# STOKES COUNTY BOARD OF SOCIAL SERVICES MINUTES March 22, 2023

The regular meeting of the Stokes County Board of Social Services was held on Wednesday, March 22, 2023, at the Social Services Building in Danbury, North Carolina. Board members present were Chairman Jan Spencer, Vice Chairman Darlene Bullins, Member Greg Collins, Member Sandy Smith and Member Sonya Cox. Staff present were Director Stacey Elmes, Income Maintenance Administrator Cindy Joyce and Administrative Officer Becky East. Chairman Spencer called the meeting to order at 3:02 p.m.

Chairman Spencer read the Ethics and Conflict of Interest reminder to the Board. Board members were asked if they had a conflict with any of the items listed on the agenda. No conflicts noted.

Chairman Spencer opened the floor for any adjustments to today's agenda. Member Cox motioned to approve the agenda as presented. Member Smith seconded and the motion passed 5-0.

Consent Agenda

Chairman Spencer entertained a motion to approve or amend the consent agenda which includes the minutes of February 10, 2023 and February 22, 2023. Chairman Spencer requested to amend the minutes of February 22, 2023 (page 4). Under New Business the word employee should be added to sentence five after the word current (current employee). Member Cox made a motion to approve the consent agenda as amended. Vice Chairman Bullins seconded and the motion passed 5-0.

#### **Board Member Comments**

Chairman Spencer congratulated IMA Joyce on her upcoming retirement and stated that she would be missed. Member Collins thanked IMA Joyce for her dedication to Stokes County and especially to the Department of Social Services. Member Smith thanked IMA Joyce for her service to the Department of Social Services and stated she has enjoyed getting to know her and work with her. Member Cox thanked IMA Joyce for all she has done over the years for the Department of Social Services. Member Cox noted that this can be a thankless job at times. Vice Chairman Bullins shared with IMA Joyce that she will love retirement and appreciated all she has done for the Department of Social Services.

#### **Public Comments**

Chairman Spencer opened the floor for public comments at 3:06 p.m.

Other items on the agenda for discussion were as follows:

#### DSS Dashboard

Director Elmes noted that childcare numbers (which come from the NCFast System and are not always correct) show a decrease. Director Elmes stated that 45 children were not terminated from the childcare program in February.

Director Elmes shared that the agency currently has a MAPP (Model Approach to Planned Parenting) class going on each Tuesday at The Rock Church in King with 8 families attending. Twenty individuals have already expressed interest in the next class. The agency is looking into the possibility of a virtual class this summer and another in-person class in the fall.

Member Cox stated that Lisa Uber attended her church last Sunday and gave a good 10-minute presentation on fostering and the need for more foster homes in the county.

Chairman Spencer confirmed with Director Elmes that one foster family has decided not to renew their license.

Chairman Spencer was pleased to see that Child Protective Services initiation rates look good. Chairman Spencer also mentioned that 91% of foster care visits took place in the home which was an improvement from last month.

Member Collins confirmed with Director Elmes that the CIP (Crisis Intervention Program) expenditures have decreased due to lack of available funding.

#### **Child Support Consultation**

IMA Joyce shared that the state representative meets with our child support supervisor monthly either by phone or in person which revealed no current issues. The agency's child support supervisor continues to go to Surry County's Child Support Unit for training to help improve the agency's numbers. Chairman Spencer confirmed with IMA Joyce that the interception of income tax returns will increase our numbers.

#### **REDA Audit**

IMA Joyce stated that the agency passed the first and second month of the REDA Audit at 100% and anticipates passing the third month. If the agency passes, the REDA Audit will not take place again until March 2024.

#### Second Harvest Food Bank

Director Elmes shared an email from the SHFB regarding the food distribution held at the Government Center on January 28, 2023 stating this was a great event with a great turnout. A total of 1,716 individuals were served 58,890 pounds of food. Member Collins confirmed with Director Elmes that the event was not just for Stokes County residents. Member Collins shared that Senior Services was gearing up to provide frozen meals again.

Proposed 2023 - 2024 Budget

Director Elmes stated that this is still a work in progress. Staff have been entering the information in the new county budget system, as well as, the budget template required by the state with both being very time-consuming. Director Elmes provided a handout

showing the current budget and the proposed budget. The increase in salaries and wages is due to the 2% that staff will receive on their anniversary date along with four new positions (two Income Maintenance Caseworkers to assist with Medicaid expansion, one Administrative Assistant to assist with increased administrative duties, and one Child Protective Services Social Worker to help with on-call and/or intake).

