Poles and Posters Don't Mix



If you are planning to use a sign to publicize any activity, please post it on a stake, not on a utility pole. Nails, staples or other fasteners used to attach signs to poles can be hazardous to our workers who must climb these poles to repair or maintain our equipment.

In addition, state law prohibits the posting of signs or outdoor advertising on any utility poles.

If you want to advertise your event, get permission from property owners to post your signs on stakes, and check with your local municipality on any regulations your town may have about posting signs.

Vincentown History - William K. Haines - Little School House



The Vincentown one-room schoolhouse located on Race Street was built circa 1860 and was one of two private school located in the village of Vincentown. This was the same year that Abraham Lincoln was elected President and the first Pony Express was run from Sacramento, California, to St. Joseph, Missouri.

Originally, this schoolhouse stood on property now owned by the Allen Oil Company on Main Street. In 1981, the Allen Oil

Company donated the building to the Southampton Historical Society, and it was moved to its present location on land donated by the township. While the exact date of the opening and closing of this school is not known, it is known that at one time it became a "helping school" during the late 1920's and early 1930's. The first "public school" was built in 1863 and was located on Pleasant Street.

Restoration of the schoolhouse was accomplished through volunteer efforts and donations spearheaded by local resident Maryann Thompson. Everything used in the schoolhouse is authentic. The most popular school master of this school was William K. Haines. Mr. Haines lived on Plum Street* with his wife, Mary, who was also a school teacher — but she never taught with her husband. Editor's note: Plum Street was spelled "Plumb" at the time of Mr. Haines.

After three years of hard work, the day of re-dedication, May 19, 1984, arrived. The town folk were invited, as well as others, to the dedication, and it was well attended by local, county and state officials. The one room schoolhouse was dedicated to the school children of Southampton Township.

Clerk's Office launches property fraud alert system

Burlington County Clerk Joanne Schwartz and the Burlington County Commissioners are pleased to announce the launch of a new online service intended to alert residents of potential identity theft or fraud.

The new Property Fraud Alert System allows residents in all 40 Burlington County municipalities to sign up to have their name or business monitored for transactions and recording activities within the Burlington County Clerk's Office and receive real time alerts of activity.

The subscription service is free and is intended to act as an early warning system for potential fraud. Residents who sign up will be notified by email or phone whenever

who sign up will be notified by email or phone whenever a document, such as a deed, lien, or mortgage, is recorded in the Clerk's office with their name.

According to the FIB. Property and Martigage fraud is the flathest growing white-color crime. It can be as simple as someone recording a flaudiseral document in the County Land Records' offices making it look like they now own your home or property.

To address concerns, the Burlington County Clerk & Commissioner's Office offers a notification service that will neep citizens compatitive effects of property flows and other similar flowclusted activities.

After receiving an alert, subscribers can contact the Clerk's Office at https://www.co.burlington.nj.us/192/County-Clerk to verify the transaction and view the actual document that was recorded.


"The threat of mortgage fraud and identity theft crimes continue to rise, and all too often victims of these types of fraudulent activities are unaware their homes or identity have been stolen until it's too late," said Schwartz. "By implementing this new alert system, we're providing a tool residents can use to identify these potential scams, so they can take action right away. It's a completely free service that's quick and easy to sign up for, and it can provide some much-needed peace of mind for residents who are too busy to regularly check their property records for fraudulent activity."

Burlington County Commissioner Director Felicia Hopson said the optional new service was another proactive initiative to assist Burlington County residents and business owners.

"Almost everyone has either experienced fraud or identity theft firsthand or know someone who has, so I'm thankful that our Clerk's Office has stepped up and provided this innovative new early warning system," Hopson said. "I know now our residents will be better protected."

The Property Fraud Alert System is now live, and residents can sign up online at https://www.propertyfraudalert.com/NJBurlington Residents can also register by calling 1-800-728-3858.

The only information required is a resident's name and email or phone number to receive alerts. Residents can opt out at any time.






NATIONAL BLOOD CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

During September, National Blood Cancer Awareness Month sheds light on the cancers that affect the blood and lymphatic systems.

The observance focuses its attention on all blood cancers, including leukemia, lymphoma, multiple myeloma, and myelodysplastic syndromes. By raising awareness, the goal is to inform the public about the causes of blood cancers, how to identify the symptoms, available treatments, and progress made through research.

Blood cancers affect white blood cells or in some cases, red blood cells, or platelets. While no effective screening exists, knowing the symptoms and risk factors help to understand when to see a doctor.

Spotted Lanternfly Management Options for Homeowners and Land Managers

Background on Spotted Lanternfly, Overview of Statewide Management

This presentation will provide background information on Spotted Lanternfly and an overview of the most effective strategies for managing Spotted Lanternfly year-round.

Current Scouting and IPM Approaches for Managing Late-Season Adults and Egg Masses

The adult and egg mass stages of the Spotted Lanternfly lifecycle are important stages for control.

This presentation will explain how to determine when and where to target control measures,
