our is the new big number in Piscataway! For four years in a row we have an annual Township budget with a 12.8 percent lower

municipal tax rate. The number four matches the four times that Money Magazine placed Piscataway on its prestigious Top 100 Best Places to Live in America list, most recently in 2019.

Home values are rising, more than two dozen roadways are being rebuilt and many good jobs are available for hard working residents. This is all the more remarkable since the national economy last year was far from ideal and cities throughout the country had to make difficult budget decisions. However, the lifeline of the I-287 corridor has kept our Township thriving.

The present and future of our region's economy is in state-of-the-art logistics centers that enable products to be transported to and from highways. Because we have been proactive with economic development, many big-name companies have either located or expanded in our Township. Now, what Piscataway makes, the state takes!

Chanel, Kiss Cosmetics, L'Oréal and Louis

Vuitton have made Piscataway a hub for beauty and fashion products.

Have you ordered a pizza lately? It may have been delivered in a cardboard box manufactured right here in Piscataway by the Canadian company Cascades. Meanwhile, Arizona Iced Tea, Dawn Foods, Performance Food Group, Robertet Flavors and Tramontano Produce are getting a wide variety of foods to markets.

Aaron & Company, FW Webb, and Fujitsu are all in Piscataway providing goods for home improvement. At the same time, furniture from Bob's Discount Furniture and Humanscale as well as appliances from Best Buy and Fisher & Paykel are being moved through our Township.

The transportation industry is now relying more on Piscataway. Kinkisharyo and Strato are key players in train travel as National Manufacturing Company and Thales Avionics provide necessary equipment for airplanes.

Speaking of technology, DuPont Fabros, SHI, Verizon and Whale Ventures all call our Township home. Hudson Holdings Group

is producing N95 masks right in our community and the medical field is further boosted by the Piscataway-based facilities of Cambridge Pharma, Johnson & Johnson and Horiba Scientific.

It's important to remember that these facilities are on private property zoned for decades for commercial and industrial use. To have kept the land untouched would have meant the Township purchasing the properties from the private owners possibly through eminent domain. That would have meant tens of millions of additional tax dollars coming out of your pockets.

Fortunately in our community we can have both booming commerce and open space with our planned 75-acre Piscataway Ecological Park. In addition, our 27 parks with new playgrounds and other amenities provide fantastic outdoor recreation.

If the private landowners had chosen to build acres of new houses and apartments, that would have been a large budget strain on our school system. Thousands of passenger cars would have been added onto our main roads and neighborhood streets - far more vehicles than the commercial trucks that only use thoroughfares to get to I-287.

Moving forward in 2021, Piscataway will continue to support our great economic activity so we can all enjoy affordable neighborhoods and fantastic amenities including a \$32 million community center built with no residents' tax money.

Protecting the Garden State from Climate Change

New Jersey is one of the most vulnerable states in the nation to the ravaging effects of climate change. From our hundreds of miles of beautiful coastline to the wild pinelands and pristine highlands, our entire state is impacted. In Piscataway and the surrounding areas, we expect to see much more frequent flooding along the Raritan River similar to what we saw during Superstorm Sandy.

So, even though we are working to make our state and communities greener, climate change is an unfortunate reality that will be with us for the foreseeable future and we need to make sure our towns and cities are prepared.

This legislative session, I introduced Senate Bill 2607 requiring that the land use plan element of a municipal master plan include a climate change-related hazard vulnerability assessment. The bill passed both houses and was recently signed into law by Governor Murphy. The assessment will consider the environmental effects associated with climate change on all aspects of a municipality. Examples of environmental effects are temperature rise, drought, flooding and sea level rise. The plan will also have to contain ways to mitigate natural disasters.

This new law expands upon my 2017 law that requires municipal master plans to include ways to implement smart growth such as electric vehicle charging stations, storm resiliency for energy facilities and flood-prone areas, and environmental sustainability.

Due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic the offices are closed to visitors until further notice. For unavoidable interaction at the discretion of our office personnel special arrangements will have to be made by calling (732) 562-2390. Social distancing and masks will be required. Parking is available in the visitor lot facing Sidney Road.

