11,240-1 The President presented an Ordinance amending Chapter 2, Section 2-27 of the Revised Ordinances, Schedule A, Classification Plan and Section 2-28(a), Section B the Compensation Plan for FY'13.

On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Harpin it was VOTED: to refer to the Finance Committee and pass to a second reading and publish as a municipal bulletin.

The Mayor explained the stipends of \$5,000 for the Police and Fire Directors along with the Police Lieutenant are because of the increase in responsibilities and levels of command. These positions are exempt from overtime effective July 1, 2013. The stipends will roll into their salary when the City Ordinance reflects the new Public Safety structure. Included in this is a request for a 1% raise retroactive from July 2012 to December 31, 2012, and an additional 1% from January 1, 2013. Reclassification for the part-time clerical position in the Public Service office because the clerk is a backup for the Mayor's office, also an 8% adjustment for emergency dispatchers.

Councilor Barrett said the City cannot keep spending, spending, spending and questioned why some City workers were getting raises and others were not. I do agree that there are several positions in City Government that deserve raises, but there are several that do not. He objects to non-union employees making more than \$60,000 a year getting a raise. The part time clerk should not be making more than the City's reserve police officers who are wearing guns. Councilor Barrett would like to know just what duties they have taken on. Councilor Barrett has no problem with the stipends for the directors, but again would like to know the additional duties the part time clerk has taken on to deserve them.

Councilor Breen felt they should vote it as is, since salaries are set by the administration and not under the jurisdiction of the Council.

Councilor Barrett said it was definitely the Council's jurisdiction since it was a spending request and none of the changes were union or contractual.

The Mayor said he would not respond at this time and would wait for the committee meeting.

Councilor Marden said there was no rush, since the raises were retroactive and would like to wait and see what the Governor's budget was going to be.

Councilor Blackmer suggested that if it was going to committee, then we should not be publishing it as a municipal bulletin until the Finance Committee meets.

On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Harpin it was VOTED: to rescind the orginial motion.

On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to refer to the Finance Committee and postpone till the meeting of February 12th.

The President presented Mayor's communication #8 requesting the establishment of bond levels for City Officials for FY'13.

Without objection the President placed the communication on file.

The President presented an Order establishing the bond for the City Treasurer/Tax Collector at \$250,000 for FY'13.

Roger Eurbin thanked Councilor Barrett for bring the charges from National Grid to everyone's attention. He took a closer look at his bill and more than half of the charges were not for electricity. Michael Chalifoux, 45 Monroe Street said the City is suffering the effects of cuts made from the State and Federal Government. Mary Ann Albee-Benoti, 16 Rand Street said the reason people are not coming to the meetings are because they are not being heard.

A moment of silent prayer was observed remembering Helen Burzamiti, Election Worker for the City of North Adams and Joseph Moresi, former Chairman of the North Adams Board of Registrars.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Councilor Breen entered the meeting at 7:32pm.

The President called for anyone wishing to speak in Hearing of Visitors, Mark Trottier, 131 Woodlawn Avenue questioned just where the priorities of the City where, we are in need of a new police and fire station as well as work on the sewers. I do not understand why we can't wait another 4 years to do the school. Mr. Trottier objects to Council Rule 10-A, there is no case law banning signs. Robert Cardimino, 173 East Quincy Street also objects to the school, I wonder just how the Mayor is going to pay for the City share of the project. He would like to see the citizens of this community decide if they really want the school project. Mr. Cardimino said the proposed Council Rule 10-A was unconstitutional. Katherine Montgomery, 67 Porter Street was concerned about the renovations at Conte School and would be definitely in favor of a new school, something more like what was done in Williamstown. I feel this is a poor investment of our community resources. Robert Moulton, 985 Massachusetts Avenue objected to the project at Conte sighting the unforeseen cost that will occur during the renovations. We all know that when you are renovating it always costs more than expected. John Franzoni, 83 North Street, Assistant Principal at Greylock and Sullivan schools said the school building committee has done their due diligence on this project and it is the best for our students.

The President called for the approval of the minutes of the Organization of Government held on January 8th.

On motion of Councilor Bond, duly seconded by Councilor Harpin it was VOTED: to accept as presented.

The President called for the approval of the minutes from the Regular Meeting held on January 8th.

10,990-2 The President presented Mayor's communication #9 recommending a borrowing Order for the renovations of Conte School.

On motion of Councilor Harpin, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to file the communication.

Councilor Barrett said he was in disagreement with the plan for Conte School; this has nothing to do with the money and everything that is best for our children's education. Councilor Barrett said the Mayor and the School Building Committee has not followed through with the recommendation of the New England School Development Council from 2007-2008, including developing a long term facility plan. The NESDC report offered several plans that were not looked at. The City should be more concerned about the low MCAS scores and the lack of a curriculum coordinator which was cut last year. The report offered fixes for Sullivan and Greylock Schools at a cost of about \$21 million. The Mayor said that there was tremendous community support, but yet at the meetings at Sullivan School, parents and residents were against this project. The SBC said they did not believe the citizens of this City were in favor of the school project and the City should go back to the drawing board. Councilor Barrett also said that just a few weeks ago the City Auditor said the City has no more free cash and yet we are willing to spend money.

