# 9F. THIRD CONTRACT AMENDMENT TO EXTEND ON-CALL TRAFFIC OPERATIONS SERVICES TO HARTZOG AND CRABILL, INC. BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STANTON, CALIFORNIA

Staff would propose to extend the current On-Call Traffic Operations Services contract for two additional years. The cost for completing the On-Call Traffic Operations Services contract is \$70,000 annually.

### RECOMMENDED ACTION:

- 1. City Council declare that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under Section 15061(b)(3) as the activity is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing significant effect on the environment. Where is can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA.; and
- 2. Approve a second contract amendment to the on-call contract with Hartzog and Crabill, Inc. to provide traffic operations services for a two year period for an annual amount of \$70,000; and
- 3. Authorize the City Manager to bind the City of Stanton and Hartzog and Crabill, Inc. in a contract to provide on-call traffic operations services.

## 12A. COUNCIL APPOINTMENTS TO FILL FIVE (5) VACANCIES ON THE STANTON PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE FOR TERMS COINCIDING WITH THE COUNCIL ELECTIONS

The Stanton Public Safety Committee is comprised of five members appointed by the City Council. The Council Member holding the seat corresponding to that numbered seat on the Stanton Public Safety Committee shall be responsible for appointment of one Committee Member (who shall be a qualified elector of the City), with majority approval of the City Council. The terms of office shall coincide with the term of office of the Council Member or Mayor who made the appointment. Section 2.06.030 of the Stanton Municipal Code requires the submission of applications and interviews prior to appointment to any position.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

- 1. City Council find that this item is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Sections 15378(b)(5)(Organizational or administrative activities of governments that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment); and
- 2. Conduct interviews of applicants; and
- 3. Make appointments to fill seats #1 (Taylor), #2 (Shawver), #3 (Ramirez), #4 (Warren), and #5 (Van) on the Stanton Public Safety Committee.

### 12B. AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR LEASING EIGHT AUTOMATIC LICENSE PLATE READING CAMERAS TO FLOCK SAFETY

Automatic License Plate Reading cameras are a very effective tool for law enforcement agencies. These cameras can either be mounted in a fixed location or on vehicles. With the recent acquisition of street lights in the city, there is the opportunity to place cameras attached to the lights. Staff would propose leasing eight cameras to be initially placed on Beach Boulevard and Katella Avenue.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

- 1. City Council declare this action is not a project per CEQA; and
- 2. Award a contract to Flock Safety to lease eight Automatic License Plate Readings cameras.

### 12C. PROPOSED ADDITION OF PARKING ON VILLAGE CENTER DRIVE FROM BEACH BOULEVARD SOUTH TO THE CITY'S SOUTHERLY BORDER

Frontier Development has requested that the City modify Village Center Drive to add parking along the curb on both sides of the street. In order to add parking, one lane of traffic would need to be removed. This will reduce the number of travel lanes on Village Center Drive to one lane in each direction.

### RECOMMENDED ACTION:

- 1. City Council declare this project to be categorically exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act, Class 1, Section 15301c; and
- 2. Direct staff whether to proceed with adding parking along one or both sides of Village Center Drive.

### **REPORT IN BRIEF:**

The Investment Report as of December 31, 2019 has been prepared in accordance with the City's Investment Policy and California Government Code Section 53646.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

- 1. City Council find that this item is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Sections 15378(b)(5) (Organizational or administrative activities of governments that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment); and
- 2. Receive and file the Investment Report for the month of December 2019.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The attached reports summarize the City investments and deposit balances as of December 2019. A summary of the City's investments and deposits is included as Attachment A. The details of the City's investments are shown in Attachment B. The City's cash and investment balances by fund type are presented in Attachment C.

### **ANALYSIS:**

The City's investments in the State Treasurer's Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) and in PFM's California Asset Management Program (CAMP) continue to be available on demand. The effective yield on LAIF for the month of December 2019 was 2.04%. All City investments have safekeeping with Bank of the West. The City's investments are shown on Attachment B and have a weighted investment yield of 2.26%. Including LAIF and the City's deposit in the Bank of the West money market account, the weighted investment yield of the portfolio is 2.13%, which is above the benchmark LAIF return of 2.04%.

The weighted average maturity of the City's investments on December 31, 2019, is 882 days. Including LAIF and a money market account, it is 395 days. LAIF's average

maturity on December 31, 2019 was approximately 226 days.

With a weighted average maturity of 2.4 years, the City is well within the investment policy restriction of 3.5 years.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

All deposits and investments have been made in accordance with the City's 2019-20 Investment Policy. The portfolio will allow the City to meet its expenditure requirements for the next six months. Staff remains confident that the investment portfolio is currently

### REPORT IN BRIEF:

The Investment Report as of December 31, 2019 has been prepared in accordance with the City's Investment Policy and California Government Code Section 53646.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

- 1. Successor Agency find that this item is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Sections 15378(b)(5) (Organizational or administrative activities of governments that will not result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment); and
- 2. Receive and file the Investment Report for the month of December 2019.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The attached reports summarize the Successor Agency investments and deposit balances as of December 2019. A summary of the Agency's investments and deposits is included as Attachment A. The Agency's cash balances by fund are presented in Attachment B.

