

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Great Lakes Athletic Club purchase


Building a strong wellness, athletic and social community

On December 21st, 2023, Orion Township acquired ownership of Great Lakes Athletic Club (better known as GLAC). This ownership transfer occurred just before the business's 20th birthday—something that might resonate as bittersweet to longtime members and employees. But the fact that the GLAC survived a near quarter century, enduring both a recession and pandemic, is something Orion Township is not taking for granted. Rather, the Township's goal as the athletic club's

> new owner is to continue cultivating that which upheld GLAC the past two decades: its

> > community.

The Township will take the time throughout 2024 to strategically integrate the existing assets





Orion Township envisions creating a welcoming space that not only preserves the existing GLAC community but also expands it to accommodate more members from the Orion area. New opportunities include a venue for community events, a super-voting precinct for elections, and dedicated spaces for youth for enhanced or new partnerships with public and private agencies, including

library services, healthcare, athletics, and public transportation. New programming could include indoor leagues and the return of youth summer camp. The Township's insight from and collaboration with the professional consultant throughout this year will better guide and define these opportunities.



Business as usual for now

In the meantime, GLAC is open and available to the community! Residents and non-residents can purchase daypasses or monthly/annual memberships to utilize the club for fitness and athletic services. Right now, the Township's goal is to provide continuity in GLAC services to members and staff, while also showcasing the club's offerings and amenities to the community at large. Some of these services include:

Personal Training and Group Fitness.

Group fitness is included with paid memberships. Personal training is open to both members and non-members and discounted to members. Additionally, many of GLAC's group fitness classes, such as Circuit, Cadence, TRX, Kettlebell, Stretch & Roll, and more, are taught by personal trainers. The class schedule also features Yoga, Cycle, water aerobics (Aqua Mix), Barre, Zumba, and other popular workout formats for



members of all fitness levels and athletic abilities. The Township will also continue to offer special group training programs through the athletic club, such as Martial Arts, the FiT program for women, and Junior Trak Club.

Swim Programming (available to the public): Swim101 is partnering with the Township to offer swim lessons (discounted for members!), swim team, and Masters swim programs to the community.

Standard & Co. Café (open to the public). Standard & Co. is one of the community's newest restaurants. As a veteran-owned small business, their core value of service is transparent in every customer they serve and every event they host. Standard and Co. offers a variety of delicious smoothies, wraps, soups, and coffee.

Investing in enhancements

While GLAC will continue to operate at status quo during this planning period, the Township will invest in facility improvements and programming additions in order to bring operations above their existing condition. Some of these smaller steps include refurbishing lighting in the indoor pool, fixing inoperable equipment and amenities, revising dated policies, restoring paused amenities (such as the rock wall), and transitioning website content over to OrionParks.com. The Township is committed to purposeful and impactful improvements now and in the future.



While the plan is ambitious, the Township is working diligently and deliberately to create a broader health and wellness, athletic, and social community built upon GLAC's foundation of premier fitness. Together, the combined team is poised to deliver a vibrant and



Natural Resources Specialist Conner Reiter

Leading Orion's green transformation

In the heart of Orion Township, a new steward has emerged to guide the community towards a greener, more sustainable future. Conner Reiter, with years of dedicated service to the Township, has recently assumed the role of Natural Resource Specialist (a new position within the Township), bringing a wealth of experience and passion for environmental conservation.

Reiter's journey with the Township began in 2014 as a seasonal parks employee, evolving into a full-time Park Maintenance Worker in 2016. His commitment and dedication to the community were recognized when he transitioned to the role of Natural Resources Specialist in August 2023.

Beyond his daily responsibilities, Reiter actively participates in the Oakland County CISMAs (Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas) Steering Committee and the Paint Creek Trailways Commission, showcasing his commitment to broader environmental initiatives.



A deep Orion connection

A true Orion local, Reiter spent his formative years in Berkley before returning to Orion and Independence Townships. Having attended Lake Orion Community Schools, his deep connection to the community has only strengthened over the years, both personally and professionally. Currently residing in the City of Grand Blanc, Reiter shares his home with two feline companions, Kitty and Brynn.

Reiter's personal interests extend beyond his professional domain. An avid kitchen enthusiast, he enjoys crafting delicious meals. In his free time, you can find him at the gym, engaged in mountain biking, hiking, and playing tennis and basketball.