Councilor Bona wondered why the City would want to spend money on band-aid fixes that would most likely not be reimbursed, when we can get a new school for \$6.5 million right now. I am on the School Building Committee and this has been a well thought out process and the committee did do their research on this project. Councilor Marden questioned the impact the ADA would have on the debt schedule and the Public Safety Building will need to be looked at down the road.

Councilor Blackmer, who was opposed to the choice of Conte because of safety concerns and the wishes of Sullivan parents to keep their school has changed her mind because she has listened to people and it has been 2 to 1 in favor of this project, thanking those who have approached her. It may not be their first choice but they think now is the time to move forward.

Councilor Bond questioned how this would affect the average tax payer. He said there are parents with some real concerns but it is the best project we can put forward and the state has endorsed it.

Councilor Harpin said she attended public hearings at Sullivan and people did not like the Conte project, they were in favor of keeping a neighborhood school. The citizens of this community can no longer afford to keep digging in to pockets they do not have.

Councilor Bullet also has spoken to parents who believe Conte was their neighborhood school and noted that Drury High, St. Joseph's High and Notre Dame Schools had all been open in that area. I believe the timing is right and to wait another two or three years when it is already approved for funding, the longer the City waits the more money it will cost the City.

The Mayor answered several of the concerns from the Councilors, saying the debt could be absorbed into the budget, at \$102,500 each the first two years on interest only and \$370,000 annually over the balance. The numbers will be built into the budget and the City would still live within the constraints of local receipts, taxes and state aid. The Mayor said he believed most of the ADA issues will be addressed through Community Block Grant Funding.

Councilor Marden said he believes the community needs to grow, growth requires investment and it can come from outside and inside the community. Two major factors are education and quality work force. I believe in the Conte project, the Mayor said we can afford it, I do not think we cannot afford not to do it.

10,900-2 The President presented an Order appropriating the sum of \$29,692,594 for the renovations of Conte School and to meet this appropriation the Treasurer with the approval of the Mayor may borrow from time to time under MGL Chapter 44.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Bona it was VOTED: to pass to a second reading and publish as required by law.

The Order was adopted by yea and nay vote as follows; yea Councilor Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Marden. Nay Councilor Barrett, Harpin.

The President presented a communication submitted by Councilor President nominating Marilyn Gomeau as the City Clerk for a term to expire January 2016.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Marden it was VOTED: to elect Marilyn Gomeau as the City Clerk.

The President called for any Councilor Concerns, Councilor Blackmer reminded everyone to stay safe with the extreme cold that is expected in the next few days. Councilor Bullett thanked everyone who took part in the snowshoeing event on Saturday, it was a great success and they are planning another event for February 25th. The President called for anyone wishing to speak in Open Forum, Wayne Goodell, 564 Barbour Street said the report of the General Government Committee did not reveal the everything that went on in the meeting. Robert Cardimino, 173 East Quincy Street said he has never seen such hatred from Councilors at committee meetings. With no further business to come before the Council a motion to adjourn was in order.

He noted that other part time clerks have had increases in duties without added compensation. Councilor Barrett also questioned why the reserve police officers were not included.

The Mayor said he would be dealing with the reserve police officers when he considers the police budget. Councilor Barrett urged the Council to take a better look at this paper and do it right.

Councilor Bond moved the question, with Councilor Barrett, Harpin and Marden opposed.

Councilors felt there was still more to discuss, so Councilor Bond withdrew his motion to move the question. Councilor Barrett said we are very fortunate that we have loyal employees in City Hall who have stayed for many years. Three part-time employees were pushed out because they had their hours cut to 10 hours and now we are giving a part-time clerk grade advancement, plus she will be working 20+ hours, making her eligible for benefits and pension, which the City will have to contribute to. The Mayor took offense to Councilor Barrett's remarks on pushing 80 year old employees out the door.

Councilor Barrett was still concerned about the language in the Classification Plan, saying this language wipes out the entire Schedule A.

Councilor Marden was waiting for this to be brought up and said he is in agreement with Councilor Barrett and asked the Mayor to have the Solicitor review this language before it comes back to Council at the next meeting. The Mayor submitted new language to the Council regarding the first paragraph of the Compensation Plan. On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to amend and pass to a second reading and publish as a municipal bulletin, with Councilor Barrett opposed.

The President presented Mayor's communication #10 recommending the appointment of Timothy Lescarbeau to the Hoosac Water Quality District to fill the unexpired term of Ronald Boucher.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Harpin it was VOTED: to confirm.

Councilor Barrett said that this was not the Mayor's appointment, that it was Council's appointment.

A short recess was called to allow the Clerk to find a ruling on the appointment.

The meeting resumed and it was determined that the Mayor needed to research this matter. On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Bona it was VOTED: to table this until the next meeting.

The President presented Mayor's communication #11 recommending the acceptance of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 32B, Section 21-23 for the purpose of engaging in the process to change health insurance benefits.

Without objection the President placed the communication on file.

