The city-initiated widening of Cerritos Avenue from Rose Street to Flower Avenue will require several Southern California Edison (SCE) poles to be relocated. 9F. EXTENSION OF CONTRACT TO JOHN L. HUNTER AND ASSOCIATES, INC. TO PROVIDE PROFESSIONAL CONSULTING SERVICES RELATED TO NPDES AND FOG PROGRAMS

The City maintains several environmental programs including the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) and Fats, Oils, & Grease (FOG). Since October 23, 2007, John L. Hunter and Associates has been providing consulting services to the City for these two programs. Staff recommends that their contract be extended for an additional three years at the same budget and hourly rates.

- 1. The City Council declared that the project is exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act, Section 15378(b)(5), organizational or administrative activities of governments that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environmen7; and

9H. AWARD OF A CONTRACT FOR THE DALE AVENUE AND CHANTICLEER ROAD TRAFFIC SIGNAL PROJECT

The construction bids for the Dale Avenue and Chanticleer Road Traffic Signal Project consisting of installation of new traffic signal poles and mast arms, controllers, and cabinet have been reviewed by the staff. Based on post-bid analysis of the five (5) bids received, staff determined that the construction bid submitted by PTM General Engineering Services, Inc. to be the lowest responsible bid at \$144,144.00. PTM is the contractor who recently completed the new signal installation at Beach Boulevard and Village Center Drive. Staff recommends the City Council award the contract for the proposed services to PTM General Engineering Services, Inc.

- 1. The City Council declared that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under Section 15301(c) Existing highways and streets, sidewalks, gutters, bicycle and pedestrian trails, and similar facilities; and
- 2. Awarded a contract for the Dale Avenue and Chanticleer Road Traffic Signal Project to PTM General Engineering Services. Inc. for the amount of \$144,144.00; and
- Authorized the City Manager to bind the City of Stanton and PTM General Engineering Services, Inc. in a contract for the Dale Avenue and Chanticleer Road Traffic Signal Project; and
- 4. Authorized the City Manager to approve contract changes, not to exceed 10-percent.

91. ACCEPTANCE OF THE THUNDERBIRD LANE SEWER AND STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECT BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STANTON, CALIFORNIA

The Thunderbird Lane Sewer and Street Improvement Project has been completed in accordance with the plans and specifications. The final construction cost for the project was \$566,433.77. The City Engineer, in his judgment, certifies that the work was satisfactorily completed as of February 15, 2018 and recommends that the City Council accept the completed work performed on this project.

The construction contract for the Thunderbird Lane Sewer and Street Improvement Project is for \$517,700.00. Change orders approved at staff level did not exceed the 10% maximum authorized at the time of award; at 9.41%. Additional costs aroused in the final stages of the project in the total of \$64,942.17. The change order was due to unforeseen conditions and additional quantities for asphalt restoration.

- 1. The City Council declared this project categorically exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act, Class 1, and Section 15301c; and
- Accepted the completion of improvements for the Thunderbird Lane Sewer and Street Improvement Project, as certified by the City Engineer, and affixed the date of February 15, 2018 as the date of completion of all work on this project; and

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- 3. Approved the final construction contract amount of \$566,433.77 with Beador Construction Company, Inc.; and
- 4. Directed the City Clerk within ten (10) days from the date of acceptance to file the Notice of Completion with the County Recorder of the County of Orange; and
- 5. Directed City staff, upon expiration of the thirty-five (35) days from the filing of the "Notice of Completion," to make the retention payment to Beador Construction Company, Inc. in the amount of \$28,321.69.

9J. LICENSE AGREEMENT BETWEEN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA EDISON COMPANY AND THE CITY OF STANTON FOR STANTON PARK

In order to continue the License Agreement for Stanton Park (Assessor's Parcel Numbers 131-091-19 and 131-091-29), between Southern California Edison and the City of Stanton, it is necessary to approve the agreement for a term of 5 (five) years commencing July 1, 2018 and ending on June 30, 2023.

The City will pay Southern California Edison Company the sum of Five Thousand Seven hundred and Eighty Five 58/100 Dollars (\$5,785.58) for the term of the contract.