When asked about his favorite spot in the Township, he emphatically points to Camp Agawam, a park he has been instrumental in developing since the Township acquired it.

"I love the natural beauty of this park with all its trails and the disc golf course that I helped plan and establish," said Reiter.

Camp Agawam features a trail system, public access beach, disc golf, playground, and a rich history with the Boy Scouts.


Reiter sheds light on his background and the driving forces behind his passion for natural resource management.

"I have always been interested in nature and our relationship with it," he said. "I grew up spending countless hours in the woods. While most kids were interested in cartoons, I spent my free time watching the Science Channel, Discovery Channel, and History Channel, learning as much as I could."

His fascination with nature and a childhood spent in the woods shaped his career path, leading him to pursue certifications as an ISA (International Society of Arboriculture) Certified Arborist and a Michigan State Extension Foundations of Gardening Certificate. He enjoys gardening and has an interest in Permaculture and sustainable garden design.

"I've always had a fascination with plants, whether it was helping my dad in the garden or collecting and caring for indoor plants—I currently have over 50!" said Reiter.





Environmental challenges

As the Natural Resource Specialist, Reiter envisions utilizing his skills to "restore habitats, implement sustainable garden designs, and improve, grow, and diversify our urban forests to create unique and interesting green spaces for everyone to enjoy."

Recognizing the environmental challenges facing the Township, Reiter emphasizes the importance of tackling invasive species. His plans involve developing comprehensive management strategies for our parks and educating the community about the threats posed by various species and how to manage them and restore vital native habitats and ecosystems.

To achieve these goals, Reiter plans to collaborate with local organizations and community groups, including Oakland County Natural Resources and the Oakland County CISMAs to help restore native habitats. Community engagement initiatives such as Green Up and other volunteer projects, like tree plantings and composting, are set to play a crucial role in promoting environmental initiatives.

Reiter believes "it's important for Orion Township to lead by example. If we develop our parks and green spaces with a sustainable mindset while also providing education opportunities to the community through educational signage in our parks to social media outreach and workshops will ultimately create a ripple effect where residents adopt similar sustainable practices."

A clear vision for the future

Looking ahead, Reiter envisions Orion Township as a haven of green spaces with expanded urban forests, sustainable landscapes, and restored vital native habitats.

When asked if there are any specific educational workshops or programs he would like to implement, Reiter stated "I would love to see workshops and programs that focused on composting, how to plant and care for trees, planting pollinator gardens, how to identify and manage invasive species, bee hotels, and non-native landscaping alternatives."

Through community engagement, he hopes to inspire a collective effort towards environmental stewardship that extends beyond the township's borders.

As spring approaches, Reiter offers valuable advice to homeowners, encouraging the selection of native plants to support local pollinators and wildlife. Insects and animals rely on those plants for survival. He advocates for the careful planting of keystone trees, emphasizing the importance of establishing soft landings around them to support the native habitat.

Conner Reiter's appointment as Orion Township's Natural Resource Specialist signals a promising era for environmental conservation in the community. With his expertise, passion, and a clear vision for the future, the Township is poised for a green transformation under his dedicated leadership.

Be a voter in the know

Election dates

Many poll workers are needed; join the team.

The clerk's office is always hiring good people to work on Election Day. This is a paid position and all training is provided. Visit the Orion Township Election website for information and an application. It's a great service to the community and a wonderful way to learn firsthand about voting on Election Day.

Keep your Voter Registration Information up to date

Be sure to update your voter registration information when your residential address, phone number or email address changes. The clerk's office uses phone numbers and emails to contact voters when there is a question about voter registration information, absent voter application, or absent voter ballot. If we can't reach you, the form or information is returned to voters using the postal service. It is much quicker if we can reach you by phone or email.

Your voter registration information can be viewed at Michigan.gov/Vote, along with sample ballots for each election.

Voter Registration signatures: That's how we know it's you!

When a voter signs their Absent Voter Application, Absent Voter Ballot and even a Candidate Nomination Petition, the written signature is validated against the voter registration signature, which is the same as your driver's license or personal identification card signature. Signatures are one of the ways clerks verify voters. When signing voter forms, use the same signature as is on your driver's license. Otherwise the clerk's office will contact the voter to come into the office to ensure signatures sufficiently match.

