezone from R-3, One and Two Family Residential to AG, Agricultural.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant, Thomas Watson, was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Wants to start a winery on the property.
- Believes the land will be better suited as AG to allow for planting and growing of crops and grape vines.
- Winery will bring tourism to the area of Big Rapids.
- Loves the winery industry.

No additional members in favor.

There was no one present to speak against the petition.

- Staff was asked about future use benefits. Staff stated that agricultural use of growing and planting vines would be allowed in an AG zoned area by right along with current zoned area through the right to farm act.
- Traffic impacts should be minimal.
- The applicant will have a limit on the number of employees.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Bill Stanek to recommend denial to the Board of Commissioners. There was no support, so the motion died.

Discussion continued

- The request would not be considered spot zoning as there are many other agricultural zoned properties in the area.
- Conforms with the area and use of other properties.
- Applicant would comply with zoning use for future use.
- The current zoning allows for a winery under special use, but agricultural use will be a better fit for the future use of planting, harvesting, and cultivating the land.
- A site plan review will be required for future use of the property as a winery.

After further discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Rick Hatkowski and supported by Bill Routley for recommendation to the Board of Commissioners for approval of a map amendment request #PPC23-013. The property is located at 13152 New Millpond Rd., Big Rapids, Colfax Township: Parcel #06 030 013 057. Property is currently zoned R-3.

Roll Call Vote – 5 Yeas – 1 Nays

 Special Use Request #PPC23-014 – Cliff Youngs, 114 Mill St, Paris, Green Township; Parcel #01 891 007 000. Property is zoned R-3. Request to allow camp cabins on property.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant, Cliff Youngs, was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Has reduced the number of cabins to 4 total on property.
- DNR will regulate the use of crossing the trail for access to structures.
- Petitioner's easements permit to cross the White Pine Trail expires in June of 2023. Is currently waiting for reply to renew with DNR.
- Is willing to add any screening whether it be a fence or shrubbery to help reduce impact on neighboring properties.
- Stated that the cabins will be used for family when they come to visit. In the off season it may be rented from time to time.

Additional members in favor were area resident, Ted Cline.

- Tree clearing and removal of shrubbery has already improved the look of the property.
- Believes the petitioner will help improve the environment and look of the area.
- Would like to see the use approved so he will be able to enjoy the area when he visits the friend.

Those present to speak against were neighbors, Ken Devroy, and Ralph Kilpatrick.

• There are concerns about the property being used as rentals.

- The drive across the White Pine Trail is temporary and limited by the DNR approval.
- Is happier with the reduction in the number of cabins proposed to build.

Some statements were made about splitting the property and what the property is currently zoned. Staff clarified.

- The property is not being split into smaller sections, petitioner is requesting to allow additional cabin homes on the property by special use,
- Zoning ordinance does not allow more than one home per property.
- At time of the petition, the petitioner was awaiting approval of a map amendment from the Board of Commissioners.
- This approval was granted, and the property is now zoned LR, Lake and River Resort.

No one else to speak for or against the petition. Chair closed the public portion of the meeting and opened the floor to the Board for discussion and decision.

- The reduction in the number of cabins will help reduce the impacts to neighbors.
- There is a concern with vehicle traffic interfering with the users and vehicle traffic crossing the White Pine Trail.
- DNR mandate restrictions and use of the trail. They will place any signage on the trail if and as deemed necessary.
- Is believed to be for personal use.
- Has done a wonderful job clearing the area.
- Construction of the first cabin is allowed by right.
- The size of the proposed cabins is small and appears they will fit within the area.
- Screening of some type will be required on the northeast side of the property near adjacent homes.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made with the stipulation of screening being placed between the existing home and new construction in the northeast area of the property by Bill Stanek and supported by Gary Lambrix to approve special use request #PPC23-014 to allow camp cabins on the property. The property is located at 114 Mill Street, Paris, Green Township: Parcel #01 891 007 000. Property is zoned LR.