- 3. Authorized the City Manager to sign Agreement: 9.1976 Stanton Park between Southern California Edison and the City of Stanton.

At this meeting, the League membership considers and takes action on resolutions that establish League policy.

In order to vote at the Annual Business Meeting, your city council must designate a voting delegate. Your city may also appoint up to two alternate voting delegates, one of whom may vote in the event that the designated voting delegate is unable to serve in that capacity.

Please complete the attached Voting Delegate form and return it to the League's office no later than Friday, August 31, 2018. This will allow us time to establish voting delegate/alternate records prior to the conference.

Please note the following procedures are intended to ensure the integrity of the voting process at the Annual Business Meeting.

- Action by Council Required. Consistent with League bylaws, a city's voting delegate and up to two alternates must be designated by the city council. When completing the attached Voting Delegate form, please attach either a copy of the council resolution that reflects the council action taken, or have your city clerk or mayor sign the form affirming that the names provided are those selected by the city council. Please note that designating the voting delegate and alternates must be done by city council action and cannot be accomplished by individual action of the mayor or city manager alone.
- Conference Registration Required. The voting delegate and alternates must be
 registered to attend the conference. They need not register for the entire conference; they
 may register for Friday only. To register for the conference, please go to our website:

Business Meeting and in possession of the voting delegate card. Annual Conference Voting Procedures

- 1. **One City One Vote.** Each member city has a right to cast one vote on matters pertaining to League policy.
- 2. **Designating a City Voting Representative.** Prior to the Annual Conference, each city council may designate a voting delegate and up to two alternates; these individuals are identified on the Voting Delegate Form provided to the League Credentials Committee.
- 3. **Registering with the Credentials Committee.** The voting delegate, or alternates, may pick up the city's voting card at the Voting Delegate Desk in the conference registration area. Voting delegates and alternates must sign in at the Voting Delegate Desk. Here they will receive a special sticker on their name badge and thus be admitted to the voting area at the Business Meeting.
- 4. **Signing Initiated Resolution Petitions.** Only those individuals who are voting delegates (or alternates), and who have picked up their city's voting card by providing a signature to the Credentials Committee at the Voting Delegate Desk, may sign petitions to initiate a resolution.

REPORT IN BRIEF:

The city-initiated widening of Cerritos Avenue from Rose Street to Flower Avenue will require several Southern California Edison (SCE) poles to be relocated. One of the relocated poles will need a new overhead easement for the supporting guy wire. A Grant of Easement to SCE for the Redevelopment Agency-owned property at 10502 Rose Street has been prepared by SCE for the Agency to approve.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

- 1. City Council declare that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under Section 15301(c) - Existing highways and streets, sidewalks, gutters, bicycle and pedestrian trails, and similar facilities; and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute a Grant of Easement to SCE for the maintenance of electrical facilities above 10502 Rose Street.

BACKGROUND:

Southern California Edison currently owns and operates electrical transmission mains along Cerritos Avenue. The Cerritos Widening Improvement Project consists of widening the south portion of Cerritos Avenue from Rose Street to Flower Avenue that has yet to be developed. This project will construct ramps and sidewalk that are to code. SCE will be forced to relocate existing facilities 5 feet from the right-of-way as is the standard throughout our city. One of the SCE poles will need an overhead 5.00 foot wide easement due to the design and load carried by that pole. As such a Grant of Easement needs to be given by the property owner (RDA) to SCE for the location of the new facilities.

ANALYSIS/JUSTIFICATION:

SCE requires a grant of easement in order to relocate wiring above 10502 Rose Street.





REPORT IN BRIEF:

The Community Services Department's mission is to enhance the quality of life of residents. In that effort and in joining with hundreds of other California cities and counties, this ordinance will implement reasonable restrictions regarding the location and manner of smoking in recreational areas.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

- 1. City Council declare that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under Section 15061(b)(3) as the activity is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing significant effect on the environment. Where it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA; and
- 2. Introduce Ordinance No. 1081, entitled:

"AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STANTON, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 14 OF THE STANTON MUNICIPAL CODE BY ADDING SECTION 14.04.075 RELATING TO PROHIBITING SMOKING IN CITY PARKS;" and