The Mayor explained it is his intention to negotiate with Public Employee Committees, created to speak on behalf of the unions. The adoption of this law is a backup plan if an agreement cannot be reached.

Marie Kelly-Whitney from the North Adams Teachers Association said that the teachers felt the adoption of the law would is disrespectful to them. They have always had a good working relationship with the administration and the union. On behalf of the teachers she asked Councilors not to vote on the passage of this law. She feels that if given the opportunity to work together at finding the best health plan possible, all parties will benefit.

The Mayor said this was in no way meant to be disrespectful to the teachers association, this gives Municipality's greater flexibility in providing health insurance plans.

Councilor Blackmer said health insurance takes a huge bite out of budget and insurance providers are being forced to be more competitive.

Councilor Barrett said this legislation is courageous and he was in full support of adoption.

The President presented an Order accepting the provisions of Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 32B, Section 21-23.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Bond it was VOTED: to adopt the Order.

The Order was adopted by yea and nay vote as follows: yea Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Bullett, Harpin, Marden. Nay none.

8717-32b The President presented Mayor's communication #12 regarding overlay surplus account from 2009.

Without objection the President placed the communication on file.

The President presented an Order appropriating the sum of \$51,570 from the overlay surplus account to General Government-Assessor Expenses.

On motion of Councilor Bona, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to adopt the order.

The Order was adopted by yea and nay vote as follows: yea Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Bullett, Harpin, Marden. Nay none.

Michael Canales said the City will try to determine if the outside contractor was responsible for the error when the land was previous surveyed.

The President called for anyone wishing to speak in Open Forum, Susan Gilman, 197 State Street was disappointed about the adoption of MGL on insurance. Teachers have worked very hard to work with the administration and wonder what impact the adoption of this law will have in negotiations.

STATE OF THE CITY ADDRESS February 26, 2012

As I come into my fourth year in office, I am here tonight to give you my thoughts relative to our fine City for this year to come.

Over the past several cycles, we faced many fiscal challenges as we tried to strengthen our financial position. We have had modest success however we have a long way to go in working towards balanced budgets and strong reserves. Despite the economy, we have positioned ourselves well for many good things to come.

We continue to spend many hours managing projects such as the Airport, the Hadley Bridge WILL be completed this year, privatization of Heritage State Park, partnership with MCLA on the Mohawk, a new solar project, Conte School renovation, Super Walmart, Crane expansion and other projects that are in the works.

There are two very important numbers that I continue to focus on and that I think are critical to our success, those numbers are...one and zero. The number "one" relates to our census. The City has seen declining population for more years than any of us care to remember. I think it will be a great day, when we see our population trend begin to tick upward.....even if only by "1". "Zero" is indicative of a balanced budget.....something that we have not had for many years. When we are able to set a budget and pay for it strictly from revenues....without utilization of reserves that will also be a very good day.

This year, as we build the budget, we are putting together a comprehensive capital plan outlining the short, mid and long term needs of the City. This list will include everything from vehicles to building infrastructure to our water and sewer systems. I am certain this document will bring to light the many capital and infrastructure issues facing the City and the reason why we all have to work together to begin to address what are truly overwhelming needs.

Public Safety will continue to be a priority as the City continues to deal with crime issues that are pervasive in more urban communities, not least of which are the problems caused by addiction. Over the past few weeks, there have been several major arrests in the City primarily people moving drugs here from outside of the City. We are very much aware of the problem(s) and our Police Department continues to work with Berkshire County Drug Task Force.

Additionally, there are several groups actively meeting to help bring awareness to addiction and the mental health issues that many times are the underlying factor. I sit on two committees, one that is working to bring awareness to Adolescents with Serious Emotional Disturbances and the other is working with a group to find solutions to the serious abuse of prescription medications. The problems we see stem from much larger social issues that are plaguing not just this City but communities everywhere. The disease of addiction and resulting crime is prevalent at all socio-economic levels.

The past two years have seen significant growth of new businesses and business expansions....24 small businesses have either opened or expanded filling vacant store fronts and creating jobs and opportunity. I thank all of these entrepreneurs who have invested in our community.

With this growth and expansion in the small business community we will be working with the newly formed North Adams Chamber of Commerce to help facilitate the growth and development of our business community. We will work to further define the role of our Director of Culture and Tourism to be certain that community events grow but more importantly that North Adams is promoted as widely as possible as a destination in Berkshire County. Additionally I am working on a partnership with the Franklin County CDC to bring their small business loan program here to North Adams and northern Berkshire. This program could prove invaluable to small businesses looking for low cost capital.

My efforts to privatize Heritage State Park will continue as the fastest moving most actively supported public/private project currently underway in the City. With some \$880,000 committed to the park from a MassWorks infrastructure grant coupled with blossoming discussions with the private sector, I am more convinced than ever that the re-birth of the park is right in front of us. With the support of Department of Housing & Economic Development, Department of Conservation and Recreation, the Department of Transportation and the private sector, I am confident that this project will succeed. HSP has become the north side visitor's center for Mt. Greylock and the bike trail from Adams to HSP is well on its way.