I. Roll Call

Chair, Ethan Ray called the meeting to order at 6 p.m. Present for roll call were Richard Hatkowski, Lorie Behrens, Gary Lambrix, Bill Routley, Bill Stanek, Annette Coles, Zoning Administrator, & Kim Straley, Recording Secretary.

II. Matters Pertaining to the Public

1. Chair Ray asked if there was anyone who wished to address the Commission regarding any subject that wasn't on the agenda or to be placed on the next agenda. There was no response.

III. <u>Public Hearings on the agenda</u>

1. Special Use Request #PPC23-012 – Mecosta Farmhouse, 19306 Monroe Rd, Morley, Aetna Township; Parcel #13 023 007 200. Property is zoned R-1. Preliminary site plan review for a platted subdivision.

The chair stated that this petition is a site plan review and recommendations will be made to items which may need to be added or addressed on this plated subdivision.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant, Ethan Gehrke, and his representative, Dave Hanko, were present to speak in favor of the application.

- Is from the area, Grand Rapids.
- Is only placing 9 homes on the site.
- The representative went over the petition and planned areas for the plat.

There were no additional members in favor of the petition.

Those present to speak against the petition were Dwayne Probst and Robert Books, area residents.

- Opposes the plat being area.
- Worried about the roads, hunting in the area, water well depletion, and hazards which may happen to the environment.

- Feel this may be a bad area to allow a platted subdivision but is an allowable use by right.
- The plated subdivision will need some type of performance guarantee such as a bond to ensure that the requirements are met.
- We are not the only approval needed. Will need to seek approval from other state agencies.
- Curbs, paved road and water runoff gutters will need to be in place before the lots can be sold or developed.
- May be a blind spot from the road, should be addressed with the County Road Commission.
- The road conditions and wear and tear should be addressed with MDOT and County Road Commission.
- Mature trees should stay on site, if at all possible, for screening and erosion purposes.
- The drain commissioner's office will need to address any soil erosion concerns due to the amount of soil being moved.
- This is preliminary only. Will need to come back once all other approvals are met with final plans for approval by this board.
- Will want to see underground electric and other utilities placed within the platted area.
- Will need well and septic approval from the district 10 Health Dept. for each lot.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Ethan Ray and supported by Bill Stanek to approve the preliminary site plan review request #PPC23-012 – with stipulations that a performance guarantee be put into place in the form of a bond with the County, to ensure that the utilities are placed underground where possible and all curbs, water gutters and roads are paved within the subdivision plat. The property is zoned R-1 and located at 19306 Monroe Rd. Morley, Aetna Township, Parcel #13 023 007 200.

Roll Call Vote – 5 Yeas – 1 Nays, motion approved.

2. Special Use Request #PPC23-019 – Amy Hayes, 10760 Lake St. Rodney, Chippewa Township; Parcel #03 891 017 000. Property is zoned LR. Request to allow a pavilion on rental cabin space.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant, Amy Hayes, was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Fell in love with the area.
- Moved here and took over the cabin/cottage rental business.
- Old structure was dangerous so have it removed and replaced with existing structure.
- Remodeled the inside of each cabin to make it more pleasing and inviting to guests.
- Did not know needed to have permit or zoning approval for placement of pavilion.

Additional members present to speak in favor was Township representative, Julie Austin.

- Believe Amy has done a lot of work for the property.
- The petitioner has done a great job improving the site and the area which she resides.
- Recommend approval of the petition.

No one was present to speak against the petition.

No one else to speak for or against the petition. Chair closed the public portion of the meeting and opened the floor to the Board for discussion and decision.

- Has done a nice job with the cabins.
- Great improvement to the property.
- Agree that the old structure was dangerous but should have asked for permission before did the work.
- Electricity should be wired directly into the structure, not use extension cords for lighting.
- Wonderful addition to the property.
- Fits the area.
- No foreseeable negative impacts.
- Will be required to get a permit and inspected by building department.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts, a motion was made by Richard Hatkowski and supported by Gary Lambrix to approve special use request #PPC23-019 to allow a pavilion at the cabin space with the stipulation that the electric be hard wired to the structure. The property is zoned LR and located at 10760 Lake St. Rodney, Chippewa Township: Parcel #03 891 017 000.

