## Shelbyville Police Department Office of the Chiefs



Chief Jan Phillips is a native of the City of Shelbyville with forty-three years of law enforcement experience and approximately thirty-seven years of leadership. Chief Phillips began his career in public service more than forty years ago with the Bedford County Ambulance Service before joining the Shelbyville Police Department in January 1977 as a dispatcher. In March of 1977, Chief Phillips was promoted to the Patrol Division of the Shelbyville Police Department, and graduated the Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy in October 1977. In May of 1979, Chief Phillips began to climb the ranks within the Department and was promoted to his first leadership position as Shift Sergeant. In 1991, Chief Phillips was promoted to Shift Captain where he would serve until being promoted to Major of Patrol. In 2000, Chief Phillips was promoted to Major of Patrol where he would serve approximately fourteen years leading and overseeing the day-to-day functions of the Department's Patrol Division. In September 2014, Chief Phillips was promoted to his current position as Chief of Police.

Deputy Chief Brian Crews, also a native of Shelbyville, began his career with the Shelbyville Police Department in January of 2000. He is a graduate of the Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy, Middle Tennessee State University, and The Nashville School of Law. He holds a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice Administration and a Doctorate of Jurisprudence. After a brief stint on patrol, Deputy Chief Crews was assigned to the Criminal Investigations Division. He rose to the rank of Detective Lieutenant in 2014 and was promoted to Deputy Chief of Police in 2018. Deputy Chief Crews is married to Amanda Crews and the couple has two daughters, Suzanna and Sara Emery.





#### Allocation of Personnel


The Department has a total of sixty-one employees (excluding crossing guards). These positions include forty-six sworn officers, five administrative support employees, six communications employees, and three animal control employees. Sworn officers account for 75% of all Department personnel, the largest personnel classification in the Department. The Department's allocation of personnel also includes civilian support. This includes an administrative support staff (12%), communications personnel (10%), and animal control personnel (5%).

The Department consists of multiple divisions: the Uniform Patrol Division, Criminal Investigations Division, Training Division, Office of the Chiefs, Communications Division, Administrative Division, and Animal Control Divison. The Uniform Patrol Division is the largest division in the Department followed by the CID Division. Together, these Divisons represent roughly 75% of the Department's functions. The Communications Divison, Administrative Division, and Animal Control make up the other approximate 25% of the Department.

## Shelbyville Police Department 2020 Goals & Objectives

In the development of the goals and objectives of the Shelbyville Police Department for the upcoming year of 2020, the Department wishes to remain mindful of its mission to provide assistance, protection, and the preservation of peace and tranquility to the citizens of the City of Shelbyville. The Department also wishes to remain mindful of the goals outlined within the Department's mission to provide a community where citizens feel secure and enjoy safe travel, in which criminal activity is deterred and offenders are prosecuted, and there exists a free flow of information and close community relationships. It is with this focus and a commitment to excellence that the Department has developed its goals and objectives for 2020.

The following goals and objectives outlined below are a collection from multiple divisions of the Shelbyville Police Department and reaffirm the Department's commitment to its mission and service excellence. They share a common theme of enhancing the Department's level of professionalism and law enforcement capabilities. They focus on the importance of continued personnel training and development, the advancement of and utilization of technological resources, improving the safety of the community and community relations, the dissemination and free flow of information, and advancements in proactive crime deterrence and the apprehension and prosecution of offenders.

In the calendar year of 2020, the Shelbyville Police Department lists the following goals & objectives:

### 1. The continued enhancement of departmental operations and services.

### From The Office of Chief & Deputy Chief:

- Adherence to widely accepted law enforcement standards of the Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation (TELA).
- A continued effort to improve and enhance the Department's written directives and dissemination of those directives in accordance with accreditation standards.
- Protect, preserve, and defend the lives, property and the rights of all people, while serving with honesty, integrity, and sound judgment.

- Provide a community where people can feel safe and secure in their homes and businesses.
- Continue efforts to update and modernize the current facility, which includes updating building security and accessibility.
- Develop a plan that will allow the City/Department to seek guidance from a consultant/firm in assessing the Department's needs for a new facility, i.e. space, security, accessibility to the public, and needed technological advancements.
- Work with MTAS law enforcement coordinators to determine appropriate personnel levels based on population and call volume increases.
- Appropriate funds for additional personnel.
- Explore options and feasibility of mobile data terminals.
- Explore updating radio communications from analog to digital.
- Convert records management system to ISOMS, a cloud based internet records management system.

## Criminal Investigations & Patrol Divisions:

- Maintain personnel levels and shift operations at full manpower.
- Replace outdated equipment and purchase of new equipment, i.e. TASERS.
- Transition from the .45 caliber handgun to the Glock 9mm.
- Appropriate funding for uniform red dot sights and rail mounted flashlights.
- Obtain a TIBRS crime solvability rate of 50% or greater.

## 2. The continued enhancement of professionalism, personnel development, and leadership within the Department.

## From The Office of Chief & Deputy Chief:

- Continue to provide leadership and direction to all Department personnel.
- Ensure training and personnel development remain a priority of the Department.
- Increase training that focuses on current law enforcement issues, i.e. de-escalation training, anti-bias based policing.
- Focus on leadership training for next generation of leaders.

## Criminal Investigations & Patrol Divisions:

- Provide programs that increase officer morale including team building exercises, recognition programs (i.e. marksmanship awards), and opportunities for specialized training of officer interest.
- Utilize opportunities that offer free training programs for officers (i.e. THSO, Murfreesboro PD, etc.)
- Maintain cell phone forensic training and partnership with US Secret Service.

