Richard Thorpe

601 N. Main Street Danbury, NC 27016 Re: McClanless Inn

Mr. Thorpe noted the following comments regarding the McClanless Inn located in the Town of Danbury:

- Have a situation with the McClanless Inn which has been in Danbury since 1830
- Personally spent \$400 toward the purchase of the historical marker for the Inn
- Historical sites bring tourism
- Have people in Danville, VA and Philadelphia, PA that want to come to the Inn and do authentic reenactments that will bring commerce to Danbury and Stokes County
- Have built a restaurant in the Inn and have \$24,000 worth of equipment already bought for the restaurant
- People think that old historical buildings can't go back to how they were originally
- Building has been there for over 180 years
- Have engineer plans that shows the building is stable and is zoned commercial residential
- Have worked as a chef at many five star restaurants across the country
- Trying to bring money to Stokes County
- Inspector Jimmy Kallam is giving me a big fit about this place
- Have questioned Mr. Kallam why the place can't be opened
- Want to know if there is something dangerous or hazardous that needs to be take care of
- Met with Mr. Kallam, a health inspector and the fire marshal, they told me that they did not want a restaurant, they wanted a bed and breakfast
- Have already spent over \$170,000 on renovations to the building
- Can't afford to build a bed and breakfast
- Know what I am doing, I am a contractor
- This building could bring revenue to this county and increase the quality of food being served
- The place is ready to go, but having a lot of opposition
- Wondering why there is so much opposition
- Could hire people right now if I could open the restaurant
- This would be a good thing for the Town of Danbury and Stokes County
- Have been working on this building for over seven years with half ready to go
- Need to open the restaurant in order to finish the other eight rooms

- It will be a fashionable, decent place that will help everybody
- Have a permit from the Town of Danbury that they approved a restaurant in the town
- If there are any codes or laws that need to be addressed, will be happy to do
- Just want to open a restaurant

Intergovernmental Relations Director Rebecca Troutman, NCACC, discussed the

following power point presentation with the Board of Commissioners:

Where We are Now - State of the Counties

- > County Budget Status Little Financial Improvement Seen
 - (Based on annual NCACC Budget & Tax Survey)
 - 50 counties cut budget
 - 21 counties increased property tax rate
 - 39 counties under hiring freeze
 - 29 counties reduced school \$
 - 52 counties eliminated 600+ positions
 - 24 counties laid off 126 employees

> Counties Face Declining Tax Base

- 43 counties underwater
 - o Cherokee = 31%
 - o 10 counties > 10%
 - Revaluations = property tax increases
 - o Brunswick County = 13.75 cents
 - Current law requires counties >75,000 to revalue at 115%
 - o Each year the Department of Revenue calculates the sales assessment ratio (selling price versus the assessed revaluation of the property)
 - O Normally, during revaluation, property grows in value, but during the recent housing problems, counties are finding out that their assessed revaluations are actually higher than market value

- o There is a general statute which requires a county, if they are 15% over valued in the assessed valuation, then they must be revalued
- O Union County is another county in this situation
- Stokes County = 96.6% in very good shape
- Several counties are having to raise taxes to stay revenue neutral

> Counties Reset Budgets

- Budget cuts during recession and sluggish economy = \$1 billion (10%)
- Spending drops below \$10 billion statewide
 - o Levels not seen since 2007

State of the State's Economy (Barry Boardman-NCGA Chief Economist)

- > State's General Fund Ok So Far....but
 - Recent economic data show recovery slowly regaining traction lost last summer & fall
 - 1st 8 months— \$115 M above \$11.1B target
 - o Revenue trends not as robust in 2nd quarter
 - Net withholdings flattening
 - o Sales taxes up, but not at 1st quarter levels
 - 10% increase in 1st quarter
 - 7.1% up thru 8 months
 - State Medicaid \$150 M over budget

> Jobless Recovery Impedes Growth

- 30 months into recovery
 - o 300,000 fewer jobs in NC
 - o Housing sector loses 1/3 workforce
 - o Dec. 2010 Dec. 2011
 - Private sector up 12,400 jobs, government sector down by 7,900 jobs
 - o NC unemployment >9% until 2014?
 - o UE claims on decline
 - o Increased price of gas and sluggish economy continue in North Carolina
 - o Currently still in the deficit mode
 - O During the height of the recession, North Carolina lost 10% of sales tax revenue (sales tax being the second largest revenue source) relative to the year before
 - North Carolina has never had such a drop in sales tax before
 - o Dropped another 4% the next year
 - O North Carolina is slowly climbing out of the revenue loss, but are very concerned with the increasing gas prices, North Carolina may began to see another drop in sales tax revenue
 - o Point of Delivery sales tax has also decreased sales tax revenue in Stokes County
 - o One of the Federal Legislative Goals is to compel Congress to get remote vendors to collect sales tax on behalf of North Carolina
 - o Amazon refuses to collect sales tax on behalf of North Carolina
 - o Amazon has agreed to start collecting sales tax for California in Sept. 2012

- Next year, the General Assembly of North Carolina is going to attempt tax reform again; attempts will be made to have sales tax on services which will help North Carolina's tax base
- o Nationally, this past year, remote sales increased 16% over the year before, all sales only increased 8% remote sales are going to continue to increase

> State Outlook

- Subpar, but steady growth in 2012
 - o State budget predicated on higher revenue growth
 - O Hope the state meets revenue for the next fiscal year
 - Certainly can't afford to lose any more money or have any more state expenses shifted to counties
 - Very concerned about the rising price of gasoline, very fragile economy which could lower the economic recovery
- Fragile recovery
 - o Subject to economic shocks, e.g. gas prices, Europe recession, USA debt reduction efforts

District Meetings scheduled for April 2012

Commissioner Walker noted to Director Troutman the recent loss of acquiring health insurance with the NCACC pool which was very advantageous to Stokes County and questioned why that could not continue.