I am thrilled with our most recent announcement of the "Hoosic Valley Service" that will connect North Adams and Adams with tourist train trips as soon as spring of 2014. This collaborative effort between the City, Town of Adams, Berkshire Scenic Rail Museum, MADOT, DCR, with support of the Governor, holds significant economic, social and cultural promise and further enhances the excitement of the re-birth of HSP. As MA DOT Rail works to acquire the rail and put back the last mile of track, we will be working with BSRM to further plan what programming will look like for the tourist train.

I continue to work with our community partner MCLA, on a sustainable project that will breathe life into the Mohawk Theater. With continued engagement, additional application for credits, looking to the state and federal governments for additional funding, I am very hopeful that we will be able to announce a solution. While I am disappointed that this project has not moved faster than I had hoped, there are many moving parts and we need to do this right. MCLA as a partner guarantees a project with long term sustainability providing daily use, revenue, management, programming and other attributes that will assure success. I am very much hoping to utilize cash realized from the privatization of HSP to further advance this project.

We are 18 or so months into our Master Planning process "Vision 2030". This process through the efforts and ideas of many is creating the roadmap that will allow the City to move forward. The plan addresses many issues concerning development, environment, neighborhoods, education, culture, recreation, healthy living and other topics vital to a healthy community. Our plan is unique to the City but we have aligned it with the larger county-wide master planning process currently being developed by Berkshire Regional Planning. We will continue to have community visioning sessions and discussions to fine tune the effort before adopting the final version.

I am very excited to be a part of the Partnership for North Adams, a "think tank" of sorts that has been established to look at different sectors of our economy and develop ideas and solutions for growth and development. The Partnership consists of a group of residents from Northern Berkshire who represent virtually every major economic sector and I am confident much good will come from these efforts.

We will continue the important work to bring the City into compliance with the ADA requirements identified by the DOJ audit last year. We are poised to begin work at the Mary Spitzer Center and the Joe Wolfe Field complex this year. This work will begin through a small borrowing and utilization of CDBG funding. We will continue to use CDBG funding over the next several cycles to complete our ADA work. This will all culminate with a study and hopefully a solution to our Public Safety building.

Super WalMart will be opening soon providing 100 or so new jobs, 40 of which will be full time positions.

As exciting, North Adams has officially become the headquarters for Crane's Fine Printing Division. In doing this, they have consolidated several of their business units into the North Adams plant and are

finalizing the acquisition of a company the William Arthur Stationary located in West Kennebunk, Maine. This acquisition will prompt \$5 million dollars in plant and technology investment, create 75 new manufacturing jobs in North Adams assuring an employment level of 280 positions as early as this fall. I will be bringing a Special Tax Agreement to Council at the next meeting to help facilitate this great opportunity.

I will continue to build our budget in the same open, transparent and TEAM oriented fashion as I have since taking office. Containing costs will be our biggest challenge as labor, utilities, pensions and capital expenses rise. We are currently working with our unions on health insurance reform that could save the City and employees money on premium costs.

We are moving forward with a new solar project and pricing and terms are being negotiated at this time. When we have a solid power purchase agreement in place, I will come to Council with a comprehensive presentation of the project by the developers. This project is really gaining momentum and I remain hopeful that the City will see the resulting savings in the FY2015 budget.

I will continue to move forward with the Conte School project, one that has been fully endorsed and approved by the Mass School Building Authority our School Building Committee, our School Committee and this Council. We have done considerable financial analysis to support our assumptions of affordability. My administration has worked to be certain that the debt incurred by this project can fit within the current budget without the need for a tax override or a debt exclusion provision.

The Conte School renovation is worthy of overwhelming community support as are those who are appointed and elected that have been charged to make this decision. I will not let this project slip away.

I have very much appreciated the support of this council, the School Committee, our School Building Committee, the commitment of all of our boards and commissions, the guidance of my neighboring town leaders, our local delegation, the wonderful employees of our City and school system, and I am very thankful for the patience and support of the people of this great city.

There is an old saying "The wheels of government grind slowly" and THAT THEY DO! But with continued support and patience, we will continue to grow and make "our" City, nestled here in the palm of God's hand, a place of pride for all of us.

A meeting of the North Adams City Council was held at 7:30pm in City Council Chambers with the following present:

COUNCILORS PRESENT: Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Harpin. Absent Councilor Marden.

A moment of silent prayer was observed, remembering Dr. John Moresi, chairman of the North Adams Board of Health, member and former chair of the Hoosac Water Quality District and faculty member of the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts. Charles Bostwick member of the North Adams Auxiliary Police Department.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The President called for anyone wishing to speak in Hearing of Visitors, hearing none the President called for the approval of the minutes from February 26th.

On motion of Councilor Harpin, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to accept as presented.

11,297 The President presented Mayor's communication #15 establishing an Economic Opportunity Area and a Tax Assessment Agreement.

On motion of Councilor Bond, duly seconded by Councilor Bona it was VOTED: to file the communication.

The Mayor explained that Crane will be making a \$5,000,000 investment and with this expansion it will create 74 new jobs for North Adams, this will be an increase of the current employment of 206 positions to 280 and most likely will require the need for a second shift, solidifying Crane's commitment to their fine stationary division. All of the documents will be sent to the MA Office of Business Development for accuracy. Once approved it will be sent to the Economic Assistance Coordinating Council for final approval on March 26th.