### ANALYSIS:

The Agency's investments in the State Treasurer's Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) and California Asset Management Plan (CAMP) continue to be available on demand. The effective yield on LAIF for the month of December 2019 was 2.04%, while the effective yield on CAMP was 1.80%.

The Agency's investments are shown on Attachment A and have a weighted investment yield of 0.87%, which is below the benchmark LAIF return of 2.04%, as the portfolio is almost completely liquid and has significant funds held in custodial accounts accruing very little interest.

With a completely liquid portfolio, the weighted average maturity of the Agency's investments at December 31, 2019 is 1 day. LAIF's average maturity at December 31, 2019 is approximately 226 days.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

All deposits and investments have been made in accordance with the City's 2019-20 Investment Policy.

CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STANTON, CALIFORNIA

### **REPORT IN BRIEF:**

Staff would propose to extend the current On-Call Traffic Operations Services contract for two additional years.

The cost for completing the On-Call Traffic Operations Services contract is \$70,000 annually.

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

- 1. Declare that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under Section 15061(b)(3) as the activity is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing significant effect on the environment. Where is can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA.; and
- 2. City Council approve a second contract amendment to the on-call contract with Hartzog and Crabill, Inc. to provide traffic operations services for a two year period for an annual amount of \$70,000; and
- 3. Authorize the City Manager to bind the City of Stanton and Hartzog and Crabill, Inc. in a contract to provide on-call traffic operations services.

### **BACKGROUND:**

Staff currently utilizes the services of Hartzog and Crabill, Inc. (HCI) to provide traffic engineering support. HCI is currently contracted to maintain the signal timing operations of all city owned traffic signals. These services include the preparation and review of traffic impact analyses, engineering and traffic surveys for establishing speed limits, traffic signal and striping plans, specifications, estimates, traffic control plans, and

development and design of traffic signal coordination systems. Essentially HCI functions as the City's Traffic Engineer.

### ANALYSIS/JUSTIFICATION:

HCI was awarded a contract in June of 2014 for on-call traffic operations services through a competitive process for two years. On August 9, 2016 the City Council extended the contract for an additional two years and again on April 10, 2018. With this third extension, the contract will terminate June 30, 2022.

The consultants' staff has performed very well for the past six years. The proposed contract amendment would extend the contract for another two years at the same unit prices.

### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Funds for these services are available from the professional services and maintenance account number #225-3520-608105.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT:**

In accordance with the requirements of the CEQA, this project has been determined to be exempt under Section 15061(b)(3).

### **LEGAL REVIEW:**

The City Attorney's office has reviewed and approved the contract amendment.

### THIRD AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FOR ON-CALL TRAFFIC OPERATIONS SERVICES

### 1. PARTIES AND DATE.

This Third Amendment to the Agreement for On-call Traffic Operation Services ("Third Amendment") is entered into on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of February 2020, by and between the City of Stanton, a California municipal corporation, organized under the laws of the State of California, with its principal place of business at 7800 Katella Avenue, Stanton, CA 90680 ("City") and Hartzog and Crabill, Inc., a California corporation, with its principal place of business at 17852 E. 17th Street, Suite 101 Tustin, CA 92780 ("Consultant"). City and Consultant are sometimes individually referred to herein as "Party" and collectively as "Parties."

### 2. RECITALS.

- 2.1 <u>Agreement</u>. The Parties entered into that certain Agreement for On-Call Traffic Operation Services with Hartzog and Crabill, Inc. on June 24, 2014 ("Agreement").
- 2.2 <u>First Amendment</u>. The Parties entered into an extension of the terms of the Agreement, dated August 9, 2016 ("First Amendment") until June 30, 2018.
- 2.3 <u>Second Amendment</u>. The Parties entered into an extension of the terms of the Agreement, dated April 10, 2018 ("First Amendment") until June 30, 2020.
- <u>2.4</u> <u>Third Amendment.</u> The Parties now desire to amend the Agreement in order to extend the term of the Agreement and increase the total amount of compensation under the Agreement. Neither the Agreement nor the amendments to the Agreement constitute "public works" contracts pursuant to Public Contract Code Section 20161 for which competitive bidding is required. Further, Stanton Municipal Code Section 2.56.110 allows the City to execute contracts for personal, professional, and consultant services without observing the City's bidding procedures.