Director Troutman responded:

- o Very unfortunate that the NCACC had to get out of the health care business
- o Went very well when the Association was with BCBS with over 30,000 members
- o Counties began to drop out when the Association went with CIGNA which ended up with less than 10,000 members
- o Working on trying to get counties (if so desired) to be able to join the State Health Care Plan
- Must have legislative approval to allow other counties to join right now can only
 join for two years, but will continue to work on being able to stay with the plan after
 the two years is up
- o County needs to contact State legislators to indicate their desire to join the State Plan

County Manager Rick Morris requested Director Troutman to explain further about the restructure of human services.

Director Troutman responded:

- o Two models Wake and Mecklenburg models
 - o Mecklenburg model
 - The BOCC has all the authority and sits as the Boards of Health and DSS
 - Still has two departments, each having a director that reports to the County Manager
 - o Wake model
 - Has a consolidated human services board that has all the authority of the Boards of Health and DSS
 - Manager has the hiring and firing authority with consent of the human services board
- o Can have a human services board that has the authority for both Health and DSS or you can have the BOCC serves as the authority
- Option will be left up to the County whether Health and DSS remain under the State Personnel Act

Director Troutman concluded with very good news - Stokes County will get Hold Harmless Funding in August 2012, may be cut 10%. Director Troutman noted that the reimbursement is calculated and paid out on calendar year and not fiscal year.

Chairman Lankford, on behalf of the entire Board, expressed the Board's appreciation

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to Director Troutman for the update and bringing Stokes County great news - Hold Harmless.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT – GOVERNING BODY – DISCUSSION AGENDA

NCDOT - Request to Abandon a Portion of SR#1915 - Pipe Plant Road from the Secondary Roads System along with Abandonment of the Right of Way

County Manager Rick Morris presented the following information regarding a request from NCDOT to abandon a portion of SR#1915 – Pipe Plant Road from the Secondary Road Systems:

- Request to abandon approximately 5,914' from the Secondary Roads System
- Pine Hall Brick Company, Inc. is the sole property owner for the portion being requested to be abandoned from the Secondary Roads System
- County Attorney Edward Powell has reviewed the request and has no legal issues
- Tax Administrator Jake Oakley sees no issues with the abandonment request
- Pine Hall Brick Company, Inc. has also requested the right of way be abandoned along the same portion of the road
- Request the BOCC to direct Administration staff to start the abandonment procedure according to General Statutes

Vice Chairman Inman confirmed with Manager Rick Morris that the entire portion being requested to be abandoned is owned by Pine Hall Brick and Pipe Company, Inc.

Commissioner Walker questioned if there had been any concerns from any citizens regarding the abandonment request.

Clerk Bullins noted that if directed by the Board, a Public Hearing will be scheduled and advertised which will allow anyone to present concerns or opposition to the Board of Commissioners regarding the abandonment request.

Chairman Lankford, with full consensus of the Board, directed Administration to take the statutory steps to abandon the road from the secondary road system and to abandon the right of way.

Chairman Lankford, with full consensus of the Board, directed the Clerk to place the items on the March 12th Action Agenda.

Qualified School Construction Bonds (QSCB) - 2013 Lawsonville Elementary School Project

County Manager Rick Morris presented the following information as requested by the BOCC at the February 14th meeting regarding the QSCB Program:

- After the bond issuance deadline of December 31, 2011, the State of NC has a remainder of \$12,530,150 in Qualified School Construction Bonds to be re-allocated
- There is no limit to how much each school system can apply for
- Deadline for application is March 16, 2012
- QSCBonds can be used for construction (including new construction), rehabilitation, or repair of a public school or for land acquisition for such a facility
- QSCB Program is intended to be interest free bonds, but could have a very small interest rate
- Met with Superintendent Ronnie Mendenhall, Stokes County Schools and Vice Chairman Mike Rogers, Stokes County Board of Education, who are both in favor of proceeding with the application
- Would have until the end of the calendar year to borrow the funds which will be no issue with the projected start date being in 2013
- Estimate for the Lawsonville project two years ago was approximately \$1.5 million
- Do not believe the current projected costs include any contingency

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• Did not see any cost for the removal of the old modular units

County Manager Rick Morris questioned Operations Director David Burge, Stokes Schools, about the estimated cost of the project.

Operations Director David Burge responded:

- \$1.5 million cost was only an estimate two years ago
- Very concerned about the square footage- the number seems too low for 8 classrooms
- Needs a revised estimate on cost and square footage
- Reiterated that figures are approximately two years old
- Can start on new estimates immediately

Chairman Lankford opened the floor for discussion.

Commissioner Walker noted:

- Even the if the footage is too low, construction costs today may be lower than estimated two years ago
- Feels the square footage is too low and could possibly cost close to \$2 million
- Could be a plus getting the funding at either no interest or a very low interest cost
- Would feel good about getting this project started earlier than scheduled and saving county dollars in interest payments

Manager Morris noted that the model had recently been rerun with the \$1.5 million estimated for the Lawsonville project and would be happy to get Mr. Carter to rerun the model using \$2 million.

County Manager Morris noted that he would contact Superintendent Mendenhall on Tuesday regarding the necessary paperwork.

The Board unanimously agreed it would be very advantageous to try to use QSCBonds for the Lawsonville project.

Chairman Lankford, with full consensus of the Board, directed the Clerk to place the items on the March 12th Action Agenda.
