Chairman Mendenhall called the meeting to order and welcomed those in attendance.

INVOCATION

Commissioner Lankford delivered the invocation.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT-GOVERNING BODY-PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairman Mendenhall invited those in attendance to join the Board in the Pledge of Allegiance.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT - GOVERNING BODY - APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Chairman Mendenhall entertained a motion to approve or amend the November 26th Agenda.

Chairman Mendenhall requested to add an item to the Discussion Agenda regarding a request from FTCC to issue a proclamation recognizing Dr. Green's work at Forsyth Tech and in Stokes County.

Commissioner Jones moved to approve the amended November 26th Agenda.

Commissioner Booth seconded the motion.

Chairman Mendenhall opened the floor for discussion/questions/comments.

With no further discussion the amended November 26th Agenda was approved.

COMMENTS - Manager/Commissioners

Commissioner Jones commented:

- It is a special night along with my other two colleagues here.
- This will be our last official meeting.
- It is a strange feeling.
- Obviously it is quite bittersweet.
- I would like to wish a belated Happy Thanksgiving to you guys.
- Would like to recognize that we have two young ladies here from South Stokes High School for their Civics class.
- They came up and took a photograph for proof that they were here.
- They are here to learn tonight and I thought that was special and wanted to share that with you.
- Lastly, I wanted to talk about an article I read in the paper on Thanksgiving about opioid deaths.
- We are actually losing 10,000 more people a year to alcohol related deaths.
- The totals were 70,000 to opioids, and 80,000 to alcohol.
- The number of women alcoholics has sky rocketed.
- I just wanted to mention this as we and the whole country have been focused on the opioid epidemic, that there are other issues.
- It seems we get focused on one thing or another and meanwhile something else is going out of control.

Commissioner Booth commented:

- Welcome everybody.
- Thank you for being here tonight.
- As my colleague said, this is our last official meeting.
- We will have to approve the minutes at another meeting.
- It has been a good eight years.
- It has been an honor and a blessing from the Lord.
- When I came on Board, I served with Leon Inman, and Jimmy of course, who is not here tonight because of a motorcycle accident.
- When I came on Board we were building schools.

- We found a way to build them in an economic downturn when no one else was building.
- We are getting ready to open the new addition to the jail.
- This was needed due to overcrowding and will produce revenue for the county.
- I can't say enough about the garage.
- We got the garage for a little over a million dollars and the owner financed it for us over 10 years at a low interest rate.
- We rented the upstairs and that is paying the payment for the building.
- In three or four more years this will be paid for without using any taxpayer money.
- We built the early college and now the trades building is underway.
- At the early college kids can graduate in 5 years, some complete it in 4, with a high school diploma and an associate's degree.
- Now they will be able to work as an apprentice and get a license for these important jobs.
- This group of County Commissioners has moved this county forward, while being conservative.
- We are leaving with a good fund balance; way more than we had when I came on Board.
- We were able to do all the things I have mentioned as well as save the hospital three times.
- Some people say the hospital is not worth saving.
- If it closed they would understand how important it is and it would leave a lot of people unemployed in our county.
- If a hospital closes it can take up to three years to get all the licensing back.
- My charge to the new group of Commissioners is to keep doing things, while being conservative, and not raising taxes.
- We are at about 33% fund balance; which is a lot more than we started with.

Commissioner Lankford commented:

- I would like to say to the two Commissioners to my right that I have enjoyed serving with you.
- I have had the opportunity to serve the great people of this county for twelve years.
- I am glad the good Lord gave me the opportunity to be a public servant.
- A public servant serves others and not themselves.
- I have tried my level best to make good decisions for the whole county.
- I have had the opportunity to work with three different Boards in my twelve years.
- As we go through time, conservative principles look after the people by providing resources and not wasting money.
- Commissioner Booth mentioned some of the things that we have done and I am proud of those.
- I am thankful the good Lord gave me the wisdom to be a public servant and that he knew that it was time for me to retire.
- I need to spend more time serving him than serving the public.
- I feel good about that.
- With that in mind I will read one more Ethics for Life.
- "For what shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his soul."
- We need to think about this, that Jesus Christ came and gave his life so that I could live.