### TERMS.

3.1 <u>Term</u>. Section 1 of the Agreement is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

"This Agreement shall commence on <u>July 1, 2014</u>, and shall remain and continue in effect until tasks described herein are completed, but in no event later than <u>June 30</u>, <u>2022</u>, unless sooner terminated pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement."

3.2 <u>Payment</u>. Section 5(a) of the Agreement is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

"The City agrees to pay Consultant monthly, in accordance with the payment rates and terms and the schedule of payment as set forth herein, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference as though set forth in full, based upon actual time spent on the

above tasks. This amount shall not exceed Eighty Thousand Dollars for the remaining term of the Agreement unless additional payment is approved as provided in this Agreement."

3.3 <u>Remaining Provisions of Agreement</u>. Except as otherwise specifically set forth in this Second Amendment, the remaining provisions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

SUBJECT: AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR LEASING EIGHT AUTOMATIC LICENSE

PLATE READING CAMERAS TO FLOCK SAFETY

#### REPORT IN BRIEF:

Automatic License Plate Reading cameras are a very effective tool for law enforcement agencies. These cameras can either be mounted in a fixed location or on vehicles. With the recent acquisition of street lights in the city, there is the opportunity to place cameras attached to the lights. Staff would propose leasing eight cameras to be initially placed on Beach Boulevard and Katella Avenue.

#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

- 1. Declare this action is not a project per CEQA; and
- 2. Award a contract to Flock Safety to lease eight Automatic License Plate Readings cameras.

#### BACKGROUND:

With the advent and advances in technology, public safety camera systems, along with automated license plate reader (ALPR) technology, are becoming very common tools for law enforcement in the United States and throughout the world, to detect, solve, prevent, and deter crime. This advanced and ever evolving technology greatly assists law enforcement accomplishing their main mission of providing safety and security for the residents they serve and to support one of the main reasons a police department exists, which is to enhance and improve the lives of our citizens.

These cameras can read license plates of vehicles driving on City streets in real-time. ALPRs utilize Optical Character Recognition which takes a photo of a vehicle, sending the image via a wireless card to a cloud-based server that has a database with information on all registered motor vehicles. If a license plate number is tied to an Amber Alert, stolen vehicle, or other law enforcement tag, the server will notify the dispatch unit and status of the alert. ALPRs are able to take hundreds of images a minute and can capture the image of a vehicle traveling over 100 miles per hour.

For law enforcement agencies, public safety security camera and ALPR systems are installed to complement anti-crime strategies, to effectively allocate and deploy personnel, and to enhance public safety and security in public areas. Often, many police departments operate with limited resources. Public safety camera systems serve as a very effective force multiplier, especially in times of public safety emergencies and disasters. Public safety security camera and APLR systems may easily be placed in strategic locations throughout the city. It is also very easy to integrate, as needed, portable cameras and ALPR's in crime hot spots, and to support the monitoring of high profile events, and other identified public safety issues/concerns in order to be able to provide the best possible public safety service to the community.

#### **ANALYSIS/JUSTIFICATION:**

Historically one vendor supplied most of the ALPR cameras to cities in Southern California. The price for each camera was nearly \$40,000 and each camera could only read the license plates in one lane of traffic. Recently several cities in Los Angeles County have leased ALPR cameras from a new vendor Flock Safety. The cameras from Flock Safety can cover two lanes of traffic and cost \$2,000 annually to lease.

The Sheriff's Department would like to install four cameras on both Beach Boulevard and Katella Avenue. These cameras would capture the license plate data for all cars traveling in both directions on these streets. The plates are checked against the Stolen Vehicle Database and officers will be alerted in their patrol cars and at their desks when a stolen or otherwise targeted car is found.

In addition to reading license plates for the purpose of identifying stolen vehicles, the cameras also upload capture data to Flock's database. This data includes license plate numbers (whole, partial, and temporary), make, model, and color of passing vehicles. When a crime occurs, investigators will have the ability to access Flock's database to search for any vehicle matching one of these collected characteristics. Investigators will also have the ability to "ask" the system to look for any vehicle matching one or more of the collected characteristics. These features will create a virtual gate around the city, assisting in the identification and apprehension of criminals.

The cameras are easy to install and can be moved to other streetlights as-needed. A solar panel is installed to power the camera. The cameras can also be installed on a vehicle and operate for seven days off the internal battery. One possibility is to install a camera on the Code Enforcement vehicle that follows the street sweeper.

On November 9, 2019 the County of Los Angeles selected Flock Safety to provide cameras through a competitive process. The City can "piggyback" on this selection process to award the contract to Flock Safety.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The proposed cost is \$16,000 annually for eight cameras. The City receives \$100,000 annually from the State for the Citizens Option for Public Safety (COPS) program. Sufficient funding is available in the Fiscal Year 2019/20 budget in the COPS Fund (account number 242-2100-602100). Staff will utilize \$16,000 of the City's annual \$100,000 allocation to fund these costs in the subsequent years.