## 3) The Enhancement and Utilization of Technology and Technological Resources

## From The Office of Chief & Deputy Chief:

- Enhance online services.
- Replace outdated equipment, computers, and software.
- Expand utilization of current software (i.e. PowerDMS)
- Continue on-line training for officers using Virtual Academy.

## Criminal Investigations & Patrol Divisions:

- Maintain subscription to *Leads Online*, and seek cooperation of local pawn shops in the utilization of *Leads Online* for data entry.
- Continue efforts to collaborate with Shelbyville Power, for the installation and maintenance of digital video recorders at all major intersections inside the City of Shelbyville.
- Continue efforts to collaborate with Shelbyville Public Housing to gain remote access to their video surveillance system.

## 4) Continued improvement in areas of community relations and the dissemination of information.

## From the Office of Chief & Deputy Chief:

- Continue to build and foster relationships with other law enforcement agencies. (i.e. monthly meetings with the Bedford Country Sheriff's Office, EMA, etc. Cooperation with Department of Children Services and other agencies.)
- Continue to support the Tennessee's Highway Safety Office (THSO) in its mission to reduce traffic crashes, and injuries and fatalities resulting from crashes. (i.e. continue to seek grant funding to support their mission, participate in NHTSA and THSO campaigns, media events, and meetings.)
- Continue monthly command meetings to discuss the operations of the Department and to share interdepartmental information.

## Criminal Investigations & Patrol Divisions:

- The enhancement of current out-reach programs and Community Policing programs, and the development of new programs. (i.e. Citizen's Academy and classes including topics on Women's Defense, Personal & Home Protection, Consequences of Sexting and Improper Use of Social Media, and Solving Local Cases with Forensic Evidence)
- Revamp the Shelbyville Bedford County Crime Stoppers Program and begin quarterly meetings.
- Increase our presence in local school safety walk-thru and involvement in the Journey mentoring program.
- Continue training sessions for local business and churches regarding security and active shooter situations.

#### **Shelbyville Police Department**

#### A Review of Accomplishments (2020)

All divisions of the Shelbyville Police Department were requested to submit annual goals during the development process of the Department's 2020 goals and objectives. Throughout the year, while mindful of the established goals and objectives, the Department continued to focus on its mission. It is with this focus and a commitment to excellence that the Department proceeded toward the accomplishment of those goals. As you review some of the accomplishments noted below, you will notice the Department's efforts to enhance professionalism, enforcement capabilities, and community relations.

#### **Accomplishments of Sworn Personnel**

A major function of the Department is answering calls for service, crime deterrence, and the apprehension of offenders; a direct function of the Department's Uniform Patrol Division and Criminal Investigations Division. While the Uniform Patrol Division struggled to maintain shift levels at full staff they continued to focus on core services that include answering calls for service. Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, officers were encouraged to increase visibility patrol but limit proactive policing efforts. The Tennessee Supreme Court limited all in-person court settings for a number of weeks in 2020. This mandate significantly impacted traffic citations. This along with our own department's measures to limit person to person contact had an impact on our enforcement efforts for 2020. The pandemic also required implementing additional safety measures such as reporting incidents via telephone and email. Despite our best efforts, a number of our officers still contracted Covid-19 during 2020.

Training and specialized training was also limited this year due to Covid-19. Officers received the majority of their core training via Virtual Academy. This platform allowed all of our officers to receive POST mandated training requirements while maintaining social distancing measures. While all of our core training was received via Virtual Academy some officers were still able to attend specialized training.

The Criminal Investigations Division continued its efforts to enhance its investigatory resources. The Division received continued funding for LeadsOnline and has now installed digital video recorders at the majority of all intersections within the city. The Division had maintained a strong TIBRS crime solvability rate.

Another primary function of the Shelbyville Police Department is the facilitation of the movement of traffic and the enforcement of laws. Remaining committed to roadway safety, members of multiple divisions of the Department worked diligently to support the mission of the Tennessee Highway Safety Office (THSO) to decrease traffic crashes, injuries, and fatalities, and to improve overall traffic safety. The Department held several DUI and traffic enforcement saturation patrols in efforts to increase safety and reduce crashes, injuries, and fatalities.

#### Administrative Accomplishments

During 2020, the Department focused on leadership and training. The Chief of Police was active in the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police and received executive leadership training. The Department maintained adherence to Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation standards. The Department also continued its efforts to improve and enhance written directives and the dissemination of those directives through the use of PowerDMS in accordance with accreditation standards. The division implemented a new Use of Force for all agency personnel. The model policy complies with the mandatory principles set forth by the Presidential Executive Order No. 13929 on Safe Policing for Safe Communities. Adoption of this policy qualifies the Shelbyville Police Department to receive discretionary grant funding from the US Department of Justice and TN Office of Criminal Justice Programs for future law enforcement needs and requests.

The Department continued to focus on equipment needs and updates to the security/accessibility to the police department. Funding for security/accessibility updates was awarded in the 2019-2020 budget and construction and implementation began in 2020. The records division and front lobby received the first round of updates. New equipment included the purchase of new police vehicles to replace units that had exceeded their service life resulting in on-going costly repairs. The Department received funding for replacement of Tasers and received the new equipment in January of 2020. The department continued to explore the implementation of body-worn cameras; however, at this time implementation is on hold due to costs and the ever changing technology and legal uncertainties. The department transitioned from WinSOMS to iSOMS records management system. The new internet based records management system affords officers the ability to access the records management system anywhere an internet connection is established.