3. Set said ordinance for second reading and adoption at the July 24, 2018 regular City Council meeting.

BACKGROUND:

The U.S. Surgeon General declared that there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke, meaning that even small amounts of smoke have the potential to

cause disease and death. Secondhand smoke is a human carcinogen and has long term risks to persons exposed to it. These risks include asthmas attacks, respiratory symptoms such as coughing and shortness of breath, and respiratory infections such as bronchitis and pneumonia. Furthermore, the California Air Resource Board named secondhand smoke as a toxic air contaminant. About 4 in 10 nonsmokers in the U.S. continue to be exposed to secondhand smoke, with 54% of children (aged 3-11 years) and 47% of youth (aged 12-19) exposed to secondhand smoke.

Additionally, tobacco litter makes up almost 34% of all litter in outdoor recreation areas. Cigarette butts are the most littered item in the world and are not biodegradable. Cigarettes contain more than 7,000 chemicals, including arsenic and formaldehyde, which can leach into the environment and contaminate water. They pose a risk starting fires and threatening the safety of parks and residents.

In 2003, California passed a law that created smoke-free policies for playgrounds at public parks to protect children from secondhand smoke. California state law only restricts smoking within 25 feet of playgrounds, but municipalities are specifically authorized to pass stronger laws to prohibit smoking within any recreation areas. Currently, over 200 cities and counties in California have implemented a complete ban of smoking in their parks.

ANALYSIS/JUSTIFICATION:

In February of 2017, American on Track presented a proposal to the Youth Committee on making the City's parks smoke-free. The Committee continued to work with the organization to survey the public, collect tobacco litter in the parks, and develop their findings to Council.

The Committee has been discussing this item in their monthly meetings since February 2017. On June 19, 2017, the Committee adopted a motion to recommend that the City draft an ordinance that bans smoking in all parks in Stanton. The Committee reviewed data provided by America on Track including statistics on health dangers from smoking and City residents' view on smoking in parks. On May 9, 2018, the Community Services Department met with America on Track to further discuss their recommendation of proposing a Smoke-Free Parks ordinance to the City to prohibit smoking in parks and recreational facilities, and provide the recommendation to the City Attorney to draft an ordinance.

Between the months of October 2015 and April 2018, America on Track conducted 1,015 surveys throughout the City. The organization found that 95% of respondents support making all City parks smoke-free and 75% reported that smoking and/or litter is a problem at the parks. Out of the 1,015 respondents, 75% were Stanton residents and 75% reported visiting a park at least once a month, and 44% reporting at least weekly attendance. Furthermore, the organization collected 2,706 cigarette butts from all 6 of Stanton's parks within 2.5 hours.

The Committee's final decision was that encouraging proper health practices and enhancing the quality of life is the mission of the Community Services Department, and therefore it would be appropriate to ban smoking in all City parks. By passing an ordinance to create smoke-free parks, the City will take an important step to encourage healthy behaviors and make parks places where people can expect to be free from secondhand smoke.

The regulations of this ordinance are intended solely to address the smoking hazards. Doing so will further the City's interest in protecting public health, safety and general welfare by increasing the safety and health of its residents. All legal prerequisites prior to the adoption of this Ordinance have occurred.

FISCAL IMPACT:

None. Signage indicating the City's new regulation will be able to be added within the City's existing park maintenance budget.

ORDINANCE NO. 1081

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STANTON, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 14 OF THE STANTON MUNICIPAL CODE BY ADDING SECTION 14.04.075 RELATING TO PROHIBITING SMOKING IN PARKS

WHEREAS, tobacco use causes death and diseases and continues to be an urgent public health challenge; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Surgeon General has declared that there is no risk-free level of exposure to secondhand smoke; and

WHEREAS, exposure to secondhand smoke has negative health impacts, and exposure to secondhand smoke occurs at significant levels outdoors; and

WHEREAS, exposure to secondhand smoke contains toxic chemicals and causes death and disease; and

WHEREAS, tobacco-free laws have proven to be the only effective way of eliminating secondhand smoke exposure; and

WHEREAS, laws restricting electronic smoking devices use also have benefits to the public; and