Roll Call Vote – 5 Yeas – 1 Nays, motion approved.

3. Special Use Request #PPC23-020 – Joseph & Candis Soltau, 19795 Indian Dr. Paris, Green Township; Parcel #01 05281109000. Property is zoned R-2. Request to allow a second accessory structure than permitted by right.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant, Joseph Soltau, was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Petitioned to have a tiny home but wants to do things as can afford.
- Does not want to put the expense into a well and septic until can afford it.
- Is willing to work with the board and staff to allow the structure.

No one was present to speak against the petition, however, a letter in opposition was received and given to the board members.

No one else to speak for or against the petition. Chair closed the public portion of the meeting and opened the floor to the Board for discussion and decision.

- Have a concern with there being a second accessory structure on the property.
- Should have applied for a house permit then would be allowed and not need to come before the board.
- Understand not wanting to get a loan. But future use to turn in to a home may not be practicable.
- Structure must meet building code for home when constructed to save cost in the future for the owner to meet insulation values and energy code regulations.
- Concern that this may never be turned into a home in the future but used in that manner.
- Fines should be assessed if caught living in a structure without property permits or structure change of use in the future.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Bill Stanek to deny the petition. Motion had no support, so it has died.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed a motion was made by Gary Lambrix and supported by Richard Hatkowski to approve special use request #PPC23-020 to allow a second accessory structure on the property. The property is zoned R-2 and located at 19795 Indian Dr., Paris, Green Township; Parcel #01 052 110 000.

Roll Call Vote – 4 Yeas – 2 Nays, motion approved.

4. Special Use Request #PPC23-021 – Mark & Angela Johnson, 8929 Lake View Blvd, Rodney, Martiny Township; Parcel #07 048 010 026. Property is zoned LR. Request to allow an oversized accessory structure than permitted by right.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicants, Mark and Angela Johnson, were present to speak in favor of the application.

- Let the board know they are looking to build the garage/accessory structure into the bank to not block the view of other neighboring properties.
- Will have a bathroom and office in the structure.
- Eventually want to live here full-time once the improvements are finished.
- Will be upgrading the septic system.

No one was present to speak against the petition.

- The roof height is limited to 20 feet.
- May need a variance to allow the height of the roof.
- Good fit and design for the area.

- Incorporating it into the hill will help keep the height down and not block any views.
- Want to upgrade septic to attach the garage bathroom.
- Entry into the structure through the easement will be cohesive to the surrounding area.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Bill Stanek and supported by Lorie Behrens to approve special use request #PPC23-021 to allow an oversized accessory structure on the property. 5. Special Use/Site Plan Review Request #PPC23-022 – Iltis Construction/ Crossroads Auto Care LLC, 19160 Northland Dr. Big Rapids, Green Township; Parcel #01 027 027 200. Property is zoned C-2. Request to allow an auto repair facility.

Use Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant's representative, John Iltis of Iltis Construction, was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Established businessman to the area.
- There is a need in the community for more auto repair facilities.
- Good fit for the area.
- Other businesses in the surrounding area.

No one was present to speak against the petition.

No one else to speak for or against the petition. Chair closed the public portion of the meeting and opened the floor to the Board for discussion and decision.

- Great location for business.
- The number of employees listed is good and meets the ordinance.
- There is a great need in the area for this type of business.
- Concerned about the wet land area. This should be addressed with soil erosion in the Drain Commissioners office.
- Has presented a good plan, so no reason cannot approve site plan review as well as special use at this time.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Bill Stanek and supported by Gary Lambrix to approve special use request and site plan review #PPC23-019 to allow an auto repair facility on the property. The property is zoned C-2 and located at 19160 Northland Dr., Big Rapids, Green Township: Parcel #01 027 027 200.

