The Busy Season For Building And Codes



It may seem like Christmas was over before it started, but spring is just around the corner. This means the Sugar Creek Building and Codes Department is gearing up for a busy time of year.

As the ground begins to thaw from the chill of winter, it's important for residents to keep in mind the need for proper permitting before they begin their building and/or renovation projects. Some projects require a permit but do not have a fee for the permit. It's also important to keep your properties up to city code.

A building permit is required anytime a person plans to build, enlarge, change, repair, move, tear down or change the occupancy of a structure. Also, permits are required when these same changes are made to any electrical, gas, mechani-

cal, plumbing or elevator systems. Swimming pools deeper than 24" or any that will need installation of electrical wiring will also need a permit.

It doesn't matter if the homeowner hires a contractor to do the work or do the work themselves, permits are required – even when it involves finishing a basement or building a deck.

But not all home repair projects require a permit. Keep in mind minor maintenance to fixtures like toilets, faucets, light switches, and ceiling fans do not require a permit. But adding a fixture where one doesn't exist does require a permit.

According to the city's website, fences six feet high and less do not require a permit. But anything more than six feet must have a permit with engineered drawings showing

the fence can withstand 90-mile per hour 3-second wind gusts.

All fences must be within the property boundaries. The finished side of any fence must face towards your neighbors. Retaining walls over 4-feet high also require a building permit and engineered drawings stamped by a Missouri Licensed Engineer.

Like fences, sheds within certain parameters (less than 120 square feet) do not require a permit, but any additional structure regardless of size must be built in accordance with city code and meet setback standards. If there will be any electrical, plumping or mechanical systems to the shed it will need a building permit.

Permits are good for 180 days. A

FROM THE DESK OF MAYOR MIKE LARSON...

Council Meeting Minutes 12/12/2022

- The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. on December 12, 2022, with Mr. Jim Nauser who led in the Pledge of Allegiance. A quorum was established by roll call and the Consent Agenda was passed unanimously.

- In business from the floor, Mr. Warren Herrick, Auditor from Hood & Associates, presented the Fiscal Year 2021 Sugar Creek Financial Audit Review. Summary: Financials are looking strong for the City of Sugar Creek.

- Seeing no further business from the floor, five ordinances were presented to the Aldermen. All passed unanimously.

- a) Ordinance No. 4602 - Ordinance authorizing and directing submission at the General Election to be held April 4, 2023 to the qualified voters of the City of Sugar Creek, Missouri, the question of whether the City shall impose an additional sales tax in the amount of three percent on the retail sale of adult use marijuana.

- b) Ordinance No. 4603 - Ordinance approving the Police Services Agreement and Addendum between the City of Sugar Creek, Missouri, and the Village of River Bend, and authorizing the Prosecutor and Municipal Judge of the City of Sugar Creek to serve as Prosecutor and Judge of the Village of River Bend, Missouri.

- c) Ordinance No. 4604 - Ordinance authorizing payment to Wil-Pav Asphalt and Concrete for street repairs at various locations in the City of Sugar Creek.

- d) Ordinance No. 4605 - Ordinance approving an Engagement Agreement between the City of Sugar Creek, Missouri and Hood and Associates, Certified Public Accountants for professional consulting services and authorizing the Mayor to execute the Engagement Agreement.

- e) Ordinance No. 4606 - Ordinance authorizing the acceptance of a Quit

Claim Deed Conveyance as part of the Road Relinquishment Agreement with the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission upon completion of improvements to the east outer road of M-291 Highway and authorizing the City Administrator to sign the conveyance.

- Mayor is involved with Independence regarding a potential Community Improvement District (CID). The Aldermen discussed whether to move forward with the CID process. A motion was made and seconded and the vote was unanimous to move forward. A motion was made and seconded and the vote was unanimous to proceed with Bill Moore Law Firm to develop documents pertaining to the CID.

- City Administrator Pat Casey thanked everyone involved with the Red Bag Event to make this event successful this year. This week, he attended Little Blue Valley Sewer District meeting. As of January 1, 2023, there will be a 12.5% increase for commercial businesses. City Hall roof replacement ordinance will be brought back next Council meeting on January 9. Regarding trash complaints – other cities are having the same issue. Administration will begin to track instances and bring up when negotiating new contract in 2025.

- Police Chief Soule reported that he will swear in a new police officer at next Council meeting on January 9. He has also received numerous complaints regarding dogs running loose.

- City Attorney Jennifer Baird will bring forward ordinances early next year regarding the newly approved recreational marijuana usage.

