Consideration of Resolution Consenting to the Inclusion of Properties in the City of Selma in the CSDA Open PACE Program

DISCUSSION:

The California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) is the largest Joint Powers Authority in California, founded and sponsored by the League of California Cities and CSAC, is implementing Property Assessed Clean Energy ("PACE") under the provisions of Chapter 29 of Division 7 of the Streets & Highways Code (commonly referred to as "AB 811") on behalf of its member counties and cities. AB811 authorizes a legislative body to designate an area within which authorized public officials (including a joint powers authority like CSCDA) and free and willing property owners may enter into voluntary contractual assessments to finance the installation of renewable energy, energy efficiency, water efficiency, and seismic strengthening improvements as well as electric vehicle charging infrastructure, in each case affixed to real property (the "Improvements"). The City of Selma currently is a member and participates in the CaliforniaFIRST Program.

CSCDA's Commissioners pre-qualified and appointed three PACE Administrators to manage the CSCDA Open PACE program in order to offer members turn-key PACE solutions that provide residential and commercial property owners the choice among prequalified PACE financing providers, creating competition on terms, service and interest rates. The prequalified program administrators operating the following programs are AllianceNRG Program^{M3}, PACE Funding LLC and Renewable Funding LLC (administering CaliforniaFIRST).

CSCDA's Open PACE program offers turnkey solutions to save California jurisdictions the time and resources of developing standalone PACE programs. Jurisdictions only need to adopt the form of resolution accompanying this staff report related to the CSCDA Open PACE program to begin the process. There is no cost to approving the resolution.

PACE has been a very successful financing tool in California. PACE is operating in over 250 jurisdictions throughout the state, and nearly half a billion dollars in energy efficiency, water efficiency and renewable projects have been funded.

More information about CSCDA and CSCDA's Open PACE Program Administrators is available at <u>www.cscda.org</u>.

ANALYSIS:

The City of Selma already participates in CSCDA PACE through CaliforniaFIRST. CSCDA Open PACE is a new program being offered to allow property owners in participating cities and counties to finance renewable energy, energy water efficiency improvements, seismic improvements and electric vehicle charging infrastructure on their property. Participation in the assessment is 100% voluntary by the property owner. The improvements installed on the owner's property are financed by the issuance of bonds by CSCDA. The bonds are secured by a voluntary contractual assessment levied on the owner's property. Property owners who wish to participate in PACE agree to repay the money through the voluntary contractual assessment collected with property taxes. The voluntary contractual assessments will be levied by CSCDA and collected in annual installments through the applicable county secured property tax bill.

The benefits to the property owner include:

- <u>Competition:</u> CSCDA Open PACE provides three options to property owners: AllianceNRG Program, PACE Funding and CaliforniaFIRST. Property owners can shop for the best price and service through the availability of the PACE administrators.
- <u>Eligibility</u>: In today's economic environment, alternatives for property owners to finance renewable improvements may not be available. Many property owners do not have financing options available to them to lower their utility bills.
- <u>Savings</u>: Energy prices continue to rise and installing energy efficient, water efficient and renewable energy models lower utility bills.
- <u>100% voluntary</u>: Only property owners who choose to finance improvements will have assessments placed on their property.
- <u>Payment obligation can stay with the property</u>: Under Chapter 29, a voluntary contractual assessment stays with the property upon transfer of ownership. Most private loans are due on sale of the property. Certain mortgage providers will, however, require the assessment be paid at the time the property is refinanced or sold.
- <u>Prepayment option</u>: The property owner can choose to pay off the assessments at any time, subject to applicable prepayment penalties.
- <u>Customer oriented</u>: Part of the success of the CSCDA Open PACE is prompt customer service.
- <u>Favorable Terms</u>: The economic terms of PACE financing will often be more favorable than other options.
- <u>Not a personal loan or mortgage</u>: The PACE assessment in effect is not a personal obligation of the property owner through a conventional loan or mortgage but an assessment on the property secured by an assessment lien and collected as part of the regular tax roll on the property.