Roll Call Vote – 6 Yeas – 0 Nays, motion approved.

6. Special Use Request #PPC23-023 – Margaret Mieras, 14298 80th Ave, Mecosta, Martiny Township; Parcel #07 023 008 170. Property is zoned R-1. Request to allow rental space in an oversized accessory structure.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant, Margaret Mieras, was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Is available to answer questions from the board.
- Thought that she had asked for special use in 2021 when asked for oversized structure.
- The structure is heated and secured with limited traffic.
- There is a well and septic on the property for the bathroom inside the structure.
- Is a retired combat vet.
- Is offering alternate options to storage for neighboring properties.

Board members asked staff about the 2021 petition. Annette stated it was not clear on 2021 petition application, did not state other items would be stored, and therefore would need to re petition for rental space use.

Additional members in favor were contractor, Rich Davis.

- This is a big investment for the petitioner.
- The structure can fit and has room for 10 15 boats.

Those present to speak against the petition were area residents and neighbors, Danny Maxon, Don Roethlisberger, and Leonard Speckin.

- The impact on the area will be larger than most would expect.
- The structure is too large.
- Will be traffic impacts with visibility issues.
- The structure sits at the top of a hill, creating a blind spot for entry into the property.
- Status as a veteran has no bearing on the outcome of petition.
- Zoning ordinance states commercial use must be 50 feet from all property lines. The structure on the north side only has 20-foot setback.
- Initial request did not mention rental items or would have been at last meeting.
- Used the unit rental until found did not have permission.
- Backing in was difficult and had impacts on the local traffic, blocked people on the road.
- There is no clear view to enter into the driveway of property.

No one else to speak for or against the petition. Chair closed the public portion of the meeting and opened the floor to the Board for discussion and decision.

• Doesn't meet setbacks for commercial use in a residential zone.

- Traffic is heavy in lake areas, there may be large impacts during the holidays or summer season.
- The building may not be set up for commercial use. It may need a new building permit for change of use. Will have to speak with the building official on this matter.
- The building looks nice.
- Do not like the idea of commercial use in this area.
- May need to upgrade electric. Should speak with Building department about this as well.
- The view for traffic may be obstructed due to the location of the driveway.
- Will need to discuss driveway issues with Road Commission.
- Did not have a commercial site plan review, one may be required in the future if this is approved.
- Believe approval will set a bad example for future petitioners.
- Should have been clearer of intent on 2021 petition, structure may not have been approved if board knew was being used in this manner.
- Commercial use like this is not an allowable use by right or by special use in this zoned district.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Gary Lambrix and supported by Bill Routley to approve special use request #PPC23-023 to allow rental space in an oversized accessory structure. The property is zoned R-1 and located at 14298 80th Ave, Mecosta, Martiny Township; Parcel #07 023 008 170.

Roll Call Vote – 3 Yeas – 3 Nays, motion is a tie therefore according to Robert's Rules of Order, motion is denied.

- No foreseeable negative impacts.
- Will be required to get a permit and inspected by building department.
- Believe should be limited to 24 additional units.

1. Chair Ray then asked if there was anyone who wished to be on the next agenda. There was no response.

III. <u>Public Hearings on the agenda</u>

 Tabled, Site Plan Review Request #PPC23-024 – Thomas & Mary Watson, 13152 New Millpond Rd., Big Rapids, Colfax Township; Parcel #06 030 013 057. Property is zoned AG. Site plan review for a winery.

A motion to un-table and reopen the petition for discussion by the board was made by Ethan Ray and supported by Bill Stanek with a unanimous vote.

- Fits with the Master Plan for the township and overall use around the area.
- Have a concern with the use of an impound yard hours of operation, but that will be delt with under special use or site plan review at a later date, another meeting.
- Fencing around and on the property is a great idea.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Bill Stanek and supported by Lorie Behrens to recommend approval to the Board of Commissioners for a map amendment. Request #PPC23-031 set to rezone the property from R-4, multiple family residential to C-1, neighborhood commercial. - Bought the property $1 \frac{1}{2}$ years ago.
- Enjoy the area and what it has to offer.
- Would like to share the beauty of the area with others through renting out, operating an Air BnB when not using it personally.
- Wants to supplement income for the family.