WHEREAS, cigarette butts are a major and persistent source of litter and pose a health threat to young children and animals; and

WHEREAS, eliminating smoking in parks helps reduce secondhand smoke exposure, encourage tobacco-free lifestyles for residents and visitors, and reduces litter and fire risk; and

WHEREAS, subdivision (a) of Section 7597 of the California Government Code prohibits smoking in public buildings and extends the smoking ban to an outdoor area within twenty feet of a main exit, entrance, or operable window of public buildings; and

WHEREAS, subdivision (b) of Section 7597 of the California Government Code authorizes cities to enact bans on smoking that are more restrictive than those provided for in subdivision (a); and

WHEREAS, Section 104495 of the California Health & Safety Code prohibits smoking within a certain distance of playground or tot lot sandbox areas; and

WHEREAS, Section 104495 of the California Health & Safety Code authorizes cities to enact bans on smoking that are more restrictive than those provided for in Section 104995; and

WHEREAS, as of June 2016, more than 356 municipalities in California have restricted smoking in at least some recreation areas beyond state law; and

WHEREAS, the Youth Committee finds that secondhand smoke in the City has an impact on parks and recreational facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Youth Committee finds that the safety and health of the general public is promoted by recognizing the danger of secondhand smoke and prohibits smoking tobacco products within parks and recreation facilities; and

WHEREAS, prohibiting smoking in the City's parks and adjacent public areas will ensure that outdoor spaces are more conducive to healthy living and promote a healthier environment.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STANTON DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council hereby finds that the fact, findings and conclusions set forth above are true and correct.

SECTION 2. Section 14.04.075. The City Council hereby adds Section 14.04.075 to Chapter 14.04 of Title 14 of the City of Stanton Municipal Code to read as follows:

"Section 14.04.075 Smoking prohibited.

- A. Purpose. The purpose of this section is to prohibit the smoking of tobacco products and other substances within the boundaries of any public park, playground, and outdoor recreational area.
- B. Definitions.

"Electronic Smoking Device" means an electronic and/or battery-operated device that can be used to deliver an inhaled dose of nicotine, or any other substance, including any component, part, or accessory of such a device, whether or not sold separately. "Electronic Smoking Device" includes any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an electronic cigarette, an electronic cigar, an electronic cigarillo, an electronic pipe, an electronic hookah, or any other product name or descriptor.

"Park" means any public park or recreation or playground areas, or building or facility thereon within the City of Stanton, owned or maintained by the City as a public park or recreation or playground area, whether or not such area(s) have been formally dedicated to such purpose. "Recreational area" means any area that is publicly or privately owned, controlled, or used by the City and open to the public for recreational purposes, regardless of any fee or age requirement, including, but not limited to, parks, picnic areas, playgrounds, gardens, athletic fields, trails, bike paths, sports facilities, skateboard parks, stadiums, and other open spaces.

"Smoke" means the gases, particles, or vapors released into the air as a result of combustion, electrical ignition, or vaporization, when the apparent or usual purpose of the combustion, electrical ignition, or vaporization is human inhalation of the byproducts, except when the combusting or vaporizing material contains no tobacco, nicotine, marijuana, cannabis, cocaine, or heroin and the purpose of inhalation is solely olfactory, such as, for example, smoke from incense. The term "Smoke" includes, but is not limited to, tobacco smoke, Electronic Smoking Device vapors, marijuana or cannabis smoke, crack cocaine or heroin smoke.

"Smoking" means the release of gases, particles, or vapors into the air as the result of combustion electrical ignition, or vaporization and/or inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted, heated, or ignited cigar, cigarette, cigarillo, pipe, hookah, Electronic Smoking Device, or any plant product, including but not limited to tobacco and marijuana, intended for human inhalation.

"Tobacco Product" means:

- 1. Any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco or nicotine that is intended for human consumption, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, including, but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, little cigars, chewing tobacco, pipe tobacco, snuff; and
- 2. Any Electronic Smoking Device.
- 3. Notwithstanding any provision of subsections (1) and (2) to the contrary, "Tobacco Product" includes any component, part, or accessory of a Tobacco Product, whether or not sold separately. "Tobacco Product" does not include any product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product or for other therapeutic purposes where such product is marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose."
- C. Smoking prohibited. In addition to all places where smoking is prohibited under State or federal law, smoking shall be prohibited in all parks and recreational areas. No person shall smoke or use any tobacco product in any park or recreational area.