Chairman Spencer confirmed with Director Elmes that the increase in the contract line item is due to the contract with VanGuard who is currently supplying the agency with two social workers to help in Child Welfare.

Vice Chairman Bullins confirmed with Director Elmes that Medicaid expansion will likely be approved. Member Collins stated that the agency will need to be getting employees trained to start once it is approved. Director Elmes shared that the State has indicated that there may be funding to help with staffing.

Member Cox shared that if a merit program is approved for the county that would need to be taken into consideration with the budget. Director Elmes stated the proposed budget includes two new vehicles. Vice Chairman Bullins confirmed with Director Elmes that the agency still receives approximately 50% federal and state reimbursement to purchase needed vehicles. Director Elmes shared that the '21-'22 DSS budget only used 30% county dollars (information is not yet available from Finance to provide the '22-'23 percentage). Vice Chairman Bullins confirmed with Director Elmes that it is very important to configure the DSS budget to make sure the least amount of county funds are used. Member Cox shared that she had mentioned to the Board of County Commissioners about the possibility of the agency using the probation building once the renovations are made in the courthouse. Member Cox confirmed with Director Elmes that the agency will struggle with where to house any new positions.

Chairman Spencer confirmed with Director Elmes that the LIEAP/CIP (Low Income Energy Assistance Program/Crisis Intervention Program) amounts are budget estimates provided by the State with LIEWAP (Low Income Energy Water Assistance Program) ending September 2023 (federal budget item). Director Elmes shared that Special Adoption Assistance and Foster Care-Cardinal funding stays with the agency each year and can't be put back into the General Fund. The agency receives Special Adoption Assistance funding based on the number of adoptions completed each year and can be used to help with the MAPP classes or related adoption/foster home needs. The Foster Care-Cardinal funding is based on a per member (child) per month percentage and can be used to hold an emergency bed at a facility or for things that aren't covered by Medicaid like neurofeedback therapy. Several of the agency's foster children attend neurofeedback therapy which seems to be helpful. Funding can also be used to pay for staff that stay with our foster children overnight as well as used for things that might help keep children out of the foster care system. Chairman Spencer confirmed with Director Elmes that these dollars are being Member Cox questioned Director Elmes about the neuro brought forward each year. feedback therapy and the monies not being used for the general public to get these services. Director Elmes stated that these funds are earmarked for the foster child population and those children that are opened in Child Protective Services to help prevent them from entering foster care. Chairman Spencer confirmed with Director Elmes that Vaya monitors the use of these funds on a quarterly basis.

Chairman Spencer confirmed with Director Elmes that she needed the Board to approve submission of the budget upon its completion. Vice Chairman Bullins stated that last year the draft was approved, and Director Elmes was given authority to make corrections as necessary and report back to the board if needed. Member Collins made a motion to approve the draft budget and give Director Elmes authority to make corrections if necessary and to report back to the board if needed. Member Smith seconded and the motion passed 5-0.

#### **New Business**

Chairman Spencer entertained a motion to enter closed session. Vice Chairman Bullins moved to enter closed session for the following:

G.S. 143-318.11(a)

(6) To consider the qualifications, competence, performance, character, fitness, conditions of appointment, or conditions of initial employment of an individual public officer or employee or prospective public officer or employee; or to hear or investigate a complaint, charge, or grievance by or against an individual public officer or employee. General personnel policy issues may not be considered in a closed session. A public body may not consider the qualifications, competence, performance, character, fitness, appointment, or removal of a member of the public body or another body and may not consider or fill a vacancy among its own membership except in an open meeting. Final action making an appointment or discharge or removal by a public body having final authority for the appointment or discharge or removal shall be taken in an open meeting.

Member Collins seconded and the motion passed 5-0. The Board entered closed session. The board reentered open session.

With no further business, Chairman Spencer entertained a motion to adjourn. Member Cox moved to adjourn the meeting. Member Smith seconded and the motion passed 5-0. The meeting was adjourned at 4:20 p.m.





# ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES (APS)

Adult Protective Services (APS) is a statutorily mandated service that provides for the protection of disabled and vulnerable adults. North Carolina General Statute 108A gives county departments of social services the authority to evaluate reports of abuse, neglect, and exploitation when a disabled adult is the alleged victim. The primary purpose of Adult Protective Services is to help the disabled adult who has experienced or is experiencing maltreatment to be free from abuse, neglect, and exploitation. The available funds to pay for these services are limited, often depleted early in the state fiscal year, and primarily funded by counties.

Adult Protective Services reports are consistently increasing each state fiscal year. North Carolina ranks 9th nationally in total population (10.6 million) and in the number of people 65 and older. In 2025, 1 in 5 North Carolinians will be 65 or older. Our 65 and older population will almost double in the next twenty years. Individuals 85 and older will be the fastest growing segment beginning 2030, when 2.4 million baby boomers approach their 85th birthday. NC State Aging Profile 2018


# APS, INFORMATION, AND OUTREACH

Adult Protective Services reports are received by county departments of social services. The information is reviewed to determine whether it meets the criteria mandated in N.C. General Statute 108A.

#### The three criteria are:


- 1.a disabled adult
- 2. who has been abused, neglected or exploited, and
- 3. is in need of protective services.

If any of the three criteria are not met, the APS report is screened out. The individual may be provided information & referral or outreach. The information may be referred to another agency or given additional information about resources in the community. An outreach may be completed with the adult in their home or through a phone call to gather additional information and provide services or resources.



# ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES FUNDING

Adult Protective Services is federally funded through the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG), which is also the major source of funding for several other programs at county departments of social services.

Funding is limited, and must be shared across several different areas, resulting in many counties using all their allocation by the midpoint of the state fiscal year. Once this funding is depleted, then county funds must cover the remaining cost of providing the statutorily mandated program.

At the beginning of SFY 2021-2022, Medicaid Administrative Claiming (MAC) was opened up to APS as a funding source for counties. The impact of this much needed additional funding is already visible. With the expansion of Medicaid Administration Claiming (MAC) funding to APS, counties have a much-needed additional source that includes a 50 percent federal and 50 percent county uncapped reimbursement.

MAC/APS Reimbursement for SFY 21/22 was **\$5,142,466.03**.

The Division of Aging and Adult Services (DAAS) allocated \$1,500,00.00 of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 funding to an Adult Protective Services (APS) Essential Services Fund for service period February of 2022 through December of 2022. This funding allows county departments of social services to provide essential services for adults for whom the need for protective services has been substantiated. These funds will assist adults to age in place, eliminating unnecessary institutionalization and promoting opportunities to return to a community-based setting when possible.

The fund is intended to assist county departments of social services in addressing identified protective services needs and mobilizing protective services where limited county funding and limited local resources may be a barrier. The funds are being made available in addition to any funds already allocated by the county and is not intended to replace funds already in place. Counties should ensure no other funding sources or resources are available to assist the individual prior to using the APS Essential Services Fund.

The APS Essential Services Fund must be used to provide and arrange for essential needs on behalf of an individual receiving Protective Services for Adults Planning and Mobilizing Services (SIS Code 204). The individual must be opened for SIS Code 204 services on a signed DSS-5027. If the individual is a recipient of the Community Alternatives Program (CAP) or the Special Assistance In Home Program (SAIH), counties should ensure that APS Essential Services Funds are used for needs that are not being covered through either of the programs.

These essential services needs include the provision of medical care for physical and mental health, assistance in personal hygiene, assistance with obtaining appropriate food, clothing, seeking and providing heated and ventilated shelter, providing for protection from health and safety hazards, and protection from abuse, neglect, and exploitation.

DAAS launched a new earning Management
System in July of 2022. We are excited to report that as of November of 2022 we have 1,260 users registered on Absorb and all 100 Counties are now represented.

For SFY 21-22, trainings were conducted in the virtual environment due to safety concerns.

In SFY 22-23, the state conducted in-person training for the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic. The updated training calendar was issued in December of 2022.

