

Mayor's Message

n addition to the hundreds of thousands of lives lost to the Covid-19 pandemic, millions of families face difficult financial times. The unexpected changes to the household budgets of many across the country will sadly have long-lasting effects.

What families need are steady paychecks and affordable neighborhoods. To do so locally, it is critical that we continue to keep and create good paying jobs for hard working residents. Thankfully, the push for economic development made by the Township Council and myself greatly helps both family budgets and the municipal budget.

Far gone from our Township are the smokestacks of chemical factories. Longtime families like mine remember the Bakelite facility operating around-theclock. Now waning are the use of office parks, and we certainly do not want vacant buildings dotting the Township. The future for our local economy is in state-ofthe-art logistics centers and innovative manufacturing which we continue to attract to our community.

From refrigerators to pharmaceuticals to furniture, products that consumers are ready to order are now shipped to and from Piscataway. From train cars to pizza boxes to N-95 masks, all are now made in Piscataway.

The decisions made by our Township Planning and Zoning boards have helped to make logistics centers and light manufacturing facilities a reality. These boards understand that our zoning decisions and our master plan goals should recognize the changes in our economy. Our land use policies remain proactive.

In addition to the many job opportunities for Piscataway residents, these businesses contribute a lot of commercial revenue to the tax base. In fact, the construction of our \$32 million Piscataway Community Center was fully funded from the tax revenue of these companies. Also because of this influx of new businesses, the Township has had a 12.8 percent lower municipal tax rate for three years in a row. Standard & Poor's kept Piscataway among its high ranked municipalities, again giving the Township its AA+ stable rating, its second highest rating since 2013. In its report, Standard & Poor's stated, "We view the township's management as very strong, with strong financial policies and practices under our financial management assessment methodology, indicating our view that financial practices are strong, well embedded, and likely sustainable."

Standard & Poor's 2020 & 2019 general obligation rating of AA+ stable matches the 2018 upgrade by Moody's of its general obligation rating from Aa2 to Aa1(stable), its second highest rating possible. Let's also remember that Money Magazine named Piscataway to its Top 100 Best Places to Live in America list for the fourth time in 2019.

So, as much of the economy comes undone, many local governments are faced with dire decisions. Like families, a number of municipalities throughout the nation are facing sudden shortfalls. Many towns will "bond out" – in essence, borrow money – to be able to pay for basic services for their residents.

Fortunately for Piscataway, we are not bonding out. Because we successfully attracted several companies that boost our Township revenues, we do not need to borrow money. We are living within our financial means and providing an outstanding level of municipal services and amenities to residents.

A lot of good work happened across Ward 2 last year. We resurfaced sections of Centennial Avenue and S. Randolphville Road, reconstructed Lakeside Drive S., Morris Avenue, Wilkins Drive and Woodland Road.

We also built a new playground at Byrne Park as well as a new setting for the memorial to our local hero Jeffrey R. Byrne who grew up in the Lake Nelson neighborhood. The 19-year-old U.S. Army helicopter pilot died in 1968 serving our country in the Vietnam War and was buried at Beverly National Cemetery.

As many of you know, I continue to be very involved with promoting a better quality of life for our senior citizens. In fact, I have been a member of Middlesex County's Office of Aging and Disability Services for several years.

Though the Piscataway Senior Center has been closed to the public, I am proud that its staff has continued to serve our elderly residents with Meals on Wheels and trips to medical appointments. Once the pandemic ends, we can restart many more of the great programs our Senior Center has such as exercise and art classes as well as guest speakers and holiday parties.

I am especially excited to restart our award winning Computer + Buddy classes where we pair together seniors with volunteer high school and college students to be taught how to use digital technology.

We built the \$32 million facility with no residents' tax monies but instead from the revenue of new businesses we encouraged to move into the Township.

Now, thousands of residents are swimming, running, playing basketball and lifting weights all under one roof. When warmer weather comes we can reopen the Raritan Rapids spray park to children. Moreover, when we can move past the Covid-19 pandemic, I look forward to many more programs and events that we can all enjoy together at our community center.