How Proposal 22-2 election changes affect you

Early Voting

Voters have the right to cast a ballot in person nine days prior to Election Day.

Days: Early voting is open nine (9) consecutive days beginning on the second Saturday before the election and ending on the Sunday before the election.

Time: Early voting is 8:30 am to 4:30 pm except Thursday when the hours are noon to 8 pm.

Locations: Regional Site: Orion Township Municipal Complex, 2323 Joslyn Road, Lake Orion, and Central Site: Waterford Oaks Activity Center, 2800 Watkins Lake Road, Waterford,.

Permanent Mail Ballot List

Please note this is different from the previous Permanent Absent Voter Ballot Application List where you received an application for each election to request a ballot for that election only. If you sign up to be on the Permanent Mail Ballot list you will automatically receive an absent voter ballot, by mail, for every election.

You will need to notify us of your temporary address. Keep in mind that ballots are not permitted to be forwarded with the mail.



Landscape advice from a local pro

Create a beautiful outdoor space with native plantings

Using native plantings in a landscape can have many benefits for both the environment and the overall aesthetic of your yard.

First, native plants are naturally adapted to the local climate and soil conditions, making them much easier to maintain and more resilient to pests and disease. This means that you will likely spend less time and money on watering and fertilizing, and you'll be able to enjoy a lush and healthy garden for years to come.

In addition to being low-maintenance, native plantings can also be an important way to support local wildlife. This can help to create a sense of connection to the local landscape and the environment, which can be an important aspect of creating a beautiful and meaningful outdoor space.

Time to set out your yard waste

Yard Waste pick up begins April 1. Place your yard waste at the curb on your regular collection day. You may use brown bags, a purchased Orion Township rolling cart, or existing cans marked with a "yard waste" or "compost" sticker. Additional compost stickers are available at the Department of Public Services counter at Township Hall or at the Orion Center.

There is no limit to how much yard waste may be set out each week. Yard waste includes the following items:

- Lawn debris
- · Grass clippings
- Weeds
- Leaves
- Small twigs
- Prunings
- Shrub clippings (tied and bundled)
- Food scraps such as: fruits and vegetables, nuts and seeds, bread and grains, pasta, eggshells & coffee grounds (No meat!)
- Old potting soil
- Halloween pumpkins
- Dirt incidental to minor plantings or edging of lawns
- Brush
- Tree branches and logs (less than 3 inches in diameter and less than 4 feet long) tied or secured with string or twine in bundles less than 18 inches in diameter
- Tree trimmings
- Small shrubs and bushes with direct removal from root systems

Keeping your drinking water safe

Cross connection control, backflow testing and inspections ensure Orion's water supply is not contaminated

Orion Township's Water & Sewer
Division is responsible for providing safe
drinking water to Township residents
and businesses. State and Federal
laws (Safe Drinking Water Acts), the
Plumbing Code, Michigan Residential
Code, and the Charter Township of
Orion Ordinances require the Township
to verify that cross connections on
private plumbing systems do not pose a
contamination risk to the public water
system through the enforcement of the
Michigan Department of Environmental
Quality (MDEQ) Law and Rules for
Cross Connection Control.

What is a cross connection?

A cross connection is any arrangement of piping on a plumbing system that could allow a backflow of contaminates into the public drinking water supply. A backflow occurs when a reversal of the normal flow of water occurs. This could happen due to a drop in water pressure

Are you moving?

If you are moving out of Orion Township, call 248–391–0304 ext. 8500 to schedule a final water/ sewer bill. Have this information available:

- ✓ Property address
- ✓ Date of closing
- ✓ New owner's name
- ✓ Name and address, or email address, of title company

from a water main break or other failure. It also could occur when a plumbing fixture, such a boiler or pump, generates more pressure than the public water supply and pushes the water back to the public drinking water supply system. Garden hoses and irrigation systems may contain pesticides and bacteria that could contaminate the water supply.

What is a Backflow Device?