The benefits to the City include:

- <u>Prequalified PACE Administrators.</u> CSCDA has pre-qualified the PACE Administrators based on their business practices, qualifications, experience, and capital commitment to the PACE market.
- <u>Single Resolution.</u> The City can pass a single resolution and provide access to residential and commercial property owners to highly qualified PACE administrators. There is no need to pass multiple resolutions to approve the administrators.
- <u>Project Eligibility</u>. The CSCDA Open PACE platform can provide financing for all aspects of PACE including: 1) Residential, 2) Commercial, and 3) Seismic strengthening programs such as Mandatory Soft Story programs,
- <u>Increase local jobs</u>. Property improvements provide jobs in the local economy.

- <u>Increase in housing prices</u>. Updated and higher efficient homes are generally more valuable.
- <u>Increase Revenue to the City.</u> Property improvements result in an increase in sales, payroll and property tax revenue to the City.
- <u>No City Obligation.</u> As in conventional assessment financing, the City is not obligated to repay the bonds or to pay the assessments levied on the participating properties. Unlike conventional assessment financing, the City has no administrative duties and its name is not on the bonds, as CSCDA's name is on the bonds.
- <u>No City staff support required.</u> All CSCDA Open PACE and assessment administration, bond issuance and bond administration functions are handled by CSCDA and the Administrators; AllianceNRG Program, PACE Funding and Renewable Funding. No City staff time is needed to participate in CSCDA Open PACE.
- <u>No internal management requirements.</u> The City can provide access for its residents to CSCDA Open PACE without the higher staff costs that an independent program established by the City would require.
- <u>Availability of Information on Projects Financed.</u> The City may receive, at its option, periodic updates on CSCDA Open PACE projects that have been completed in their community.
- <u>Demonstration of Community Commitment to the Environment.</u> Participating in CSCDA Open PACE demonstrates the [City's/County's] commitment to do everything in its power to improve the environment.

The proposed resolution enables CSCDA Open PACE programs to be available to owners of residential and commercial property within our City to finance permanently fixed renewable energy, energy efficiency, water efficiency, and seismic strengthening improvements as well as electric vehicle charging infrastructure.

CSCDA (and not the city) will be responsible for entering into voluntary contractual assessment agreements with participating property owners, levying the voluntary contractual assessments, issuing bonds to finance the Improvements and taking remedial actions in the event of delinquent assessment payments. The resolution expressly provides that the county or city will not be responsible for the conduct of any assessment proceedings, the levy of assessments, any required remedial action in the case of delinquencies in assessment payments, or the issuance, sale or administration of any bonds issued in connection with CSCDA Open PACE.

FISCAL AND STAFF IMPACTS:

There is no negative fiscal impact to the City's general fund by consenting to the inclusion of properties within the City limits in CSCDA Open PACE. All CSCDA Open PACE administrative costs are covered through an initial administrative fee included in the property owner's voluntary contractual assessment and an annual administrative fee, which is also collected on the property owner's tax bill.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SELMA CONSENTING TO THE INCLUSION OF PROPERTIES WITHIN THE TERRITORY OF THE CITY IN THE CSCDA OPEN PACE PROGRAMS; AUTHORIZING THE CALIFORNIA STATEWIDE COMMUNITIES DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY TO ACCEPT APPLICATIONS FROM PROPERTY OWNERS, CONDUCT CONTRACTUAL ASSESSMENT PROCEEDINGS AND LEVY CONTRACTUAL ASSESSMENTS WITHIN THE TERRITORY OF THE CITY OF SELMA; AND AUTHORIZING RELATED ACTIONS

WHEREAS, the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (the "Authority") is a joint exercise of powers authority, the members of which include numerous cities and counties in the State of California, including the City of Selma the "City"; and