The Department was successful in securing grant awards during the 2020 calendar year including awards through THSO and the US Department of Justice. Grant funds from the Department of Justice allowed the department to outfit all of the patrol division with load-bearing vests and accessories. Acquisition and implantation of the load-bearing vest was a stated goal for 2020. This significant accomplishment would not have been possible without the grant funding from the federal government.

As a result of a sizeable donation from a local business, the department received funding for the purchase of Ipads for all sworn officers. The Ipads come with a data package allowing mobile data technology. This ability has been a desire for administration for quite some time. Without the donation, the department would not have been able to implement this technology on 2020.

Another significant accomplishment was the increase of sworn personnel from forty-two to forty-six. The four additional officers have been hired and are currently in the field training program. Upon graduation from the police academy, an additional officer will be added to each of the four patrol shifts.

#### Advancements in Community Relations & the Free Flow of Information

Recognizing the importance of positive community interactions and relationships, and the Department's responsibility to educate the community, the Department supported several community outreach programs. These programs included community presentations by the Department's K-9 officers and K-9s, and multiple presentations by members of the Criminal Investigations and Patrol Divisions. Examples include presentations targeting women and children; programs that target senior citizens presenting topics of personal and home safety, fraud, and safe driving; and presentations targeting teens including online tips and the dangers of social media. Once again, due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, the agency was not as involved this year as it has been in the past. The department hopes for increased community related events for 2021.

The Department also recognizes the importance of the free flow of information in community relations. This is not only important for community relations, but also interdepartmentally. It builds public trust and supports transparency and establishes a means of communication. Interdepartmentally, it increases efficiency and the Department's ability to improve services and public safety. The Department continued its usual means of public communication, including Chief's monthly radio broadcast and continued to focus on increasing its use of social media. The Department also continued inter-agency monthly command meetings to ensure the free flow of information interdepartmentally. The minutes from the Command Staff meetings are now transcribed and disseminated to the members of the department through PowerDMS.

As the Department reflects on 2020, it looks forward to 2021 and the pursuit of new goals while still focusing on the mission of the Department and a standard of excellence.

## Shelbyville Police Department Programs (2020)

**Crime Stoppers:** Provides a department sponsored intelligence gathering function for the anonymous submission of information concerning past and future crime.

Traffic Accident Reconstructionist: Investigates and reconstructs accidents.

Field Training Program (FTO): Provides field training for incoming Shelbyville Police Officers.

Firearms Instructors: Conducts weapons training for the Shelbyville Police Department.

Driving School: The Shelbyville Police Department has four officers certified to instruct the DDC-4 Defensive Driving Class.

**Pressure Point Control Tactics (PPCT) Instruction:** The Shelbyville Police Department has several officers trained in pressure point control tactics and self-defense. These officers provide training to department personnel and offer this instruction to members of the community.

**General Order System:** A revised publication composed of more than eighty written directives to control, direct, and provide guidance for police operations.

Motorcycle Patrol: Two units are assigned to traffic enforcement.

Performance Evaluation System: An annual performance evaluation system for all personnel.

**Police K-9:** Two certified patrol canines trained in narcotics detection. One canine additionally trained in tracking and patrol canine work.

**Mobile Audio/Video Recording:** Capabilities are included in most uniformed patrol vehicles with auto download from within in the vehicle.

**Radar Units:** Most patrol vehicles are equipped with radar to encourage speed enforcement, assist in DUI apprehension, and reduce accidents, injuries, and fatalities.

**DUI & Traffic Enforcement Saturation Patrols:** Proactive enforcement program, wherein patrol officers are scheduled overtime assignments to enforce DUI and traffic laws to reduce related traffic crashes, injuries, and fatalities.

**Take Home Vehicle Program:** Vehicles are provided for police officers who live within 10 miles of Bedford County, investigators, and upper level command staff. This increases visibility in neighborhoods, reduces downtime during shift change, and improves morale.

**Police Benevolence Association (PBA):** Established in 2016 to instill the spirit of benevolence, good will, integrity, and mutual respect among members of violent crime and/or major catastrophe.



## **Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS)**

#### **Total Reportable Offenses:**

A review of crime data from the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS) shows an overall decrease in crime within the City of Shelbyville over the previous three years. According to this data, the total number reportable incidents In the City of Shelbyville, has decreased by 7% in this time period.



It is important to consider population increases in regards to crime trends as the City continues to experience population growth. As of January 2020, TIBRS hasn't updated the estimated population for the City of Shelbyville. The estimated population of 22,304 could be significantly lower than what is actual. The City continues to see significant residential developments. The growth could lead to a higher number of reportable incidents to TIBRS in the near future. The department is doing well in its efforts to control crime through deterrence and apprehension of offenders. The department also expects to see an increase in reportable incidents once proactive policing measures are reinstated. In 2020, many of the proactive policing measures were curtailed due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Officers were encouraged to focus on high visibility patrols and limit their person to person contacts. the court system was closed and the Bedford County jail was limiting their intake. As the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic subside and police operations return to normal, the department expects to see an increase in reportable incidents. The addition of 4 patrol officers will enable the shifts to conduct more proactive policing measures in 2021. This too will likely effect the number of reportable incidents.

#### **Reportable Incidents by Group:**




In the City of Shelbyville, *Group A Offenses* show a 9% decrease over the previous three years (2018-2020). These offenses include *Crimes Against Persons, Crimes Against Property, and Crimes Against Society. Crimes Against Property* include burglary, fraud, and theft and continue to account for the largest number of all *Group A Offenses* inside the City.