Backflow Devices are installed on water lines to prevent backflows from occurring. There are many types of backflow devices and MDEQ requires testing of these devices at a minimum of every three years. Testable devices include Pressure Vacuum Breakers (PVB), Reduced Pressure Principle Backflow Assemblies (RPZ), and Double Check Valve Assemblies (DCVA)

Testing and inspections of Backflow Devices

Orion Township's Cross Connection Control Program was approved by the State of Michigan in 1991. Since then, commercial properties and subdivision irrigation accounts have had routine inspections of backflow devices and annual reports are submitted to the township on testable devices. However, a new MDEQ mandate requires all testable backflow devices on residential homes be tested every three years.

A typical testable backflow device you will find on a residential property will be a Pressure Vacuum Breaker (PVB) installed on a lawn irrigation line. This



device will be on the outside of the home and designed to prevent pesticides or herbicides from entering the water system.

Beginning in 2019, Orion Township requires all testable backflow devices in residential properties be tested every three years. If your residence is required to test in 2024, you will receive a notification letter from Orion Township.

Only Licensed Plumbing Contractors can test, repair, and install Backflow Assemblies pursuant to State of Michigan Law—Public Act 733 (State Plumbing Act) of 2002. Further, effective January 1, 2018, the plumbing contractors must be ASSE 5110 certified through the State of Michigan. If a new backflow device is being installed, or a repair is needed, a plumbing permit must be applied for through the Building Department.

We appreciate everyone's help and cooperation abiding with the MDEQ mandate. The Township and all residents share the responsibility of protecting the water supply, and together we can ensure we have the safest possible water supply system.

A list of ASSE certified testers is available at oriontownship.org under the Department of Public Services tab.

Blue dots mark curb boxes

Why is there a blue dot on your lawn? Annually, the DPS crew works to locate curb boxes. In doing so, the curb box is marked with a blue dot and then marked on a GPS mapping system. The DPS crew members also check to make sure the curb box valve is operational. This way, if an emergency occurs, the curb box can be located quickly, and water can be turned off immediately.

Be prepared for spring storms

Having good information about water safety could help your family get through a nasty storm or other emergency situation.

Store at least one gallon of water, per person per day, for emergency purposes. Consider storing a two-week supply of water in clean plastic, glass, fiberglass or enamel-lined metal containers. Never use a container that has had a toxic substance in it. Make sure containers are sealed tightly and store them in a cool, dry space. You should also rotate your backup water supply every six months.

If a water main break occurs, you may be without water for a period of time. A. A "Boil Water Alert" may be issued when the purity of the water in the lines is questioned. The water should be brought to a rolling boil for five minutes. Let the water cool, then pour it back and forth between two clean containers to add air for improved taste. The water will then be safe for cooking and drinking purposes.

If your water service is completely lost for an extended period of time, there are sources of water within your home that are safe for consumption. Water in the pipes of your home can be drained and used. You can also access the water in your hot water tank in an emergency situation. Begin by making sure the electricity and gas are shut off. Open the drain at the bottom of the hot water tank and turn off the cold—water intake at the top of the tank. If there is a hot water faucet, turn it on, and the water should begin draining. When your water service is restored, fill the tank back up. Do not turn the electricity or gas back on when the tank is empty, wait until the tank is full—otherwise you could damage your hot water tank.

Follow these summer watering restrictions

Each year from May through September, a mandatory watering restriction applies to residents connected to Orion Township water who have an automatic sprinkling system.

Monday through Saturday: Water only between midnight and 5 am.

Sunday: Watering may be done at any time.

No watering may be done between 5 and 10 am, Monday through Saturday. If these restrictions are not followed, your water service could be discontinued.

If you are connected to Orion Township water but do not have an automatic sprinking system—meaning you water your lawn from a hose—please water your lawn between 10 am and 4 pm, Monday through Saturday.

Lake Orion History

Tracking the Polly Ann's railway past

What was the Polly Ann Trail before it became the scenic pathway we know today? This well-kept nature trail was once a bustling railway.

In the late 1800s, railroading was the future of transportation. Before that, dirt and gravel roads made travel dirty, slow,

from Pontiac to the rich timber in Michigan's thumb area. John T. Stanton, an Oxford doctor, and James Ashley, a Toledo investor, started planning this line in 1879. It was named the Pontiac, Oxford and Port

causing delayed deliveries. There was a desperate need for a rail line Austin.