WHEREAS, the Authority is implementing Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) programs, which it has designated CSCDA Open PACE, consisting of CSCDA Open PACE programs each administered by a separate program administrator (collectively with any successors, assigns, replacements or additions, the "Programs"), to allow the financing or refinancing of renewable energy, energy efficiency, water efficiency and seismic strengthening improvements, electric vehicle charging infrastructure and such other improvements, infrastructure or other work as may be authorized by law from time to time (collectively, the "Improvements") through the levy of contractual assessments pursuant to Chapter 29 of Division 7 of the Streets & Highways Code ("Chapter 29") within counties and cities throughout the State of California that consent to the inclusion of properties within their respective territories in the Programs and the issuance of bonds from time to time; and

WHEREAS, the program administrators currently active in administering Programs are the AllianceNRG Program (presently consisting of Deutsche Bank Securities Inc., CounterPointe Energy Solutions LLC and Leidos Engineering, LLC), PACE Funding LLC and Renewable Funding LLC, and the Authority will notify the City in advance of any additions or changes; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 29 provides that assessments may be levied under its provisions only with the free and willing consent of the owner or owners of each lot or parcel on which an assessment is levied at the time the assessment is levied; and

WHEREAS, the City of Selma desires to allow the owners of property ("Participating Property Owners") within its territory to participate in the Programs and to allow the Authority to conduct assessment proceedings under Chapter 29 within its territory and to issue bonds to finance or refinance improvements; and

WHEREAS, the territory within which assessments may be levied for the Programs shall include all of the territory within the City's official boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Authority will conduct all assessment proceedings under Chapter 29 for the Programs and issue any bonds issued in connection with the Programs; and

WHEREAS, the City will not be responsible for the conduct of any assessment proceedings; the levy of assessments; any required remedial action in the case of delinquencies in such assessment payments; or the issuance, sale or administration of any bonds issued in connection with the Programs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Selma as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. This City Council hereby finds and declares that properties in the territory of the City will benefit from the availability of the Programs within the territory of the City and, pursuant thereto, the conduct of special assessment proceedings by the Authority pursuant to Chapter 29 and the issuance of bonds to finance or refinance Improvements.

<u>Section 2</u>. In connection with the Programs, the City hereby consents to the conduct of special assessment proceedings by the Authority pursuant to Chapter 29 on any property within the territory of the City and the issuance of bonds to finance or refinance Improvements; provided, that

(1) The Participating Property Owners, who shall be the legal owners of such property, execute a contract pursuant to Chapter 29 and comply with other applicable provisions of California law in order to accomplish the valid levy of assessments; and

(2) The City will not be responsible for the conduct of any assessment proceedings; the levy of assessments; any required remedial action in the case of delinquencies in such assessment payments; or the issuance, sale or administration of any bonds issued in connection with the Programs.

<u>Section 3</u>. The appropriate officials and staff of the City are hereby authorized and directed to make applications for the Programs available to all property owners who wish to finance or refinance Improvements; provided, that the Authority shall be responsible for providing such applications and related materials at its own expense. City staff members are hereby designated as the contact persons for the Authority in connection with the Programs.

<u>Section 4</u>. The appropriate officials and staff of the City are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such certificates, requisitions, agreements and related documents as are reasonably required by the Authority to implement the Programs.

Section 5. The City Council hereby finds that adoption of this Resolution is not a "project" under the California Environmental Quality Act, because the Resolution does not involve any commitment to a specific project which may result in a potentially significant physical impact on the environment, as contemplated by Title 14, California Code of Regulations, Section 15378(b)(4).

<u>Section 6</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the Secretary of the Authority at: Secretary of the Board, California Statewide Communities Development Authority, 1400 K Street, Sacramento, CA 95814.



SUBJECT: Consideration and necessary action on the Sharing of Costs Associated with "City At-Large" Membership on San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority

DISCUSSION: This topic was discussed at the December, 2015 Fresno COG Policy Board meeting and requires consideration by each Council with regards to their willingness to "share" in the costs associated with one or possibly two of our COG member agencies serving as a "City-At Large member" on the newly created San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority.

