The City received proposals from six actuarial firms. Staff selected Demsey, Filiger & Associates because their total fee for the four fiscal years was the lowest cost. PLANNING DIVISION PROJECT UPDATE



A new restaurant is coming to the City of Stanton. **Pollo Campero** is renovating the building located at 10511 Beach Boulevard and will also be improving the parking lot for their new location.



Construction has started on the **Super King** redevelopment project located at 10560 Magnolia Avenue. Grading has gotten underway and the property is moving forward for new construction and site improvements.



The City is working diligently with the **Assisted Living Development** located at 12282 Beach Boulevard. Final site improvements and health and safety items are being completed to move this project to final occupancy.



Four detached single family residential units are currently under review for the property located at **7082 Kermore Lane.** The project is expected to go to the Planning Commission for review this month.



The **Raising Claw, Boiling House** located at 12140 Beach Boulevard has submitted a request to add beer and wine to their existing restaurant. This application is expected to be heard by the Planning Commission in April.



A new single family home is being proposed at **11572 Court Lane**. The property will be subdivided into two, legal lots and the new home will be constructed on the newly created lot. The project is going to Planning Commission this month.

The Katella Assemblage project located at 7401-7455 Katella Avenue is making great progress. All of the structures on the site have been demolished and grading for the new residential pads, streets and site improvements has begun.

Significant progress continues at 12736 Beach Boulevard as Bonnani Development works to complete the framing for the 300 residential unit apartment buildings and the commercial space.




STREET SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS

COMMUNITY MAINTENANCE AND UPKEEP



Last week, audible pedestrian signals were installed by Bear Electric, the City's traffic signal maintenance contractor, at Katella and Knott to aid a legally blind citizen with being able to cross the intersection. The costs of the improvement will be 25% shared with the City of Cypress.



A streetlight pole was replaced by Bear Electric, the City's streetlight maintenance contractor, on Western Avenue after a traffic accident knocked down the previous pole.



More than 100 sections of City sidewalk were replaced or ground down by the County in the last four weeks to eliminate trip hazards around the City. During a rainstorm last month, a tree at Premier Park dedicated to Natalie Dotson split in half and needed to be removed for safety reasons. A new tree was installed in the empty circular planter, and a new plaque dedicating the tree to Natalie Dotson will be installed soon.



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Lastly, a new curb ramp will be added on the westside of Fern Avenue at Palais Road to aid residents in crossing at the existing intersection. A mockup of the location is located below. The white "striping" shown in the photos is just to emphasize that the new curb ramp is supposed to line up with the existing curb ramp on the opposite SE corner of Fern and Palais. There will be no striping installed.

HOMELESSNESS SUCCESS STORIES

Elderly Female Connected to Navigation Center

While responding to a call for assistance from a concerned resident, the Outreach Coordinators engaged an elderly female participant who has been experiencing chronic homelessness. Based on the referral, the Outreach Coordinators began the process to connect the participant to County housing resources. Once the participant was evaluated, she was deemed appropriate for placement at the Buena Park Navigation Center. Additionally, the Outreach Coordinators completed a housing assessment and assisted the elderly female in completing the application process for county-funded housing. As a result, the participant was able to obtain supportive services that include housing, case management, and medical care.



Transitional-aged Youth Receives Rapid Rehousing

Stanton Outreach Coordinators consistently offered case management services to a transitional-aged participant (18yrs-26yrs). The individual was a Stanton resident who had recently become homeless and was in dire need of housing assistance. The Outreach Coordinators then collaborated with the Buena Park Navigation Center to connect the participant to shelter and additional resources. Additionally, the Outreach Coordinators assisted the participant with the process of connecting them to County's Housing subsidies. As a result, the participant was matched to Orange County's Rapid Rehousing Program, allowing the participant to begin their housing search. The Outreach Coordinators provided Housing Navigation to the participant to assist with locating a unit. The Outreach Coordinators were successfully able to locate an ideal unit for the participant in Anaheim, allowing them to remain local. The team also assisted the participant with transporting items from the shelter to his new home.

Coordinated Approach Leads to Employment

Based on a referral from a non-profit agency, the Outreach Coordinators received a call for assistance regarding an elderly female in need of services. The individual was staying at a local Motel 6 and stated she could no longer afford the stay. The Outreach Coordinators immediately contacted the individual to go over possible resources. During the discussion, the Outreach Coordinators informed the individual of possible available resources and options for them. The individual expressed interest in seeking employment and finding an affordable place to live. The Outreach Coordinators worked with the participant and ultimately connected them with a thirdparty agency, People Ready, who aid individuals to find job placement. This referral allowed the client to find an employment opportunity in the City of Laguna Beach. Additionally, the Outreach Coordinators assisted the individual with finding an available housing option within the area of employment. This assistance led to the individual renting an RV in Laguna Beach while she begins her workforce journey. Lastly, the Outreach Coordinators connected the client to Mariners Church, and the church assisted them with groceries.

OVERSIZED VEHICLE ORDINANCE

Since the passage of the oversized vehicle ordinance, staff has been working tirelessly to address homeowners that owned motorhomes and trailers to find storage options. Many of these homeowners had become accustomed to parking motorhomes directly in front of their residence, causing a number of aesthetic and safety issues. On Via Irana, we routinely had between five and eight motorhomes on this single residential street. A view of the street in its current condition is shown to the right. This reflects a significant improvement to the quality of the neighborhood, as residents have expressed their satisfaction with the improved conditions.