The last train service was on February 9, 1984. The Grand Trunk sold the line to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Along with a federal grant in 1993, the final purchase (\$728,000, or \$1.5 million today) from Grand Trunk was made. The trail today is run by a council and trail manager Linda Moran. Her passion and get-it-done attitude have brought positive energy to our historic trailway.

Unfortunately, in 1881 a large fire devasted the thumb area, taking out 2000 square miles of trees. The land was cleared for farming. The first passenger train left Pontiac for Caseville in 1883. This line struggled to be profitable. In 1888 Hugh Porter bought the line for \$600,000 (equal to \$19.3 million today). He renamed it Pontiac, Oxford, Northern, abbreviated to P.O. & N. The name Polly Ann derived from these initials. It was named that due to its delays, questionable service, and breakdowns.

In 1909, Grand Trunk Western took over the line. There were never enough passengers for the line but fertile farmland in the area provided ample wheat, sugar beets and beans for rail transportation.

In the 1930s, Oxford had one of the largest gravel mines and was the source of carloads for Grand Trunk Western. This regular job was known as the "mud run." The gravel was used for road construction and runways at Selfridge Air Force Base in Macomb County. At its peak in the 1950s, a man assigned the "gravel extra" meant 16 straight hours of railway duty. In 1955 the line was freight only and was nicknamed the "poor, old and neglected." It was always the last line to receive maintenance.

It's construction season in Orion

A trio of major road construction projects is set to begin this spring and summer that will affect many commuters' daily routes. As we gear up for another season filled with orange barrels, let's dive into the details of the upcoming projects.

Brown, Giddings, and Silverbell Roads

Scope: 2.8 miles of pavement removal and replacement, road widening, right turn-lane enhancements, new traffic signals, and more.

Timeline: Spring to Fall 2024 (dates to be announced)

Traffic Impact: Access to businesses maintained at all times. One lane open in each direction, except for specific closures detailed below.

Road Closures: Brown Road, east of Giddings Road: A temporary closure for several hundred feet during the initial stage with a signed detour. Giddings Road, north of Silver Bell Road: A temporary closure for several hundred feet during the second stage with a signed detour.

Baldwin / Clarkston Road Roundabout

Cost: Approximately \$3.2 million (Federal funds, Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC), and Orion Township dollars)

Scope: Roundabout construction, ADA-compliant crosswalks, HAWK pedestrian signals, storm sewer improvements, decorative concrete, curbs, intersection lighting, and utility relocation (starting winter 2023).

Timeline: Dates to be Announced (anticipated to begin after school releases for summer break)

Traffic Impact: Intersection closure during construction.

Detour: Indianwood Road to Joslyn Road to Waldon Road to Baldwin Road, and vice versa.

Waldon Road, Baldwin to Clintonville Road

Cost: \$14.7 million (Federal dollars, RCOC, Independence Township, Orion Township, and Oakland County)

Scope: Paving, roundabout construction, curve realignment, culvert replacements, pathway construction, stream improvements, tree removals, utility relocation, and peat bog removal.

Phase I (2023): June 16 to Mid-November completed

Phase 2 (2024): Start Date: To be announced

Expected Completion: To be announced

Closure: Yes, access to homes and businesses maintained at all times.

Detour: To be announced

These projects promise a more efficient and better commuting experience once completed. The community's patience and cooperation during this period will undoubtedly contribute to the success of these essential projects, ensuring a brighter future for Orion Township's roadways.





Instructor Profile: Master Floyd Soo

Martial Arts teaching and training spans decades

Master Floyd Soo began his Martial Arts training as a young boy in the mid-60s. He and sister Annie began with Judo lessons; and after a year or so, started their training in Moo Duk Kwan Tang Soo Do in Royal Oak, Michigan, when the karate club opened up a few blocks from their home.

Their first instructor was Dale Drouillard, a 3rd Dan Black Belt at the time. Master Drouillard is now a 9th Dan and is still actively teaching Tang Soo Do in the Detroit area.

In the mid-70s, Masters Floyd and Annie moved to Kalamazoo, Michigan to attend Western Michigan University. There, they met Mike March, a 3rd Dan Black Belt at the time. Once they watched a class or two taught by Master March (now a 6th Dan Black Belt), Masters Floyd and Annie knew they had found a new home.