Over the last month the five COGS representing the five counties (Merced, Madera, Fresno, Kings & Tulare) that make up the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority (SJVWIA) formed a working group to develop a "Call for Interest" process whereby each COG solicited nominations from their member agency cities as to who might be interested in filling the two "City At Large" seats on the newly created SJVWIA. That process will be completed on January 28, 2016 when the five COGS and all interested parties get together to discuss the results of the "Call for Interest". After the nominations have been received by the working group they will be forwarded over to the SJVWIA Board, who will then make the decision on which of the interested cities will fill the seats.

As was also discussed at the December meeting, Fresno COG has already selected its nominees, Mendota & Orange Cove, with Clovis as the alternate. Also discussed was the fact that it costs \$50,000 to serve as a member of the SJVWIA Board. Fresno COG staff provided a spreadsheet that identified what each Fresno COG member agencies pro-rata share would be based on population, for both \$50,000 (one COG member) and \$100,000 (two COG members). Each COG Board member was then encouraged to go back to their individual councils and determine whether there was an interest in "sharing" the cost of these seats across all 16 Fresno COG member agencies.

The issue before the COG Policy Board at its January 2016 meeting will be "should" and "how" the costs of the SJVWIA City-At Large seats be shared across the region. It is important to note that that the appointment of Fresno COG's nominees to the SJVWIA and how the costs associated with those seats are to be paid, are not within the by-laws of the Fresno COG, therefore all actions taken by the Fresno COG Policy Board related to this matter are "voluntary" in nature and there is no mandate that the costs be shared amongst all member agencies, as would be the case if this were a transportation related issue.

The intent is to allow each city time to contemplate the issue but be in a position to provide Mayor Robertson direction for his vote at the Fresno COG Board meeting on January 28, 2016. Attached is a spreadsheet that shows how the costs for both one member (\$50,000) and two members (\$100,000) to each of our 16 member agencies if the COG's traditional population based formula was utilized.

SUBJECT: League Dues for 2016 Voluntary Surcharge to Support Vital Litigation

Thank you for your City's membership in the League of California Cities. We understand the City's financial resources are precious and value your commitment to keep the League strong now, and into the future.

League Membership – A Great Investment

Enclosed is your city's 2016 dues statement and related supporting documentation. The value your city derives from membership in the League of California Cities makes the payment of League dues a wise investment. Please review the enclosed customized "Return on Investment" report for your city. It reflects financial benefits your city enjoys as a direct result of the League's legislative and ballot measure advocacy. A strong and effective League is central to your city's strength and vitality.

For 2016, the Board of Directors authorized a two percent dues increase. Following an unprecedented eight year period with no increases, this year's modest adjustment reflects the board's desire to return to its pre-great recession approach of increasing dues to keep pace with inflation, ensure adequate funding to maintain the League's work program, and carry out stable and predictable adjustments that minimize the potential for significantly larger increases in the future.

Annual Report - Advancing the Mission

The League is the leading voice for California cities. Working in concert with cities, partners, and coalition members, protecting local control through advocacy and education remains the cornerstone of League activities. Through numbers, the enclosed 2015 Annual Report provides an informative glimpse of the organization and the activities dedicated to advancing the League's mission. The strategies, activities and advocacy behind these numbers are made possible because of continuing commitments from cities like yours.

Voluntary Litigation Surcharge – Defending Local Control

The League and city officials have invested tremendous human and financial resources over the past decade to secure meaningful constitutional protection of city revenue sources. Proposition 1A (2004) and

Our mission is to expand and protect local control for cities through education and advocacy to enhance the quality of life for all Californians. Proposition 22 (2010) were passed with strong leadership from the League and cities to protect city revenues, but the work is not over. When legislation is enacted that attempts to erode these revenue protections and other constitutional authority of cities, defending and enforcing these protections can require litigation as a last resort.

This vital defensive strategy is expensive, but essential. Implementing this strategy is conducted at greatly reduced cost and effort when the League coordinates efforts or serves as the lead plaintiff on behalf of member cities. The alternative would be for each city or *ad hoc* groupings of cities to initiate separate lawsuits. Through the League, cities can leverage their membership and resources to challenge the state whenever it attempts to weaken the important local revenue protections and authority California cities have worked so hard to achieve and maintain.