*Crimes Against Persons*, which includes violent crimes such as aggravated assault, simple assault, and rape accounted on average for approximately 36% of all *Group A Offenses* in 2020. This group of offenses saw a slight decrease in 2020.

*Crimes Against Society,* which includes drug offense and prostitution, accounts for the smallest portion of all *Group A Offenses*; an average of approximately 14% of all reportable incidents over the previous three years. This classification of offenses will likely increase when proactive policing efforts are reinstated by the Criminal Investigations Division and the Patrol Division.

In summary, the City of Shelbyville saw a slight decrease in overall reportable incidents. This is remarkable considering the population growth and significant call for service increase over the same time period. It is an indication that efforts of the Shelbyville Police Department to reduce crimes through deterrence and the apprehension and prosecution of crimes has been successful.



**Group B Offenses** include DUI, Drunkenness, Liquor Law Violations, Disorderly Conduct, and Family-Non Violent offenses. The City experienced a decrease in these offenses during 2019 after only a slight increase from 2017 to 2018.



The City experienced a significant increase in DUI arrests in 2020. Grant funding through the Tennessee Highway Safety Office is utilized by the Shelbyville Police Department in an effort to specifically concentrate on DUI enforcement. Officers conducted numerous saturation patrols specifically focusing on impaired driving.

## Shelbyville Police Department Uniform Patrol Division

The Uniform Patrol Division consists of 36 sworn officers and is the largest division within the Shelbyville Police Department. The Uniform Patrol Division is commanded by Major of Patrol Pat Mathis, four Lieutenants, and four Sergeants. There are currently four shifts with permanently assigned officers to each. Each shift is twelve hours and consists of a lieutenant, sergeant, and seven patrol officers.

The Uniform Patrol Division has two Patrol K-9 units and two motorcycle officers. Several officers maintain certification in special areas of skill that includes Tennessee Information Enforcement System (TIES) certification, crash investigations and reconstruction, defensive driving instructors, firearms Instructors, and defensive tactics instructors. The Uniform Patrol Division provides around-the-clock police protection to the citizens of Shelbyville and is responsible for patrolling a jurisdiction of approximately nineteen square miles broken down into five geographical zones.

Members of the Uniform Patrol Division respond to initial calls for service as well as self-initiated activity. They conduct preliminary investigations, prepare incident and crash reports, make arrests, issue citations, provide traffic support, and provide numerous other duties. They also participate in the Tennessee Highway Safety Office (THSO) funded saturation patrols and campaigns such as "Click-it-or-Ticket," "Booze It and Lose It," and the Tennessee Highway Patrol's "Move Over" campaign. Members of the Uniform Patrol Division frequently assist the Bedford County Sheriff's Office, Tennessee Highway Patrol, and the 17<sup>th</sup> Judicial District Drug Task Force. The members of the Division also have the opportunity to assist and support other outside agencies.

#### Highlights From 2020

In 2020, administration requested four additional patrol officers to increase manpower and the level of service. The city council approved the request during the 2020-2021 budget negotiations. Uniform Patrol Division celebrated the addition of officers Brandi Merlo, Tracy Teal, Dylan Farrar, Bailey Dineen, Laterra Clay, and Brandon Paslay. We are excited about each of these officers future in law enforcement.



**Officer Dylan Farar** joined the Shelbyville Police Department on October 6, 2020. Before coming to work at the police department Dylan worked for Shelbyville Animal Control as an Animal Control Enforcement Officer. Dylan is scheduled to attend the Regional Law Enforcement Training Academy in Blount County, Tennessee in January of 2021. Patrolman Farrar will join the patrol division upon completion of the law enforcement academy.



**Officer Brandon Paslay** joined the Shelbyville Police Department in December of 2020. Paslay relocated to Tennessee from the state of Pennsylvania where he was a certified police officer for the borough of Marcus Hook, Pennsylvania. Officer Paslay will be attending the TLETA transition school in the Spring of 2021. After successful completion of the transition school and the field training program, Paslay will join the patrol division.



**Officer Laterra Clay** joined the Shelbyville Police Department in November of 2020. She completed 8 weeks of the field training program and enrolled in the Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy in January of 2021. Upon successful completion of the TLETA, Officer Clay will join the patrol division.



**Officer Bailey Dineen** joined the Shelbyville Police Department in November of 2020. Before joining the police department Bailey worked as a correctional officer with Bedford County Sheriff's Department. She completed 8 weeks of the field training program and enrolled in the Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy in January of 2021. Upon successful completion of the police academy Dineen will join the patrol division.



**Officer TJ Teal** joined the Police Department in April of 2020. TJ began his law enforcement career as a patrol officer in the State of Oklahoma. After moving to Tennessee TJ worked as a correctional officer and deputy for Marshall County Sheriff's Department. TJ was hired by the Shelbyville Police Department and after completing an abbreviated field training program he joined the B-night shift.



**Officer Brandi Merlo** joined the Shelbyville Police Department in February of 2020. Before joining the police department she worked as a corrections officer at the Bedford County Sheriff's Department. After successful completion of the field training program she attended the Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy. She is currently assigned to A-nights as a patrol officer. Every day, members of the Division work diligently exhibiting excellence in the services they provide to the community and citizens of the City of Shelbyville. Throughout the year, members of the Division receive recognition from the citizens they serve, the Chief, and other members of the Division's Command Staff. The Department is excited to recognize the professionalism, dedication, and service provided every day by all of the members of the Division. This year, the command staff was tasked with nominating individual officers for exemplary service to the City of Shelbyville. While this is often a very difficult task the following officers have been nominated by their supervisors for their service in 2020.