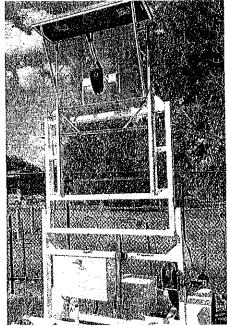

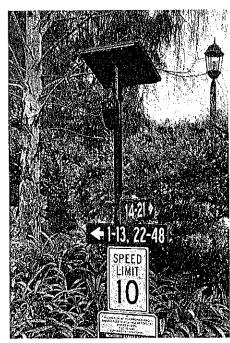

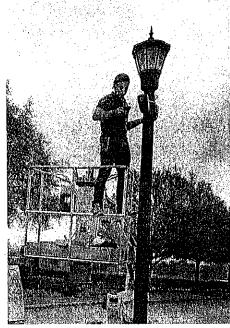

FROM BEACH BOULEVARD SOUTH TO THE CITY'S SOUTHERLY

#### **REPORT IN BRIEF:**

Frontier Development has requested that the City modify Village Center Drive to add parking along the curb on both sides of the street. In order to add parking, one lane of traffic would need to be removed. This will reduce the number of travel lanes on Village Center Drive to one lane in each direction.

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION:

- 1. Declare this project to be categorically exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act, Class 1, Section 15301c; and
- 2. Direct staff whether to proceed with adding parking along one or both sides of Village Center Drive.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The redevelopment of properties along Village Center Drive is under construction. The developers of the properties are Frontier Development (Frontier) and Brookfield Residential (Brookfield). The Frontier portion of the project is commercial in nature, while the Brookfield portion is residential. Both developments have onsite parking in excess of what the City's Municipal Code requires.

Both Frontier and Brookfield have frontage on Village Center Drive. Currently Village Center Drive has two lanes of travel in each direction, each twelve feet in width. Frontier has proposed that one lane of traffic be eliminated and that parking along the curb be allowed. It is also proposed that a bike lane be installed.

#### ANALYSIS/JUSTIFICATION:

Parking is one of the biggest concerns that the City has heard from the residents. In an

effort to accommodate additional parking, the City has accomplished the addition of parking stalls at the following locations:

- Flower Street lot 35 spots
- Bell Street lot 125 spots
- Main Street Diagonal Parking 17 spots
- Cerritos Avenue re-striping 30 spots
- Removal of red curb on Lampson Avenue 20 spots

The proposed changes on Village Center Drive would add 66 parking stalls and are similar to the City's past efforts. The proposed plan is attached. Please note red curb will be placed to allow for visibility from driveways and access to fire hydrants.

The other large property along Village Center Drive is the Crosspointe community. In order to obtain their thoughts on the proposal, staff reached out to the management company Cardinal and has received many emails opposing the changes. A meeting was held January 23<sup>rd</sup> at City Hall to receive additional verbal testimony from the residents of Crosspointe. A summary of all emails and public testimony is attached to this report. Responses to their concerns from the engineer who designed the plan and from the City's Traffic Engineer are also attached to this report.

At the January 23<sup>rd</sup> meeting, a concern was raised regarding the validity of the Level of Service analysis performed for the modified street. In order to address this concern, the City's Traffic Engineer calculated the Level of Service of Village Center Drive with only one lane of traffic and the projected traffic demand caused by the completion of all the commercial and residential units. The result is that the Level of Service of Village Center Drive remains an "A". Additional traffic counts are being obtained to confirm the existing traffic volumes used in the analysis.

Matters regarding parking and traffic such as this are always difficult. There are often competing needs for what happens in the street with no solution that will appease everyone. In order to assure that the changes do not create safety issues, the City's Traffic Engineer has reviewed the plan and has not expressed any significant safety concerns.

Staff would recommend that if any parking is allowed along Village Center Drive, that a formal review be conducted by the City Council every three months for at least one year. The Council could direct modifications to the parking or elimination of it. This would not preclude staff from implementing minor modifications at any time to address safety or other concerns.

Additionally staff is concerned with the lack of a sidewalk along the east curb of Village Center Drive. If parking were implemented along this curbline, the developers of the adjacent property would be required to construct an acceptable walking surface along the street.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Staff has obtained an estimate for the striping at a cost of \$26,700. This amount is not included in the City's 2019/20 budget and would require an appropriation from General Fund reserves. This would be done when formal bids are received and reviewed/approved by the City Council.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT:**

This project is categorically exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act, Class 1, and Section 15301c.

#### LEGAL REVIEW:

None.

#### **PUBLIC NOTIFICATION:**

Notifications and advertisement were performed as prescribed by law. Emails were also sent to residents who had previously emailed the City as well as the management company for Crosspointe. Signs were also placed on the street regarding the meeting of the City Council and their review of this matter.