There were no additional members present who were in favor of the petition.

Those present to speak against were; area neighbors, Sam Hazen, and Sheila Roberts.

- Believes the access easement needs upkeep and the use will only give more wear and tear on the surface.
- There is no public access to the water from the proposed use.
- There are concerns with fire pits and campfires.
- Wants to know who will be responsible for guest getting out of hand.
- Like the neighbor but not the proposed use.
- Believes the use is already being done.

No one else to speak for or against the petition. Chair closed the public portion of the meeting and opened the floor to the Board for discussion and decision.

- Not opposed to the use but understand the neighbors' concerns.
- Is a 2-bedroom home so guests will be limited to the size requirements.
- Should have rules established to mitigate issues.
- Short term versus long term use limits the use and allows more control through rules and regulations.
- A plat amendment is cost prohibitive.
- Using a rental organization to get patrons for use.
- Renters should be limited due to the size of the structure.
- Boundary lines should be established so users know the limitations of use and space surrounding the property.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Gary Lambrix and supported by Rick Hatkowski to approve special use request #PPC23-032 and allow an Air BnB on the property. The property is located at 6051 Truman Rd., Barryton, Chippewa Township and is zoned R-2. Parcel #03 079 076 000

Roll Call Vote – 7 Yeas – 0 Nays, motion approved to allow an Air BnB.

5. Map Amendment Petition #PPC23-033 – Stephen Hanford, 17099 Sierra Dr., Big Rapids, Colfax township; Parcel #06 030 001 000. Property is zoned R-1. Request to rezone the property from R-1, rural residential to AF, agricultural and forestry.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicant was present to speak in favor of the application.

- Has lived on the property since 1992.
- Thanked staff for the help and information on rezoning the property.
- Neighboring property owners changed their zoning a few years ago.
- Neighboring property, with their horse trailer loaded, causes the same wear and tear on roads as petitioner with his equipment.
- Believes that the violations were ridiculous and done out of vengeance because neighbor's mother does not like him.

Additional members in favor were; area resident, Therese Ventocilla.

- Stated the petitioner is a builder and brings his equipment home each night.
- Has had the equipment on the property since 1992.
- Arguments between neighbors are over the easement usage, and rezoning should help solve some of the issues.
- Property is prime for agricultural use if petitioner chooses to use in that manner in future.

Those present to speak against were; area neighbors Joe Strohkirch, Terry Strohkirch, Kristine Green, Suzanne Hosking, and several emails and letters received by staff and placed on record.

- Owned property in area for many years
- Petitioner has had a commercial business of property for a long time.
- Many believe there has been damage to the road due to the large equipment going on and off the petitioner's property.
- Mentioned several items which are civil matters between neighbors and petitioner.
- Has hours of operation at all times of the night.
- Believes the petitioner has buried products on the property.
- Believes the petitioner has been in trouble with several law enforcement agencies.
- Comes through the residential zoned area to access property.
- Several members believe that McKinley Road does not allow commercial use to go up and down the road, therefore, should not be allowed to have on property.
- Some believe the petitioner acts viciously towards others.
- Believe the equipment is too heavy and causes damage to the roads.
- Many are upset that the use of a commercial style business has not been stopped or brought into compliance earlier than now.

 Many believe that the petitioner should not be allowed to change the zoning district due to the lack of following the rules in current zoning district's regulations.

No one else to speak for or against the petition. Chair closed the public portion of the meeting and opened the floor to the Board for discussion and decision.