Councilor Barrett asked why this was not a TIF agreement. The Mayor responded it was an investment in new jobs and not equipment.

Richard Kendall a representative from Crane said the company is not purchasing a big piece of equipment, that it was mostly IT.

Councilor Barrett expressed he was not opposed but cautioned Councilors that the City needs to watch our finances and reminded Council they walked away from the City and took the jobs to Dalton. He commended Crane's management team for getting things in order and is in full support of this but thinks we can get a better deal.

Councilor Breen said that Councilor Barrett's remarks were that of political platitudes, and she thanked Mr.

Kendall for coming before the Council. Councilor Blackmer wondered if this should go the Finance Committee since Councilor Marden is not in attendance tonight. He is involved with the economic development and he should be included in this discussion. Councilor Blackmer questioned how many of the 74 jobs would be filled by former employees from the Maine plant, saying the agreement stated that employees for the new jobs should be hired from the City and greater Northern Berkshire. Councilor Blackmer made a motion to refer to the Finance Committee with a second from Councilor Barrett.

Councilor Bona thanked Mr. Kendall for being here tonight and noted that we did lose jobs when Crane moved to Dalton and we do not want to lose 150 jobs to another community. Councilor Bullett and Bond also thanked Mr. Kendall for coming here tonight and feel this is a positive sign for things to come. Councilor Breen said its bizarre that Crane would be interrogated like this, and she feels that this is a fair agreement. Councilor Blackmer withdrew her motion to refer to the Finance Committee.

The President presented a Resolution designating the property identified as Map 15, Lots 14B and 15 as Crane & Co. as an Economic Opportunity Area.

On motion of Councilor Bona, duly seconded by Councilor Bond it was VOTED: to adopt the Resolution.

The Resolution was adopted by yea and nay votes as follows: yea Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Harpin. Nay none.

The President presented an Order authorizing the Mayor to execute a Special Tax Assessment Agreement with Crane & Co., Inc.

On motion of Councilor Bond, duly seconded by Councilor Bona it was VOTED: to adopt the Order.

Councilor Barrett asked if this will go before the State for approval. Mr. Kendall said it does have to go to the State for approval.

The Order was adopted by yea and nay vote as follows: yea Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Harpin. Nay none.

10,990-2a The President presented a communication submitted by the City Clerk regarding a referendum petition filed on February 28, 2013, regarding the borrowing order for the renovation of Conte School.

On motion of Councilor Bona, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to file.

Councilor Breen said she was offended that someone can force us to put something on the floor that we don't want to do.

10,990-2b The President presented an Order rescinding Council Paper 10,990-2, which was adopted on February 5, 2013.

The President did not get a response from any Councilor for a motion.

The President explained a yea vote would rescind the Order and a nay vote would not.

Councilor Barrett wondered what the motion should be; Councilor Bona motioned to file, duly seconded by Councilor Bullett.

The President called for a roll call vote on the motion to file; yea Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bona, Bond, Bullet, Harpin. Nay Councilor Bloom and Breen.

10,990-2c The President presented an Order fixing the date of April 30, 2013 as the date for the Special Election to consider the referendum petition regarding the borrowing order for the renovations of Conte School.

Councilor Barrett said the Council had to vote on rescinding the order up or down in order to set the date of the election.

Councilor Breen said she was opposed to voting on this issue.

The President said we need to vote on the rescinding Order, that we cannot file the paper, but would like to call a short recess to talk with the City Solicitor.

The meeting resumed with John DeRosa, the City Solicitor in attendance. He explained that it is Council's duty to reconsider it. The Solicitor said that the borrowing order had been stayed as soon as the petition had been certified. Under the City Charter and State Law you must vote to either rescind the order or send it to the voters. You are all free to vote any way you wish, you have to reconsider it.

Council President asked Councilor Bona to withdraw his motion, but Councilor Bona said he did not want too. Councilor Breen again said she was unhappy that they are forced to put this on the floor when basically we are not in favor. The Solicitor said the Charter is very clear on the process and you have to reconsider. Councilor Barrett said the fact that some 1,400 people signed the petition showed that not all questions have been answered.

The President placed Council Paper #10,990-2b back on the floor to be reconsidered; at the President's request Councilor Bona withdrew his original motion to file, duly seconded by Councilor Bullett.

On motion of Councilor Barrett, duly seconded by Councilor Harpin it was VOTED: to rescind the Order.

The Order was adopted by yea and nay vote as follows: no yeas. Nay Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Harpin. The Order failed.

The President reintroduced Council Paper #10,990-2c to fix the date of the election.

On motion of Councilor Barrett, duly seconded by Councilor Harpin it was VOTED: to adopt the Order.

Councilor Breen said the language on the petition was very deceiving.

The Order was adopted by yea and nay vote as follows; yea Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Harpin. Nay none.

11,264-1 The President presented an Order authorizing the Treasurer with the approval of the Mayor to borrow the sum of \$250,000 for ADA Compliance under Chapter 44, Section 7(3a) of the Massachusetts General Laws.