Recycling/Mini-Dump Center's summertime days & hours

Tuesdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.) Thursdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.) Saturdays – 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (Gates close at 4:15 p.m.)

The Center is closed on Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays as well as certain holidays.

Residents must wear a mask or similar effective face covering when coming to the Center.

Need to dispose of leaves? Grass? Other bagged brush or vegetation? Since January 1, 2020, in lieu of the coupons being mailed to residents, you will use the new Piscataway Service Card that electronically contains the services provided by DPW through a UPC code.


While a Service Card packet is normally provided at the DPW office, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, no residents may enter the DPW offices. However, homeowners may e-mail an image of their driver's license to ServiceCards@PiscatawayNJ.org and a card packet will be sent in the mail. Renters will need their landlords to obtain a service card packet for them. If you need assistance, please call our office at (732) 562-2390 on Mondays-Fridays from 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

Grass may be disposed at the recycling yard for a charge of \$1.00 per 30 gallon bag. The bag is to be provided by the resident. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, payment for grass coupons can be made by mailing in a check with the request for coupons or call the office at (732) 562-2390 to arrange for a limited special visit to the office where a credit card can be used by the DPW personnel to charge for grass coupons. Your service card number is to be provided so the credit for grass coupons can be entered into the service card. A minimum of two \$1.00 purchases must be made with each transaction. Once pandemic restrictions are released, grass coupons can be purchased directly at the DPW office. Only checks or credit/debit cards are accepted for any purchases made through the DPW office. Checks should be made out to "Township of Piscataway." Please note that grass coupons are valid only in the year that they are purchased. The service card acts as your ID and must be presented at the gate as proof of residency.

Public Works will not pick up leaf bags until the Fall. Residents who leave leaf bags at the curb after receiving a notice to abate may be subject to a fine. However, residents may bring them to the Mini-Dump Center during its summertime hours. Unbagged vegetation such as branches brought to the Center will not be debited from your service card but will be scanned for record purposes.

Need to get rid of lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture or other such non-recyclable materials? This is also when to use your service card under the continuing rules & regulations. When you bring any of these materials to the Center, you must present your service card as your ID. A car-load of these materials needs one scan of the card; a pick-up truck needs two scans of the service card to debit each permitted deposit of trash. Please remove all nails from lumber.

Residents entering the Center must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed is a halfton pick-up truck. No commercial vehicles, trucks with side boards, boxed U-Hauls or moving trucks are permitted.



What to do with materials such as batteries, tires, motor oil, certain metal items (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners), certain electronics (televisions, desktop or personal computers, computer monitors, portable computers, desktop printers, desktop fax machines) as well as any recyclables usually picked up curbside? You can bring these to the Center. As these items are recyclable, none of the services provided will be debited but your service card will be scanned for record purposes.

Some items may not be brought to the Center. No paint, hazardous waste, kitchen garbage, contractor debris, dirt, rocks or stones are handled by the Township. The Center will also not accept other electronics such as cell phones, copiers, digital cameras, DVD players, ebook readers, keyboards, MP3 players, modems, mouses, personal digital assistants (PDAs), scanners, stereo and radio equipment, telephones, VCRs or any products that contain rechargeable batteries not included in this list. Please contact the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management at (732) 745-4170 for information on how to dispose of such items.

Need a special curbside pickup? Until mid-October, residents may schedule two curbside trash pickups and one curbside branch pick up. Your service card will be debited accordingly. To schedule, please call the Public Works Department at (732) 562-2390 no later than Friday, September 10th as scheduling curbside pickups are at least a month in advance. All mattresses and box springs must be enclosed in a disposal bag.

Please keep in mind that for branches picked up curbside, the bundles must be tied with string and be no wider than one foot in diameter. Crews will not take any branches longer than five feet in length and no wider than four inches in diameter. Any bundles containing construction-type wood, metal or other foreign objects will not be taken. Please stack the bundles neatly at the curb, making the pile no longer than ten feet in length, five feet deep and four feet high.