Acknowledging the increasingly important role litigation serves for the League, the board of directors formalized a policy to maintain a Litigation Contingency Reserve Account (LCRA) funded through an optional voluntary surcharge set as a percentage of dues. Reviewed annually by the League's finance committee and board of directors, the LCRA is set at \$275,000 and is reserved to 1) cover expenses incurred from board approved litigation within a single budget year; and 2) maintain sufficient set-asides to cover expenses the League would incur if the League becomes or remains involved in board approved litigation during the following year.

In 2013 and 2014, approximately fifty-two percent of member cities voluntarily paid ten percent of their membership dues and in 2015 seventy-two percent contributed 2.4 percent of their membership dues. To date, approximately 54 percent of the surcharge collected has been used to defray litigation expenses associated with the *League of California Cities v. Matasantos* (AB 1484) and *City of El Centro, et al. v. David Lanier, et al* (SB 7). During 2016, litigation expenses are projected to be \$200,000.

To maintain the LCRA at \$275,000 and help support vital on-going litigation, the board strongly encourages each city to consider including with its 2016 dues an optional surcharge payment equal to four percent of dues. The recommended surcharge is shown on the enclosed invoice. The recommended surcharge is optional; a city may pay the base dues and enjoy all the benefits of membership. However, the board of directors sincerely hopes you will support the LCRA because of the tremendous value a coordinated litigation strategy and united front brings to your city and all cities throughout the state.

Conclusion – California Cities Work Together

Through the League, all cities and all city officials have the opportunity to help shape solutions to the issues of greatest importance to our cities and the state of California. Working together, we pursue those solutions most effectively. It is important for cities to act energetically, in unison, and with renewed focus to amplify our voice in key statewide policy matters.

The board of directors encourages your enthusiastic support of and participation in the League of California Cities in 2016. We look forward to continuing our fight together to protect local control and help you provide outstanding service to the residents of your great city.

El Nino update: Jan- March

WSI, a division of The Weather Company, issued their January through March 2016 outlook update, and both forecast temperatures and precipitation have the fingerprints of the current strong El Niño, the strongest in 18 years, all over them. The forecast includes the potential for a significant cold snap in parts of the central and eastern states starting in the middle portion of January.

Stronger El Niños typically exhibit their peak influence on North America's weather pattern during the core winter months.

Keep in mind, however, there are several other factors in the atmosphere, operating on shorter time scales, that can, at times, oppose the overall three-month trend.

We'll go into more detail on those patterns following the outlooks a bit later. First, let's take a look at the latest outlooks for average temperature and total precipitation across the U.S. for January through March 2016.

These predictions do not project when and where individual storms may occur. An individual cold front or an upper ridge of high pressure can lead to a brief period of colder or warmer weather, respectively, that bucks the overall three-month trend. The same front or area of high pressure can bring a brief period of enhanced precipitation or dry spell that may or may not be indicative of the overall trend that is forecast.



Temperatures

Shaded areas indicate regions where WSI believes the average temperature from Jan. 1, 2016, through Mar. 31, 2016 will be most above or below the 1981-2010 climatological reference period.

For the first three months of 2016, WSI says the best chance of colder-than-normal temperatures lies in roughly the southern half of the Lower 48 states, from Southern California into the Southern Plains, Deep South, Florida and the Carolinas.

Meanwhile, a large swath of the western and northern United States from northern California into the Pacific Northwest eastward into the Midwest, Great Lakes and Northeast is expected to be warmer than normal, overall.

However, there's a January catch.

Shaded areas indicate regions where NOAA believes the average temperature from Jan. 16, 2016, through Jan. 29, 2016 will be most above or below the 1981-2010 climatological reference period. This outlook is considered an experimental product.

"We expect a 'tale of two months', with a cold-West, warm-East first half of the month, followed by a reversal during the back half of the month towards potentially much colder eastern U.S. temperatures," wrote Dr. Todd Crawford, WSI chief meteorologist, in their outlook released Friday.