#### Employee Spotlight 2020



Officer Darrian Lanier led the department with 35 DUI arrests in 2020. One of our core goals as an agency is to reduce traffic accidents by all means possible and to make our streets a safe place to travel. The apprehension of 35 persons for suspicion of driving under the influence is a significant personal accomplishment. There is no doubt Lanier's enforcement activity and efforts in 2020, made a great impact in reducing alcohol related accident and injury. Officer Lanier has set another lofty goal for 2021 and for this he should be commended.



Officer Samuel Campbell was nominated by his supervisors for exemplary moral character and compassion. He is known for always going above and beyond when answering calls for service and dealing with the public. Maintaining a close relationship with our community is a core goal of the Shelbyville Police Department. In 2020, after responding to a call involving child abuse and neglect, three small children required immediate removal from the dangerous environment in which they were living. After consulting with his own wife, the the Campbell family agreed to foster the three small children. The children are now receiving emotional support, love, and a safe home

environment. Because of his efforts, Officer Campbell is very well deserving of this special recognition.



Officer Chris Vest was recognized by his supervisors for his outstanding service to our department and community. Officer Vest has been with the Shelbyville Police Department since 2008. He is a Field Training Officer and Crash Scene Investigator. Vest is passionate about teaching and preparing new recruits for a career in law enforcement. While 2020was a trying year for everyone, especially first responders and police officers, Officer Vest displayed exemplary character and dependability. He was called upon many times under short notice and always agreed to come into work and relieve shifts who were shorthanded. Officer Vest displayed a positive attitude and served his community without

complaints. A core value is to provide a community where the people can feel secure and safe in their homes and businesses. Officer Vest's commitment to service before self in 2020 warrants this special recognition.






## **Review of Uniform Patrol Division's Statistical Data**

In 2020, the Shelbyville Police Department continued to experience an increase in calls. Calls for service increased from 14,647 calls in 2019 to 17,319 in 2020. Officers of the Uniformed Patrol Division responded to a total of 839 vehicle crashes. Due to a change in fuel contractors the total number of miles patrolled during 2020 is unavailable.

In 2020, the Shelbyville Police Department responded to 839 vehicle crashes. Of these crashes, 134 involved accidents with injury. The department had two traffic fatalities in 2020.



The Uniform Patrol Division issued 1,942 citations in 2020. (560 speeding citations, 4 violations of the Move Over Law, 21 seat belt/child restraint citations, 145 citations for failure to show proof of insurance, 147 citations for light law violations, and 82 citations for violations of traffic control devices.

Traffic enforcement is a major function of the Shelbyville Police Department. However, during
the Covid-19 Pandemic, proactive traffic enforcement efforts were significantly curtailed. While
our officers were encouraged to remain visible, they were requested to prioritize their
enforcement efforts focusing on major infractions. City and Sessions Courts were closed for a
significant time during 2020. Both prosecutors and judges requested our enforcement activity
be limited. Administration also believed the reduction in enforcement activity would limit
officers exposure to Covid-19. When the virus is abated we will continue our proactive
enforcement activity.

## **Criminal Investigations Division**

The Criminal Investigations Division is responsible for the investigation of crimes reported to the Shelbyville Police Department. The division is divided into two distinct units: the criminal investigation unit and the forensic services unit. As a division we strive to work with other agencies in an effort to better serve the citizens of our community. We are also committed to representing our department at several speaking engagements throughout the year where participants are instructed on topics such as child safety, crime prevention and protection.

The Shelbyville Police Department year to date statistics as reported to the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS), indicate 1807 offenses were reported to the Shelbyville Police Department. 916 offenses were cleared representing a clearance rate of 50.69%. The offense clearance rate according to TIBRS is down from 53.81% from 2019. The Criminal Investigations Division set a goal of obtaining a 50% clearance rate. The 50.69% clearance rate is in the goal set forth by the Criminal Investigations Division for the Shelbyville Police Department. The statewide average clearance rate is 38%.

The criminal investigation division conducted 1450 investigations into various crimes. Detectives assigned to the criminal investigation division made 206 arrests in 2020.




#### Notable Investigations, Arrests and Convictions

On January 15<sup>th</sup> 2020 Brad Majors was sentenced to • fifty years in Federal Court, Chattanooga TN, for one count of exploitation of a child and one count of possession of child pornography. On August 3rd 2020 Brad Majors pled guilty in Bedford County Circuit Court to six counts of Rape of a Child and



agreed to forty years to serve. This is a 90-year sentence to be served at 100%.

- Dale Clark was sentenced to 20 years in Federal Court for Hobbs Act Robbery, Possesing a Firearm as a convicted felon, and using a firearm during a federal crime of violence, stemming from the Robbery of Chally Wally's in 2019.
- Jesse Ray Laurin plead Guilty in Circuit Court and was sentenced to 20 years to an Amended Charge of Attempted Second-Degree Murder of William Prater. The homicide occurred in 2018.
- Dannie Gately plead guilty to 2 counts of Rape of a Child in Circuit Court and was sentenced to serve 20 years at 100%.





#### Notable Investigations, Arrests and Convictions (cont.)

- Rachel Moore plead guilty to Theft Over \$60,000.00 stemming from an investigation of Embezzlement from Redd's heating and Air.
- On June 19, 2020 Criminal Investigations was called to the scene of a Homicide located at 300 Neeley Ave Apt 6D. Adrienne Cox was found deceased in the apartment with at least two apparent wounds. While interviewing relatives, neighbors, and friends, investigators were able to develop a suspect. Steven Lokey and Christopher Gunsell were arrested for First Degree Murder.