Councilor Barrett would like to table this until the next meeting giving the Council more time to review the spreadsheet that was just given to them.

On motion of Councilor Barrett, duly seconded by Councilor Bona it was VOTED: to table until the next meeting.

Administrative Officer Michael Canales explained this outlines everything from coat hooks to bathroom rails. This includes renovations to bathrooms, ramps, grab bars and signage as well as braille signs, elevator adjustment's, doors and bathroom renovation's at City Hall at a cost of \$46,000. Windsor Lake and the campground also is a target area at a cost of \$47,000. The final project will be the Police Station, which will could be in the millions.

The Mayor said that the City has three years to address these issues and the Department of Justice is aware that the Public Safety Building is a major undertaking.

Councilor Barrett asked if Council would see an analysis of the Public Safety Building.

Mayor Alcombright said a full study would be done and officials have informally met with a company who Does analyses and a request for a proposal would be forthcoming.

Councilor Breen could not understand how the City has fallen so far behind in compliance. Several times Councilor Breen pointed out the infractions at Alcombright Field.

Councilor Barrett said everything was done with the rules and regulations of the time, rules change. The President cut off the debate of what was done in the past and reminded Council they were discussing a borrowing order.

Councilor's were in favor of tabling this until the next meeting.

11,298 The President presented Mayor's communication #17 requesting a transfer from the Tinker Fund to the Cemetery Department.

Without objection the President placed the communication on file.

Mayor Alcombright explained that \$8,000 was for removal of the existing building at Southview Cemetery, \$2,000 was for a new sign and \$10,000 maintenance of Hillside Cemetery. He explained he has been working with Roger Eurbin on improvements needed to Hillside Cemetery.

The fund has \$42,000 and \$4,000 a year is put into the trust to fund the cemeteries.

Councilor Barrett said the fund was established when E.R. Tinker died; he is in a mausoleum at Hillside Cemetery. Herb Anderson was a representative for the Tinker estate, the funds could only be used for Hillside. Mayor Alcombright said in the past practices the fund was not just used for Hillside, it was used for the cemeteries.

Councilor Bona asked if in the past were funds ever used to purchase equipment.

Councilor Barrett acknowledged that funds had been used for equipment and labor at Southview.

The Mayor said he would come back with a split from the Tinker Fund and Perpetual Care, which has \$12,000.

The President presented an Order appropriating the sum of \$20,000 from the Tinker Fund to the Department of Public Services, Cemetery Expenses.

On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Barrett it was VOTED: to refer to the Mayor's Office.

Councilor Barrett noted it was important to preserve Hillside Cemetery, since it is the only cemetery divided by a highway.

On motion of Councilor Barrett, duly seconded by Councilor Harpin it was VOTED: to set the Public Hearing for April 9th at 7:30pm.

Edward Morandi, 722 West Shaft Road asked the Mayor to please find out who is in charge of the Tinker Fund and exactly how much money is in the fund.

Councilor Barrett said these were all good people but I'm bothered that some people were left out.

The Mayor noted all the adjustments that have been made are rewarding people who are taking on additional responsibilities and who have been under paid for years.

Councilor Marden, chairman of the Finance Committee, Councilors Blackmer and Bond read the budget for approval.

TOTAL FOR GENERAL GOVERNMENT \$1,210,857.00.

On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Bond it was VOTED: to approve General Government as presented, with Councilor Barrett opposed.

TOTAL FOR PUBLIC SAFETY \$4,583,106.00.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Bond it was VOTED: to approve Public Safety as presented, with Councilor Barrett opposed.

TOTAL FOR PUBLIC SERVICES \$3,062,924.00.

On motion of Councilor Bond, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to approve Public Services as presented, with Councilor Barrett Opposed.

TOTAL FOR SCHOOL DEPARTMENT \$15,890,000.00.

Councilor Barrett motioned that \$150,000 be reduced in the salary account, seconded by Councilor Bona. Councilor Barrett said the Superintendent salary is going from \$121,000.00 to \$123,000.00 at a time when we are cutting. The School Committee could replace it with funds from its School Choice account.

The Mayor noted this was a step increase for the Superintendent.

Councilor Barrett claimed the net school spending was wrong and the district was \$200,000 over amount required.

After much discussion Councilor Barrett moved the question.

Council President called for a roll call vote on moving the question, yea Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Bond, Breen, Harpin, Marden. Nay Councilor Bloom, Bona, Bullett.

On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Bond it was VOTED: to adopt the Ordinance.

Councilor Barrett motioned that PT-1B, reserve police officers be amended to \$115.00 per diem + 6.00 differential for shifts B and C, duly seconded by Councilor Marden.

The Mayor said this is an administrative decision and he would be bringing the reserve police officers in when he settles with the police union. I have no idea how we can work this into the budget and what impact it would have at this time.

Councilor Breen said it is not only the reserve police who put their lives on the line, everyone does. This is very arbitrary and it is not our roll as Councilors.

Councilor Breen asked if there is money for this increase. The Mayor answered "no", could it work "yes".