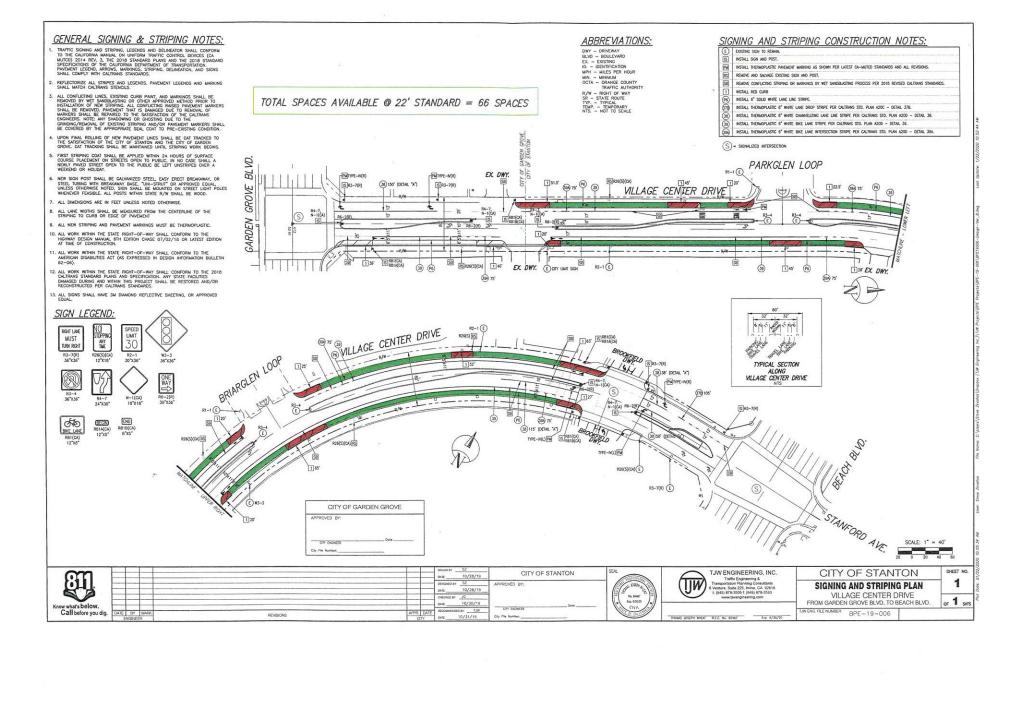

Level of Service (LOS) Analysis for Village Center Drive

As requested by the City of Stanton, Hartzog & Crabill, Inc. (HCI) has conducted a Level of Service (LOS) Analysis for Village Center Drive between Beach Boulevard and Garden Grove Boulevard based on the potential conversion from a four-lane road to a two-lane road, which would allow for the installation of on-street parking on both sides of the street. Because the potential conversion to a two-lane road would result in a loss of road capacity, it may also result in Village Center Drive operating at an unacceptable LOS. Based on City standards, LOS E and LOS F are considered unacceptable.

#### Methodology

To determine the LOS for Village Center Drive, it is based on a volume-to-capacity (V/C) ratio as shown in Table 1 using a road capacity of 25,000 daily vehicles for a four-lane road and a road capacity of 12,500 daily vehicles for a two-lane road.

#### **Traffic Volumes**

Based on the Village Center and Village Center North Project Traffic Impact Analysis (Revised) (TIA) (Kunzman Associates, Inc., September 2017), the 2017 existing traffic volumes on Village Center Drive was approximately 2,600 daily vehicles both west of Beach Boulevard and north of Garden Grove Boulevard. The TIA also estimated that the proposed commercial and residential projects would add approximately 800 daily project Mr. Allan Rigg, PE, AlCP City of Stanton Page 2 of 2

vehicles just west of Beach Boulevard and approximately 400 daily project vehicles just north of Garden Grove Boulevard. Therefore, the forecasted daily traffic volumes on Village Center Drive with the completed projects are approximately 3,400 and 3,000 daily vehicles, respectively. Attached are select pages from the TIA.

It should be noted that because the existing traffic volumes were several years old from 2017, the City intends to collect additional traffic counts on Village Center Drive to reflect the latest traffic conditions. And because the proposed Village Center projects are only partially completed at this time, it would be appropriate to add the project traffic onto Village Center Drive for the portion still under construction.

#### LOS Analysis

Table 2 shows the LOS for Village Center Drive as a four-lane road and two-lane road for both existing conditions and with project conditions. As shown in Table 2, Village Center Drive is forecasted to operate at acceptable LOS A as both a four-lane road and two-lane road with the project conditions.