From the mid-70s to the present, Masters Floyd, Annie and Vince are still training with Master March. He demanded the highest standards in technique, speed, power, skill, courage and honor from his students, just like Masters Drouillard and Shim did.

The United States Korean Karate Association was formed just a few short years after they (Master Vince too) all met in Kalamazoo. As anyone who has trained in the USKKA knows, these standards have not been compromised in any way, even three decades later!

Master Floyd Soo now teaches and trains in the Clarkston, Waterford, Lake Orion area, while Masters March, Soo-Mott and Soo are still training and teaching in the Kalamazoo area.





Modernization of the laws in Michigan which regulate community media funding and the preservation of our public rights of way, is needed. ONTV is helping lead this fight to preserve community media across our state. Without action in 2024, ONTV and community television could go dark.

Passion, fun and love of learning

Media Specialists use reading, technology, experiences to nurture lifelong learners

Each winter, Lake Orion Community Schools middle school students embark on a unique journey.

With reading as their guide, the students who choose to participate in the Battle of the Books begin in November by receiving a list of books to read and highlight, absorbing even the smallest details.

Creating teams within their schools, the students begin to quiz each other on trivia from the four titles. Each team develops an identity and connected costume, building to the February morning event when they compete against other LOCS middle school teams with multiple choice and short answer questions about the common books for a trophy.

The competition and celebration is one of the year's middle school highlights, now in its 21st year.

"It's a great experience," Waldon middle school media specialist Kevin Kast

explained at the 2023 event. "They spend a lot of time digging into the books, finding out and understanding what the book is all about."

The Battle reflects the dynamic nature of the Lake Orion Community Schools media program.

At all three levels (elementary, middle and high school), media specialists in each school work to create a creative experience for students in the evolving media landscape.

That was reflected in 2022, when Scripps Middle School media specialist Rebecca Lowe received the Michigan Association for Media in Education School Librarian of the Year Award.

"There's so much room to grow any program," Lowe said at the time. "You've got to have passion, you've got to have a love, you've got to realize you're creating all of these incredible opportunities for students. But you've got to have fun doing it too."

That commitment is reflected in all the media specialists throughout the district, bringing wonderful opportunities to the Dragons.

Elementary

With reading as the foundation of students' school education, creating a love of books begins at the elementary level.

The lower elementary focus is on a love of literature, with many read-aloud sessions, introducing them to authors and illustrators and how books are organized in the library and how to find them, along with introducing various technology skills.

The upper elementary students focus heavier on the technology skills, with students gaining access to their Microsoft 365 accounts in 3rd grade. Learning the apps within these accounts, as well as conducting research, creating multimedia presentations, and discussing digital citizenship are all a part of the media classes. Reading and books remain a strong part of the program and support reading skills that the students have already acquired. With impressive classroom libraries, they've developed that passion for books

already and the media specialists are enhancing it through

read-alouds and collections that appeal to elementary-aged students.

Both groups learn about coding at the appropriate developmental level, with the youngest students doing block coding with apps and programmable cars, and the older elementary students using small robots.





LOCS district media chair Jeannine Crissman is the longtime media specialist at Carpenter Elementary and helped guide the elementary curriculum created eight years ago.

Because elementary media specialists receive a full class multiple times each week, they can extend a topic over the course of weeks or a month.

Much of the elementary experience is being exposed to new processes and opportunities and refining those skills before entering middle school.

For Crissman, that means connecting with the classroom teacher and helping them use technology features while also imparting those skills to the upper elementary classes when they visit for a specials period. She'll ask the teacher about the current class lesson focus and impart that into the technology lesson using PowerPoint, Sway or Canva.

"That collaboration makes it more meaningful," Crissman said.

Each of the elementary schools received a refreshed media center space (or entirely new with the new Blanche Sims Elementary school,) providing an area more conducive for learning, as well as a media productions area.

Media productions is the next step as part of the district initiative to lean into media and technology.

The pilot for the elementary media productions is being led by Stadium Drive

media specialist Dan Dabrowski, who has students volunteering to be part of the morning announcements a few times each week.

The students have video interviews, reports and segments they produce and Dabrowski helps them put it together to air in each classroom in the morning. As the weeks progressed from fall to winter, the students began to take more ownership.