• The Criminal Investigations Division placed some ads on Craigslist during a prostitution sting. There were 6 persons arrested for Patronizing Prostitution.



#### Notable Investigations, Arrests and Convictions (cont.)

 An investigation of Fraud was assigned to Detective Swift. During the investigation David Glenn Helton was developed as a suspect. David Glenn Helton was charged with Forgery and Theft of Property in the amount of \$9494.12. At the time of his arrest, David Helton was on Federal Parole for Forgery.



• Thomas Leroy Arthur was arrested for Solicitation of a Minor and Attempted Aggravated Statutory Rape. Arthur, a 71 year-old male used Face Book and text messaging to solicit who he thought was a 16 year-old female to meet and have sex. At the time of his arrest Thomas Arthur was a



registered sex offender from Coffee County.

#### Major Events:

On March 18, Criminal Investigations Division was called to the scene of a homicide located at 208 Chestnut Drive. Artenchis Wainwright was found lying face down in the doorway of his front door with a large laceration to his head. The victim's girlfriend, Cristalia Ford advised that 2 masked men were in the house when they returned home and beat Artenchis to death and then stole his vehicle. On the same date Artenchis Wainwrights' vehicle was located in Murfreesboro TN after being set on fire. Using cell phone forensics, call detail records, and video from different locations, suspects were identified. Colby Watford, Charles Young and Cristalia Ford were arrested for First Degree Murder.



#### Notable Accomplishments:

• Det. Carol Jean was selected to represent the Shelbyville Police Department for Leadership Bedford Class of 2020.



- Criminal investigations received a total of 49 video requests for case files from Patrol Officers.
- A total of 268 interview videos were collected by Criminal Investigations.
- A total of 100 forensic extractions of cell phones were conducted by Lt. Merlo.
- Detective Nathan Everhart registers the sex offenders for the City of Shelbyville and filed charges on 4 individuals that were out of compliance.

#### **Spotlight:**

#### **Criminal Investigation Division**

Detective Sergeant Sam Jacobs joined the Shelbyville Police Department as a patrol officer on 11/13/2001. He was assigned to the Criminal Investigations Division in October 2011, and promoted to Detective Sergeant in November 2018. Detective Sergeant Jacobs was assigned over 250 cases to investigate for the year 2020. Detective Sergeant Jacobs is very instrumental in obtaining videos from many different sources to complete not only his case file, but also detectives and patrol officers case files. Detective Sergeant Jacobs is a very loyal and dependable member of the Shelbyville Police Department and can be counted on to work alongside any other agency that needs his assistance. Detective Sergeant Jacobs is always prepared and is very capable of leading the Criminal Investigations Divisions when the Lieutenant is not available. Det. Sgt. Jacobs, along with his dedication, work ethic, dependability and leadership qualities is an asset to the Shelbyville Police Department.



#### **Forensic Services Unit:**

Crime Scene Investigator Sgt. Bill Logue and Property & Evidence Technician Sheri Rhodes make up the Forensic Services Unit of the Shelbyville Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division.

Together they processed 1026 items of evidence in 2020. Of those, 187 were submitted to the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation for forensic analysis.

Sgt. Logue processed 29 crime scenes.

The district attorney's office requested and received 63 in-car videos for submission as evidence in the prosecution of SPD cases.

62 items of property that was found, recovered stolen, or evidence from adjudicated cases were returned to their rightful owners.

26 submissions of counterfeit U.S. currency totaling a fraudulent value of \$1,360.00 were processed and will be turned over to the U.S. Secret Service for destruction.

There was an evidence destruction in November 2020. Shelbyville Police Chief, Jan Phillips and Bedford County Sheriff Austin Swing assisted Detective Sgt. Sam Jacobs and Sgt. Logue. All combustible items, mostly confiscated drugs, from adjudicated cases with no remaining appeal opportunities, were incinerated to ash in a 10-foot-deep trench dug at the City of Shelbyville's Burn Pit. The trench was then filled in burying the remaining ashes. The evidence was never unattended and was observed until its complete destruction.





#### **Community Service Projects:**

The Criminal Investigations Division is committed to representing the Shelbyville Police Department at various public relations functions throughout the year. We are also frequently asked to give presentations on topics such as self-defense, senior fraud and home protection, online safety and drug avoidance and awareness. The following is a snapshot of some of the functions we represented the department in this year.

#### Synopsis of 2020 Shelbyville Police Department Training

This year the Shelbyville Police Department had approximately 2,455 hours of training in a variety of fields. In 2020, the Department's general in-service topics included Dealing with Autism and the Mentally III, Low Light Tactics, advanced Firearms Training and a variety of courses on Virtual Academy, including the mandatory annual requirements.

Although 2020, was a very difficult year for training, with several courses cancelled due to Covid-19, the department still managed to send officers to specialized training such as Patrol Rifle Instructor, Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE), DUI Detection and Standardized Field Sobriety Testing, Narcotics Investigations, TBI Amber Alert and Endangered Child Alert, Homicide Investigations, Advanced Traffic Crash Investigations, Man Trailing Workshop for K-9 handlers, along with Basic and Advanced Glock Armorer's course.

In 2020, the Training Lieutenant along with the department's firearms instructors conducted testing and evaluations for the acquisition of new duty weapons. After a thorough review of different options the division elected to replace its existing duty weapons with the Glock G45 MOS, which can be equipped with red dot sights (RDS). The department's firearms instructors attended a Red Dot Instructor course put on by OTG Tactical. Officers who have elected to equip their duty pistol with and RDS have been trained and qualified.