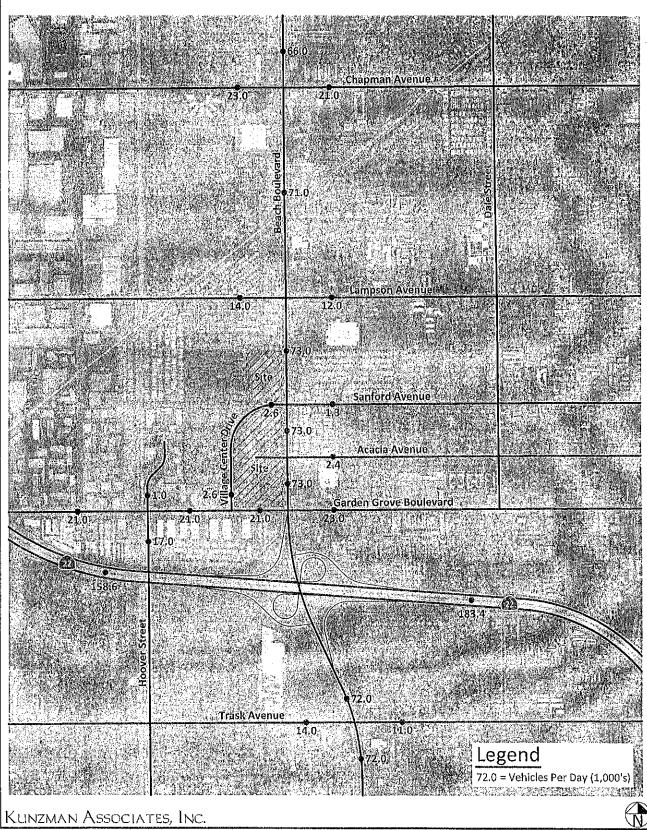

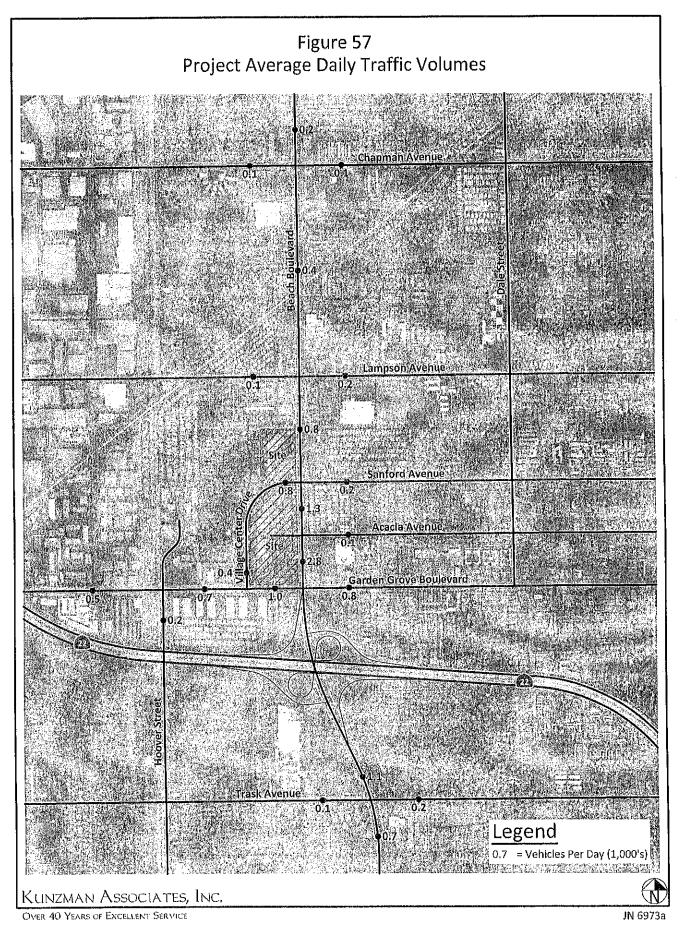

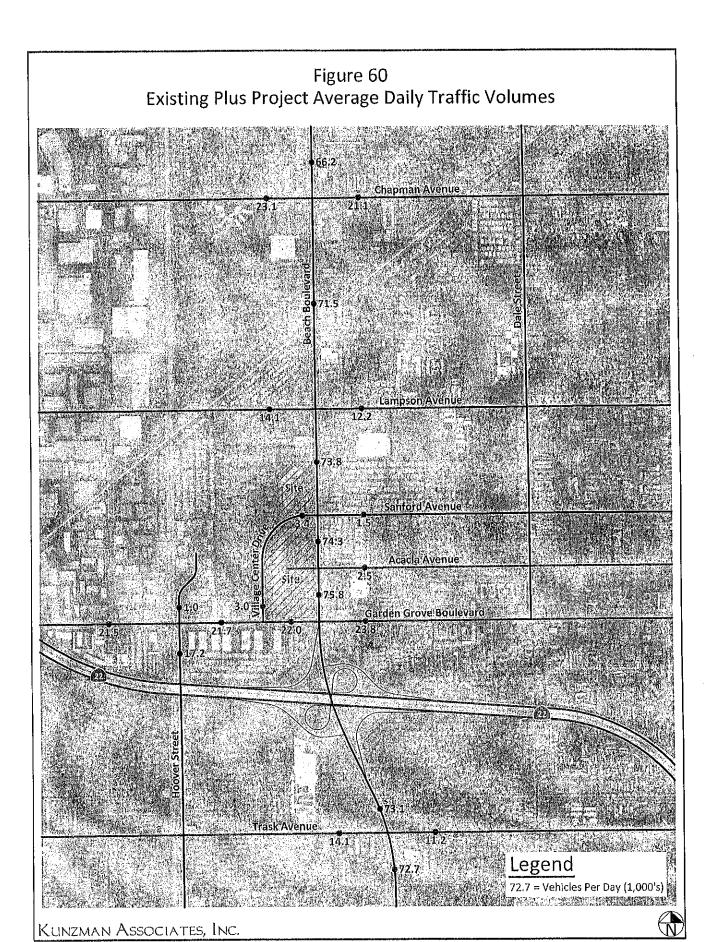

Proposed Conversion of Village Center Drive from a Four-Lane Road to a Two-Lane Road

As requested by the City of Stanton, Hartzog & Crabill, Inc. (HCI) has reviewed the proposed project to convert Village Center Drive between Beach Boulevard and Garden Grove Boulevard from a four-lane road to a two-lane road, which would allow for the installation of on-street parking on both sides of the street. It is our understanding that residents from the surrounding neighborhood have raised various concerns regarding the proposed conversion to a two-lane road. Based on the various topic items discussed below, it is recommended that the City implement a trial period of six (6) to twelve (12) months. After the trial period, the City could reassess Village Center Drive to determine whether to revert back to a four-lane road, maintain it as a two-lane road or implement additional measures.

#### Traffic Congestion

Based on our experience, the most challenging aspect of going from a four-lane road to a two-lane road is the loss of road capacity, which could result in additional traffic congestion. There have been a couple of cases where the reduction in travel lanes resulted in tolerable congestion. And ultimately, some of the roads were reverted back to its original condition as a four-lane road.

For Village Center Drive, the capacity of the road would be reduced from 25,000 daily vehicles to 12,500 daily vehicles when going from a four-lane road to a two-lane road. Based on traffic counts taken in 2019, there were approximately 2,831 daily vehicles on Village Center Drive. As a four-lane road, the volume-to-capacity (V/C) ratio would be 0.11 (= 2,831 / 25,000), which is level of service (LOS) A. As a two-lane road, the V/C ratio would increase to 0.23 (= 2,831 / 12,500), but would still remain at LOS A. Therefore, the reduction in road capacity should not result in adverse traffic congestion on Village Center Drive.