With the youngest students growing up with such a handle on technology, handing them the controls of the show with huge screens and dozens of buttons is no problem.

"The real push is for the kids to have the overall control of the announcements, the setup, the broadcast," he said. "It's really trying to empower our kids to have a morning news show. Our high school does an award-winning news show. The kids see that from time to time and just trying to build a platform from the high school down to the elementary schools."

For the students, managing a news show allows them the chance to share their work with the whole school.

"It's really fun to do everything by yourself," said Clara, a Stadium Drive student. "We have a lot of new segments this year. We're trying to make it different than the rest of the years. The rest of the years didn't have current events or three questions."

Students Sofia and Shreeya act as producers and are involved in coordinating the show—most which is designed the day before—and determine the backgrounds, the transitions and helping with scripts.

There is significant opportunity for reading from the media specialist to students as a group and the students reading themselves individually—including school—wide March is Reading Month activities planned by the media specialists — the modern media center is evolving.

"Most kids enjoy looking at a book and enjoying the feel of the paper in their hands but media is so much more than books," Dabrowski said. "In the library we have the opportunity for iPads and coding.

"We work on all realms of media."

Middle School

The middle school media center is often about opportunity.

"It's about literacy, a major component about connecting with their curriculums," said Oakview Middle School media specialist Katherine Montei. "Whether that's digital literacy, whether it's visual literacy, artistic literacy or our traditional reading and writing literacy, we want to be able to connect with all curriculums.

"Whereas in the past we were seen as just a connection to ELA (English Language Arts) ... Now it is so much bigger than that because of the technology focus."

An example came in December when the Hour of Code week, during computer science education week, was held nationwide. In the LOCS middle schools, the goal was to show the students resources they could create on their own or see different types of coding and make that career connection."

The middle school media specialists have a varied role. At times, they provide class



teachers with research and resources to supplement their lessons and other times they find out what the class unit is and offer a few small activities to be conducted by the teacher.

On other occasions, the media specialist teaches the full lesson, using whatever subject that class is experiencing.

The American Library Association curriculum and the International Standards for Technology and Education guide their process as the media lessons are developed, working in parallel to the district curriculum.

Montei and Lowe are among the most respected members of their profession, presenting annually to their colleagues at the state conference.

Each month, there are dozens of projects run by the middle school specialists trying to create a place for

students to feel

comfortable.

The media centers have also become a comfortable alternative location for students.

"We want to offer that opportunity that, if that lunchroom is too loud or too busy, we're the safe space," said Montei, who has a consistent group of 15-20 sixth and seventh graders who prefer being in the media center. "In the morning before school, during lunch, during class time, and after school—it is about making connections with students, about helping to make sure they feel like a part of the library community."

The students lean into their comfort zone, even asking for a knitting club or offering to be a part of the library/media center as assistants.

Between the Battle of the Books, the connection with the Orion Township Public Library, the opportunities are endless. The middle school media centers are as passionate and connected a location as exists in the district, providing a home for many students.

High School

With Lake Orion High School students independent with their education, having classes around the school at different times, with different lengths and locations, the media center is more free flowing.

A few years ago, the media center was rebranded as the Learning Center.

"We want students to know this is a place for learning in all forms," said LOHS media specialist Cathy Srock, in her first year guiding the LC. "Sometimes that's digital learning, sometime that's learning through research sometimes that's learning through collaboration."

The LOHS LC has a variety of different areas, each with a unique purpose.

Books are still there—Srock purchases 5-to-15 new books each week to supplement the collection, including ebooks and audio books—and shares on Instagram with the students a few times each week, offering popular or interesting titles.

Those diverse sections are reflected in the physical layout of the LC space.

funds lead directly to scholarships for senior students at the end of the year. Last year, the funds given out to students totaled \$9,000.

"It's something that gets kids into our LC and we're able to do great things with the money," Srock said.

Srock is assisted in the LC by Greta Bailey, as well as a number of student volunteers to earn service learning hours and occasionally special education students who need work placement hours.

"We want to welcome any student that wants to be in here," Srock said. "We'll find a way for them to be a part of our team."

Though Srock does not teach classes, she offers mini-lessons, such as when she taught AP classes how to use the databases for research.