- I am thankful that he has given me the opportunity to retire and stay home and let my wife look after me.
- I have enjoyed serving with all of you.
- I hope to be around for several years to see things go along that we started.
- We can have progress without putting the burden on the taxpayers.

- I feel like the lone ranger.
- I want to say thank you to each of my fellow three Commissioners.
- I consider my time working with you an honor and a privilege.
- I have learned a lot in these past two years working with you.

- We each try our best to serve the citizens of Stokes County the best way we can.

The Jayebird Gallery at Hanging Rock State Park - Nov /Dec

The Stokes County Arts Council presents the works of artist Anthony Miller at The Jayebird Gallery at Hanging Rock State Park. His exhibit of digital art will be on display in November and December.

Miller's interest in digital art began in 2005, when he discovered the ability to draw as one would with pencil or paint, only in a computerized environment. His work is primarily fantasy oriented with painted landscapes, cartooning, and explorations of the abstract psyche.

Born in Baltimore, Maryland, Miller and his family relocated to North Carolina in 2006, finally settling in Walnut Cove in 2013. Diagnosed with Asperger's Syndrome at age 5, Miller says, "My personal interests and thought processes were a complete mystery to everyone around me. I discovered that I had a knack for drawing and decided to start cultivating that skill from 1998 onwards. My parents began to homeschool me in middle school and have allowed me to cultivate my interest in art, teaching me to draw with more finesse and better style."

Miller is currently studying toward earning a degree in Digital Effects and Animation at Forsyth Technical Community College.

An opening reception and artist meet and greet was held on Sunday, November 4th.

<u>Veteran's Day Celebration – Nov 11th</u>

The American Legion Post 290 and the Stokes County Arts Council hosted a Veteran's Day Celebration on Sunday, November 11 at King Central Park.

The festivities began at the park amphitheater with a patriotic music prelude presented by the West Stokes High School Band under the direction of Ms. Lorena Schakel, followed at 2 p.m. with the Posting of Colors by the American Legion Post 290 Honor Guard. Legion Commander Clif Kilby introduced guest speaker Lieutenant Colonel David Durham before the program moved to the Stokes Veteran's Memorial site at the park for the tile dedication, laying of the wreath, and special music provided by Mr. Ken Bloom.

Veteran's Day is an official United States public holiday, observed annually on November 11 that honors military veterans who have served in the United States Armed Forces. It coincides with other holidays, including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day, celebrated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of World War I, as major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918, when the armistice with Germany went into effect. The United States previously observed Armistice Day until it was renamed Veteran's Day in 1954.

Stokes County Animal Control - DataMax Animal Control Collections

TO: Stokes County Board of Commissioners

RE: DataMax Animal Control Collections

DATE: November 7, 2018

In accordance with N.C.G.S 105A-1, the County can utilize DataMax Collection Services for Stokes County Animal Control fines. It has been verified with DataMax that the County will not be required to setup a separate account for Animal Control Citation Debt Setoff since the County already has a Capital Management Account for Debt Setoff. Please see the N.C. General Statute below.

105A-1. Purposes

The purpose of this Chapter is to establish as policy that all claimant agencies and the Department of Revenue shall cooperate in identifying debtors who owe money to the State or to a local government through their various agencies and who qualify for refunds from the Department of Revenue. It is also the intent of this Chapter that procedures be established for setting off against any refund the sum of any debt owed to the State or to a local government. Furthermore, it is the legislative intent that this Chapter be liberally construed so as to effectuate these purposes as far as legally and practically possible. (1979, c. 801, s. 94; 1997-490, s. 1.)

Commissioner Jones moved to approve the Consent Agenda.

With no further discussion, the motion carried unanimously.

DISCUSSION AGENDA

Wellness Center Presentation

Chairman Mendenhall noted that this project has been in the works for over a year, and that Commissioner Lankford and Commissioner Walker have been gathering information along with our County Manager Jake Oakley and Economic Development Director Wil Carter. They have visited numerous facilities, and we have now gotten information from Architect Perry Peterson.