Interestingly, one factor in this pattern reversal may have been brought about by an Icelandic storm that tugged above-freezing air to the North Pole between Christmas and New Year's Eve. "The rapid and unexpected destruction of the tropospheric polar vortex, via the historically strong North Atlantic storm this week, has thrown a significant monkey wrench into the January forecast," said Crawford.

Specifically, the more "blocked up" the upper-level flow is in the higher latitudes, the more likely cold air is going to be forced south into the U.S. The stronger and more persistent the blocking, the longer the cold air will stick around.

Crawford said whether the colder East pattern relents later in January is uncertain, as upperatmospheric blocking, such as is forecast for mid-January, often lasts longer than numerical models suggest.

"It would not surprise us if the second half of the month was quite cold across much of the East, and there are clearly cold risks to our forecast."



Beyond January, the basic warmer-than-average North, but colder-than-average South outlook still holds.

In a typical strong El Niño winter, a warm South in December eventually transitions to a colderthan-normal January, February and March, while the northern tier of states remains relatively mild, by winter standards.

But that's not always the case. The winters of 1972-73 and 1965-66 were considerably colder in much of the northern tier of states during those strong El Niños, and the winter of 1957-58 was very cold in the Northeast.

NOAA believes there is a greater-than-average chance that the total precipitation from Jan. 1, 2016, through Mar. 31, 2016, will rank among the wettest or driest one-third of all such periods in the 1981-2010 climatological reference period.


NOAA expects January through March 2016 to trend wetter than usual over much of the southern tier of the nation, from California into the Desert Southwest to the southern and central Plains, as well as the Gulf Coast and Southeast coast, including Florida.

Parts of the Northeast seaboard from the Mid-Atlantic states into southern New England, may also see more precipitation than a typical winter.

Conversely, a relatively dry winter is expected over parts of the Pacific Northwest, northern Rockies and into the far northern Plains, Great Lakes and Ohio Valley.

This precipitation outlook owes to the typical dominance of the subtropical or southern branch jet stream during a strong El Niño winter, bringing more frequent and vigorous low-pressure systems along the nation's southern tier.

December through March precipitation anomalies in five previous strong El Niños dating to 1950. Green/blue shading corresponds to areas wetter-than-average. Yellow, oranges and reds correspond to drier-than-average areas.

This should at least deliver a significant dent in California's exceptional drought, but even a strong El Niño winter doesn't assure that.

As we discussed in an early December article about the winter outlook, one of the five previous strong El Niño seasons was drier than average in the Golden State (1965-66).

The aforementioned subtropical jet stream usually brings an increase in Pacific storms to California in January and February.

Conversely, drought may either hold steady or expand during the winter in the northern Rockies and northern High Plains, thanks to persistent warmth and expected drier conditions.

El Niño Not the "Be-all and End-all"

The current strong El Niño has peaked, but its influence on the atmosphere and subsequent temperature and precipitation impacts is most strongly felt in the northern hemisphere winter months.

However, three variables, in addition to El Niño, could play an important role in early 2016, including the North Atlantic Oscillation, the Arctic Oscillation and the Madden-Julian Oscillation. These features can be difficult to forecast more than a few weeks in advance. The North Atlantic Oscillation (NAO) basically describes the degree of blocking of the jet stream over the North Atlantic Ocean, frequently in the vicinity of Greenland. The NAO's negative phase features high pressure aloft blocking the west-to-east flow of the jet stream, forcing it to buckle south over the eastern U.S., ushering in prolonged cold air. The positive phase is just the opposite; no blocking means Canadian cold air mainly drains west-to-east across the content, not plunging deep into the U.S.

Training Center

POLICE DEPARTMENT BI-WEEKLY COUNCIL UPDATE (12/16/15 – 1/13/16)

Crime Trends

• Current crime data for the last 28-day period indicates an overall rise in crime of 4.4%, including a 47% rise in violent crime. During this same time period, we experienced a similar 4.0% drop in property crimes. This can be attributed to a drop in theft and vehicle burglary, while the rise in violent crime can be attributed to a 50% increase in aggravated assault during this time frame.