# MULTIDISCIPLINARY TEAMS (MDT)

DSS are seeing an increase in difficult cases involving severe and persistent mental illness. Many cases involve mental health issues, behavioral issues, criminal and sometimes complex medical issues. There is a growing need for counties to work collaboratively with their community partners. Collaboration on a local level is critical to resolving these complex issues. All 100 counties should have an MDT. There are currently only 34 county DSSs with an identified MDT and about 20 are active. Having a MDT is critical to helping identify services and resources that are needed to help address complex client issues. DAAS is collaborating with the UNC School of Government to develop resources to help the counties develop and sustain MDTs. By working in unison, the strength of each agency can complement the others. Together, the agencies involved in the MDT can ensure that individuals do not fall through the cracks while addressing their range of needs. An MDT allows each team's strengths to shine, by bringing a diverse group of professionals to the table to identify needs and together pinpoint solutions to assist positive outcomes in complex cases. When developing a MDT counties should include a wide range of partners from all disciplines such as mental health, local hospital discharge planner/social worker, law enforcement, home health, Elder Justice Centers, aging services, homeless shelters, local advocacy groups and a facility representative. Agencies that work collaboratively can produce better solutions for individuals, MDT members, and the community.

Successful MDT partnerships can benefit individuals in need of services in the following ways:

- Can help agencies gain an understanding of local resources and community partners.
- Enhances the probability that no matter where individuals enter the system, they have access to coordinated services.
- Individuals may receive concurrent services by many disciplines, coordination of these services may reduce the number of systems the individual has to navigate.
- Collaboration promotes greater awareness of available services and improves access to and receipt of services for individuals.


## **GUARDIANSHIP**

Adult guardianship is governed by North Carolina General Statute 35A. County departments of social services Directors are the only statutorily defined disinterested public agent guardians (DPAG). County DSS Directors are appointed for incompetent individuals when no other family or socials supports are identified. The guardian is responsible for making decisions about their person or estate, for the best interest of the individual under guardianship.

There are three types of guardianship appointments:

- 1. Guardianship of the Person- involves making decisions about the individual's medical procedures, placement, and overall wellbeing.
- 2. Guardianship of the Estate- involves management of the individual's property and financial resources.
- 3. General Guardian- has the responsibility of both the person and estate decisions.

#### June 2022 Guardianship







\$3,795,442.80 for the SFY. The monthly amount for each individual per month is \$226.09.




# **GUARDIANSHIP FUNDING**

The funding is often depleted quickly in the state fiscal year leaving county funding to cover the cost of providing this statutorily mandated program.

# SPECIAL ASSISTANCE IN HOME (SAIH)

The Special Assistance In Home (SAIH) program was created for individuals who may need care in a facility, but who can remain safely in a private living arrangement (PLA), if provided with sufficient income, adequate housing, necessary health and social services, reliable informal support from family and friends, and case management services.

The N.C. General Assembly recognized this as a viable option when it passed a special provision in Session Law 1999 237 authorizing the SAIH Program, and then making it a permanent statutory program in 2007.

The goal of the SAIH program is to allow eligible individuals to remain in the community and live as independently as possible. The SAIH payment is an income supplement, and is intended to assist with the provision of daily necessities such as food, shelter, clothing, utilities, transportation, in-home aide services, essential household items, essential home repairs and modifications and other services that enable the client to live at home safely. The purpose of the SAIH payment is to help eligible individuals meet their basic financial needs.

As of June 30th 2022, 93% of counties were serving SAIH individuals, which equates to 3,747 individuals being served statewide.

# SPECIAL ASSISTANCE IN HOME WAITING LIST


County departments of social services face barriers while providing the Special Assistance In Home (SAIH) program. Some of those barriers include additional funding for staff, large caseload sizes, community education about the program, and the COVID-19 pandemic.

While these barriers have posed challenges, the SAIH program has proven to be a value to many older and disabled adults. The SAIH program can provide the ability for individuals to stay in their homes with the necessary supports and can prevent maltreatment to include abuse, neglect, and exploitation. Counties reported that a lack of funding for additional staff and staff having multi-program responsibilities as leading barriers to increasing SAIH cases.

**20%** of NC counties reported having a SAIH waiting list in SFY 21-22.


As of June 2022, there were a total of **401** adults on those SAIH Waiting Lists.

In December 2021, Session Law (S.L.) 2021-180 removed the limit on the number of allowable SA In-Home recipients. Counties should not place individuals on a waiting list. Any waiting lists that counties currently have should be worked to be eliminated.