Chairman Mendenhall turned the floor over to Commissioner Lankford, Architect Perry Peterson, and Economic Development Director Will Carter.

Commissioner Lankford presented the following information to the Board:

- As our Chairman mentioned, we have been gathering information on what is needed in a Wellness Center for Stokes County.
- At a doctor's appointment recently I had to answer five pages of questions related to wellness.
- Insurance companies and Medicare are very concerned with wellness programs.
- We see a major need for this Wellness Center in this location of the County.
- The western part of the county already has a YMCA, which is located in King.
- This is too far away for people to travel.
- We felt like if we could get a facility in the center of the County, which is the Meadows area, this would work well for everyone.
- We already have the land in this area.
- It would be an ideal location.
- We are hoping we can make this happen.
- We have been working on this for about a year.
- In the past five months, we have visited five different facilities in three different counties, which were Rockingham, Guildford, and Forsyth.
- One of the facilities that we looked at in Forsyth County fit what we thought we would need in Stokes County.
- At this time, Perry Peterson and Will Carter have information to present on the Wellness Center

Architect Perry Peterson presented the following information to the Board:

- It is my job as an architect to take this idea and turn it into a building that everyone can use.
- The other thing I have to do is try and project how much this building will cost.
- The first thing everyone asks when they see something nice is how much will it cost.
- The projected costs and details of the building are:

- Gross Building Area- 19,186 square feet (sf)
- Statement of Probable Cost
- Building
- \$158 per sf Subtotal
- Building Total 19,186 area $\times $158 = $3,031,388$
- Site Work
- Site Work Total \$403,000
- Building/Site Summary
- Building-\$3,031,000
- Site Work \$403,000
- 5% Contingency \$170,000

- Other Costs (Fees, Surveying, Internet)
- Other Costs Total \$331,000
- Total Project Probable Cost \$3,935,000

Architect Perry Peterson provided a 3D presentation of the Stokes Wellness Center:

- A large amount of land has been left towards the back so that down the road if there does need to be addition to the building there will be the land to do it on.
- There is a hallway leading to the back of the building that would make this possible.
- We are not only building what we want to do today but are hopefully planning ahead for the future.
- You may want to add a swimming pool or more exercise space.
- There are a tremendous amount of things that could happen.
- There would be a high school sized gym with a walking track above it.
- There could be many activities going on at once.
- There are windows on the top level as well, so as you are walking you can view what is going on outside.
- The floor plan for the facility has a lobby that 50 or 60 people could comfortably be in at once.
- The other thing that the lobby offers, is a reception area that is built to act as kind of a gate keeper so that one or two people can basically run the building.
- This design would eliminate having a large staff to run the building.
- This is centrally located so they can keep an eye on what is going on in the facility.
- There will also be a spectator and child care area.
- The building will be multiuse with a yoga, dance, and exercise studio.
- It could also double as another large meeting room.
- There is a door to the parking lot for convenience if there were to be caterers coming in for events or meetings.
- There is a large space for exercise equipment.
- We envision this being a large room with lots of windows.
- There will be an area for free weights.
- For the number of people, there is a fairly large amount of restrooms.
- Also as required by code there is a family restroom.

