Legislative goals may change based on bonding vs. non-bonding year.






### **Current Legislative Process**

#### Annual Legislative Breakfast


- Yearly check in

- Make Legislative process more clear to City Council, residents, and elected representatives
- More equitable and inclusive process

# 1. Proposed Changes to Legislative Breakfast

- Move to early Fall
- More time for engagement with State Legislators
- Comprehensive Legislative Priorities Report prepared for meeting





## 2. Targeted Legislative Priorities

- Legislative platform be limited to 3-5 priorities per department.
- Within the City's scope of influence
- Foster and grow relationships with State Legislators





# 3. Vote and Adopt Legislative Platform

- Shows the priorities are aligned with Mission, Vision and Values
- Shows community support for priorities
- Provides increased visibility on priorities
- City best practice- recommended by LMC attorney and City lobbyist



# 4. Testifying to Legislative Bodies Policy

- City Internal Political Policy is silent and inconsistent with past practices
- The City has professional, and experienced employees - knowledge is valuable to public policy discussions
- Working with the city attorney and HR manager to develop internal language

### **Next Steps**

- Staff plan Legislative Breakfast in late fall of 2021
- Staff will continue to create a list of targeted Legislative priorities for the upcoming session
- City Council adopt Legislative priorities at a future City Council meeting
- Staff is working with HR manager and city attorney for proposed Testifying Policy






# 2020 Census Overview City of Richfield

#### Minnesota grew by 7.6% between 2010 and 2020




Minnesota's April 1, 2020 Population 5,706,494






- 51 counties gained population.




#### Richfield Total Population Trends





- 2010-2020: Richfield grew by 1,766 people, the largest gain since 1970.
- Richfield's 2020 population surpassed its 1990 population.


#### The population of Richfield grew by 5% over the 2010s













#### BIPOC communities make up 41% of Richfield's population

#### Changes in Data Collection

- Changes to the race and ethnicity questions on the 2020 Census allowed for more opportunity to write in racial and ethnic groups.
- This has painted a better picture of how individuals view themselves, which in turn has shown that we are a more multiracial society than previous data has been able to show.
- While not solely responsible for the changes, it has corresponded with an increase in the "Some other race" and Multiple race categories.

#### Other Data Considerations

- The 2020 Census was conducted during a world-wide pandemic, which required the Census Bureau to make several adjustments to the operational plan.
- There was unprecedented uncertainty regarding aspects of the Census—even before the pandemic—that caused concern regarding individuals' willingness to respond to the Census.
- This is the first census to implement Differential Privacy (DP) as the Disclosure Avoidance System (DAS) to protect respondents' confidentiality.


MAY 13, 2021 – The U.S. Census Bureau today announced the revised schedule for the 2020 Census Count Question Resolution (CQR) program. The purpose of the 2020 Census CQR is to provide a mechanism for governmental units to request a review of their official 2020 Census results and to help ensure that housing and population counts are correctly allocated to 2020 census tabulation blocks in the 50 states, District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.


The current schedule is as follows:

- Fall 2021: Federal Register notice announces the beginning of a 30-day comment period for the public.
- December 2021: The Census Bureau plans to officially notify tribal, state and local government officials eligible to file CQR cases.
- January 2022: The Census Bureau begins accepting CQR cases for processing from eligible tribal, state and local governments.
- June 30, 2023: Deadline for governments to send CQR cases to the Census Bureau.
- September 30, 2023: Deadline for the Census Bureau to provide results to impacted governmental units.


#### Growth in Minnesota's U.S. Congressional Districts

Population Change by Congressional District, 2010-2020







# Difference from Ideal State Senate Districts




# Difference from Ideal Twin Cities Metro State Senate Districts