- Traffic through the subdivision is a concern. Asked staff to clarify.
- Staff replied an easement was platted and added to the plat allowing access to the six parcels which sit south of the subdivision. This is the only access on record for those parcels.
- Road maintenance can be an issue, but not considering a special use, looking at a map amendment proposal.
- The size of equipment mentioned is not different than many sizes of farm equipment used on area farms.
- Sad to see childish behavior being done between neighbors.
- The request is within the petitioners' rights.
- If special use is required, hours of operation can be discussed at that time.
- Any property owner should be allowed to bring their tools home, even if they are larger than others.
- There may be safety issues or concerns with traveling through the subdivision but supports the tools of the occupation being allowed at home.
- Some of the matters presented by both sides are civil matters and should be handled through litigation or court proceedings.
- Would approve the amendment based on the facts provided for rezoning not the civil matters or special use discussed.
- Fits within the Master Plan for the area.

After discussion and based on the findings of facts listed, a motion was made by Gary Lambrix and supported by Bill Routley to make a recommendation of approval to the Board of Commissioners for a map amendment. Request #PPC23-033 set to rezone the property from R-1, rural residential to AF, agricultural and forestry. The property is located at 17099 Sierra Dr., Big Rapids, Colfax Township and is zoned R-1. 1. Chair Ray then asked if there was anyone who wished to address the Commission regarding any subject that wasn't on the agenda or to be placed on the next agenda. There was no response.

III. <u>Public Hearings on the agenda</u>

1. Special Use Petition #PP23-035 – Richard & Ruth Locke Trust, 21199 Monroe Rd., Morley, Aetna Township; Parcel #13 039 005 000. Property is zoned LR. Request to allow an oversized accessory structure than what is permitted by right.

Chair Ray read the request into the record. The applicants, Richard & Ruth Locke, were present to speak in favor of the application.

- Side setback of 4 ft. was denied at the October 3rd, 2023, ZBA meeting.
- Property line has been located.
- This will be permanent residence.
- Has need for storage.

- Liquid Plus fertilizer sold in 5-gallon buckets, as well as natural chicken manure pellets.
- The board stressed the need for safety in product storage and having an emergency plan.
- No apparent negative impact to neighbors, adequate space for site.
- Adequate space for transitioning for delivery trucks.

WHEREAS, there are currently pending in the Michigan Legislature certain bills, SB299, SB300, HB4479 and HB4480, which would impose statewide regulations for the implementation of and maintenance of septic systems; and

WHEREAS, the Sanilac County Board of Commissioners recognizes the importance of maintaining clean and safe water resources and protection of public health within our county; and

WHEREAS, these bills as presently drafted, would require inspection of all systems every five years and would impose much greater expenses and work hours on local public health departments; and

WHEREAS, the bills would dramatically increase the requirements for septic inspectors and make it much more difficult to find, hire and retain qualified personnel; and

WHEREAS, the current legislation does not provide a permanent, secure funding mechanism to cover these increased costs, which will invariably be shifted to our local health departments; and

WHEREAS, in Michigan, local governments have historically been the appropriate entities to regulate and oversee septic systems with their jurisdiction, taking into account the unique needs within their jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, soil types vary considerably throughout Michigan making it difficult to establish generalized "one size fits all" rules for septic systems; and

WHEREAS, statewide septic regulations may impose undue financial hardships and burdens on homeowners and may lead to unintended consequences, such as potential hardships for low income residents.

Whereas should local control be preempted, a county, township, city or village would be unable to determine the location, size, setback distance, decibel level or any other criteria for a solar or wind facility; and

Whereas should local control be preempted, a county, township, city, or village would be unable to determine requirements for construction, operation, use, or maintenance of a solar or wind facility; and

Whereas if a county already has a solar or wind policy, practice, regulation, rule or ordinance on record it would be null and void; and

Whereas all other types of energy facilities, while regulated by the Michigan Public Service Commission, must adhere to local zoning; and

Whereas this proposal grants far more regulating authority to the Michigan Public Service Commission than for any other energy source; and

Whereas the Michigan Association of Counties opposes any legislative action that may grant the Michigan Public Service Commission this power.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that DELTA COUNTY opposes the pre-emption of local control in solar and wind siting and zoning.