#### Increase in Traffic Volumes

Converting Village Center Drive from a four-lane road to a two-lane road generally would not result in an increase in traffic volumes. Typically, there is an external factor. For example, if there is major congestion on the primary arterial roads, drivers may seek out less congested roads in hopes of finding a quicker route. Another example would be if there is a new large development nearby. In this particular case, most of the traffic increase on Village Center Drive would be associated with the new development on the east side of the road, not necessarily with converting the four-lane road to a two-lane road.

#### Speed Reduction / Lane Widths

A potential benefit of converting Village Center Drive to a two-lane road is that it may result in slower traffic speeds, which is attained primarily through the reduction in lane widths. Currently, the lane widths are 12 to 13 feet wide. It is recommended to install a travel lane at 11 feet, a bike lane at six (6) feet and a parking lane at eight (8) feet.

#### **On-Street Parking**

A potential benefit of converting Village Center Drive to a two-lane road is that it would allow for the installation of on-street parking to supplement the adjacent communities/developments. Because the on-street parking is a on a public street, it would be available for anyone to use, including visitors to the gated community on the west side of Village Center Drive. On-street parking cannot be assigned to any particular person or private development. In regards to the new development on the east side of the street, it is our understanding that the new development meets the City's parking code.

#### **Parallel Parking**

The delays associated with parallel parking should only be momentary.

#### Missing Sidewalk

It is recommended to install the missing sidewalk on the east side of Village Center Drive to eliminate the need for pedestrians to walk in the street.

#### Sight-Distance

The proposed signing and striping plan has factored in sight-distance into its design. Red curbs are proposed adjacent to the driveways and intersections.

#### More Collisions

Concerns were raised that converting to a two-lane road would result in more collisions. However, studies have shown that the collision rate has generally remained constant or has dropped when converting to a road with fewer lanes. Because red curbs would be installed adjacent to driveways and intersections, we do not anticipate a spike in collisions on Village Center Drive. In regards to the severity of the collisions, it is expected to be lower because of the lower travel speeds.