The Department continued its efforts to assist outside agencies and the Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy in specialized instruction. In 2020, Patrolman Ronnie Blankenship taught Defensive Tactics courses at TLETA.

The training division was involved in the onboarding of six new patrol officers in 2020. One officer graduated from the 12 week Law Enforcement Training Academy in 2020.

#### **Administrative Division**

The Administrative Division of the Shelbyville Police Department is commanded by Deputy Chief Brian Crews and includes our City Clerk of Court, Records Department, Grants, and Accreditation Management.



#### **Division Personnel**

Kim Nash, the City Clerk of Court, has over forty-three years of service dedicated to the Shelbyville Police Department. She is responsible for the daily management of administrative personnel, department payroll, managing the city court docket, and all fees, fines and court costs collected. 2020, was a challenging year for the administrative division. The Covid-19 pandemic presented unforeseen challenges to payroll and court docket management. The department was fortunate to have a dedicated employee such as Kim to handle these challenges.



Kerry Dunn, who has more than twenty years of dedicated service to the Department, primarily provides assistance and support to the Criminal Investigations Division and is responsible for registering all sex offenders living within the City of Shelbyville. She also assists the City Clerk of Court, Records Clerk, and the Communications Division. In 2019, Dunn took on the role of assisting the accreditation manager and was instrumental again in 2020 in assisting the accreditation manager with the annual reporting requirements.



The City Clerk of Court is also assisted by a full-time Records Clerk, Lilia Torres, with more than eleven years of service to the department. She is responsible for greeting and assisting visitors with records requests, data entry, and the collection of fees, fines, and court costs. She also serves as an interpreter for the Department and often assists in the Communications Division.

#### 2020 Grants

The Shelbyville Police Department often seeks additional sources of funding through the submission of grants to state and federal agencies to assist the Department in providing improved services to the citizens of the City of Shelbyville. Examples of funding requests include funding for additional traffic enforcement and equipment.

#### **Grant Awards**

- The Department was awarded funding through the Governor's Highway Safety Office (GHSO) for the purchase of capital and non-capital small equipment, and overtime funding for DUI and Speed Enforcement.
- The Department was awarded annual funding through the Office of Justice Programs, Bulletproof Vest Partnership for the purchase of bulletproof vests for safety and protection of Department officers.
- The Department received a Department of Justice Grant totaling over \$30,000.00 for the purchase of personal protective equipment and sanitation equipment to mitigate the spread of Covid-19. The department used these funds to purchase load bearing vests for all certified officers. The department also used funds for additional cleaning supplies.

#### Accreditation

In 2013, the Shelbyville Police Department successfully completed a self-assessment process that included a full review and update of all existing policies and procedures in accordance with Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation (TLEA) standards. The Department was found to have demonstrated a commitment to professional law enforcement standards and compliance with the TLEA program. At that time, based on the recommendation of the assessment team, the Department was awarded its first Certificate of Meritorious Accreditation in December 2013 by the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police (TACP) and its Board of Directors.

To remain this certification of accreditation, the Department must maintain compliance with all applicable standards and undergo a new TLEA assessment every three years. The Shelbyville Police Department's Accreditation team continues to work diligently to maintain compliance with all applicable standards and provide assurance to the citizens of Shelbyville that they are served by a professional, effective, and efficient police department. In 2019, the Department's re-accreditation assessment consisted of an on-site review and panel interview. The department was recognized for successfully meeting all of the standards at a meeting of the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police on December 04, 2019. In 2020, the department updated its Use of Force policy and was recognized by the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police and Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation Program for being in compliance with best practices. This qualifies the department to receive additional federal grants. (Certifying letter attached)

Dear Chief Phillips :

On behalf of the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police and the Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation Program, this letter confirms that the Shelbyville Police Department meets specific eligibility requirements, set forth by the U.S. Department of Justice, for discretionary federal grants. The Shelbyville Police Department is qualified to receive federal grants for three years from the date of this letter.

Pursuant to Section 2 of the Presidential Executive Order on Safe Policing for Safe Communities, dated June 16, 2020, Executive Order No. 13929 (the "Executive Order on Safe Policing"), the U.S. Department of Justice's discretionary grant funding is only available to state, local, and university or college law enforcement agencies that have obtained (or are in the process of seeking) credentials certifying that they meet specific standards on use of force. The U.S. Attorney General has designated the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police as an independent credentialing body to certify that Tennessee law enforcement agencies meet the conditions of eligibility for federal grants.

Following our review, we have determined that the Shelbyville Police Department meets the conditions for certification. Accordingly, the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police will include your agency within our database of certified law enforcement agencies. On or before January 31 of each year, we will provide the name of each certified law enforcement agency to the U.S. Department of Justice and the TN Office of Criminal Justice Programs.

The Communications Division, commanded by the Deputy Chief of Police; consists of six dispatchers and is often assisted by trained personnel of the Administrative Division. The primary function of the Communications Division is to provide a service to the citizens and businesses of Shelbyville by answering emergency and non-emergency requests for police service, coordinate response to citizen requests, track and document status of personnel, and assist in the protection of life and property.

All personnel of the Communications Division are Tennessee Information Enforcement System (TIES) certified, recertifying on a bi-annual basis. They are responsible for ensuring compliance with all Tennessee Bureau of Investigations (TBI), Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), and Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS), rules and regulations regarding network access to and dissemination of criminal history information, vehicle information, and driver's license information. They are also responsible for entering and checking information in the National Crime Information Center (NCIC). Other responsibilities include logging officers into and out-of-service, on-duty officer call rotation, maintaining wrecker rotation, and maintaining various electronic and manual files, and databases.