Councilor Barrett said it is our job to act on recommendations and we do have the right. The last time the reserve officers had an increase was in July 2009, they are not part of the union.

Councilor Blackmer agreed and does not want to see them get lost in the shuffle and they should be considered, I will continue to advocate for them.

Council President suggested Council consider a salary increase for the Mayor, currently the Mayor's salary is \$84,470 and it has not changes for several years. I would respectfully propose the increase effective January 1, 2014 to be \$88,693. This is reflective of a 5% increase or \$4,223 to the current salary for the Mayor. Funding this increase for a half year would be \$2,111.

Consideration for the increase died without a motion. Councilor Marden said he supported giving the Mayor a raise but did not think the Council should be changing line items. Councilor Breen noted the Mayor has said at

the finance committee meetings that he did not want a raise, but perhaps giving him a basket of cookies would be nice, since he like cookies.

The Ordinance, as amended, was ordained by yea and nay vote as follows: yea Councilor Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Harpin, Marden. Nay Councilor Barrett.

He noted his daughter Elizabeth came in seconded for the 8th grade, as well as 4 other students from Brayton and Greylock School. Councilor Bond thanked everyone involved in the three day event of Wilco. Councilor Bullett thanked the Public Safety Committee for a job well done on Wilco weekend. President thanked the Finance Committee for their hard work on the FY'14 budget. The Mayor noted that the \$500.00 for the City Sister was not cut from the budget.

The President called for anyone wishing to speak in Open Forum, Roger Eurbin, 677 Ashland Street responded to a recent comment about Hillsdie Cemetery. The cemetery is making progress and there is a plan, it just takes time and the weather has not been on our side.

A meeting of the North Adams City Council was held at 7:30pm in City Council Chambers with the following present:

COUNCILORS PRESENT: Barrett, Blackmer, Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, Marden absent Councilor Harpin.

A moment of silent prayer was observed.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The President called for anyone wishing to speak in Hearing of Visitors hearing none he moved to the next item on the agenda.

The President called for the approval of the minutes from the meeting of June 26th.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Bond it was VOTED: to approve the minutes as presented.

11,310 The President presented an Ordinance amending Chapter 13, Article VI entitled Parking Meters, Section 13-58 Parking meter zones, which was passed to a second reading and publish as required by law at the meeting of June 26th.

communities. Councilor Blackmer said that most communities charge and some like Adams charge as much as a dollar an hour. The committee did not take a survey of other communities. On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Marden it was VOTED: to confirm the appointment.

Councilor Barrett objected to the appointment. He felt that Joseph Gniadek had done a great job for the City and should not be replaced. Councilor Breen also agreed that Joseph Gniadek, who had been her teacher, had served the City well but that Lynette Bond is qualified for the job. She has felt, since being on the Council, that it is good to have new people on the boards. Councilor Bona stated that several people have not been reappointed on the Planning Board when their term has expired. When any new administration takes over it is not uncommon to have new people appointed to the boards, a 50/50 mix of new and old can be an asset to the City. The Mayor feels that Lynette Bond will be an asset to the board. The Mayor noted that Councilor Barrett had been correct at the last meeting that the Ordinance states that it is a five year term therefore changing the expiration date to February 1, 2018. Councilor Blackmer said that she has always felt that if positions are becoming available in the City that the public should be made aware of them. Councilor Breen moved the question.

Councilor Blackmer withdrew her original motion, seconded by Councilor Marden.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Bona it was VOTED: to confirm the appointment as amended with Councilor Barrett opposed and Councilor Bond abstaining.

Councilor Barrett strongly objected to the Mayor's order allowing the City's Redevelopment Authority to hire an outside attorney to represent the City during negotiations to privatize Western Gateway Heritage State Park. He questioned why it has taken a year since the RFP had been awarded for negotiations to begin and where the MassWorks grant funds had gone. The Mayor said the funds for the MassWorks Grant were recalled by Gov. Patrick prior to the end of the fiscal year with the promise of being released after the state budget was finalized. The negotiations were just beginning now as the NADT had secured a significant amount of investors to finance their proposal. Councilor Barrett told the Mayor he was not trying to delay the project, he was trying to stop, it he does not believe it is in the best interest of the City. Councilor Barrett agreed with Councilor Breen that the City Solicitor's affiliation with the interested parties in the negotiation has come into question before. Councilor Barrett asked why nothing has been done in over a year. He wanted to know why no other company or organization was given the option of developing the park only the North Adams Development Trust Inc. Councilor Breen said she felt that a separate lawyer should be hired and that if Councilor Barrett feels that something unethical is going on as he said he should report it to the Ethics Commission. Councilor Marden felt there was no need for the acceptance of this order. Councilor Blackmer said it is common practice to use this chapter of the law.

The Order was adopted by yea and nay vote as follows: yea Councilor Bloom, Bona, Bond, Breen, Bullett, nay Councilor Barrett, Blackmer, Marden.

11,320 The President presented a Communication submitted by Councilor Bond regarding traffic on North Street.

On motion of Councilor Bond, duly seconded by Councilor Bullett it was VOTED: to refer to the Public Safety Committee.