She seeks to grow the LC in new and innovative ways.

"The top goal is to create an environment where students feel welcome and encouraged," said Srock, in her first year guiding the LC. "They're encouraged to pursue to the love of reading and learning."

District

With the approaches catering to the age-appropriate location for each level, the media centers become a critical supplementary piece in the LOCS student's education.

It provides an introduction at the youngest levels, a connection at the middle levels and a resource for the oldest students.

In LOCS, learning extends beyond the individual classroom teachers.

to come in and watch separate movies at each table for their assignment following their book club books.

The book genres (fiction, non-fiction, bios and memoirs, graphic novels, children's stories, and story collections) ring the outside of the room.

At the far end of the space is the softseating areas where classes can meet in a casual area without desks and mostly large lounge-style chairs and couches.

In the front of the LC, near the circulation desk is a quiet room, where students can work without the noise of

the rest of the LC.

The high-top table area is where a small group of students can eat their lunch and/or teachers can be there when their students are working.

One of the most unusual and appreciated spaces is the café.

Orion Veterans Memorial

HONORING DR. JOSEPH MASTROMATTEO, CHAIRMAN EMERITUS

After more than 30 years, Orion Veterans Memorial Chairman Dr. Joseph Mastromatteo decided in January it was time to step down and pass the torch. With that, he took on another title, one just a token of the great things he has contributed to the Orion Veterans Memorial, located at Odonah and M-24. The board unanimously bestowed him the title of Chairman Emeritus.

Dr. Joe's heart and soul sits on that street corner in one of the most beautiful Memorials around. When he speaks of it, his eyes still twinkle and a smile emerges on his face. Without Dr. Joe's persistence, and a lot of other people's "blood, sweat and tears," that street corner would not be the magnificent piece land it is today. It is a "living memorial."

JoAnn Van Tassel, a community icon in her own right, detailed the history of the memorial: "The Orion Veterans Memorial exists today primarily because of the efforts of one man," Van Tassel wrote, "Dr. Joe Mastromatteo had the vision to create a memorial to veterans and brought it to the Orion Area Chamber. They supported his vision and authorized him to go with the idea. This enthusiasm prompted Leonard Els to do the initial design for the memorial. Dr. Joe's persistence in seeking funds led the Lake Orion American Legion Post 233 and VFW Post 334 to donate the funds to get things started.

When M-24 was widened to five lanes in the early 1990s, Dr. Mastromatteo asked Orion Township to buy the parcel at the northwest corner of M-24 and Odanah, which it did. Others stepped forward to help. Joe Guinn, Sr. and his family did much of the construction work to bring the Memorial to fruition. The sale of bricks provided much needed funds to complete the job. Dr. Mastromatteo's idea to emphasize the family unit as the prime focus of the main monument won out over an eagle or other patriotic symbol. Over the years, hundreds of people and organizations have contributed to the Memorial as the Benefactors Wall shows. However, there never

ensure they were remembered and never forgotten. A veteran himself—he served in the U.S. Army as a dentist—Dr. Joe saw many things that made him a fierce patriot of the United Sates and what our great country stands for. If you talk to him and mention someone else who has worn the uniform, one of his first comments will be, "They are a great patriot." Many have known Dr. Joe. He practiced

every war, conflict, or police action to

dentistry in Lake Orion for many years. His office was located at M-24 across from Atwater. Once you saw it you knew it was his, as the American flag flew proudly over it. We have interacted with many veterans over the years, but you'd be hard pressed to find another veteran who holds patriotism and the American flag as close to their heart as Dr. Joe does. The only thing he holds more dear is the Orion Veterans Memorial.

Thank you, Chairman Emeritus Dr. Joseph Mastromatteo, for all you have provided this little community of Lake Orion, for your contribution and over 30 years of leading the committee who oversees this magnificent Memorial.

We invite the public to stop by and walk through the Orion Veterans Memorial. The bricks you walk on have names of veterans from Lake Orion and surrounding area who served proudly in the Military, some of whom paid the ultimate sacrifice. Also, you will notice the names of many benefactors who have contributed to this beautiful place. We are seeking volunteers to help preserve this beauty, veterans and others who want to honor our veterans by maintaining this piece of land that Dr. Joe envisioned over 30 years ago.


