
Green Team

Energy Audits

- Conducted free energy audits from two energy consultants
- Presented their findings and next steps:
 - solar arrays
 - complete LED street light change-out
 - pool mechanical upgrades
 - athletic field lighting
 - ice arena upgrades

How would we pay for this?

- Purchasing Power Agreement
- Grants and rebates



Options

- 1. Continue the process towards implementing a solar project.
- 2. Suspend work towards implementing green energies.

Recommendation

To continue the process towards selecting an energy consultant or installer to pursue solar projects, subject to no financial obligation.



September Study Session

- Hennepin County is shifting their recycling grant money to include organics.
- In 2018, 30% of our recycling rebate comes from offering organics
- Offered 5 different action plans

Hennepin County is shifting more funds to organics



Organics Collection Options	
OPTION 1	Require all haulers to offer organic collection by ordinance.
OPTION 2	Develop a pilot program with the County to offer all haulers an incentive to offer organics collection.
OPTION 3	Establish an organics drop off site(s).
OPTION 4	Organize hauling and require organics collection by contract.

Recommended Action Plan



Overview of Recommendations

- 1. Launch a citizen based organics taskforce.
- 2. Appoint a City Council member to serve as a spokesperson for the new taskforce.
- 3. Partner with the Richfield League of Women Voters.
- 4. Establish drop-off site(s) to increase awareness and education about organics.
- 5. Charge the taskforce with studying and planning the establishment of organized recycling, including curbside organics collection
- 6. Ultimately work towards organized waste collection.

Establish Drop-off Site (s)

- Follow Dakota County's Model.
- No cost to residents.
- Heavily supported by Hennepin County.
- Helps retain county recycling funds.
- Locate site (s) by dense residential areas providing opportunity for apartment residents to participate.

Dakota County Drop-Off Sites

Dakota County Drop Off Sites Great Success!

• Two Sites Established:

- Thompson Park, West St. Paul
- Lebanon Hills Park, Eagan
- 1,577 households registered between the two sites.

• Over 5 cubic yards collected each week.

• Established for the purpose of educating the public about organics.

Dakota County Drop Off Sites Great Success!

- Residents must register to receive the free service.
- Registrants receive:
 - welcome packet
 - locked gate combination
 - 2 compostable collection bags
- Serviced once a week, twice per week in summer depending on odor




Resident Incentive

Go through a box compostable bags per week

Bags cost \$.06 each

\$24 collection fee per pick-up

Inside



Hennepin County

- \$100,000 available for organics drop-off sites countywide
- Grant eligible items include:
 - enclosure, signage, compostable bags, welcome packets, and collection fees

Citizen Support

Organics Taskforce Charge

- Determine selection criteria and recommend drop-off locations
- Determine Program Details.
- Develop a plan for the educational outreach & evaluation of the drop-off sites.
- Plan and work towards establishing organized recycling including curbside organics collection
