am excited to move into 2024 with our community stronger than ever! Home values continue to grow while our municipal tax rate lowered six years in a row helps to keep your property taxes affordable.

Thousands continue to use our wonderful YMCA at the Piscataway Community Center and families have been enjoying our refurbished parks as well as free Township Recreation programs for youth. Our Senior Center and libraries are filled with residents sharing together in fun and enriching programs.

But another aspect of the warmer weather to come in a few months will be the return of our robust road program. Providing all of these highquality services and improvements through a responsible budget often comes from making difficult decisions. That is why it is important to move forward with our long anticipated project, Piscataway Ecological Park, in a way that is answerable to you as taxpayers.

I assure you that the land is dedicated for open space. It cannot and will not be sold to private developers. There will not be apartments, warehouses or stores. All of the land is set aside for your enjoyment in natural surroundings.

So again, Piscataway Ecological Park will be your open space park but the path to its completion will need all of our patience. While environmental work has been taking place, new regulations from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection now require us to create two detention basins instead of just one to contain all of the rainwater that falls on the park. Also with a longer and more careful process to prepare the land to build the park, the cost is much higher than anticipated.

So as we move forward in 2024 we will need to assess how we can most prudently steward your tax dollars and undertake this enormous project without diminishing our services or adding a financial burden to our community.

Bulk pick-ups

Residents may schedule two (2) bulk trash curbside pickups and one (1) brush curbside pickup per calendar year by calling (732) 562-2390 for an appointment. This program resumes on Tuesday, January 9th. The last appointments may be made in mid-September and the program ends during the second week of October.

Christmas trees

Christmas trees will not be picked up. Residents may bring them to their local Piscataway firehouse only during the month of January or they can be brought to the Recycling Center during the hours as shown below. Trees must be devoid of all decorations. Trees will be recycled.

Recycling Center / Mini Dump

Recycling Center hours through December 31, 2024 Tuesdays & Thursdays, 2-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.) Saturdays, 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. (Gates close at 4:15 p.m.) Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays & holidays – Closed



You must present your Piscataway Service Card at the DPW gate to enter the recycling yard. It will be your proof of residency. For a loaded passenger vehicle, SUV or minivan, the recycling yard attendant will scan your card once. The largest vehicle allowed in the Recycling Center is a half-ton pickup or trailer no larger than four feet by eight feet for which two scans of the card will be made. No trucks with built-up sideboards are permitted.

For more information about the Piscataway Service Card, please visit its webpage using the QR code or call DPW at (732) 562-2390.

Depending on the type of vehicle, one or two scans will be made for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials. Cards will not be scanned for recyclable materials such as batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, leaves, metal, various plastics and glass, cardboard and paper. Each year, cards will be automatically replenished with the free services provided by Piscataway.

Electronic devices covered by the NJ Electronic Waste Management Act include televisions, desktop & personal computers, monitors, printers and fax machines. They may be brought to the Recycling Center during hours of operation. Electronics will not be picked up curbside.

Not permitted at the Recycling Center are kitchen garbage, hazardous or toxic waste, chemicals, paints, contractor debris, dirt, concrete, asphalt or any other type of rock debris.

East Jersey Old Town Village & Cornelius Low House Museum

Visit East Jersey Old Town Village 1050 River Road, Piscataway Open Wednesday through Sunday 10 a.m.-4 p.m.



The Village features historic structures from the 1700s and 1800s relocated to its site within Johnson Park. They represent different architecture styles found throughout Middlesex County's Raritan Valley. The Village's founder, Dr. Joseph Kler, and a group of local residents saved most of the buildings from demolition and transported them to the Village where they were reassembled and restored to reflect how they would have looked way back when.

Now you can explore these buildings of early residents and the archaeological discoveries from the long-vanished port community of Raritan Landing which was located in the same area as East Jersey Old Town Village on the Raritan River.

Micah Williams: Portrait Artist Cornelius Low House Museum 1225 River Road, Piscataway


Traveling portrait artist, Micah Williams (1782-1837) was a prolific artist who has 272 known existing paintings. With over 35 paintings on view, visitors can come face to face with Middlesex and Monmouth County residents. The exhibition traces the transformation of the artist from his first career as a New Brunswick silver plater to a traveling portrait artist, placing his work into the larger context of social change and American economic development. The exhibition offers viewers the opportunity to explore family relationships among the sitters as well as a glimpse into a prospering agrarian society of Central New Jersey.

Visitors will be able to try their hand working with pastels and learn more about the making of materials used. Children will be encouraged to add their artwork to our Student Gallery and have it become part of the exhibit.

Fire Election Saturday, February 17th

Did you know that Piscataway has four fire districts each with their own elected board of commissioners? These fire commissioners are independent of the municipal government and set their own tax rates and budgets – and that affects the total of what you pay in property taxes.