Councilor Bona as a resident of North Street said that the speeding on North Street has been an ongoing problem and that the law states 30 miles an hour in a residential area. A speed sign had been placed on a lawn on North Street and that the Traffic Commission has been assessing the problem. Councilor Blackmer also has been approached about the speeding on North Street. Councilor Bullett as a person who walks in this area would like to see something done. The Mayor said that the North Street neighborhood is being looked at by the City with concerns about stop signs and children playing signs. Councilor Blackmer said she would like to see the Traffic Commission meet more often to address the speeding issues in the City.

John Mucha, government relations representative for Time Warner spoke to the Council on changes from analogue to digital.

All Councilor's had questions and concerns for Mr. Mucha, concerning the networks and programming.

Dear Honorable Members:

Tonight you will be voting on establishing the CIP shift which sets the percentages of tax levy of the different classes of property; residential as well as commercial, industrial and personal property (CIP).

Within the attached tax package, you will find all pertinent information as to process, valuations, tax rates and tax levies, (current and historic). As in past years, I will review the information and the City Assessor and Administrative Officer will be available at the meeting to aid in answering any questions.

Based on factored assumptions, the FY2014 tax levy will be \$14,434,111, an increase in levy of 5.37% over FY2013 which represents the legislated 2.5% increase plus new growth of \$393,604. I am recommending that we maintain the CIP shift at 1.71. The increase in rates (per \$1000 valuation) is as follows:

- Residential from \$15.30 to \$15.93
 (A \$91.95 increase on the average single family home valued at \$135,833)
- CIP from \$33.95 to \$34.55

As we establish this CIP shift tonight, we are assuring our community that we will be able to provide services at acceptable levels. Unfortunately and despite best efforts, we have not fully reduced our deficit and will be asking for reductions in the budget to set these rates. This will set us up for yet another challenging FY2015 budget cycle.

I respectfully ask for your support of this tax package.

The Mayor explained that based on assumptions the FY'14 tax levy will be \$14,434,111 an increase in levy of 5.37% over FY'13 which represents the legislated 2.5% increase plus new growth of \$393,604. He is recommending that the CIP shift at 1.71, residential from \$15.30 to \$15.93 an increase of \$91.95 on the average family home valued at \$135,833. The CIP \$33.95 to \$34.55.

Mark Trottier, 131 Woodlawn Avenue was opposed to the tax rate, and raised several questions on the appropriations, which he was informed would be answered when the paper comes to the floor. Mr. Trottier questioned the purpose of the Public Hearing if questions could not be answered during this time. Councilor Barrett explained to Mr. Trottier that state if he is in favor or opposed and his reasons, then his questions would be addressed when the paper is put forth. The Mayor noted he would address any question Mr. Trottier has brought forth and answer them when the paper comes to the floor. Mr. Trottier stated he was opposed to the tax rate and had many concerns.

Councilor Barrett said he was in favor of the dual tax, but at the same time I'm opposed to the CIP shift. The shift only creates further hardship to the residents.

Councilor Barrett said what bothers him is the Mayor says there is a budget deficit, there is not a budget deficit it's a structural deficit. How will emergencies be paid for? The Scanlon report said the City cannot continue to keep spending. Councilor Barrett said the Scanlon report recommended to cut spending and increase revenue.

The Mayor said we have cut spending and raised revenue through taxes, fees and State Aid. We should not be here debating the budget, but how we are going to fund it. We do not have much left in reserves, but we have a very tight handle on expenditures. I'm very nervous about those emergencies that may come up. Several Councilors had questions on the budget reduction, which were all answered by Michael Canales, Ross Vivori and David Fierro who were at the meeting to answer questions.

11,344 The President presented an Order imposing a Moratorium for Medical Marijuana Facilities, which was referred to the Community Development Committee at the meeting of December 10th.

Councilor Bond Chairman of the Community Development Committee gave a verbal report.

On motion of Councilor Marden, duly seconded by Councilor Blackmer it was VOTED: to accept the verbal committee report.

On motion of Councilor Bond, duly seconded by Councilor Breen it was VOTED: to file the Order.

The President presented Mayor's communication #43 recommending the appointment of James Neville to the North Adams Housing Authority to fill the unexpired term of James Canavan to expire July 1, 2014.

On motion of Councilor Blackmer, duly seconded by Councilor Bond it was VOTED: to confirm. Councilor Barrett asked the Mayor if the tenant position had been filed yet. The Mayor said he has not, he was trying to find a good fit. Councilor Barrett urged the Mayor to fill the tenant's position to the North Adams Housing Authority as quickly as possible.

The President called for any Councilor Concerns, Councilor Harpin thanked the community for the support for the last 16 years. The Mayor also thanked all City staff for their services. Councilor Blackmer read citations from Senator Downing for Councilor Harpin, Marden and Bloom. Councilor Bloom also thanked everyone for their support.

The President called for anyone wishing to speak in Open Forum, Mark Trottier, 131 Woodlawn Avenue thanked Council President, Councilor Marden and Harpin for their willingness to work with him. With no further business to come before the Council a motion to adjourn was in order.
