- Endorse the significance of a place




- Types

 - -Guided or self-guided




















Piedmont Pathways: Day Rides & Sunday Drives From Culpeper, Virginia

- •Written to appeal to a specific demographic in mind, but broad enough to appeal to those with 4 wheels, too
- •Used an expert to write it, but who had local connections
- •Kept the user in mind with the design
- •Press and word of mouth very important
- •4 loops appeal to variety of interests
- •Regional

HOW do you develop one?

- Take inventory
 - What is of interest or unique?
 - What would you like to preserve, protect, or highlight?
- Identify tourism trends and capitalize on them
 - Food & Wine
 - Girlfriend Getaways
 - Day Trips
- Know your local experts who can help. They are a wealth of information.

HOW do you develop one?

- Consult with others who have gone before
- Will the Trail be marked or just have a printed or audio guide of some kind?
- Can it be tied in with similar trails (i.e. surrounding localities, Civil War Trails, Journey Through Hallowed Ground)
- Promote your trail (virginia.org, advertising, press)

The End of the Road

- Be conservative on your print quantity the first time out corrections are inevitable!
- Proof it! Proof it! Get *many* eyes to look at it.
 - Different perspectives
 - Is anything missing?
 - Is anything overemphasized?

The End of the Road

- Seek the advice and opinion of your local stakeholders as much as possible
 - Experts don't always agree. Weigh their opinions carefully, and if a definitive conclusion can't be reached, it's OK to acknowledge that. Choose your words carefully!
- Keep a "master" copy to keep track of changes/corrections for the next printing