Significant Calls for Service

- On 12/17/15 at approximately 1:20am, Selma Community Hospital reported that a subject was dropped off at the hospital with a gunshot wound to the thigh. He was identified as Arnold Ortiz by hospital recorders, with an address from the city of Dinuba. Ortiz was very uncooperative with Officers and hospital personnel and would not give any information on the circumstances or the location where he was shot. He only stated that it was not in the city of Selma. Ortiz was transported to CRMC with non-life threating injuries.
- On 12/17/15, at approximately 7am, officers were dispatched to the alley of the 2300 block of Knowles St for an unresponsive male. Upon arrival, they found the elderly homeless man, David Valdez, sitting in a chair deceased. Coroner stated the death was most likely natural causes.
- On 12/20/15, at 5:40pm, officers were dispatched to a roll over traffic accident at Highland Ave and Whitson Ave. Officers arrived on scene and located a vehicle on its side. After assessing the situation there appeared to be no serious injuries. The driver of the roll over vehicle was taken into custody for suspicion of DUI.
- On 12/21/15, at approximately 1:51am, residents at 3201 Thompson Ave called to report that Lorenzo Aceves (19yrs old) was shot and lying on Thompson Ave. Residents at that location then went out and pulled Aceves into the house. Witnesses reported only hearing two shots fired and Aceves yelling out in the street. Aceves refused to cooperate in providing any information regarding the suspect. Aceves sustained a single, non-life threatening gunshot wound to the left thigh. Aceves was transported to CRMC for treatment.

- On 12/23/15, at approximately 1:30pm, Robert Clark attempted to rob a woman withdrawing cash at the Fresno County Credit Union ATM located near Taco Bell. He demanded money before being scared off by a citizen. The woman ran to her vehicle and called 911. She identified Clark in a photographic line-up and he was later arrested on the 2500 block of Highland Ave. Clark was later taken to Fresno County Jail.
- On 1/5/16, at approximately 1am, several 911 calls received of shots fired at 3101
 Jasper St. Officers located approximately 20 expended rifle shell casings in the
 roadway. According to witness/neighbor a black Honda 2dr. was observed driving by as
 the occupants fired upon the house and car parked on Jasper St. None of the 10 +
 occupants of 3101 Jasper St. were injured from the spray of gun fire. It appeared that
 residents from the Jasper address returned fire at the passing Honda with some of the
 rounds missing the Honda and striking the stucco wall, garage door, and car of the
 neighbor across the street (3062 Jasper St.). All occupants at 3101 Jasper St. were
 uncooperative with the investigation.
- On 1/9/16, at approximately 3:30pm, Officers dispatched to Eric White School for Graffiti in progress. When officers arrived on scene, a witness identified two suspects in the area as the culprits. Two Suspects taken into custody, identified as "Gilbert Jude Garcia (4-17-97) of 584 Pine St. Tulare, Ca." and Jenzzon Macias (8-19-96) of 2222 Sylvia St. Graffiti consisted of BULLDOG type graffiti.
- On 1/12/16, at approximately 8:30pm, a 911 call was received concerning the victim of a gunshot wound in front of her residence at 2212 Gaither St. Julian Gonzalez dob 11/19/1977 was reportedly on Wright St. near the Selma Senior Apts between Gaither St. and Merced St. when 10 male subjects confronted him and engaged him in a fight at that location. A single gunshot was heard by the witnesses who said the 10 fled the scene and the victim ran to 2212 Gaither St. to ask for help. A white four door car and green pickup truck may be involved but not confirmed. Gonzalez sustained what initially appears to be a through-and-through gunshot wound to the area near the left elbow and grazed the left torso area. Wounds he sustained do not appear to be life threatening. Gonzalez, a Malaga Bulldog gang member, was uncooperative with the investigation.
