

Recruitment Update

Recruitment for the City's next City Manager remains open until filled. To be considered on the first review date, applicants were instructed to submit their materials by Wednesday, May 11. Applications have been reviewed and interviews have been scheduled.

A part-time Administrative Clerk position for the Finance Department opened on Tuesday. April 19. The first review date of applications was May 9. Applications are currently under review.

Recruitment for both a full-time Assistant Planner and Associate Planner opened on Thursday, April 14. Both positions will remain open until filled. Applications for both positions are currently under review.

A part-time Public Works/Engineering Intern position for the Public Works Department opened on Monday, March 28. This position will remain open until filled. The first round of interviews were conducted on Tuesday, May 17.

A recruitment for a full-time Senior Public Works Inspector opened on Thursday, March 10 and closed on Monday, March 28. A candidate has been selected and a start date is confirmed for Monday, May 23.

A recruitment for a full-time Marketing Assistant opened on Thursday, March 10. This position will remain open until filled. Interviews were conducted on Monday, May 2. A candidate has been selected and is currently in the process of completing pre-employment requirements.

The full-time Building Official position for the Community Development Department remains open until filled. The first round of interviews was conducted on Wednesday, April 6.

The full-time Building Inspector position for the Community Development Department remains open until filled. The second round of interviews was held on Thursday, April 14.

The recruitment for several temporary parttime Recreation Leaders remains open until filled. The City will continue to accept employment applications and hold interviews until all vacancies are filled.

Staff continue to monitor the Public Service Request Application for notices from residents and community members. Currently, users can report issues related to Public Works, Code Enforcement, Homeless Encampments or General Inquiries. Since launching in late November, we have received and addressed 65 public requests for service.

PROPOSED BUDGET

Fiscal Year 2022/23

Staff will be presenting the Proposed Operating and Capital Budget for Fiscal Year 2022/23 to the City Council during a budget study session scheduled to begin at 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 24th. The General Fund's proposed operating budget is balanced with revenues exceeding expenditures. General Fund revenues are expected to increase by 2% while General Fund expenditures are expected to increase by 6%. In addition to the General Fund's proposed operating budget for Fiscal Year 2022/23, the study session will include a list of one-time expenditure requests for the City Council to consider for appropriation.

The Proposed Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget for Fiscal Year 2022/23 requests \$4.6 million in new funding for the City's CIP program as follows: \$2.4 million for street projects; \$1.7 million for parks projects, and \$0.5 million for sewer projects.

PROPERTY TAX COLLECTION

Update from the Orange County Treasurer

Shari Freidenrich, Orange County Treasurer, provided the following update regarding Fiscal Year 2021/22 property tax collections as of April 30, 2022.

Secured Property Tax Collections Tax Update

Total secured taxes billed for Fiscal Year 2021/22 were \$7.8 billion versus \$7.5 billion billed in Fiscal Year 2020/21. The second installment of the Fiscal Year 2021/22 Secured Property tax bills were due on April 11, 2022. As of April 30, 2022, the collection rate was 98.16% of secured property taxes. This is slightly below the pre-COVID collection rate (Fiscal Year 2018/19) of 98.37%.

Unsecured Property Tax Collections Update

Total unsecured property tax billed this fiscal year was \$275.5 million versus \$256.6 million last fiscal year, or an increase of \$18.9 million. The unsecured property taxes were due on August 31, 2021. As of April 30, 2022, 95.87% of unsecured property taxes have been collected versus 95.52% collected for the same period last year. This is significantly lower than the pre-COVID-19 collection rate (Fiscal Year 2018/19) of 98.41%.

American Planning Association Award

The project will be recognized at a ceremony taking place on Thursday, June 16, 2022 at the **Lake Forest Community** Center. Staff is preparing the next application for consideration by the State Chapter of the American Planning Association.

Youth Programs








PUBLIC WORKS WEEK

OUTREACH EFFORTS

Female Connected to County Services

While responding to a call for assistance from a concerned resident, the Outreach Coordinators engaged a female participant who had been experiencing chronic homelessness. Based on the referral, the Outreach Coordinators began connecting the participant to County health resources. Once the participant was evaluated, she was deemed appropriate for placement at a county health treatment center. Equally important, the Outreach Coordinators completed a housing assessment and referred the participant to Orange County-funded housing for placement on the list to receive assistance. As a result, the participant obtained supportive services that include housing, case management, and ongoing medical care.

Services for COVID-19 Positive Client

While responding to a call for assistance from a concerned resident, the Outreach Coordinators engaged a middle-aged male individual experiencing chronic homelessness. The individual was exposed to a confirmed COVID-19 case and was experiencing COVID-19 symptoms. Based on the information, the Outreach Coordinators connected the participant to a County-funded COVID-19 isolation site. Once the participant was evaluated, he was deemed appropriate for placement at a designated isolation site in the area. At the isolation site, the client will receive three meals a day, onsite medical treatment, necessities, and a safe place to stay during his recommended quarantine timeframe. As a result, the participant could obtain immediate services, followed by entry into the North County shelter program.





CODE ENFORCEMENT

Update

Code Enforcement staff have continued to work with property owners to address abandoned and problematic vehicles. Through this cooperation, we have been able to remove a number of vehicles in breach of City code.

Code Enforcement Officer David Munoz continues to identify illegal businesses in the City, working with property owners to inform them of illegal operations and gaining voluntary compliance. In each case the property owner is evicting the tenant responsible for the illegal operation.