#### Increased Crime

We are not aware of any correlation between converting to a two-lane road and an increase in crime. As appropriate, we can request for additional monitoring by the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

#### Add Stop Signs and/or Traffic Signals

These measures would require a traffic warrant study. As appropriate, these measures could be studied as part of the overall reassessment of Village Center Drive after the proposed trial period.

#### Signal Timing

Because of the reduction from a four-lane road to a two-lane road, additional green time may be needed for Village Center Drive at Beach Boulevard and at Garden Grove Boulevard. If needed, the signal timing can be adjusted accordingly in the future.

#### Jaywalking

Concerns were raised that drivers would park on the west side of the street and then jaywalk to access the new development on the east side of the street. However, it would be speculative at this time to know to what extent that there will be jaywalking. From our experience, drivers have a tendency to park on the side of the street of where they want to go to avoid unnecessarily crossing the street. And if they do park on the west side of the street, there are already established legal crossing locations at intersections.

To discourage jaywalking, traffic signs could be installed directing them to legal crossing points at intersections. In addition, if jaywalking becomes a common occurrence in the future, then additional measures could be implemented as discussed further below.

Finally, there may be some residents that live in the gated community on the west side of the road and decide to walk to the new development instead of drive. With the proposed conversion, they would have to cross a two-lane road instead of a four-lane road, which should be easier.

#### **Trial Period**

Based on the topic items discussed above and the concerns raised by residents from the surrounding neighborhood, it is recommended that the City implement a trial period of six (6) to twelve (12) months. After the trial period, the City could reassess Village Center Drive and implement one of the following:

- · Revert back to a four-lane road.
- Maintain the two-lane road and on-street parking.
- Maintain the two-lane road and on-street parking and implement other traffic safety measures listed below.

#### **Additional Measures**

Additional measures may include one or more of the following:

- If warranted, add Stop signs and/or traffic signals.
- Install fence in raised median to physically prohibit jaywalking between intersections.
- Install curb extensions/bulb-outs to reduce crossing widths at intersections.
- · Install marked crosswalks at intersections.
- Install rectangular rapid flashing beacon (RRFB) at marked crosswalks.

TJW is pleased to provide this review of the proposed Village Center Drive striping plan to remove a travel lane in each direction and to install curb side parking. The City recently received questions on the plan from the adjacent neighborhoods. Below are TJW's responses to the questions received.

#### 1. Concerned with dangerous turns or blind spots

 Final placement of parking striping will be based on the City of Stanton and City of Garden Grove standards for safe line of sight in and out of each driveway.

#### 2. Concerned with increased traffic

- The addition of parking in itself will not generate additional traffic. The commercial development located on the south side of Village Center Drive has been analyzed and was determined to meet City standards for traffic impacts for the surrounding streets.
- To determine if Village Center Drive could accommodate traffic with one less travel lane in each direction, TJW reviewed the capacity of the roadway compared to recent traffic volumes taken for seven (7) days between November 27 and December 3, 2019.
  - Traffic counts showed an average of 1,913 daily vehicles on Village Center Drive west of Beach Boulevard. The traffic volumes ranged between 1,008 daily vehicles and a maximum of 2,619 vehicles.
  - Traffic counts showed an average of 2,586 daily vehicles on Village Center Drive north of Garden Grove Boulevard. The traffic volumes

ranged between 1,549 daily vehicles and a maximum of 3,299 vehicles.

The table below shows the Level of Service (LOS) of a variety of roadways sizes with different volume capacities. This table is taken from the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA) Master Plan of Arterial Highways (MPAH) publication. LOS is a qualitative measure to relate roadways based on speed of travel, density, congestion, etc. A letter grade of "A" represents free flow of traffic.

o Per the table, the capacity of a 2-lane divided roadway would be 9,000 vehicles per day to maintain a LOS A. Using the peak 3,299 volume observed on Village Center Drive, the table shows that even a two lane roadway would still operate at a Level of Service of "A".

#### 3. Concerned with more accidents

- As shown above, the 3,299 vehicles observed on Village Center Drive will be able to efficiently be accommodated at a LOS A. Accidents should not occur due to the lack of space.
- Accidents should not be created due to lack of sight distance. Final striping will
  be laid out in the field using City of Garden Grove and City of Stanton
  requirements for proper sight distance.
- The proposed striping layout will most likely lead to a reduction travel speed on Village Center Drive, which will help in reduction of accidents.

#### 4. Consider adding stop signs or traffic signals

- Stop signs or signals should only be reviewed after the roadway has been operational for several weeks or months to get a better understand of the roadways operations.
- Once operations have been determined, the City of Stanton could perform a traffic signal warrant analysis or an all-way stop warrant analysis per the standards set in the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices. This analysis helps determine if these devices would help with the operations and safety of the roadway segment.