# NC Coverage Maps for Continuous • Quality Improvement Specialist (CQIs)

#### Continuous Quality Improvement Specialist for Special Assistance




# STATEWIDE CONSULTATIONS



#### Greetings DSS Directors,

Recently DHHS created a monthly dashboard of key outcomes in the behavioral health system, something the DSS Directors have requested for quite some time. DSS data about children in DSS offices that you self-report has been integrated into these key metrics. I am sharing a recent message from Secretary Kinsley to our legislators regarding this dashboard and have attached this first monthly report as well as proving you the link for the monthly posting.

#### From Secretary Kinsley:

As you know, improving Behavioral Health is a top priority. To that end, we've created a **monthly dashboard** of key outcomes of the Behavioral Health System. We've shared this with the LME/MCO CEOs for feedback, which we have incorporated. I'm sharing it now with you, also for your feedback. Our goal is a tool that highlights our shared priorities and areas to improve. It's important to note: this is not about finding fault, and that when something isn't right, the goal is to start a conversation on how things could be better, and discovering all the pieces at play. If we can better define the problem, we can better work together to solve it.

Attached is the dashboard and further below are the data definitions.

#### Here are a few highlights, by measure:

#### Medicaid Covered Children in Inappropriate Crisis Situations:

- Eastpointe, Sandhills, and Vaya all had more than double per-capita children in inappropriate crisis settings than the other 3 LME/MCOs.
- Across the 3-month period, these children tended to be in Emergency Departments, save Partners and Vaya, where children tended to be in DSS Offices.

#### Children in PRTFs

NC had 190 children in out-of-state PRTFs. (41% of the total – 462 children).

Trillium has the least number of children in PRTFs – per capita and absolute.

#### State Psych Read for Discharge

- There are 185 patients in State Psych Hospitals Ready for Discharge
- Alliance, Sandhills, and Trillium had more than the state average number of patients ready for discharge.

(important to note that often insurance coverage, access to housing, and other social supports make it challenging for LME/MCOs to create safe discharge plans)

#### **Serving Individuals with IDD**

- ~39% of individuals on the Innovations Waiting List get some sort of service.
- Eastpointe had the lowest (14%) of individuals on the waiting list getting some sort of service; Trillium had the highest with 66%.

#### Follow-up Within 7 Days After Inpatient Discharge

- 7-Day follow-up among mental health Medicaid consumers was highest for Partners (52%) and lowest for Eastpointe (31%)
- 7-Day follow-up among mental health State-Funded consumers was highest for Vaya (45%) and lowest for Trillium & Eastpointe (19%)
- 7-Day follow-up among substance use Medicaid consumers was highest for Sandhills (42%) and lowest for Trillium & Eastpointe (22%)
- 7-Day follow-up among substance use State-Funded consumers was highest for Partners (61%) and lowest for Sandhills (23%)

#### **About the Dashboard Measures**

**Children in Inappropriate Crisis Settings.** This is the number of children boarded in emergency departments or county Department of Social Services offices over the most recent 3-month period measured. An arrow <u>down</u> shows improvement.

Medicaid Children in Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facilities (PRTFs). This is the number of children in PRTFs, including whether the placement is in-state or out-of-state and by whether the child is DSS-involved over the most recent 3-month period measured. An arrow <u>down</u> shows improvement.

**Ready for Discharge.** Patients who are stable and no longer need to be in a state psychiatric hospital should be discharged timely. The dashboard includes the number of patients waiting to be discharged and those who are not yet ready for discharge for each LME/MCO. An arrow <u>down</u> shows improvement.

People on Innovations Waitlist Receiving Medicaid or State-Funded Behavioral Health/IDD Services. This shows people who are waiting to receive an Innovations Waiver slot that are currently receiving any Medicaid or State-funded BH/IDD service. Data is reported by the LME/MCO for the most recent 3-month period measured. An arrow up shows improvement.

Follow-Up Within 7 Days After Inpatient Discharge – Mental Health Treatment. After someone is discharged from a hospital for mental health treatment, they need to receive community services quickly. The standard is within 7 days of hospital discharge. An arrow <u>up</u> shows improvement.

**Follow-Up Within 7 Days After Inpatient Discharge – Substance Use Disorder Treatment.** This measure mirrors the previous one but focuses on follow up after admission and discharge for Substance Use Disorder treatment. An arrow <u>up</u> shows improvement.




Foster Family Alliance of North Carolina held nominations for World Social Work Day which was 3/21.