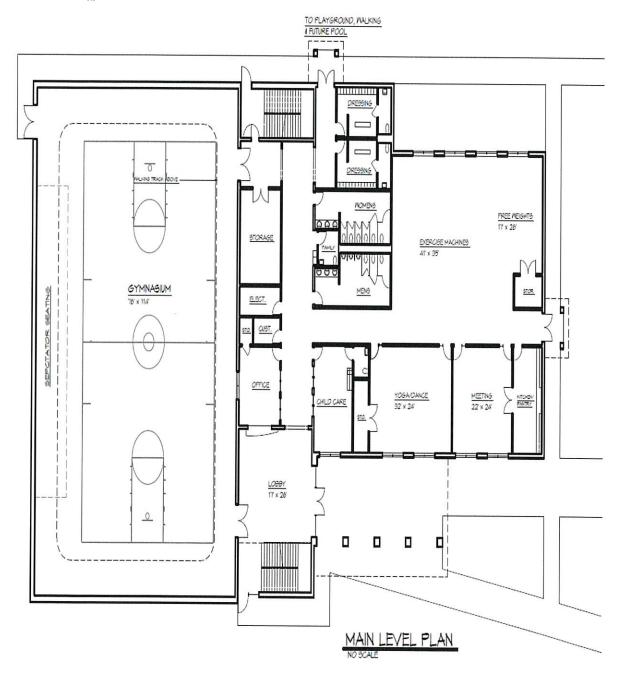
- There are dressing rooms.
- We are not doing any kind of showering facility because that requires a whole different level of supervision.
- If you decided to do a swimming pool, there would need to be some showers.
- Our goal was to keep the building under 20,000 square feet while providing as much program space as possible.
- The numbers I provided for the cost are probably some of the highest I have ever done in my career.
- The \$3.9 million does not include exercise equipment but everything else you would expect in a turnkey project would be included.
- There are of course numerous grant opportunities available I am sure.
- Some of which have been discussed during our planning sessions.

Economic Development Director Will Carter presented the following information to the Board:

• I am requesting that upon the Board's approval that the Board moves this item to the Action Agenda at tonight's meeting to approve the Capital Project Ordinance appropriating funds for the Wellness Center in the amount of \$4.2 million, with \$2 million from the general fund, and \$2.2 million from financing along with the approval of Budget Amendment #43.

Chairman Mendenhall opened the floor for discussion/questions/comments.

Commissioner Jones commented:

- This looks beautiful.
- I have several questions.
- Will the track be rubberized?

Architect Perry Peterson responded:

- At this point we are not that far along to know.
- It will be made to be easy to walk on.
- It may end up being rubberized.
- There are some cushioned floors that are easy to walk on.
- We are at a very schematic state so the detailed decisions will be made at a later date.

Commissioner Jones continued:

- My other concern is low level lighting.
- We keep building these big buildings and if we are not careful we are going to lose our stars.
- That is one of our pluses in this county.
- I am hoping whoever comes in can be sure that doesn't happen.

Architect Perry Peterson responded:

- A lot of what is being done now is a cut off type lighting which is LED lighting and shines down so you don't have the typical light spilling out around the building.
- We have choices.
- We can limit the height which will also help.
- We can do less fixtures.
- I am glad that you brought this up so we can note that down.

Commissioner Jones continued:

- I am kind of surprised we have this on here tonight to sign our names on.
- It is a lot of money.
- Of course I am not against the project.
- I understand it is our last meeting.
- I am curious about the USDA loans and other funding.
- I want to be sure we are going to do all we can concerning grants to keep this off the taxpayers.

Commissioner Booth commented:

- Just like Commissioner Lankford said, this has been going on for over a year.
- We even had a committee looking at it at one time.
- All along the way I have had a lot of questions.
- I have been saying show me what you are talking about and how it can be done.
- I appreciate you showing us this tonight.
- After seeing this, I was expecting the cost to be way above what was presented here tonight.
- I think the need is here in Stokes County.
- We have built a good fund balance and even with taking this \$2 million out, we would still be leaving it in good shape.
- It would really benefit the early college.
- I feel it would be good for economic development in the county.
- I have been asking about how we can sustain this building?
- We pay \$117,000.00 to the YMCA out of our budget.
- With the way this is designed, with it being able to be ran by 2 people, that amount would cover it.
- With the fact that we are funding half of the money up front, it should make us a better candidate for grants.
- It is looking good.