Meanwhile, our police department continues to enforce the truck ban on River Road. We resurfaced sections of Newark Avenue and Piluso Way and reconstructed sections of Crestwood Street, Evergreen Court, Haywood Avenue, Lynnwood Street, Roosevelt Avenue and Wynnwood Avenue. At Wynnwood Park we installed two pickleball courts as well as a new playground.

We can all look forward to many more improvements such as beginning the first two phases of the planned reconstruction of 2nd Avenue between Crestwood and Elwood streets.

YMCA at the Piscataway Community Center (YPCC)

Last year was challenging to say the least, but in times of struggle, we each had the opportunity to really evaluate and focus on the things that matter most. At the YPCC we have witnessed so many examples of power from the Piscataway community. From our children reconnecting at Camp Lenape to kids and families enjoying Raritan Rapids spray park over the summer, we were reminded that summer is for the kids of all ages as well as kids at heart.

Our doors finally opened to members on October 1st. Our community's health was our paramount concern:

- Each day before checking in, our members need to pass a health screen before entering the building.
- Our branch capacity has been set at 125 people. Members can track facility usage on our webpage or the membership account they created.
- Masks are required at all times inside of the facility.
- Use of locker rooms is prohibited.
- Lap lanes are one swimmer per lane and require a reservation. Reservations can be easily created through your member portal or though the help of our member service staff.
- Family swim times available through reservations.
- We placed a 90-minute limit on all visits to your YPCC.

Even with these safety protocols in place, our community proved we are better when we are able to be together (safely, masked and socially distanced). In fact, on January 8th we welcomed our 3,000th member into our family.

The YPCC has been able to offer our community group fitness training options that help strengthen bodies as well as private and semiprivate swim lessons that teach new skills. We also have a wide array of virtual fitness class options and a fun virtual triathlon series that allows individuals to pick and choose their preferred areas of fitness that motivate, challenge and provide some bragging rights upon completion of each stage. You can also get some awesome YMCA swag that will leave your friends and family envious.

We have been operating our remote learning program throughout the school year. This program has helped alleviate the stress on families who are now working either in the office or at home and challenged with providing educational instruction to their children. As we strengthen young minds, we also are there to help our children stay connected, and most importantly, have fun!

2020 might not have been what we expected but we did learn we are stronger together. The YPCC is excited for the potential 2021 presents us. We will continue to open up new opportunities as we can do under the direction of state and county health departments. Thank you for your support and we cannot wait to see everyone at your YMCA at the Piscataway Community Center.

Piscataway Police Get Tenured Leader Longtime Officer Thomas Mosier Elevated to Rank of Chief for Township Police Department



Thirty years ago, a lifelong Piscataway resident began his law enforcement career in his hometown as a patrol officer. Now three decades later, Thomas Mosier was sworn in as the full Chief of the Piscataway Township Police Department, one year after having been promoted from captain to acting chief.

"Protecting and serving all Piscataway residents continues to be my guiding principle," Chief Mosier said. "The department's good relationship with our Township's diverse residents and several neighborhoods is a testament to the rank and file of our professional and admired police force which I am proud to lead."

During Mosier's storied and successful career, he has also served PTPD as a hostage negotiator with its Emergency Services Unit Crisis Negotiation Team, a sergeant with its Special Victims Unit, a lieutenant in both its Patrol and Traffic Safety divisions, and captain of its Operations Division. Mosier has specialized training from the U.S. Department of Justice in crisis negotiations and holds certifications in counterterrorism from the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

"The Township Council and I congratulate Chief Mosier on his well-deserved promotion which is an expression of the extraordinary confidence and respect that

Piscataway residents have for his leadership," Mayor Brian C. Wahler said. "We are certain that his continued management of our Township police will ensure the lasting and trusting relationship that all residents have in local law enforcement."

Chief Mosier took the helm of PTPD as acting chief in January 2020 upon the retirement of Chief Michael McLaughlin, becoming only the 18th person to lead the department in its 104-year history. In just the past year, PTPD was accredited by the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police (NJSACOP) which looks at many factors when determining accreditation such as department leadership, personnel development, records and financial management, arrest and investigation procedures, weapons training and call responses.