D. Penalties.

- Any person who violates any provision of this section shall be guilty of an infraction pursuant to Chapter 1.10 of the Stanton Municipal Code and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars.
- The remedies provided by this section are cumulative and in addition to any other remedies available to the City at law or in equity."

SECTION 3. Severability. If any chapter, article, section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance or its application to other persons. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each chapter, article, section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions of the application thereof to any person, be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and cause same to be posted in the three (3) designated posting places within the City within fifteen (15) days after its passage.

SECTION 5. The documents and materials associated with this Ordinance that constitute the record of proceedings on which these findings are based are located at Stanton City Hall, 7800 Katella Ave., Stanton, California 90680. The City Clerk is the custodian of the record of proceedings.

SECTION 6. This ordinance shall be effective thirty days after its adoption.

REPORT IN BRIEF:

At the request of Mayor Shawver, this report provides information on the process of establishing a Stanton Historical Society.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

- City Council declare that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under Section 15061(b)(3) as the activity is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing significant effect on the environment. Where is can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA;
- 2. Receive and file this report.

BACKGROUND:

At the January 9, 2018 City Council meeting, Mayor Shawver requested staff research the feasibility of creating a historical society in the City of Stanton. Historical/preservation societies are defined as organizations dedicated to preserving, collecting, researching and interpreting historical information or items.

At the March 13, 2018 City Council meeting, information pertaining to other historical societies in Orange County were provided to City Council. Staff was provided direction to conduct a survey to gauge interest from the community regarding the creation and participation in a historical society.

ANALYSIS/JUSTIFICATION:

On April 18, 2018, a survey was launched and was live for over 9 weeks until June 21. 2018. The survey included the following questions:

- Would you be willing to donate items/artifacts/photos if they are deemed to be historically relevant?
- If you have specific items/artifacts/photos in mind, please list them in the space below.
- How much time would you be willing to volunteer monthly?
- If a historical society is formed, would you be interested in being one of its leaders?

City staff advertised the survey on the City's official website and social media channels, including Facebook, Instagram and Twitter, with over 3,000 collective users, the Summer 2018 edition of the Community News and Activities guide which is distributed to 17,200 residences, and the May and June editions of the City Manager's online newsletter, which is delivered to almost 500 residents.

To further promote the survey, a Facebook ad campaign was launched on April 18, 2018 and ran for 58 days, ending on June 21, 2018. During the ad's run time, 11,643 people were reached. Of those 11,643 people, 496 clicks on the survey link were recorded.

During the time the survey was active, a total of 12 responses from residents were received. The results from the survey are as follows:

- Nine said they were willing to donate items that could be deemed historically significant with old photographs being most often cited as what could be donated.
- Four residents indicated they would be willing to donate 0-4 hours a month to help operate a potential historical society. Seven residents indicated they would be willing to donate 5-10 hours per month, while one indicated they would be willing to donate 11-15 per month.
- Eight residents indicated they would be willing to serve as leaders on a potential Historical Society committee, while four indicated they would not be interested.

Looking at the information gathered, 0.03% of the City's population filled out and submitted a survey indicating interest. Also, the maximum number of hours prospective volunteers indicated they would be willing to donate toward maintaining a potential historical society is 101 hours per month. It was estimated by a volunteer for the Costa Mesa Historical Society that it takes 6,000 hours a month to preserve their museum, so the aforementioned 101 hours a month from potential Stanton volunteers falls well short of that recommendation.

Based on the number of responses received from the online survey as compared to the number of people reached, there appears to be minimal support for the pursuit of the creation and operation of a Stanton Historical Society. If residents or other parties identify an interest in establishing a historical society, the staff report provided on March 8, 2018 provides a number of suggested starting-off points for volunteers to consider.

FISCAL IMPACT:

None currently. This would be a volunteer-driven program.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT:

In accordance with the requirements of the CEQA, this project has been determined to be exempt under Section 15061(b)(3).