Commissioner Lankford commented:

- I believe our other Commissioners have said pretty much everything.
- We have an aging population.
- We spend a lot of money on our children, which I am in support of.
- The Wellness Center will be good for the children as well but will also benefit our aging population which we have not spent much on in the past.
- It will provide an indoor environment for them exercise and congregate with one another.
- This is good for their physical and mental health.
- We currently have a fund balance of 33.3 %.
- If we take the \$2 million out it will leave the balance at 29.5%.
- When I came on this Board 12 years ago our fund balance was 8%.
- It was so low the County was broke.
- We could not even finance the Walnut Cove Library.
- When we completed out last budget we said we would not go below 25% and we have stuck to that.
- Just as Commissioner Booth stated, when you have matching funds it is easier to find grant money.
- I believe this is something that will help the people of the County.
- It will provide a service to the people.

Chairman Mendenhall commented:

- I have made a list of fourteen items that I would like to share on the positives surrounding the Wellness Center.
- Most of them have already been spoken about.
- If I repeat anything just bear with me.
- 1. A Wellness Center is part of the process that helps to reduce insurance premiums. This has been addressed by two different speakers over the last few months.
- 2. It will be a big boost to Economic Development in our County. Families and businesses prefer to move into areas that have a variety of activities to offer.
- 3. It would offer physical activities from basketball, walking, yoga, and dance. On Election Day I had two people from the Walnut Cove area ask me if we were going to have a building that could accommodate yoga and dance.
- 4. We already have the land.
- 5. The location is in the center of the County.
- 6. It certainly can serve all of the County, however it does give the people of the northern end something closer by that they are missing.
- 7. Our County is extremely financially sound at this point. I give the credit to these Commissioners sitting beside me. It is going to be a challenge for the new Board members to continue this. I give kudos to three of you that are leaving for this accomplishment. They have done a tremendous job.
- 8. Commissioner Lankford, Commissioner Walker, Economic Development Director Will Carter, and our County Manager Jake Oakley have visited several sites and answered a lot of the questions we had, especially with this presentation.
- 9. I have known Perry Peterson for a long time. His architectural drawings are outstanding. When he gives you a price it is very close to the actual cost. He included the rising cost in the price. I have had the opportunity to work with him many times in the school system.
- 10. One of my campaign promises was to improve Economic Development and this is a major step in that direction.
- 11. When the YMCA was built in King, the County gave \$400,000.00 and every year since then has given \$117,000.00 with the YMCA contract.
- 12. The Meadows Community is growing. We already have the FTCC Campus, the Trades Building is underway, as well as the Animal Shelter. This would just add to the growth of that area.
- 13. It is usable by all ages.
- 14. There is grant money available. We will have to dig in and get them.
- This is a conservative Board.
- However, if they see a chance to advance this county forward, they are going to take it.

Commissioner Booth commented:

- We have had Josh Carswell here from the USDA several times to speak about funding.
- With the amount we are putting in and the possibility of grants we can bring down the amount we have to borrow substantially.
- My fellow Commissioners know I have been asking lots of questions on this and do not make a decision off the cuff.
- With that being said, I feel confident in this being moved to the Action Agenda.

Commissioner Booth motioned to move the approval of the Wellness Center to the Action Agenda at tonight's meeting.

Commissioner Jones seconded.

Chairman Mendenhall opened the floor for any further discussion/comments/questions.

With no further discussion and a 4-0 vote of the Board, the Chairman instructed the Clerk to add this to the Action Agenda at tonight's meeting.

Resolution for Dr. Gary Green with FTCC

Chairman Mendenhall presented the following information to the Board:

- I received a request by email from Bill Green from FTCC requesting that the Board of Commissioners issue a proclamation recognizing Dr. Green's work at Forsyth Tech and in Stokes County.
- As many of you know, Dr. Green is retiring at the end of the year.
- They would like someone to present this at the retirement gathering to be held on December 12, 2018 at the college.
- December 31, 2018 will be Dr. Greens last day.

Commissioner Lankford motioned to move the proclamation to the Action Agenda at tonight's meeting.

Commissioner Jones seconded.

Chairman Mendenhall opened the floor for discussion/questions/comments.

With no further discussion and a 4-0 vote of the Board, the Chairman instructed the Clerk to add this to the Action Agenda at tonight's meeting.