2020 Annual Report

The primary objectives of the Shelbyville Police Department's Animal Care and Control Division is to protect and educate the public. Animal control officers protect the public by responding to dangerous animal calls and they educate the public about the rabies virus, altering domestic animals and local and state laws. When these objectives are achieved they in turn protect the animals as well.

## Meet the Team!



The Animal Care and Control Division includes Deputy Chief Brian Crews, who is the Director, Animal Control Officers Jon Evans and Mariah Teal, and Administrative Assistant Linda Dickerson. Deputy Chief Brian Crews who serves as the Director oversees all major decisions for the department and checks in to make sure the daily hands on tasks are completed.

Officer Jon Evans who serves as the Senior Animal Control Officer has been with the department since July 2019. His title comes with the added responsibility of not only an animal control officer who goes on calls, but also the field training officer, and the rescue liaison. His positive attitude and notable skills working with animals are both encouraging and educating to his coworkers.

Officer Mariah Teal who serves as the Shelter Manager has been with the department since March 2020, but has been employed with the city since August 2017. Her title comes with the added responsibility of continually upgrading the department's policies and procedures and other paperwork, and maintaining a safe, clean, orderly workplace. Her organization and desire to learn all she can has helped further educate her coworkers.

Linda Dickerson who serves as the administrative assistant has been with the department since April 2019, but has been employed with the city since July 2015. Her responsibilities include taking complaint information and advising an animal control officer and cleaning the office space. She has been very supportive and willing to help where she can to keep this department running efficiently.




This year was a very unusual year. There were several weeks when this department was working with minimal staff and going on emergency related calls only and therefore the numbers below will appear unexpected.

In 2020 there were 629 calls for service responded to by animal control officers. This total call number is down from the previous years. 2018: 927 calls and 2019: 974 calls. This year the calls separate into the below listed categories;


Animals at large: 437	Noise: 11
Welfare check: 73	Fowl: 10
Dead: 36	Abandoned: 8
Aggressive: 19	Cruelty/Abuse/Neglect: 3
Sick/Injured: 16	Animals being sold: 2
Bite: 12	Ordinance violation: 2

It is important to note that some calls may be initially reported as one type, but also considered another, i.e. a welfare check may be requested, and then once responded to the animal control officer will see that the animal is being neglected. Animals at large make up the most calls at 69%.



The slight decrease from 500 (total animal intake) in 2019 to 417 (total animal intake) in 2020 can be attributed to the closures the department faced due to the pandemic. Perhaps hopefully, but also potentially due to better owner responsibility from education.


Owner surrenders were either not an option or not accounted for in years prior to 2019, but since, they have increased. Accountability has been found to be most important for owner surrenders, and the department does so while also attempting to do what is best for the animal. Owner surrenders this year came to the department mainly from people that were going through pandemic related financial trouble, or people that refused to properly take care of their animal/s. Fortunately, animals taken in from owner surrenders tend to be easily rehomed.



With a lower animal intake the output is therefore lower as well. Animals reclaimed by their owners has been added in animal output for 2020 as it was recognized as accounting for the largest percent of animals leaving the facility. Unfortunately the euthanasia total has not appeared to decrease significantly however the overall euthanasia yearly rate was calculated as 5.9%. This year has seen a rise in phone calls where people were interested in adoption. Thankfully between that and the local rescues pulling several animals at a time, the department stayed at a low capacity during the most intense parts of the pandemic.

Even without being able to utilize events such as adoption centered ones, the department has been vigilantly using other means such as social media to advertise availability of animals. With a newly enacted adoption application the department is able to get to know potential adopters more, which helps to confirm a good match between human and animal.

## Accomplishments/Changes

2020 has been a challenging year for everyone, but we have many things to be grateful for as well.

Construction on the new building, which is behind the existing one, started in December 2019 and it was approved to be utilized at the end of June 2020. This building was fashioned to have 26 kennel runs with 18 of those runs being indoor/outdoor. It also has a medical intake room, bathroom, laundry/dog washing room and small storage room. This building was made possible by the support of the public, the City of Shelbyville officials and the City Council and could not be more appreciated!

Some items were needed to furnish the new building and were acquired and donated by Leadership Bedford 2020. These items include the dog bath and washing machine. Leadership Bedford 2020 also provided the means to help update and modify the existing structure and surrounding area. The existing building was revamped by painting the interior, installing a central heating and air fixture in the office and landscaping the front parking area.

Randy McCullough who had been with the department for 43 continual years of service retired just as the new building was opened.

Due to the many restrictions for gatherings, a formal open house for the new building was postponed until October 29<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Leadership Bedford 2020 hosted and it was treated as a come and go event allowing the public to get a behind the scenes look at the many improvements.

With these major developments the department has been in a state of transition. Some changes have been called for, and the department has risen to the challenge.

### Goals for 2021

- 1. Either reestablish a third full time person, or hire a second part time employee as a kennel technician.
- 2. Have all animal control officers certified in newfound online training programs.
- 3. Expand on the FTO program that has been introduced to include firm firearm qualification.
- 4. See if an agreement can be made with local Veterinarians concerning microchipping.
- 5. Replace or repair the animal boxes on the backs of the work trucks.
- 6. Continue updating or upgrading the existing building i.e. the plumbing.
- 7. Come up with a working plan of how to upgrade the existing building to include a more extensive cat room.
- 8. Update animal city ordinances and add a chapter to include fowls.