- Fire Chief Nate Richardson received notice from FEMA that Sugar Creek did not receive SAFER Grant, but they will reapply. The Fire Department also applied for an Emergency Medical Service Provider Grant; this is a 50% match grant. Nate

Richardson would like to take money allotted for rescue truck and apply toward this grant to purchase a newer CPR device. The Fire Department will come forward with ideas early next year to provide staffing solutions. The department finally received a VIN number for the Ford chassis.

- Building Official Ed Cary reported that Dominos is progressing quickly and the old Stix & Stones building drywall has been installed.

- City Clerk Christine McGhee reported a meeting with Wayside Waifs regarding a possible contract for animals. A few dates to note: December 26, 2022 – City offices closed in observance of Christmas. January 2, 2023 – City offices closed in observance of New Year's Day. January 9, 2023 – next Board of Aldermen Council meeting.

- Finance Director Keisha Guthrie will bring a quarterly financial report and a business license renewals report at the next Council meeting on January 9.

- Parks and Recreation Program Director Pam Burnham reported the Mayor's Christmas Tree Lighting event went well. Thank you to all who volunteered at the event. The Luminary Walk hosted by VFW was well received and collected \$405 to be donated to the CCRC. Gym rentals have increased to 3 to 4 times a work week.

- Jim Nauser reported on behalf of Ben Hedrick for the Public Works Department. They are currently interviewing for a full-time employment position. Trailer bids were received to replace a trailer to be used at Public Works. Ordinance will be brought back next Council meeting on January 9 for approval to purchase the budgeted equipment.

- Seeing no further business from the floor and no reason to move into closed session, the Council voted unanimously to adjourn at 7:23 p.m.

LANDFILL PERMIT PROCEDURES- The following is information for obtaining a landfill permit from the City of Sugar Creek:

- Must be a resident of Sugar Creek, and all refuse charges must be current and up-to-date for the service address.
- A current Sugar Creek utility bill must be presented at the time of obtaining the permit.
- In a calendar year, the maximum number of daily permits issued to a resident shall be four (4). Additional permits may be issued at the discretion of the Public Works Director.
- Residents using haulers other than themselves must call ahead to approve the hauler to pick up the permit.
- All waste material hauled to the landfill must comply with the regulations that govern sanitary landfills, as determined by state law. NO batteries, white goods, appliances, paint, or hazardous materials. For the full list, contact Courtney Ridge Landfill.
- Permits for the landfill are only issued to properties that are located within the city limits of Sugar Creek. All refuse must come from the address located in Sugar Creek.

TRASH TOTES NOTICE- Please do not overload trash totes. Totes are intended for household trash only. No construction debris, yard waste, or hazardous waste should be placed in totes.

WHOSE SNOW?- Who is responsible for clearing and maintaining sidewalks during a snow event? The adjacent property owners are responsible for maintaining their sidewalks. We ask that both business and residential owners maintain their sidewalks for safe pedestrian travel. Per Ordinance No. 105 Sec. 38-3 (c) - Clearing of snow, ice, etc., required: *It shall be unlawful for any person to fail, neglect or refuse to keep the sidewalk or the gutter in front of the buildings, tenements, rooms, or real property owned or occupied by him or her, or under his or her management or control, swept clean of mud, filth, dirt, snow and ice, and clear and clean from weeds and grass.*

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS- During times of emergencies from Public Works, such as trash cancellations, water breaks, special announcements, or street closures, the department will utilize the City of Sugar Creek Facebook page, the Sugar Creek website, and the daily edition of "This Week in the Creek" for up-to-date information.

building inspector will come out at various stages of the work to check for compliance before work can move to the next stage. Inspectors will provide a list of items that need to be corrected before work can move to the next stage.

The Building and Codes Department also works with residents to keep all property clean and up to code. Residents are expected to keep their yards mowed less than 12 inches high with all noxious weeds removed. Residents who violate this policy will be notified of the need to comply. If the property still isn't mowed, the city will have it done and bill the property owner.

Additionally, city code prohibits the collecting of debris and trash in yards.

"The Municipal Code prohibits any accumulation of worn out, broken or worthless items, including broken toys, washing machines, clothes dryers, stoves, ranges, refrigerators, newspapers, trash or refuse on any property. Useful items, such as lumber, boxes, barrels, bottles, cans, ladders, carts, logs, and metal must be properly stored."

Cars, trailers, campers and boats may be stored outside but only on a paved surface.