Instead of paper coupons, etc., residents use the new Piscataway Service Card featuring a unique UPC code for DPW services. During the Covid-19 pandemic our municipal offices are closed to the public. For information on acquiring the Service Card, please call the DPW office at (732) 562-2390 during business hours of Mondays-Fridays from 8:30 a.m-12:20 p.m. and 1:30-4:30 p.m. Only checks and credit/debit cards may be used to add funds for grass credits or additional leaf bags to your Service Card. No cash is accepted.

Credits are required for grass disposal and may be purchased in the Public Works Office starting Monday, March 1st, 8:30 a.m.-12:20 p.m. & 1:30-4:30 p.m., and are good for the current year only. Cost: \$1 per credit (minimum purchase) for two credits. The Recycling Center will accept grass dumped from cans or in recyclable bags with credits starting Tuesday, April 6th. Credits will be placed on the service card account when purchased.

Credits are also required for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials. Every year credits will be placed into the account for four trash visits and two curbside pickups. A passenger vehicle requires one credit and a pickup truck requires two credits. Residents must provide a service card for recyclable materials such as batteries, tires (maximum two per trip), motor oil, branches, leaves, metal, various plastics and glass, cardboard and paper. Brush may be brought to the Mini Dump but may not be longer than five (5) feet in length or greater than four (4) inches in diameter. Recycling and brush trips are unlimited but residents must have their service card for each visit.

Not permitted are kitchen garbage, hazardous or toxic waste, chemicals, paints, contractor debris, dirt, concrete or any other type of rock debris.

Electronic devices covered by the NJ Electronic Waste Management Act includes televisions, desktop & personal computers, monitors, printers and fax machines. They may be brought to the Recycling Center during hours of operation. Electronics will not be picked up curbside.

Hazardous materials

Residents are encouraged to recycle hazardous household materials and paint at Middlesex County's designated locations at announced dates & times. Piscataway Township does not accept any hazardous waste, toxic waste materials, chemicals or paints at its Recycling Center & Mini Dump. Bulk pick-ups

Residents may schedule two (2) bulk trash curbside pickups and one (1) brush curbside pickup per calendar year by calling (732) 562-2390 for an appointment. Residents must have their service card before calling. The last appointments can be made in mid-September and the program ends in the second week of October. During the summer months there may be a two to three week wait. Branches must be bundled and tied. No bagged brush is allowed.

Arriving

All residents entering the Mini Dump must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. Open toed and flip flops are not allowed to be worn in the center. No trucks larger than half-ton pickups and no trucks with sideboards are allowed. Pickup trucks and full size vans are required to provide two (2) credits per visit.

Parking is available in the visitor lot facing Sidney Road. Indoor DPW offices remain closed to the public due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Be mindful of what you flush

The Piscataway sewer system is designed to flow from your home through the Township owned sewer lines to the treatment plant in Sayreville. In some areas, due to the topography, flow has to go uphill and must be assisted by lift stations known as pump stations. At this point, certain elements have to be excluded as the pumps can get jammed by materials such as fabrics, both woven and non-woven. Other types of products include baby wipes, chemically treated wipes, sanitary napkins and most paper towels. Although many manufacturers of these products list them as flushable, in reality, they are not. We ask that you dispose of these non-flushable materials via your regular garbage collection for deposit at a landfill. By complying, you will reduce the possibility of you having a plumbing company rectify a sewer blockage at an estimated cost of \$125 per hour.




Sterling Village

Apartments are available for those age 62 and older with low and moderate incomes at Sterling Village, Piscataway's independent senior living residence.

Located adjacent to the Senior Center, John F. Kennedy Library and Community Center site, the 150-unit, five-story building has elevators, a community room, laundry on the first floor, and a furnished outdoor patio & grill. A security guard is on duty in the evenings and on weekends. Owned by the Township, it is professionally managed by Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey.

You do not need to be a Piscataway resident to move into Sterling Village. At this time, there are vacancies for low-income \$984/month and moderate-income \$1,181/month one-bedroom apartments with electricity and gas included. Cats and dogs up to 20 lbs. are allowed with a one-time \$75 pet security deposit. For more information, please call (732) 699-0033.
